Will be Put in Field For Civic Honors at Municipal Election

Fred Stork Endorses Freight Rates Case but Plainly Says Rupert Entitled to Elevator

Receiving a telegram this morning from the Vancouver Sun asking that he express his endorsement of the movement to have unfair discrimination in B. C. freight rates removed in view of a meeting to be held in Vancouver on Monday night, Fred Stork, M.P. for Prince Rupert, has acceded to the request.

The following is the text of the telegram received by Mr. Stork from the Sun:

"Fred Stork, M.P. Prince Rupert.

"Mayor Tisdall has called a monster mass meeting of citizens of Vancouver for Monday night as a protest against existing freight discriminations against B.C. whereby grain rates Westward are double existing rates Eastward thereby constituting an outrage against the citizens of British Columbia and also to urge the Dominion government to commence immediate construction of grain elevators at Vancouver.

"Kindly wire Mayor Tisdall endorsing the movement and stating that you will do all you can to remedy this situation. Your telegram will be read at the meeting and published in the press."

No Catch in Reply

Mr. Stork's reply is as follows: "Mayor Tisdall, Vancouver.

"By request of the Vancouver Sun I assure you that I am using every influence to remove the unfair discrimination in freight rates against British Columbia and am urging to the utmost a square deal for our province.

"The fact that Prince Rupert is located 485 miles nearer the Orient than Vancouver and is the terminus of the Canadian National Railway with a railroad grade unequaled on the continent and possessing a magnificent harbor with dry dock and splendid port facilities compels me to say that Prince Rupert is the logical location for the erection of another grain elevator on the coast.

"I hope the people of this town will not start to sue us when our bills are due." His Honor remarked.

Mr. Mortimer denied the statement of the plaintiff that he had been asked to repair the place during the summer. He also told of offering to try and get the rent reduced. Mr. Fisher asked

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SMEETON CASE IS DISMISSED

Counter Claim of Defendant for \$160 Rent Was Also Sustained

The action brought by Mrs. Rose Smeeton and W. H. Smeeton for an injunction against E. H. Mortimer as agent of the building occupied by the Carlton Cafe seizing the contents for back rent and also to damages amounting to \$1,000 was dismissed by Judge Young in the County Court this morning and a counter claim of \$160 for rent due was sustained.

Dr. J. P. Cade, city medical health officer, told of being called in by the plaintiff and finding water leaking into the dining room.

Henry Lebourneau, the tin-smith who worked on the building, told of repairing two skylights. He was satisfied they were both water tight when he finished.

Archie L. Box, the first witness for the defence, said that he had eaten in the cafe for three months and had never seen any leaking from the skylight or heard of any.

Never Saw Leaks

George McDonald, the contractor who erected the building, told of taking out part of his bill in meals there. He had never seen any leaks during the rain after they had been repaired the first time.

Thos. J. Glenn, chauffeur, was called to prove that on November 4 Mr. Smeeton had called him in to take a quantity of goods from the house at once.

Sheriff Shirley testified that he had served Mrs. Smeeton with a notice on November 1 in writing that nothing was to be removed from the premises as everything was under seizure.

The main witness for the defence was E. H. Mortimer, agent for the property. He told that he had had the first leak fixed and had received no more complaints till early spring when he had the contractor go over the skylight again.

In reply to a question Mr. Mortimer stated that the plaintiffs had only paid their rent once on time and that they had stated on October 26 that they would not pay the three months back rent until the building was repaired.

Mr. Fisher asked him if he had waived the rent on the first of the month.

"No," witness replied.

"Well you did not enforce it on the first of the month so you must have waived it," the counsel suggested.

Tried to Get Rent

Mr. Mortimer insisted that he tried to get it the first of every month.

IRISH BILL INTRODUCED

House of Commons Get Down To Important Business

LONDON, Nov. 25.—A bill setting up the constitution of the Irish Free State and known as the Constituent Act was introduced today in the House of Commons.

It provides for a continuation of the present taxation system and gives the Free State power to adopt acts applicable to the other Dominions.

The first schedule contains 83 articles and declares that the national language in the Free State be Irish with English given equal recognition as the official tongue.

The legislature will consist of the King and two Houses, Chamber of Deputies and the Senate.

OLD COLLEGE IS DESTROYED

Three Persons Perish and Damage \$750,000 in Burning of St. Boniface

WINNIPEG, Nov. 25.—Three persons are known to have perished and property damage is placed at \$750,000 as a result of a fire early this morning which completely destroyed St. Boniface College situated in the town of St. Boniface.

A check-up shows five students missing but some of these may have gone to their homes nearby. Two are known to be dead and the charred remains of one body as yet unidentified has been found.

There were 138 students and 18 of the college staff in the buildings when the fire commenced. It is believed that the blaze started from a furnace explosion in the basement.

The known dead are W. A. Taylor, of St. Boniface, and Lawrence Legree, of Winnipeg.

The college dates back to 1818 and was the oldest institution of its kind in the West. A Jesuit library covering the earliest historical records of Western Canada was destroyed and the bones of La Verendrye, the early explorer and Father Aulneau and sixteen Indians massacred with them at Fort St. Charles were lost in the flames.

DEMPEY TAKES MILLION OFFER

Made by Al. Woods For Three Bout, Opponents Yet to be Named

MEMPHIS, Tennessee, Nov. 25.—Al. Woods, New York theatrical director, has offered Jack Kearns \$1,000,000 for a series of three matches between Jack Dempsey, world's champion heavyweight boxer, and opponents still to be named.

The offer has been accepted conditionally. Dempsey may meet Strangler Lewis in a mixed bout.

CITY COUNCIL WAS IN PRIVATE SESSION FOR SEVERAL HOURS

The members of the city council with the exception of Alderman Dybhavn met in committee of the whole last night in the council chamber and discussed Mayor Rochester's report in regard to a re-organization of the staffs of the various departments.

The meeting was closed to the press but as one alderman expressed it this morning, "they talked from eight to eleven-thirty without doing anything." The city hall staff were straining their ears all morning for an inkling of the decision of the city fathers but nothing was forthcoming.

#### More Life In House of Commons.

That the new British House of Commons is to be a livelier chamber than for some years past is assured by events which have transpired since it opened this week. The Labor members, it may be expected, will be largely responsible for its increased vivacity.

The extremist, Newbold, has already been heard and, as was expected, made a radical speech. His avowed aim, even before election, was to forward the Communist movement, so little of a constructive nature may be expected from him.

Apart from Newbold, however, it is unlikely that the Labor strength will work in unison. There are moderate and radical Laborites and already the leaders of the party have displayed worry as to the actions of their supposed followers. Indications are that there will be just as much controversy among the Labor members themselves as there will be between them, as a unit, and the government. In unity there is strength and weakness comes in division. With such a division in the parliamentary Labor party there will be little danger of destructive legislation. However, the party will agree, perhaps, on certain moderate measures so their good to the government may yet be felt. In any case, they will keep up a close Opposition.

#### Trace Of Coalition May Still Remain.

With such a large element of Labor in the House of Commons, which is recognized as the Opposition, it is likely that the Conservative government and the Liberals will co-operate more than if they were the only two parties in the House. This prediction receives further support in the announcement by the government that the middle policies of the former Lloyd George administration are to be carried on in respect to trade and employment.

Any big divisions in the House, it may be expected, will come between Conservatives and Liberals united and Labor. With moderate Labor members occasionally siding in with the government, as may also be expected, it would also seem that these big and important divisions would be rather infrequent.

#### Liberal Party Coming Together.

As far as the British Liberal party is concerned it is apparent now that the two divisions, Georgians and Asquithians, will come together under the leadership of ex-Premier Lloyd George. There would be no object in having it otherwise. Perhaps, through this coming together, Lloyd George may rise rapidly again after his recent fall from power. The Moderate Labor may also come into the combination and what the results may be in such a case will only remain for future events to disclose. In any case a useful opposition, such as never will be provided by radical Labor, may be brought about. Looking at the British political situation from every angle it appears that the outlook is safe and that dangerous legislators will be held in check.

#### Spur Provided For Administration.

There is sufficient element of Opposition in the British House of Commons to spur to action the Bonar Law government which, if left to itself, might not be a very progressive administration. As it is, the new government so far has shown little indication of anything big or useful in the way of legislation. It was expected that it would be a quiet and strictly conservative administration and the events of a week go to bear out that assumption. A government often fails through too much energy but, on the other hand, it is certain that it cannot succeed with lack of it. That is one reason why the present British government may not be very long lived.

The halibut schooner M. M. Christopher, was forced to accept the aid of the Gold Storage trawler Andrew Kelly, while on the deep sea fishing grounds, having lost her sails and part of her gear. She is now at Yakutat undergoing repairs.

The trawler Lunedale, owned by Capt. Lunedale, which broke drift in the storm last week off Metlakatla has not yet been found and hopes are entertained for her safety. There was no one aboard at the time of the mishap.

With all the trials and tribulations of this extremely heavy weather experienced during the week the fishing boys are bringing home the bacon so to speak, and the catches have been well up to the average. Reports from floating skippers are to the effect that the fishing on the deep sea banks is very good just now and given fine weather, some bumper fish cargoes are predicted.

Attention Drawn to Ultimate Plan of Road to Hazelton

VICTORIA, Nov. 25.—When the Good Roads League of British Columbia representatives met the members of the Government on Tuesday to present resolutions, Hon. T. D. Pattullo, member for Prince Rupert, pointed out that no representations were made regarding roads for northern or central British Columbia. He mentioned that the plans laid by the Government called for the ultimate completion of a road from Prince Rupert to Hazelton so that motorists could go from Prince Rupert to Prince George and thence to Vancouver.

Mr. Pattullo drew attention to the fact that Prince Rupert people contributed auto fees without getting any direct benefit and were pressing the government to start the road leading off Kaien Island toward the interior. He suggested that the Good Roads League should be representative of the whole province and take up the cause of Prince Rupert and the north generally.

President Gale said the league would meet at Prince Rupert next year and would give special study to the needs of the north on that occasion.

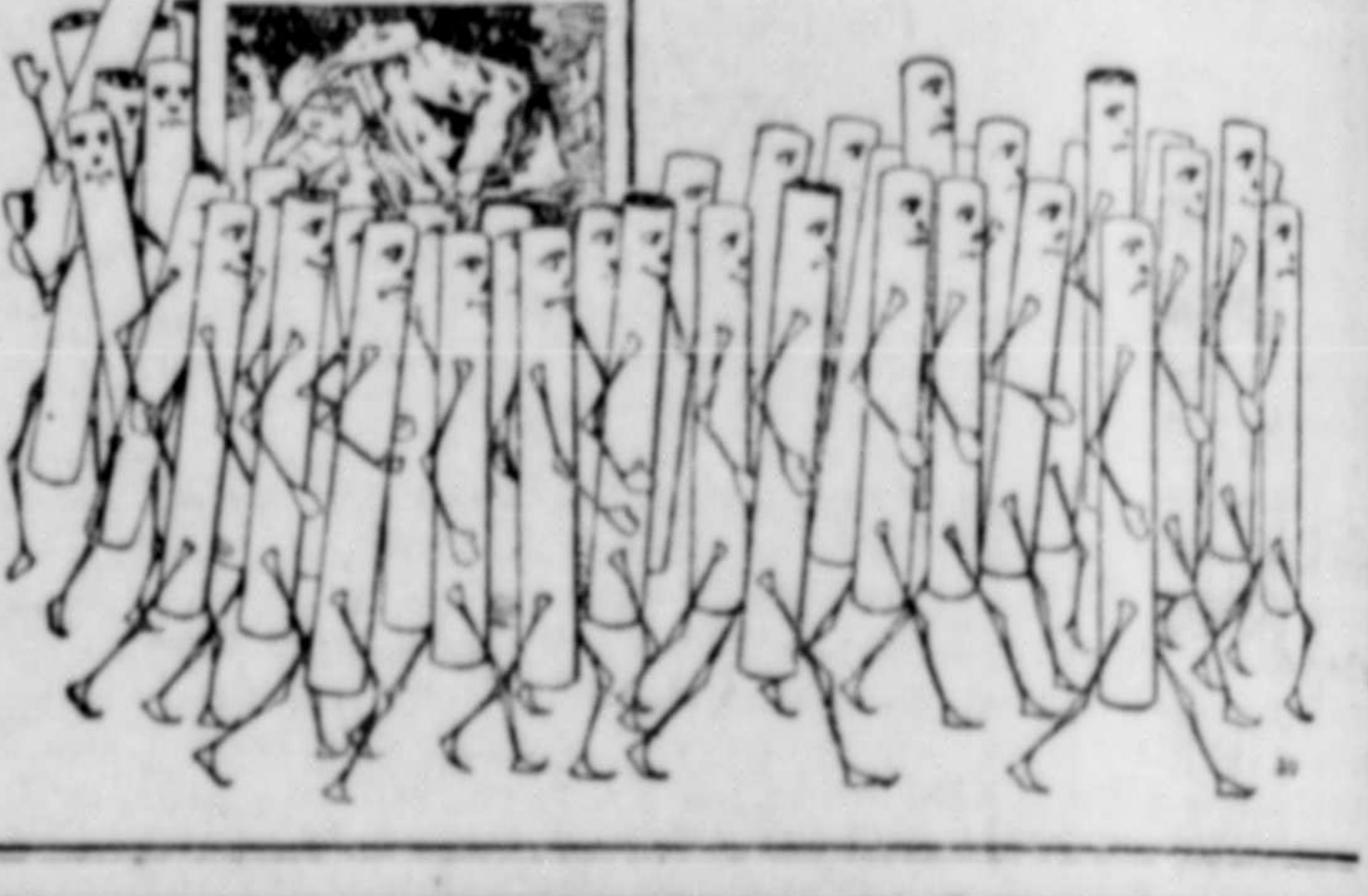
