REPUBLICANS EXECUTED IN IRELAND TODAY

EXCEPTIONAL REQUEST IN CONNECTION WITH McBRIDE SHOOTING TRAGEDY

Seven Men Pay Death Penalties in Dublin at Hands Free State

DUBLIN, Dec. 19.—Four railway men and three laborers were executed here this morning for attacking trains in County Kildare. The seven men were captured on November 14 by Free State troops and with them was found a quantity of stolen goods as well as rifles and ammunition. They are reported to have been members of the Republican army.

The situation in the Free State has been more quiet during the past few days and the Republicans have been perpetrating fewer untoward acts. It is generally believed that, with the final enactment of the Free State bill, the formal setting up of the Free State government and the withdrawal of British troops from South Ireland, that the Republicans are becoming more conciliatory. The capture or surrender of De Valera, leader of the Republicans, is looked for at any time.

There was heavy firing for two hours last night in the northern suburbs of Cork. The Republicans were using machine guns. One civilian was severely wounded.

WILL CONTINUE HIS FIGHT FOR BETTER RATES
Premier Oliver Going to Ottawa About January 15 on Freight Tariff Appeal

VICTORIA, Dec. 19.—With the legislative session now over, Premier Oliver stated yesterday that the freight rates appeal cases before the Privy Council at Ottawa would engage his attention. The Premier will go to Ottawa himself about the middle of January, and will continue the fight inaugurated there by him early in the year. Alberta and possibly Saskatchewan may join British Columbia this time in the fight for lower rates.

MAROONS BEAT REGINA TEAM
First of Inter-League Hockey Games Resulted 10 to 3 in Favor of Vancouver

VANCOUVER, Dec. 19.—The Regina Capitals were snowed under by the Vancouver Maroons by a score of 10 to 3 in the first of an inter-league series which the Western Canada hockey champions are staging on the coast. The Regina team will play at Seattle on Wednesday night and at Victoria on Friday.

BAD FIRE SASKATOON
Two Store Buildings Destroyed—Sixteen Homeless and Damage \$185,000

SASKATOON, Dec. 19.—Sixteen persons are homeless and \$185,000 damage was done as a result of a fire which destroyed two business buildings and the stores and stocks contained therein. No persons were injured. The fire lasted ten hours.

CITY OFFERED RIGHT OF HAYS COVE LEVEL CROSSING ONE YEAR

PEACE PACT IS COMPLETE
Announcement to This Effect is Made at Lausanne To-day

LAUSANNE, Dec. 19.—It was reported this afternoon that a complete draft of the peace treaty had been drawn up as the result of the deliberations of the Near East conference. The treaty will be presented to the Turks on Saturday.

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IRISH PARLIAMENT PASSED FIRST BILL
DUBLIN, Dec. 19.—Technical legislation known as "The Adoption of Enactments Bill," which passed the Dail Eireann last week, was adopted by the Senate last night with great solemnity because it was the first bill passed by an Irish Parliament in 123 years.

TWO KILLED IN C. P. R. WRECK
Engineer W. Melville and Fireman J. A. Field Killed When Toronto Express Hits Broken Rail

REVELSTOCK, Dec. 19.—Two C.P.R. engine men lost their lives in an accident between Golden and Field yesterday morning when the eastbound Toronto Express derailed. J. A. Field, fireman, was killed instantly and W. Melville, engineer, died three hours later from injuries. No passengers were injured.

SECOND STEWARD OF PRINCE GEORGE DEAD

John Peterson, Swede, Appears in Police Court on Attempted Suicide Charge

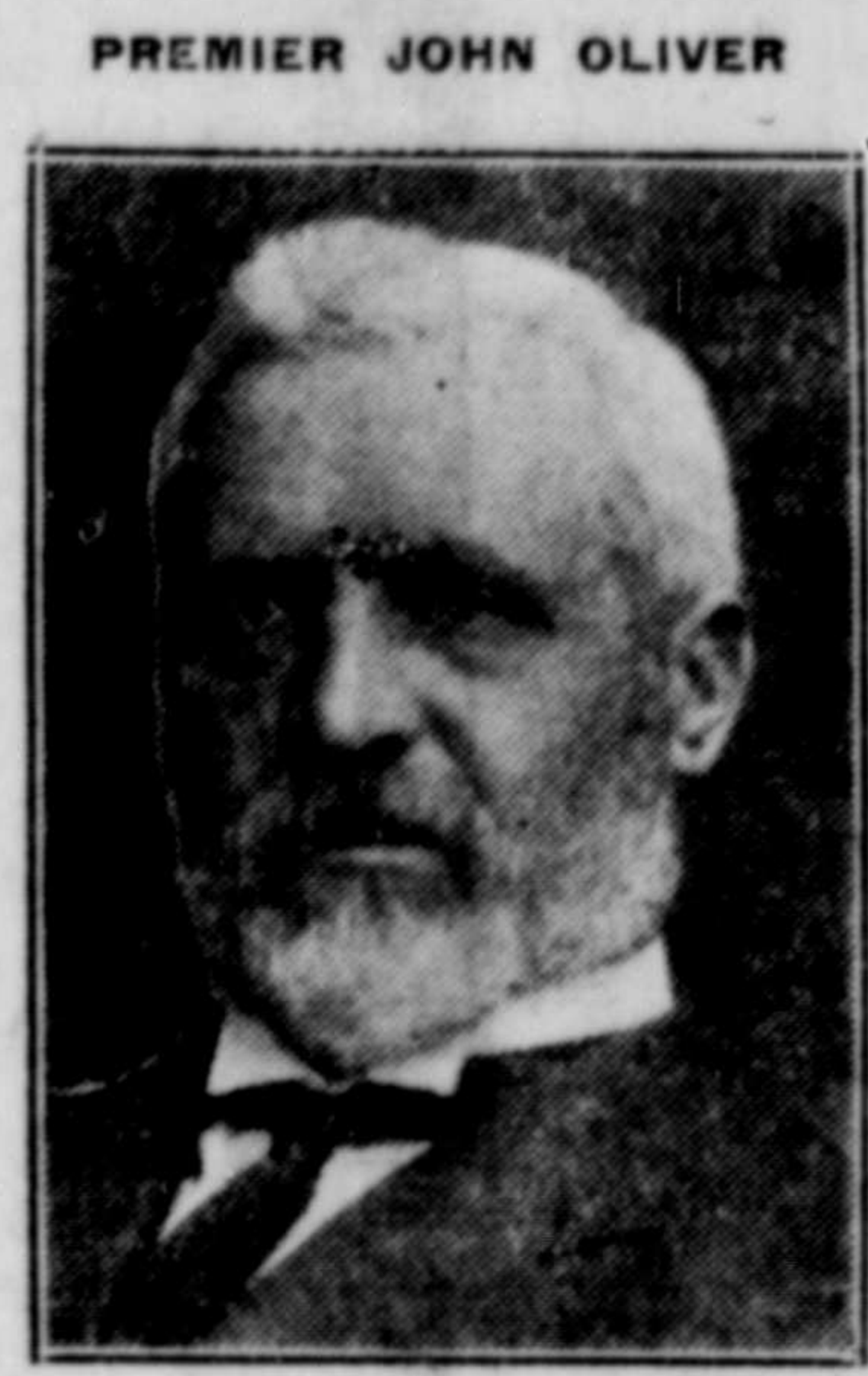

There will be no remuneration for these officers for the regular time spent in conducting the election but meals will be provided and overtime on a straight time basis will be paid.

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NO MONEY FOR GERMANY FROM UNITED STATES

KAMLOOPS, Dec. 19.—Francis Anstey, sr., a resident of the district for forty years, died today in his ninety-third year. He was a son of Rev. Chas. Anstey who for forty-five years was master of the famous Rugby Public School.

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Release of Mrs. Frye, Charged with Murder of Husband, Asked for by Women of Prince George

PRINCE GEORGE, Dec. 19.—A petition signed by 222 women of Prince George and vicinity asking for the release of Mrs. F. Frye from Okalla prison, where she is now being held on a charge of murder till the spring assizes, has been forwarded to the attorney-general at Victoria.

Few cases in B.C. have attracted such attention as this case which was enacted at the Frye homestead when the wife and mother, who says she was driven to desperation by the threats of the drink-crazed husband, sent a bullet through his heart.

According to the women of Prince George there are no two opinions about the killing. Isolated as Mrs. Frye was, there was no one to help her. Her husband had loaded the shotgun for the express purpose of killing off the entire family. It was his life or the lives of the children with her own as well, and Mrs. Frye steeled herself to end it all and did so. She was without friends or money and in due legal process was committed to stand her trial on the charge of murder. She cannot be cleared of this charge until a court of competent jurisdiction sits and this will not be till next summer. Had she friends she might have arranged bail, it is said, but as it is, she is forced to stay in Okalla for six months.

When the facts became known the women of Prince George and vicinity interested themselves and decided, by means of a women's petition to the attorney general, to request the liberation of Mrs. Frye upon her own recognizance pending the sitting of the assize court. All told, 222 women signed the petition without urging and they are now waiting word from Victoria.

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MISSING CREW RESCUED FROM BARREN ISLAND

Four Persons of Tug Reliance in Great Lakes Yet to be Accounted for—Feared Dead

SAULT STE. MARIE, Dec. 19.—Twenty-three of the twenty-seven missing persons from the wreck of the tug Reliance have been found by the rescue steamer Gray after having been for five days without food or fuel on a barren island in zero weather. The four others are presumed to be dead.

A wireless message from the Gray gives only the fact that the derelict has been found and that it will be brought back on Tuesday or Wednesday.

WILL FIT OUT LIBRARY HOME

John McKechnie Given Contract This Morning For Repairs and Alterations to Building

The contract for repairs and alterations to the old public works office at the corner of Third Avenue and Fourth Street which is to be the permanent home of the municipal library was let this morning by the library board to John McKechnie whose tender was \$147.30.

Other figures on the job were as follows: C. K. Yrberg and E. Stookern, \$245.50; Mitchell & Currie, \$225; T. Ross Mackay, \$196.50; J. L. Blain, \$185.

The work includes putting in of shelves, tearing out of partitions, building of two chimneys and general alterations. It will commence as soon as the public works department vacates the quarters which, it is expected, will be early in the New Year.

BELLA COOLA FISH OVERSEER KILLED

Advice of Death by Accident of John Widsten Received Here

Advice has just been received at the fisheries inspector's office of the death of Overseer John Widsten of Bella Coola, who was accidentally killed by a falling tree on December 4. Only meager details of the accident have so far been received.

Mr. Widsten had been in the fisheries service for a number of years, and was a highly valued and respected member of the service.

He leaves to mourn his loss a widow and eleven children.

Productive Soil
This District.

While the potatoes sent to the provincial potato fair from Osland, Smith Island, did not take a prize this year, they stood well in the grading and beat several other points where the soil is supposed to be more suitable and the climate less moist. The fact that three growers from Osland had sufficient interest in their work to send in exhibits speaks well for the settlement there. Possibly next year if they try again they may secure one of the prizes. The Daily News takes pleasure in extending congratulations to the residents of the Island and urges that still greater efforts be made to develop it as a residential small-farm settlement. Where it has been proved that crops can be raised successfully and where there is the nucleus of a good settlement with school established, there should be little difficulty in extending the community indefinitely. There is always a market for the crop in Prince Rupert.

Prince George
Again Winner.

Prince George of course has done well in carrying off first prize. After seeing the exhibit at the Prince Rupert fair this year it is easy to understand how that district could win anywhere. The other districts have all taken a share of the honors, especially the points in Omineca. Another year there should be more competition and when Prince Rupert fair directors are considering their new prize list they might well make special provision for potato exhibits with special prizes.

Trade Treaties
Good For Canada.

A new trade treaty with more favorable tariff terms has been closed by the federal government with France and a similar one with Australia has been negotiated. Hon. W. S. Fielding, minister of finance, arranged the former on his recent visit to France and Hon. J. A. Robb, minister of trade and commerce, is returning from Australia from a similar mission.

The provisions of the Franco-Canadian pact show that there will be a reduction on 128 articles entering Canada from France such as light wines, perfumery, books, printed matter, automobiles, locomotives, lace, silks, fur, rubber goods, feathers, and cinema films. All are necessary imports and will not have the effect of increasing importation at the expense of Canadian production. No doubt when the provisions of the Australian agreement are made public they will show tariff reductions along similar lines.

Such tariff reductions are in line with Liberal policies. They aim at bringing necessary imports to the Canadian markets at lower prices thus tending to bring down the cost of living. They will have some effect in bringing down prices of Canadian goods at the same time. In return for these preferences, the countries affected will make reciprocal reductions. Thus the trade tariffs will have the double desirable effect of stimulating Canadian exportation and benefitting foreign trade while the average citizen enjoys a visible benefit in the lowering of prices of imported articles. It is such measures with such effects that are needed at this time of high prices and economic reorganization and the federal government is doing good work in having negotiated two such agreements in the first year since it was returned to power.

INTEREST IN
LIQUOR ACT
AMENDMENTSLegislature, Irrespective of Party
Gives Attorney General
Good Support

VICTORIA, Dec. 19.—The passing of the liquor amendments, providing among other things a jail sentence instead of fine for the first offense in beer selling cases proved to be one of the interesting features of the session. It was well over midnight and the galleries were practically empty and members sleepy when it came before the House. During its course members were called from the corridors more than once to vote.

The matter was considered in committee of the whole, this giving considerable latitude in discussion. Members were all anxious to get the work done and the Conservatives were giving splendid co-operation with the Government in making the various clauses workable and suggesting improvements. All day the desire to get business done had been shown and opposition leaders on either side were all courteous to each other.

The House had been devoting an hour or so to discussion of methods of fighting codlin moth and the galleries were practically

was followed by a number of innocuous measures, when suddenly the Liquor amendment Act was called and the interest in the proceedings increased. Reporters who were still in the House scrambled back into the press gallery and members who had been quietly sleeping in their chairs, awoke and were alive to the things of the workaday world once more.

Contentious Clause

The chief contentious clause in the bill was that providing for a jail sentence in first offenses in beer selling cases. Ian McKenzie was fairly on the rampage in his opposition to the clause. While giving Mr. Manson credit for his efforts in law enforcement he appealed to the fairness of the House, to the patriotism of the members, to the sympathy they had with the men who had been his comrades in arms, and was on his feet again and again to advocate the elimination of the offending clause. He proposed an amendment but this was rejected. The Attorney General was adamant. He declared that as long as the House refused to have beer sold by the glass they must back him up in enforcing the law. This could only be done by the measure proposed. Fines were useless as had been proved. A beer vendor was fined and then another took his place. They never caught the same man twice.

In the course of his remarks Mr. Manson made some caustic remarks about the police commissioners and provincial consulates who made no attempt at enforcing the law. The latter were gradually removed and others would go as proof of their inactivity was secured.

Had Strong Support

Mr. Manson had very strong support in the House. While a few members spoke, whenever a division was called there was a substantial majority for the Attorney General. The big vote to eliminate jail sentences was passed by 22 to 15. As it was in committee names were not recorded but it was noticeable that a number of Liberals opposed the fine and a number of Conservatives supported it.

Other clauses in the act did not arouse as much interest but they were criticized at some length by R. H. Pooley and others, passing, however, with good majorities. One rather outstanding incident was a statement of the attorney-general in connection with some liquor prosecutions that had gone against the government was that the magistrate and the trial judge had agreed to let the offenders go, yet the men were guilty. He was asking for the right of appeal against decisions of magistrates.

Manson's Courage
Mr. Manson, while having

rather a strenuous and trying time piloting his bill through against the wishes of some of his supporters, did not flinch at any time. His courageous manner inspired confidence. Had the opposition supporters switched at the last minute the prestige of the government would have been injured, but there was no sidestepping and no suggestion of giving way at any stage of the proceedings.

NOW TO BE CLOSEDCouncil Rejects Offer of Capt.
Babington to Sell Buildings
and Equipment for \$1500

In view of the fact that the delivery of Smith Island rock to the city streets as contracted for between the city and Capt. H. B. Babington is nearly completed, the council last night authorized the mayor and city solicitor to close up the contract by paying the balance of the retention money due Capt. Babington. Outstanding accounts owed by Capt. Babington in connection with the work will be submitted for the use of the city. The contract with Capt. Babington called for the delivery of 12,640 cubic yards of rock more or less and the city engineer reported that all but 30 or 40 yards had been delivered. It was the opinion of the city solicitor and the city engineer that the contract to all intents and purposes had been fulfilled and it might be closed. On motion of Ald. Montgomery and Ald. McLeod it was decided to have the mayor and city engineer take the necessary steps to that end.

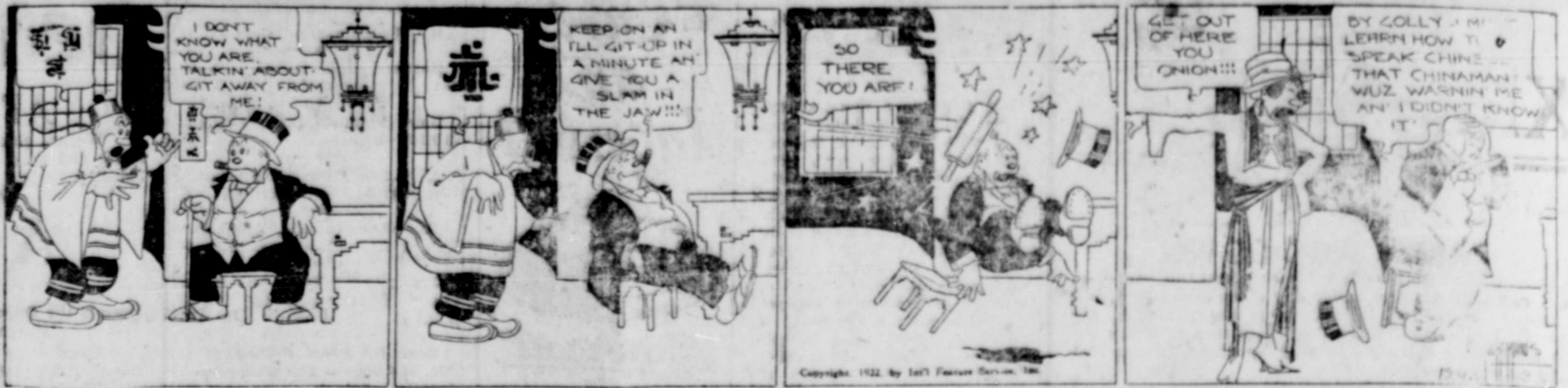

RETURNED SOLDIERS' INSURANCE EXPIRY DATE

All amendments to the Returned Soldiers' Insurance Act provides that insurance may not be granted on the lives of returned soldiers with or without dependents, in a serious condition of health from causes other than war service, for those without dependents, even when impairment is due to service. The amendment, however, contains the following provision:

"Provided that applicants with or without pensionable disability who are so seriously ill that they have no expectancy of life, and who have dependents who are entitled to become beneficiaries under the contract as provided under the Act, shall be insurable under the Returned Soldiers' Insurance Act, up to, and inclusive of 1st JANUARY, 1923."

Insurance may be granted in all cases where the impairment is due to service and the returned soldier has dependents.

Application may be made at any local office of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, or by mail to Soldiers' Insurance Division, Dally Building, Ottawa.

Applications not affected by the above will be accepted until September 1st, 1923.
