TURKEY SIGNS THE ARMISTICE CONVENTION BRITISH ELECTION BEFORE CHRISTMAS FORECASTED BY POLITICAL PROPHETS

Armistice Convention Signed at Mudania by Leaders of Both Sides

MUDANIA, Oct. 11.—The Armistice Convention has been signed by all the parties concerned.
The Turks expressed resentment over the terms and the failure of the French to continue backing Turkey. They say that if the peace conference yet to be arranged does not concede the Turkish demands the Turks will continue the military campaign against Greece.

General Harrington, for the British, said the convention represented the limit Britain was prepared to go and reminded Turkey that it was not wise to risk a clash of arms with Britain.

NEW DIRECTORS CAN. NATIONAL HOLD MEETING

Appoint W. D. Robb and S. P. Hungerford as Vice-Presidents of Sections

TORONTO, Oct. 11.—The new directors of the Canadian National Railway and merchant marine system were sworn in here yesterday and after carrying out the routine business, made two very important appointments. W. D. Robb is appointed vice-president and general manager of the Grand Trunk Railway and S. P. Hungerford is vice-president and general manager of the Canadian National.

CONFERENCES ARE ARRANGED

Details of Peace in Near East to be Arranged Following Armistice

LONDON, Oct. 11.—With the armistice signed at Mudania putting an end to warfare between the Greeks and the Turkish Nationalists, plans for the conference designed to bring about a definite peace in the near east are proceeding in a less agitated atmosphere.

The conferences being arranged are one for fixing the general near eastern terms and another to provide for the neutralization of the Dardanelles.

LIGHT DRAGOON IS NEWMARKET WINNER

Horse is Property of Capt. Forester; Prize a Thousand Pounds

NEWMARKET, Oct. 11.—Capt. Forester's "Light Dragoon" at one hundred to one against, won the Czarvitch handicap of one thousand pounds with extras today. A de Rothschild's "The Villager" at 40 to 1 came second and "Ceylonese," owned by Sir A. Bailey, at 10 to 1 passed the judge's stand third.

FIGHTING IN DUBLIN DURING LAST NIGHT

DUBLIN, Oct. 11.—Numerous ambushes accompanied by heavy bursts of firing occurred in various parts of the city during last night. The fighting continued until dawn. No reports on casualties were available this forenoon.

INSUFFICIENT EVIDENCE GIVEN

Charge of Breaking and Entering Against Goodland is Dismissed

The case of W. Goodland, charged with breaking and entering a room in the Dominion Cafe on October 7 and tried before His Honor Judge F. McR. Young in the county court this morning was dismissed. Jos. Lawler, a minor, charged with the same offence, was ordered detained by His Honor for further action. W. S. Fisher appeared for the prosecution and L. W. Patmore of Patmore & Fulton, for the defence.

The Evidence
The evidence given by Goodland was to the effect that he had stayed at the Dominion Cafe on the night of Oct. 6. On Saturday morning Oct. 7 he had a friendly scuffle in the Royal Hotel with a chum in which he got "mussed" up. It was for the purpose of fixing his tie and making himself respectable before going to see his cousin, who received his mail, that he went up to the room he had vacated, accompanied by the boy.

On arrival there he found his room occupied by an Indian. He saw a girl acquaintance Louise, whom he had known for some time, and asked her if he could use her room to which she assented. He opened the door with his own key and he and Lawler went in, locking the door after them. They had been in the room only some few minutes when the police arrived.

Lawler's Evidence
The boy Lawler said that he met accused on the street, on Saturday last, who said he was going up to his room in the Dominion Cafe, and he went up with him. He did not know what Goodland was going up for. When they got upstairs they went into the girl's room, and while there he gave Goodland some gold tipped cigarettes, which in reply to a question he said he had bought with some money he had stolen from a boat. Goodland asked him to loan him money and he gave him \$2.00. While in the room, the boy stated that Goodland had opened the drawers in the bureau, but this Goodland denied.

Summing Up
In summing up Judge Young told Goodland that he had been charged with a serious offence and in his mind it was not quite clear whether he was guilty or not guilty for the reason that it was the duty of the Crown to prove the case up to the hilt, which had not been done, and he had no recourse but to let him go. However, sufficient evidence had been brought out in the case to prove that accused was not living a proper and clean life and that he was going headlong to destruction. He would be allowed to go but the facts brought out in the case would stand against him if brought up again at some future time. "You are only a young man yet, and I would judge to be of respectable parents. I may tell you now that there is only one rule you can adopt if you wish to be successful and happy and that is to go straight," said His Honor.

LLOYD GEORGE DEFENDS SELF

Will Address Meeting at Manchester on Saturday in Defence of Policy

ELECTION IS DENIED
British Government is Said to be Holding Together Well

LONDON, Oct. 11.—It is announced that Lloyd George will speak at Manchester on Saturday in defence of the Near East policy of his government and it is expected he will make a vigorous reply to his critics.

While it is stated in some quarters that the Premier may make a sensational announcement foreshadowing his impending resignation in certain contingencies, the fact that Austen Chamberlain, leader of the government forces in the House of Commons, speaks at Birmingham on Friday and Winston Churchill, colonial secretary, will also address a meeting at Dundee shortly, is regarded as evidence that the Government is holding firmly together and organizing a counter attack.

In Liberal circles it is stated there is no question of the resignation of Lloyd George or an immediate general election.

CHURCH NOT WITH REBELS IN IRELAND

Holy Offices Refused to Those Who Continue Military Rebellion.

DUBLIN, Oct. 11.—The heads of the Catholic Church in Ireland have issued a strong statement that rebels will be denied the offices of the church if the military rebellion continues.

The document says that the rebels have caused more devastation in Ireland than British troops ever could have done.

Four persons are dead and many injured following the mutiny in Mount Joy prison where prisoners attacked the guards with arms that had been smuggled into the cells.

CONSIDER APPEAL ON LIQUOR IMPORT

Attorney General Manson Says the Decision of Supreme Court May be Appealed.

VICTORIA, Oct. 11.—The British Columbia Government will consider the matter of an appeal against the judgment of the Supreme Court of Canada confirming the right of the Dominion to collect customs duties on liquor imported into Canada by provincial liquor boards, it was stated here yesterday by Attorney General Manson.

BOND CONVERSION A GREAT SUCCESS

Hundred Million Dollars Worth of New Securities Taken by Former Investors

OTTAWA, Oct. 11.—The conversion of 1922 Victory bonds into new five and ten year Government five and a half per cent bonds with a month's interest added has been very successful. The finance minister announces that the sum of \$100,000,000 of the new bonds have been taken and the Government expresses satisfaction with the results.

POLITICS TAKE SIR ROBERT HORNE HOME

LONDON, Oct. 11.—Sir Robert Horne, British Chancellor, has postponed indefinitely the debt funding mission to the United States on account of the British political situation.

NEWNHAM GETS APPOINTMENT

Popular Corporal of Mounties to Have Position in Indian Department

Corporal E. G. Newnham, M.M., of the local detachment Royal Canadian Mounted Police, has been appointed to the Indian Department of the Naas River district. He will now come under the jurisdiction of W. E. Collison, the Indian Agent for that district, with headquarters in Prince Rupert. Corporal Newnham served with the first Imperial division for four years and six months, and won his Military Medal in the battle of the Somme in 1916, being wounded in that engagement.

Corpl. Newnham has been a member of the R.C.M.P. for the past nine years and has been stationed in Prince Rupert for the past two years. He was a very popular member of the local detachment and was active in both G.W.V.A. and S.O.E. matters.

The definite date of his leaving the city to take up his new appointment has not yet been decided.

Election in Britain Before Christmas and Probably Next Month it is Announced Today

LONDON, Oct. 11.—Taking advantage of the settlement of the Turkish difficulty, it is understood that Premier Lloyd George will at once appeal to the country for endorsement of his policy in the near east. This will mean another war election.

The Daily Chronicle, Lloyd George's official organ, says a general election is certain before Christmas and it may be held in November.

Sir William Horne, chancellor of the exchequer, has been called home from Washington, the task of completing financial arrangements with the United States being left for the next government.

Speculation is rife as to the line up to be taken. Many of the old Conservatives are for throwing over the premier and trying to elect a straight Conservative government with a Conservative premier. There have been many outbreaks against the present government, the most outstanding being that led by Sir George Yoenger. The fight is bound to be a bitter one and it is expected that the labor party will figure large in the contest.

Wall and the late Mrs. Wall, became the bride of George Alexander Hunter, elder son of Mr. and Mrs. D. McR. Hunter, Fifth Avenue, Prince Rupert. The ceremony took place at the home of the bride's father, 648 Haliburton Street.

The bride wearing a costume of white charmeuse satin with pearl dropped trimmings and the veil of Spanish mantilla with corners of orange blossoms worn by her mother at her wedding and carrying a bouquet of Ophelia roses with streamers, looked very beautiful as she entered the room on the arm of her father. FRASER LAKE MILL BURNS

Twenty Thousand Dollar Loss From Fire at Interior Point

ENDAKO, B.C., Oct. 11.—The sawmill and part of the lumber stock at Fraser Lake, B.C., belonging to Webster and Black, Fraser Lake, was destroyed by fire at 7 o'clock last evening. The fire started in the boiler room after the men had quit work and had strong headway before it was noticed. Every effort was made to save the property by bucket brigade. As the mill is located on edge of the lake and with the aided assistance of a work train arriving later in the evening with a tank full of water, got the fire under control at about one o'clock in the morning. The mill is a total loss and about one hundred thousand feet of No. 1 cedar and fir was destroyed, the loss being about twenty thousand dollars with practically no insurance to cover.

POLITICAL TIRADE BY H. H. STEVENS AT PRINCE RUPERT MEN

Member Lets off Barrel of Spleen Trying to Damage Characters of Local Leaders

VANCOUVER, Oct. 11.—At a meeting here for the purpose of organizing the Liberal-Conservative party in Vancouver, H. H. Stevens denounced the Oliver Government's liquor policy and accused Fred G. Dawson of Prince Rupert of having brought in big quantities of beer illegally during the past few months.

Mr. Stevens said that Attorney General Manson's legal firm was the principal defender of bootleggers in the north and he further charged that the Government had failed to bring in convictions in the north where bootleggers flourished and the only convictions brought there were by the civic authorities.

Mudania Convention Has Been Signed.

The signing of the Mudania convention is a great relief. While the possibility of trouble is not wholly averted yet, the prospects are that there will be peace and that Europe will be able to proceed with the program of reconstruction, a most difficult task.

Beware Of Fake Investment Schemes.

Prince Rupert has been flooded with circulars designed to get from them good Canadian dollars in exchange for useless paper marks. In any arguments that are used to push the sale of German securities it must be remembered that while currency has often been debased, there never before has been a time when any country counted on paying all its debts by printing millions of paper notes. This has been done by Russia, Germany and Austria with fatal results. There seemed at first to be a temporary advantage but now there is so much paper money in circulation that it has become valueless in trade with other countries and even for home use it is almost useless. There is so much of it that the government cannot hope to redeem it.

There are plenty of good investments that may be made or if lighter speculation is desired, there is mining and oil stock that may bring big returns even if the security is not very good. To send the cash to Germany to buy money that is valueless is like throwing it into the sea. The gambler should at any rate have something approaching an even chance of winning.

Bulkley Beef Controversy.

Considerable controversy has been raised over Bulkley beef and the ability of the farmers to kill and dress it properly. The matter seems likely to be settled by the big dealers purchasing the cattle on the hoof and dressing it here. That seems to be the logical outcome. The ordinary farmer has no facility for killing and he has not served an apprenticeship to the trade.

The vital thing is that the farmer shall find a proper market for his stock, and that now seems assured. In the scattered districts of the north, markets are few and it is very desirable that there shall be the most complete co-operation between the dealers in Prince Rupert and the farmers of the interior.

Moderation Over Mining News.

When a prospector goes into the hills and knocks off a chunk of ore that carries high values he usually thinks he has a mine worth one hundred thousand dollars at the least. At any rate he says so and he gets an assay made showing the immense values in the bit of rock. He then expatiates on the thousands of tons of ore exactly like the sample that is in the mine.

People who do not know prospectors are apt to be misled by their enthusiasm. They sometimes are led to invest large sums in what is nothing more than a hole in the ground.

What is needed today is accurate news of the mines and their possibilities. Until a mine is proved it is a prospect. There is nothing to be gained by exaggeration, but often much harm may be done that way. The wonderful output of a mine such as the Premier is romantic enough without telling wild stories about it.

Stewart Does Not Need The Booster.

Stewart mining camp does not need the booster to put it in the prosperous class with all sorts of possibilities. With one mine shipping ore carrying immense values and with others getting out ore in smaller quantities and making a few small shipments, and with the prospects looking extremely good at many of the properties, this place should be a permanent camp and should attract capital from all parts of the world. As a matter of fact it is already doing so.

In the Letter Box

MR. MEIGHEN'S CALL TO ARMS

Editor Daily News:

In the critical period through which we are now passing one reads with interest the extracts from the "Financial Post" and Winnipeg "Free Press" as given in your issue of 4th inst. and there is that in the situation which should cause Canadians to consider before committing themselves to any rash or irrevocable decision.

One thing at least is certain—Canada has no need of a counsellor such as Mr. Meighen to teach her in which direction her duty lies nor has she occasion for heart searching on the question of loyalty to the Motherland. Her part in the Great Crusade is written large on the pages of History and places her for all time beyond and above the cavilling of mere notoriety seeking politicians. And so we may be forgiven if we do not all take Mr. Meighen quite so seriously as he might wish.

But there are other matters which have to be taken into consideration and which may bear considerably on the decision which now lies before the people of this country.

Pseudo-Patriotic

Following the ex-premier's pseudo-patriotic political outburst one is almost impelled to ask whether he is aware that Canada emerging from four years of exhaustive effort and unprecedented drain on her resources, weighted by a huge debt, taxed to the utmost bearable limit is only beginning to struggle back to a normal basis of business prosperity. Are there not enough Canadian graves in Flanders to satisfy Mr. Meighen's idealistic conception of loyalty? Is he aware of the thousands of maimed and crippled human wrecks which still crowd our hospitals and institutions? Is he conscious of the tears—scarce dry on the cheeks of widows and orphans throughout the length and breadth of this land that he so lightly essays to sweep the youth of his country into another inferno the end of which neither he nor his colleagues can possibly foresee?

For loyalty may have its penalties as well as its rewards. Would Mr. Meighen like to learn? Let him go among the loyalists—or rather what is left of them—throughout the south and west of Ireland. When the history of their black betrayal and sufferings comes to be written—as written, some day it will be—Britons throughout the Empire will have cause to hang their heads in shame. For not only were these poor people disarmed—deprived of their only means of defence—but were handed over, bound and helpless to the mercies of their enemies. Their only crime was their loyalty; and they paid for it—in blood and tears—for the ink on the infamous treaty was scarcely dry ere their martyrdom began, and it might be well, at this crisis to bear in mind that the signatures at foot of that treaty which was in reality neither more nor less than the death warrant of many of these unfortunate people, are those of David Lloyd George and Winston Spencer Churchill, these same gentlemen who but a few days ago broadcasted an appeal for aid to the loyalists of the Overseas Dominions.

Black Betrayal

We have no assurance that the appeals of these martyrs penetrated to the council chamber in Downing Street yet it is possible that they were heard and are on record before a Higher Tribunal than that over which Messrs. Lloyd-George and Churchill preside.

And, hearing these things in mind Canadians may be pardoned if they hesitate at the clamor call so persuasively sounded by

So, if Mr. Meighen can only succeed to the extent of awakening the people of this Dominion to a sense of their position he will not have labored in vain; for we have it on the authority of those whose experience in such matters ought to be sufficient guarantee, that the Treaty of Versailles with its mandates, concessions and countless intricacies, has forged the most potent weapon for the waging of future wars among the nations of the earth, that the blunderings of statesmen and the greed of politicians could possibly achieve.

Therefore, for this reason alone, it is time that our Government, sweeping aside all secret treaties or commitments affecting the peace and security of this country, insist once and for all on the exercise of the inalienable right of a Free Democracy, that the question of peace or war is one that shall in future be decided solely by the Parliament and the People of Canada.

BURMESE MONK IS HERO IN MANDALAY

Carried Through City and Greeted by Fifty Thousand.

MANDALAY, Burma, Oct. 11.—Mandalay gave the greatest ovation in its history recently to U. Ottama, the Burmese monk and Nationalist leader, who came to the city from the Maubain jail where he had been shut away for his political activities. The city went wild for Mandalay. At the railroad station U. Ottama was placed in a palanquin and carried through the streets. Eight thousand monks and 50,000 people lined the way to greet him. There were many flags, much bunting, and countless political mottoes hanging from trees. Women threw flowers and rice in front of U. Ottama, presented him with gifts, and distributed fans, betel nuts, cold drinks and tea among the marchers. There was singing all along the line of march, and music from Burmese bands. U. Ottama was called upon to make an address. He dwelt upon the country's national aspirations.

Distinct Change. "There has come a distinct change in the mentality of the Burmese people, he said. "The old cringing before a sunburnt aloof has given place to a manlier outlook. We have begun to take active interest in everything that happens in Burma as well as India.

"We are born in an age of new world-awakening. We are nurtured in new ideals. Let us take courage in our hands, and with a will and determination spring into the fire of patriotism and our road is clear before us. It is a question of the realization of the true spirit of freedom.

"If we can induce our people to take to hand-made cloths and avoid many useless luxuries of foreign make, home rule will be secured to us at no distant date. Englishmen do not want your country if they cannot make money out of you."

BUY BULKLEY BEEF AND KILL IN THIS CITY

P. Burns Co. Made Arrangements to Handle All Fat Cattle Offering

RENTED WAREHOUSE

The P. Burns Company has secured the use of the fish packing house formerly occupied by the Pacific Sea Products Ltd. and will kill there the cattle that are purchased in the interior of British Columbia. R. Moore, local manager for the company made the announcement at a meeting of the council of the board of trade in conference with D. D. Munro of the Land Settlement Board and Alex. Prudhomme, a Telkwa farmer at the city hall yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Munro outlined the difficulties of the Bulkley farmers. There was no opportunity to sell the stock in the ordinary way as they were too far from the markets. Prince Rupert was the natural point to which to ship and he thought the local people should, as far as possible, use Bulkley beef.

Ready to Buy

Mr. Moore said he was ready to buy the cattle for P. Burns Co. and had already made arrangements for a temporary place to kill the cattle. He was willing to pay Calgary and Edmonton prices but would not pay any fancy prices. The price for prime steers in Calgary today was four to four and a half cents a pound live weight and cows down to three or three and a quarter. The price in Chicago was seven to eight cents which would be about the same as Calgary prices less freight and other charges. He asked for a list of cattle that might be offering so that he could make preparations to call and see them.

W. G. Murray of the co-operative store was inclined to think the beef would be better killed in the interior.

Alex. Prudhomme suggested that the city should put up a killing pen where anyone could kill. There was no need of an abattoir here at present but a slaughterhouse would fill the need and then Burns or anyone else could use it.

W. E. Williams thought the people interested ought to undertake work of that kind.

E. C. Gibbons suggested that Burns should allow any other people to use their place. They did that at Vancouver, charging a fee for it.

Mixed Car Loads

Mr. Moore said they wished to co-operate with the farmer but they had rented the warehouse for only six weeks, by which time he expected all the beef would have been killed. It was a temporary arrangement. It suited his company better to buy from the prairies because they got in a mixed car load of beef, mutton, pork and veal. Of this beef was only about one third. By getting it in regularly no refrigeration was necessary.

Mr. McCaffery criticized the methods of P. Burns in doing business here. He had made here but had never done anything for the town.

It was finally arranged that Mr. Munro and Mr. McCaffery should accompany Mr. Moore into the interior. Mr. McCaffery represented

ting the Prince Rupert Board of Trade. It was also suggested that probably the Swift Canadian Company would take part of the beef.

GERMAN PRICES GO SKYWARD AS MONEY DECREASES IN VALUE

Thousand Marks Once Bought Twenty Suits of Clothes; Now Won't Pay For Vest

BERLIN, Oct. 11. — About the only thing can be bought in Germany today for one mark is a wire nail. "Under the present quality standards of production," remarks a native pessimist, "the nail may or may not be strong enough to hang one's self on after he has looked over the other increases in prices."

Before the war a thousand marks would pay for twenty suits of clothes. Today that sum will purchase a vest. A good piano could be bought then for 100 marks, a sum now required for a pair of boy's shoes. Five hundred pre-war marks sufficed to build a small house, while now it scarcely foots the bill for two pairs of women's woollen stockings. Two pounds of butter can be found on the market today for 400 marks, or the pre-war price of a milk cow.

One cannot get a spool of thread today for the former price of a sewing machine. Fifty marks once bought a lady's silk dress; now it will buy a cheap handkerchief. There was a time, some eight years ago, when one could get a bottle of champagne for what it costs now to ride on the subway. Two cigarettes are worth what a hundred of the same quality cost in 1914.

To follow the daily rise in prices at the present time, the Berlin newspaper reader must pay six marks for a copy of his favorite journal. In the "good old days" the paper lost him sixty times less, or ten pennings.

A shopkeeper in Darmstadt displays a five-dollar bill in his window attached to the following notice: "For this note foreigners formerly obtained goods to the value of 26.25 marks; now they get wares worth 7,000 marks for it. Therefore I sell only to Germans."

ONE BIG UNION WAS FAILURE

Winnipeg Paper Quotes One of Its Leaders as to Future Action.

Under the caption "Admits O.B.U. a Complete Failure," the Winnipeg Free Press has the following editorial article: "Walter Mill, secretary of the Saskatchewan branch of the O.B.U., has resigned his position on the ground that the O.B.U. has proved an entire failure and, though he still believes in its revolutionary aims, he thinks these

must be gained by other methods. In his letter of resignation he tells of the hopes of those who started the O.B.U. a few years ago. When the membership went up to forty or forty-five thousand, the prospects for success seemed bright, but, says Mr. Mill, "time has shown that the accession to our ranks was only a temporary manifestation and that when the wave subsided our ranks began to dwindle and are thinning every day." He also says he is forced to the conclusion that secession of the O.B.U. weakened the organized workers. If the O.B.U. had not been launched, "we would not now be in the hopeless, helpless, disorganized condition in which we now find ourselves." The resigning secretary also speaks of "the decline of the O.B.U. and its failure to function and represent the masses of workers." Again he says: "Though fully conscious of our sincerity and hope in the O.B.U. in the days of its apparent promise of success, I yet realize that the O.B.U. is an instrument that can not be utilized in the fight, either locally or internationally and that its day is done."

Still a Red

This evidence of the failure of the O.B.U. is all the stronger since it is not that of an ordinary deserter of a movement or of a prejudiced witness. He is still a "Red" and is speaking to comrades whose objectives are still his objectives, but he frankly tells them that the O.B.U. has not made good because it has completely failed to attract more than a small proportion of the workers.

Mr. Mill's plan is to have the members of the O.B.U. return to the more moderate branch of organized labor, oust the moderate leaders—"reactionary," he calls them—and give the reunited labor movement a decidedly reddish tinge. Under this new impulse the labor forces would, he says, strive for "the overthrow of the capitalist class, the establishing in its stead of the dictatorship of the workers and the setting up of the workers' republic."

Quietly Take Control

This coincides exactly with the scheme which was laid three years before the O.B.U. set up as a separate organization. The moving spirits decided that they would quietly take control of organized labor and use it for their extreme purposes. But the bulk of the workers have recognized the folly of extreme, revolutionary aims or methods they have had an object lesson in Europe in "dictatorship of the workers," and they are far less likely to be duped by the Reds now than formerly. It is interesting to know, however, from one of their own number that the O.B.U. is dwindling and "thinning every day," and that there is any attempt of those who remain to return to the main body of organized workers and capture control of it, it will not have been without warning.

PREMIER KING CONGRATULATED

Trades and Labor Council Appreciation at Appointment of Moore to Railway Board

A meeting of the Trades and Labor Council was held last night in the Carpenters' Hall, S. D. Macdonald being in the chair. There was a good attendance.

The Calgary Trades and Labor Council are conducting a campaign against the four western provinces entering into a ten year agreement with Gage of Toronto for the printing of school books. The opposition is based on the ten year contract, the fact of the printing being done in the east and the subject matter of the text books not being suitable. The stand of the Calgary Council was endorsed by the meeting.

It was recommended that ten year bonds be issued in connection with the raising of money for the Nurses' Home.

A telegram was sent to Tom Moore, president of the Trades and Labor Congress, congratulating him upon his being elected to the new railway board. A telegram was also sent to the Hon. Mackenzie King in which appreciation of his putting into practical effect what he has recommended in theory in his book entitled "Humanity and Industry," was expressed.

A letter of congratulation was sent to F. G. Dawson congratulating him upon his recent appointment as member of the new railway board.

A mass meeting of labor, to which all labor organizations in the city have been invited, will be held next Tuesday night in the Carpenters' Hall for the purpose of organization and discussion of civic politics.

SCIENTIFIC RESULTS FROM VOYAGE OF QUEST

LONDON, Oct. 11.—The Quest returned to Plymouth just a year after she set out for the Antarctic under Shackleton on what was to prove the great explorer's last voyage. The little vessel was dogged by ill-luck throughout her 25,000-mile course, and through no fault of her own—or, at all events, through no fault of her crew and equipment—was not able to carry out the ambitious programme which had been laid down for her. Unfavorable weather attended her all the way, she proved to be an indifferent sailor, and her stay in the Antarctic co-incided with a particularly bad ice season.

Commander Wild states that, though the expedition was, in the main a disappointing one, scientific results of great importance were obtained.

SILVER CREEK IS SCENE OF BEAR KILLING

W. Ross of Pt. Simpson Kills Big Animal Weighing 600 Pounds

PARIS, Oct. 11.—Guarisanter, three-year-old son of Sardana-pale, Grand Prix winner in 1911, who made the journey from Malsens-Laffitte to Doncaster and started in the St. Leger, is a social thoroughbred who dislikes to be alone even when travelling.

His favorite companion is a jet black sheep, and the latter went off with the son of Sardana-pale on his trip to England. Arriving at Boulogne, Wallace Davis, Guarisanter's American trainer, was informed that owing to the embargo against the importation of sheep into England, the thoroughbred's pet could not land at Dover.

Bought Mascot

Davis thereupon sent the following cable to his agent at Dover: "Buy black-sheep at once meet us at pier with him." While entertaining some doubts as to his employer's sanity, the agent went out to look for a black-sheep, succeeded in locating one and met the party at the boat.

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UNEMPLOYED ASK BIG WAGE

Seven to Eight Dollars a Day is
Lowest for Which Men Will
Work for Farmers.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 11.—Refusal of unemployed to accept farm work unless at exorbitant wages threatens gravely the harvest situation throughout northwest.

The situation, to say the least, is very acute. Mr. Cameron declared. He did not think any crops actually had been spoiled as yet, but grain was standing out in the field and unstocked, and horses were idle for want of men to do the ploughing.

Mr. Cameron said farmers were perturbed to see so many men passing on trains and refusing to go into the harvest fields at less than \$7 to \$8 a day. Eastern labor was not satisfactory and the only remedy he could see was for those farmers who could afford to do so to build additional houses on their land to accommodate laborers and their families and to find work for the men through the winter.

Price Ridiculous

He declared the price being asked by some of the men was ridiculous. Around Minnedosa and Basswood, where crops were later than nearer the city, they

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class and reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent lands to be taken with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres before receiving Crown Grant. Where pre-emptor in occupation of less than 5 years, or other cause, is granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, but pre-emptor must make improvements to extent of \$20 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvement of \$100 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required. Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may receive another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his former, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions. For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 20 acres may be leased by one person or company. Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased on conditions including payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows, inaccessible by existing roads, may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT. The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under the Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the date of discharge from service. This privilege is also made retrospective.

No fees relating to pre-emption are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emption records after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years. Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 1, 1914, on account of payments, "cess" or taxes on soldiers' pre-emption records, or city lots held by members of Armed Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from entitlement to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS. Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING. Grazing Act 1915, for systematic development of livestock industry provide for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

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were cut but not stocked, and there seemed to be no place where men could be obtained. Another distressing feature of this labor problem was so many horses were idle owing to the scarcity of men. Ploughing should be proceeding now, but in many places teams were idle and machinery was standing because it could not be moved. Farmers also were being faced with the difficulty of completing gangs where one or two had dropped out, as harvest hands sometimes would not go to the fields except in groups to thresh.

MOTORLESS FLYING GREAT CAPABILITIES

LONDON, Oct. 11.—London is much interested in sail planing today following various recent experimental flights in Europe.

M. R. Quinton, vice-president of the French Ligue Aeronautique, is bold enough to describe certain practical uses of the art which he expects to see before long. He thinks that motorless flying should become rapidly practicable in tropical countries and in mountainous regions. His argument is based frankly on the observed "sailplaning" methods of vultures in such countries as Egypt and Morocco and of eagles in Switzerland.

The higher question of practicability, according to M. Quinton, depends on the prevalence of ascending air currents, and these are common in hot climates and among mountains. In flat lands of the tropics hot air rises in columns from the earth, and it has been shown that vultures use these ascending currents upwards in one column as long as it is serviceable, and then pass on to another. In mountains the upward air movement is due to an other cause. There the current tends to follow the configuration of the land. The problem is how to make use of these natural currents.

What birds can do in the way of "sail planing" man can do. M. Quinton says that in Egypt he has himself seen the eagle rise 1,968 feet in forty-five seconds. Vultures and eagles in such countries float for a whole day, travelling three hundred to five hundred miles at twenty-five to thirty miles an hour. They cross Egypt without a single beat of wing. There is no secret about their general mechanism. It is genuine "sailplaning."

Gliders are being used a great deal in France and Germany and many experiments are being tried. Fokker, the famous airplane maker, made a wonderful flight in Germany with a passenger.

The glider ascended from the Wasserkuppe to a considerable height with great ease, although the wind was not strong, and it was evident that the pilot was complete master of his craft. He made a number of sharp curves, and spectators declare that the behaviour of the glider differed by absolutely nothing from that of an aeroplane driven by a motor.

AMERICANS DO NOT COME TO CANADA FOR CHANCE OF A DRINK

Says the Financial Post: In calling attention to the large number of American tourists entering Canada by motor car—over 617,000 cars crossed the border in the last calendar year, compared with only 93,000 in the previous year—the Wall Street Journal refers to "invigorating refreshments" as the magnet drawing visitors to this country. The Wall Street Journal, which leaves the impression that American tourists coming to Canada are all "boozers" might be surprised to know that of the 617,000 motors crossing the border over 537,000 registered in Ontario which has prohibition as compared with about 43,000 in the Province of Quebec and about 26,000 in British Colum-

bia, the wet provinces. American tourists come to Canada because of this country's attractive natural resorts, which are being made more readily accessible as the result of the building of better roads. Good roads are proving a good investment for all the provinces. The figures fail to give any indication that it is a beckoning Bacchus enticing tourists over the border or that our visitors come up with the sole idea of indulging in the cup that cheers.

GROCER FIRES CANS AT HEADS OF ROBBERS AND DRIVES THEM OFF

CALGARY, Oct. 11.—A volley of tinned tomatoes and soup cubes, fired by Fred Langston, a well-known local grocer, routed two masked and armed hold-up men who attempted to rob him in his store, 535 Third Avenue west.

As Langston heaved the tins, one of the robbers opened fire with a revolver. The bullets whistled dangerously near Langston's head, but he gamely reached for another tin, and as it struck the wall it burst the ripe fruit descending in a shower over the robbers.

A bottle of soup cubes almost knocked one of the gunmen off his feet, and then the grocer reached for a cheese. This was too much for the gunmen, who lowered their guns and fled.

Their flight was hastened by screams of Mrs. Ollie Lennox, a customer, who dropped to the floor, screaming that she had been shot—when a soup cube struck her in the leg.
