Greatest Raid in Ireland's History

GETTING ON WITH WORK, COMMONS MAY PROROGUE BY JUNE 15

Swarms of Police Sweep Into Ulster Rounding Up 300 Sinn Feiners Including Officers

BELFAST, May 23.—The greatest raid in the history of Ireland was carried out early today when swarms of police swept through Ulster and rounded up at least three hundred Sinn Feiners, the majority of them Irish Republican officers. They will all be interned.

The Northern government has taken this action, it is stated, in an effort to suppress not only the Irish Republican Army and the Irish Republican brotherhood but all other Sinn Fein organizations in the Six Counties area. The move of the government follows swiftly upon the Irish Republican Army raids and burnings in Counties Down and Antrim and the intensified hostilities in Belfast which culminated recently in the murder of W. J. Twaddell, member of parliament.

POST OFFICE BEING MOVED

Postmaster Morrison Receives Instructions to be in New Premises by May 31

J. M. Morrison, postmaster, has received instruction from the Department of Public Works, to vacate the present post office in the Federal Block and establish in the Black Building, at the corner of Seventh Street and Second Avenue, by May 31.

The contract for the removal of the postal boxes has been let to D. H. Morrison who commenced work yesterday on the dismantling of the old office. This work will continue tomorrow and holders of boxes will be notified in due course.

Mr. Clarke, post office inspector, will arrive from the South on Saturday to make final arrangements.

LONDON, May 23.—While the cabinet convened today primarily to discuss the results of the Genoa conference it is understood that the recent developments in Ireland would occupy more serious attention. The murder of W. J. Twaddell, member of the northern parliament, has stirred public opinion and Belfast is reported to be seething with excitement.

EMPIRE DAY IS DULY OBSERVED
Annual Demonstration Under I.O. D. E. Ausioes Takes Place This Afternoon.

Some three hundred school children, including those from the convent are this afternoon taking part in the annual Empire Day demonstration under the auspices of the Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire, Municipal Chapter, Mrs. S. P. Mc-Mordie, regent of the senior chapter, is in charge and is receiving the assistance of other officers of the order and the school teachers, a half holiday having been declared.

After the parade, led by the Greenville Concert Band from the corner of Fifth Avenue and Fulton street to the Westholme Theatre, the youthful gathering, in the latter place, will see a movie "Running a Runaway Train," and listen to addresses and musical numbers.

Archdeacon G. A. Rix and Principal J. C. DUBLIN, May 23.—Ard Feis, a national Sinn Fein organization, ratified at its meeting today the agreement reached last week by the factions in the Dail Eireann regarding the elections and composition of the government.

ROUND THE WORLD FLYERS OFF TOMORROW

LONDON, May 23.—In an attempt to fly around the world by air, the two British aviators, Major W. T. Blake, of the Royal Air Force, and Captain Norman Macmillan, will hop off the flying field at Croydon tomorrow at noon. They expect to complete the trip in two months.

BUDGET IS PRESENTED

Hon. W. S. Fielding, Minister of Finance, Brings in His Bill

OTTAWA, May 23.—Today, after eleven years in opposition, Hon. W. S. Fielding again brought down a Liberal budget. His financial proposals had been kept strictly to himself and to members of the cabinet. The general expectation was that when he spoke this afternoon he would announce some reductions in customs duties on farm implements and articles entering generally into the cost of living.

The minister's opening words, on introducing the Budget, stressed the inadequacy of the present tax system and indicated the probability of increases. He foreshadowed floating further loans; a domestic loan if the market conditions were favorable.

The British preference would be increased in some respects Mr. Fielding announced. Preference has been offered Australia in return for similar treatment. All changes in the tariff will be reductions but one.

Regarding reciprocity with the United States, Mr. Fielding said American developments would be awaited. There will be few reductions in the tariff with that country.

INDIAN CHIEFS HAVE TROUBLE

Differences of Iniquois and Ontario Government Going to The Hague

BRANTFORD, May 23.—Chiefs of the Onondaga Indian reserve are planning to take their grievances against the Ontario government to the International tribunal at The Hague. They claim that the recent visit of Hon. Charles Stewart cleared up none of their troubles and they must go further abroad for consultation.

CITY COUNCIL STILL FAVORS SUMMER TIME

Daylight Saving to Remain in Effect—Previous Stand is Backed Up.

Daylight saving time is to remain in effect in the city for the summer. Decision to this effect was made by the city council last night when, in face of petitions and delegations presenting cases for and against the measure, a resolution, moved by Alderman Silversides and seconded by Alderman Kerr, that the council stand by its decision to "adopt daylight saving this season but next season take a plebiscite on the question was carried. Ald. Montgomery and Ald. Collart voting against it. Ald. Montgomery moved an amendment that the question be left over for another week in order to give opportunity to examine the petitions presented. This was seconded by Ald. Collart but failed to carry, the mover and second being the only ones to vote for it although Mayor Rochester expressed his sympathy with it. There was another full discussion on the matter which took up about an hour's time, both the delegates and members of the council taking part in it.

The city clerk reported that he had a supplementary petition against daylight saving which made the total petitioners 946 now as against 757 last week. Although he had been advised that a petition from those favoring daylight saving was to have been presented it had not yet made its appearance. E. C. Gibbons, who championed the cause of daylight saving, stated that there was a petition from his side which bore 600 names and included the majority of the business men. He could obtain this immediately. The mayor explained, however, that it was too late now and the council could deal only with what it had before it.

In putting forth his plea for the retention of daylight saving, Mr. Gibbons said that the council had already endorsed the scheme and should now stand by it. The big point in favor of it was that it allowed for a greater measure of evening recreation which was badly needed here. Last year without daylight saving not a single baseball or football game had been finished before dark. The council had spent thousands of dollars on the sports grounds which would be nullified if the provision for the extra hour were rescinded. All sport societies and many others had asked for daylight saving and no objections had been made at first. Opponents of the law had no right to come before the council now and ask that it be rescinded. He asked that the council stand by its guns on the matter.

Martin O'Reilly, for the anti-daylight savers, declared that the new time was not good for the business of the community. There were two times here now and there was no chance of the railway changing. Daylight saving was also not fair to the mothers and the children. If the council now thought that it had done wrong in adopting it, it was its duty to rescind it. It certainly would not work to the best interests of the community if the railway did not adopt it. The petition that had been presented against it had been large.

DEVELOPMENT OF VICTORIA

Chamber of Commerce Suggests Separate Railway Division and Freight Mosquito Fleet

VICTORIA, May 23.—C. P. W. Schwengers, in addressing the Victoria Chamber of Commerce last night, urged the creation of a Vancouver Island division of the Canadian Pacific Railway as a means of furthering the transportation interests of the Island. He also advocated the establishment of a mosquito fleet to operate out of Victoria to restore the port's shipping prestige. The Chamber of Commerce will appoint a committee to pursue the scheme further.

ly signed voluntarily. People had not realized its disadvantages until it actually had been put into effect.

Should Be Rescinded.
J. C. Gavigan agreed that decision should be left to the people but, in the meantime, it should be rescinded. He was satisfied that ninety per cent of people were against it. A petition as presented bearing 1000 signatures should be sufficient to indicate to the council how the people felt on the matter.

Joe Scott, Jr., said that the daylight savers had had a petition out for three days only and unsolicited, it had obtained 600 signatures. He was satisfied that they could get 2000 names. Seventy-five business houses in the centre of the city had signed in favor of daylight saving.

Mrs. Director said that the petition presented against daylight saving did not represent all the people who were against it.

Aldermen's Views.
Ald. Kelly said that the representation of various societies to council at first had seemed sufficient to justify the belief that daylight saving was generally wanted. At that time there had been no objection from the other side. He still favored daylight saving but was willing to compromise if necessary.

Ald. Silversides said he was still of the opinion as before on the question and still favored daylight saving although next time he would like to see the question decided by means of a plebiscite. The fact that the city had a little extra daylight made it a better place to live in. He was of the opinion that the best thing the council could do would be to stand by its original decision.

Ald. Montgomery said that a petition of 1000 names should not be ignored. The petition on either side should be examined. If necessary he would be in favor of a special plebiscite.

Ald. Collart wanted to give everybody a chance and would abide by the judgment of the majority.

Government Naval Policy Is Accepted by Commons Today Without Division

OTTAWA, May 23.—The House of Commons has adopted without division the naval estimates for \$1,500,000 and thus automatically accepts the government's naval policy for a reduced fleet. This year's estimate is one million dollars less than last. There was considerable debate and criticism up to the last minute.

It is now believed that the House may conclude its business and prorogue by June 15.

Hon. S. C. Mewburn, former minister of militia, reviewed work of the war memorials committee for which \$500,000 was voted in a non-party debate which was full of compliments for Mewburn.

The Minister of Railways announced that the government had advanced the Grand Trunk Railway since January 1919 a total of \$134,154,917 and the Grand Trunk Pacific in the same period, \$35,958,095.

ADMIRAL LINER RAMS AND SINKS BRITISH STEAMSHIP ANDREA

PHILADELPHIA, May 23.—The British steamer Andrea, 2,400 tons, sank after a collision with the liner H. F. Alexander, of the Admiral Line, off this coast. No lives were lost.

LONDON, May 23.—The Empire Settlement Bill was given its third reading this morning after the House of Commons had rejected several amendments brought down by the Laborites.

BUSINESS MAN OF VICTORIA DIED IN NEW ZEALAND

VICTORIA, May 23.—William Christie, a Victoria business man and formerly manager of the C. P. R. Telegraphs here, died while on a visit to New Zealand according to word which has been received here.

LASCARS RUSH LIFEBOATS AND WOMEN DROWNED

Cowardly Conduct of East Indian Sailors Responsible for Loss of Life in Egypt Wreck

LONDON, May 23.—Rescued passengers from the liner Egypt, which was sunk off the French coast on Sunday, confirm the report that Lascars employed on the ship rushed the life boats and had to be beaten back by officers. Ninety eight lives were lost, many of these being women. One man says that all the women would have been saved if the Lascars had not mutinied.

SCHOONER SANK OFF CALIFORNIA

Crew of Virginia Olsen Maintain Ship Was Rammed by Sub-Navy Officers Deny.

LOS ANGELES, May 23. Officers at the marine base here deny the statement that the schooner Virginia Olsen, which sank today through a collision, was rammed by the sub-marine H-7. The captain and officers of the submarine rammed their boat and then left them to race for shore, but the crew of the H-7 deny any knowledge of such an incident. The Virginia Olsen sank but the crew saved.

MERCHANT MARINE TO CONTINUE CARRYING OCEAN FALLS PAPER

VANCOUVER, May 23.—The Canadian Government Merchant Marine has secured the renewal of the paper and pulp contract from Ocean Falls and Powell River to California, according to a report from San Francisco. This contract, which up to a year ago was held by the Pacific S. S. Company and which was won then by the G.G.M.M. Limited in competitive bidding was the cause of a sharp contest in tenders this year. The existing contract expires in June and the tenders were opened last week. It is understood that six or seven companies sought it, one of them being an organization representing the Comyn interest who own the wooden moterships built for the Australian Government.

VICTORIA BUYS STOCK.

VICTORIA, May 23.—The city has purchased 14,500 pounds sterling worth of Northern Ontario debenture stock at 34 for investment in sinking fund.

Budget About To Make Appearance.

Hon. W. S. Fielding's first budget, long-looked for and much demanded by the Conservative element in the Canadian House of Commons, is making its appearance this afternoon. Its submission at this time is generally conceded to be a sort of earnest of good faith and a desire to meet, at least partially, the demand of private members for more information regarding the government policies and intentions.

Is Most Interesting Item of Program.

Budget announcements are probably the most interesting single items that ordinary sessions of parliaments have to offer. This is not because of the figures given because they are generally wearisome, but it is because governmental policy is possibly given more indication by this means than by any other.

Another interesting matter in all budgets is that of taxation. It is here that the government announces what old taxes are to be dropped or what new ones are to be adopted.

The present budget contains less of an outstanding nature than many others of the past. It is only a very reasonable one that can be adopted, but nevertheless, there are facts and conditions that must be faced and it is the minister's duty in his budget to announce his solution for them.

DRY DOCK GETS NO REFUND ON POWER ACCOUNT ASKED FOR

A report from the Utilities Committee recommending that the application from the dry dock for refund on electric account for the months of January and February be not granted but recommending that, effective March 1, the plant be put on the 4c to 1c power rate was adopted by the city council last night. A dispute between Henry Wolf, the city contractor, for the quarrying of rock at Smith Island, and his workmen has arisen and the work is closed down at the present time. The workmen, alleging that they have received no pay for their work, have quit the job and are now awaiting the action of the city council. Last night four of them headed by C. A. Swanson and Fred Martinson appeared before the council and were told by the mayor that the matter was now under advisement and he hoped that some kind of a suitable arrangement might be reached by this afternoon.



Sacramento, May 13.—Sacramento has many attractions. It has fine parks and open spaces and trees and buildings and is the centre of the almond industry but it also has heat. Without heat it cannot grow grapes and the other fruits which are produced here. Heat is what makes it prosperous. Heat is also what makes life unbearable at times to people who are not used to it.

The snow clad mountains almost a hundred miles away look very attractive and the remembrance of our own British Columbia makes life worth living yet.

It was useless to ask today how hot it was. It was too hot for a British Columbian. Another day here would be purgatory if the day were as hot as today. We are out of our natural latitude.

The oranges have been small and the lemons not very large, and even the grape fruit are not first class. The strawberries are good, very similar to Gordon Heat and Terrace except that they seem to lack somewhat of the flavor which makes those northern berries famous. It looks to us as if the best fruit is sent away and the poorer grades are consumed at home.

Veteran Minister Of Finance Presents Canada's Budget For Year To House This Afternoon

OTTAWA, May 23.—(By Canadian Press).—The budget speech, which will be delivered by Hon. W. S. Fielding this afternoon, is expected to contain some changes in the tariff but no general revision. Budget secrets are proverbially well kept, but this much is inferred from past declarations of the Liberal party and from the political situation in the House of Commons, especially from the parliamentary influence of the Progressive bloc.

The budget is also likely to contain announcements of moment on taxation and on the methods to be adopted to bridge the gap between the revenue in sight and the estimates which have been brought down. It is regarded as probable that these methods will include an internal loan in addition to that which has already been floated in New York.

The year which Mr. Fielding covers in his budget has been one of decline in trade and in the revenues of the country, but there are signs that a turn of the tide has come. The total trade figures of the fiscal year which closed on March 31 last—the year of which the Finance Minister has to give an account—showed a big falling off from those of the year before, but the figures for March were larger than for those in any month in the whole fiscal year. The revenue figures for the year were also much below those of the year previous, but again March, the last month of the year, was marked by an increase in income.

Revenue Surplus

The financial statement for the year closed in March shows a considerable surplus of ordinary revenue over ordinary expenditure. The total revenue as announced is \$371,000,000 as compared with ordinary expenditures of \$324,000,000. This gives a surplus on consolidated account of some \$47,000,000. For the year previous there was an even larger surplus, the revenue being \$451,000,000 as against expenditures of \$357,000,000.

The largest single item in the revenue of 1921-22 was derived as usual from the customs, which showed \$104,000,000 as compared with \$162,000,000 in the year before. Second place in the last year was held by the income tax, which replaced sales tax and other special war inland revenue in rank of importance. The revenue from the income tax for 1921-22 was \$78,000,000 as compared with only \$38,000,000 the year previous; while the sales and related taxes sank from \$75,000,000 to \$72,000,000.

Net Debt Larger

In spite of this favorable showing on consolidated account, however, there was an increase of \$73,000,000 in the net debt of the Dominion. On March 31 last the net debt of Canada stood at \$2,384,996,391 as compared with \$2,314,294,443 for the end of the fiscal year previous. Curiously enough the gross debt of the country did not rise during the year, but on the other hand showed a falling off of approximately \$87,000,000. The explanation of this condition is that there was a large decrease in the assets of the Dominion, especially in advances to banks, at the same time that there was an increase in the list of assets which are regarded as "non-active." Among these latter are the loans which have been made to the railways in recent years.

Gold Reserve Rises

When the note circulation of the banks is combined with the government notes, thus including the whole note circulation of the country, the gold reserves were on March 31, 1921, 43.9 of the circulation while on the corresponding date this year they had risen to 47.2 per cent.

Canada's external trade during the year recently closed fell off very heavily. For the year 1920-21 the total trade was \$2,450,586,000; while for 1921-22 it sank to \$1,501,731,000. The decline affected imports somewhat more seriously than exports, and the result is that for the year ending with March last there was an excess of exports over imports which is usually referred to as a favorable balance of trade. For the year 1902-21 the imports were \$1,240,058,000 and for 1921-22 the imports were only \$747,804,000; while for the corresponding periods the exports were \$1,210,428,000 and \$753,927,000 respectively.

Optimistic Note

There is a note of distinct optimism in another financial alteration which has taken place in the year under review. This is in the exchange rate as between Canada and the United States. At the end of March 1921 New York funds were at a premium of nearly thirteen cents. Today the premium is ranging about a cent and a half.

Turning to the year that is now current, that is 1922-23, though the exchange and trade situation are showing an improvement, Mr. Fielding has a difficult problem in making ends meet in national finance. The main estimates already down are for \$466,000,000, while the revenue for the last fiscal year was only \$371,000,000. This indicates a deficit of about \$95,000,000; but in addition there is likely to be a big decline in income tax and in business profits tax this year as compared with last. The decline in business profits tax is to be expected because that tax expired at the end of 1920, while last year's revenue from income tax, owing to the introduction of the system of payment at the time of making the return, included a large part of the taxes for two years. It is very likely that these two items may add forty or fifty millions to the sum which Mr. Fielding will have to raise.

Raising Money

Indications has been given already that part of the money to fill this gap will be secured by loans. Already one hundred millions has been raised in this way in New York. In addition a domestic loan is expected in the fall to meet the Victory Loan of \$184,000,000 and a school land loan of \$22,000,000 more, which are due this year. Mr. Fielding has also a special source of revenue in the payments of five billion monthly which are being made by the British government in settlement of the balance of \$130,000,000 due to Canada on the war accounts between the two countries.

PRAIRIES SOON BE DOTTED WITH GARDENS

Winnipeg, May 23.—That the time will come when the prairies will be hedged and dotted with gardens and blooming flowers, of ripening fruits and of delicious vegetables, was the prediction made here recently by W. T. Macoun, horticulturist of the Dominion Experimental Farms, who has almost completed a tour of inspection of the Dominion's experimental farms. Mr. Macoun is a son of Professor John Macoun, of Ottawa, the famous naturalist and explorer, who died last year in his ninety-third year.

Mr. Macoun said that he had seen on the prairies some of the finest gardens that could possibly be seen anywhere in Canada. But before the prairies can have gardens they must have hedges for their windbreaks, Mr. Macoun added. "Set your garden," he said. "The hedges are coming. The Dominion experimental farms have more, far more, than paid for themselves by the wide distribution which has been given to the caragana hedge, which the department at Ottawa introduced from Russia. It is indispensable to the small garden on the prairies. I attribute a great deal of the splendid results achieved in western gardening to the influence exerted by the experimental stations," Mr. Macoun declared.
