## Wales Benefits from the U.S. Strikes PROGRESSIVES TO SUPPORT LIBERALS AND HUDSON TO CABINET

### United States Strike Makes Heavy Demand Welsh Coal

CARDIFF, South Wales, July 26.—The demand in the United States for coal is creating a boom in Welsh coal trade. The price is advancing to thirty shillings a ton and the value of colliery shares is advancing in consequence of the situation. Yesterday 35,000 tons of coal was shipped from Cardiff docks. The United States demand is likely to relieve the acute situation in the South Wales coal fields.

The demand for Welsh coal is caused by the big strike of miners and railway workers in the United States.

### ORDER GERMANY DESTROY FORT

Range Finding School on Kiel Canal Said to Be Easily Convertible.

PARIS, July 26.—The council of ambassadors today decided to send a sharp note to the German Government demanding the immediate destruction of the range finding school, which the German naval authorities have quietly established at strategic point on the Kiel Canal. The school, it is declared by allied experts, is convertible into a fort commanding the entrance to the canal.

### SEVERAL KILLED IN ACCIDENTS MONTREAL

Truck Struck by Train; Woman Killed by Truck; And Woman Killed by Train

MONTREAL, July 26.—Telegrams from Gauthier, forty years of age, and Joseph Payette, 15 years of age, were killed, and Lionel Gauthier seriously injured when the motor truck in which they were riding was struck by a train at St. Martin.

Mrs. J. B. St. Denis was killed when the Ottawa express when she stepped on the track opposite the Valois station.

Narcisse Tabuany, 82 years of age, was struck by a truck while crossing Craig St. and instantly killed.

### RESULTS OF MUSIC EXAMINATION ARRIVE

Two Pupils From St. Joseph's Academy Get Honors in Theory.

The only two pupils from St. Joseph's academy who wrote on the theory examinations of the Toronto Conservatory of Music got honors in their respective classes. Word to that effect was received here yesterday. Miss Alice Nelson secured first class honors and Miss Mary Comadina second class honors.

### BOMB IN DUBLIN KILLS FOUR WOMEN

Irregulars in West of Ireland Continue to Fall Back.

DUBLIN, July 26.—Six civilians, four of whom were women, were wounded by a bomb thrown at a lorry in which national soldiers were riding in York St. last evening. No soldiers were injured.

Irregulars continue to fall back before the Irish National Army in the west of Ireland, according to word received from the front.

### GOVERNMENT IN CONTROL OF FREIGHTS

Chicago Expects Canadian Shipmen to Walk Out—Peace Remote.

CHICAGO, July 26.—With the Government assuming control of freight traffic from midnight last night, the Eastern railroads are continuing efforts to form new unions of shipmen and indications from Montreal that a walkout of 40,000 Canadian shipmen will be authorized. Peace in the railway strike situation today seemed remote.

### MISSION BOAT WILL GET AWAY TONIGHT

Rev. J. Gillett Will Take His New Boat, Western Hope, to Islands, Leaving at 10 O'clock

The new Anglican mission boat Western Hope, captained by Rev. J. Gillett, sails at 10 o'clock tonight for Naden Harbor and Massett on her maiden trip. Slight delays have been caused in getting away but Capt. Gillett is now certain of his time of departure, everything running smoothly now.

Charles Phillips, of Tow Hill, who has been in the city for the past month, will go across in the new boat and also Reginald Kelsey, son of Mr. and Mrs. G. A. Kelsey, of this city, who will visit with his chum, Sam Simpson, son of E. H. Simpson, the manager of the Naden Harbor crab cannery.

### JAPANESE DIED FROM USING WOOD ALCOHOL

Body of Jap Fisherman Was Found in Gasoline Boat at Arrandale Cannery, Naas River.

The local provincial police office has received a report from Constable D. S. Cameron, Arrandale, telling of a Japanese fisherman named Sadao Nakayama, aged 52 years, having been found dead in his launch at Arrandale last Wednesday morning.

The dead man was an employee of the Arrandale cannery and his body was found by a Japanese contractor, K. Hara.

The officer, on returning from Port Simpson on Thursday, examined the body and found no marks of violence. The remains were taken to Anyox where an inquiry was held by John Conway, coroner. It was decided that deceased had undoubtedly come to his death by drinking wood alcohol. He was buried at Anyox on Saturday.

### STRIKE MAY BE DECLARED SOON

Railway Shopmen Authorize Calling Out of Men It Is Asserted.

MONTREAL, July 26.—An official here declares that a strike has been authorized and will be declared if the railways persist in the intention to reduce wages. The decision will affect 30,000 shopmen throughout Canada.

Union officials take the stand that the railways have flouted the Dominion arbitration law by declaring a wage reduction before the matter had been submitted to an arbitration board.

A statement was issued last night which shows that the employees of the Canadian Pacific who are skilled mechanics during the past year have averaged only \$100 a month in wages.

### GOLD AND PLATINUM FOUND NORTH ALBERTA

EDMONTON, Alta., July 26.—Both platinum and gold have reached this city from the placer mining claims on Willow Lake, 30 miles south of the terminus on the A. & G. W. railway, but the finding of the precious metal is subject to conflicting reports by men who have actually been on the scene of operations.

The minerals, each in a small glass phial, and mixed with a quantity of fine sand, were submitted to analysis here which showed a very high average, but it is pointed out that a favorable chemical analysis and quantity production do not necessarily go together. Although the minerals found might be rich enough, unless the gold and platinum were discovered in considerable quantities the find would be of no value.

### POSTAL RATES ARE DISCUSSED

Premier of Newfoundland Claims His Colony is Discriminated Against by Canada

OTTAWA, July 26.—Sir Richard Squires, Premier of Newfoundland, just prior to leaving for Great Britain, gave an interview in Montreal protesting against what he called gross discrimination by Canada against the Island Colony, in that Canada had increased her postage to Newfoundland four cents for a one-ounce letter, while mail going from Canada to the United States enjoyed the three cent rate. He declared that when money was being spent to encourage trade between this country and Newfoundland, it was unreasonable to retard that increase in trade by raising the postage rate.

No official protest was lodged by Premier Squires with the Dominion Government, but it is probable that before long there may be some official exchange of views.

### Canada's Position

The position of Canada on the matter is clear.

It is pointed out, in the first place, that at the Congress of the Universal Postal Union, held at Madrid over a year ago, with Hon. P. E. Blondin as Canadian representative, it was decided that it was advisable and necessary to increase greatly the maximum postal union rates of postage, and the rates previously in force were established as the future minimum, the maximum rates being set at double that amount, each country being free to adopt whatever rates it might choose between the minimum and the maximum.

Most of the countries concerned promptly adopted the maximum rates of postage, and in view of Canada's financial condition, these rates were finally put in force by this country, dating from October 1, 1921, as regards correspondence with the postal union countries with whom Canada has no other special postal arrangements.

### Empire-Wide Increase

As for the postal rate between Canada and other parts of the Empire, the rate imposed by Canada up to October of last year was three cents for a one ounce letter to any point within the Empire, whereas the initial letter rate from Great Britain, Australia and New Zealand to Canada had for over a year been four cents, and in view of Canada's need for increased postal revenue it was finally decided that Canada should follow the example of these other parts of the Empire, and Canada's postal rate was accordingly increased to four cents for a one-ounce letter to any point in the Empire, including Newfoundland, from the first of October, 1921.

### Again Reduced

Great Britain has since May 29 last again reduced this rate to three cents for a one-ounce letter, in view of her improved financial condition, but other portions of the Empire have not done so.

Canada's position in relation to rates to the United States, it is argued, is different. For fifty years there has been a special postal convention between the two countries under which the domestic rate of postage of either country is applied to correspondence addressed to the other. This convention is largely the product of geographical position, the

### Progressives are Said to Have Offered Allegiance Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King

QUEBEC, July 26.—An Ottawa despatch to the French Canadian paper L'Evenement states that well informed political circles say 52 of Hon. T. A. Crerar's adherents remained in Ottawa after the session was over and offered Premier Mackenzie King their allegiance unconditionally.

There is supposed to be an arrangement whereby Hon. A. B. Hudson will be taken into the King cabinet and will head the Progressive group in the Government ranks.

Premier Mackenzie King is said to favor the arrangement because it would give him an overwhelming majority in the House.

### FLIES NORTH OF HAZELTON

Len Bell's Plane in Air an Hour With Pontoons Attached.

HAZELTON, July 26.—The airplane Hazelton, which has now been converted into a seaplane by having pontoons attached, made her trial flight under the new conditions this morning. She rose from the river at 9 o'clock and scouted the country north of here with a view to finding a suitable landing place and base in a nearby lake. After flying for an hour she returned and made a perfect landing in the Skeena River.

### "ROLLING" CASE ON STEAMER CHELOHSIN

Two Men Landed in City Lock-up on Suspicion of Rolling Four Fellow Passengers

Joe McBain alias King and Rouray Conley, who arrived from Anyox on the Chelohsin yesterday, are being charged by the provincial police this afternoon with theft before Magistrate McMullin.

The two men were arrested yesterday afternoon and put in the city lock-up on suspicion of being implicated in a "rolling" incident which is alleged to have occurred as the steamer was coming from Anyox to this port. Information was laid by H. Trickey who lost \$112. Three others were involved in the case, each having suffered losses of \$25, \$34 and \$27 respectively. All were intoxicated and there had been gambling and fighting. A great deal of money was found on the two accused.

McBain was charged with assault this morning before the magistrate and was fined \$10 and costs.

McBain and Conley were on their way to Prince Rupert while the men said to have been robbed were going to Vancouver.

### AIRPLANE IN SPAIN FALLS, KILLS THREE

GRANADA, Spain, July 26.—An airplane carrying mails and passengers between Rabbit and Casa Blanca, Morocco, fell yesterday near Gaudix after catching fire in mid-air. Three occupants of the machine were killed.

### Bestowing Honors For Services Rendered.

There is still a great deal of discussion going on in Britain over the custom of bestowing political honors. It is charged, and apparently with a good deal of truth, that honors are bought there and that as a result titles are coming to be held in disrepute.

Possibly Lloyd George, who is a thorough democrat and does not care much for titles, he himself on more than one occasion having refused the distinction, may be using the appointments for the purpose of breaking up the old system. He is very astute. Nothing would do more to eventually kill the title business than giving them away indiscriminately.

And after all it would be difficult to award titles to new men who are less fit to have them than many of the hereditary holders are at present. A man may be an imbecile and yet if he is the eldest son of an earl he sooner or later becomes an earl. So it is with every title except the knight.

The chief difficulty in doing away with hereditary titles is that the move would be looked upon as a slap at the monarchy. As long as the king gets his position because he is the eldest son of a former monarch, it is not reasonable to suggest that a duke or an earl of a baronet may not do likewise.

### Distinction To Be A Mister.

Discussing the question of titles the Manchester Guardian says:

"Criticism of the method of bestowing honors concentrated in the Lords on the peculiarly unfortunate case of Sir J. B. Robinson, who has now in very suitable terms withdrawn from the arena by surrendering the peerage. But a peerage or any other honor ought not merely to be free from objections. Unless the public service is something very definite, involving serious effort and self-sacrifice, why pick out the performer to be distinguished from his fellows by a title? If titles are to be conferred at all, their gift should be dissociated altogether from party politics and purged from every possibility either of a pecuniary or of a political consideration. They should be limited to real distinction or to official services and position, and they should not be multiplied beyond necessity. Earls, viscounts, barons, baronets, knights of orders of old renown, knights of mushroom orders that nobody remembers, dames and Victorian orders and O.B.E.'s—they swarm till it begins to be a distinction to be plain mister, like our greatest novelist, our most celebrated dramatist, and the present and the late prime minister."

### Strikes Are Cause Of Suffering And Loss.

Suffering on the part of the women and children and loss of immense sums of money on the part of the employers and employees always result from strikes. While there are occasions when strikes are justified, especially in the past, under present day conditions every effort should be made on either side to prevent the tie up of the plant. Not only is there the loss and suffering mentioned but also there is the engendered hate which is closely allied to war. If war is wrong so are strikes. Seldom is advantage gained by either. They are often the result of mutual distrust.

### Will Prove More Than Interesting Fad.

The radiophone is at present an interesting fad but it may in time come to be much more than that. At present it is in its experimental stage and is not being adapted to any particular useful purpose outside of a little entertainment. Possibly entertaining will in future be its principal sphere.

There was a time when some people kept a parrot so as to have someone to talk to them. Now they can put in a wireless receiver with an amplifier and get all the talk and music they want. That is, they can do it if they live in one of the big cities. Here we have no broadcasting station so have more difficulty in picking up the speeches.

Possibly in the not too distant future the system will be simplified and amplified and the cost of instruments reduced so that everyone will have a receiver in the house, wired in when the building is erected.

## HALIBUT-BOAT CAP. GIVES OPINION OF FISHING REGULATION

Fish Would be of Inferior Quality  
If Delayed in Transit Says  
Capt. Angel

Capt. C. G. Angel, of the halibut schooner Alaska, arrived in Ketchikan last night from Prince Rupert, where he had just disposed of his catch of 61,000 lbs. to the Pacific Fisheries at 10c and 1c, says the Ketchikan News. The captain and crew will proceed to the Sea Fisheries after purchasing their supplies. Louis Larsen, one of the members of the Alaska, said he agreed absolutely with the views of Capt. Bassi, of the halibut boat Altan, Capt. A. Olson of the Vanece and Capt. John Johnson of the Omamney regarding the proposed ferry the stories of which were printed in the Daily News.

Mr. Larsen said it would cost at least one million to one and a quarter million dollars to build a ferry which would be suitable to carry cars from Prince Rupert to Ketchikan. The cost of operating this ferry would be very expensive. He said he would like to know what would happen to the fisherman if five or six schooners should happen to arrive in Ketchikan at one time. Besides this if the mosquito fleet should have a few boats in port, it would also add considerably to the fish to be sold. There was always a ready market at Prince Rupert, as the buyers know they can get their fish away within a day over the Grand Trunk line.

### Capacity of Boats

On an average it could be figured each schooner would have from three to four carloads of fish, 25,000 lbs. to each car. This would mean sixteen cars for each trip of five schooners.

"Here is an estimate," said Mr. Larsen, "of what the different schooners carry: Scandia, 125,000 lbs.; Commonwealth, 110,000 lbs.; Helgeland, 100,000 lbs.; Seattle and Republic, 90,000 lbs.; Polaris, Alaska, Panama, Vanece, Omamney, Altan, Liberty, Torden, Skjold, Seymour and Yakutat, 75,000 lbs.; Constitution and Senator between 50,000 and 60,000 lbs.; Washington, Arctic, Tacoma, Atlas, Daly and Gladstone, 45,000 and numerous others besides the mosquito fleet."

It is well known among the fishermen, and also buyers, that a halibut schooner can make better time from here to Prince Rupert than from a ferry could. Also the halibut schooner could get across Dixon's entrance when it would be impossible for the ferry to make the trip. This would mean that if the fisherman was forced to sell his fish here, and a storm should be blowing, the buyers would not buy, as it would mean the fish would have to be held over here perhaps several days, before reaching Prince Rupert to be forwarded to the Eastern market.

### In Better Condition

When the fish goes to Prince Rupert direct it is certain to be placed on the Eastern market in better condition. If it had to be ferried, and there was any delay it would mean the re-icing of the fish. It is well known that the moving of the fish will make an inferior quality.

Mr. Larsen said the fishermen were all anxious to help Ketchikan, and if not forced to other markets they would certainly buy all the provisions and supplies from here, as they are doing at the present time.

## Ten Years Ago in Prince Rupert

News was received in town today that the fishermen's strike at Ketchikan has been settled, both sides having compromised. There has been a tie-up for some time.

## WIFE A VAGABOND

Retired Builder Writes to Father-in-law Scathing Letter Complaining About Daughter.

LONDON, July 26.—Mrs. Eleanor Lillian Pearce, whose maiden name was Beyer, of Aberdare-gardens, prayed for a judicial separation from Simon Henry Pearce, a retired builder, on the ground of his cruelty.

The respondent denied the cruelty and prayed for a judicial separation on the ground of his wife's cruelty towards him. This the petitioner denied.

Mr. Cartwright Sharp said that the parties were married on April 30, 1911. Mrs. Pearce complained of her husband's heavy drinking, of his abominable language and of his violence. Dear Sir.—Just a reminder that ten years ago today I married the greatest vagabond, liar, and thief on earth. Nothing in the house is safe. She steals, pawns, shouts, and is a curse to the neighborhood. The police have been here many times. This morning I again caught her red-handed stealing money from my trousers pocket. She thinks she was born into the world to powder her face, smoke cigarettes, burn furniture and carpets, spend her time in picture palaces, music halls, and stop out every night with my brother.

The servant is as bad as her, and, with the aid of the police, is being thrown out on Wednesday, and your daughter will follow. She is ruining my boy, and the proper place for her to live is where she was born.—Yours faithfully, S. H. Pearce.

## BRINGING UP FATHER



## STORK ANSWERS MANY QUESTIONS

Big Crowd of Delegates Listened to Member at Trades and Labor Meeting.

Fred Stork, M. P. for Skeena addressed the Trades and Labor Council last night and replied to a questionnaire list that was submitted to him. There was a large attendance of delegates and President S. D. MacDonald occupied the chair.

In his speech, Mr. Stork told of the doings at Ottawa and briefly summarized the work of the session. Speaking of local conditions and prospects, the member said that a great future for Prince Rupert was just on the horizon. As for the fish business, the geographical advantage at the terminus of the National Transcontinental Railway put the port in a position where it could compete for the Alaska business successfully no matter what the United States government might do to take that business to Alaskan ports.

**Questions Answered.**  
The following was the list of questions and the answers given by the member.

1—Why did the government refuse to submit a national policy in dealing with the unemployment question?

Answer—The government is still considering the question and a conference is to be held. No practical solutions had been advanced yet by the Dominion government on account of the shortage of money.

2—Why did the government oppose the Woodsworth resolution restoring the Royal North West Mounted Police to their original territorial jurisdiction?

The whole question is now under review and changes will be made. The Graham estimate for military and naval purposes were reduced \$4,000,000.

3—Why did the government oppose the McMaster resolution debaring corporation directors from acting as ministers of the crown?

Absolute consistency might have worked great disaster along some other line so the lesser of two evils was chosen. Mr. Stork gave an account of the debate in the House on the question.

4. In what particulars does the revised tariff shift the burden of taxation from the port to the rich?

A slight reduction in the tariff had been made but the lack of a clear majority had forced the government to do things that were not entirely to its liking. This condition had also prevented the Liberal program from being carried out in full. The question was much involved.

**Prince Rupert Drydock**  
5—Why has a part of the Prince Rupert dry dock plant not been converted into a car repair shop and car building plant for the Canadian National Railway system?

This matter was one for the new railway management to deal with. Mr. Stork stated that anything he could do towards having the suggestion carried out would be done.

6—Why did the Government defeat the Asiatic exclusion resolution?

Even the United States had refrained from using the words "total exclusion." Effective restriction had been used, this being merely a matter of diplomatic courtesy. Hon. Charles Stewart had just announced that being made.

7—What was the attitude of the member for Skeena on the Nova

Scotia coal miners' strike?

He did not consider the question of vital importance. It was a Nova Scotia question and not British Columbia's.

8—Is the Government in favor of further centralizing the control of our banking system?

He was not familiar with the policy of the Government but admitted that the Liberals had gone on record as being opposed to further centralization.

**No Railway Building**

9.—In reference to the unallotted vote of eight million dollars for British Columbia will the Government build a road into the Ground Hog or some other short feeder that will help make the main line of the Grand Trunk Pacific a profitable road and, at the same time, help the unemployment when it is needed?

Hon. W. C. Kennedy, minister of railways, had said that no more railways would be built in the immediate future. Personally, Mr. Stork said he would vote for it.

10—Does the Government contemplate passing a national eight hour day?

He did not know if the Government was contemplating such a measure but if it did he would vote for it.

Mr. Stork stated that he had not taken up the matter of unemployed insurance with the Government.

In reference to the question as to why the Dominion Iron and Steel Corporation of Nova Scotia had been paid \$4,000,000 for breach of contract in connection with war cancellations and B. C. lumber mills had not been similarly treated, Mr. Stork said he was not familiar.

The next meeting of the Trades and Labor Council will be devoted exclusively to consideration of the Workmen's Compensation Act.

## HERRING INDUSTRY OF THIS COAST IS DISCUSSED BY EXPERT

Letter to Alaska Paper Will Prove of Interest to Prince Rupert People

In a letter to the Juneau Empire, Einar Beyer tells of the possibilities and limitations of the herring industry. He says:

Southeastern Alaska will in my opinion this year produce 100,000 one-half barrels (not whole barrels) of herring. I expect to handle 40,000 one-half barrels. I don't think it is possible to pack 1,000,000 whole barrels in Southeastern Alaska, while I do believe the district can pack 4,000,000 one-half barrels without impairing the supply. However, there is not and never will be a market in the United States for pickled herring to such an extent, as the average American does not eat salt herring. It is consumed exclusively by the foreign born population, especially by the conservative Jews and, to a smaller extent, by the first generation of Scandinavians, Germans and Russians. The second generation of these foreign born people does not favor pickled herring, which is eaten raw, that is, cured, but not cooked.

**Europe's Pickled Herring**  
In Europe the pickled herring is appreciated by the rich and poor. Norway, Great Britain, Germany, Sweden and Holland produced before the war about 4,000,000 barrels a year, of which, however, 90 per cent were so-called full herring (with melt and roe developed). This fish was sold at exceedingly low prices — \$2 to \$7 per barrel, according to quality and size, and it can still be produced cheap, as European labor, barrels, salt, freight, etc., are

much lower than here. The United States can never produce herring for the poor people in competition with Europe. The empty barrel alone costs more than \$2 here. Even today Europe produces 2,000,000 barrels yearly, and with improving conditions abroad it will again increase its pack to 4,000,000 barrels and more, as the supply of poor grade of herring is unlimited.

**Demand Increasing**

The remaining 10 per cent of the pre-war European herring production consisted of matjes—that is, fat, early herring without melt or roe. Of this variety being caught exclusively in Scotland and Ireland, it can only produce one-half of the former production, while the demand is increasing in the United States. This is the reason why Alaska has an excellent opportunity to pack an increasing quantity of pickled herring. It has an ample supply of the high grade of fish, which can stand the higher cost of materials and labor to some extent.

But Scotland is sure again to increase its pack of matjes. Alaska therefore needs a tariff to be able to compete in the long run. The freight alone from Alaska to the Eastern market is \$6.50 per barrel, notwithstanding that it has been considerably decreased. The freight from Scotland to New York is hardly \$2 per barrel. Our costs for empty barrels, labor, salt, etc., is at least twice as great as that of the Scotch. Thus there is great need for further reduction of the cost of freight and materials.

**Need World's Markets**

In order to be able to use its ample supply of fat herring Alaska would need the markets of the world, which cannot be reached today. Until the German and Russian markets open up it would be foolish to increase the pack of Alaska much over this year's output.

A market could and should be worked up in the United States for canned herring, which is a very superior food article but now unknown to the public. The supply for canning is unlimited, as the small herring, not fitted for pickling, is the best for canning purposes. With the new machinery invented in Norway the canned herring can be produced at a low cost to compete favorably with canned salmon and sardines. As a food it is as good if not superior to salmon. The salmon for canning purposes can be caught nearly all the year around, weather conditions permitting, and something ought to be done to give this industry a start.

## THINKS MAYOR SHOULD NOT INSULT CATHOLICS

Resident of Toronto Writes Open Letter to Head of That City Regarding Matter.

TORONTO, July 26.—Wallace J. Baker, 152 Close Avenue, has issued the following "open letter" to his Worship Mayor Maguire:

"Last January I had the pleasure of having you express the following sentiments to me: 'I hope that my public service, as Chief Magistrate, will give every satisfaction to all the citizens of this city. My most earnest desire is to be the Mayor of all the people, and I hope in this ambition I will have your hearty support.'"

"Now Mr. Mayor, I believe

you have sincerely endeavored to live up to your ideals. You have been most tolerant and consequently have had my support. It seems too bad that you have been used, by virtue of your office, to appear as though you sanctioned the insults that have been hurled at the 60,000 Catholics of Toronto by William Goode and others.

"It was most unfair to you that in a public place, which belongs as much to Catholics as to Protestants, you were associated on a platform which was graced by such men as Mr. Goode, who thrives on anti-Catholic bigotry.

**Loyalty to Empire.**

"Let us not forget, when Mr. Goode speaks of loyalty to the Empire, he is treading on very thin ice. It is a recognized fact that the Catholic French-Canadians saved Canada to the Empire. This loyalty cry is a splendid shield behind which such men as Mr. Goode hide.

"Would it not be well to have our public men discontinue the sowers of hatred and discord among us?"

"I speak for harmony, love and goodfellowship among all the people of our splendid city. It is an insult to ask you to sponsor any religious bigotry. Let us hope you may be saved from any further humiliation from any source whatsoever, and that we may live as one big family in peace and unity."

## RADIO AMATEURS ARE MUCH DISAPPOINTED

Ten Thousand in Britain Have Licenses For Receiving

LONDON, July 26.—Amateurs in wireless telephony who purchased receiving sets in anticipation of the early introduction of the system of broadcasting into this country have been greatly disappointed by the continued delay in inaugurating the scheme. There are now ten thousand private persons in this country in possession of licences entitling them to the use of receiving sets, but up to the present their experiments have been confined to receiving from continental stations. The Postmaster-General six weeks ago in Parliament announced that facilities would be given for broadcasting, and that the country had been mapped out in districts for the erection of central stations. Only British manufacturers, he said, would be allowed to tender for the ownership of such stations. A boom resembling that reported from the United States was anticipated.

## GERMAN SAILORS ON BRITISH VESSELS

BERLIN, July 26.—Shipping circles here note with satisfaction that German sailors are again in demand for the personnel of ships sailing under foreign flags.

The most recent instance cited is that of a modernly equipped salvage vessel which an English company has sent to the Baltic Sea to stand ready for assistance in all cases of distress. It is said here that, although the ship's captain is English, as is also its flag, the crew consists of 36 Germans hailing from Danzig.

**MANY LOST MEMORIES IN GREAT WAR; EFFORT MADE TO FIND THEM**

**France Will Advertise for Men Who Have Lost Themselves Owing to Memory Failure.**

According to Le Matin, the great Parisian morning paper, the War Department of the French Republic proposes to get in touch with leading motion picture producers in the United States, Canada and Brazil with a view to establishing the identity of a number of poilus who have lost their memory as a result of the terrors of the war.

**Men Without Memory.**

"There are at present time in France nearly sixty poilus who are either suffering from a certain form of insanity or are afflicted with amnesia to such a degree that they can neither recall their names nor incidents connected with their former lives. All French newspapers have published their photographs from time to time and although some of the veterans have been identified, there are still a number of these unfortunate war victims left," the paper states.

The French War Department will ask leading moving picture concerns in Canada and the United States to flash the photos of these men on the screens in all towns and villages, in the hope that they will be recognized here.

**Soldiers From Canada.**

"It must not be forgotten," states LeMatin, "that hundreds of thousands of the gallant soldiers who fought under the battle flags of the Republic answered the call from Canada and the United States."

The men, who are suffering from loss of memory, were officially listed as "assumed to have been killed." In the first instance they were reported "missing."

**STORK CARRIES MESSAGE**

MERSEBURG, Germany, July 26.—A stork returning to its nest in the village of Lieskau, near here, was observed to be carrying a small object attached to its neck. The bird was caught and the object was found to be a tiny leather bag containing the following message: "Greetings to my German home! Willi Bucha, farmer in Nova on Victoria Lake (East Africa). ## VANDERHOOF

## SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class and second-class to be \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is not timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange to purchase land jointly.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation.

Where pre-emptor in occupation less than five years, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$50 per annum and records same each year.

Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture.

Title cannot be obtained in less than five years, and improvements of \$100 per acre, including 5 acres cleared, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas not exceeding 20 acres may be leased as homesteads, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stamp duty.

Natural gas, meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under the Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the great war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emption are due or payable by holders on pre-emption recorded after June 26, 1918.

Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of money accrued, due and been paid since August 1, 1914, on account of payments, "taxes on sales" or "taxes on transfers."

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or descendants, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from August 1, 1914, to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASES OF CROWN LANDS

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1922.

GRAZING

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner.

Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

## MORE SIAMESE TWINS ARE LIVING IN TEXAS

Daisy and Violet Hilton Are Sixteen Years of Age and are Bright

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, July 26.—Leather-lunged spicers of the World's Greatest Combined Shows will never extol to throngs of the midway the odd twinning of Daisy and Violet Hilton, upon whom has fallen the title of "Siamese Twins," following the death in Chicago of the world-famous Blazek sisters.

Daisy and Violet Hilton, sixteen years old, will not commercialize their malformation, declare Mr. and Mrs. Ben Meyer, foster parents of the sisters.

The twins are joined together at the base of the spinal column. This fusion, however, has not interfered with their enjoyment of the customary amusements of childhood and they daily can be seen playing about the lawn of the modest little home of their foster parents.

Medical scientists of two continents have become interested in these sisters, a strange phenomenon of nature. Each girl, declare doctors who have examined them, has a complete set of organs, functioning perfectly.

Strangely, Violet and Daisy spring from lineal descendants who are twins. Their parents both were twins, as were their grandparents on both maternal and paternal sides. It is more than passing strange, assert physicians and surgeons, that the Hilton sisters should be joined together, while coming from parents who were of normal physique.

The mother of the two girls died from a Caesarian operation, following the birth of Violet and Daisy. Shortly thereafter the girls were brought to America from their home in England by Mr. and Mrs. Meyer, with whom they now reside in this city.

Violet and Daisy are being given a musical education. They are peculiarly endowed with a love for music, declare their foster parents. Violet favors the violin, while Daisy accompanies her on the piano. Both girls are fond of reading. Violet prefers the works of Edgar Allan Poe, while her sister, Daisy, takes to the writings of Charles Dickens.

The two girls are being educated by a private tutor. Fearing that they would be embarrassed by students at the public schools, the foster parents of the twins have persistently declined to enter them in municipal institutions of learning.

Can Never Be Separated

The twins, whose curious formation has attracted hundreds of medical scientists, can never be separated, according to the unanimous verdict of physicians and surgeons who have studied the fusion of their spine. Violet and Daisy, prior to being brought to America, appeared several times before the Royal Medical Society of London.

## CHIEF JUSTICE TAFT POPULAR IN BRITAIN

Interesting Sidelight on His Recent Visit to London

LONDON, July 26.—The extent to which Mr. Taft, the popular Chief Justice of the United States, has been in demand during his visit to London was amusingly illustrated by Mr. Harvey, the American Ambassador. Both were guests at a Press Club luncheon, and Mr. Harvey remarked that one reason why he was glad to be present was that it gave him an opportunity of meeting Mr. Taft. He went on to explain that Mr. Taft was supposed to be staying with him. He had had the privilege of meeting him at the station on his arrival. The same evening he suggested to Mr. Taft that he might turn down the lights and tell him a few things about what was going on in America. Since that day, Mr. Taft had had one square meal in his house.

Chief Justice's Days

Mr. Harvey threw some light on Mr. Taft's routine. "I get up in the morning at a normal English hour," the American Ambassador remarked, "and I come down and inquire, 'Where is the Chief Justice?' Has he been down, or is he still asleep? Then I am told he was down at seven o'clock and has gone off to the Courts. At luncheon time, I learn, he has been in and changed his clothes. Later in the afternoon I ask if anything has been seen of Mr. Taft. Oh, yes, he is taking tea with someone and presently will be back. He does; he comes back, but he is always behind time, and has to rush to some other engagement."

"I thought I would rise one morning and catch him, and I got very near it, but he was under a skylight being sculptured in clay." The truth of the matter, Mr. Harvey added, was that the visit of Mr. Taft was proving more than a mere episode, and he said in conclusion that it was absolutely essential to the success and prosperity of the entire world that there should be a true, real acquaintance ship between the best types of the British and American people.
