TURKS MASSACRE CHRISTIANS AT SMYRNA NATIONALIST ARMY UNDER KEMAL THREATENS CITY OF CONSTANTINOPLE

Turkish Terrorism Evident in Taking of Smyrna Where Fire And Sword Prevails

LONDON, Sept. 15.—Fire has demolished the foreign quarter of Smyrna, according to despatches received here. It was started by a Turkish soldier with a torch and gasoline, and has already damaged property to the value of £15,000,000, while thousands of people have been massacred. The conditions are described by allied admirals as appalling. All the British and all the Americans with the exception of fourteen have been safely taken on board allied warships.

Turkish irregulars are in control of Smyrna and are firing on and terrorising the inhabitants.

LONDON, Sept. 15.—Mustapha Kemal Pasha has decided to march his army on Constantinople unless the powers hand over the city to the Turks. He has so informed the Daily Mail correspondent.

Bodies of Victims.

MALTA, Sept. 15.—Hundreds of bodies of victims of the Turkish massacre in Smyrna are lying in the streets of the city when the British hospital ship Main left with more than 100 refugees on board, it is stated.

GERMANY IS REFUSING A GUARANTEE

Will Not Put Up Hundred Million Dollar Gold Marks as Security.

PARIS, Sept. 15.—Germany having categorically refused to deposit the one hundred million gold marks demanded by Belgium as a guarantee for future reparations payments, France and Belgium will demand that the allied high commission declare Germany voluntarily defaulting and subject to punishment.

France insists that Germany is able to pay and the demand for gold guarantees, at first thought to be merely formal, has become a serious matter. Members of the reparations commission have notified their respective premiers that they can do no more and Premier Lloyd George and Poincare have been called in consultation.

AMERICANS DEAD IN BIG SMYRNA FIRE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 15.—Fourteen Americans are reported dead during the first few hours of a big fire at Smyrna which has just been occupied by the Turks.

Fisheries Committee Likely Will Recommend Appointment Of Minister For Department

VANCOUVER, Sept. 15.—The question of a separate minister of fisheries at Ottawa will have a place in the report which the Canadian committee will make to the Federal cabinet, William Duff, chairman of the fisheries commission suggests. The evidence submitted to the committee at several of its sittings up and down the coast has not been reviewed by the committee in its deliberations since the hearing of evidence, but most of the evidence strongly supports the proposal that a minister of fisheries should be appointed and Mr. Duff admitted last evening that this evidence was bound to have an effect on the recommendations of the committee to Parliament.

Yesterday the committee held a conference with the representatives of the Washington state fisheries board in regard to the problems attending the salmon

by Reuter's Smyrna correspondent, who arrived here on the Main today.

LONDON, Sept. 15.—From one to two thousand Christians were massacred in Smyrna by Turks before a fire which swept the Armenian and other quarters of the Asia Minor seaport, recently evacuated by the Greek army. It is charged in semi-official and other Greek messages from Athens that among other Turkish outrages was the carrying off of many girl pupils of the American Girls' College.

The Greek belief is that the fire was set by the Turks to conceal traces of their misdeeds. The property damage from the fire is estimated at \$75,000,000.

Killed British.

LONDON, Sept. 15.—An American destroyer which arrived at Piraeus, Greece, reports that the Turks entered the British Consulate at Smyrna and killed an official who was assembling the archives. Postmaster Wilkinson is also said to have been murdered as well as other Englishmen. Sir Harry Lamb, consul general, is said to have escaped on a warship.

The admiral commanding the British squadron of Smyrna warned the Turkish authorities in the city that if the massacres are continued the Turkish quarters will be bombarded, it is stated in despatches.

Ultimatum to Kemal.

The British cabinet is summoned for this afternoon with the principal object of discussing the near eastern tangle. One of the possible results of the meeting it is believed will be that Mustapha Kemal will be informed that he will be met, not only by British troops and the British ships but by a Slav army if he attempts to cross the straits.

RAILWAY COMMISSION PASSED THROUGH CITY

Sat at New Hazelton Yesterday to Consider Question of Closing Down Station at That Point

Hon. Frank B. Carvell, chairman of the Canadian Railway Commission, Commissioner Lawrence and staff as well as members of their families, passed through the city last night arriving on their special car "Acadia" from the East and leaving on the Prince George for Vancouver.

Sessions of the commission have been held at Jasper, Lucerne and New Hazelton. The meeting at the latter place was to consider the question of closing down the C.N.R. agency, permission having been applied for by the company. Several local residents presented themselves to give evidence against this action. Judgment will not be rendered until the commission returns to Ottawa. Meetings will also be held at Vancouver and Victoria while they are in the West.

The official party contains besides Chief Commissioner Carvell and Commissioner Lawrence, Nelson B. Butcher, reporter, and Mrs. D. Fisher, Miss Kathleen Hand, Miss K. Diblee and Mrs. Lawrence.

Superintendent Walton also returned from the East on last night's train, having officially attended the sittings of the commission at Jasper, Lucerne and New Hazelton.

CASH COMING FROM RACES

Tax on Pari-mutuel Gambling to Be Divided Among Municipalities.

VICTORIA, Sept. 15.—Race track fans in British Columbia bet \$1,058,865 through pari-mutuel machines during the four weeks racing at the two Vancouver tracks, Brighouse and Hastings. Hon. John Hart announced yesterday.

The provincial government, through its five per cent tax imposed on all regularly placed bets at the track, collected \$205,794.92. The cost of collecting the tax amounted to \$12,998.73. The remainder will be divided among the municipalities of the province according to population.

WOULD MAKE FURTHER ARMAMENT REDUCTIONS

Canada and United States Among Countries Included in Recommendation

GENEVA, Sept. 15.—The disarmament committee of the assembly of the League of Nations has decided to recommend to the Council of the league a resolution introduced by a Frenchman asking all countries except those whose judicial conditions have been changed to reduce their armaments to the figure of 1913. This would include Canada and the United States.

GREAT ALARM FROM KEMAL

Nationalist Army is Within 35 Miles of Constantinople

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 15.—The Turkish Nationalist army is within 35 miles of Constantinople. The population of the city is in a state of nervous tension and the entire city is rife with rumors about Mustapha Kemal's designs upon the capital. Rodosto and other ports on the sea of Marmora are choked with refugees who are arriving by tens of thousands in an appalling state of misery, hundreds dying before they can be landed.

NATIVE TRIBES HOLD MEETING

Appoint Henry Pearce to Be Delegate to Conference with Minister.

The meeting of the native tribes of Northern British Columbia was held yesterday in the Salvation Army Hall at 2 o'clock. President Henry D. Pierce in the chair. Mr. Pierce and Vice-President Samuel Bennett addressed the gathering on the question of Indian rights. Henry Pearce was unanimously chosen as delegate to represent the tribes at Vancouver in November and money is to be raised to pay his expenses there. It was reported that already the women's auxiliary at Port Simpson had raised part of the money.

Samuel Bennett welcomed the delegates, delivering an address in which he outlined the history of the dispute on land and other matters which had gone on since 1829 and has been a bone of contention ever since. It has been a grievance since the first white settlers came to the country. He urged a fit person be appointed to represent them in the conference with Hon. Charles Stewart, minister of the department of the interior, including Indian affairs, and Duncan Scott, superintendent of Indian affairs.

Henry Pearce spoke along similar lines and urged that every step be taken to secure the rights of the Indians of the province. As president of the organization he strongly recommended co-operation and united action between the various tribes in regard to the land question and all matters of Indian rights. The title they laid claim to was the same title acknowledged and recognized by the Dominion Government in connection with other tribes in the East. He said all that they asked was a square white man's deal.

CREW OF FISHING BOAT IS MISSING

Fifteen Men From Pierre Barnardo Not Accounted For Since Vessel Sank

ST. JOHNS, Nfld., Sept. 15.—Fifteen members of the crew of the French fishing vessel Pierre Barnardo which sank on Tuesday are still missing. The crew of 26 took to the boats and only nine have been rescued.

LONDON, Sept. 15.—Four big bombs wrapped in an old cape were found in the residential district by the London police. Children were playing near and the disaster would have been great had it exploded. No clue has been found as to who the miscreants were who set it.

Evidence adduced showed that the Green family had had serious domestic troubles of late and that it was on account of these that the double tragedy Meagher, W. McRae, John Buckley and J. W. Potter.

The funerals will take place tomorrow.

BIG PULP PLANT VANCOUVER CITY

That is Plan it Seems According to Latest Developments in South.

VICTORIA, Sept. 15.—Vancouver is to get the big pulp and paper plant which the Seaman Paper Mill Company of Chicago plans to build in British Columbia, according to developments yesterday in negotiations which are being carried on by Mr. Seaman and his associates here.

The mills will get power from Bridge River near Seaton Lake 100 miles up the P. G. E. railway.

Advantages of District.

In the grains there is displayed flax, Ruby wheat, garlick and oats which proves beyond doubt that the fertility of the soil and climatic advantages are well established facts. While there are a number of mixed farms already in this district, there is yet a vast expanse of wonderful natural country particularly suited to cattle raising, grain truck and dairy farming which will undoubtedly be taken up by the not far distant future by farmers who will realize the possibilities in the soil if the excellent publicity work started with exhibits of the nature displayed this year is continued.

There is a splendid variety in the garden truck exhibit including cabbage, parsnips, potatoes, white and red carrots, Swedish turnips, peas, onions, marrow, cucumbers and tomatoes. The tomatoes are of an exceptional fine quality which the heat experienced this summer has helped a great deal in ripening.

Wild Fruits.

The wild fruit is composed of a great variety, and Mr. Windt says that in spite of the dry weather this season's crop has been fine. The varieties include cherries, strawberries, currants, red and black cranberries, high bush and low bush Saskatoons, gooseberries, huckleberries and blueberries. The display of raspberry jam and jelly is particularly inviting.

The dairy exhibit, consisting of eggs, butter and cheese proves what the Bulkley Valley is capable of in this direction, and a record this year the produce on

a second prize in print butter has been secured.

Mr. Windt is very anxious to secure an exhibit from the Prince Rupert district for the Smithers Fair which opens on Sept. 20, and to this end the Smithers Fair Association are paying the cost of freight.

FEAR BREEDS WAR SAYS LORD CECIL

Fear of War Led to Establishment of Large Armies in Several Countries

LONDON, Sept. 12.—"When we come to analyze the situation closely we find that the fear of war is the beginning of unwisdom," said Lord Robert Cecil recently discussing conditions in Europe. "Russia's apprehensions have been translated into vast armies withdrawn from reproductive work, ill-fed, ill-clothed, ill-disciplined, and consequently a greater menace to their friends or fellow-citizens than to their enemies."

"In France the fear of war has led to the establishment of those armies of occupation on the Rhine that are costing bankrupt Germany more than one million pounds a week—more than two thousand million marks."

"Fear of war is leading a section of public opinion in England to demand a vastly increased air service, and still further concentration upon scientific methods of slaughter. In all directions we find that knowledge is still harnessed to destruction; that the readiest means of money-making is to invent something that can destroy life and the products of life—energy faster than nature can replace them. Behind all these manifestations lies fear."

PRINCE RUPERT WINNERS SERIES

Defeated Anyox Yesterday Afternoon 6 to 5 with Sensational Ninth Inning Finish.

Prince Rupert's baseball team came through with the most sensational ninth inning rally of the season in the game with Anyox yesterday afternoon and touched Benny Fitzpatrick, the smelter town pitcher, and Jimmy Ferguson, their emergency substitute hurler, for six hits and four runs in the last half of the frame converting a 5 to 2 score against them into 6 to 5 victory and winning the third and deciding game of the Exhibition series. A quiet game almost to the last, a climax was provided for local fans that fairly made the excitement go sky high and caused the game to end with a bang, victory coming out of apparent defeat in such a manner as to make the match go down in baseball history of the season as the most sensational of the year.

Bunting Tactics. The visitors started out with bunting tactics which proved rather profitable for them and netted them a run in each of the first and second innings. J. Brown, the first Anyox man to bat, was walked by Eady. P. Brown was put out at first when Curtis, the local catcher, picked up his bunt. In the meantime Downs, a speedy base runner, had stolen second and made third, coming in when S. Moran made another bunt which got him to first and then to second on an error. Greenwell was put out at first after bunting and J. Ferguson struck out.

In the second inning, A. Sinclair singled as also did Mealy. Sinclair was caught at the home plate and Gorkle was put out after bunting. Mealy scored and Fitzpatrick was out bunting a foul on the last strike. In the last half of the second, Menzies started out for Prince Rupert with a three bagger to left field and the scoring chances looked good but the runner got no further, the Anyox bunt playing a tight field while Douglas struck out, Farquhar fouled out to Greenwell and Smith was put out on a left field fly.

Better Success. In the third the Prince Rupert field started to handle the Anyox bunters with better success though Downs got to first on his and stole second. Brown was put out bunting. Moran fouled out and Greenwell was put out at first on Eason's fielding.

In the fifth Gorkle got a single to left field. Fitzpatrick knocked an infield fly to Eady which was converted into a double play to Menzies catching Gorkle. Downs made first again and stole second but the side went down when Brown fanned. For Rupert, Douglas singled and Farquhar walked. Smith was put out on a bunt and luck seemed to run against the locals again when Eady knocked a fly to centerfield which might well have been a hit but was caught by Mealy and doubled into second where Farquhar was caught.

In the seventh, Mealy poked out a single to left field but was

The locals tied up the score in this inning. Anderson singled and got second on an error. Menzies overthrew to third in an attempt to get him there. Douglas got to first when Fitzpatrick dropped an infield fly. Farquhar was out on a second base fly. Smith singled to centre field and Eady did likewise scoring Douglas. Eason was put out at first.

Three in Eighth. The Anyox boys got three more runs in the eighth which made things look blue for the locals. Downs walked and stole second. Brown was put out at first on Eady's fielding. Moran singled scoring Downs and Greenwell was hit by the pitcher. J. Ferguson struck out and Sinclair singled. Anderson seemed to go to sleep on short and before the spectators knew what had happened Moran and Greenwell were romping home in quick succession before the slowly relayed ball. Mealy walked. Gorkle was put out when Jack Rathford made a pretty catch in right field and Sinclair died on bases.

Curtis, for Prince Rupert, was put out at first after Greenwell picked up a sizzling grounder. Rathford fled out to left field and Anderson struck out.

Big Recovery. Anyox went scoreless in the ninth and then came Rupert's big recovery. Menzies started the ball rolling with a safe single to left field, Douglas doing the same thing to right. Farquhar came through with a timely two bagger which scored Menzies and Douglas. Anyox pulled Fitzpatrick out of the box in a hurry and sent in Ferguson from right field where he was replaced by Sherman. It was no use, however, for Smith touched the new pitcher for a three bagger tying the score with Farquhar's run and Clark Eady came through with a safe single scoring Smith for the winning run before a single man had gone down.

Criticism of Players. Eady, the local pitcher, did not make as many strike-outs as in the first game but he was accorded very fair support in the field and held things safe throughout showing himself to be somewhat of a hitter as well as a pitcher. Curtis was in great form behind the bat and made his best showing of the series. Menzies spoiled his record at first with an error or two as did also Anderson at short and Farquhar at third. Eason was not taxed very hard and there was not much coming his way at second. The timely bunch of hits in the ninth was solely responsible for the local victory for, in justice to the

Anyox team, it must be said they played better ball than the locals for eight and one half innings. Any luck that was going, though, was certainly not with Prince Rupert.

ROTARIANS AND THE EXHIBITION

Judges and Officers of Society
Are Speakers at Club
Luncheon.

Yesterday was exhibition day at the Rotary Club. The speakers were people connected with the fair, including the judges, J. Tait, H. E. Wabey and Dr. Sparrow, the president, F. G. Dawson, John McRae, honorable secretary-treasurer and the former presidents. In addition there were present Robert Harvey and E. W. Keenleyside of Vancouver; Iver Fougner of Bella Coola and A. Kiharik of Winnipeg, formerly of this city.

Mr. Tait said he considered the whole of the arrangement of the fair was exceptionally fine. He urged that the district exhibit be continued and this phase of the fair be encouraged and developed. The district could raise as fine produce as he saw anywhere. The cauliflowers and cabbages especially being equal to any.

Canadian Produce

In connection with the campaign to buy Canadian produce Mr. Tait mentioned that he found most of the fruit consumed here came from the states of Washington, Oregon, California and Idaho. In the Okanagan they could raise the finest fruit in the world and he thought local people could purchase their apples from B. C. There should be two ear loads a month used here and possibly 20 in a year.

Mr. Wabey saw great possibilities for farming and poultry raising in this district. In the fair here there were birds fit to go anywhere in B. C. It would be a good move for local people to encourage the poultry industry. It was very desirable to get good eggs and the best way was to raise them at home. He urged that there should be an extension of the exhibition next year so that judges might candle all the eggs. The show had a splendid appearance and everything was in good order.

Cash Prizes.

Dr. Sparrow of Vancouver, a member of the Kiwanis, thought it would be a good thing for the local people to encourage the showing of live stock, which was the most interesting part of any exhibition. He suggested

MINERALS MAKE GOOD SHOWING

Smithers Carries Off First Prize With Fine Collection of Ores.

The mineral exhibit at the Fair this year is a very excellent one from the quality standpoint of the ore exhibited. The marvellous richness of northern B. C. from a mineral standpoint is here brought very vividly to the notice of the public. This exhibit is adjudged by experts to be one of the richest in the Dominion.

The Granby Consolidated Company of Anyox were the winners of the first prize for copper ore from a shipping mine in northern B. C. and have on exhibit four very rich samples from their Anyox holdings.

Smithers carried off the first prize for the best District exhibit and the display of sample ores is very comprehensive and rich. The exhibit contains gold silver and copper ore from the Hunter Basin, Apatite, Bromide of Silver smelter returns, semi-anthracite coal from Lake Kathleen, B. C. ore from the Mamie mine, Hudson Bay mountain, assaying 5,000 oz. of silver to the ton; gold, silver and copper ore from the Venus group, Grouse mountain, assaying, gold \$1.80, silver 52 oz. and copper 14 per cent; gold, silver lead ore from the surface at Victory mine, Hudson Bay mountain, silver copper ore from the Shamrock group assaying silver 18 oz. and copper 40 per cent; gold, silver, lead ore from the White Swan group, Hudson Bay mountain, assaying gold -10.00 silver 60 oz. lead 70 per cent; Bird Group, Babine mountains, gold, silver, copper ore assaying gold 7 oz., silver 110 oz., and copper 15 per cent.

Geo. Kerr took the first prize in the prospector's display, also first for silver ore, copper ore, and copper and silver ore. Mr. Frizzell took second in this class. The Kleanza Co. Ltd., of U.S. have a very nice exhibit on display and were successful in winning the first prize for silver lead ore, and copper gold ore. This company has some very rich mineral holdings on the Kleanza mountain, situated south of U.S.

For the best prospectors collection Howard Frizzell took first prize.

L. W. Patmore has a nice exhibit of gold copper ore from the Emma Grant at U.S.

Will develop power from ocean's waves

Company Formed in New York For Purpose of Saving Coal.

NEW YORK, Sept. 15.—A new company has been formed to utilize the waves of the ocean for power purposes. The Stodder Wave Power Corporation, capitalized at \$25,000, filed a certificate of incorporation a few days ago. The company which will begin business at New Rochelle, sets forth in the certificate that its object is:

"To develop and promote the utilization of the power of the ocean waves as a means of increasing the world's productivity, and conserve coal, oil, labor and our resources."

The directors are: Edward D. Stodder, Guy L. Gleason and Donald J. McLean, all of New Rochelle. Mr. Gleason, who is a real estate broker said:

"This corporation is just in its infancy. It intends to build field piers out in the ocean and then have a series of floats on the water connected with chains which will work compressed air engines on top of the piers. Every motion of the water, the rise and fall of the tides and the ever-changing waves, up and down, right and left, and every direction will be caught by the floats which will operate the compressed air engines. The compressed air will then be forced through pipes to power houses to generate electricity and through tunnels to different cities. The main object of the invention is to conserve the supply of coal. We have a working model, and have generated electricity with it."

SOLDIER PATIENT IS RESCUER OF WOMAN

Dives into Water at Winnipeg Beach and Injures Self.

WINNIPEG, Sept. 15.—Mrs. Gensington Downes, wife of a member of the provincial house, narrowly escaped death by drowning off the government pier at Winnipeg Beach. T. W. Lunn, her rescuer, a soldier patient at the Red Cross home, was knocked unconscious in his efforts to save her.

Mrs. Downes is at the Red Cross hospital in a serious condition, although every hope is held for her recovery. Lunn is progressing favorably.

This is the second time within three weeks Lunn has risked his life off the dock. Three weeks ago he pulled two girls out of the water. He has been recommended for the award of the Royal Humane society.

CUBA RETRENCHES CUTS PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL SALARY

HAVANA, Cuba, Sept. 15.—Congress is turning a deaf ear to intimations that the \$100-a-day Cuban White House budget is not commensurate with the presidential cost of living.

When the 1922-1923 economy budget became effective last July the major domo of the palace took what he considered to be adequate steps to reduce grocery and other bills, but he was forced to announce a deficit at the end of the month of \$1,400. This the president paid from his own pocket after congress had failed to heed the hint he embodies in a special message. Far from bringing additional funds, an intimation that he might be forced to leave his ornate temporary residence for a modest home in 3 Morro Street, brought only expressions of commendation.

To help reduce the threatened August deficit, the staff of aides de camp, who formerly sat at the presidential board, now are taking their meals elsewhere.
