ATTORNEY GENERAL'S BILL AIMED LARGELY AGAINST ORIENTALS

VICTORIA, Nov. 25.—A bill introduced by Hon. A. M. Manson increasing the fines for offenses under the Factories Act seems to be aimed largely at the Chinese. Complaints have been made that employees of Chinese laundries work night and day, Sundays and other days under most unsanitary conditions. The new bill provides for fines up to \$50 for offences on conviction.

While white laundries have been subject to inspection and have been obeying the laws, those operated by Orientals have to a large extent escaped.
