Safe and Sane

Xmas Celebrated.

Another happy Yuletide has passed and the manner in which it was celebrated in Prince Rupert clearly showed that this city had the proper spirit. The air was pervaded with optimism and contentment—factors that do not come unless people are hopeful and prosperous.

There was no big splurge about Christmas here but, generally speaking, there was plenty and enough of the good things of life to go around. It was a safe and sane Christmas and the spirit of goodwill and fellowship was there in an accentuated degree.

Such a Christmas celebration is characteristic of a prosperous community with a permanent and stable foundation for its existence and the people who live in it.

All Agree That

Immigration Is Necessary.

Lieutenant-Governor Nichol, on his return from a tour of Europe in the course of which he took the opportunity of studying internal conditions in the Old Country in relation to the affairs of Canada in general and British Columbia in particular, brings with him the message that Canada's development can only be brought about with an influx of immigration. This premise has been accepted for some time and of late both federal and provincial governments have been making efforts with that end in view. There are too few people in Canada and there are too many in Europe. Many people want to leave Europe and come to Canada to settle. With such a condition existing it should be a difficult matter to colonize this country with suitable immigrants from the old countries. There is one thing that is necessary, however, and the governments are working on that basis. This is that immigrants to Canada must be carefully selected and must be assisted when they get here. We do not want tradesmen or artisans. What we do want is agriculturalists and it does not matter much whether they be poor or rich. If the governments invest money in the right kind of immigrants, the country will be amply repaid for such will develop themselves into prosperous citizens, improving the citizenship of the land while doing their bit to increase its trade and production.

Germany Reaching

Out For Business.

That Germany is reaching out far afield for foreign business is demonstrated in a letter which has just been received at the business office of the Daily News. This letter is from a German paper manufacturing concern in Essen which offers to deliver monthly 500 tons of newsprint to fit any type of rotary machine.

"Though we have still numerous orders to execute, we can deliver to you from 300 to 400 tons of this paper in December or January and will suit your sample of color and finish. As the demand for newsprint is very great we suppose we will soon be out of all our articles," the letter states, although it gives no indication of prices.

The Daily News has no intentions of buying paper from Germany but the letter exemplifies Germany's progressiveness and indicates that that nation is already in the field for extensive exports. It would seem directly evident that her economic condition may not be so black as it is painted.

One Market She

Has Recaptured.

One market that Germany has virtually recaptured is that of Egypt. She is steadily increasing her exports to that country and orders which previously went to other countries have been secured by German firms. She exercises an almost unchallenged monopoly in synthetic dyes, toys and pianos, and has a predominant position in the field of pencils, paper, glass, chinaware, cutlery, leather goods, small metal manufactures, cotton hosiery, small mirrors and hardware. All these articles have been dumped into the Egyptian market on a scale and at prices that have defied competition. Statistics on foreign trade for the first seven months of 1922 show that Germany has advanced from sixth to fourth position, and that the United States stands fifth.

Collart declared that, regardless of who might be elected mayor, he would insist on the consideration of his platform one of the principal features of which is a thorough reorganization of the city hall departments.

ERA OF INTENSE DEVELOPMENT IN EUROPE FORESEEN

LONDON, Dec. 26.—"We are entering a new chapter in the economic history of the world, a period which will, I believe, surpass in the intensity of its development the wonderful forty-four years preceding the Great War," said Edgar Crammond, an English financial writer, recently in the course of a lecture on "The International Financial Situation," to members of the London Chamber of Commerce.

"This country is called upon to undertake tasks of reconciliation and reconstruction such as her broad shoulders have never carried before, and she is the one power organized and equipped to bring order out of the great chaos.

"Our two great duties must be," continued Mr. Crammond, "the problem of reparations and inter-Allied debts. Now that we have practically arranged for the payment of our debt to the United States, it might be possible to invite American co-operation with us in a policy of help and forbearance. To carry out these great tasks, it is essential that we have freedom from governmental control of the financial machinery of the country. The great joint stock banks, the Anglo-foreign banks, and the great British mercantile houses should now be allowed to exercise greater influence in the shaping of our financial policy than they have enjoyed since August, 1914.

"If we can arrive at a friendly understanding with France," the speaker added, "re-unite the world into a single economic unit, and establish once again the international financial sys-

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class and reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 2 acres before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation less than 5 years, and has made improvements, he may be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$20 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$100 per acre, including 2 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant requires land in conjunction with his fee, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads. Title to be obtained after fulfilling residence and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 40 acres may be purchased by company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased on conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural gas windmills inaccessible to the public may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with the Master's forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under the Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the great war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by holders on pre-emptions recorded after June 28, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of money accrued, due and been paid since August 1, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on holders of original parcels under agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or descendants, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING

Grazing Act, 1915, for systematic development of livestock industry provided for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

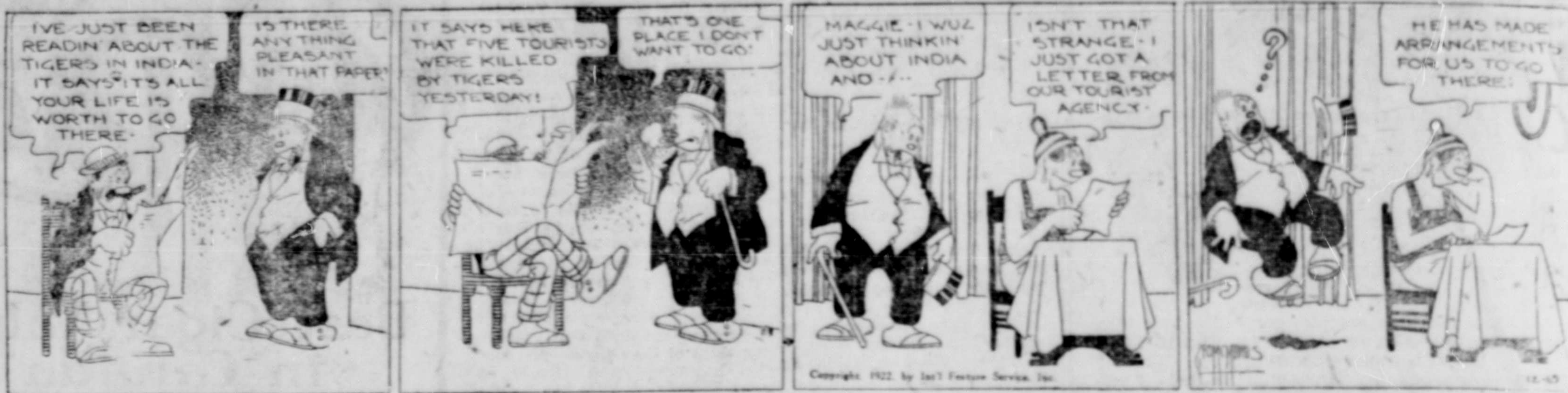

RETURNED SOLDIERS' INSURANCE EXPIRY DATE

An amendment to the Returned Soldiers' Insurance Act provides that insurance may not be granted on the lives of returned soldiers with or without dependents, in a serious condition of health from causes other than war service, or those without dependents, even when impairment is due to service. The amendment, however, contains the following proviso:

"Provided that applicants with or without pensionable disability who are so seriously ill that they have no expectancy of life, and who have dependents who are entitled to become beneficiaries under the contract as provided under the Act, shall be insurable under the Returned Soldiers' Insurance Act, up to, and inclusive of 1st JANUARY, 1923."

Insurance may be granted in all cases where the impairment is due to service and the returned soldier has dependents.

Application may be made at any local office of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, or by mail to Soldiers' Insurance Division, Bury Building, Ottawa.

Applications not affected by the above will be accepted until September 1st, 1923.

LIGHT AMUSEMENT FAVORED IN PARIS

PARIS, Dec. 26.—The people of Paris spend a quarter of a billion francs yearly on theatres and motion pictures, and do not care to do much heavy thinking during the process. Government statistics on last year's receipts of every playhouse in Paris warrant these statements, and at the same time supply interesting information about what pleases the tired business man of France and his non-voting wife. Motion picture houses, which outnumber the theatres three to one, took in 50,000,000 francs in 1919, rather more than did the theatres, and a third of the total amusements receipts. Last year, however, the theatres took first place with receipts of 86,000,000 francs, 11,000,000 more than the movies. This increase seems to be due largely to the fact that theatregoers have modified their Oppositional attitude toward high prices of admission and also by a revival of the typically light and racy play. The government subsidized Opera, and the Opera Comique, headed the list with the largest receipts, each taking in more than 9,000,000 francs last year, and the serious Comedie Francaise did well with 6,000,000 francs, but these institutions are virtually without competition in their field, and they represent a big portion of the money paid for the classics. The Follies-Bergeres, where the big scenes always hinge on the presentation of a group of handsome show-girls, tops the list of theatres, exceeding even the famous Comedie Francaise. The next in line among the dramatic houses is the Palais Royal, which always pursues a policy of giving highly spiced comedies of family life.
