Conference Drifting Towards Rocks BY-PRODUCTS PLANT AT TUCK'S INLET TO RESUME OPERATIONS

Hinton Denies Statement About Pacific Great Eastern Railway Attributed to Him at Calgary

VICTORIA, April 25.—Premier Oliver yesterday gave out a statement carrying a denial of the Calgary story of April 17 in which it was said that W. P. Hinton was of the opinion that the only possible hope that the Pacific Great Eastern had of successful operation was by extending the line eastward or westward from Quesnel instead of following the original grade to Prince George.

Mr. Hinton has sent the premier a message denying the statement attributed to him and also denying that he had in any way discussed in the interview the subject matter of his report to the British Columbia government.

ALL CANADIAN PREMIERS ARE INVITED B. C.

VICTORIA, April 25.—Premier Oliver has extended invitations to all provincial premiers of the Dominion to visit British Columbia this summer and attend the annual convention of the Canadian Good Roads Association to be held here from June 13 to June 15.

IRISH LABOR IS PEACEFUL

Dublin Leaders Declare That No Revolution Will Be Tolerated.

DUBLIN, April 25.—The 24-hour strike in Southern Ireland came to a close last night without untoward incidents.

Labor leaders addressing the crowds emphatically stated that labor did not want a counter-revolution and would not tolerate it. A freak manifesto had been posted without authority announcing in the name of the labor unions that the workers had declared a republic.

Two men were killed in East Belfast by snipers.

Commander Killed.

DUBLIN, April 25.—Brigadier General Adamson, commanding the Athlone brigade of the regular Irish Republican Army, was killed today near headquarters by the independent Republican forces in Athlone.

CONFERENCE ON UNEMPLOYMENT

Premier Mackenzie King Intimates Federal and Provincial Governments to Meet.

OTTAWA, April 25.—Speaking on the motion calling upon the government to take action to relieve unemployment, Premier Mackenzie King announced that negotiations were already under way between the federal and provincial governments to assemble in national conference to go into the unemployment question this summer. The resolution was carried.

PIONEER IS DEAD.

CHILLIWACK, April 25.—A. C. Wells, a pioneer dairy farmer, born in Ontario in 1837 and coming to British Columbia in 1862, passed away here today.

DIES AFTER KNOCKOUT

NEW YORK, April 25.—Lew Brody, a lightweight pugilist, died here today after a knockout at the hands of Frankie Pitcher, another boxer, whom he met in the ring last night. Physicians declared the cause of Brody's death was cerebral hemorrhage.

The fatal blow occurred in the ninth round of the bout. Brody fell so hard he could not be revived and was removed to a hospital, where he later expired.

FIRST ACTION OUT OF CEDAR CREEK GOLD RUSH STARTS

VANCOUVER, April 25.—The first litigation arising out of the Cedar Creek gold rush began today when a writ on behalf of Robert Campbell of Harper's Camp against Albert Platt, holder of a discovery claim. The action seeks for enforcement of an alleged option given by Platt to Campbell compelling Platt to relinquish his mining rights to the plaintiff.

FATHER OF MEMBER OF PARLIAMENT IS DEAD IN VANCOUVER

VANCOUVER, April 25.—Thomas Ellis Ladner, father of Leon J. Ladner, member of the Dominion house for South Vancouver, died today. He was 85 years of age and came to the province some fifty years ago.

WESTERN CANADA PAPER COMPANY IN LIQUIDATION

TORONTO, April 25.—Debtors of the Western Pulp & Paper Co. met yesterday and decided to allow the sale of the company's properties to proceed. The company defaulted in February on payment of interest due on bonds and the holders have instituted foreclosure proceedings.

CANADIAN LOAN IS QUICKLY SUBSCRIBED

NEW YORK, April 25.—J. P. Morgan & Co., financial firm, announced at noon that the subscription books for a \$100,000,000 loan for the Canadian Government which were opened this morning had been closed.

Whether Russian and Allied Positions Can be Adjusted Is Present Question Genoa

GENOA, April 25.—The Genoa Conference is drifting towards the rocks again. Whether it can be kept from wreckage depends on the possibility of reconciling the new demands of the Russian Soviet delegates with the position of the Allied governments, who declare that they will stand fast by the resolutions adopted at Cannes on which the conference is based.

The situation at the conference is made even more critical by the frank warning of Premier Poincare at Bar-le-due yesterday that France will withdraw if it is unable to see that the ideas expressed by the French cabinet before parliament can triumph.

Foreign Minister Tchitcherine of Russia declared today that the Allied resistance to the principle of nationalization is blocking the conference.

LAMBTON SUNK ALMOST SURE

Canadian Lighthouse Ship Believed Gone Down With 17 Hands in Superior Storm.

SAULT STE MARIE, April 25.—It is now almost certain that the Canadian lighthouse steamer Lambton, with a crew of seventeen men, foundered in a storm on Lake Superior last Wednesday. The keeper of the Caribou light was also on board the steamer enroute to his light which has not been lighted for several days according to wireless messages from steamers. The Lambton was last seen struggling in the storm and since that time wreckage has been noticed in the mid waters of the lake.

PETE HERMAN GETS DECISION OVER ROY MOORE IN BOSTON

BOSTON, April 25.—Pete Herman, bantamweight boxing champion of the world, was awarded the decision over Roy Moore, of St. Paul, in a ten round bout here last night.

Fish Plant in Harbor To Resume Operations Employing Thirty Men

Operations at the Tucks Inlet by-products plant, which has been idle since the Tucks Inlet By-products Co. Limited became insolvent some two years ago, are to be resumed in the course of a very few weeks and the industry there is to be made a permanent one operating all the year around, according to an announcement made to The Daily News last night by G. G. Bushby, a prominent business man of the south, who has just reached the city to get operations started and take active personal management of the plant himself.

In speaking of his plans last evening, Mr. Bushby stated that it was his intention to carry on the plant along similar lines as before. Fish oil, edible fish meal and fish fertilizer will be produced from the salmon and halibut offal of this port and the canneries of the district. It is expected to have the plant in full operation again in the course of a fortnight's time. The supply of raw material in the form of fish offal will be drawn from the canneries and the local halibut packing houses.

There will be practically no extensions to the plant at this time, but it is estimated that in the course of the season 1000 tons of fish meal and fertilizer and 100,000 gallons of fish oil will be turned out.

INSISTENT DEMAND. M'MASTER RESOLUTION IS DEFEATED

OTTAWA, April 25.—After a long and bitter debate, the McMaster resolution calling for legislation compelling cabinet ministers to resign from the directorates of any corporations or banks was defeated in the House of Commons by a vote of 42 to 59. McMaster was the only member to vote for the resolution. T. G. McBride and A. W. Neil, British Columbia farmer members, voted against it.

MISSING MAN WAS DROWNED

Body of Cement Worker on Johnson Street Bridge, Victoria, Recovered Yesterday.

VICTORIA, April 25.—After having been missing since March 25, the body of Vincent John Haile, aged 31, was found yesterday by the police in the waters of the inner harbor at the foot of Johnson Street. Haile, who had been working as a cement man on the Johnson Street bridge contract, was missed after quitting work on March 25.

SASKATCHEWAN ASKS FOR MEN

Appeal Sent to B. C. Deputy Labor Minister for 1000 More Farm Hands.

VICTORIA, April 25.—J. D. McNeven, deputy minister of labor, yesterday received another appeal for one thousand more men for farm work in Saskatchewan. This brings the total requirements of Saskatchewan up to 2,500 men.

Permanent Industries Are Needed Here.

The announcement made by G. G. Bushby of Victoria that the fish-by-products plant at Tucks Inlet is to be put in operation again in the very near future is a gratifying bit of news, for it will add another industry of a permanent nature to the city. The time has come when Prince Rupert must look to such industries as these for its prosperity, and no matter how small they may be they will add to the quota which helps support a city. Business of a permanent nature is what we must have now.

Bengough Entertainer Of High Order.

It is not often that Prince Rupert audiences are afforded the opportunity of enjoying such a delightful combination of skilful and relaxing talent as that provided at the entertainments given by the famous caricaturist, J. W. Bengough. Mr. Bengough really delighted a full audience at the Empress Theatre last night and will probably be greeted with another tonight. He has been giving such entertainments as these for two-score years now, but his style is still as pleasing and refreshing as it ever could have been.

Tourist Trade and What It Means.

Now that the tourist season is to open in a very short time and indications are that Prince Rupert will enjoy more of this business this year than ever before, it may be appropriate to consider just how we benefit through it. The benefits are threefold: First, from the ready cash the tourists leave with us; second, the advertising value they give us after they return home; third, a very large per cent. of them are prospective residents or investors.

To a very large extent it depends upon ourselves as to just how much of this value is coming to us. It depends on the way we receive our visitors and treat them while they are among us. The Pacific Northwest Tourist Association is considering the question of adopting a universal policy throughout the Pacific Northwest of taking care of these people and giving them such information as will enable them to thoroughly enjoy their trips and become familiar with scenic attractions and natural resources.

It is also the policy of the association that for all time there shall be no more jealousy, if there is any, and no selfishness displayed on the part of any community, but all shall be as a general unit in welcoming visitors.

All progressive communities in the Northwest may co-operate with the Pacific Northwest Tourist Association in the work. Already several cities in the south, such as Victoria, Vancouver, New Westminster, Nelson, Kelowna and Kamloops, are identified with the organization.

ACTIVE PROPAGANDA OF BOLSHEVISTS IN ORIENTAL COUNTRIES

ANGORA, Turkey, April 25.—Active propaganda is being carried on here at the seat of the Kemal Pasha Nationalist Government by a Bolshevik trade delegation under Professor Goldan of Moscow University. The Soviet aims were explained at a dinner to Kemal press representatives, when the Russian spokesman said:

"We mean to work hard to bring about the recovery of Oriental peoples. They must free themselves from the grip of western influence. Turkey has given a brilliant example, and this will be followed by other Asiatic nations. We intend to open libraries, economic institutes, theatres and railways throughout the country."

It was further announced that a Russian commission would

shortly arrive in Anatolia to study the resources of the country. A Russian orchestra is giving a series of propaganda concerts in aid of the Russian famine.

WICHITA FALLS, Tex., Apr. 25.—L. W. McCormick, catcher with the St. Louis Nationals in 1913, was elected chief of police here on Monday night. As a Texas Ranger he has been on duty in and about Wichita Falls for three years.

TWO PLATOON IS UP AGAIN

Council Meeting Discussed It Last Night But No Results Obtained.

At last night's council meeting a report from the Utilities Committee regarding the two platoon system in the local fire department was discussed at length.

Ald. Perry said that he did not think it was necessary to read all the correspondence on the subject which had been brought before the council before. The last letter from the Board of Fire Underwriters had stated that it would be necessary to put three extra men on in the fire department if the two platoon system were adopted. It had then been decided to ascertain from the fire underwriters whether the double platoon system could possibly be put in force with the addition of only two men without increasing the rate of insurance. The reply was that while that might be satisfactory the standard of efficiency as applied to different cities would practically be the same as the present system. The cost of maintaining two extra men in the department had been gone into and it was shown that the extra salaries for one year would amount to \$3432.00, plus extra uniforms, boots, beds, etc. It was a question, in his mind, as to whether the city could stand this extra outlay in view of the expenses that had to be met at the present time. He was certainly in favor of the double platoon system in principle but the cost was a matter for the council to discuss.

No Money For It.

Ald. Dybbavn said this matter had been before the council several times before and it was a fact that the money was not available to provide for the extra men and equipment. The adoption of the two platoon system would amount to more than an extra half mill on the taxes.

Ald. McLeod thought that a financial point should be stretched, and that it was a system that was badly needed. He said that the men working in the fire hall at the present time were little more than slaves. They had no time to themselves and he could not see why they should not be able to get what was coming to them.

He thought the city was in duty bound to give their employees a show.

Mayor Rochester read the hours of duty existing in the fire department which worked out at two nights per week at home.

Ald. McLeod suggested taking two policemen off the present police force and adding two firemen to the fire department.

Ald. Silversides stated that in other cities they had gained financially by the adoption of the two platoon system, and the reason that information was obtained was to find out if in adopting the two platoon system here the city would gain in reduced insurance rates.

Nothing to Be Gained.

Mayor Rochester said that if two extra men were put in the firehall it would mean no reduction in the fire insurance rate from the fire underwriters. If by putting on two extra men they could obtain a reduction in the fire insurance rate there would be something to justify the procedure in the eyes of the ratepayers. The matter had simply resolved itself down to the expenditure of some \$3500 and still getting the same results.

Ald. Kerr said he understood the fire underwriters were contemplating giving the City of Prince Rupert a new fire insurance rating.

Ald. Montgomery tried to show that the chairman of the Finance Committee could finance the two platoon system from the revenue of the Utilities department without increasing the mill rate, and thought that if the council wished to do it they could find ways and means of doing it.

Ald. Perry in answering Ald. Montgomery explained that while asking for a reduction of light rates he was suggesting expenditure in another direction, and that one could not have the bun and the halpenny at the same time. He said that the finance and the public utilities committees were about to meet together to go into the question of finances of the public utilities

SCHOOL CHILDREN OF GREAT BRITAIN AND CANADA WRITE

LEEDS, England, April 24.—Hearty approval of a scheme to promote friendly correspondence between school children of Leeds and those of various Canadian cities has been given by Premier Lloyd-George in a letter to James Watson, headmaster of Harbills Council School here, who has instituted the idea as a means of stimulating interest in composition, geography, writing and spelling.

Under Mr. Watson's plan, each child has one particular correspondent whom he or she addresses by name. The letters written in school under supervision are the unaided work of the pupils. They form part of the ordinary composition lesson, but have proved to be its most attractive feature. Incidentally the letters received often convey valuable hints to teachers in regard to methods used in Canada, which are frequently made the subject of inquiries by the Leeds education authorities.

Occasionally the English children are puzzled by Canadianisms. A reference to "Buddie" as the name of the Unknown Soldier proved difficult even for the masters, but "my teacher is a first-class soccer football fan" was more easily interpreted.

BENGOUGH GAVE SPLENDID SHOW

Entertainment by Famous Cartoonist Was Delightful Indeed Last Night.

Nearly every seat in the Empress Theatre was filled last night when J. W. Bengough, the famous Canadian cartoonist and caricaturist, gave the first of his series of two performances under the auspices of the High School Literary Society. Mr. Bengough manifested his noted versatility as an entertainer to great effect and the program from beginning to end was thoroughly enjoyed. They were produced in such a manner that the interest of the audience was kept on them from the first to the last stroke of the crayon. Mr. Bengough has the delightful faculty of keeping the real interest of his pictures until the last few brushes of the chalk. While he is drawing he still further holds attention with a splendid line of conversation. Of a warm and friendly personality, this feature is indeed pleasing.

Local Color.

The first was a cartoon depicting a stork carrying the usual bundle in its beak, which was labelled "elevator." The bird carried on its tail the tag "M. P." Another was a very true sketch of Mayor Rochester riding a hobby horse and carrying the banner, "A Big City." The third showed Principal Brady extolling on the depths of some mathematical problem to a pretty little school miss.

As the opening of the program the Girls' Glee Club of the High School, assembled on the stage sang "Believe Me if All Those Endearing Young Charms" and closed with "Three Fishers." Mrs. H. C. Fraser, accompanied by Miss Kathleen Grant, sang two delightful solos in the intermission. J. C. Brady was chairman and Professor H. Aubrey Pryce, accompanist.

Mr. Bengough will give an entirely new program this evening, with a prelude especially for the younger people.

STREET SURFACING METHOD DECIDED ON

Second Avenue Will Get Application of Liquid Asphalt—Penetration Method on Third Avenue.

A report was read at the council meeting from the Board of Works last night regarding the surfacing of Second and Third Avenues. It was recommended that Second Avenue be finished with liquid asphalt and that Third Avenue be prepared with asphalt penetration method in order that black top could be put on afterwards.

City Engineer Whittaker said that unless something were done with regard to surfacing Second Avenue with asphalt from 25 to 30 per cent of the surfacing would be lost. In regard to Third Avenue he thought that the penetration method would be the best. The cost of liquid asphalt would be 16 cents per gallon or 32 cents per square yard for asphalt plus the cost of application. The cost of application would be 40 to 55 cents per square yard. The black top would cost at least \$2 per square yard.

Ald. Theo. Colliart asked how long the various applications would last. Engineer Whittaker in reply said that the black top was probably good without maintenance for from five to seven years. The penetration method would be practically good for a similar time. The surface coat would probably last for two years.

Ald. Dybhavn asked what amount would be involved in putting down a black top strip 16 feet wide. Engineer Whittaker replied about \$19,000.

It was moved by Ald. Perry, seconded by Ald. Kerr and carried that the report of the Board of Works be adopted.

IMMIGRANTS LEAVE ON LAST LAP OF THEIR LONG JOURNEY

Every berth on the Prince Albert was taken up on her trip to the Queen Charlotte Islands last night by the party of English immigrants, who arrived in the city on Sunday evening's train, for the last lap of their 6,000 mile journey.

All day yesterday the party were able to take "leg stretching" and enjoy a little shopping. They were delighted with their reception in Prince Rupert which although not spontaneous was very sincere. Most of the party made good friends in the city before leaving. A number of local citizens, made the acquaintance of the new comers on their special car and gave them a real homely welcome.

DOUBTFUL IF QUEEN CHARLOTTE ISLANDS SUITABLE SETTLERS

According to the Vancouver Province, Walter Drinnan, secretary of the G. W. V. A. provincial command, states that the attention of the executive of his organization has been drawn to the press reports that 100 British families are being brought out from England to settle on the Queen Charlotte Islands.

The matter is being taken up at once with the Dominion command at Ottawa with a view to investigating the conditions under which these families are being brought out. Mr. Drinnan states that emphatic opinions have been expressed to members of the executive that the Queen Charlotte Islands are entirely unsuitable for such a settlement and the aim of the provincial command is to see that the interests of prospective settlers are protected and impartial advice placed at their disposal.

Mr. Drinnan expressed surprise that no action had been taken by officials of the government either here or in London to turn the attention of intending settlers to more accessible and suitable portions of the province.

REPORT OF FIRE CHIEF FOR MARCH

Brigade Answered to Nine Calls—Damage \$2414.56 Covered By Insurance.

The report for the month of March from Fire Chief McDonald on the activities of the Prince Rupert Fire Department, read at last night's council meeting, showed that the brigade had answered nine fire calls, and the total damage suffered was \$2414.56 which was fully covered by insurance. All hydrants and fire boxes had been tested and found to be in order. All buildings over two stories in height had been inspected and those not conforming with the fire regulations of having a fire going installed were required to do so. The salaries for the department for the month amounted to \$1,099.00.

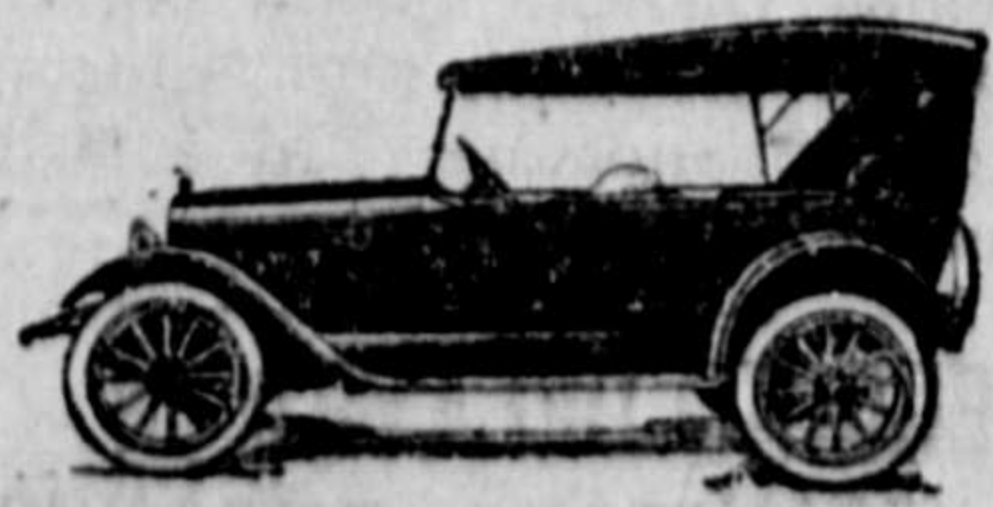
PERRY'S QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS AT COUNCIL MEETING

AUDITOR'S REPORT IS RECEIVED

City Utilities in 1921 Showed Net Surplus of \$13,987.58—Is Laid on Table.

The public utilities department, according to the city auditor's report for 1921, read at the council meeting last night, showed a net surplus in 1921 on the utilities of the city of \$13,987.58. The electric light department showed a net surplus of \$11,918.66, and the telephone department, \$3634.79, while the water department had a deficit of \$1533.47.

The surplus assets over liabilities for the city were \$1,032,790.68, which is an increase over the year 1920 of \$95,694.57.

The general revenue surplus from schools amounted to \$43,096.70, a decrease from 1920, the surplus being in that year \$16,109.52.

This year the surplus or deficit on each department has been carried to its own individual surplus account instead of being transferred to the general account.

The auditor's report was laid on the table pending arrangements for its printing.

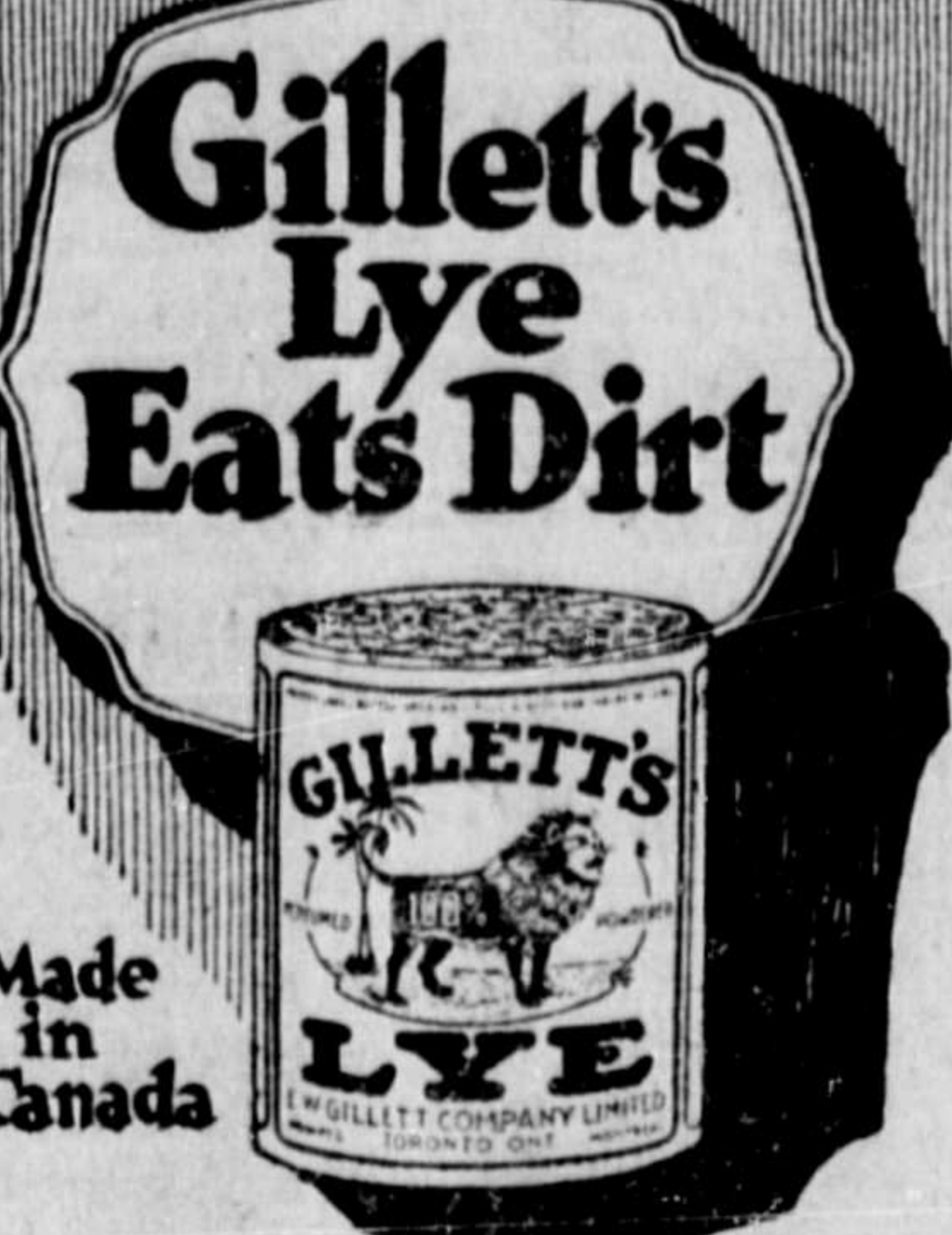

We are roasting and packing for current requirements only, realizing that, essentially, coffee must be fresh roasted to prove perfectly satisfactory.
