Irish Situation Has Become Alarming BUDGET STILL OCCUPIES ATTENTION OF HOUSE OF COMMONS

Progressives, Though Not Wholly in Accord, Refuse to Condemn Whole Budget

OTTAWA, May 30.—Yesterday's debate on the budget was carried on chiefly by the Progressives. It revealed that, while the Progressives are not satisfied with the budget's provisions, they do not intend to support the Conservative opposition amendment put forward by Sir Henry Drayton and Hon. Arthur Meighen condemning the government on account of it.

W. G. McQuarrie, Conservative member for New Westminster, in answering one Progressive declaration in favor of reciprocity with the United States, declared that no member for British Columbia, either Liberal or Conservative, would have the courage to favor reciprocity which would mean the death of the province's industries.

GERMAN REPLY SATISFACTORY Will Undertake Fulfill Demands if Loan is Made

PARIS, May 30.—The German reply to the reparations commission says the German government will undertake to fulfill the demands on the hypothesis that it be given and through a foreign loan with suitable time to maintain its paper circulation within the limits reached on March 31. Germany will comply with the conditions fixed by the committee for a partial moratorium. The reply is generally regarded as satisfactory with the exception of a few immaterial details.

FARMERS IN FAVOR OF CROW AGREEMENT

OTTAWA, May 30.—Norman Lambert, secretary of the Canadian Council of Agriculture, urged the restoration of the Crow's Nest Pass agreement on behalf of the organized farmers of Canada before the railway transportation costs committee in the House of Commons.

EXCURSION RATES ARE NOT ADOPTED

T. L. Church's Bill Was Killed by Railway Committee Today

OTTAWA, May 30.—The railway committee in the House of Commons today killed the bill presented by T. L. Church, member for North Toronto, to re-establish excursion rates.

COAST LEAGUE THIRD BASEMAN IS SOLD TO CHICAGO AMERICANS

SAN FRANCISCO, May 30.—Confirmation has been made of the sale of Willie Kamm, third baseman for San Francisco Coast League team, to the Chicago Americans for \$100,000. Two other players are also to be traded.

MUTINY OF CHANG'S FORCES CONTINUES

Harbin Garrison Goes Over to Side of General Wu Pei Fu

PEKIN, May 30.—The Manchurian mutiny against General Chang Tso Lin, the Manchurian leader, is spreading. The garrison at Harbin has joined the mutiny and declared itself in favor of General Wu Pei Fu, the victor in the recent Pekin fighting.

KARKLE IS COMMITTED

On Charge of Breaking and Entering Several Premises.

John Karkle, charged with breaking and entering George Leek's store, George Tite's warehouse and the Taylor & Moorhouse garage on Third Avenue, came before Magistrate McGlymont in the city police court this morning for his preliminary hearing and was committed.

The robbery was discovered at 9:50 yesterday morning, by Geo. Leek and Geo. Tite, and Sergeant Bailey took the investigation in hand. At the Tite warehouse on Second Avenue it was found that three trunks, belonging to Jack, Peters, Mrs. Steeves and S. Bennett, had been broken open, the goods taken therefrom being identified in court.

The thief had gained entrance to Geo. Leek's store on Third Avenue, by climbing through a window at the rear of the premises, used as a workshop by H. H. Hemmings. A rifle, two revolvers, watches, rings, etc., were missed, valued at approximately \$120, most of the stolen property having been recovered and identified in court.

At the garage on Third Avenue owned by Messrs. Taylor & Moorhouse, spark plugs and tire patches were stolen.

Karkle Suspected.

Upon a close examination of the premises, and after several enquiries, had been made, Sergeant Bailey suspected Karkle was the culprit and mentioned the fact to Mr. Tite. The accused had been working on the Skeena River canneries in the past few weeks and was in the city presumably for the weekend.

The eastbound train was consequently watched yesterday morning and Karkle, who had the stolen property in his kit on board was apprehended by Geo. Leek and handed over to the city police.

Karkle was convicted some 12 months ago on a charge of breaking and entering Jack Gavigan's store and the Prince Rupert Pool room. He was released on suspended sentence by Judge Young.

Gets Two Years.

3 p.m.—Karkle came up before Judge Young this afternoon and elected for speedy trial. He was sentenced to two years on three charges, the terms running concurrently.

Tonight's train is reported on time, and the Prince George will arrive tomorrow at 11 a.m. (standard time.)

DALE PITT TAKES RIDE ON PREMIER MINE TRAM LINE

STEWART, May 30.—Dale L. Pitt, general manager of the Premier, made the trip down from the mine to the ore bunkers at tide-water last week on the aerial tram, being the first man to take this trip. Mr. Pitt says that the tram is not intended as a transportation route for passengers but that it was necessary for him to ride over it in order to thoroughly inspect it. He returned to the mine the next morning in the same manner, riding a "timber hook" instead of a bucket, both ways.

FOOD AND CLOTHING BEING ADMITTED TO RUSSIA DUTY FREE

MOSCOW, May 30.—Plans are announced for admitting into Russia, duty free, packages from abroad for individuals and which contain only food or clothing intended exclusively for personal use. These parcels must not exceed 21 pounds in weight.

By the Soviet customs regulations each person is entitled to receive from foreign countries by post under this ruling not more than two packages each month. The contents of the parcels will be subject to duty if the food and personal effects are sent in the same bundle.

CHURCH FORBIDS TRIBAL WEDDINGS

VANCOUVER, May 30.—Although tribal marriages among the Indians of the Coast are permitted by the government, they will in future be forbidden among Indian adherents of the Methodist church, according to a decision reached by the Indian workers' department of the annual convention here last week. Many missionaries are anxious about the reported growing laxity and looseness of domestic life among the Indians, and Christian marriages were decided as essential before an Indian could join the Christian church.

Victoria Council to Ask Federal Government make Ruling Lord's Day Act.

VICTORIA, May 30.—Every member of the city council, with the exception of Mayor W. P. Marchant, last night voted to ask the attorney general to postpone the prosecution of Sunday law violators until the Federal Government decides regarding possibility of amending the Lord's Day Act to make its enforcement a matter for the municipalities to decide.

WILL REPLACE POLICE LAUNCH

Myfawny Found Unsuitable For This District and Will Be Returned to Vancouver

The provincial police launch Myfawny has been found unsuitable for the northern waters and after a minor overhaul she will shortly be taken to Vancouver in exchange for a larger, faster, and more suitable police boat for this district.

The launch Myfawny was originally built for still water use and has a very light draught. It is not fitted for the long and often stormy trips which the provincial police are called upon to make to outlying districts.

VANCOUVER, May 30.—Fourteen Indians of Alert Bay, who had been sentenced to two months imprisonment for potlaching, have been released on suspended sentence for good conduct. Their term is thus shortened by several weeks.

CANADIAN EXPRESS OFFICIALS COMING ON TRAIN TONIGHT

John Pullen, president of the Canadian National Express Co., Montreal, W. C. Muir, vice-president and general manager, S. G. White, secretary to Mr. Pullen, C. A. Cunningham, general superintendent at Winnipeg, and Z. M. Middleton, superintendent at Edmonton, comprise a party of Canadian National Express Co. officials who will arrive in the city by special car on tonight's west-bound train on a tour of inspection along western lines. The party will leave tomorrow night on the Prince George for Anyox and will go south to Vancouver, Victoria and Seattle on the same vessel Thursday night. Mrs. Pullen accompanies her husband.

PRINCE OF WALES WILL REACH HOME EVENING JUNE 20

PLYMOUTH, England, May 30.—The Prince of Wales, who is now returning home on the Renown from his tour of the Orient, will arrive at this port on the evening of June 20 and will proceed direct up the harbor to the north dock yard. The Prince will disembark on the following morning and will reach London the same afternoon. The Renown will leave Gibraltar for home on June 17.

Fred Stork, member for Skeena, voted with a minority of 57 to 83 in the House of Commons at Ottawa last week in favor of the discontinuation of manufacture and importation of oleo-margarine. The defeated motion to this effect was brought in by A. W. Neill, Progressive member of Comox-Alberni. The vote was a non-party one.

Manifesto Gives Rise to Fear That Warfare is Planned by South

LONDON, May 30.—The cabinet meeting called for today to discuss the Irish difficulty continues to cause nervous concern with no solution, apparently, in sight. The manifesto from the states bordering on Ulster, criticizing Ulster members of the Imperial parliament and their sympathizers, has led to the belief that Southern Ireland is preparing for war on a large scale against the North. It is reported that, in these quarters, munition factories, controlled by the Minister of Defense of the Dail Eireann, are manufacturing war materials under high pressure.

Arthur Griffith and Michael Collins had a long conversation with Premier Lloyd George prior to the cabinet meeting over which the premier presided.

Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill announced in the House of Commons this afternoon that British troops were being kept in Dublin not by request of the Irish provisional government but because the process of evacuation had been temporarily suspended by the British government.

Ulster Evacuating
BELFAST, May 30.—The evacuation of a considerable stretch of country in the border region by the Ulster forces was announced today. Special constables have been withdrawn from the Balleck salient in County Fermanagh, Ulster, thus abandoning it to the Free State troops. Fighting was in progress along the Donegal-Fermanagh border last night. Further fighting is also reported at Glady, County Tyrone. Shooting and ambushing continued along the border all night long and several more people were killed yesterday.

Vicecount Fitzalan, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, has issued a proclamation confirming the government's order that the elections must take place in July under the jurisdiction of the provisional government. The parliament thus elected will be regarded as provisional.

VANCOUVER, May 30.—With the address of Mrs. Joan Arnoldi, president, referring to the order's loyalty to the British Empire and its determination to work for it, the convention of the National Chapter, Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire, got away to a good start yesterday. Committees are now working on resolutions which will be submitted in the course of the week's meetings. Social events are filling much of the time.

ENCAMPMENT OF INDIANS

Band of Natives Started Camp on Summit Avenue—Were Ordered Away

A miniature Indian pageant containing Indians, papooses, wigwams and dogs was staged yesterday on the grassy slopes of Summit Avenue. The permanent inhabitants, however, resented the intrusion and called in the aid of the city police. Sergeant Bailey very diplomatically informed two Indian families that it would be necessary for them to vacate the newly-found reservation for pastures new. This morning the entire camp had vanished with the exception of the dogs and some baggage which will be removed during the day.

It appears that the Indian families in question left Kitwanga for the Stikine country some three months ago and have trekked some hundreds of miles for trapping as they proceeded. The party eventually reached Stewart from which point they arrived over the week end and being some what scared of seeing so many white people all together they had sought the seclusion of Summit Avenue for safety. They will probably leave for the interior on tomorrow's train.

EX-CROWN PRINCE TO RETURN TO GERMANY

BERLIN, May 30.—The return of former Crown Prince William to Germany in the near future, is likely, it is learned, in official quarters. It is understood that the ex-Kaiser's son will give up his abode on the Island of Wieringen and settle down in Germany, to live quietly as a country squire. The Berlin government is making his return conditional on a promise that he will not engage in any political activity.

Agriculture And Economic Regeneration.

It is generally agreed throughout the British Empire that a movement to the land would constitute one of the greatest factors towards successful economic regeneration. While the great factor of unemployment in the Old Country has made conditions there bad and many people, as a result, are suffering hardships, men and families are wanted in the Dominions for the land. With the introduction of the Empire Settlement Bill in the British House of Commons, the first real step has been taken towards co-ordination and co-operation in migration policy that has been long needed. Many minds are at work on the problem and harmonious measures will likely be taken by the Dominions now that the Motherland has taken the first step. The Old Land is rich in men and money; the Dominions are rich in opportunities for those who are willing to use enough energy to take advantage of them. The resources of the Dominions of the British Empire should be developed by British capital. Therefore it is well that all members of the Empire should co-operate in measures that will be of benefit to the British citizens and will still preserve the British Empire for the British people, and the putting of British settlers on British land, wherever it may be, will assist towards that end.

Farming Is Sure And Safe Calling.

It seems peculiar that immigrants are, as a rule, more willing and more courageous in entering upon agricultural pursuits and taking up the occupations of farmers and ranchers in the Dominions, and in Canada particularly, than are the residents of the Dominions themselves. There are, doubtless, many people in Canada who are so afraid of entering into agriculture as a means of making their living or investing their money that they would rather starve in a city than make a try at the land. Due caution in changing from one occupation in life to another is to be commended and is wise but it seems in many cases in this country to be not so much a case of caution as a case of actual fear. People will stake their means, and, sometimes, even their lives on business deals of various description, in mining, in oil fields, in mercantile lines and in countless of other ventures, all less sure than the land, but would never consider agriculture. To the man of small means, the land, indeed, presents no sinecure and hard work is necessary for success, even for livelihood, but to the man of moderate means who feels that he is slipping in the city and in business, there is no safer and no more pleasant means of investing than by taking up land and turning it into productive use. In any case, it is a certain fact that if suitable land is obtained, such as still offers in almost every part of Canada, the investment of actual money or labor or both will be amply returned. There is little of the spectacular in agricultural pursuits; perhaps, that is why so many western Canadians are reluctant at following them. But what the development of the land lacks in excitement it certainly makes up for in eventual satisfaction and it is safe. Provided the land is taken up in the proper spirit of industry and commonsense there is nothing to be lost and much to be gained—something of which one can never be robbed.

Importance Of Agriculture To Building Of Country.

We are inclined to look towards the establishing of great industries and the development of mines and lumber mills and actual manufacturing or the like as the only means of making Prince Rupert a great city and the Skeena district a prosperous one. Possibly, in thinking of such things we lose sight of the real and direct benefit that land settling and development in this district means to us. We may be inclined to downheartedness because the spring has not brought forward so much in concrete form right here in Prince Rupert as we had looked for. But if we took a trip out of Prince Rupert into the hinterland agricultural valleys of the Skeena and the Bulkley, directly tributary to this city, we might be heartened up a little and might come back in a more hopeful and more confident mood. Those who do visit these valleys, come back and tell us of great activity, of new settlers coming and of fine agricultural projects progressing steadily towards great productiveness. It is because the people of Prince Rupert do not see all that is going on along these lines that they may be inclined to doubt the future. But if reason is allowed to prevail a new attitude will be produced. Agriculture is going to mean a lot to this city as the entrepot for the great valleys of the Skeena and Bulkley and possibly for the Queen Charlotte Islands but no one can expect it to develop in a single year or in a single decade.

The Skeena valley will some time become a second Fraser valley, the Bulkley, a second Thompson, Francois and Ootsa Lakes, a second Okanagan, the fisheries of the Skeena are more important today than the Fraser, the mining production of this section of the province is greater than any other single district and the possibilities are much vaster, the hills and mountains are covered with a practically untouched virgin forests, Prince Rupert is the terminus of the greatest Transcontinental railroad in Canada and as a port is closer to the Orient than any other southern port, therefore, why should Prince Rupert with modest expectations, indeed, not become a second Vancouver?

A short account of a Trip to California in a Ford Flivver By H. F. Pullen

FINAL REFLECTIONS.

VICTORIA, May 26.—British Columbia looks good and feels good after being in the south. The air is fresh and cool and the people change slightly, the farther north one goes. They are slow to get up in the mornings but when up they move with alacrity and vigor.

I am constantly asked all sorts of questions about California and the other states through which we passed, mostly inane questions such as "How are things in the south?" I reply that things are all right in the south, just as right as they are here. The people go about their work in their own way and solve their own problems just as we have to do.

In San Francisco they told me there had been no unemployment problem during the winter and there was no appearance of lack of occupation anywhere, but talking with some people in Los Angeles I was told there was difficulty in getting work for those other than laborers.

Prohibition.

I have been asked how prohibition is working out there, and I should say it is working out well, so well that I was most agreeably surprised after the stories I had heard. Of course there are blind pigs and there are illicit stills, plenty of them, but during the month we were in the country I saw only one drunken man and I saw nothing to indicate that the prohibition law had been a failure. Naturally we did not go out of our way to look for that sort of thing. I have been told that we could have got a drink anywhere if we had tried to get it. But there were no saloons flaunting themselves in our faces and challenging our decency on every street corner as I am told was the case a few years ago. There is very little public drinking, which is about all that could be expected at the present time. It will take years to eliminate the desire for intoxicants, especially in some quarters where there is laxity in the enforcement of the law.

Enforce Laws.

The main feature in the United States and in Canada is to eliminate public drinking and to enforce the existing laws to the best of our ability. Among those who favor improved conditions there is a fear that in this province there will be a reversion to conditions against which we all fought several years ago. Today British Columbia and the United States are fairly decent. The laws are all right. What is needed is rigid enforcement rather than changes. Happily in the United States there is no hope of any change owing to the rigid constitution. In Canada, however, we are swayed by our emotions and shift constantly from side to side. The constitution is flexible.

There are an immense number of Canadians in the United States. In Victoria I met a lot of people who were moving south, mostly to Los Angeles. It seems to me as if Los Angeles was in for a break one of these days. The building boom cannot continue indefinitely and with the break of the building boom will come a slump in business generally. This will be a set back in a sure growth, for Los Angeles is destined to be a big city and to remain one of the important centres of the United States.

Inconsistent Attitude.

One of the things I noticed in regard to the United States is this. Canadians look with jealousy on that country and they shout loud for the British flag as against the stars and stripes. Let them be offered a position on the other side of the line, however, and they jump at once at it, never remembering that they are to live under a foreign flag.

No man ever seems to let his loyalty interfere with his livelihood and yet when living on this side he is intensely keen on frowning down anything which tends to better relations between the two countries.

Looking at the matter coldly and without sentimental bias, it seems foolish that there should be a boundary line between Canada and the United States. The C. Rogers is captain of the Cross-sensible thing would be to form

The Alfred Street 16-foot plank roadway matter has been left over for another week by the city council pending receipt of further advice from the provincial government on the question.

ITALY CRUELLY MISREPRESENTED

But Investigator Finds Living and Travel Safe and Money Will Go a Long Way

For some reason or other the world seems to have it in for Italy.

More actual misinformation and malicious gossip is set afloat concerning Italy than any other country in Europe, says John Baurty of The Boston Post, in a news cable from Italy, which has now reached J. Balagno, 816 Princess Avenue, Victoria, father of Charles Balagno and William Balagno, the local musicians.

First they tell you the place is full of Bolsheviks, making the industrial cities unsafe, he says; next, that the train service is paralyzed and incredibly dirty, that the cities are full of hold-up men, and finally that every Italian hotel proprietor feels disgraced if he has allowed you to leave with a solitary lira in your pocket.

All this is frightful buncombe. The Italian cities are as safe as Boston, if not safer. There is little industrial trouble. What there is certainly is well advertised to the world. The train service is admirable. True there are some delays, but delays are quite the rule in Europe. Italian railway fares and dining car rates are far cheaper than in France or England and the accommodation quite as good. Hotel rates are lower than in France and, save for the half dozen exclusive hotels, very cheap.

Nearest to Pre-War Scale
It is possible to get three good meals a day in the smaller Italian restaurants for a dollar. You can't begin to do it in France and certainly not in England.

Italy seems the one place where an American traveller can come somewhere near living on a pre-war scale. This does not mean he can live at the Hotel Excelsior in Rome or the Excelsior in Naples, two of the most expensive hotels in the world, at the rate he could before the war, but that an economical traveller can get a great deal for his money if he looks about to save cash.

More Polite Than Others
It may be that Italians do not like Americans any better than the French or English do, but they are more polite about it. An Englishman or a Frenchman will not hesitate to blandly point out that America is bleeding Europe to death, having all the money in the world and demanding more. Whatever the Italians think they keep quiet about it.

The result is that an American in Italy saves laundry bills by the lack of the necessity to keep constantly defending America and American ideals, and thus ruining his collars.

Nine of every ten Americans like Italians better than the French. At the risk of mortally offending all the friends of France it might be said that most Americans find Italians more polite, more cultivated and more congenial than the French.

Fine Looking Men

People who have nosed about the world claim that the handsomest and best dressed women are in Rome. Whether or not this is so is a matter of opinion, but there are certainly more fine looking men in Italy than anywhere else in Europe. There is an air of distinction about them and a delicacy of feature that the French seem to lack. The cultivated Italian is the last word in graceful courtesy and attractive tactfulness.

Italy is thoroughly awake to the importance of reconstruction. On the French side of the northern frontier a start has been made toward harnessing the mountain streams for electric power, but the moment the train sweeps into Italy the contrast is startling. Italy is doing the job by wholesale. She is worse off for coal than almost any other country and realizes the necessity of using water power to the limit. So while the French are proceeding slowly the Italians are working with feverish energy to build up a great hydro-electric system. The railway from Modane to Bern stretch of railway trackage Turin, a long stretch, is completely electrified—the one modern European.

Wonderful Farm Lands

Agricultural Italy has its nose to the grindstone. It gladdens one's heart to see those wonderful stretches of farm lands between Rome and Naples. So alive

with eager workers and so beautifully kept up. They are going to get all the land will produce in Italy this year.

There are still very many soldiers about the streets of the cities and towns, so that it looks as if Italian demobilization had proceeded slowly. But many of these men have been long out of the army and are wearing their uniforms because clothing is scarce.

Are Not Grumblers

The casual visitor would certainly be willing to take a chance on Italy coming back fast—financially and industrially. The Italians are workers and not grumblers. To be sure, life is hard there, but there are compensations. It would help out Italy a great deal if America would take a little more pains to find out the truth about Italy, instead of accepting the fantastic yarns about turbulent Italy.

America has never done much for Italy in comparison with what we have done for other countries, but Italians have done a good deal for America. No country would be more grateful for our friendly co-operation.

DERBY DAY TOMORROW

Most Popular Day of English Racing Year.

LONDON, May 30. (By Canadian Press).—Today sees the opening of the Derby week on Epsom Downs, and though possibly better racing is seen later on at Ascot, at Goodwood, and during the autumn meetings at Newmarket, no meeting of the flat racing season stands as high in the popular esteem. The four days' program offers a varied and interesting bill of fare, the Woodcock Stakes to-day offering bringing together some of the most promising two-year-olds of the season, and in this the royal colors, purple, gold braid, scarlet sleeves and black velvet cap with gold fringe, may be seen out on the colt by Friar Marcus out of Etoile or the colt by Synford out of Pintade.

Tomorrow, the Derby, blue ribbon of flat racing, is the outstanding feature. This is the third of the five "classics" races for three-year-olds, of which the Two Thousand Guineas has been won by St. Louis and the One Thousand, the fillies' race, by Silver Urn. On Friday the fourth of the "classics," the Oaks, also confined to fillies, is run the fifth and last being the Doncaster St. Leger in September. Unless St. Louis, not a very strong favorite, repeats in the Derby, it rather looks as if the "classics" will be as open an affair as last year, when five different animals won them, there being no outstanding equestrian champion at the age. The feature on Thursday is the Coronation Cup, a stake race at weight-for-age run over the Derby course, which often brings together the best cup horses of the year.

Popular Derby.

Derby Day is easily the most popular day of the racing year, and annually attracts enormous crowds to Epsom. Each year there is a great exodus from the city and the many roads leading to the Downs are jammed with vehicles of all kinds, whose occupants have only one destination and one thought in mind—the Derby, and who will win it. For many it will be the only race that they will see during the season, and is the climax to a one, two or three day outing. To some the Derby spells romance, and to others fortune. In any event, the Derby has a firm grip upon the sporting instinct of the Englishman and there is not to be found throughout the country a sportsman, whether he sits in the House of Lords, or drives a costers' donkey, who does not have something on his fancy. Wednesday's race will be the

139th renewal of the Derby Stakes, raced in 1780, just one year later than the Oaks and four years later than the St. Leger. The twelfth Earl of Derby originated both the Oaks and the Derby, naming the former after his seat or hunting box at Woodmansterne and the latter deriving its name from its originator. The distance for both events is about one and one-half mile. The nominations for the Derby closed on November 2, 1920 with 381 entries, while for the Oaks, 276 fillies were placed in nomination. As might be expected from a race that has been run continuously for nearly a century and a half, many sensational results have characterized the great classic. Fortunes have been won—and lost.

Viscount Lascelles' colt Mulin is among the nominations and a considerable number of turf followers are asking themselves if the viscount's ambition to win the greatest double of all time—the King's daughter for a bride in February and the blue ribbon of the turf in May—will be achieved. At any rate the Epsom classic was one of the topics discussed during the royal wedding festivities and the viscount's classic candidate Mulin was mentioned, the impression being that although the colt's two-year-old form was but moderate he had wintered so well that his prospects of victory at Epsom were not at all remote.

Some Favored Ones.

There is, of course, no more superstitious body of sportsmen than those who follow racing. They are always on the lookout for omens and portents and many will play the "royal double" and plank down their coin on the expectation that the king's son-in-law will lead in the winner. There are also those who do not overlook the fact that the Derby winner last year as a two-year-old won the Woodcock Stakes at Epsom, and they are asking themselves if Sir Earnest Paget's colt Re-Echo the winner of the Woodcock Stakes last year and who is entered in this year's Derby, has been appropriately named and can he duplicate Humors's performance. Re-Echo is a well-bred colt, by Neil Gow out of Corrie Rae and as a two-year-old won two of his four starts, finishing second in the remainder. He did not appear in the Newmarket classic and therefore it is somewhat difficult to appraise his quality as a three-year-old. The unfavorable racing conditions of a year ago, when many promising two-year-olds could not be brought along, owing to the hard condition of the tracks, has resulted in many upsets in form this year.

Lord Queensbury's colt St. Louis, the winner of the Two Thousand, did not win a race as a two-year-old, but his sterling performance in the Newmarket classic has put him at the top of the list for the Derby. St. Louis is a Louvois-Princess Sterling colt and he showed that he had inherited both speed and stamina from his sire, also a winner of the Two Thousand. Sol Joel's Ponderland has also received goodly support and his easy win in the Newmarket Stakes this month, added many backers to the Pommern colt.
