Immense Gathering At Conference CLASH BETWEEN MILITARY FORCES OF RIVAL IRISH FACTIONS

Economic Conference Opens Today at Genoa with Many Delegates Present; Speeches

GENOA, April 10.—The Genoa Economic Conference was formally opened this afternoon in the historic palace of St. George by Premier Facta of Italy, who delivered the opening address. He was followed by Premier Lloyd George of Great Britain.

Nations of four continents were represented in an endeavor to restore to the world normal conditions. The nations and states represented and the size of their delegations are as follows:

LOS ANGELES, April 10.—Robert Wilson, formerly a clergyman in London, Ontario, shot and killed a fellow prisoner and accomplice just outside the penitentiary during an attempted jail breaking.

Wilson, Herbert Cox, the dead man, and Eddie O'Brien were under arrest charged with mail robbery of over a million dollars. They attempted to escape but were recaptured.

for loss which has been caused through the confiscation of property and establish legal punishment to assure the impartial execution of all commercial or other contracts.

The resolution also suggests that the nations ought to have a convenient means of exchange; that all nations should agree to abstain from propaganda subversive of the political system in other countries and all nations take a common engagement to abstain from aggression on their neighbors.

Eyes on Russia.

All eyes are upon Russia, for it is the first time this great nation has participated in world affairs since the overthrow of Kerensky's provisional government in the spring of 1917. After more than four years of experimental government, Nicholas Lenin, Russian Premier, has abandoned much of what he previously considered essential to Bolshevism and has consented to participate in a conference called by "capitalistic nations."

On the ground that the gathering will be political rather than economic, the United States has declined Italy's invitation to send representatives. The American people, Secretary Hughes said in declining the invitation, are anxious to assist Europe in recovering its economic life but feel that they cannot involve themselves in European politics.

Decision to call the Genoa conference was reached by the Allied Supreme Council meeting at Gannes early in January. Rapidly diminishing European exchange, billions of dollars in unpaid debts, German reparations, necessity of reconstructing devastated areas, the Russian situation and hope that the United States would lend itself as a stabilizing influence constituted the pressure behind this decision.

Germany Active.

Germany, represented in a passive capacity in nearly all European conferences since Versailles, is expected to play a more active part at Genoa. Many observers even go so far as to predict that Great Britain and Germany will dominate the assembly by working hand in hand for the salvation of their industrial lives through the resurrection of their markets in the east and south.

Briefly, the conference will seek to accomplish some means for the granting or extension of foreign credits to the most enfeebled countries and will then attempt to set up machinery for assuring such foreign capital that the fruits of its investment will not be lost.

The resolution calling the conference set forth that the nations of Europe cannot presume to dictate to one another the principle under which they must conduct their internal affairs but adds that foreign capital cannot be expected to come in unless the nations recognize all obligations and public debts previously contracted or to be contracted in the future, agree to indemnify all foreign interests

Regarding Russia, the resolution concludes: "If the Russian government claims official recognition in order to assure development of its commerce, the Allied powers can accord the same only upon acceptance of the foregoing stipulations."

It was Russia and the question of her participation in the Genoa meeting which played an important part in Premier Briand's sudden decision to return to Paris and lay the Gannes deliberations before the Chamber of Deputies in the hope of receiving a vote of confidence. After a lengthy and eloquent speech, he suddenly announced his resignation and was succeeded by Premier Poincare, who formed a new cabinet.

France was flatly against permitting Russia to enter the Genoa conference without the imposition of advance restrictions on the subjects the Bolsheviks should participate without restrictions other than were mentioned in the resolution as applying to all nations.

Prime Minister Lloyd George also experienced something of a flare back from British political leaders, with the Genoa conference and its Russian question entering into the difficulty.

The Prime Minister's desire to carry through the Gannes program precipitated a virtual crisis in his coalition government, following which he went before the House of Commons for a vote of confidence on the subject.

HIDDEN MINE KILLED 23

Diggers Struck Detonating Machine on Graveyard with Disastrous Results.

KATTOWITZ, Silesia, April 10.—While French soldiers were digging in a graveyard for hidden arms, a spade struck a detonating machine and blew up a hidden mine. The explosion killed 23 French soldiers and one German foreman.

FIREMEN ARE BURIED IN RUINS OF ELKS HOME CITY NEW ORLEANS

NEW ORLEANS, April 10.—Two firemen buried in the ruins of the Elks' Home, which was partially destroyed by fire last night. Seventeen firemen were injured and the financial loss is estimated at a quarter of a million dollars.

Civil War in Ireland is Inevitable Unless Change Tactics There Very Soon

DUBLIN, April 10.—Michael Collins in a speech at Wexford said it looked as if civil war in Ireland can be averted only by a miracle unless there is an immediate change of tone and tactics of certain people.

LONDON, April 10.—It is rumored in London and Dublin that a secret meeting of the Irish Republican Army deposed De Valera as republican leader and a statement was afterwards given out that De Valera now has no governing part in the Irish Republican Army.

LONDON, April 10.—The police barracks at Broadford, County Clare, were occupied by official Irish Republican Army units, who attacked early this morning. There was an exchange of fire for a considerable time, the besieged refusing to surrender. Captain O'Brien, who was in charge of the besieged troops, was fatally wounded.

Rumors Not True.

DUBLIN, April 10.—The statement by the Irish republican publicity department contradicts the rumors that De Valera has been deposed as leader of the republicans at a secret meeting of the republican army in Dublin yesterday.

O. M. Walker, of Alice Arm, pleaded guilty to the theft of a watch on appearing before Judge Yung this morning after having elected for speedy trial. He was released on suspended sentence putting up a surety of \$500 for one year. W. E. Fisher appeared for the crown and T. B. Hooper for the defence.

CANADA PREFERENCE IN WEST INDIES IS ANNOUNCED TODAY

OTTAWA, April 10.—The Jamaica Legislature has sanctioned a trade agreement between Canada and the West Indies giving Canada a preference ranging from 25 to 50 per cent.

SUGGESTED UPRISING IN EASTER WEEK

Talk in England and Ireland That May Be Trouble on Anniversary.

LONDON, April 10.—Will the so-called extremist republicans in Ireland observe the anniversary of the Easter week uprising against Great Britain in 1916 by attempting this Easter week to oust the provisional government and establish a republic in its place. This is the question that is being seriously discussed both in England and Ireland.

Value of Getting Together.

The value of getting together and talking over differences was well illustrated in connection with a dispute over the freight and passenger service to Stewart given by the G. T. P. The Citizens' Association of that town felt themselves aggrieved over the treatment that they were getting and they started an agitation for improved service and lower rates. For some time there was friction, but at last the general freight and passenger agent, who is located in Vancouver, came north and with the assistant general freight and passenger agent went to Stewart and talked over the matter. There was a long session and all the difficulties and differences were cleared up. In many cases it was a matter of lack of information that caused the irritation.

It is extremely important that there should be co-operation between the transportation companies and the communities of Northern British Columbia. The best way to secure this co-operation is for any matters which seem to cause friction to be discussed between the management of the company and the people concerned.

Stability of Canadian Banks.

While there is often criticism of the Canadian banking institutions, the element of safety is one that can not be ignored. Figures have recently been published showing that during the past three years not one Canadian bank has failed, whereas during the same time in the United States there were no less than 471 failures with a total capital of \$178,283,642.

Some Canadians point to the Merchants Bank as a case of failure, but it must be remembered that not a single depositor lost anything in that bank, and even the shareholders were protected to the amount of half of the amount of cash they had invested. It was not a failure, although it might have been had not quick action been taken.

Canadian bank notes are always worth their face value whether the bank fails or not, and it is seldom indeed that depositors lose anything. This element of stability is very important and one that can not be ignored in any comparison between the banks of the United States and those of Canada.

Yesterday Anniversary Of Glorious Vimy Ridge.

Five years ago the world was thrilled by the news that Vimy Ridge had been taken by the Canadians. Canadian people here were proud to think that their country had won such glory.

The Canadian Corps' attack on Vimy Ridge in the early morning of April 9, 1917, was the climax of an intense artillery preparation covering many hours, and the troops went forward under protection of a wonderful barrage representing a record concentration of artillery, great and small. Plans for the attack had been carefully co-ordinated weeks ahead, and all ranks engaged had gone through a special training for the offensive. The Boche held the ridge strongly and attached great importance to its retention, as it dominated the plains of the Scheldt and their precious coal fields. The Prussian Guards stationed there, along with the Bavarian reserve divisions, had been told to hold it to the last man. But the attack, carried out from "zero" hour to its last phase relentlessly and with clockwork precision, was not to be denied.

By 2 o'clock that afternoon the Canadian had done their work so effectively that they had driven the Germans from their stronghold and were in complete possession of Vimy Ridge, except for Hill 145. They kept on in their heroic assault until they had battered their way clean through, and by 11 o'clock that night the enemy was on retreat and Hill 145 was in our possession.

Vimy Ridge was not taken without a terrific struggle, during which hundreds of Canadian soldiers laid down their lives. It was a splendid victory, but it was won at a cost that meant sad hearts in this country, as well as hearts filled with pride and gratitude. Sir Julian Byng, as he was then, commanded the Canadian Corps, and in addition to being raised to the peerage under the title of Baron Byng of Vimy, he was further rewarded by being promoted to the command of the Third Army, being succeeded in command of the Canadian Corps by Sir Arthur Currie.

GOVERNMENT WILL SECURE CHANGE IN B.N.A. ACT FOR WOMEN

MONTREAL, April 10.—A promise by the Prime Minister, the Hon. Mackenzie King, that the matter of the amendment of the British North American Act to enable Canadian women to become senators would be taken up shortly is reported by Mrs. James Goggie, of Quebec. Following the ruling of the Department of Justice that an amendment of the Act would be necessary before women could sit in the Senate, Mrs. Goggie who had a few days previously headed a deputation on the subject of the admission of women to the Senate, had an interview with the Premier in which she urged that the Government should take steps to have the Act amended and that the name of Judge Murphy of Edmonton, Alberta should be kept in view should the Act be amended. The Premier, Mrs. Goggie reports, acquiesced on both points.

Ten Years Ago in Prince Rupert

April 10, 1912.

The Prince Rupert Moral and Reform Council had a delegation at last night's council meeting consisting of Rev. F. W. Kerr, Rev. W. F. Rustbrook and T. J. Davidson. The organization approved of the council's efforts towards the early closing of bars.

Matthew Dow, of the North American Construction Co., arrived from the south this morning to take charge of the building of the G.T.P. dry dock here. Thirty-five men will at first be employed but later in the summer the number will be considerably increased.

Reports submitted by Engineer Matthews, of the light department, show a profit of \$1,469.70 for the months of January, February and March. The plant is to be kept running day and night and the rate will probably be reduced to 8c a kilowatt hour.

POOR SPORTSMANSHIP.

There is much of that variety of sportsmanship among the younger generation. They get it from their elders, evidently, and if they feel that way in their games how will they act in their other dealings with their fellows later on.

Lasting peace, human brotherhood, justice, and other ideals are not built on, "Kick him in the ankles."

RUSSIANS AT GENOA TODAY

Soviet Leaders to Meet Representatives of Other Governments on Equal Footing.

ASSASSINATION IS FEARED

Are Allotted to Villa 35 Miles Out of City—Chicherin Is Leader.

GENOA, April 10.—None of the more than 1000 persons who will sit as delegates, advisers and experts in the Genoa Economic Conference, which opens here today, will command greater public interest than the small group of men representing Russia.

While prominent statesmen, diplomats and political leaders of almost every European country are well known to the average reader for the reason that they have participated in numerous assemblies and conferences since the Versailles deliberations, the Russians are meeting for the first time since 1917 with representatives of the rest of Europe.

The All-Russian Central Executive Committee, meeting late in January, elected a slate of fifteen prominent Soviet statesmen headed by Premier Lenin, giving them full plenipotentiary powers in all matters affecting Russia to come before the conference. Responsibility for this delegation fell upon Vice-chairman George Chicherin, Bolshevik foreign minister, however, when it was decided that Lenin was too ill to leave Moscow. It also was said that fear of assassination if he left Russia played an important part in keeping the Bolshevik premier within his own domains.

Danger of Assassination.

Concern over their personal safety was displayed by other members of the delegation, particularly when they reached Riga, Latvia, late in March and learned that the Italian government had assigned them to a villa at Rapallo, 35 miles out of Genoa. Chicherin issued a statement criticizing the Italians for thus isolating the Russians and calling attention to "the daily gauntlet of 35 miles" which the delegates would have to run in motor cars under conditions "especially convenient for assassination."

While the Italian government did not make formal answer to several notes of protest to the Rapallo incident, it was explained to the Russians that Italy was having trouble with her own radicals and feared the presence of such prominent representatives of Bolshevistic principles might foment renewed anarchist activities. The section around Genoa and Milan, it was recalled, had been a hotbed of anarchy when Italian labor uprisings resulted in the taking over of much of the nation's industry by the workers.

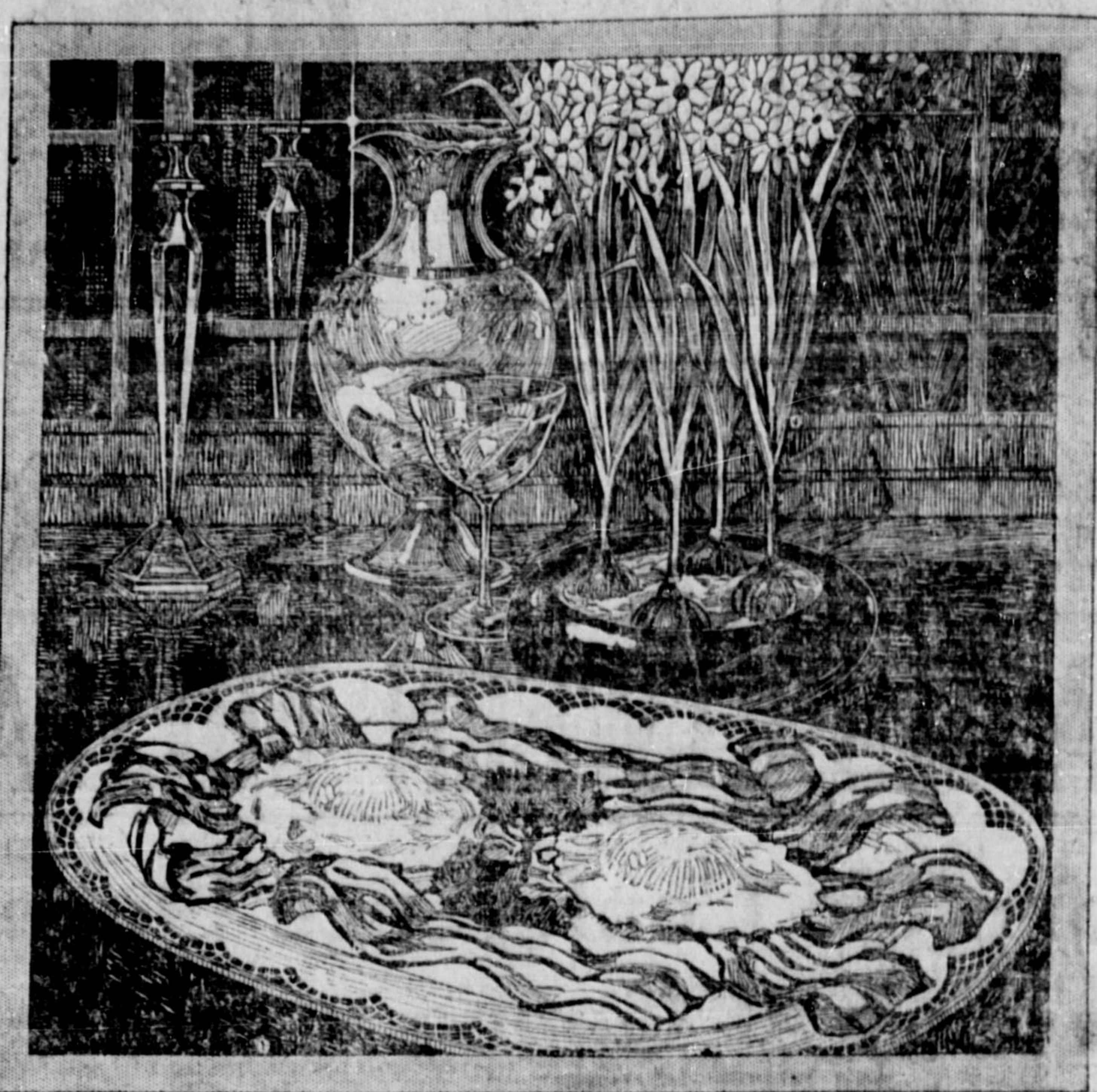
Leader of Party.

Chicherin stands foremost above his colleagues of the Russian delegation as a statesman. He is a man more than 60 years of age, and began his diplomatic career during the Czarist regime. He was in England when the Bolshevik revolution started Europe but returned to Russia in answer to an urgent call from Lenin, who promptly seized upon him as likely material for important diplomatic work then in hand.

Next to Chicherin, perhaps the most important member of the group is Leonid Krassin, Bolshevik Minister of Foreign Trade, who was opposed to Bolshevism in 1917 but joined the Communist party after Lenin's victory. His first assignment, that of organizing the transportation systems of Russian, ended in utter failure but his efforts along other lines, particularly in securing a trade agreement with England were more successful. He is 45 years old, an electrical engineer by profession and has been referred to as the only real business man in the Soviet government.

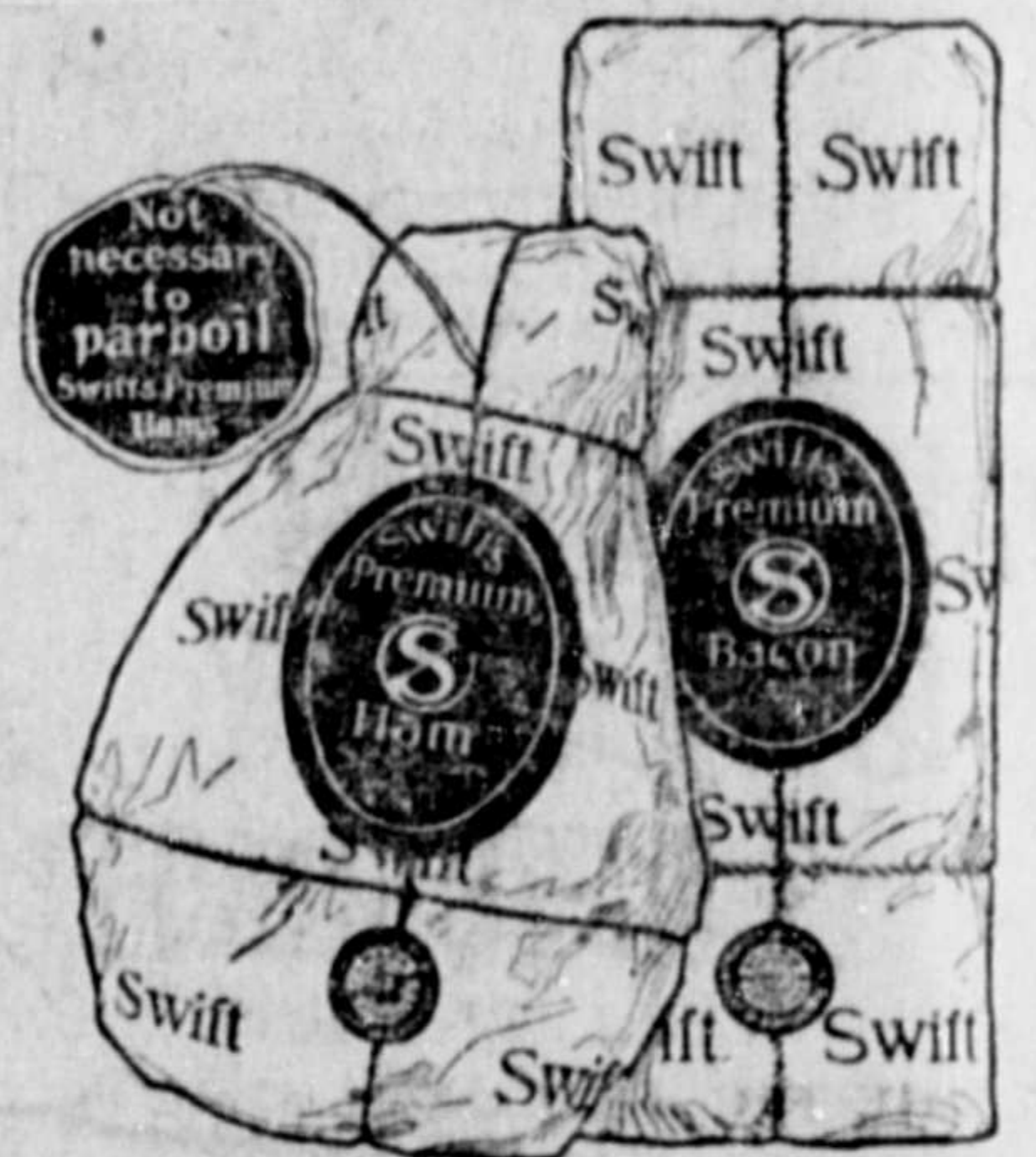
Premier of Turkestan.

Adolph Joffe, "singer of peace treaties," headed the Soviet delegation which carried on the long peace negotiations with Poland during the fall and winter of 1920-21. He goes to Genoa as Premier of Soviet Turkestan. He was born in the Crimea, of Jewish parents, 45 years ago. His father accumulated a fortune as carrier of the mails in road wagons before the days of railroads. Dr. Jacob Janson, who will represent the Soviet Far Eastern Republic, is a Lett, considered obedient to the Central Execu-

BRINGING UP FATHER



By George McManus

Garde's Report For Board of Trade on Establishment Iron and Steel Industry Near Here

The brief prepared by Alfred C. Garde, consulting mining engineer and metallurgist, on the proposed establishment of the iron and steel industry for Prince Rupert for the Prince Rupert Board of Trade, and which the board is now considering printing and circulating widespread, is a most complete compendium of data on the subject.

The raw material section is classified under the following different headings: Iron Ores of Northern British Columbia, Coal Fields of Northern British Columbia; Coal and Iron on Queen Charlotte Islands; Fluxing Material (limestone and quartz) in Northern British Columbia; Fire Clay and Hydro Magnesite in Northern British Columbia; Ferro-Alloys in Northern British Columbia.

Under "Economic Conditions," Mr. Garde deals with markets for iron and steel products on the Pacific Coast; Transportation facilities in Prince Rupert district; government assistance to the iron and steel industry; smelter site; labor conditions in Northern British Columbia; water powers and hydro-electric developments in Northern British Columbia; climatic conditions in Northern British Columbia; recapitulation and general remarks.

Ores of District. Dealing with iron ores in the district, the report says that two varieties of iron ore are to be found in abundance, namely, brown hematite and magnetite, the latter predominating.

Water Powers. Other hydro-electric locations listed are as follows: Khatada River, 17,500 horsepower, 44 miles transmission line. Brown Lake, 16,000 horsepower, 40 miles.

The many coal properties are fully described in the section devoted to coal. These include the Copper River coal basin, Betty coal seam, Telkwa River, Telkwa collieries, Telkwa River, Jefferson - Dockrill syndicate, Telkwa River, Howson coal, Morice River, and other coal areas such as Kitnaikwa, Zymioz River, Skegona River, Kispox River, Kitzeukla River, tributary to the Skeena, Wright Coal Co., Seaton, Naas-Skeena Coal area and Frank's coal mine, Hudson Bay Mountain. The Grand Hog anthracite coal fields and the Queen Charlotte Island fields are also reported upon.

Plenty of Fluxes. The feature of securing suitable fluxes, says the report, is the least difficult of all as limestones of exceptional quality and in great quantities can be obtained from along the railway line and on the adjacent Islands. Various properties are mentioned in connection with the campaign that body has recently been waging against the freight and passenger rates on the government steamers plying into this port.

Notice of Arrivals. DR. HUESTIS SPEAKS ON WORK OF ALLIANCE

Was at Presbyterian and Methodist Churches Yesterday—Has Support of Attorney General.

Dr. C. H. Huestis, president of the Lord's Day Alliance, spoke in the Presbyterian Church yesterday morning and at the Methodist Church in the evening.

Dr. Huestis dealt with the general work of the Lord's Day Alliance at both services and did not mention the local situation particularly.

"There is an idea abroad," he said, "that the Sunday observance law is not in effect until the city or municipality adopts it through the government. This is a mistake for the law comes into effect as soon as it is adopted by the municipality or the city. The Alliance does not interfere with the cities in the matter and if they do not want to take action that is their business and not ours. It is entirely up to the police commissioners to enforce the law."

Will Enforce Law.

Dr. Huestis stated that Hon. A. M. Manson, attorney general had assured him that the law would be enforced wherever the cities or municipalities asked for it. Prosecutions would have to go through the attorney general. Fines would have to be granted by him in each individual case and there would be no blanket prosecution permissions given. Each individual case would be taken up separately so that petty cases would be avoided.

The work of the Lord's Day Alliance was chiefly of an educational nature consisting in developing public opinion. It also tried to keep pressure on the authorities. Court cases were avoided as far as possible and it was estimated that practically 90 percent of the cases taken up by the Alliance were settled by mutual agreement out of courts. This method was proving satisfactory.

The law which the Lord's Day Alliance supported forbade all work on the Sabbath except work of necessity and mercy. The act did not forbid sport as long as it was not commercialized. The whole idea was to give everybody a free day. The law was not a religious one or a "blue" law.

The local Lord's Day Alliance Committee will meet this afternoon to consider the local situation and Mr. Huestis will be present at that meeting.

SPRING WEATHER CAUSES ACTIVITY TERRACE RANCHES

TERRACE, April 10.—With the advent of springlike weather considerable activity is taking place in the vicinity prior to the commencement of the strawberry planting season.

Several owners of strawberry ranches arrived on Saturday's train from Prince Rupert to prepare for the coming fruit season, and the depot is packed with new bushes of every description ready for planting. It is the intention of several fruit ranchers to put in raspberries this year in conjunction with strawberries, as past experiments have proven the Terrace soil to be admirably adapted for this class of fruit.

The ice has started to break away in the Skeena river, and there is open water from bank to bank, which permits of good crossing with a rowboat. The ferry is being overhauled and placed on rollers prior to launching for the coming season, which it is anticipated will take place this week.

H. Kilbrath of Hanell, has four men employed cutting out poles in the vicinity of Usk station. This work has been undertaken by private contract and it is expected will take all the summer to complete.

USK MILL IS BEING BUILT

Machinery Being Put in Place and Should Be Ready by June 1.

SHINGLE MILL ALSO

Prince George Man One of Partners in New Industry East of Town.

USK, April 10.—Usk promises to be a busy place this summer. The lumber industry will be active during the summer and regular shipments will be made to the Eastern markets.

The Kleanza Co., Ltd., has commenced work on the assembling and erection of machinery in the new mill. The log carriage has been placed in position and the engine is in place. Circular saws will be installed instead of the hand saw, as was previously intended. The boiler has yet to be bricked in, and this work will be undertaken in the near future. With the completion of preliminary work it is expected the mill will be in operation early in June. There are at the present time over two million feet of logs stacked at the mill. When finally completed the mill will be capable of a 50,000 feet b. m. per day capacity. John Willman, the president and general manager of the company, is at present in the city on company business.

Shingle Industry.
A new shingle mill is to be built on the railway side of the river, some mile and a half east of Usk station, and will be situated on the timber limits owned by the Hayward Lumber Company. Joe Gauthier of Prince George and Joe Colhorn of eastern Canada are partners in this undertaking.

The necessary machinery has been purchased and is enroute to Usk. The cedar rights have been secured by contract from the Hayward Lumber Company. It is the intention of the owners to have the mill in full operation before June. When completed this shingle mill will give employment to some eight or ten men, and will be a welcome acquisition from an industrial standpoint.

MEN FOR LOGGING CAMPS ON ISLANDS TO GO FROM HERE

Arrangements have been made whereby men taken on at the Kelly logging camps at Cumshewa Inlet, Moresby Island, will in future be sent through the local employment bureau instead of through the logging associa-

tion at Vancouver as heretofore. Three men were sent to the Islands on Saturday through the local office.

Three camps employing about sixty men are now running at Cumshewa Inlet and it is possible that two more camps, raising the total number to 100, may start operations before long. However, advice is being awaited from T. A. Kelly, the head of the company, before this will be known definitely.

In the Letter Box

A WARNING.

Editor Daily News:
I see by the Vancouver Province that the Shipmasters' Guild is making another attempt to rob our people of the right to buy and sell service. Of the right to use the waterways "God has given us."

Our small boat fleet now has reached such proportions that the numbers engaged in it outnumber all other sea-faring community.

That they are handled efficiently and safely there can be no question. These same efficient small boatmen will not pay graft, nor could they go up for their examinations and pass. Their time would not count. The association should first see that the food laws are altered so that these same efficient men can secure their tickets, without graft. They should also see that their men sell service instead of being stick-up artists.

No Dry Nurses.

Our dry boatmen do not need dry nurses, nor do the people who use them, and the proper place for those steamship men who do or think their neighbors do is an asylum of the pen.

There is no decent reason why our small boats, being Canadian owned, should not sell service. They cannot sell service without customers. There is no honorable reason why work boats should be at greater disadvantage than pleasure boats or Government boats. The Guild would like to make the performance of service a crime. My contention is that any Canadian who has his money invested in a boat has the right to operate it for the purpose of making a living by selling service, and those who are not willing to sell service in open competition with any other Canadian boats are not good citizens, (one law for all). There should be one straight motor boat law for us all. That law should be based on common sense and the steamship men are the last people who should be allowed to have anything to do with it. Steamship inspectors especially.

Sport Chat

Whether or not daylight saving is to be adopted in this city this summer will probably be decided at tonight's council meeting when the motion of Ald. Kerr calling for the advancing of the clocks one hour after May 1 and until September 30 will be brought forward. The motion will be supported by the letters of 1' St. Andrew's Society and the Sons of Canada, which are already in the hands of the council, asking for the adoption of daylight saving and the favorable resolution passed unanimously by the Board of Trade on Friday. The matter has been receiving a good deal of discussion in the city during the past few days and feeling seems to be rather divided. Sport organizations are pretty well in favor of the change and the St. Andrew's Society, Trades and Labor Council, Sons of England, Board of Trade and Sons of Canada have already gone on record endorsing it. It is a foregone conclusion that both the Baseball and Football Associations will also favor it. The opposition against daylight saving is mainly on the ground that the change of time will make confusion in the city for it is understood that the transportation companies were not adopting it. An opinion seems to be that it would not be adopted locally unless the change is general throughout the country. Many more people would favor it if it could be very long here in the summertime, anyway, the change would be only beneficial in the city during the months of April, May, August and September. Perhaps for that reason alone, however, it would be well to adopt it.

"The Birth of Football" is the title of a very interesting article that appears in a recent issue of the All Sports Weekly, an Old Country athletic publication. The soccer game is said in this article, to have had its origin in Rome and was known in Britain as early as the eleventh century. In the sixteenth century it was a furious, brutal game and English laws were passed prohibiting it. A 1583 writer described it as "a devilish pastime out of which groweth envy, rancour, and malice and sometimes bradling, murder, homicide and great effusion of blood as experience daily teacheth." During the reigns of the Stuarts and the Georges it was allowed but it seemed to have become violent to the point of brutality. In 1830 both sexes and all ages joined in the game, Shrove Tuesday being the favorite day for playing it. As it was played in the streets, shopkeepers and others were forced to bar up their windows as a necessary precaution. About the middle of the nineteenth century the first laws of the game were drawn up and since that time the rules have been modified and altered but the principles laid down then remain today. Out of the chaos of riot and scramble had evolved a scientific and disciplined game, the playing of which is now recognized to be the best teacher of unselfishness and public spirit. Football moulds character—broods men but "looking on" will not help the bull dog British breed—play the game!

TAKE CHARGE OF ALL BOXING IN MONTREAL

Suggestions Made as to Conduct of Contests and Powers of Commission.

MONTREAL, April 10.—Some interesting suggestions for the proposed Montreal boxing commission are contained in the letter sent to the city council by Charles H. Sprieser, which were referred by the aldermen to the commission when it is formed. Mr. Sprieser submitted his ideas as a follower of sport and one with past experience, expressing the opinion that it was in the interest of sport in general, as it was really a shame to think that a large sum of money was being spent by the public without any evening's entertainment being provided for them.

Mr. Sprieser suggested that the commission should consist of seven persons, believing that only four or five would attend the exhibitions of boxing or wrestling. No appointment, he says, should be made from persons holding public positions and that the selections be made only from true lovers of sport and those who understand exhibitions of this nature in every particular, so as to ensure the confidence of the public. The commissioners should give their services without salary or any other remuneration with the exception of the secretary.

To Protect Public.

Previous to bouts being arranged the clubs concerned must present to the commission the names of the contestants prior to advertising or the acceptance of such bouts. The articles of agreement must also be furnished the secretary of the commission, which shall then fix the tax for such exhibition, the fee ranging from \$100 to \$1000. He also suggested that all contestants be examined and weighed by a doctor not later than three o'clock in the afternoon of the day of the exhibition, the doctor to advise the commission as to the fit or unfit condition of the contestants immediately after such examination, and the weight to be announced to the contestants entering the ring.

The commission, Mr. Sprieser suggests, should be given power to stop any and all contests and during such contests if they deem it advisable and in the event of any bout being considered a fake and not in accordance with the agreement, the contestant or contestants of such exhibition should forfeit their end of the purse and the amount handed over by the club concerned. The referees will be under the jurisdiction of the commission.

HOME RULE ALL COUNTRIES

First Step in Ireland Causes Scotland and Wales to Move.

LONDON, April 8.—The birth of the Irish Free State has led to renewed talk in some quarters of "home rule all around," that is, autonomy for Scotland and Wales as apart from England proper.

Home rule for Wales has already entered the range of practical politics, says an article in the Pall Mall Gazette.

Hitherto there have been among Welsh politicians two schools of thought. One has urged the setting up of a Welsh secretariats similar to the office of the Secretary for Scotland, so that Welsh administration may first be disentangled from English affairs; the other favoring a comprehensive home rule scheme without any preliminaries.

Lloyd George Favors.
Prime Minister Lloyd George himself a Welshman, has hinted that he would look with favor on a comprehensive home rule measure.

This prompted the Welsh National Party at Westminster—composed of all the Welsh members of the House of Commons—to draft and adopt a home rule scheme as the basis of a measure to be introduced in Parliament at the earliest opportunity.

This has, in turn, fired the Scottish members, who at a party meeting have appointed a committee to confer with the Welsh members with a view to joint action.

Under the Welsh plan the imperial parliament would reserve its powers on questions affecting the crown, peace and war, foreign affairs, regulation of trade and industrial legislation and postal and other communications.

The company opened up some 10 retail shops in London, and it obtained the lease of a site at Caledonian Market for the purpose of receiving and distributing depot.

The company did not realize their original hopes of success, and within the past few months appeals appear to have been made to shareholders for fresh temporary capital in the form of one-year notes.
