PLANS FOR REORGANIZING OF CITY HALL

AGRARIANS WITH ALLIES ARE PLANNING TO ENTER B. C. POLITICAL FIELD

Mayor Recommends Dismissal of Four City Departmental Heads--- Vance, Hooper, Duncan and Woods

The first inkling of the scope of the recommendations regarding official reorganization which Mayor H. B. Rochester will put before the city council for endorsement at the meeting on Monday night, was received last night by four heads of departments at the city hall. It came in the form of personal letters to W. D. Vance, city treasurer; E. A. Woods, city clerk; T. C. Duncan, superintendent of utilities; and T. B. Hooper, city solicitor, informing them, if the recommendations were approved by the council, the letters would serve as a notice of dismissal to take effect on December 31st this year.

CITY HALL IN MEXICO CITY IS DESTROYED

Mob Clashes With Police in Six Hour Battle Alleging Indifference to Water Famine

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 1.—A mob wrecked and burned the City Hall in the course of a six-hour battle with the police in protest against alleged indifference to water famine. The police fired on the mob and killed seventeen besides injuring fifty. Troops are patrolling the city and business houses are closed.

SUDDEN DEATH BERT RUSSELL

Well Known Pianist Expired in Hospital This Afternoon Following Failure

Robert C. (Bert) Russell, the well known musician and pianist in Arthur's Orchestra, was stricken with heart failure about 1 o'clock this afternoon in the Good Eats Cafe and expired a few minutes later in the General Hospital. Deceased had gone into the restaurant about 12:30 and had given an order for toast and tea. He complained shortly afterwards of pains across the chest and suddenly collapsed. Dr. W. T. Kergin was called and rushed him to the hospital where he died. Deceased had an axe in his hand when entering the restaurant and was on his way to the St. Elmo Hotel to do some work for A. Roy. Only last night he played with Arthur's Orchestra at the St. Andrew's hall and was apparently in normal health then.

The late Mr. Russell, who was about 40 years of age, is survived by a wife and son in Vancouver. Funeral arrangements are in the hands of the Moose Lodge of which he was a member.

THREE BURNED PORTLAND FIRE

Ben Hur Hotel Swept by Fire Last Night

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 1.—Three men lost their lives and property estimated at \$75,000 was damaged in a fire which swept the Ben Hur Hotel here last night. The dead are J. J. McDonald, address unknown, and two Filipino bus boys.

REVENGE WAR IS PLANNED

Daily Mail Says it Has Proof of Russo-German Secret Pact

LONDON, Dec. 1.—The Daily Mail claims it possesses proof that Germany and Russia are working under a secret pact to make munitions in Russia, drill soldiers under German supervision, concentrate airplanes and prepare for an agricultural campaign in Russia to make the two countries independent of ocean imports with a view to launching a war of revenge chiefly against France.

BURDE HAD STORMY TIME AS CHAIRMAN IN HOUSE THURSDAY

VICTORIA, Dec. 1.—Major Dick Burde, the Independent soldier member for Alberni who enjoys interrupting speakers and delaying the business of the House, was chairman of bills yesterday. LABOR BILLS BROUGHT UP

Guthrie Measure for Protecting Children Was Defeated—Present Act Covers It

VICTORIA, Dec. 1.—Private members' day yesterday gave the Labor members a chance to take to their bills, none of which seems likely to pass.

Hon. J. W. deB. Farris, member for Vancouver, took exception to three bills, one of which was introduced by Sam Guthrie, Labor member for Newcastle. It was defeated by 23 to 15, having been opposed by Mr. Bowser and Mr. Oliver and the most of the Liberal members. The bill was supposed to protect children but Mr. Farris said there were already wider powers under the present Act.

NINETY FOOT BOAT GOES AROUND WORLD

MIAMI, Fla., Dec. 1.—The motor cruiser Speed-Jacks, ninety feet long, has completed a globe-circling tour. The boat left Miami in September 1921. It is believed to be the smallest boat in the world accomplishing the feat.

WIDER POWERS DEALING WITH FOREST FIRES

Minister of Lands to Introduce Amendments to Forest Act in Legislature

VICTORIA, Dec. 1.—Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, will introduce in the legislature a measure amending the Forest Act to give the department wider powers in dealing with forest fires. The experience of the past season has shown that much drastic action is necessary and that it will be without cost to the people of the province generally if the timber is conserved.

ANXIETY FELT FOR SCHOONER MORENGEN

Coastguard Cutter Smith Dispatched From Ketchikan in Search For Her.

Anxiety is felt in Ketchikan regarding the safety of the halibut schooner Morengen which is long overdue. The Morengen left Petersburg on October 14 last and was last heard of on November 5 when she was seen in a heavy storm off Yakutat. The coastguard cutter has gone in search of the schooner which is commanded by Capt. Walderbaugh.

SEVEN OF CREW LAKE MICHIGAN STEAMER DEAD

Canadian Ship Broke up in Heavy Gale today

CALUMET, Mich., Dec. 1.—Captain Mason Bernard and six members of the crew of the Canadian steamer Maplehurst lost their lives early today when the ship broke up a mile west of Portage Lake canal during a heavy gale. Nine other members of the crew were rescued after jumping from the bridge into lifeboats.

Amalgamation of All Returned Soldier Organizations is Live Question Penticton Convention

PENTICTON, Dec. 1.—The provincial convention of the Great War Veterans' Association opened here today with a stirring speech by Major M. J. Grehan, of Vancouver, Dominion president of the Army and Navy Veterans' Association of Canada.

Major Grehan discussed the amalgamation of various returned soldiers' organizations and stated that the first meeting of the newly constituted British Columbia section of the amalgamation committee would be held in Vancouver on December 7, next Thursday. A platform opinion on amalgamation would then be submitted. This platform, along with similar platforms from other provincial committees, would be referred to the Dominion amalgamation committee to guide in working out a plan for the amalgamation of all veterans' associations in Canada.

The British Columbia amalgamation committee includes Col. J. Leckie, of Vancouver; Col. C. E. Edgett, of Vernon; Walter Drinnan, of the Great War Veterans' Association; J. W. Glenwright, of Vancouver, representing the Grand Army United Veterans; President Ross of the Vancouver Imperial Veterans; Major Grehan and General Ward, of the Vancouver Army and Navy Veterans. Members for Vancouver are: Capt. J. H. Falconer, member of the board, asking the staffs to put their selling ability behind certain brands. United Farmers Launched New Political Body at Vernon to be Known as Provincial Party

VERNON, Dec. 1.—A new political organization to be known as the Provincial Party was launched by the United Farmers of British Columbia at a meeting here yesterday of the political committee of farmers' organizations. All organizations not in accord with the two old parties are invited to join with the farmers to form the new party. Labor men, business men and others will be invited to confer with representatives of the United Farmers Party at its annual meeting to be held in January to plan an active campaign throughout the province.

John Redman, chairman of the political committee, stated that enormous fixed provincial charges and increasing high taxes were already a burden to farmers and ordinary citizens of the province. This was responsible for the action now taken by the farmers.

Local political organizations will be set up in all agricultural ridings. The platform of the new party includes land settlement in conjunction with Imperial and other authorities, rural credits, drastic cutting down of costs, construction of the provincial university, amendments to the Liquor Act, establishment of free ports by the Dominion government at Victoria and Vancouver and absorption of involuntary unemployment by provision of productive work non-competitive with established industries.

MONTREAL COLLEGE BURNED TO GROUND

Laval Dental and Veterinary College Burned in Fire Believed of Incendiary Origin

MONTREAL, Dec. 1.—The Laval Dental and Veterinary College, situated with the University of Montreal but in a separate building, was burned to the ground last night. The loss is estimated at about \$500,000. Eight firemen were injured by flying glass. Rumors of incendiarism are current.

LABOR BILL REJECTED BY BRITISH COMMONS

Measure in Regard to Unemployment Turned Down by Vote of 303 to 172

LONDON, Dec. 1.—The House of Commons today rejected by a vote of 303 to 172 an amendment to the speech from the Throne moved by the Labor Party. The amendment raised the question of unemployment.

IRISH BILL PASSES LORDS' COMMITTEE

Third and Final Reading Will be Made on Monday, it is Expected

LONDON, Dec. 1.—The Irish constitution bill passed without amendment through its committee stage in the House of Lords today. It will receive its third and final reading on Monday.

VICTORY BONDS ARE BEING REDEEMED IN ALL CANADIAN BANKS

OTTAWA, Dec. 1.—In every bank in Canada today Victory Bonds are being redeemed. In all between seventy and eighty million dollars will be paid out and more than a hundred million dollars of the loan converted.

KILLS MANAGER OF STORE THEN TURNS PISTOL ON HIMSELF

DUCK LAKE, Sask., Dec. 1.—After admitting theft from the store where he had been employed as a clerk for 28 years and having been dismissed, A. G. Davidson, aged 65, returned to the store with a revolver and shot and killed David McNair, manager. He then committed suicide by turning the gun on himself.

BLIZZARD ON GREAT LAKES

Ties up Biggest Grain Shipment Ever Sent Out of Fort William

FORT WILLIAM, Ont., Dec. 1.—After having loaded and cleared with 7,000,000 bushels of grain yesterday constituting a record shipment day, several ships have been compelled to remain at Thunder Bay under shelter of Islands unable to venture out into Lake Superior on account of a heavy blizzard at the head of the lakes. The ships had to leave the harbor last night in order to secure lower insurance rates expiring on November 30. Only one vessel is reported in the middle of the lake and it is battling with the storm. The others scurried to shelter.

INTEREST IN CHIROPRACTIC

Medical Doctor Defended System at Opening Committee Meeting in Victoria Yesterday

VICTORIA, Dec. 1.—Great interest was taken here yesterday morning in the opening meeting of the committee recently appointed by the legislature to look into chiropractic affairs. There was a large number of people in attendance including many women.

Dr. Lee Edwards, a medical man from Omaha, Nebraska, who said that he himself had been cured by the chiropractic system when doctors had failed, was examined at length. He claimed that medical doctors were prejudiced against the system and that was why a separate profession had grown up. He admitted that there were cases that would not yield to chiropractic treatment. Dr. Edwards explained the difference between the chiropractic system and that practised by medical doctors. Chiropractors adjusted the spine, he said, and the other organs of the body then repaired themselves.

Today the chiropractic committee was still the centre of interest. The meeting was crowded all the time. Full stenographic reports are being taken of the proceedings but it is not likely to lead to any action being taken by the legislature.

Progress Towards Halibut Close Season.

It is now getting on towards that time of the year when the landings of spawn-laden halibut from fishing schooners here brings home forcibly the necessity and desirability of a close season for these fish. It is gratifying to see the progress that has been made in the past twelve-month towards the enactment of International legislation which will bring such a close season into effect.

Many appeals have been made lately for a close season both in the United States and Canada by companies participating in the halibut industry, fishermen and other fishing interests. A satisfactory point has been reached in the recommendation to the Canadian parliament by the Duff fisheries commission for a close season between November 15 and February 15 annually.

The difficulty in the past has been to obtain unanimity of opinion and action on the matter by the Canadian and United States governments. With the United States indicating its intention of co-operating that difficulty has been to a large extent removed.

The indications now are that another year may see the actual enactment of the badly needed legislation and that by December 1 the halibut fisheries of the Pacific Coast will be receiving the protection that must be given if they are to be preserved for the future.

Last fall the Daily News called attention to this "killing of the goose that lays the golden eggs." Despite the fact that the condition continues still, efforts that have been made during the past year bear every promise of being successful and attaining the desired result.

Alberta Strike May Cause Coal Shortage.

A general strike of coal miners in the Edmonton coal fields, which yesterday's despatches stated would commence today, may have a serious effect on the local market. Much of the coal used in Prince Rupert today comes from the Alberta fields for the reason that it can be sold more cheaply here than Vancouver Island coal and has proven to have almost as satisfactory fuel properties.

The coal industry all over the continent has been racked with strike after strike this year and, while some districts are suffering through shortage of supply, Prince Rupert has not yet felt the pinch although predictions have been made on several occasions that there might be a shortage. A strike in Central Alberta would undoubtedly cause a shortage here if it continued for any length of time and would, needless to say, cause the prices to go up for what there may be. The wise ones will get in a supply while the getting is good and the prices remain as at present.

Irish Free State Constitution Advances.

The constitution of the New Irish Free State has now advanced to its final stages and only a few formalities remain to put it into complete effect in the administration of Ireland and its relations to the British government. One of these formalities was accomplished on Wednesday with its adoption by the British House of Commons. Another will be the acceptance of the document by the House of Lords which is assured and the final one is the action of the Irish Parliament.

The constitution in its final form is substantially the same as originally framed in accordance with the treaty negotiated between the Irish delegates headed by Arthur Griffith and Michael Collins, and the British cabinet ministers headed by ex-Premier Lloyd George. The treaty provided for a constitution and this was later drawn up in Dublin and given cabinet approval in London.

The constitution calls for the creation of Ireland as a "Free State"; its establishment as one of the Dominions of the British Commonwealth, with its own Parliament and executive organization, and with the oath of allegiance to the King which still preserves the tie uniting Ireland with the rest of the British Empire.

The document grants political and religious freedom in Ireland and under it no law favoring cult may be passed. Opinion and the right of association are untrammelled. There are two elective houses and all citizens of both sexes enjoy the right to vote. The initiative and referendum are also provided for.

The St. Andrew's annual ball is always one of the big events of the year's social calendar and the 1922 affair held last night in the Auditorium was as distinct a success as any of the past. PLENTY OF LAND IN B.C. FOR SETTLERS

Agent General Mentions Local
Districts in Correcting
False Impression

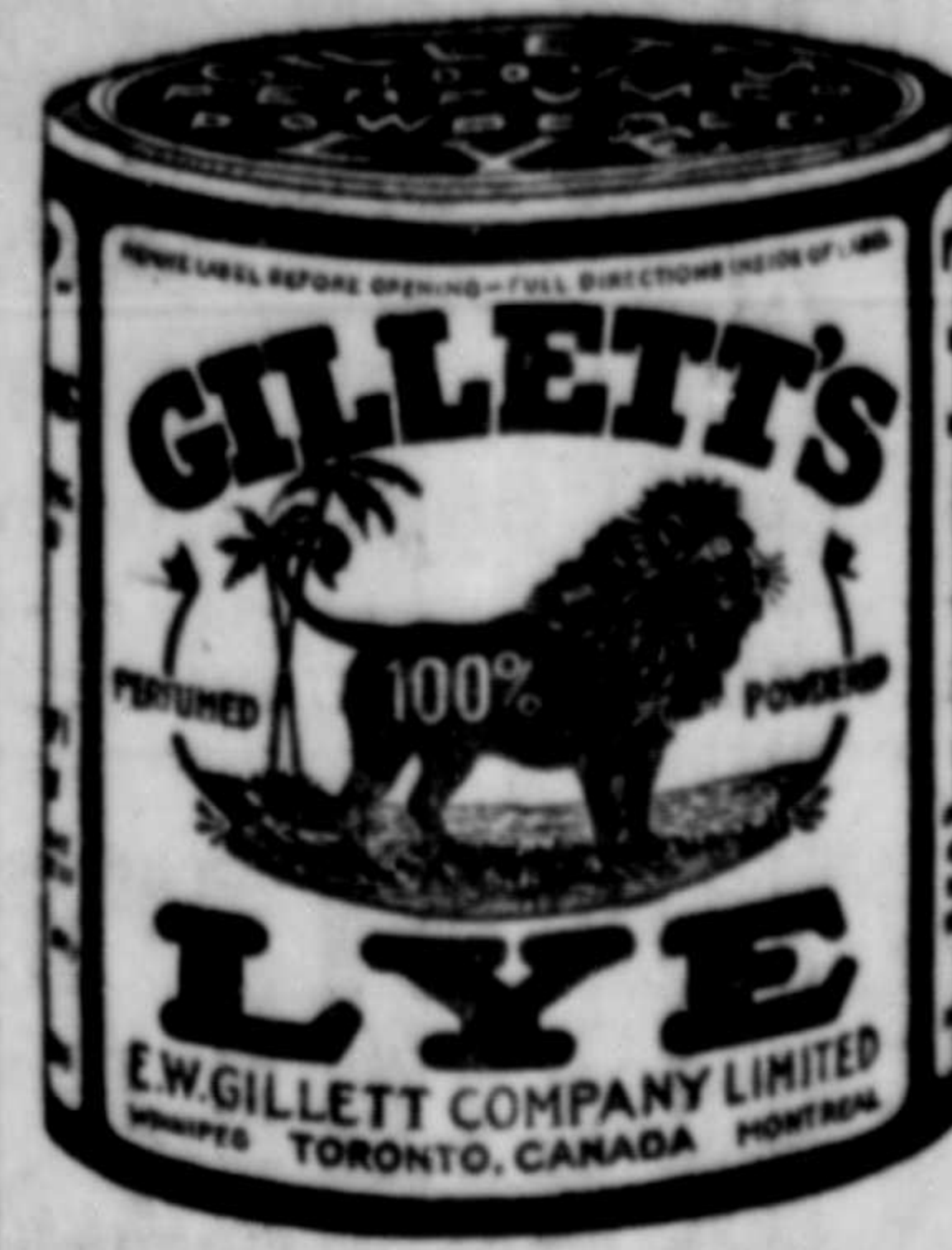
In reply to an article recently appearing in the London Times entitled "Canada's Idle Acres," which he says is apt to give the casual reader an impression that there is a scarcity of available land in British Columbia, F. C. Wade, K.C., Agent General for B. C. in London, has written the following article which appeared in the Times of current date:

The Government of British Columbia has established the following areas for new settlers:—Bulkley Valley, 14,500 acres; Nechako Valley, 35,000 acres; Marten Lake, 14,000 acres; Fort George, 23,000 acres; Comptonay, 14,000 acres; Creston, 7,000 acres; South Okanagan, 20,000 acres; and Sumas, 30,000 acres. These small settlement tracts are merely central points for much greater development, and particularly in Central British Columbia, there is room for many thousands of farmers.

In the Stuart Lake district there is an area of 200,000 acres of splendid land which has reverted to the Government, and in the Francois and Ootsa Lake districts, south of Burns Lake, on the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, there is an area of millions of acres, much of which is open grass land, capable of taking care of vast herds of cattle. This great central country is practically untouched, and, even in British Columbia its great potentialities are little known. Development of this district means pioneering, but it is going to be profitable pioneering.

WRIST HANDKERCHIEF IS AGAIN POPULAR

INSPECTOR ON SCHOOLS

H. C. Fraser was Speaker at
Rotary Club Luncheon
Yesterday

An appeal to the members of the club to do all they could towards the carrying out of compulsory education between the ages of seven and fifteen years, was made at the Rotary Club luncheon yesterday by H. C. Fraser, inspector of schools for this district, at the conclusion of his talk on the educational situation in Northern B.C.

Mr. Fraser stated that there are 64 schools in this district with 105 teachers. The district was known as No. 13 and extended from Allin on the north down to Hunter Island, 30 miles below Ocean Falls, on the south and from the Queen Charlotte Islands on the west, to 150 miles on the C.N.R. to the east. The district was supposed to be covered twice yearly by the inspector.

At some length Mr. Fraser told of the different classes of schools in the district assisted, rural, district municipality and city. The assisted schools were those which were supported by the government when ten pupils were offered. Rural schools received from \$180 to \$580 a year per teacher from the government.

Growth of Schools

In speaking of the growth of the school population in the district, the speaker stated that, since last September, eleven new schools had been opened, and the Prince Rupert High School was taking the first year work of the University. The increase being greater than last year when ten new schools were started and the commercial course started in the local high school.

Dealing with the promotion of pupils, Mr. Fraser gave figures to show that out of the 139 pupils in the district who wrote the government entrance examinations last summer, 63 per cent were successful while the whole province where many were passed on recommendation only 50 per cent passed. In Prince Rupert alone 78 per cent of the candidates succeeded in their examinations.

Rotary Orchestra

The Rotary orchestra of four pieces made its debut at the luncheon yesterday and rendered two numbers which were heartily applauded. More will be heard of them in the future.

Next week the meeting will be held in the evening and will be in charge of the ladies, Mrs. T. H. Johnson, presiding.

BODY OF MISSING FISHBOAT CAPTAIN FOUND KETCHIKAN

KETCHIKAN, Dec. 1.—A body found floating in the bay this week was identified as the corpse of the missing fishboat captain of the Esperlan, captain of the halibut boat Volunteer, who has been missing since October 22. The verdict of the coroner's jury was that deceased came to his death by accidental drowning.

Esperlan on the night of October 22 went to the dock in a taxi and nothing was seen of him afterward until the body was found. O. W. Horwick discovered the body, the arm lying over a rope which tied a boat to the dock near the city float in New-town.

The body was identified by papers in the pockets and by his deep sea fishermen's union card, also there were marks on the body which showed that it was Esperlan. He was about 32 years old and single. During the war he served in the American forces and was wounded.

COMMITTEE ON CHIROPRACTIC

Matter to be Discussed Before Coming Back to Legislature

(H. F. Pullen.)
 VICTORIA, Nov. 29.—In opposing the bill to license chiropractors before the Legislature last week, Hon. A. M. Manson objected to giving a license to any person not educated and trained in scientific knowledge of the human anatomy. There were among the chiropractors men of no education and of no professional character. The human body was a complicated piece of machinery and anyone treating it should have a thorough knowledge of the subject. Human life was more precious than a machine and even a machine they would not entrust to an inexperienced mechanic. Death came easily and no dollars and cents could replace it as in the case of a machine.
 Mr. Manson said the matter had been discussed fully by a committee on a former occasion and that committee had come most thoroughly into the question. Now they came back in eighteen months and asked to be heard again. He thought they should not do this unless they could show reason for it. He knew some chiropractors did good and he was persuaded a number of others did a lot of harm. The harm once done could not be undone.

"What about the doctors?" was a query from the labor ranks which was cheered from the galleries.

Defended Doctors

Mr. Manson went on to explain that there was a chiropractor on the medical board to set the examinations. No body of men was more humbly minded than the doctors. Their whole aim in life was to find some new way of treating the human body. While he was both to have them excluded, they refused to take the examinations set. In 36 years there had been only one complaint against the examinations set by the doctors.

Mrs. Mary Ellen Smith said while she went to a doctor if she needed medical aid they could not ignore the fact that 17,000 people signed the petition asking them to consider legislation on behalf of the chiropractor. The medical men said they did not want the chiropractors. She, on her part, did not want them either. On the part of those who had signed the petition she did not

COMMITTED FOR TRIAL

Flewin and Kevis Are Sent up on Attempted Murder Charge

BLOODSTAINS WERE SUBJECT OF EVIDENCE

Clarence Flewin and Raymond Kevis were committed for trial at the next assizes, on the charge of attempted murder of Robert Boyd Young at Port Simpson on the night of September 11 last, by Magistrate McMullin yesterday afternoon at the conclusion of the evidence for the prosecution.

Having warned the accused men that if they wished to say anything at the time they might do so, but it would be put down in writing for use at their trial, Magistrate McMullin asked the prisoners if they had anything to say. L. W. Patmore, appearing for them, stated that the defence was reserved and there would be no witnesses just now.

His Worship then announced that sufficient evidence had been submitted by the crown to commit the prisoners for trial.

Dr. J. A. West was the only witness called yesterday afternoon. He made the twenty-third person to be called by the crown.

Dr. West made the blood test on the clothing of the accused men. Questioned by Mr. Hooper, he stated that he had done pathological work and had served under Dr. Mervile Cameron at St. Bartholomew's Hospital, London, Eng. He commenced his evidence by stating that he was brought a package of clothes on September 14 by Constable Saint, of the provincial police and asked to examine the stains.

Blood on Clothing

He first took the khaki pants of Kevis. On the left leg he found evidences of an attempt having been made to rub out a stain. On being tested it immediately gave a blue color—a sign of blood. The doctor then tried the serum test for human blood and found it was such. He also found splashes of blood further down the leg. They were a few days old, he added. Then taking of the blue sweater owned by Flewin he told of finding splashes on the breast and a smear on the left sleeve near the cuff. There were eleven little specks on the breast—all of which showed human blood. In reply to a question from Mr. Hooper, the doctor said they might have been caused by the spurt of blood from a small artery. The smear on the cuff also gave all the tests for human blood, and were very marked.

Mr. Hooper then produced the coat and vest worn by Young on the night of the assault. He asked if a person, feeling in the vest pockets of a man lying on the ground bleeding heavily, might get the stains on his sleeve and received an answer in the affirmative. Dr. West was then asked if a man with a broken nose might spatter blood on another man's breast, providing the latter named man was leaning over him. Once again the witness gave an affirmative answer qualifying his statement with the remark that the injured man might have scattered the blood in breathing heavily.

Violence of Attack

Mr. Young was then placed before Dr. West and asked if he would bleed freely from the nature of his scars. The witness stated he would but, on Mr. Hooper asking about the nature of the attack from the appearance of the scars, Dr. West said it would be hard to tell now as the wounds might have been caused by either a blunt or a sharp instrument.

"What would you say about the violence of the attack?" queried Mr. Hooper.

"It was done with a great deal of force," Dr. West replied.

"Might any one of them caused death?"

"Yes," Dr. West replied, adding if they had been deep enough.

Mr. Hooper then gave notice that he would call Dr. Kergin and Dr. Eggert at the trial to testify as to the injuries received by Young, they having seen him shortly after.

Dr. West also stated that he had been given a vial of blood by Dr. Eggert who stated it had been taken from Mr. Young. This was given the "class test" and was found to be the same as that which was found on the prisoners' clothes.

BIG CITY HAD NO NEWSPAPER FOR FIVE WEEKS

That Was Experience of Perth, Australia, When Printers Had Strike

LONDON, Dec. 1.—(Canadian Press).—Imagine a city of 150,000 population being without a newspaper for five weeks, not even a weekly newspaper—practically cut off from the world for that period—and you have some idea of the position of Perth, the capital of Western Australia, during part of last August and September. Perth was not only cut off from news of the world outside of Australia, but it had no news from the neighboring states in the Commonwealth during this blank period.

The cause was the strike of the mechanical staffs of the papers. It arose over what at first was regarded as a comparatively trivial dispute in the printing industry, but it suddenly developed into a deadlock. The mechanical staffs of the West Australian and the Daily News ceased work. These were the only daily newspapers. The Sunday Weekly and two mid-weekly journals were involved, and a population of 150,000 persons was thrown back into the position of the earliest settlers, before the cable and land telegraph linked them with their fellows beyond their borders.

No News At All
 In the middle of September the man in the street in Perth was ignorant of the trend of the reparations struggle in Europe, knew little or nothing of Ireland's

This had a very limited circulation in Perth, and the proprietors, avoiding any possibility of being made parties to the dispute between the printers and publishers in the metropolis, were not trying to obtain a Perth circulation. The strike ended on September 21.

WOMAN SAVES RUM RUNNERS
 Story of Bravery and Greed Comes from Lake Erie

SIMCOE, Nov. 30.—The story of a woman's bravery and of men's greed is hidden behind the details of the wrecking of the City of Dresden last week. This vessel sprang a leak and foundered while off the Lake Erie shore five miles west of Port Rowan.
 The heavily laden ship, with Capt. J. S. McQueen, Amherstburg, in command, bound for Port Huron, was caught in a sweeping gale which threw Lake Erie into a furore. The boat sprung a leak, and the water poured in so fast that all hope of reaching Port Burwell was abandoned, and Captain McQueen headed the vessel for shore.
Lifeboat is Capsized
 The treacherous undercurrent kept sweeping the boat back, although several times shore was but 300 yards distant. A small life-boat was launched with oars and lifebelts, but heavy seas capsized it. The second skiff was lowered minus oars and bells, and the Captain and four mates clambered in, but the former's son, Peregrine McQueen, while assisting one of the men who was rendered partially helpless by a wooden leg, slipped, was caught on the crest of a huge breaker, and was drowned.

The sight of the wreck had brought speculators to the shore. The survivors of the crew were unable to make a landing, being caught in the treacherous under-bow. But for the courageous aid of Mrs. Rockefeller, wife of a neighboring farmer, they would have shared the fate of young McQueen. Alone she ventured out into the surf and by dint of daring and great efforts managed to drag the helpless and exhausted men to shore.
Whiskey Floats to Shore
 As the City of Dresden commenced to break up the nature of her cargo became apparent. She was laden with 500 cases of whiskey. As case after case came crashing on the shore, while hundreds of bottles from broken cases were bobbing about the surf, willing workers eagerly gathered the welcome spoils. Farmers toged their wagons and trucks, others came with bags, and the liquor was quickly gathered up. The harvest of the storm was nearly all gathered when License Inspector Edmonds, Provincial Constable Lawrence and County Constable Alway arrived on the scene from Simcoe. There was little left for the officers to seize.
 All Sunday afternoon it was reported that a number of those who had terrified by their salvage operations were busy en-

gaged in driving backward and forward to the beach and in various directions along the roads, making it impossible for the officers who were attempting to trace down the liquor to follow tracks into the various farm-yards.
Body Comes Ashore
 The body of young Peregrine McQueen came floating to shore while the salvors were removing the last few bottles of liquor. Coroner McGillivray was called to the scene, and after investigating the circumstances decided that an inquest was unnecessary. The body is being taken back to Amherstburg by Captain McQueen. He and the other survivors are little the worse for their experience, having been sheltered, warmed and fed in neighboring farmhouses.
 The City of Dresden was condemned some 20 years ago, when Captain McQueen purchased it and installed a completely new set of high-powered engines. The scene of the wreck is the most treacherous point along the coast of Lake Erie.
