Agreement on Immigration Reached

HEAVY FIGHTING IRELAND; IRREGULARS STEADILY RETREATING

Two Governments Will Co-operate on Immigration

VANCOUVER, July 25.—Hon. Charles Stewart, minister of the interior, announced that the Provincial Government had promised to co-operate with the Federal Government in the new immigration policy which they were about to inaugurate. They have agreed to appoint a man and woman whose special duty it will be to look after the interests of the new settlers and at the same time to keep in touch with the immigration department at Ottawa.

Lack of co-operation had been one of the chief drawbacks to the carrying out of immigration plans in the past the minister said. Settlers who had been induced to come into the country had in many cases drifted away to the United States while others had returned to their former homes carrying a tale of woe. It had also been found that owing to lack of supervision many settlers in rural districts had drifted into the cities. All these drawbacks it was proposed to remedy in the scheme now in hand. The co-operation of the Oliver Government in the work was very important as the lands of the province were nearly all controlled by the Provincial Government. The government representatives would meet the incoming settlers and see that they got a good start.

FISHING ON SKEENA FAIR

Slight Improvement Over Last Week—Salmon Running in Drifts and Averages Vary.

Salmon fishing on the Skeena River started off fair this week showing a slight improvement over last. The fish appear to be running in drifts, some boats getting as high as 80, others 67 and down to 35. The big run predicted generally for this week has not yet made its appearance. The Skeena pack up to Saturday night was: Sockeye, 29,100 cases; spring, 875; chums, 1,880; cohoes, 73; pinks, 3,102. The average per boat last week was between 40 and 45.

TETRAMETER WON AT GOODWOOD TODAY IN STEWARDS' HANDICAP

GOODWOOD, July 25.—Tetrameter won the steward's cup in the handicap race for a thousand sovereigns for three year olds and upward over a six furlong course here today. Night Patrol came second with Morning Light third. Thirty horses ran and the betting was ten to one against Tetrameter, fifty to one against Night Patrol and ten to one against Morning Light. The winner is owned by Sir H. Macdonald.

MISSING HOTEL MANAGER'S BODY FOUND IN BAY

False Creek Gives Up Dead After Two Weeks Search for Body of H. B. Jackson.

VANCOUVER, July 25.—The body of H. B. Jackson, manager of the Hotel Vancouver, was found yesterday in False Creek. He had been missing for the past two weeks and it was generally thought that he had taken his own life by drowning.

Mr. Jackson was well known having been in the employ of the C. P. R. hotels for many years. He was for a long time manager of the Empress Hotel at Victoria and during the period he lived in the capital he made a host of friends. He was always looked upon as a very capable hotel man.

FREE STATE SUCCESSFUL

Insurgents Continue to Retire Before Regular Irish Forces

DUBLIN, July 25.—Intense fighting is in progress in the vicinity of Killmoleck, County Limerick, according to today's despatches.

Additional large areas in the west of Ireland have been occupied by the Free State forces before whom the republican insurgents are retreating precipitately, according to today's official report.

NEW WATER SUPPLY FOR NEW HAZELTON

Railway Company Putting in a Permanent System with Gravity Flow.

The engineering department of the Canadian National Railways is sending an outfit to Hazelton this week to commence work on securing a new water supply for the tanks at that place. The plan in hand is to tap Five Mile Creek where there is always good water and to lay approximately 3500 feet of four inch water main.

The new system which will take a couple of months to complete will give a permanent gravity flow and will also supply some of the settlers in the neighborhood who have found difficulty in securing a proper water supply.

OIL AT FABYAN

Imperial Oil Well Is Causing a Great Deal of Excitement.

EDMONTON, July 25.—The oil well at Fabyan is causing a good deal of excitement here. Already there is a retaining pool containing a plentiful supply of the fluid and analysis of the quality of the oil is being made. It is understood that the quality is very similar to that found in California.

The well was put down by the Imperial Oil Co.

CANADIAN CATTLE TO BE PERMITTED INTO BRITAIN IS DECISION

Motion to That Effect Passes British House of Commons in Face of Opposition.

LONDON, July 25.—The House of Commons yesterday adopted a motion calling for the removal of the embargo on Canadian store cattle entering England.

An amendment, which would have killed the motion and the bill which followed it, was rejected by the Commons on a vote of 247 to 174.

The cabinet and all political parties are sharply divided on the question and the debate was lively.

Ottawa Pleased.

OTTAWA, July 25.—Word that the British House of Commons has approved the removal of the embargo on Canadian store cattle was received in official circles with keen satisfaction as marking the approaching end of a thirty year's battle.

DR. CADE MADE AUTO TRIP UP KITWANCOOL

Mrs. Cade and Family Are Spending Summer Camping at Kitwanga

Mrs. J. P. Cade and family have taken up summer camp at Kitwanga. Dr. Cade was there last week-end and drove an automobile up the Kitwanga valley further than a machine had ever been taken before. Had it not been for a steep sand hill he might have reached the Indian village which has always had the reputation of having "bad Indians." The doctor was delighted with the country he passed through and is enthusiastic over the possibilities for a real tourist road and for real agricultural development.

STRIKE CAUSES MORE TROUBLE

Big Steel and Other Plants Likely to Close Soon if It is Announced

CHICAGO, July 25.—The railroad strike combined with the coal strike is being brought home to the public today through the announcements of leaders in several industries that unless a speedy settlement is reached there will be closing of plants with resultant unemployment. The rationing of fuel and food supplies and the crippling of public utilities services would result.

Steel plants, especially in the east, will be closed on a wholesale scale if the present conditions continue until August, it is declared.

SKIPPER OF FORESTRY BOAT LOSES WIFE

Mrs. Dan Archie Died at Abbotsford Last Evening

A wire was received this morning by E. C. Manning, District Forester, to the effect that Mrs. Archie, wife of Capt. Dan Archie, skipper of the Forestry service headquarters boat, died at Abbotsford at 7 o'clock last night. Mrs. Archie had been ill for some time.

FIND BASE FOR PLANE

First Trip Was Expected to Take Place Today at Hazelton

HAZELTON, July 25.—Work on the pontoons of the airplane "Hazelton" was completed last night and the machine is now moored to the bank of the Skeena River at Mission Point being made ready for a flight today and Bell and his associates expect to leave about noon.

On account of the strong currents, the Skeena River cannot be used as a permanent base as was anticipated but it is expected that some of the lakes north of here will be utilized for the purpose. The first flight of the machine will be for the purpose of locating a suitable base of operations.

BLAKE CRASHES DELAY CAUSED

Globe Flyer is Uninjured but Under Carriage of Airplane is Smashed

LONDON, July 25.—The airplane, in which Major W. T. Blake, the British aviator, is attempting the round the world flight from England, crashed at Sibi, British Beluchistan, on Saturday, says an Exchange dispatch. The aviator suffered no injuries but the under carriage of the machine was smashed. Men are being sent from Karachi, 350 miles distant, to repair the damaged airplane. The flight will be delayed about a week.

CLOSE SEASON RIVERS INLET IS CURTAILED

OTTAWA, July 25.—The Government has curtailed the weekly close season for fishing salmon at Rivers Inlet from midnight on Friday to six p.m. on Sunday for the balance of the 1922 fishing season.

Fishing was suspended during the dispute between cannery and fishermen over prices with the result that a lot of fish escaped to the spawning grounds. The embargo was raised at the request of the community at Rivers Inlet.

Owing to the number of licenses exceeding 1,000 at Rivers Inlet the close season had been increased to 48 hours and the recent order means that it has been again reduced to 36 hours.

ULSTER UNITED BEATS MONTREAL GUARDS IN FOOTBALL SEMI-FINALS

TORONTO, July 25.—Ulster United defeated Montreal Grenadier Guards by a score of one to nothing and will play off with Fort William for the right to meet the winner of the Winnipeg-Calgary game for the Canadian soccer football championship.

Youthful Electric Genius Hears Frisco Concerts on Up-to-date Radio Outfit

Peter Black Jr., with his radio broadcast receiving outfit at the Central Hotel, is listening to concerts, speeches and sermons from the cities to the south as far away as San Francisco, 1,500 miles from Prince Rupert.

After having experimented for years with electricity, ever since he was old enough to know what it meant, this clever 15-year old lad has now an outfit that is the most perfect of its kind anywhere north of Vancouver. Up to the present his work along these lines has been more or less of an experimental nature and he has been using amateur equipment. Now, however, he is branching out further and has ordered new instruments, tuners, amplifying horn, tubes, detectors and various and sundry other mysterious pieces of equipment which only the electrically inclined understand.

Junior Eiffel

Already young Peter's "Eiffel Tower No. 2" fills a prominent and conspicuous place on the Prince Rupert landscape. It is about 120 feet high and has just been completed. This tower is built up from the main roof of the Central Hotel and carries the aerial to the second tower, a shorter one, on the annex. On the ground to the rear of the hotel is the station where the messages are received and the concerts, etc., heard.

Peter started receiving broadcasted concerts from the Post-Intelligencer building in Seattle about a month ago. Last Saturday night, he heard the announcement of a band concert in San Francisco and caught snatches of the concert. Concerts, speeches and sermons are heard regularly from Vancouver and Seattle.

Radio concerts broadcasted by both the Vancouver Province and the Seattle Post-Intelligencer were heard on Sunday evening. Static interfered somewhat with the former but musical selections and parts of a long speech were recorded. The P.I. concert was much more distinct and there was no difficulty in recognizing two numbers, "The Sunshine of Your Smile," and "The Star Spangled Banner."

Strange to say, the San Francisco concert on Saturday seemed to be the most plainly recorded yet. The static or natural electrical waves cause considerable interruption and when these are strong it is only possible to get snatches of the broadcasting plainly. These waves are, however, due entirely to the condition of the air and cannot be governed. When the atmosphere conditions are favorable and the static is low, the broadcasts are recorded here very plainly.

Hear At Any Time

The receiving of wireless messages is an every day occurrence at the Black station. Messages sent by powerful stations in Germany and Honolulu have been taken and the ordinary coast messages may be taken at almost any time of the day or night.

There are other radio outfits in the city operated by Gordon Kerr, Gordon Bulger, Sydney Anderson, Jack Barnsley and W. W. Wrathall, but none seem to have given such good results as the one operated by Peter Black. Of course, they are not so well equipped. Peter's outfit has so far cost him some \$600 or \$700 besides the new equipment that is being ordered.

Also An Aeroplane

This young mechanical genius has not confined his endeavors to the electrical, either. In the basement of the hotel there is an airplane which was built by him and which with little more fitting out,

FOUND OUTCROP OF GOOD COAL NEAR HAZELTON

W. S. Sargent Staked Area Six or Seven Miles West of Town

W. S. Sargent, of New Hazelton, staked a good-sized area of coal land across the river from Hazelton and about six or seven miles due west the first of this week, says the Omineca Herald. The coal was discovered by an Indian, who took Mr. Sargent out. Bill brought in a sample of the coal which he took from the surface, and it looks like the real article. It is perfectly clean and of high quality. After the first staking was done, Angus Beaton was taken into the confidence of the original locator, and went out to look the ground over and to stake more land.

Beaton returned Thursday morning. He located the coal measures and traced the coal for over two miles. He stated that before he would express any opinion he would want to spend about two weeks with pick and shovel. He also felt that a hundred foot tunnel would be more satisfactory than surface work in locating and opening the main measure.

WILL CONSIDER INDIAN CLAIMS

Hon. Charles Stewart, Minister of Interior, Receives Representations from Allied Council.

VANCOUVER, July 25.—Hon. Charles Stewart, minister of the interior, conferred with the committee representing the Indian Allied Council of British Columbia and heard their grievances. He promised consideration by special representatives from the Indian department in the autumn after publication of the special report of the Indian investigation commission. He says he is prepared to submit legislation before Parliament at the next session at Ottawa based on the Indians' claims.

Must Give Time

To Railway Matters.

The Vancouver World, in discussing the resignations of the National Railway directors, says:

"Without reflecting upon the valuable service rendered by President D. B. Hanna and several of his co-directors on the Canadian National System, there will be a general interest taken in the resignations of the directorate. The circumstance of the simultaneous resignations will be interpreted to mean that, if not asked for, they were at least inspired.

"Vancouver World readers have the enlightenment thrown on the situation by Hon. Charles Stewart, in his address at the Liberal picnic at Hastings Park on Wednesday. Hon. Mr. Stewart stated that the government proposed to appoint a new board, 'representative of the ablest business talent in Canada and one that would give the whole of its time to the work of management.'

"The retiring board was composed of men representative of the ablest business talent in Canada, but with very few exceptions they were not in a position to give any but a small proportion of their time to the work of management. Take E. R. Wood, for instance. His eminence in the business world is of the very highest. Commencing life as a telegraph operator he is now one of the financial wizards of the north. He is president of the Central Canada Loan and Savings Co., and of the Dominion Securities Corporation, Ltd.; vice-president of the National Trust Co., of the Canada Life Assurance Company, and of the Brazilian Traction, Light and Power Co.; he is a director of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, of the Western Assurance Company, of the British America Assurance Company, of the Dominion Steel Corporation, of the Massey-Harris Co., of the Toronto Power Company, of the Toronto Railway Company, of the Shawinigan Water and Power Company, of the Mexican Power and Light Company, and of the Mexican Tramways Company. He also takes an interest in a great number of charitable and philanthropic societies. It is quite obvious that there is a limit to the amount of time that Mr. Wood could give into his directorship of the Canadian National Railways, which, as a matter of fact, is not enumerated in the current edition of 'Who's Who,' from which the foregoing list is copied.

"In pursuit of his intention to give public ownership of railways in Canada the most thorough opportunity to prove itself a success, Hon. Mackenzie King will have the good wishes of all Canada."

Should Support
Mission Boats.

The Daily News takes particular pleasure asking favorable consideration from everyone for the mission boats that ply along these shores. They make calls at the outlying points and carry magazines and take with them a breeze of cheerfulness for the people who seldom meet a visitor.

It matters not what our religious beliefs, anyone who is able to cheer the life of the lonely settler or lighthouse keeper by occasional visits is worthy of support. One of these mission boats has just been launched and may leave today for the Queen Charlotte Islands. We wish Rev. James Gillett and his new boat every success. It is a great work and should be well supported.

Using Airplanes
For Exploration.

One of the most important features of airplane development in this part of the country is discovery. Len Bell's new plane at Hazelton will to some extent be used for that purpose. Here we could use a plane most profitably in locating the highway up the Skeena valley. A preliminary reconnaissance from the air would save an immense lot of work in deciding if a pass through the mountains should be used or if the road should follow the Skeena River.

One suggestion in regard to the Skeena River is that it should go inland by the Gloyah Lakes and come out beyond Haysport and then possibly follow the river the rest of the way to Terrace. It is time we were considering the matter of route. If anyone knows anything about that country and has a better route to suggest we should like to give it publicity.

in Prince Rupert

EXTEND WATER MAIN
TO COLD STORAGE

Board of Works Report Sent Back When Distance Is Found Incorrect.

A recommendation from the Board of Works that the city's 6 inch water main be extended a distance of 35 to 50 feet from the Prince Rupert sawmill to the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co.'s property at Seal Cove was sent back by the council last night when it developed that the distance of the extension would be 250 feet instead of 35 or 50. It will probably come up again next week. The city has enough 6 inch pipe on hand to do the job. The fish company, which is a large consumer of water, is now served with a 3 inch pipe.

AVIATOR TELLS
HIS OWN STORY

Killed Caribou to Provide Himself with Food When Machine Broke.

DAWSON, July 25.—Like a chapter of fiction reads the story of the experience of Aviator Clarence O. Prest, who without a companion, attempted the flight across the sub-Arctic empire of the Yukon and Alaska.

Prest flew with his moving picture camera above a great herd of hundreds of caribou and was forced to land in their midst where he slaughtered one to keep from starving. The herd is part of the vast multitude of caribou which annually treks across the region near Dawson and Eagle.

Prest's own story of his remarkable exploit was told in the following special from U. S. Customs Collector Jack Hillard of Eagle to the Dawson Daily News:

"Thirty minutes out of Eagle my engine bucked. I searched for a landing place and picked what looked like a level spot. This, it developed, was Nigger Head flat at the head of Deer Creek, eight miles south of Seventy-Mile River. I fixed the engine, noticed a couple of caribou and set up my moving camera to get them and the ship. I noticed that more of them were coming so I walked down a pier to see about taking off.

Caribou Plentiful

"Turning around I saw five or six hundred caribou all around the ship and the camera, and rushed back expecting to find the camera ruined, but it was not damaged. I got ready to take off, but the ship went up on her nose in the soft going and broke her propeller.

"I had been debating killing one of the caribou, but the debate ended when the propeller broke, so I killed one with a .32 pistol and butchered him with a pocketknife.

"I was overhauling the motor when a puff of wind finished the job by turning the ship on her back breaking the radiator. I deserted the ship, stripped off the instruments and magneto, and started to get it down to the river. I got down with one load and saw I wasn't going to make it on the grub I had, so I cached everything, went back to the ship and slept in the tail Sunday night. I had left the compass in a cache at the mouth of Barney Creek, so I started for town without it.

"I was further out than I thought. On that account I did not pick up the trail as expected and made a lot of unnecessary circles, climbing mountains for observations. It rained steadily but I had equipped myself with a small can of gasoline for starting fires.

Afraid to Sleep.

"My shoes and feet were giving out and I was afraid to lie down to sleep. Finally on Wednesday I struck the trail at Nimrod Bar and shortly after the search party hove in sight. On Tuesday I was pretty sick of caribou cooked on the end of a stick. I had one steak left when the party arrived and promptly threw it out. I was tickled when we ran into a cabin late Thursday night, with my cigarettes all gone. I made one cigar last three days by lighting it occasionally. I thought I was about ten miles out when the search party met me, but was over twenty. On account of lack of sleep I was seeing cabins and people that did not exist."

Prest followed the right bank of the Seventy-Mile and the trail is on the left bank. He was within a hundred yards of it when he cached his stuff at Barney Creek but did not know it. Not knowing the country and having no compass, he tried to follow the air line back to town and through hard work succeeded. A pigeon sent out with the search party brought back first word of his safety.

CITY'S COMPRESSOR
GOING SMITH ISLAND

Argument Develops in Council Over Renting of Equipment to Capt. Babington.

The city's compressor plant, which is now in use at the corner of Second Avenue and Fifth Street, is to be used at Smith Island by Capt. H. B. Babington in connection with his crushed rock contract. The council last night, on motion of Ald. Dybbavn seconded by Ald. Perry, decided to rent the plant for a period of two months at a rental of \$5 per day subject to an agreement being entered into for its proper care and return.

There was considerable opposition to the renting of the plant especially from Ald. Kerr and Ald. Montgomery, of the Board of Works. Both felt that the contractor had already been given every consideration due him by the city but had not in turn given satisfaction. The crusher might be needed on the street grading work in Section 5. They were not in favor of renting the crusher.

Other members of the council felt that, by renting the crusher, the Smith Island contract might progress faster and more satisfactorily. Ald. Dybbavn felt it was important that the down town street work should be finished this year. On the other hand, the Section 5 work could wait if necessary.

Ald. McLeod, Ald. Perry, Ald. Collart, Ald. Dybbavn and Ald. Silversides voted in favor of renting the compressor and Ald. Kerr, Ald. Montgomery and Ald. Kelly against.

The work at the corner of Fifth Street and Second Avenue, where the compressor has been used, will soon be finished.

CITY COUNCIL WILL
PUT IN WATER, ETC.,
IN MCCLYMONT PARK

The city is to go ahead with its share of the improvements recently suggested for McClymont Park by the ladies' committee. This includes the putting in of a drinking fountain, lavatory and swings at a cost of \$75.

Decision to this effect was made, on motion of Ald. Dybbavn, seconded by Ald. Perry, last night following a letter being received from Mrs. O. B. Hall setting forth the great need for drinking water in the park. The letter also stated that the Rotary Club was in favor of the putting in of a concrete wading pool providing some well defined policy was adopted for the park by the council. The appointment of a park commission was suggested.

BRINGING UP FATHER



SEWER SCHEME SECTION SIX

Estimates on Temporary and Permanent Systems Were Dealt with by Council Last Night.

The city council has under consideration plans and estimates for sewer services in Section 6. Two plans were put forward by the city engineer at the meeting last night. The first provides for a permanent vitrified pipe system which will cost \$11,500, the second, a temporary wooden pipe system costing \$11,500. There are 11,033 assessable feet of property and the scheme affects Fifth, Sixth, Seventh and Eighth Avenues east of Cotton Street. Carried out under the local improvement plan, the cost of the permanent scheme on a 25 year basis will be \$2,294.2 per front foot, 30 year, \$2,732. The temporary scheme will cost \$2,365 per front foot on five year basis, \$2,155, ten year. The matter was discussed in committee by the council last night and was laid over for a week.

Ald. Perry felt that service was badly needed in the district suggested. If possible, the permanent scheme would be more desirable than temporary.

The city engineer explained that the outlet temporarily could be into a septic tank in the Hays Creek basin. If the permanent scheme was adopted, the septic tank could later be eliminated and connection made to the main trunk sewers. When the costs were compared, it seemed better to put in a permanent system. He would like to have the decision of the council, whether they decided to go on with temporary sewers or adopt a permanent basis.

Ald. McLeod, Ald. Collart and Ald. Montgomery felt that the district now proposed to serve was less important than the west part of Section 6 and Section 5. In the latter vicinity there were many residences which had no sewers and the need was pressing.

Ald. Dybhavn suggested that the property might not be able to stand the cost, especially unimproved property. A temporary system would serve for years and might fill the need.

The committee arose without having adopted the scheme although the feeling was unanimous that sewers were needed both in Section 6 and Section 5.

LOST FISH PACK OWING TO STRIKE

Word received from Sitka states that the Sitka Cannery and Sitka Bay Cannery each lost their sockeye pack on account of a disagreement with the fishermen regarding prices, says the Ketchikan News. By the time they finally came to an agreement the sockeye run was over.

The creeks in the vicinity are now alive with sockeyes, but the watchmen at the different creeks, placed there by the fish commission, are keeping a sharp lookout to see that there is no illegal fishing. This means the fish are getting up the different rivers to their spawning grounds.

Through this protection it means that four years from now good results can be anticipated in this vicinity.

Reports from Icy Straits state the salmon pack in that vicinity is about one-third of normal, and still slack. It should be right at its height now. The outlook seems doubtful for a good pack this season.

In the Letter Box

TECHNICAL SCHOOL WORK.

Editor, Daily News:—
The school board is about to call a public meeting to enable the citizens to express their sentiments regarding the establishment of Technical and Continuation School work here.

There is a possibility of some confusion in the minds of the public as to what they are to be called upon to support, and as this type of education is of such vital moment to our future prosperity, may I trespass upon your valuable space with some explanations.

Technical Education is the study of the great mass of mechanical processes that comprise our modern civilization. To compare the two classes of education, we might illustrate: Law, Accountancy, Holy Orders, Stenography are all Academic professions, whereas Civil, Steam, Electrical and Gas Engineering, Carpentry, Shipbuilding, Dressmaking, etc., are Technical professions. Academic education such as is at present presented to the children of our schools, is for the purpose of inculcating the ethics of civilization and culture with only minor reference to the student's future business career.

Mind and Hand.
Technical education, on the other hand, trains both the mind and the hand simultaneously, and requires the application, in practice, of the theories memorized.

Vocational education specializes along certain lines. The various business colleges give vocational education in commercial subjects, but a Technical Vocational School would endeavor to offer both the Academic and Practical Education covering as far as possible all trades and professions.

Industrial Education, Trade Schools, etc., are synonymous with Vocational education.

Continuation Education covers in intensive courses, all the Academic, Technical and Cultural subjects, and is particularly for adults over fifteen years of age. It is arranged for men and women in business or homes who have a little time, either at night or during the day, to devote to the improving of their business or housewifery, or to study in connection with some hobby. To instance—for a Doctor, a knowledge of how to make a slight repair to his automobile may mean a matter of life or death, whereas the acquiring of similar ability by say, a tailor, to adjust the engine of a gas boat, is simply a matter of culture. And yet to both it is as useful as electrical repairing is to a housewife.

To summarize then, Academic Education is a study of the Liberal Arts and Sciences.

Technical Education is the study of the Technical Arts and Sciences.

Vocational Education specializes in business training of all kinds, both Academic and Technical, and is for adults over fifteen.

Continuation education covers the three foregoing fields with intensified study for adults.

And the public is to be asked tomorrow, whether a beginning is to be made in Prince Rupert to align itself with all the other cities throughout the continent who have Technical, Vocational and Continuation classes as a recognized part of their educational program.

PUBLIC WORKS CARRYING OUT ROAD POLICY

Appropriations for Various Sections of District Being Spent Under District Engineer.

GENERAL TRUNK SYSTEM.

So far as possible the policy of the public works department is to connect up and improve roads that will become a part of the main highway from Prince Rupert to Prince George, according to A. L. Carruthers, resident engineer of the public works department who discussed the improvements to be made this year in this district with a Daily News representative. At the same time the main trunk roads branching off to the settlements on either side have to be given attention.

This year there is \$26,000 to be spent joining up Cedarvale and Woodcock, a district that from an agricultural point of view has a great future. This will put the road in good shape and the section will be a part of the trunk highway east and west. It is work that is badly needed and will tend to make the land available for settlement. From Terrace north and south road work is to be done, in accordance with repeated requests from the residents. The sum of \$10,000 will be spent in making the road more passable from Terrace to Lakelse Lake and \$15,000 in extensions to and improvements of the road to Kitsumkalum Lake. This year the road will be built past Lean-to Hill, the main obstacle in getting to the lake. This road will encourage the mining which is already under way in the district and will tend to open the district to settlement.

Omineca Constituency.
In Omineca the same policy is being pursued. The road will be improved from Endako westward by the spending of \$5,000, and the road from Houston to North Bulkley will be completed at a cost of \$5,600. The main road from Telkwa to Houston will be very considerably improved and straightened, the sum of \$18,000 being appropriated for this particular section. There will be regrading and general improvement.

The main thoroughfare to Francois Lake from Burns Lake is to have \$9000 spent on it; the completion of the road to Colley-mout from North Francois is estimated to cost \$20,000; North and South Francois will absorb \$10,000 for road betterment while the Osoa Lake district will get \$15,000.

In Atlin the largest sum will be spent on the Bear River road extensions, the sum of \$6,500 being expended in that section. Naturally this is the busy season of the year in the public works department and the work of road building is going merrily on.

REPUBLIC'S SKIPPER OBJECTS TO DUTY OF TWO CENTS ON HALIBUT

Says It Will be Imposing a Burden on American Fishermen—Producer Should be Considered.

Says the Ketchikan News of recent date: Captain A. Angelsen, of the halibut schooner Republic, arrived in port yesterday from Prince Rupert, where he disposed of his catch of 81,000 pounds at 10 1/2 and 1 cents. The Republic is fitted up with a Diesel engine and is one of the most up-to-date fish boats calling into Ketchikan. This is the second trip of the Republic this month. Two weeks ago the captain and his crew disposed of a 70,000 catch.

Captain Angelsen said while in the city that if the bill passed in Washington imposing a duty on fish sold in Canada, or if the proposed ferry from Ketchikan to Prince Rupert was established, it would certainly work a hardship on the fishermen. If they were forced to sell their fish here it would mean going back to the old system, and the fisherman would have to take just whatever the buyer offered him.

The Old System.

"Under the old system," said the captain, "the fishermen were always in debt. But when allowed to sell their catch in Prince Rupert, without having to pay duty, the halibut fishermen were soon able to pay off bills owing in Ketchikan of six years' standing."

Captain Angelsen went on to say—"What would happen to the halibut fishermen if they came into Ketchikan and the ferry was loaded to the limit? Or if a storm should happen to be blowing making it impossible for the ferry to cross Dixon's entrance. A halibut schooner can go through and even fish in weather when a ferry, with cars on wheels couldn't live in the sea. Take for instance the ferry between Port Townsend and Bellingham, the Milwaukee Ferry, operating in inland water the halibut fishermen will keep on fishing while this ferry is driven to shelter. Now figure out just what would happen to a ferry trying to cross Dixon's entrance in a storm."

Burden on Producer.

"If this two cent duty is taxed on the fishermen, wanting to sell their fish where they can get the best price, it will certainly be imposing a burden upon them," said Captain Angelsen. "The producer should be the man to be considered," said the captain, "not the stock gambler or the real estate shark."

John Wesley Responsible Present Misunderstandings Says Premier Lloyd George

LONDON, July 25.—Premier Lloyd George, in a speech at a luncheon held recently at the Hotel Victoria here to inaugurate a scheme for the restoration of the John Wesley chapel and grave in City Road, E.C., touched on the subject of Europe's distrust of Great Britain, and humorously said John Wesley was responsible for international misunderstandings. "There are such things as international misunderstandings," the premier said, in a jocular manner, and amid laughter he followed this up by disclaiming responsibility therefor on the part of either himself or M. Poincaré, premier of France, and blaming it on the founder of Methodism.

"Shall I tell you why," continued Lloyd George, "You cannot get them to understand on the Continent the motives that sent hundreds of thousands and millions of young men to face death and mutilation in the Great War. They are always seeking for material reasons. They say, 'Ah, the commercial supremacy of England was challenged, her maritime strength was defied; she was in fear of her coast.' None of these things. I attended many recruiting meetings, and there are many here who did the same thing, at the beginning of the war, and I know the appeal that was made to young men. At no recruiting meeting did I ever hear a sordid appeal made to any young man. The appeal was the most chivalrous appeal that has ever been made for young men to go into battle since the days when the knights and peasants of the middle ages went on a crusade to rescue the holy sepulchre—to fight for the weak, to protect them against the ruthless strong, a righteous indignation against barbarity. You cannot get anyone on the continent of Europe to realize that that was the appeal that moved Britain, and not a commercial one, not a material one, and I say the difference is—John Wesley."

Influence of Wesley
Elaborating the subject of the far-reaching influence of John Wesley, Lloyd George referred to him as "undoubtedly the greatest religious leader the Anglo-Saxon race ever produced, and said, 'The movement of which he was the leader was probably the greatest religious movement of the past two hundred and fifty years at least.' Continuing, he said: "It was a movement that gripped the soul of England. The result is that when a great appeal is made, either to England or to America, there is always a response, and it is due to the great religious revival of the eighteenth century. The same thing applies to peace. When you preach the gospel of peace and say, 'Let us have peace,' they say, 'What is England after? Trade? What is it? She is after something.'"

"The idea that she is preaching peace because it is the supreme message of her faith never enters their heads. That is why I say it is very often difficult to interpret the appeal which you can make to Britain and America to those who have not had the same training as the people who have been subject to the great influences of that religious revival. Wesley was a man of peace—not at any price, though. He offered once to raise a company of volunteers to defend this country against invasion. He asked for guns from the Tower. Just like an ordinary recruiting sergeant."

VICTORIA, July 25.—The Government piers at Ouden Point are to be completely equipped and the docks utilized to the fullest extent possible, it was announced by Capt. G. H. Nicholson, manager of the floating equipment of the Canadian National Railways, on his arrival in the city from Vancouver.

The fitting of the piers with all modern cargo handling gear is now under way, and it is expected that by August 1 the docks will be in shape to handle all the shipping that wishes to berth there. Mr. Jas. McArthur, who was recently appointed superintendent of the piers, will be in charge.

A general waiting room is being built for use of passengers and other offices are being provided. Men are now at work on these structures.

The decision to add to the facilities of the Ouden Point piers and make them fully equipped to cope with the demands of shipping follows upon the gradual utilization of the docks during the past year. The outbound liners of the Admiral Line use these docks consistently, with sailings every two weeks. In addition the Blue Funnel Line freighters are docking up cargo for the Orient, while the ships of the C.G.M.M. are occasional callers. 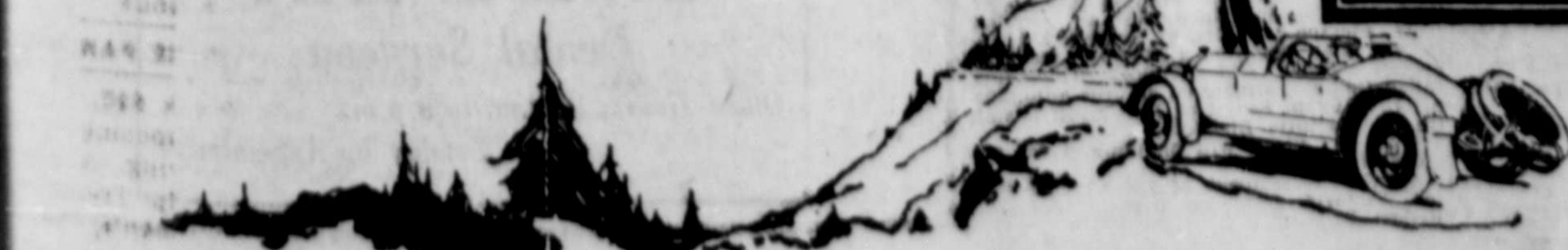

FEES FOR LICENSE OPERATE RADIO IN DOMINION OF CANADA

OTTAWA, July 25.—The advent of broadcasting radio-telephone stations has necessitated a revision in the annual fees payable for licenses issued by the naval department for the installation and operation of radiotelegraph stations in the Dominion of Canada. In addition to the revision in the license fees, the fees to be paid in respect to examinations for certificates of proficiency in radiotelegraphy and radiotelephony, are also revised.

The revised annual license fees are as follows: limited coast station, \$50; public commercial station, \$50; private commercial broadcasting station, \$50; private commercial station, \$5; amateur broadcasting station, \$5; amateur experimental station, \$1; private receiving station, \$1; technical or training school station, \$5; ship station, \$1.

Revised fees for examinations are as follows: extra first class certificate, \$5; first class, \$2.50; second class, \$1; third class, \$1; experimental, \$2.50; amateur, \$50; emergency (any class), \$5; radiotelephony certificate, \$2.50.

FOUR CENT STAMP IS LATEST THING

Is For Use on Letters Addressed to British Isles.

OTTAWA, July 25.—The Postal Department has greatly reduced the number of square inches of murellage to be moistened per person per annum by introducing a four-cent stamp.

This stamp, of a deep mustard chrome color, is intended for use on mail addressed to the British Isles. Letter writers with linguistic accomplishments and French friends will, however, find frequent correspondence costly.

For letters to "La belle France" must bear a 10-cent stamp for the first ounce, and a 5-cent stamp for each additional ounce.

The changes in postage stamps made in accordance with the color scheme of the Postal Union and to be complied with by all countries in the union, also include the meek and verdant one-cent stamp, which now sports a coat of brilliant orange.

The color scheme is a plentiful source of argument, and would almost foil an expert. The green, blue, brown and mauve are easy to put in their place, but when it comes to deciding the exact shade of the one-cent stamp or of the four-cent stamp one finds considerable difficulty in holding the same opinion for more than a minute at a time.

PEACE OF THE WORLD DEPENDS ON ADOPTION LEAGUE OF NATIONS

Resolution Carried by Ten Meetings in Hyde Park Simultaneously

LONDON, July 25.—"This meeting affirms its belief that the future peace and safety of the world depends upon the adoption by all nations of the principles of the League of Nations. It recognizes that the admission of all European nations, and especially Germany, to the League is a matter of urgency."

This resolution was put and carried simultaneously from ten different platforms in Hyde Park. The occasion was the anniversary of the League of Nations Day. Thousands proved their devotion to the league by cheering the resolution despite the rain which fell in torrents.

The Archbishop of York said he knew the league had prevented war between Sweden and Finland and that it had settled a most difficult question in Upper Silesia. Also it had quenched the sparks flying about Albania, the powder magazine of Europe.

Lord Rober Cecil said the league had brought back and restored to their homes something approaching half a million prisoners of war; it had helped prevent disease and death spreading from the famine stricken areas of Europe, and had done much to raise labor conditions throughout the world.

The Earl of Cavan, Chief of the Imperial General Staff, sent this message: "My business is war and preparation for war, but that does not and never will prevent me from doing all I can to prevent war. The League of Nations has, I believe, the backing of all thoughtful people."

RANCHERS ARE FINED FOR ILLEGAL GRAZING

Charles Kostering and William Grinden, of Big Bar, failed to Take Out Permits.

CLINTON, July 25.—Before Magistrate George Milburn, Charles Kostering and William Grinden, Big Bar ranchers, pleaded guilty to the charge of allowing cattle to graze on crown ranges without first having secured grazing permits. In consideration of arrangements being made to pay all grazing fees due, the court imposed nominal fines although the penalties might have been heavy.

The prosecutions were undertaken in order to protect legalized range users in the quiet possession of the ranges and to prevent trespassers from taking to themselves the benefits of range protection and the improvements carried out for the benefit of those permitted.

These were about the first cases of their kind in the province.

UNABLE TO COLLECT RAILWAY FARES AS CROWDS TOO GREAT

GALATZ, Rumania, July 25.—Some railroad trains in Rumania are so jammed with the roving populace that the conductors are powerless to collect fares. Hence the impression is conveyed that one may travel for nothing, which serves only to bring larger numbers to the already overcrowded coaches.

Like most other war-affected countries, Rumania has not enough passenger coaches to take care of the throngs of people who want to travel. The Germans and Austrians confiscated most of the rolling stock. Passengers today are forced to ride on the roofs, bumpers, running boards and even on the under-trucks of the coaches. Fist fights and altercations, to say nothing of accidents, fatal and otherwise, are of frequent occurrence.
