Irish Election Returns Are Delayed INDICATIONS ARE THAT THE REPUBLICANS HAVE LOST GROUND

Victory For Anglo-Irish Treaty Supporters Seems Assured in Irish Election

DUBLIN, June 17.—Complete returns from yesterday's parliamentary elections in South Ireland are not expected before Tuesday night at the earliest, but indications are that the republicans will suffer losses. The chief indication is furnished by the vote at the National University which is announced showing that Dr. Ada English, republican, has been dismissed. She was prominent in the Dail Eirean in resistance to the treaty while Professor McGinnis, who is returned in her stead, was an active supporter of the Anglo-Irish pact.

Treaty candidates for Monaghan, including the independent Thomas McLough appear certain of election.

Dr. Patrick McGarvill, the anti-treaty panel candidate, apparently has received little support in the Clones district.

AMERICAN REALTY MEN VISITED CITY

Party of Thirty, Accompanied by Families, Were Here on Jefferson Last Night.

Thirty real estate men and their families from the Middle States, who have been attending a convention at San Francisco, were in the city last night on the steamer Jefferson. They were on their return south after making the round trip to Skagway on the Admiral Line steamer and were pleased at the opportunity given by the long stay of the vessel here to get ashore and see Prince Rupert. The Jefferson did not get away until 6:15 this morning.

IMMIGRANTS OF RIGHT KIND

Vote in Commons Passed After House Was Given Assurance By Minister

OTTAWA, June 17.—The right kind of immigrants for this country are to be chosen, according to the minister of immigration, who made a promise in the House of Commons yesterday that care would be taken in selection of those brought to this country from Europe.

The discussion took place during the debate on an item of \$1,170,000 in the estimates for immigration purposes. The vote carried after the House was assured the money would be well spent.

KILLED AND INJURED BY WISCONSIN STORM

ST. PAUL, June 17.—Rain, wind and hail storm in western Wisconsin last night killed six people and did much property damage. One hundred people were injured.

WAGES CUT ON RAILWAY

United States Board Make Reduction Bringing Total to \$135,000,000 a Year.

CHICAGO, June 17.—Pruning nearly \$27,000,000 from the annual payroll of 325,000 employees by cutting the wages of the clerks and signalmen and stationary firemen from two to six cents an hour, the United States Railway Board announced another wage cut making total reductions under the order of the board of \$135,000,000 beginning on July 1.

LOCATION FOR HIGH COMMISSIONER IN LONDON DISCUSSED

LONDON, June 17.—It is understood that the Canadian government's tentative proposal to acquire the Grand Trunk Pacific office building in London as headquarters for the Canadian High Commissioner's staff has been decided upon.

The latest suggested location for the High Commissioner is in the British Columbia office building in Regent Street.

TACOMA PARTY WILL CRUISE DOWN COAST

Party of Business Men and Wives Arrive From South to Board Yacht "Vamoose."

Mr. and Mrs. Harry Fisher, Mr. and Mrs. Vaughan Morrill, Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Love, and F. S. Baker, all of Tacoma, arrived from the south on the Prince Rupert this morning. They will board their gasoline yacht, "Vamoose," which arrived recently from Ketchikan, and will sail on it down the coast returning home by easy stages. The gentlemen of the party are prominent Tacoma business men.

VESSEL TURNED OVER CREW ARE MISSING

HAMBURG, June 17.—Eleven members of the crew of the Brazilian are missing following the turnover of the vessel while being hauled out of the drydock. One hundred and twenty men were rescued.

GRAVE WARNING BISHOP SWEENEY

Issues Call to Ministers to Apply Remedies to Present Social Conditions

TORONTO, June 17.—A note of grave warning of the existence of social evils threatening the spiritual life of the Church, and a clear call to ministers and laymen to walk worthy of their high calling as stewards of the mysteries of God, was sounded by Right Rev. J. F. Sweeney, Bishop of Toronto, in delivering his charge at the annual meeting of the Synod of the Diocese of Toronto, which opened in St. James' Parish House.

One of the worst evils that his Lordship saw in the life of today was the growing tendency of visitors and tourists to neglect the services of the Church on Sundays. Such a condition, he said, was one to be deeply deplored.

Of existing social conditions he said: "There are conditions existing in our social order that are imperilling the morals, and therefore the spiritual life of our young people—the too free and easy intercourse between the sexes, both in business and social life, is a distinct peril to both; the immodesty of dress, the challenge to the flesh, is another distinct and grave peril to both. The yearly opportunities provided for race-track gambling, which fosters the desire and feeds the craving and leads so often to downfall and the portals of the penitentiary. The unhealthy excitement, and consequent incitement to crime, by lurid films put on by moving picture concerns, these are a few of the deadly unseen influences and perils which often end in ghastly tragedy in our modern social life, several painful illustrations of which have recently transpired in our midst.

Expose Evils
"Let our Council for Social Service, the machinery for putting into effect 'Applied Christianity,' get at and expose these evils, and call on the whole Church to assist in their eradication, for these Councils exist solely to give vital effect to the leaven of Christianity in the community, and to secure for it that practical expression of it which is in accordance with His will."

SKIRMISHER CLEARED FOR SOUTH YESTERDAY

The Canadian Government Merchant Marine freighter Canadian Skirmisher, Captain H. S. Hilton, moved out of the dry dock yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock and, after tying up alongside the Imperial Oil wharf and loading from a scow alongside 300 cases of salmon from the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. for Australia, cleared for Vancouver at 6:45 with Capt. Duncan McKenzie, G. G. M. M. coast pilot, on the bridge. The Skirmisher will complete loading in the south for her third voyage to Australasia.

LONGER STAY FOR VISITORS

Board of Trade Asks Captain Nicholson to Have Excursion Boats Arrive Here an Hour Earlier.

The council of the Board of Trade, at a special meeting yesterday afternoon, instructed the secretary to send a telegram to Captain G. H. Nicholson, manager of the Grand Trunk Pacific Coast Steamship Co., asking that the steamers Prince George and Prince Rupert arriving next week with Rotary and Shrine excursionists be speeded up so that they may arrive here one hour earlier than had ordinarily been intended. This action was taken in view of the fact that the present itineraries provide for only a half hour stay in the city which would allow the visitors no chance of getting around and seeing the town. It is understood that the Rotary Club is making a similar request in regard to the Prince George on Wednesday which is bringing a party of 250 New York Rotarians.

A telegram was received this morning from Capt. Nicholson, manager of the Canadian National Coast Services in reply to a telegram stating that the Prince Rupert would arrive an hour earlier than usual wind and tide permitting on Thursday next to allow time to show the visitors the city.

PORT ARTHUR, June 17.—All next week and part of the following week the highbrows of the world of women will be visitors in this city and at Fort William for the 29th annual meeting of the Council of Women. Most of the visitors will be women reformers, those who take a prominent part in women's societies, the leaders of the groups that pass resolutions and are generally in the public eye.

The president is Mrs. W. F. Sanford of Hamilton and among the vice-presidents who will be here are Miss Carmichael of New Glasgow and Mr. Stowe Gullen of Toronto, both of whom are nominees for the national presidency. Prominent among those invited is Mary Ellen Smith, M. P. of Vancouver, Mrs. Nellie McClung has sent regrets.

JEFFERSON WAS HERE LAST EVENING WITH SHIPMENT OF HERRING

The Admiral Line steamer Jefferson made her first appearance in this port for many years last evening when she arrived at 8:15 with four carloads of mild cured herring from Port Walter, Alaska, for transshipment over the Canadian National Railway to New York. The Jefferson spent several hours at No. 2 G. T. P. shed unloading her cargo and then pulled out for Seattle.

DOLLY VARDEN MINE MAY REOPEN SOON

VANCOUVER, June 17.—There is a probability of the Dolly Varden mine at Alice Arm opening up again. The foreclosure proceedings against the company are going on and the defendants have not put in a defence. The mortgage is for \$200,000 given by George Wingfield of Reno.

The understanding here is that as soon as the foreclosure proceedings have been completed, work will recommence on the properties possibly on the Wolf as well as the Dolly Varden.

GERMANY PAID HER INSTALLMENT OF 50,000,000 MARKS

PARIS, June 17.—Germany yesterday paid her regular monthly installment of 50,000,000 gold marks for reparations.

BENNETT LOSES HIS ELECTION APPEAL

Capt. J. T. Shaw Confirmed in West Calgary Federal Seat.

OTTAWA, June 17.—The supreme court this morning confirmed Capt. J. T. Shaw, sitting member for West Calgary, in his seat. The appeal of Hon. R. B. Bennett, Conservative candidate and former Minister of Justice in the Meighen government, was dismissed with costs.

MORE HERRING FROM ALASKA DUE TODAY

Cannery Tender Einar Beyer Bringing Four Carloads to This Port for Transshipment

The Alaskan cannery tender, Einar Beyer, was due in port last night at midnight from Port Walter with five carloads of mild cured herring for transshipment over the Canadian National Railway. The vessel had not arrived late this morning, however, and is now expected this afternoon. This will be the third vessel to arrive this week with a similar cargo for this port.

SHIPPING EGGS TO ANTIPODES

VICTORIA, June 17.—The first shipment of eggs from this coast to the Antipodes left this port yesterday on the Makura. The consignment consisted of 1,200 dozen and should it prove successful will be followed by others. The Makura sailed for Australian and New Zealand ports with stops at Honolulu and Fiji Islands.

American Newspapers in Support of Constitution of The Irish Free State

NEW YORK, June 17.—The constitution of the Irish Free State demonstrates Great Britain's sincerity and generosity and should be acceptable to every Irish citizen who has his country's real interest at heart. This is the general tenor of editorial comment in the New York papers today on the document which is expected to bring about an era of peace in Ireland.

The Tribune declares that had Britain granted the American colonies a measure of independence compared to that granted in Ireland, there would have been no revolution.

PRELATE SEARCHED BY IRISH POLICE

BELFAST, June 17.—Cardinal Logue, primate of Ireland and his coadjutor, Archbishop O'Donnell, were again held up by members of the Ulster constabulary last night, when the automobile in which he was riding was stopped at Newry by the patrol.

This is the third time the prelate has been stopped and searched.

BUILDING EXPERTS ARRIVING TODAY

Architect Whittaker Arrived from Victoria Today—Jeffers Expected Tonight.

H. Whittaker, government architect, who is to make an inspection of the Booth Memorial School construction, arrived from Victoria on the Prince Rupert this morning. A. M. Jeffers, the Edmonton building expert, whom the school board has engaged, will arrive this evening from the east. The reports of these two experts will be dealt with by the school board in the course of a few days it is expected.

OLD COUPLE KILLED

Outrages Continue in Ulster; Houses of Loyalists Burned

BELFAST, June 17.—Four men and one woman were shot and killed this morning in the vicinity of Bessbrook. The houses of three loyalists were burned. Those killed were a man and his son and an aged couple who were slain together and a young man.

FURTHER SUSPENSION CROW'S NEST AGREEMENT

OTTAWA, June 17.—Further suspension of the Crows' Nest Pass agreement is considered inevitable in lobby discussions in regard to the probable verdict on railway rates. The committee meets again on Monday to consider the verdict.

STOLE FROM BANK

AURORA, June 17.—An unmasked bearded robber yesterday held up the state bank and escaped with \$1,155.

G. A. Mackenzie, who bonded the Prince John group at Stewart this spring from James Nesbitt and Andy Archie, is in the city today on the Prince Rupert enroute north. Development operations on the Prince John group will commence at an early date under Mr. Mackenzie's supervision.

EXCURSION TO PRINCE RUPERT

Vancouver Board of Trade Would Like to Meet Local Organization.

Vancouver Board of Trade writes the local board that it hopes to visit this city in July and would like to meet the local organization. The following is the letter:

Mental Defectives
Are Not Insane.

The word "moron," which criminologists as well as newspaper headline writers frequently use to designate a person of morbidly criminal tendencies, is defined in a bulletin issued by the State Charities Aid Association.

"Moron," they say, comes from the Greek "moros," meaning "fool." And the word, as applied by psychiatrists and mental specialists, means just that—"fool."

It is not applied to insane persons, to lunatics, imbeciles or idiots, but to the considerable percentage of the population whose limited reasoning power places them on the great border-line of mental deficiency.

Before the word "moron" came into general use such persons were called "defectives." They were those who, if left to shift for themselves, usually became "liabilities to society."

Figuring from statistics gathered by army draft boards the state association estimates that there are 45,000 mental defectives—morons—in New York State today. This would indicate, says the report, that one person in every 250 is mentally deficient and incapable of passing sound judgments as to what is right or wrong.

Of this number, 5,200 are in state institutions, 500 are in colonies attached to such institutions; and 7,500 are enrolled in special classes in public schools. This leaves some 34,000 without any special supervision—at large in all walks of life. Describing the defective, the charities association says:

"He is often unable to adjust himself to permanent employment and is habitually changing his job. He is tremendously responsive to suggestion and is thus particularly susceptible to the criminal influence of others."

"Nearly all of the attempts at assassination of prominent men in recent years and of criminal assaults with a sexual phase have been the work of mental defectives. A moron killed President McKinley and another tried to kill Roosevelt. A moron tried to kill Mayor Mitchell and shoot Corporation Counsel Polk. Mayor Gaynor was shot by another defective."

There is a distinct difference between mental deficiency and insanity, it is pointed out. They have little in common. Insanity is a mental disease which is curable in at least 25 per cent of cases and preventable in 40 per cent.

Morons Always
Are Incurable.

A moron or mental defective is a person who definitely lacks brain capacity. The condition usually is inherited and cannot be cured, for, say the psychiatrists, "Science cannot add what nature has omitted." In other words, an adult moron is just a man or woman with the brain of a child.

The schools are considered the best sorting pen for the discovery of the defectives. There he automatically is separated from the children of normal intelligence. Perhaps he progresses to the sixth grade without displaying any lack of the power to absorb knowledge. Then he falls behind. He doesn't seem able to learn any more; his classmates go on, while he remains, vainly trying to absorb his lessons, but without success.

Should he continue in school at this time the chances are he will become an incorrigible—the sort of over-grown bully who far outstrips his playmates in size and strength, but who is a dwarf in the classroom. Or if he leaves school he is apt to join the class of easily-led criminals, unguided by any sense of right or wrong, wholly irresponsible, who go from misdemeanor to felony and thence to the electric chair or to Mattewan.

At the period of arrested development psychiatrists claim to be able to pick out the defectives by their reaction to certain simple questions, included in the Binet-Simon measuring scale of intelligence.

One test is known as "Detecting Absurdities." Here the examiner may say, "Yesterday the police found the body of a girl cut into 18 pieces. They believe she killed herself."

The sub-normal, the defective or "moron" will probably react with this exclamation: "Think she killed herself! They know she did." Or it may be, "She was a foolish girl to kill herself. No girl would do that unless she was crazy."

Where Do All
Defectives Come From?

Where do the defective come from? Are they just accidents of birth? The answer to this question is best illustrated in the story of the Kallakaks.

About 1770 Martin Kallakak, a young man of good family who was serving in George Washington's army, met a feeble-minded girl and became the father of a feeble-minded son. Later he married a normal woman. The history of the two families that go back to Martin Kallakak have been accurately traced.

The feeble-minded woman had 480 descendants, most of whom have been paupers, criminals, immoral women and drunkards. The normal woman had about an equal number of descendants, all of whom have been worthy members of their communities and some of whom have attained to positions of public eminence.

Given a chance, however, the moron often becomes a useful member of society. Sometimes he displays a rare aptitude for the simpler branches of mechanics. Usually it is something manual although cases have been known of mental defectives who displayed rare talents with palette and brush.

Well, the wedding season is once more upon us (no, please don't misunderstand us again, we mean generally) (Nothin' doin'; one and three over, is our limit. Ed.). To turn to the inside pages of the Canadian papers and the outside pages of the illustrated English dailies is enough to dazzle the eyes of a mere male with feminine beauty depicted in the most bewitching poses (—or are we confusing weddings and bathing beaches?) appalled in diaphanous creations.

The faces of the brides are always shown by the camera as possessing an angelic repose—It may have been a hard and harassing struggle to work him up to the sticking point, but once the day was arranged, the sweet confidence in "The Man" engenders an expression of beatific assurance which will carry the dear thing through to the wedding cake.

Ah! we think, they must indeed be gods who win such prizes as these fair lilies, these Venuses! With what dashing debonair they must have swept aside every obstacle. How their masterful victorious faces must be suffused with the flush of victory!

It is seldom that in a Canadian paper one gets a picture of the bridegroom. Quite right, this is the bride's day, her feast, and she is the "piece de resistance," the entire "belle of fair," as it were.

But occasionally we get a glimpse of the man in the case, and what a horrible shock it is, what a shattering of idols.

If the idol has not feet of clay he certainly has a face of tallow. And what can you expect of tallow in June? It has slipped, of course.

The picture shows him—the thing they are mating to this glorious creature—with a ghastly imbecile smile on a tallowy countenance which has already wilted and sagged badly in the summer sun.

The same agent has affected his candle-arms, which hang about six inches below the knees, whilst his candle-legs look as though one leg had been bent backwards and the other sideways in the heat.

And the thought comes to us, do all men actually look like that? Have we been viewing our fellow men through rose-tinted glasses? Do men assume that look for their weddings only, or is it after all, their usual expression?

SONS OF CANADA DEFEAT GROTTO

First Half.

The Wasps won the toss and took the field on the down grade. The play was of a wide open description from the centre, both sides taking equal spells with the ball. Scott, in goal for the Sons was soon called upon to clear, and he made a good save. During the latter part of the game the Wasps set the pace to a speedy tune and it was not for the want of trying that they were not successful in notching an equalizer. However, the defence of the Canadians was up to standard and they kept their custodian well covered, and the game terminated in a 4-0 win in favor of the Sons of Canada.

Davis and Anderson in the halfback line worked hard and were always on the job when wanted. Marks in the forward line was dangerous on many occasions and played well.

A. Clapperton and W. Martin performed the linesmen's duties satisfactorily.

With their victory on Thursday evening the Sons have gained a footing in the standing at .333 and have brought the Knights of Columbus down to .667 with the Elks midway between with one loss and one victory. The next game is scheduled for next Friday evening between the Sons and the Elks. A victory for the former would give them a standing of .500 and would put the Elks at .333 while a victory for the Elks would put them on even footing at the top with the Knights. EXAMINATIONS WILL SOON BE STARTING IN VARIOUS SCHOOLS

Students in the various schools of the city who must pass examinations in order to qualify for promotion will soon be writing off their tests.

Next week at the High School 75 pupils will commence writing examinations set by the teachers. This number includes 35 in the preliminary course, junior grade, 22 in the advanced course and 17 in the commercial classes. The University of B. C. matriculation examinations start on Saturday, June 24, there being 22 candidates from the High School and four or five outside for these tests.

Waterfront Whiffs

Doings of the Mosquito Fleet Which Is the Chief Source of Prince Rupert's Prosperity

No one is downhearted along the waterfront these days and the Admiral of the Mosquito fleet reports that his merry men are in an optimistic mood. While locally we have been experiencing unseasonably cold weather, the weather on the deep sea fishing grounds has been real hot, according to reports. One skipper stated that the rays of the sun had melted the tar on the roof of his pilot house. This goes to show that the fishermen do sometimes get compensations in their otherwise dangerous calling.

During the week, seventeen carloads of the best halibut in the world have been shipped over the Canadian National lines comprising some 322,000 pounds, while only 3,000 pounds of salmon has been marketed.

The small supply of salmon is accounted for by the fact that in local waters the temperature has been on the cold side thus having a detrimental effect upon the run.

The highest price paid for fish during the week was 9.80c and 4c, and the lowest 6c and 3c.

The Pioneer floating cannery at Ketchikan is now running full blast. This cannery was acquired some time ago by the Stuart Packing Company. A new exhaust box has been installed and the equipment has been thoroughly overhauled.

The Prince Rupert Yacht Club was agog with excitement on Thursday morning. Soon after 9 o'clock a gang of happy youngsters put in an appearance "armed to the teeth" with parcels of sandwiches, cakes, etc., the occasion being the High School picnic. Several launches pulled out before 10 o'clock filled to the skylights for Digby Island. Principal J. C. Brady was in charge aboard the Orlando, and appeared to be having the time of his life.

The Macdonald Shellfish Co. of Seal Cove has suspended business permanently, and are disposing of their plant.

The Joe Baker, Captain Lund, is undergoing hull repairs on the Ketchikan gridiron.

The Tug Tepic arrived from Vancouver on Tuesday with 100 tons of coal in tow for Albert & McCaffery.

R. Davis, secretary for Albert & McCaffery, who has been in the south on a combined pleasure and business trip, will return to the city on Wednesday next.

Two small boys were venturing on their way to a trout stream.

The Provincial, Captain Larsen left on Thursday for the Beaver cannery at Rivers Inlet where she will engage in the fish packing business for some two months.

Captain A. Swanson left on Thursday afternoon for the Skeena River on a private business trip.

Bob Hanna and the crew of the Seattle power boat Sueja were the guests of honor on Wednesday night at a smoking concert given by the civil lords of the Mosquito fleet admiralty.

The musical program was opened by C. Thayer and his dog who gave a remarkably fine duet entitled "Tales of a Whining Weiner" which was heartily applauded. The engineer of the Sueja proved himself an expert domino tictler and introduced some new melodies to his local audience. Bob was scheduled to sing "O Darling I Am Getting Cold" but unfortunately the aforementioned dog chewed up the music and as a substitute he gave a political talk with his feet, his step dancing being very much appreciated. Refreshments were served continuously in fact Bob said it was the nearest approach to perpetual motion that he had struck yet. Bob Ogilvie stated that if he could sing as well as he thought he could he would have much pleasure in officiating, but unfortunately the cat was mothering kittens in his piano at home and he was not used to strange accompaniments. 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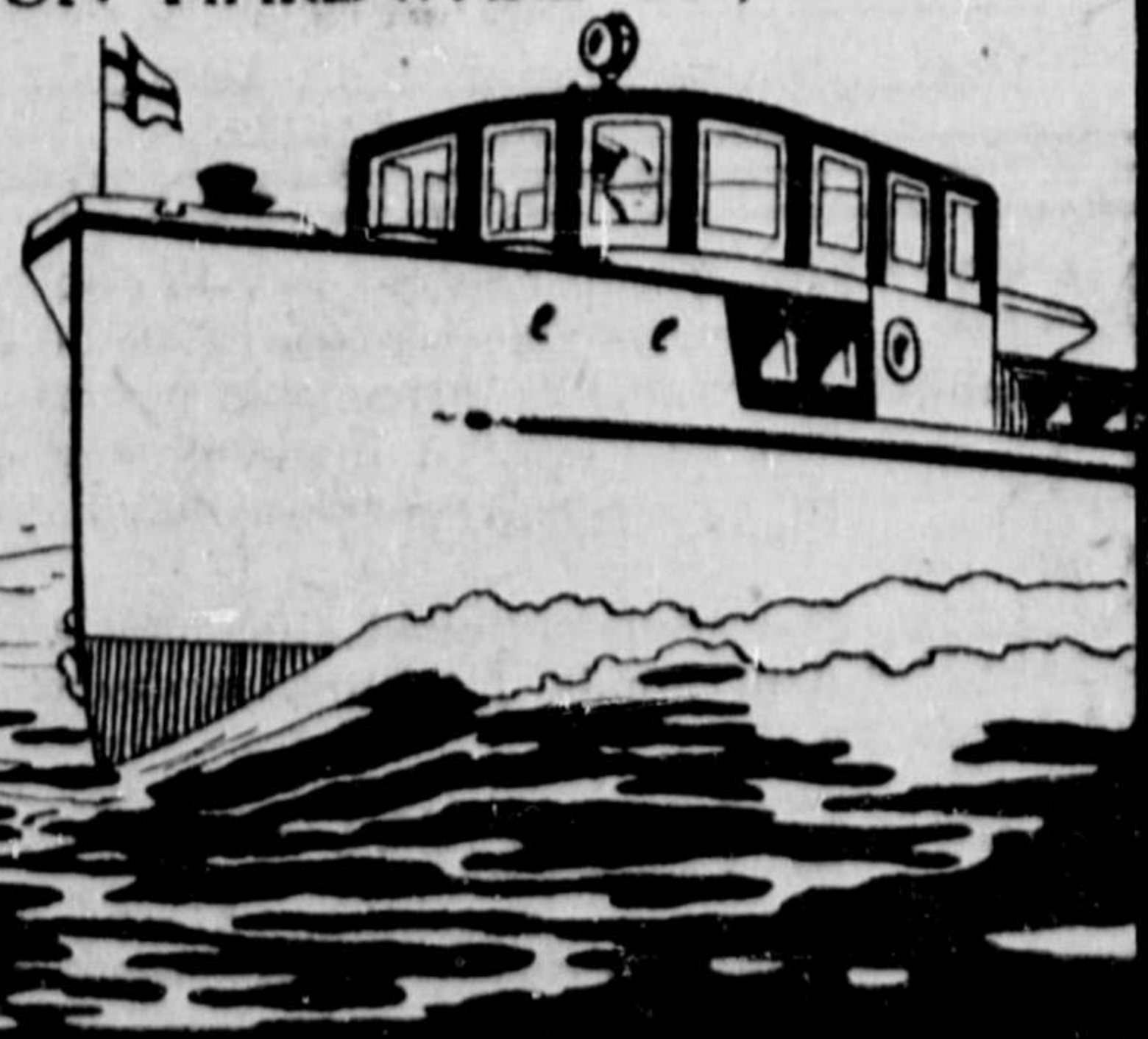
