FRESH OUTBREAK IN PENITENTIARY

LIBERAL AMENDMENT TO CONFERENCE TREATIES REJECTED

Second Outbreak At Kingston Is Put Down After the Military Is Called To Give Assistance

SILVER IS COMING UP
BUTTE, Mon., Oct. 21 — President Herbert Hoover yesterday telegraphed to Republican headquarters here his assurance that, as a condition to participation of United States in the world economic conference to be held later this year, the whole silver question would be fully dealt with. Mining areas of the country have been urging that the silver question be taken up as a means towards the economic rehabilitation of the world.

DEATH OF PLAINTIFF
James Brady, Seeking \$75,000 Damages From C. P. R. For Injuries, Dies in Calgary
CALGARY, Oct. 21.—Called by death, the plaintiff will be missing when the civil action brought by James Brady against the Canadian Pacific Railway for \$75,000 damages is set for hearing at the opening of the Supreme Court next week. Mr. Brady died Wednesday night at his residence here after having been paralyzed from the waist down since August, 1931.

Usual Calm of Appeal Court Was Ruffled as Two Learned Justices Had Spat Thursday

VANCOUVER, Oct. 21.—The judicial calm of the British Columbia Court of Appeal was disturbed yesterday by an exchange of words between Chief Justice J. A. Macdonald and Mr. Justice Archer Martin.
Barristers gazed in astonishment as the Chief Justice told his learned brother that he was too fond of expressing his opinions.
Mr. Justice Martin rejoined that his brother was becoming personal and added that the question was one of principle.
The incident arose near the end of the hearing of an appeal by several insurance companies from a judgment requiring them to pay some \$24,000 to the Cameron Lumber Co. Ltd. of Victoria for a fire loss last February.
The chief justice expressed the view that certain mathematical calculations given by E. C. Mayers K. C., counsel for the lumber company, were false.
Mr. Justice Martin did not think that the remark was justified and the exchange between the two judges followed.
Decision in the case was finally reserved by the court.

Prison Premises Resembled Armed Camp Following Disorders Yesterday Afternoon—Quiet is Restored After Four Hours—Explosion and Rifle Shots

KINGSTON, Ont., Oct. 21.—Portsmouth Penitentiary today resembled an armed camp following a second outbreak of rioting among prisoners in which one convict was wounded yesterday. More than 150 troops stood sentry along the walls. Following the report of a muffled explosion after which the sound of shots was heard, a detachment from the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery was rushed to the penitentiary. The troops arrived wearing steel helmets.

AGED MAN RUNS AMOK

Egbert Malcolm, 80, Attacks Two Women Near Sarnia and Then Takes His Own Life
SARNIA, Ont., Oct. 20.—Egbert Malcolm, aged 80, today attacked two women at his home at Point Edward, two miles north of here, with a nail-studded stick and then killed himself by slashing his throat with a butcher knife. The women were hurt but will recover.

Movie Actress' Home is Looted

Two Bandits Take \$30,000 in Jewelry From Residence of Helene Costello in Hollywood
HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 21.—Two robbers, after overpowering and trussing up servants, yesterday ransacked the home of Helene Costello, screen actress, here and escaped with diamonds, pearls and other jewelry the value of which is estimated at \$30,000.

Grit Measure Is Ruled Out of Order Thursday By Speaker of Commons

Some Parts Expressed Agreement With Portions of Treaty While Others Enunciated General Principles and, Therefore, is Found Not Proper Amendment

OTTAWA, Oct. 21.—The amendment to the Imperial Conference treaty resolution, read on Monday in the House of Commons by Rt. Hon. William Lyon Mackenzie King, Liberal leader, and formally proposed by Hon. J. L. Ralston, was ruled out of order yesterday by Mr. Speaker George Black. The Speaker found that, since in some parts the amendment expressed agreement with portions of the treaty while others consisted of an expression of general principles, it could not properly be regarded as an amendment.

KILLED BY EXPLOSION

Engine on Canadian Pacific Train Blows up on Prairies—Engineer M. Harris is Dead

WINNIPEG, Oct. 21.—An engine on a mixed stock and freight train of the Canadian Pacific Railway blew up a mile and a half east of Dymont, Ont., Thursday, according to meagre reports reaching here. All telegraph wires are down but it is understood the engineer, M. Harris, is dead, and the fireman, T. O'Flaherty, injured.

TRIAL IS DEMANDED

Libby Reynolds Holman Not Satisfied With Mere Withdrawal of Murder Charge

WINSTON-SALEM, North Carolina.—Oct. 20.—Mrs. Libby Holman Reynolds has demanded that she be given immediate trial on the charge of having murdered her husband, Smith Reynolds, the heir to the Reynolds tobacco millions, so that she might have complete vindication from the charge which she declared she would not get if it were merely withdrawn.
The authorities this week announced their intention of withdrawing the murder charge against Mrs. Reynolds and Ab Walker.

BONUS IS OPPOSED

Governor Roosevelt Announces His Stand on Issue—Smith Predicts Democratic Victory

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt, Democratic presidential candidate, took an anti-bonus stand in a speech here. "Happy Warrior" Al Smith spoke to a crowded house in New York and prophesied a Democratic win throughout the nation.

TEST CASE ON LICENCE

Magistrate Decides That City is Entitled to Collect Rooming House Fee Apart From Government Beer Licence

The fact of a person holding a provincial government beer licence does not cover entire hotel premises and exempt the owner from paying a municipal rooming house licence, it was decided by Magistrate McClymont in city police court this morning in a test case heard at the instance of A. J. Prudhomme, proprietor of the Savoy Hotel.

Mr. Prudhomme, whose counsel was L. W. Patmore, held that the beer licence covered the whole premises and that he should not be subject to a rooming house licence as well.
City Solicitor E. F. Jones contended that Mr. Prudhomme was liable to pay the rooming house licence in addition to the beer licence. This view was upheld by the court and Mr. Prudhomme was ordered to pay the rooming house licence.

Twenty Years Ago

In Prince Rupert

October 21, 1912

Thousands of tons of earth and stone were moved in a huge blast set off near Hays Cove in connection with the excavating and filling for the railway yards. Contractor Archie McDougall was in personal charge of the blast.

James Knouse, proprietor of the Pantheon on Sixth Street, found a prowler in his place of business about midnight. The man, being unable to give a satisfactory account of himself, was arrested.

WHO HAS THE MONEY?

Who has all the money? Where is it all gone? That is a question that is agitating many people today. Some think it is held by large corporations and capitalists, but is it?

Take as an example a corporation capitalized at \$100,000,000. The capital is mostly tied up in buildings, machinery and other plant, material or something having to do with the conduct of the business. In the bank to their credit will be a few thousand dollars, just sufficient to enable them to get along and pay employees without borrowing. Possibly there is a reserve invested in liquid securities such as government bonds that in case of necessity can be sold on the open market for cash or placed in the bank as collateral against which the company may borrow.

If the company makes a profit, part of the profit is invested in reserve securities but the money is not held by the corporation. It is not idle in their safes. If it is in the bank it is not idle because a part of it at least is being loaned out by the bank to some other concern that is needing it. Evidently the money is not held by the corporation.

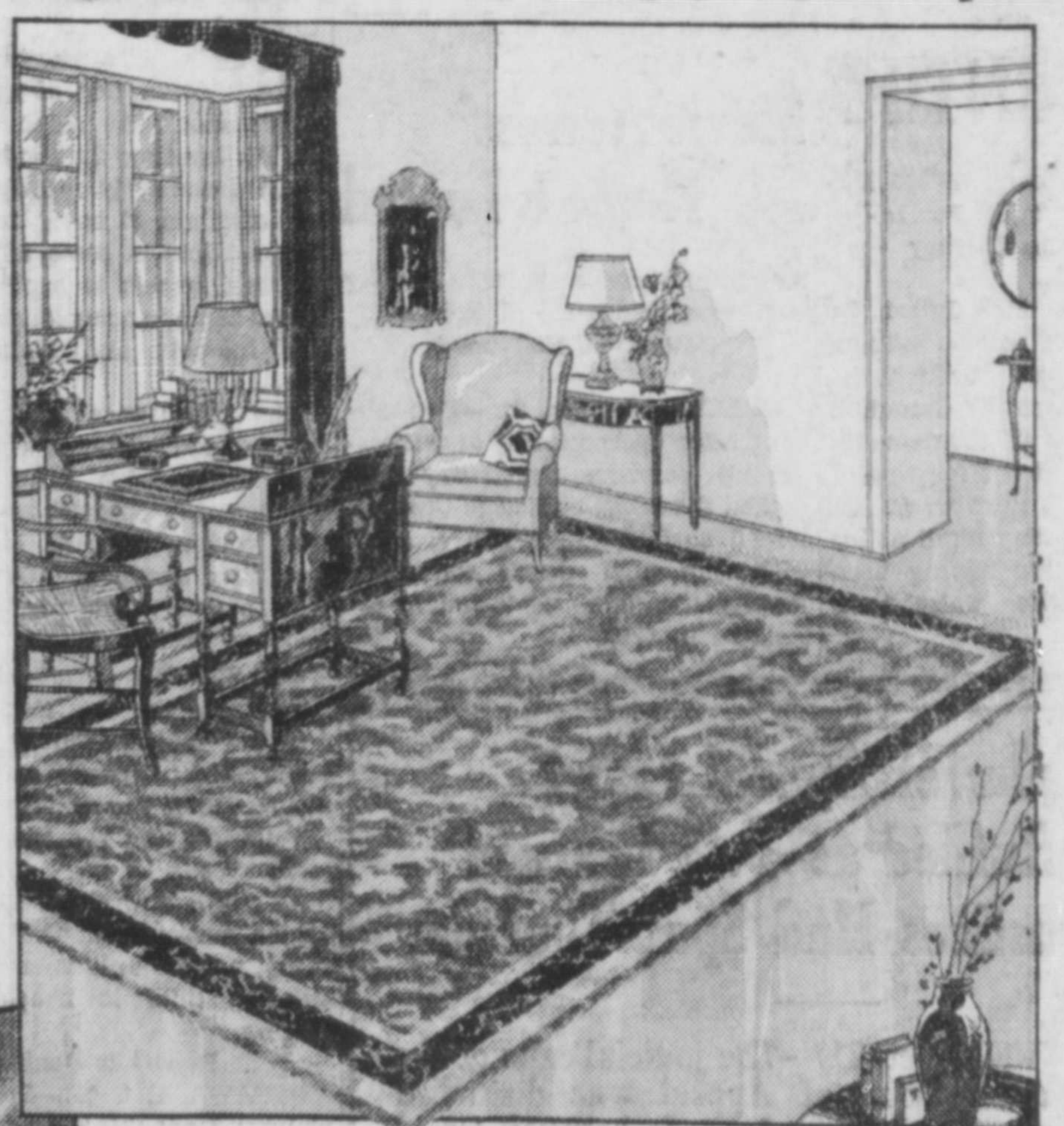
No capitalist, unless he be an old fashioned miser of the storybook type, ever hoards currency. He has made his money by investing wisely and he continues to do the same, whether times are good or bad. He will have a sufficient amount in the bank to pay his running expenses, possibly a little more in the savings bank, but he will want a larger rate of interest than the bank pays so he will have most of his money invested in government bonds or other good securities. He will have very little loose currency. His money is all working for someone else and he gets rent for its use.

The banks are not keeping any more money than they can help because if they keep it they are losing interest on all they keep. If they have too much they try hard to get rid of it. They loan it in such a manner as to be sure that they will get it back. They are responsible to the depositors and must loan it safely or they are betraying their trust. They often have more money than they want, but they are always ready to loan it if they can do so with safety. Possibly at a time like this too much money is held by the banks but not voluntarily. It is only because they cannot loan it on such terms as they consider safe and they must play safe to protect the depositors.

If all the money were taken from the banks, it would not last long. It would be used up very quickly and then conditions would be worse than ever, and yet the banks are the only institutions that seem to have any money. The capitalists have none, the corporations have none, the ordinary business people have none, or only barely sufficient for their daily needs.

The lack of money is explained by the fact that at a time like this there is a restriction of credit, fewer bank checks are used, a few people hoard, usually in very small amounts. There is the same amount of currency in circulation yet nobody seems to have any.

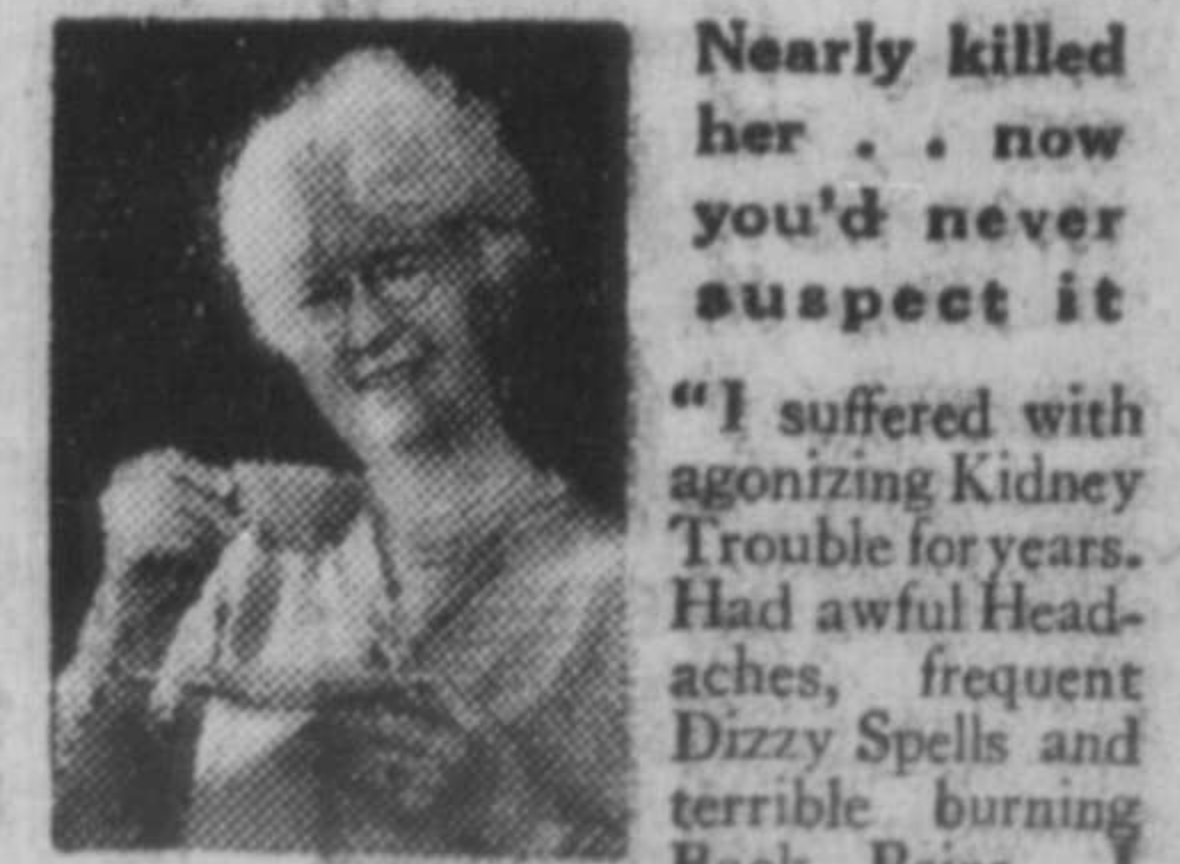

day. Good conduct prisoners were being moved from the crowded buildings to the new women's penitentiary building nearby. With the transfer of these prisoners, it was expected that the guards would be able to gain definite control of 220 rioters who were not locked in cells. Originally 110 prisoners were housed in a cell-less dormitory but, in the most violent outburst of the present disturbances, the overflow gang overcame their forty guards and released 110 prisoners from their cells. The guards found it impossible to hold the 220 loose men although they were able to keep them crowded into two corridors. Inside these corridors, however, all furniture has been wrecked and fixtures smashed. Temporarily forty guards were held by the prisoners but they were able to effect their release, officials said.

The next move of the prison officials following the transfer of the prisoners was expected to be to force the loose rioters, still yelling and screaming in their semi-freedom, into the cells vacated by the good conduct men.

The Survival of the Sweetest

(By Barbara Brooks)

HAM SCALLOPED WITH POTATOES

One slice of ham (one inch thick), six medium sized raw potatoes, one-third cup flour, two tablespoons butter, one-half teaspoon salt, pepper, enough milk to cover potatoes (about three cups).

Peel and cut potatoes into thin slices. Place ham in bottom of a casserole. Cover with a half inch of sliced potatoes. Add salt and pepper to flour (not too much salt as the ham may be quite salty). Sprinkle some of the flour mixture over the potatoes and dot lightly with part of the butter. Add another 1/2-inch layer of sliced potatoes, sprinkle again with flour mixture and dot with butter. Repeat this until all the potatoes are used. Put the rest of the flour mixture and butter over the top. Fill the casserole with milk until the potatoes are covered. Bake in a moderate oven (375 d. F.) until the potatoes are done (about 50 to 60 minutes).

With the ham and potato dish in the oven, there will be a few minutes for setting the table. A salad could be prepared and the plates placed in the refrigerator if there is room for them. After the potatoes and ham have cooked 15 or 20 minutes, start a corn flake charlotte.
