RIOTS BY UNEMPLOYED IN LONDON

MACKENZIE LAUNCHES BROADSIDE AGAINST BENNETT

Ancient British City Takes On Battle-Like Appearance Today -- Police Fight With Marchers

ROOSEVELT BACK HOME

Democratic Candidate For President Had Triumphant Tour of South-eastern States

ALBANY, N.Y., Oct. 27.—Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt, Democratic candidate for president of the United States, was back home yesterday following a triumphal whirlwind eight-day tour of the south and east during which he made campaign speeches at various centres of importance.

"The tide is flowing strongly in favor of the Democrats," declared Governor Roosevelt to newspapermen.

The Democratic candidate will visit Massachusetts at the weekend, giving a major address at Boston on Monday night.

HOOVER'S CAMPAIGN

Will Make Speeches at Number of Points Between Now and Election Day

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 27.—Details of President Herbert Hoover's final campaign tour prior to the national election on November 8 were made known last night.

On his way to Indianapolis, where he will address an important meeting Friday night, Mr. Hoover will make eight talks during stops in West Virginia, Ohio and Indiana. Following the Indianapolis meeting, Mr. Hoover will be heard in major speeches at Baltimore, Philadelphia and Newark before closing his campaign on Monday night, at Madison Square Garden in New York.

FLY BEFORE COMMUNISTS

America and British Missionaries Seek Safety From Outlaws in City of Foochow

FOOCHOW, China, Oct. 27.—British and American missionaries are fleeing into Foochow from their posts in the north before an advance of Chinese communist outlaws, it became known here yesterday.

It is possible that a squadron of American destroyers, bound from Manila to Shanghai, may put in here to take on the refugee missionaries.

YUKON RIVER IS NOW FREEZING UP

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Oct. 27.—Winter, rather belated this year, arrived along the Yukon River today with the ice jammed at Fort Yukon. The river is freezing up all along its course.

"Hunger Army" Waves Red Flag as it Moves From Outskirts to Hyde Park—Oxford Shopping District Becomes Surging Mass of Hysterical People—Exciting Scenes

LONDON, Oct. 27.—Rioting occurred on Edgware Road where thousands of "hunger marchers" were entering Hyde Park today to organize for their protests against the new provisions of the dole system. Police charged the crowds, swinging long batons right and left. Several were injured. The rioting broke out opposite the Marble Arch entrance.

TO OBTAIN PREFERENCE

Goods Must Be Consigned Direct From Canada to Britain, It Is Announced

OTTAWA, Oct. 27.—Canadian goods shipped to the United Kingdom will receive a British preference if consigned directly from Canada whether they pass through the United States en route or not.

Canadian goods consigned to the United States and then re-consigned to the United Kingdom will not receive the preference.

Payment of Cash Bonuses Demanded

Representatives of Veterans of Four Wars Put Request Before Hoover

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 27.—Immediate payment of cash bonuses was formally demanded of President Herbert Hoover yesterday by representatives of veterans of four wars.

Well Known Screen Star Now Mother

Seven and Half Pound Child Born in Brooklyn Yesterday to Helen Twelvetees

BROOKLYN, Oct. 27.—A seven and a half pound baby was born here yesterday to Helen Twelvetees, well known screen beauty, whose husband is Frank Woody, Los Angeles real estate dealer. Miss Twelvetees, who lives in Los Angeles, has been spending the past three months prior to confinement here with her mother.

Richard Bennett Has Pneumonia

Veteran Actor, Fighting For Life Against Malady, to Be Removed to Drier Climate

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 27.—Richard Bennett, head of the well known family of actors and father of Barbara, Constance and Joan Bennett, screen stars, who is fighting for his life against an attack of pneumonia, was ordered by his physicians yesterday to be removed to the dry air at Palm Springs.

It was estimated that fifty thousand people, mostly spectators, were massed in the park where many of the marchers were assembled and their leaders were making speeches. The police singled out the leaders and arrested them despite shouts of protest from the crowd.

The trouble began when a brick was heaved through the Post Office window at Great Cumberland Place. Stones and sticks were hurled at the charging police.

The Oxford Street shopping district became a surging mass. Women were shrieking and many windows were broken. Cumberland Place was finally cleared.

In the park a living wall of police, standing shoulder to shoulder, kept back the crowds as the marchers entered.

Today's demonstration was the climax of a nation-wide gathering of unemployed and the goal was the famous park in the centre of the city where two thousand marchers, who entered the outskirts of the city last night to appeal for a more generous administration of the dole, were augmented by thousands of London's unemployed. Their particular protest was at the "means test" of the dole system. The invading "hunger army" of two thousand was led by W. A. L. Hannington, Communist, who is alleged to have already been active in connection with mutinies and other disorders.

Approximately five thousand police were assigned to special duty to quell the disturbance, demonstrating the fact that never before has Scotland Yard taken such elaborate precautions to deal with a demonstration of workers. Police van motors, wireless-equipped, and motorcycle squads kept headquarters in touch with a dozen or more contingents of marchers as if the whole business were battle manoeuvres.

A drizzle and chill wind, to which the marchers have long been accustomed, failed to dampen the ardor of the various columns as they moved in from the rim of London with Red Flags flying.

Prime Minister J. Ramsay MacDonald has already promised consideration to some of the requests that are being made.

Former President Of Mexico to Take U. S. Citizenship

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Oct. 27.—General Ortez Rubio, former President of Mexico, has purchased property here with a view, it is reported, to taking up residence in this city and becoming a citizen of the United States.

ADVANCES IN STOCK

Majority of New York Issues Up—Wheat and Pound Reach Low Levels

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—Heartened by the announcement of a dividend on United States Steel Preferred, the local stock market showed fair gains on yesterday's trading with the majority of issues closing higher. The industrial average was up 14-100 points to 61.36, the rail average up 52-100 to 27.64 and utilities up 37-100 to 27-18.

During the day 869,260 shares changed hands.

Grains showed slight advances late in the day to close one cent down from Tuesday after having struck the lowest levels on record earlier in the session. Cotton closed up 75c per bale.

Bonds closed at an average of 78.87, off 33-100.

The British pound sterling also sank to a new low level for the year, closing at \$3.297. The Canadian dollar closed at 91 1/4c.

RIOT IN MEETING

Deliberations of Chicago Council Disturbed By Unemployed Demonstration

CHICAGO, Oct. 27.—One hundred unemployed men and women, who started a riot in a city council meeting here yesterday when they were refused a hearing to air grievances in regard to the administration of relief, were appeased when Mayor Anton Cermak promised that he would give their representatives an audience on Friday.

WHEAT HAS COME-BACK

No Reconciliation In Royal Family

Visit of Princess Helen to Bucharest Has Nothing to Do With This It Is Announced

BUCHAREST, Roumania, Oct. 27.—The visit of Princess Helen to Bucharest has no significance as far as the possibility of a reconciliation with King Carol is concerned, it was officially stated yesterday. Princess Helen merely came here to be present at the eleventh birthday of her son, Crown Prince Michael.

NEW BISHOP OF TORONTO

Rt. Rev. Derwyn Owen of Niagara to Succeed Archbishop Sweeney, Who Has Retired

TORONTO, Oct. 27.—Rt. Rev. Derwyn Owen, Bishop of Niagara, has been elected bishop of the Anglican diocese of Toronto in succession to Archbishop Sweeney who has resigned.

Collapse of Economic System Under Present Conditions is Feared

Trade Agreements With United Kingdom Will Not Help Starving Unemployed, Vancouver Centre Liberal Member Tells House of Commons

OTTAWA, Oct. 27.—Complete collapse of the economic system in Canada within eighteen months if present conditions continue is feared by Hon. Ian Mackenzie, M.P. for Vancouver Centre. Unable to find any hope in the trade agreement with the United Kingdom when he spoke in the House of Commons yesterday, Capt. Mackenzie launched

into a general assault on the economic and tariff policies of the Bennett government. It was, he charged, a government in the interest of "coupon-clippers, protecting idle men and idle money."

The new trade treaty would not help the starving unemployed, Capt. Mackenzie declared.

MAY KNOW OF KIDNAP

Suspect in Connection With Lindbergh Abduction is Being Held in Spanish City Told Sailors

SEVILLE, Spain, Oct. 27.—At the instance of the United States consul here, a man giving the name of John Saul is being held for questioning in connection with the kidnapping of Charles Augustus Lindbergh Jr. and the distribution of \$50,000 ransom money which was paid for the return of the child. Detention of the man followed a conversation he is alleged to have engaged in with two United States sailors who informed the consul that he appeared to have considerable information on these subjects.

Saul, who was arrested Tuesday night, refused to answer questions until he faced American authorities. It is expected he will be transferred to Madrid jail for further examination.

Saul's identification papers appear to be not in order and it is possible that is not his real name. There is also some uncertainty as to his nationality.

Pay of College Staff Reduced

Ten Percent Cut in Salaries at Northwestern University is Announced

CHICAGO, Oct. 27.—A ten percent cut in the salaries of the staff of Northwestern University was announced yesterday. The reduction is necessary to meet an estimated deficit of \$400,000 on the term's operations.

Young Rockefeller To Be Wedded Soon

John D. III Takes Out Licence to Marry Miss Blanche Hooker of Buffalo

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—John D. Rockefeller III took out a licence here yesterday to marry Miss Blanche Hooker, daughter of a Buffalo industrialist. Rockefeller gave his age as 26 and that of Miss Hooker as 23. They plan to be married on Armistice Day.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 27.—Bainbridge Colby, who was a member of the administration of the late President Woodrow Wilson, in a speech here yesterday in support of the candidature of Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt for president of the United States, declared that the only hope of recovery for the United States from its present economic ills lay in a change from Republican to Democratic administration and policies.

VICTORIA WOMAN IS DROWNED IN WASH TUB

VICTORIA, Oct. 27.—With her head buried in a tub of soapy water, Mrs. Elizabeth Crews was found drowned in her home here yesterday. The woman is believed to have been seized with a fainting spell while engaged in washing.

ERA OF COMMON SENSE

Clarence Budington Kelland says that we are now getting back to an era of common sense such as that of the period prior to the war. For eighteen years the world has lived in a delirium and liked it. The younger generation has been born on a merry-go-round and would have to be taught that the world could not be run to the music of a hurdy-gurdy while they sit on the wooden horses.

The same writer suggests that we must write off the past eighteen years. We must rub our eyes, wake up after the carouse, take something for our headache and resume normal life under normal conditions.

Kelland is always interesting but in an article in the current American Magazine he states so many homely truths that one wants to read them a second time. Here are one or two:

"Everybody had a bad attack of Delusion of Grandeur. Now we must realize that a spade is a spade and not an implement for shovelling money out of the window."

"Quit trying to impress the neighbors. It only makes them gossip about you."

"You are going to be pretty busy if you do your thinking for yourself, and if you try to do it for your immediate family you are going to have to work overtime—but if you start in regulating the goings and comings and risings and sittings of your neighbors and townsmen you are going to be more than overworked—you are going to be an infernal, impertinent nuisance."

"I'm all against the double standard in smoking. I admit that a goodly percentage of women who smoke light a cigarette as if it were a Roman candle, hold it as if it were a bomb and blow through it as if it were a bean shooter. But that is no reason why they shouldn't. I contend that a lady has a right to do whatever she likes with her cigarette and I contend that the busybodies need a bigger dose of temperance than the bootleggers."

Speaking of gossip, Kelland says: "Almost nothing gives such exquisite joy as putting over a sizzling innuendo damaging to the reputation of a neighbor. I've sat for evenings getting positively intoxicated with the fumes of gossip. I wouldn't prohibit it—God forbid—I can't get along without my daily nightcap of it; but after all, there's no use lushing it from breakfast to midnight."

But he returns to economics and says: "We have been living in an age where too much wasn't plenty. Now, if we are to get anywhere we must inaugurate an era where plenty will be just enough."

"A good deal of rebuilding must be done for the roof leaks and the hinges have grown loose and the floors are warped, but we have the tools to do it with."

PROGRAM IS DELIGHTFUL

Ladies' Music Club Meets at Home of Mrs. Robt. H. W. Bartlett

An exceptionally interesting and delightful program of American Indian music and also music of East India was rendered yesterday afternoon at the meeting of the Music Club, under the capable supervision of Mrs. Robert Bartlett.

Many citizens will recall one composer of American Indian music, in the person of Dr. Ernest McMillan Mus. Doc. of the Toronto Conservatory of Music, who gave an organ recital in the Anglican Cathedral in 1927.

Dr. McMillan was instrumental in immortalizing many ancient melodies of the West Coast tribes which would otherwise have been lost in a few years. BEARS KILL EIGHT SHEEP

Raid Made By Bruin on Tiel Farm Ends in Fatalities For Raiders

UNEMPLOYED IN SESSION

Ask Permission to Kill Deer to Augment Meat Supply—Scrip Every Two Weeks Requested

At a meeting of the local branch of the National Unemployed Workers' Association last night it was decided that the Game Conservation Board be approached with the request that local unemployed be allowed to kill or possess deer in order to augment their food allowance.

It was also decided to interview the mayor with a view to having municipal scrip issued every two weeks instead of weekly. It is be-

lieved that, if this were done, housewives would be able to make their allowances go further.

J. J. Gillis, a member of the board of school trustees, addressed the meeting and outlined some of the educational problems in local schools. Mr. Gillis pointed out that the government did not make an allowance to the school board for purchase of books for children of unemployed persons but the board had been able to supply all books so far required locally by means of old books that had been turned in. Principals had been asked to notify the board of cases of shortage of school accessories which the board would do its best to meet.

The executive of the association was given authority to organize a mass meeting with a view to gathering data and protesting at a number of arrests and deportations of unemployed workers in various

parts of Canada. This meeting will be held in the near future.

Last night's meeting was crowded to capacity. Charles Chapman was in the chair.
