Michael Collins Buried Amid Grief DEVELOPMENT STEWART PERMANENT MINING CAMP PROCEEDS

Many Mining Men National Repute Visit Stewart; Great Development Going on there

STEWART, Aug. 28.—Every steamer that arrives brings mining men of national repute, prospectors, business men who see a chance of making money in mines or from miners' supplies and laborers who are looking for permanent work with a chance to get on something good when out in the hills. Most of them remain here but some go away. All who know anything about mining are agreed that Stewart is now looking like a real mining camp.

Never before in the history of Stewart, even in the boom days when everyone was gambling on possibilities, has there been as much interest taken here by real miners as there is today. The men who have likely looking properties are either developing them or are trying to interest capitalists who have money to take an interest in them.

The Premier continues to do as well as ever. While shipping is going steadily on it is accompanied by development work and a permanent camp is springing up around the mine at Premier. In the same neighborhood are a number of good looking prospects all of which have good showings.

A recent good strike on Glacier Creek in a tunnel being driven on the Dunwell property struck some high grade ore last week, the native silver being almost exactly similar to that taken from Premier. The Dunwell property is a consolidation of the old Stewart mine and the Dunwell claims. It is only five miles from Stewart, and is at an elevation of 1,500 feet above sea level.

Work is proceeding on the Big Missouri, where high grade ore carrying very high values in gold were recently reported. The Fish Creek property is to be worked all winter, a new camp being in course of erection capable of accommodating 25 men. Some big values in silver and gold have been taken from ores taken from a tunnel on this property.

Gus Seifert, who has bonded the Rufus property is going east in connection with the property. A lot of money is to be spent in development work, he says.

BATTLESHIP FRANCE SANK

Pride of French Navy Lies Today in 75 feet of Water; Three Lives Lost

L'ORIENT, France, Aug. 28.—The battleship France, the pride of the French navy, lies sunk in 75 feet of water, a total wreck. The death list from the accident remains at three, the rest of the 900 people aboard the big vessel being rescued.

SEVENTY MEN ARE ENTOMBED

Fire Breaks Out in Main Shaft of Argonaut Coal Mine in California.

JACKSON, Cal., Aug. 28.—Seventy-five men were entombed in the Argonaut gold mine in the 4300-foot level by a fire which broke out in the main shaft at midnight. The men were still in the mine at noon and the fire was still burning. Efforts are being made to reach the men through an abandoned shaft. Some officials believe it will be impossible to rescue those entombed except by extinguishing the flames.

INVESTIGATION IN HERRIN MASSACRE

MARION, Ill., Aug. 28.—More than two months after 26 non-Union miners were killed in the "Herrin Massacre," the affair was today the subject of an official inquisition. Neither miners nor coal operators have been empaneled on the specially called Grand Jury.

TRAIN COLLISION.

DENISON, Texas, Aug. 28.—Nine were injured, three fatally, in a rear end collision between trains on the Missouri, Kansas and Texas Railway.

AIRPLANE SPEED RECORD.

TURIN, Aug. 28.—The airplane speed record was broken by Lieut. Brkpepa, who flew 209.09 miles an hour here in an exhibition flight.

LONDON, Aug. 28.—Lloyd George has made it known that all the proceeds of his forthcoming book will be devoted to charity.

FIGHTING YET IRELAND TODAY

Five Men Shot Down in View of Little Children—Guerilla Warfare.

BELFAST, Aug. 28.—Sporadic fighting continues throughout Ireland and 200 British soldiers are searching the mountains of Armagh and Louth border for irregular fugitives.

WAS PICKED UP BY FISHING BOAT OUT IN HECATE STRAITS

Old Man Who Gave His Name as Anthon Doll Said He was on Way to Vancouver and Australia.

When the fishing boat Joe Baker was crossing Hecate Straits at the week end it came across a man who gave his name as Anthon Doll in an old sail boat who said he was on his way to Vancouver and Australia.

The Joe Baker towed the boat to Seow Harbor, Aristobel Island, where the Lilooet is now doing survey work and the officers and men on the Lilooet are keeping an eye on the craft and its queer occupant.

Doll is an old man and acts very queer. He had no food in the boat and the fishermen on the Joe Baker consider him demented.

CONVICTED OF EMBEZZLEMENT

Gets Ten and Five Years Respectively at Honolulu—Took Church Funds.

HONOLULU, Aug. 28.—John Guild, convicted of embezzling \$37,500 from his employers, the Alexander & Baldwin Sugar Company and embezzling \$29,000 funds entrusted to him as security by the Protestant Episcopal Church of Hawaii, has been sentenced to five and ten years imprisonment.

Guild, who was in a state of nervous collapse, wept in court.

REMAINS OF MISSING OLD MAN WERE FOUND AT REMO LAST WEEK

The remains of Joe Lapelle, the old man who disappeared in the woods between Terrace and Remo last December, were found last week according to a message which has been received at the local provincial police office from Constable Mancor of Terrace. It was believed at the time of his disappearance that Lapelle had become lost and perished in the cold and the discovery of his remains confirmed this theory.

GUARANTEES REJECTED BY M. POINCAIRE

British Section Despairs of Amicable Settlement of Reparations

PARIS, Aug. 28.—Premier Poincaré of France rejected the eleventh hour guarantees offered by Germany and independent action by France to enforce reparations demands seems certain.

The British section of the commission apparently desponds of an amicable settlement between the Allies on the reparations question.

EXCEPTIONALLY GOOD HUMPBAC RUN THIS SEASON AT MASSETT

Pink salmon fishing at Massett Inlet this season has been exceptionally good according to Provincial Constable Ponder, of Massett, who reached the city on the Prince Albert this morning. Indians and whites have been engaged in the fishing and the Watun River cannery will have a good pack. Activities will continue for a few days yet.

Constable Ponder reports that geese and ducks are already at Massett Inlet in abundance and when the season opens next month there will be much good shooting there.

COST FIVE TIMES GREATER THAN BEFORE

Estimated Price of Rebuilding Warship "France" is 200,000,000 Francs.

PARIS, Aug. 28.—The loss of the dreadnaught "France," which cost 40,000,000 francs to build, will cost the French nation 200,000,000 to rebuild at the present prices of materials.

ANYOX MAN DIES

John McMillan Was Former Resident of Ladysmith.

ANYOX, Aug. 28.—John McMillan, 46 years of age, is dead. He formerly lived at Ladysmith and leaves a mother, four brothers and three sisters.

Collins Funeral Wonderful Display of National Grief

DUBLIN, Aug. 28.—The body of Michael Collins was laid to rest here today in Glasnevin, after a demonstration of national grief seldom seen in long centuries of the troubled history of Ireland. Collins went to his grave amid the tears of a nation that worshipped him personally as a gallant young patriot in whom were combined all the traits Irishmen hold dear, humor, oratorical power, laughing in disregard of death.

Sister Mary Celestine came from the convent in England to pray for her baby brother. Beside her knelt Sean Collins, the general's brother, but it was on the trembling young woman nearby that all eyes fell most pityingly, Kitty Kernan, Collins' betrothed.

OFFICER FARMERS FROM INDIA HERE

VICTORIA, Aug. 28.—Tangible evidence of the success of the mission of Major J. Clark to recruit settlers for British Columbia from the ranks of British military officers in India is forthcoming with the arrival of Major Clark on the Empress of Russia today, accompanied by an advance guard of officer-farmers. The indications are that 200 officers and their families will come, he said.

BANK ROBBERY IN MANITOBA

WINNIPEG, Aug. 28.—Ten thousand in cash was taken by bank robbers who this morning blew open the safe of the Bank of Hamilton branch in Killarney, Manitoba, and escaped in an automobile with a start of more than three hours of their pursuers.

LOUISE STRUCK FISHING BOAT

Japanese Craft Got in Way of Big Steamer Last Night With no Lights Showing

About 12:30 last night as the C.P.R. steamer Princess Louise was coming up the coast from Vancouver she struck a Japanese fishing boat in the channel net far from Swanson Bay. The craft, sprung from a glancing blow, commenced to fill with water so the big steamer hove to and put out a life boat which towed the distressed craft and crew to shore where the damaged boat was beached, the crew remaining with it. The craft was not badly hurt and the Japs aboard were not injured. The night was dark and foggy and the Japs were not showing a light. The accident caused the Louise about an hour and a half's delay.

However, it is quite possible if the weather keeps fine, that Baseball League may run in one of their postponed games and the Football Association will likely pull off a Stuart Shield match probably between the Grotto and Sons of Canada who are eliminated from the Gihuly Cup running and will be taking no risks in playing.

Without any bias, it would appear that the Calles are the general favorites for winning the Gihuly Cup final in connection with the Labor Day celebration next week. The Scots are going stronger than ever now and have several of their incapacitated players back while the Sons of England are still suffering about as much as they have at any time. It is the confident boast of many of the Calles that they will not lose another game this season.

Sceptre, the famous race horse whose sale to Count Lundgren, an Argentine breeder was announced a short time ago, is to remain in England after all.

Lord Glanely sold her to Count Lundgren recently for \$500. It was the Count's intention to send her to his stud farm in Argentina. But the announcement that the wonderful mare was to go so far from the scene of her victories on the turf provoked such an outburst of sentimental regret that a movement was started by influential supporters of horse racing to keep her in England. Lord Glanely and Count Lundgren talked the matter over in a friendly spirit with the result that it was mutually agreed to call the sale off.

Sceptre is being presented to the national stud with no other stipulation but that on her death Lady Noreen Bass, wife of Sir William Bass who gave \$25,000 for Sceptre as a four-year-old and Mr. Sievier who gave \$10,000 for her as a yearling, shall each get one of her hoofs when she dies, and Lord Glanely the other two.

In addition Lord Glanely, another Somerville Stattersall, another ex-owner of the mare, in giving \$500 to the London Hospital for the establishment of a Sceptre ward.
