## Assassination of German Statesman COMPLETE REPORT ON SCHOOL BY TWO EXPERT ARCHITECTS

### Booth School Safe but Needs Ten to Fifteen Thousand Dollars Spent on it to Make First Class Building

That the Booth Memorial School is not and never was in as serious condition as was generally supposed and that there is not danger in its being occupied was agreed upon by A. M. Jeffers, Edmonton architect and hollow tile building expert, and H. Whittaker, provincial government architect, who submitted their reports on the building to the School Board last night following the examinations that have been made by them during the past week. The fire walls, they agree, are in bad condition and should be rebuilt, and auditorium wall should be re-inforced, certain floor slabs should be strengthened, the pointings of the whole building should be gone over and renewed, floors should be strengthened if they are to be put in proper shape for strenuous use, certain further flashings should be done in the roof and the entire walls of the building should be waterproofed.

### SETTLEMENT OF RAILWAY RATES

Reached Last Night by Private  
Committee of House of Commons.

OTTAWA, June 24.—A settlement was reached last night on the railway rate problem which is said to be based on the granting of the Crow's Nest Pass agreement rate on all grains while the rest of the agreement remains in suspension. This settlement was reached in private committee and is not yet submitted to the House.

### BRITISH POLITICAL SITUATION IS TENSE

Indignation of People May Bring  
About an Election

LONDON, June 24.—The probable effect of the assassination of Field Marshal Wilson on the political situation attracts attention today and all newspapers speculate as to the position of the British government in view of the outburst of anger in parliament at the withdrawal of protection for prominent men. Intense indignation over the murder is mingled with a widespread feeling that it should have been prevented. Monday's session of the Commons may see the defection of a large number of coalition unionists who hitherto supported the Government's Irish policy but who are more than ever inclined to attach themselves to the "die hards."

### FINAL SCENES IN MASONIC CONVENTION

Visitors leave at Midnight After  
Spending Day in Enjoyment.

APPRECIATE VISIT  
Mayor Tisdall Expresses Confidence in Future of Prince Rupert.

Amid farewell cheers, singing of farewell choruses and shouts from ship and shore the fine C. P. R. Steamship Princess Charlotte pulled out from the Grand Trunk Pacific dock at midnight last night bearing away the visiting Masons who had spent three days in the city enjoying the hospitality of the various Masonic lodges of the city and district. It was a great sight and the local people were full of regrets at the departure of guests who had been so appreciative of their reception. So ended the 1922 Grand Lodge convention.

In Special Train.  
Yesterday afternoon a special train bore the visitors and their friends from the station to Seal Cove where all the processes of curing for the fish were seen at the cold storage plant. Fish, halibut and red salmon were being discharged at the cold storage dock and the visitors were intensely interested in the process of packing and freezing. They were extended the courtesies by Manager Johnson and Comptroller Nicholls.

At the shipyard they were taken in charge by J. H. Pillsbury and shown everything. Surprise at the completeness of the plant was expressed and the visitors were, as one man expressed it, "keener than ever on getting that drydock taken to Vancouver."

Hosts to Rupertiles.  
In the evening the visitors were hosts to the local masons and their friends aboard the Princess Charlotte. Entertainments were conducted simultaneously in two rooms of the ship. H. M. Duggan of Victoria was the moving spirit with conjuring tricks and other forms of entertainment and a mock trial was conducted by another group. Singing and short speeches punctuated the proceedings and there was much hilarity which continued until a short time before the boat pulled out.

Mayor Tisdall, when seen by a Daily News representative, expressed on behalf of the visitors appreciation of the hospitality which had been shown them. They had had a wonderful time, he said he had visited Prince Rupert on several occasions but at that time the people here were living on capital coming in from the outside. Now they were developing their own resources and the development was on a sound basis.

He saw great things in store for the port.

Stephen Jones, speaking for Victoria, expressed deep appreciation of the way they had been received. Everyone had enjoyed it to the full.

Local Viewpoint.  
C. H. Orme, who had charge of the proceeding here, said he felt that the convention had been a great success. Both the local lodges and those of the district had extended the best welcome they could to the visitors and he felt it had been appreciated. The city would stand to gain much from the visit which had proved a revelation to many.

EXPORT LIQUOR IS  
TO BE STOPPED IN  
OCTOBER THIS YEAR  
OTTAWA, June 24.—The amendment to the Canada Temperance Act empowering the provinces to prohibit the export of liquor will not become effective until October so as to permit private trading companies to dispose of their stocks.

### CONTRACT LET CLEAR RIVER

Jamb to be Removed on Yakoun,  
Queen Charlottes, by Arthur  
Robertson

PORT CLEMENTS, June 24.—Arthur Robertson of this place has secured the contract for removing the large log jamb on the Yakoun River. This river is the main waterway for the salmon visiting the islands. In the past the spawning grounds at Yakoun lake were not accessible to a large number of the fish of all varieties entering the principal river on the Queen Charlotte Islands. It has been remarked that the sockeye salmon visit this lake earlier than the run commences on any other river.

This year the sockeye run has been remarkably large, an indication that the run on the larger rivers will be up to expectations.

### MECCA SHRINERS WERE HERE FOR SHORT TIME

One Hundred and Thirteen New  
Yorkers Spent an Hour in  
Town This Morning.

One hundred and thirteen Shriners of Mecca Temple, New York, were in the city this morning for an hour. They arrived on the Prince George and left at noon on their special train for the East. Many of them called on U. S. Consul Wakefield. Local Shriners were at the steamer with their red caps to receive the visitors and show them about during their brief stay.

### FISH BOAT WRECKS

HALIFAX, June 24.—The Gloucester schooner Puritan, prospective international racer, was wrecked on Shale Island. Seven men reached shore and fifteen are missing.

### German Foreign Minister Assassinated in Berlin by Nationalist Plotter

BERLIN, June 24.—Dr. Walter Rathenau, German minister of foreign affairs, was assassinated this morning. He was shot and instantly killed as he was leaving the residence for the foreign office in an automobile. The assassin escaped.

The murderer, who was driving a motor car, slowed up as he was nearing Rathenau and fired twice at the minister, both shots taking immediate fatal effect.

The assassination followed a hard attack on the foreign minister by Dr. Karl Helfferich in the Reichstag yesterday when the nationalist leader grilled the government generally and Rathenau in particular concerning the cabinet's repatriation policy and its attitude toward the populations of the Rhineland and Saar Valley.

### Damage very Great Prairie Provinces Result big Storm

WINNIPEG, June 24.—Incalculable damage has been done to the crops in Manitoba in the districts swept by the big storm on Friday morning. They are utterly destroyed in the Portage Plains district. Hail was the chief trouble in the country districts, many barns being battered to splinters and cattle killed.

Manitoba is just beginning to recover from the effect of the disastrous visitation. It not only swept Manitoba but also the contiguous sections of Saskatchewan and Ontario. Buildings were destroyed, trees uprooted and all wire communications were cut off. Two big elevators were set on fire.

A little girl named Spence was killed when a house in Portage la Prairie fell. A small boy named Rice grasped a live wire in Winnipeg and died. A baby boy was killed at Lyndiatt, Manitoba, and the mother named Kormie was injured when the house fell. Station buildings, freight cars and every imaginable building in the path of the storm, suffered. The damage in Portage district alone will be two million dollars.

The small casualty list is the biggest surprise of the checkup which proceeds slowly under the crippled communications. Many miles of telephone and telegraph wires were destroyed and it will be days before they are completely restored.

SASKATOON, June 24.—No high winds are reported from any part of the district surrounding Saskatoon. During yesterday heavy rains fell intermittently, ceasing at about 5 o'clock. The land has been thoroughly drenched, which, according to farmers, is a consummation sorely needed. The weather has now cleared and is warm and bright. Nothing approaching a hurricane is reported from anywhere in the vicinity.

### LABOR FEDERATION AGAIN REFUSES TO RECOGNIZE SOVIET

CINCINNATI, June 24.—For the third successive year, the American Federation of Labor today placed itself on record by action of its convention as against the recognition of Soviet Russia.

### SCHOOL BOARD THIS MORNING

Heating Report Received—Architects Staying Over to Further  
Plan Work to Be Done.

The School Board met again this morning and, after receiving the report of Architects Jeffers and Whittaker on the ventilation and heating system of the Booth School and further discussing the general reports submitted last night, adjourned until 4:30 Monday afternoon, when another meeting will be held to prepare a report on remedies to the school for submission to the city council on Monday evening. Mr. Jeffers and Mr. Whittaker have been requested to remain over until after Monday in order to give further advice on the program of reconstruction as recommended in their reports. Mr. Jeffers indicated that he would be willing to remain but Mr. Whittaker advised the board that he would have to wire Victoria to ascertain if it is possible for him to stay.

Report on Heating.  
The report on the heating of the school recommends that the present boilers be replaced or connected up with each other, that the intake of fresh air be reduced and that the radiation be increased. There are also other recommendations. It was shown that the heating plant had not been installed according to specifications. The cost of putting it into efficient and economical shape was estimated at \$2,000 for general alterations and \$5,000 for new boiler.

The general report on the school was again discussed and the architects were asked for more definite and detailed recommendations so that the work may be proceeded with as soon as possible. The board will formulate its plan and submit it to the council. Mr. Jeffers said that it would be an easy matter to have the school ready for occupation by next term. The work of tearing down and rebuilding the fire walls would possibly take about four weeks and the other work recommended could be carried out at the same time.

### SCHOOL TEACHERS ARE COMING HERE SOON

The personally conducted party of school teachers will be in the city on the evening of July 5 and will leave for the south at midnight on July 6. Some of them may make the trip to Anxoy but it is expected most of them will come in on a special train and most of the berths on the south-bound steamer have been taken by them. These teachers come from the prairies both Canada and U.S.

### BOOTH SCHOOL SAFE BUT NEEDS TEN TO FIFTEEN THOUSAND DOLLARS SPENT ON IT TO MAKE FIRST CLASS BUILDING.

joists, or bottom of the archi-  
trave, but from these levels the  
upper walls (including the Audi-  
torium walls) should be taken  
down and properly rebuilt and  
then waterproofed.

I have tested a brick (as a fair  
sample) for absorption and find  
that they will take up about six  
oz. of water which is about 15  
per cent of their weight. This  
amount of water is not exces-  
sive and indicates a good quality  
of brick.

### Floor Slabs

5. The corridor slabs of con-  
crete are of sufficient strength,  
but in their design the reinforce-  
ment bars should have been of  
greater area per linear foot of  
span in order to insure against  
practice. The ground floor slab  
should be strengthened at the  
centre hall space. The roof slab  
of concrete over the coal room  
is not well designed for reasons  
given above and I recommend  
that this slab be strengthened  
and this recommendation is made  
after knowing that heavy loads  
have been taken over the slab.

6. A brick heading course is  
specified for every tenth course,  
but for some unknown reason  
was not put in. Had this been  
done a better bonding between  
face bricks and tile wall would  
have resulted. The method used  
for bonding, i.e., a leaded brick,  
is the custom in many places and  
is the standard practice of many  
architects.

### Water in Basement

7. This drainage of water in  
the basement and taking out the  
muskog has not been done and  
apparently was never expected to  
be done. The existing conditions  
have a deteriorating effect on the  
uses of the building, as the  
dampness will rise and be dis-  
tributed through the building,  
giving a chilly feeling alike to  
pupils and teachers and in the  
winter months will show as frost  
on the windows.

The draining of the areas at  
the rear has not been done and  
backfilling work has not been  
completed in many places.

8. Fire escapes have not been  
installed and apparently no pro-  
visions have been made for se-  
curing them to the building.

9. The steel sashes in many  
instances are not weather proof  
as to glazing and I believe from  
appearances that they are not all  
weather proof in their setting.

### Unusual Specifications

10. Joists, etc. are specified  
No. 1 Fir or Hemlock or Spruce.

This is an unusual manner to  
specify for quality in framing  
lumber and I found that spruce  
joists have generally, if not al-  
together been used. The floor  
construction of all rooms is safe  
for their intended uses but do  
not compare favorably with the  
standards of the best practices.  
The doubling of joists under  
partitions was not called for and  
was not done, but should have  
been, as some, if not all, of the  
floors have a decided dip at the  
cloak room partitions. These  
floors are out of level in most of  
the rooms. This is because they  
were constructed in that manner  
and not because of any special  
weakness. If dancing is to be  
allowed then the floors must be  
strengthened.

11. Railings were specified  
for certain stairs but in only  
one place have they been instal-  
led. No particular harm has  
been done by these omissions,  
but if they were in position,  
some pupil may be saved a nasty  
fall from a fall by being able  
to grasp the rail to prevent such  
an occurrence.

12. The floors and bases of  
cloak rooms are in a miserable  
condition and should be replaced  
with wood.

### Exterior Walls

13. The exterior walls of the  
ground floor were specified to  
be built with sheared steel  
lath, but this was not done and  
instead plastering material was  
applied directly to the tile walls.  
This method of plastering is  
good practice, but in this part  
of the work the walls should have  
been waterproofed before being  
plastered.

14. On account of the con-  
struction of the roof boarding  
at the eaves of the Auditorium  
roof it was not possible to pro-  
perly lay the asphalt shingles  
and as a result some water finds  
its way into the brickwork be-  
low. This part of the work  
should be corrected at once.

15. The flashing and counter  
flashing of the main cornice and  
architrave under same was not  
done as specified and it was not  
required by the architects' de-  
tails. Plastic cement as speci-  
fied was not used to point up  
these flashings. Both of these  
omissions contribute greatly to  
the easy penetration of rain  
water into the parapet walls.

### Iron Work and Roof

16. The unexposed surfaces  
of the galvanized iron work are  
not painted as is required by  
the specifications. This omission  
is not vital but if done would  
materially extend the life of the  
cornice and gutter works. A  
part of the gutter at the rear of  
the center building is leaking  
and all gutters at the edge of the  
gravel roofs are more or less  
filled with pitch and gravel.

They should be cleaned so as to  
not retard the flow of water  
which they are intended to take  
care of.

This part of the works i.e. gal-  
vanized iron, carries a two year  
guarantee clause which should  
be noted by you.

The gravel roofing work is ex-  
cellent and I have never seen its  
equal. It carries a ten year  
guarantee clause and it should  
last for at least thirty years.

17. In conclusion, I believe  
it is right that I should mention  
that your building has been well  
planned and its facade is har-  
monious. The construction is  
fairly well throughout and is  
generally satisfactory except as  
follows:

### Unstable Wall

The wall on the second floor  
between the Auditorium and cor-  
ridor is not stable and should  
have additional supports by way  
of piers to ensure the necessary  
stiffness to make this a load  
bearing wall as it now is and  
was designed as such; there are  
not enough supports under the  
floor of the manual training  
room to prevent vibration when  
the various machines are operat-  
ing.

17. The "Rubble Wall" of the  
ground storey is not the old time  
rubble wall which was in general  
use before rock concrete came  
into universal use as it is today.  
I believe however, that you have  
a first class wall in every re-  
spect and one that is equal in  
strength to any type of wall con-  
struction other than first class  
concrete work. It is a local con-  
ception and deserves favorable  
consideration from your citizens  
in their building projects when-  
ever it is practical to make use  
of it.

### Poor Workmanship

The workmanship displayed by  
the brick laying results is not  
generally a credit to the masons  
engaged on the works but more  
particularly the upper half.  
Some of the unsightly work  
should be cut out and be rebuilt  
wherever it is practical or ab-  
solutely necessary to do away  
with unsightly or faulty work-  
manship.

All door frames in the cor-  
ridor walls should be taken  
out and be replaced so as to per-  
mit of the doors opening full  
and swinging clear back and ly-  
ing flat against the corridor  
sides of their respective walls.

### Whittaker's Report

The report of H. Whittaker, the

provincial government architect,  
presented at the joint meeting  
last night agreed in all vital re-  
spects with that of Mr. Jeffers al-  
though it is a longer document  
and goes into more detail, es-  
pecially in regard to the floors.  
He agreed with Mr. Jeffers that  
the mortar, especially in the fire  
walls, was of poor quality and  
there were signs of careless  
workmanship in the brick-laying.  
Had the walls been erected ac-  
cording to the specifications and  
good mortar used and work dis-  
continued during inclement and  
frosty weather they would not  
have been in their present condi-  
tion. The question of laying the  
tiles vertically or horizontally  
was merely a matter of opinion  
and either plan had proved suc-  
cessful.

### Walls Well Built

The masonry walls of the base-  
ment had been efficiently built  
and were capable of carrying the  
loads intended. There should be  
repointing of mortar joints. The  
quality of the bricks and tile  
were good, but waterproofing  
would increase their efficiency.  
No dancing, marching or gym-  
nasium exercises should be al-  
lowed on the present spruce  
floors of the classrooms or audi-  
torium. These floors could be  
supported at no great cost. The  
method of putting in cornices  
had not been in accordance with  
the best practices. When new  
fire walls were erected these  
should be flashed and counter-  
flushed and painted. The cloak-  
room floors should be taken up  
and replaced by wood. The  
muskog and rubbish in the base-  
ment should be cleared out and  
the ground drained, if necessary.

### Considerable Discussion

The Jeffers' report was read  
over clause by clause and con-  
siderable discussion took place.  
It was brought out that there  
had been many changes in con-  
struction throughout the build-  
ing from the original specifica-  
tions. Mayor Rochester led in  
the criticism of this course and  
J. W. Potter, architect, de-  
fended it. The latter said that  
some of the most important  
changes had been decided upon  
after consultation with the  
School Board. High prices and  
necessity for economy and in-  
ability to obtain some of the  
specified materials had been the  
cause in most cases. Mr. Jef-  
fers said that while some of the  
changes might have been econ-  
omical, it was doubtful if all  
were.

Mr. Jeffers said that ninety per-  
cent of the mortar, so far as he  
could judge, was satisfactory al-  
though there were signs of un-  
even mixing and in some places  
where it should have been hard  
it was soft like sand and could  
be scraped out with a knife.  
The building superintendent  
should have had organization to  
see that the work was carried  
out properly.

Mr. Potter said that the mor-  
tar had always been mixed right  
when he was around.

### Appearance Affected

Mr. Jeffers said that there  
were some bulges in the brick-  
work where evidently rows had  
been taken down leaving uneven  
rows below. This affected the  
appearance of the building but  
not the strength to any degree.  
He was not satisfied with the  
mortar especially in the fire  
walls. It was not good mortar.

The theory that gasses in the  
building might have the effect of  
exploding if there was a fire was  
ridiculed by Mr. Jeffers. "It  
is a foolish statement. An air-  
ship might hit the building and  
knock it down. Anything might  
happen if you let your imagina-  
tion go far enough."

### Only Difference

In the course of the entire  
discussion, the only point where  
there was any difference of  
opinion between Mr. Jeffers and  
Mr. Whittaker was in regard to



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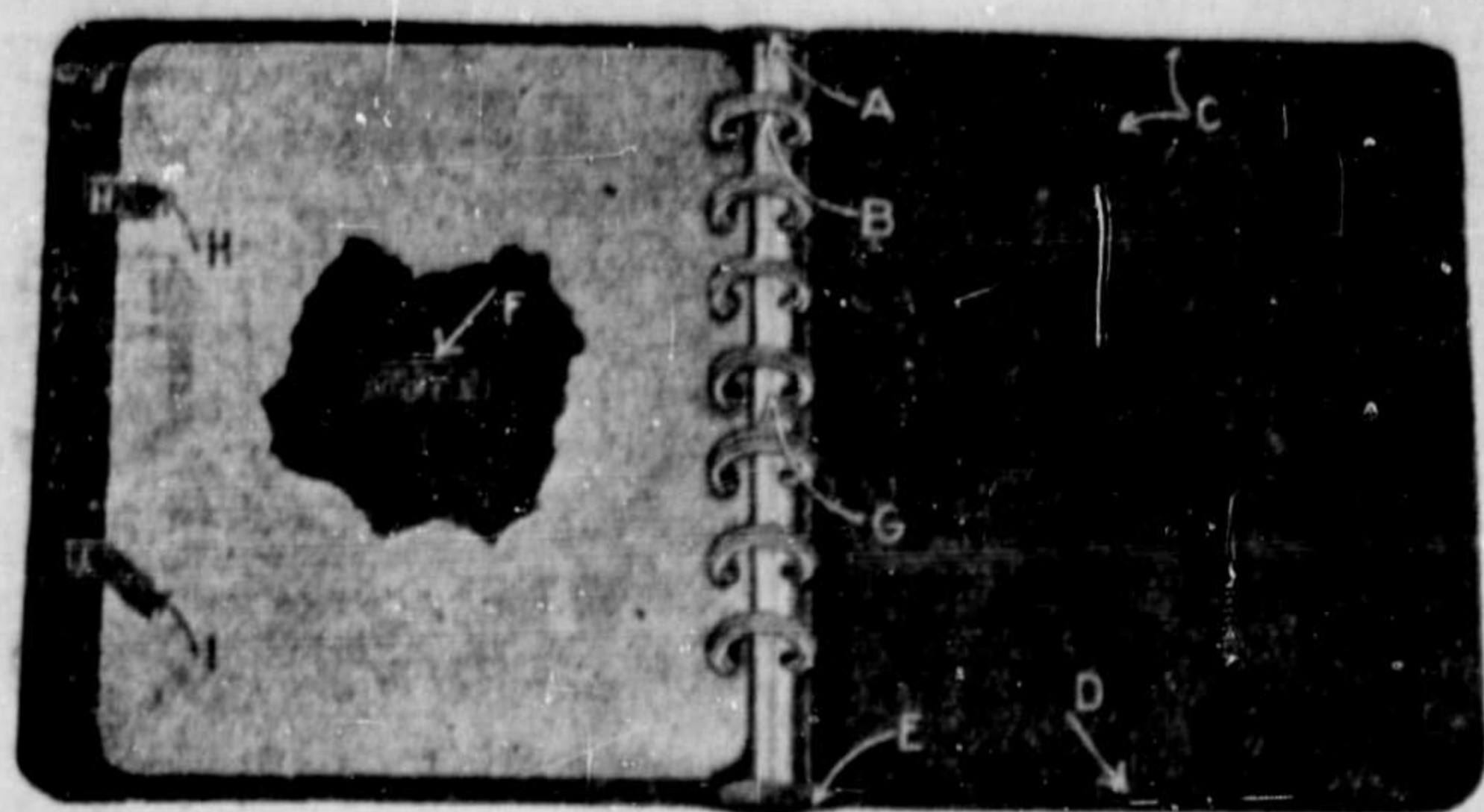

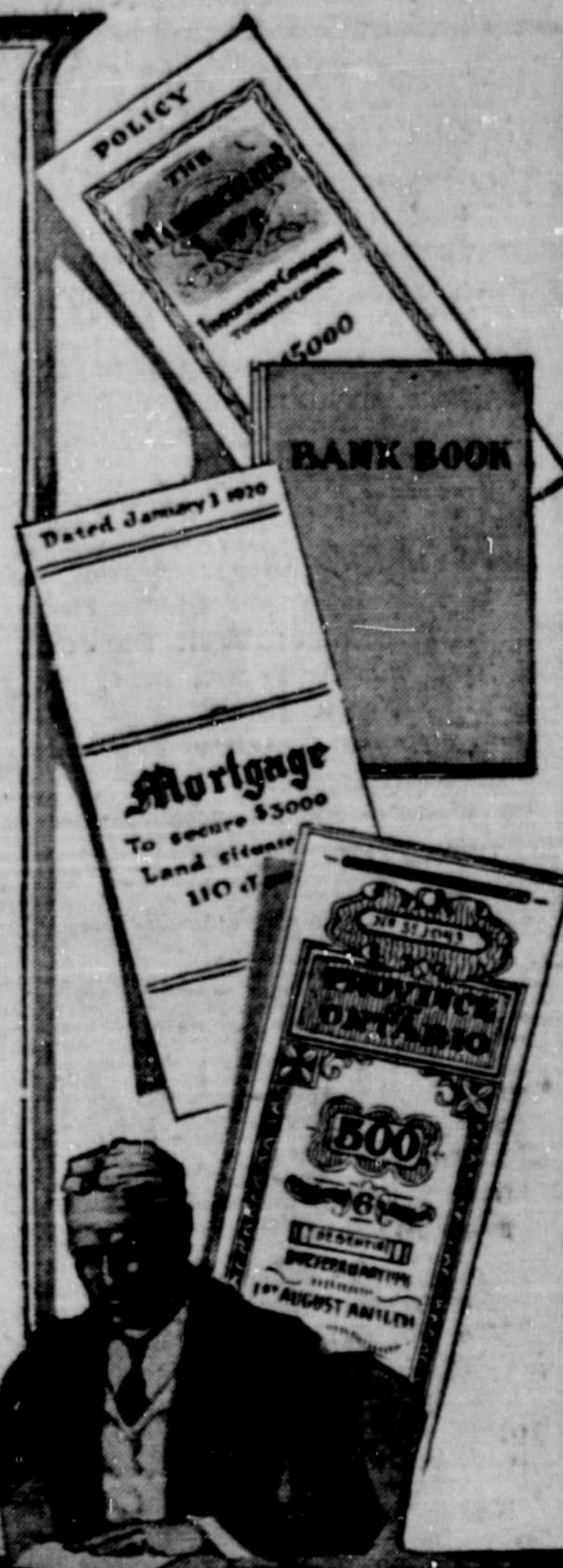

## Waterfront Whiffs

Doings of the Mosquito Fleet Which Is the Chief Source of Prince Rupert's Prosperity

The fact that Cow Bay, the home of the mosquito fleet is looking somewhat deserted these days is no criterion that the boys are not bumping. On the contrary everything that will float, regardless of whether the machinery will give a kick on all cylinders or not, is out on the deep blue sea harvesting the halibut, sprigs and cohoes. With the price of fish higher it has given the crews more heart and as a consequence some bumper catches have been brought in. The Admiral of the fleet reports that some 362,000 pounds of halibut has been sold this week, also 11,800 pounds of salmon. As the Admiral says "Not a bad week's work at that."

Word has been received from the Naas salmon grounds that the spring salmon is running in fine shape now, and on Tuesday the boats were averaging 10 sockeye at a clip. While the run on the Skeena up to the present is nothing to brag about the salmon trollers are very optimistic and realize that the season is late this year. It is anticipated that the run in the Naas is a forerunner of a good run in local waters.

At the local Exchange during the week the highest price paid for fish was 13.20c, and 4 1/2c, and the lowest price 8.30c and 3c.

Several of the visiting Masonic celebrities from the south inspected the Mosquito fleet base yesterday afternoon accompanied by the officials of the admiralty and were entertained in regular nautical style.

Those of the boats that were in port were thrown open to the visitors and tea, etc. was bountifully poured all over the decks.

Refreshments were served aboard the flagship by the midshipmen of the fleet after which exhibition of boxing the compass by the Admiral was given. 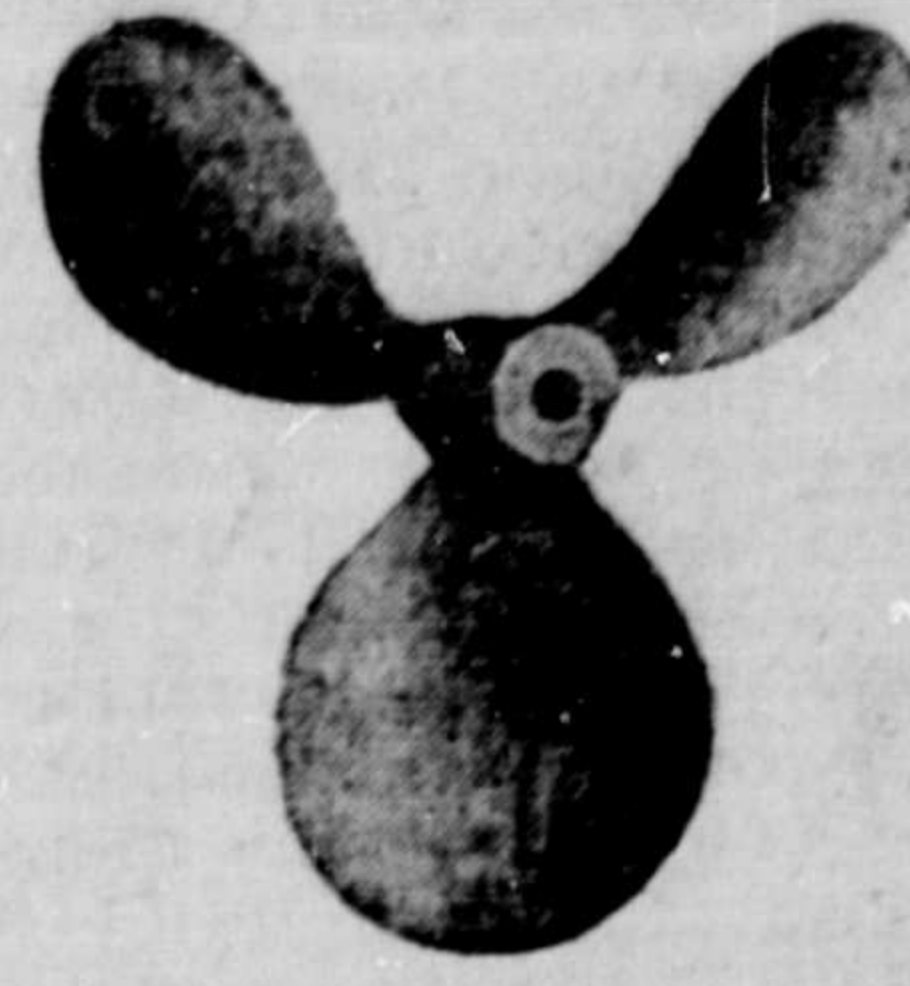

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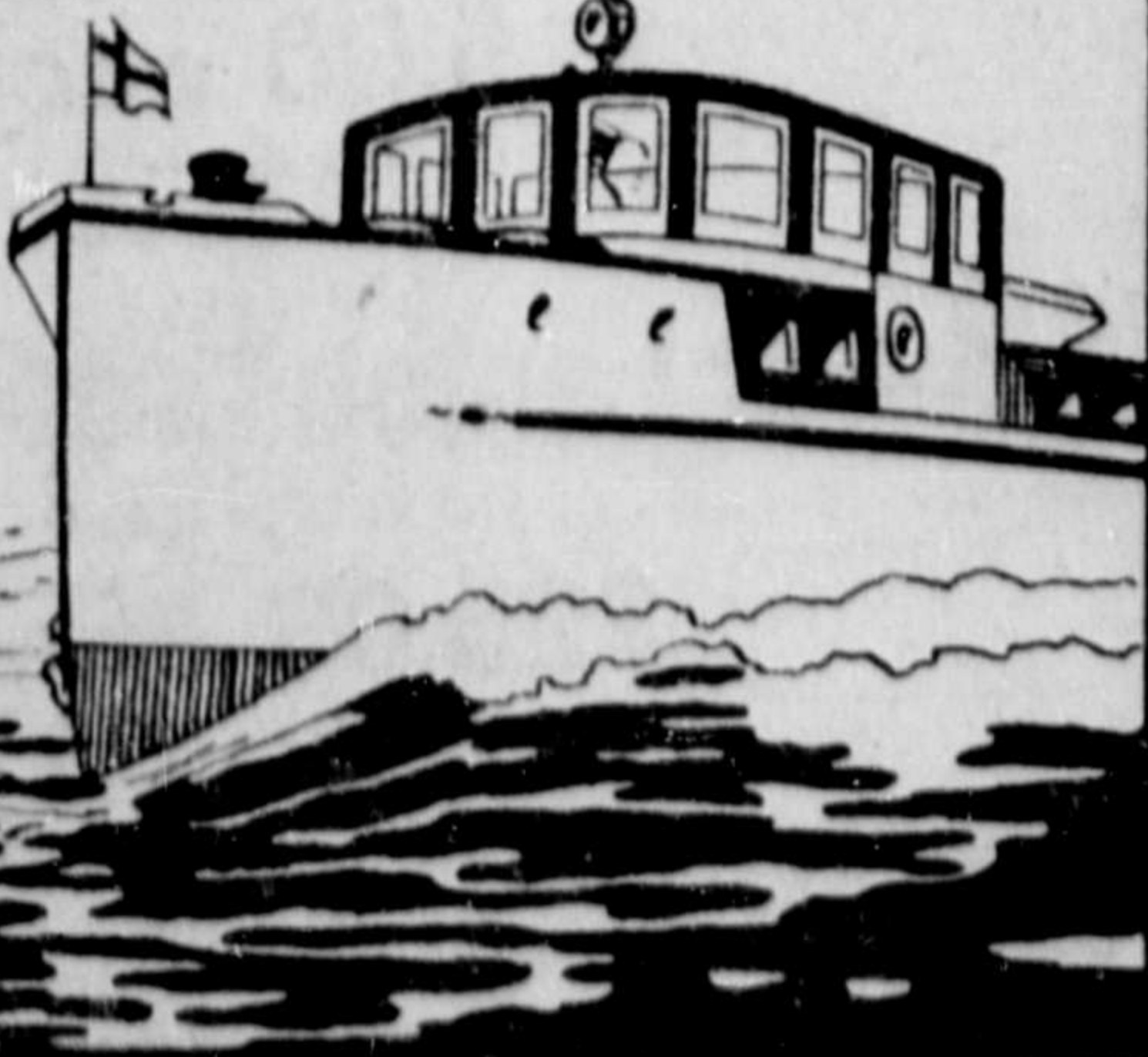
