Victory on Budget For Government IRISH ELECTIONS ON FRIDAY CENTRE OF INTEREST IN BRITAIN

Budget Carried by Majority of Eighteen: Supported by All The B. C. Progressives

OTTAWA, June 14.—The budget resolutions were carried by the House of Commons at an early hour this morning by a majority of eighteen. The vote stood 119 for and 101 against. It followed the defeat of the Drayton amendment by a huge majority. Nine Progressives and one Independent voted for the Government, including McBride of Cariboo, Humphreys of Kootenay and Neill of Comox-Alberni and seven Ontario Progressives.

After the vote on the Drayton amendment was taken showing a majority of 123, Hon. Arthur Meighen drew attention to the fact that seven Progressives and two Labor members had refrained from voting and were not paired.

The Speaker instructed them to put themselves on record while the House roared "No loafing on the job." The final vote on the Drayton amendment showed a majority against of 118. Miss McPhail, Ontario agrarian, supported Drayton and so did the two Labor members.

The vote came at half-past one this morning. There were no switches in either the Liberal or Conservative ranks, the Liberals voting for the budget and the Conservatives against it to a man. Crear and all the Progressives except nine voted against the budget.

ALASKA HERRING COMING THROUGH

Steamer Jefferson Coming in
Today—Motorship Apex
Was Here Yesterday.

The Admiral Line steamer Jefferson is due in Prince Rupert today with another shipment of mild cured herring from New Port, Alaska, for New York. The motorship Apex was in port yesterday with four carloads of this commodity which is being shipped to New York today. It is understood that these two vessels are only the first of a number which will call here during which will the season with a large quantity of herring which is to pass over the line of the Canadian National Railway through this port for the East.

ANTI-BLUES WIN FINAL VICTORY

No Appeal to be Made at Victoria
Against Magistrate's Decision

VICTORIA, June 14. — Police Commissioner Stansland announced that the commission will not appeal against Magistrate Jay's decision in dismissing the charges against the merchants infringing the Lord's Day Act. Enforcement of the act, he states, is practically at an end.

Mayor Marchant is out of town but without Commissioner Stansland's support he can do nothing as Commissioner North is opposed to the enforcement of the law.

TESTING IRON ORES IN SARATA DISTRICT ON VANCOUVER ISLAND

VICTORIA, June 14.—Rich iron ores in the Sarata district near Alberni are being tested by the provincial Government as one of the preliminaries to getting a steel industry started in British Columbia.

NEW YORK, June 14.—Three more bodies, victims of Sunday's storm have been found. The police think the death list will reach 75.

Mother General Victoria, of the Sisters of St. Joseph, arrived today from Vancouver to spend a week visiting the local convent. Mother General Victoria, who is head of the Sisters of St. Joseph in Canada, has been visiting the Pacific Coast for some time. She comes from Toronto and is accompanied here by Sisters Claudia and Alacoqua.

Today's Conference on Irish Question May be Final: Elections Friday

LONDON, June 14.—Considerable optimism is felt regarding the status of the Irish negotiations and it is suggested in some quarters that today's conferences may be final ones. In any event it is declared that very little more discussion will be necessary for a complete agreement.

DUBLIN, June 14.—The leaders of the pro-treaty party manifest increasing confidence in the outcome of Friday's parliamentary elections and predict some surprises for the anti-t, claiming among other things that Erskins Childers and Mary McSweeney are certain to lose their seats.

Many complaints of intimidation are reported in districts where independent candidates are standing for election.

Riddled With Bullets
BELFAST, June 14. — The bodies of two unidentified men riddled with bullets and with their hands tied behind their backs were found lying by the roadside at Lislea, South Armagh, this morning.

PAY OF CLERGY IS DISCUSSED

Presbyterian General Assembly
Goes on Record Favor of
Minimum Wage

WINNIPEG, June 14.—The Presbyterian General Assembly went on record yesterday regretting the failure of the Pensions Board to carry out the agreement to pay all ministers a minimum stipend of \$1,800 at mission centres.

Chairman Sedgwick of the Pensions Board promptly resigned, complaining that the Assembly advocated payment in full of stipends but did not suggest where the money was coming from. The matter will probably be brought up again.

125,000 ALASKAN HERRING TO BE PUT UP DURING SEASON

SEATTLE, June 14.—The salting industry of Seattle and Alaska will put up 125,000 bbls. this year compared with 74,000 barrels last year. The increase is due to the increased demand for the product in New York.

ALLEGED CONFESSION OF MAN SAID TO HAVE CAUSED EXPLOSION

Man Who Committed Suicide in
Washington State May Have
Caused Trouble.

SEATTLE, June 14.—Canadian and United States authorities are investigating the alleged confession of William Johnson, alias N. Primatchek, who is said to have caused the explosion of three British ammunition ships in the harbor at Halifax late in the year 1917, resulting in many deaths and great destruction. Johnson committed suicide in Skagit county, Washington, last month and is alleged to have made a confession to a mine watchman a few weeks before he killed himself. He was a native of Finland.

TUG LORNE IS TO GO INTO SERVICE AGAIN TOWING Q. C. LOGS

The G. T. P. tug Lorne is to be commissioned again next week towing logs from the Queen Charlotte Islands to Alert Bay, distributing point. This vessel has been tied up for several months and moved today from the ocean dock to No. 1 shed. Captain J. McKernan, of the Prince Albert, arrived today from Vancouver to take charge of her. The Albert, which has been running to San Francisco from Ocean Falls, is tied up at Vancouver for a short time.

COAL BARGE LOST PART OF CARGO IN CHARLOTTE SOUND

The tug boat Louise, Captain W. Bell, has arrived in port with a scowload of Vancouver Island coal for Albert & McCaffery.

While in Queen Charlotte Sound on the way north the coal cargo on the scow shifted and it is estimated that somewhere over 50 tons was lost overboard. The weather was rough and windy and, just after the G. T. P. steamer Prince George had passed, the cargo started to shift in the addition swell. Capt. Bell immediately made for cover in Safety Cove and due to his good management in beaching the scow the greater portion of the 402 tons of coal aboard was saved.

Fierce Attacks Are Made on British Premier in The House of Commons

LONDON, June 14.—Premier Lloyd George resisted another attack in the House of Commons on a proposal to reduce the vote for the costs of his secretariat, which was rejected by a vote of 205 to 111 amid scenes of excitement during which there were cries of "resign."

The Premier's private secretary and staff organization was built up during the war and costs £33,000 annually. Lloyd George predicted that no responsible government would in future dispense with this machine.

The matter of the reprieve of Major True convicted on a charge of murder, was brought up in the House yesterday. Home Secretary Short denied that any favoritism was shown in the reprieve of the slayer of Gertrude Yates, a reprieve which precipitated a terrific attack on the Premier in Parliament and in the press of the country.

700 VISITORS WILL BE HERE

Three Hundred B. C. Masons,
150 Rotarians, and 150
Mecca Temple New
York Shriners.

With three big excursion parties which will be in Prince Rupert next week this city will have 700 visitors. The Grand Masonic Lodge, arriving on Wednesday morning for a two day convention here, will bring at least 300 visitors. The Princess Charlotte, Captain William Boyce on which they are making the trip has been fully booked up for some time now. The New York Rotarian excursion, numbering 250, will be here for half an hour on Wednesday morning on their way East and the Mecca Temple Shriners of New York, on Saturday morning, will comprise 150 members.

Great preparations are being made here for the reception of the B. C. Masons. There will be the usual business of the convention with the social events going with it. Besides members of the Rotary Club from the south who are with the convention are to be invited to the Rotary Luncheon on Thursday. The Prince Rupert Club will also be thrown open for all the Masonic visitors. The Princess Charlotte will arrive on Wednesday and will return south on Friday.

Rotary Visitors.

The New York Rotary excursion will arrive from Seattle on Wednesday morning on the steamer Prince George, Captain Moorehouse. Their special train of 14 cars including Pullman sleepers and observation car, three Canadian National Dining and New York Central baggage cars, will be on hand on arrival of the steamer and will pull out for the East at 11 o'clock.

During the half hour stay of the excursionists in the city it is planned to have an impromptu meeting with the local club in the upstairs rooms of the new station. G. K. Howard, general tourist agent from Toronto, is making the trip from Seattle to Montreal with the Rotarians as representative of the Canadian National Railways.

The Mecca Temple Shriners of New York will arrive from Seattle on the Prince Rupert, Capt. Donald, Saturday morning and will go East on their special train of ten cars half an hour after arrival. G. A. McNichol, assistant general freight and passenger agent here, is going south tomorrow night to Seattle and will accompany this party to Montreal as representative of the Canadian National Railways.

TURKS CHARGED WITH MASSACRE

Archbishop Claims That 1,300
Women and Children Slaugh-
tered Inland From Black
Sea

LONDON, June 14. — Charges that thirteen hundred Christian women and children were taken by the Turks from Samson on the Black Sea to the interior and massacred near Kavak two weeks ago are contained in a telegram received by a Greek citizens' committee here from Archbishop Metaxakis, the Greek patriarch of Constantinople.

SKIRMISHER TO LEAVE FRIDAY

Will Take a Small Shipment of
Salmon From Here Before
Going on to Vancouver.

The Canadian Government Merchant Marine steamer Canadian Skirmisher will complete overhaul at the local dry dock and will go off the pontoons on Friday afternoon. The vessel will then take on a small shipment of Canadian Fish and Cold Storage salmon here and will clear for Vancouver the same evening.

More vessels of the fleet are expected here before long for overhaul but none are yet definitely set for arrival.

COST OF LIVING STILL GOES DOWN

So Reports Labor Department of
the British Government —

LONDON, June 14.—There was a further slight decline in the cost of living during the month of May according to the Labor Department. The average cost of the family budget of staple foods on sixty cities was \$10.20 as against \$10.26 in April and \$12.25 in May, 1921, and \$7.43 in May, 1914.

All Budgets
Are Annoying.

All government budgets are annoying. They almost always indicate changes and changes always hurt someone. Those who smoke cigarettes now have to pay more than before the budget was passed, and all who do business find their taxes materially increased. Motor car owners have to pay for their pleasure and so it is with other people. Nearly all are feeling the pinch with the exception of the fishermen and farmers who are favored under the law.

The country is deeply in debt and has to pay the bills. The debt is largely the result of the war so there is nothing to be said about that part of it. All we can do is pay. The budget shows that even yet we are not assessed enough to allow the government to come out even at the end of the year.

Remove Burden Is
Plan To Adopt.

The chief burden for the taxpayer outside of the war debt is the railway debt and the deficit on the Canadian National Railways. The railway debt cannot be removed but the deficit may. To rid the country of that immense charge should be the aim of the Liberal Government.

How shall the government get rid of this charge? The only way is to make the railways pay their way. Give the national railways a chance and they will soon be an asset to the country instead of a drain on its resource. Instead of trying to compel traffic to go in one direction, give the business an opportunity to expand in every direction. Let Prince Rupert have a chance to do some of it. Prince Rupert is the only port in the west wholly dependent on the Canadian National. Any business coming here is bound to benefit the railway, whereas business going into Vancouver is just as likely to go to the other railway as to the Canadian National.

We believe the present government will develop the business of this section of the line. They have started out right by giving a daily service for passengers and refrigerator fish. This should benefit the business here. The next thing will be to make it possible to do other business here. If the railway is to pay, the development of business is necessary.

Blue Sundays
In The Discard.

Many people here have been watching with interest the effort to close up everything tight in Victoria on Sundays. There was not much business done on that day, but the fruit and cigar and news stands were allowed to remain open, gas stations could operate and tourist conveyances could run. The police commissioners, urged on by the churches, set out to stop this business, claiming that it was an injury to the employees engaged therein. Their point of view was made clear and had considerable support but the mass of the people fancied it was a question of "church domination" and they were not slow in saying so. They did not want the "Blue Sunday" as they called it. These people are now extremely pleased that the prosecutions have broken down and that things will proceed in that city as before the present commissioners were elected.

Preparing For
Annual Fair.

The officials for the annual fall fair have now been chosen and the next step will be to get busy and make this year's event a good one. Preparations have commenced later than usual. There is not very much time but there is plenty to make a very successful fair if all join their efforts with that end in view.

USING PLANE
JASPER PARKExploration From Air Reveals
Hitherto Undiscovered Lakes.

JASPER, June 14.—Several hitherto unknown lakes and river valleys have been discovered in Jasper Park, through the use of government airplanes. This work was undertaken by the High River air station, Alberta, and three experimental flights were carried out over the region for the purpose of exploration and reconnaissance. The Canadian air board report states: "A flight was made on each of three successive days with gratifying success and the possibilities of the use of air craft for exploration in mountain regions and in the administration and general maintenance of the park system were proved without a doubt."

At the conclusion of the operation, Colonel Maynard Rogers, park superintendent, who was taken as observer on each of the three flights expressed himself as highly pleased with the results obtained and with the rapidity with which it was possible to reach any part of the park as compared with making a similar trip by trail. In the seven hours of flying over the park he claimed he traveled more distance and inspected more country than he could possibly have done by trail in six weeks' or two months' hard travelling. Col. Rogers also expressed the opinion that sufficient flying had been done to demonstrate the absolute necessity of having machines stationed at Jasper Park to continue this exploration reconnaissance work, as well as for the purpose of forest fire protection.

In the Letter Box

Editor Daily News:

Several of us were discussing the H.C.L. and the recent raise in sales tax. I made the remark that our taxes exceeded 30 per cent of our average income or total income. This was questioned to the extent of 5 per cent both ways. We were frankly guessing but as the lowest estimate was 25 per cent, I believe you and your readers will admit that we are over-taxed for what I bluntly name misgovernment. There has been a fever of desire to regulate, an agitation caused by jealousy and envy to interfere with the business and private life of each other, which had to run its course just the same as the "flu" or the measles. Now we should get down to the business of reducing taxes, which can be brought about only through simplifying our laws to the bare necessities of an undeveloped country.

Employees Unnecessary. We are crying for immigrants, yet fully two-thirds of our present government employees are easily unnecessary. They would be better off if they were not in government employ and so would the community.

We are going to see a great wave of immigration, the most wonderful in history into Canada. It remains for us whether the migration shall be composed of independent and honorable settlers who will come on their own to take their places in a Canadian way in a free Canada or whether it shall be composed of the red tape, servile, dependent, who will want the government to do everything for them except eat.

Duty to Prepare. We are going to have this migration whether or no. It will come from the white portions of the earth or from the yellow, either from the East or West. It is our duty to prepare. My contention is that no man worthy to become a settler in a frontier country is going to come here to spend one-third of his time paying useless government employees, to interfere with him in the other two thirds. We will have to clean house or some other people will.

The best governed country is the least governed.

HARDSHIPS ON GROWING OF TOBACCO

British Impose Restrictions Which Are Very Objectionable.

LONDON, June 14.—The introduction of Hampshire-grown tobacco to the House of Commons by Lord Wolmer has aroused fresh interest in the efforts which are being made to cultivate the tobacco plant in this country. It is probable that there will be considerable support for the movement which is being organized to persuade the government not only to extend to the growers the relief from taxation promised to home-grown sugar, but also to relax restrictions which at present hamper the development of a young industry.

Tobacco is grown at present in Norfolk, Devonshire, and Hampshire.

The Hampshire experiment is under direction of A. J. Brandon, at Church-Crookham, Fleet, and has been in progress for 11 years. Mr. Brandon has 20 acres under cultivation, and has had considerable success, with Virginian and Turkish leaf. He states that it takes about 11 years to establish a tobacco-growing industry. The war stopped his work for four years, but the experiments are now in a very interesting stage.

Does Not Pay.

"We are, about, half-way through," he explained to a correspondent, "and our chief difficulty is that the thing does not pay. Before the war we were getting 6d. to 8d. per lb. for our tobacco, and this gave us satisfactory return. Today we are offered the same price but our expenses are more than doubled and we are out of pocket on every acre we grow. We are trying to get the same treatment from the government as is given to the sugar beet industry. If we could get a remission of duty we should have a chance to go ahead. An infant industry needs nursing, but with help, I am sure that tobacco-growing in the Southern counties would prove a success. If we could get a concession I could take a larger acreage and put on a considerable number of men. On 20 acres at present I employ about 30 people.

Location Oppression.

Apart from the difficulty of taxation, the existing Excise regulations are all against us. Before 1911 it was a penal offence to grow tobacco. Even now I have to enter into a bond to grow, a bond to cure, a bond to receive tobacco, and a bond to send it away. The old laws are so obsolete that the authorities would not accept a leading bank of their own naming. I have to go an insurance company to take all the risks, and this is a considerable expense. Another point is that we are not allowed to use our waste products, which could be turned into nicotine for insecticides. The waste and offal have to be destroyed in the presence of an Excise officer. An officer has also to be present when we are packing leaf, and if he cannot come on the day we require him men have to be idle."

Flavor Distinctive.

Mr. Brandon added that he was growing Virginia pipe tobacco and Turkish tobacco. Sumatra leaf had also been tried, but the two former varieties did the best. The flavor of the English-grown leaf was distinctive but if it became known it would probably be appreciated. Tobacco cultivation had a special agricultural interest, as the plant could be grown on light soils, which otherwise were of little use, and the crops had the effect of improving the land, so

that they could, in time of emergency, be put under wheat.

A deputation will shortly wait on the Minister of Agriculture to ask him to take such action as would enable some thousands of acres in England to be placed under tobacco cultivation, if the taxation were proportional.

BRINGING UP FATHER



By George McManus

ORIENTALS AND MUNICIPALITIES ARE DISCUSSED

Attorney General Speaks to Council of Western Municipalities at Victoria.

PROBLEMS TACKLED

Suggestion That Two Year Term May Be Beneficial in City Government.

VICTORIA, June 14.—In seeking to protect itself from Oriental domination the people of British Columbia do not intend to "sacrifice themselves upon the altar of Imperial relations," Attorney General Manson told the Council of Western Canadian Municipalities.

"The Oriental problem is a menace of the worst possible type for the white social life of British Columbia and unless the other provinces, the provinces of the Prairies, realize their duty as part of the Dominion of Canada we are going to have a very serious situation indeed," Mr. Manson declared. "We have said that we don't intend to sacrifice ourselves on the altar of Imperial relations in this connection. We don't and we won't. That, perhaps is my personal view but I speak as a Minister of the Crown. It is a grave situation when you find the Oriental in our schools, on our lands, as the leader or permanent holder of our lands."

"The Oriental is to-day a very serious factor both in the labor and mercantile life of British Columbia. He is today opening up his stores on the main streets of our cities— which he didn't do ten years ago—and under names which you could not recognize as Oriental. To you men from the Prairies, I say help us to solve this problem. Help us to solve our unemployment situation, which will be much less serious if we can eliminate the Oriental permanently as a labor factor in our communities."

Asks Co-operation.

Mr. Manson uttered a strong plea to the municipalities of British Columbia and other western provinces to stop bickering and get together with their provincial governments to solve provincial and municipal problems. He urged that the term of municipal office should be increased and announced that he was working out a new system of unemployment relief which would enable coast cities to work together on unemployment next winter.

At the commencement of his address Mr. Manson pointed out that the provinces of Canada were separate units, able to do whatever they pleased in their own spheres. On the other hand municipal governments enjoyed only delegated powers and were in a sense, committees of the provincial government. Their powers fluctuated from time to time and one of the constant questions before provincial governments was to extend or contract these powers.

The complaint had been made that provincial governments were too fond of "passing the buck" to the municipalities. Mr. Manson observed. The reason why provincial governments often handed matters over to municipal authorities, he declared, was that they were absolutely overburdened with responsibilities. And the British Columbia Government, he added, on account of the geographical condition of

the Province, was faced with much more serious difficulties than the governments of the Prairie provinces. One of the results of these difficulties was constant bickering between the provincial government and the municipalities.

"I don't think that is necessary," he went on. "If we went on the assumption that both the government and the municipal authorities were placed in office only for the good of the people and that they have common interests there would be no necessity for strife between them. There is no occasion for that strife."

Office Term Too Short.

"Democracy has many weaknesses," Mr. Manson remarked as he went on to point to some of the defects of municipal government. "We must remember," he said, "that the life of municipal governments is short. Indeed I have spoken to the Municipal Inspector on the question of whether the term of municipal office should be increased to bring about greater continuity in municipal government. Again in many municipalities whom do you find in authority in the councils. You find men there of shallow experience, frequently self-seekers who perhaps want the petty returns paid to their office. Our best men will not serve. Isn't that true. We have appealed time and time again to our business men to take an interest in municipal affairs. But always the answer comes back 'I'm too busy, let someone else do it.'"

Need for Experience

"The inducement is not sufficient, in honor or in money. You have to fight constantly against material, which would weaken a municipal council. The short term of municipal office encourages inexperienced men and results in poor government. A man needs experience to run a municipality. Then again, as in all public life, men once in the game strive to stay in and often cater to a certain class for votes. And, holding office for such a short term, the next election day looms very large in the minds of the council members. This leads to bad government, just as it does in the Federal and Provincial field. And the shorter the term of office the stronger that factor is and the poorer government you get. You might consider this question."

Uniform Legislation.

Mr. Manson went on to urge more uniformity in the legislation of western provinces. At the same time, he warned against making uniformity a fetish. Uniformity in legislation, he urged, must be based upon fundamental similarity of conditions in the various western provinces. The necessity of a two-year term for municipal councils, he thought, was a subject upon which uniformity of legislation in the western provinces was desirable.

On that 3,000 odd yards of front, which represented the area of the fighting, it is estimated that over eleven German divisions were used in an effort to smash through the Canadian line. Opposed to these were actually only two Canadian divisions, for the Second Canadian division only contributed a few battalions. The Germans did advance; penetrating in one place to Zillebake village, nearly 2,000 yards from the original front line trenches, but in their attack six years ago today, Canadians drove them from the occupied ground, consolidated the line where it had previously been and made good the saying of the Canadian Corps "that the men from the Dominion had never lost a trench."

CANADA USES MUCH NEW ZEALAND BUTTER

Canada during the past twelve months has imported nearly as much butter directly and indirectly—from New Zealand more particularly—as she exported last year to Great Britain, according to A. W. Grant, prominent Montreal butter and cheese exporter, who returned home after a five week visit in England, on the White Star Dominion liner Canada.

Mr. Grant went on to say that New Zealand is now exporting more cheese to Great Britain than Canada is, although Canadian cheese is preferred as regards quality.

DECLARES MILK IS DANGER TO HEALTH

Is Fit Only For the Young; No Other Adult Animal Uses It.

LONDON, June 14.—"Is there any one subject today upon which doctors agree?" asks a sceptical newspaper commenting on the advice of Dr. Cecil Webb-Johnson, who has said: "Never drink milk; it is an unnatural food save for the young."

Giving his reasons for this revolutionary opinion Dr. Webb-Johnson, a specialist on diet, said to a questioner:

"We are the only animals in the world who drink milk after infancy. The domestic cat, it may be pointed out, drinks milk after it has grown up, but this is purely a domestic habit."

"The idea has been handed down through generations that milk is a good thing to drink when you are ill. I think it is the worst thing, and I never allow my patients to have it. It causes constipation, flatulence, a dirty tongue and leads to rheumatism, headaches, and tired feelings. Taken in excess it often causes appendicitis."

"Nature does not intend milk to be taken after the purpose for which it was provided has been fulfilled. I prefer hard food always. Frequently—some times habitually—people will go whole days without hard food of any description. That, for one thing is bad for the teeth. Celery, apples and other things that make you bite should be on the table every day."

Nor is milk good for the body in addition to ordinary food. It makes one fat, and a fat person cannot be healthy."

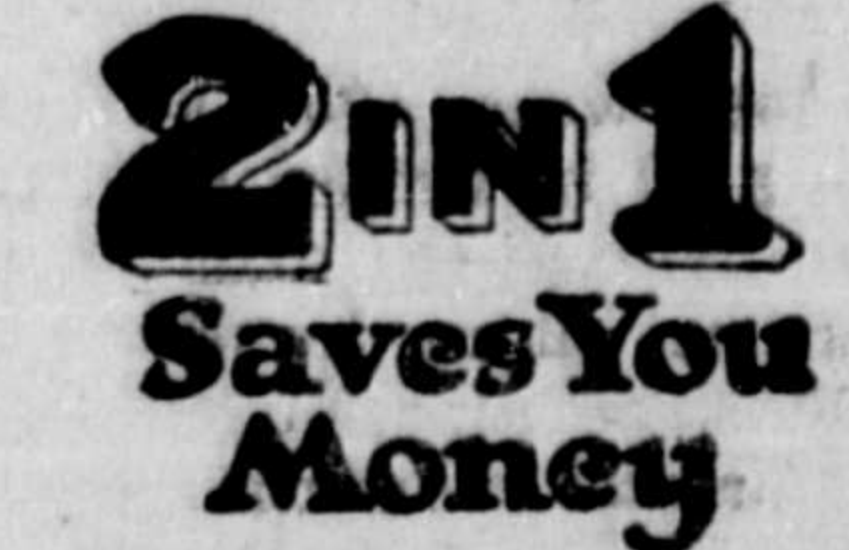

BRITISH PAY IRISH BILLS

Large Sums Boinn Appropriated by Government at London.

LONDON, June 14.—(Associated Press).—While the Irish people burn buildings and destroy property in Ireland it is the people of the sister island who have to pay the bills. Part of these costs are taken from the national treasury by Parliament and part are voluntary contributions given to the funds being raised in England by the sympathizers of sufferers in both sections of Ireland.

The Irish Secretary, Sir Hamar Greenwood, recently proposed in the House of Commons a grant of £750,000, as compensation for damages to property in northern Ireland during the disorders of the past three years. During the excited debate which followed he explained that by agreement between the Colonial Secretary Churchill and Sir James Craig, Prime Minister of the Ulster government, the British government promised to pay Ulster £1,500,000 for damages committed up to the first of January. This does not cover the amount the national treasury will grant to Ireland by any means.

Large Appropriations.

Sir Hamar Greenwood told the House there would be also an appropriation of another £1,500,000 for relief work for Catholics and Protestants in Northern Ireland as well as a further estimate of £2,000,000 to compensate Crown employees, most of whom have lost their positions through the establishment of the new government.

The total amounts made by the British in Northern Ireland to persons who have suffered damages amount to £2,000,000 so that the British government doing £1,500,000 there will be £500,000 for the Ulster government to deal with.

The courts have passed on the claims in the north, which has simplified matters. In the south most of the British
