GOVERNMENT SEEKS TO JUSTIFY EXECUTIONS OTHER NATIONS NOT OBSERVING PACT SO ENGLAND WILL FOLLOW SUIT

Baptism of Fire for Attorney General in Capacity of Leader

VICTORIA, Nov. 29.—Attorney General Manson received his first baptism of fire yesterday as leader of the House when a filibuster, led by Major Burde, member for Alberni, and supported by Conservative and Labor members, took place. Hours of time were wasted and with it much public money but before it was over the Conservative leaders called for mercy and the attorney general consented to an adjournment at 1:30 this morning. As a spectacle, the proceeding did not amount to much and as a political manoeuvre it was a failure. Mr. Manson was reasonable all the time in face of the most severe "razoo" which was enough to try any one's patience. The trouble started at the opening of the afternoon session when H. H. Neelands, Labor member for South Vancouver, wanted to discuss unemployment and offered a resolution asking adjournment for that purpose. Mr. Manson asked the Speaker to rule the motion out of order, this being done. The Speaker's ruling was challenged twice and there were government majorities each time a vote was taken. Then obstruction commenced, culminating in a regular filibuster at the evening session. The minister of agriculture was under fire much of the time but, whenever possible, the opposition switched its attack on the attorney general. The Premier, being indisposed, had left the leadership to Mr. Manson.

CANADA'S CRIME WAS INCREASED

More Indictable and Summary Offences in 1921 Than in 1920.

OTTAWA, Nov. 29.—Convictions for indictable offenses in Canada during the year ended September 3, 1921, increased by 953 or 5.07 per cent over the previous year according to criminal statistics just issued for the year 1921. Charges of indictable offenses totaled 24,934, an increase of 1,730 over the previous year, and the convictions totaled 19,396. Summary convictions during 1921 numbered 157,704, an increase of 13,139 over 1920.

MURDOCK BACK FROM GENEVA; MOORE IS EXPECTED SUNDAY

OTTAWA, Nov. 29.—Hon. James Murdock, minister of labor, who has been at Geneva attending the fourth International Labor Congress, returned at the first of the week from Europe. Tom Moore, President of the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress who was also at Geneva, sailed last Saturday from England and is expected in Ottawa on Sunday.

GOLD IS FOUND IN FAR NORTH

OTTAWA, Nov. 29.—A government surveyor reports the discovery of gold bearing quartz south of the Nahanni River, a tributary of the Mackenzie River. Many residents of Fort Simpson and vicinity have staked claims and there is great excitement in that district.

FINAL SETTLEMENT AWAITING FIELDING

Transportation Account Between Canada and Britain Hanging Fire

LONDON, Nov. 29.—The war is not yet over for the Canadian Militia Department. Mr. Garrison, an official of the accountants' branch of the Department at Ottawa, has been in London for several weeks, trying to obtain a settlement of the transportation account between the Canadian and British governments, which is the last one outstanding. It cannot be settled until Hon. W. S. Fielding reaches an agreement with the British Treasury regarding the exchange rate to be paid on the British war debt to Canada. The sum of \$30,000,000 is involved. Hon. Messrs. Fielding and LaPointe returned from Paris last week.

FIRST WOMAN TO PADDLE THROUGH PANAMA CANAL

PANAMA, Nov. 29.—Miss Elsie K. Grieser is the first woman to paddle through Panama Canal. She made the 42 miles from the Atlantic to the Pacific in 15 hours and was accompanied by her brothers.

JOE BENT SAYS ALICE ARM BUSY

Local Merchant Says Optimistic Tone Prevails in North

There is much activity in the building and mining business in the north, especially at Alice Arm, according to Joe Bent who has just returned from an extended business trip to Northern towns. In Alice Arm Mr. Bent noticed six new business buildings being erected and a number of private dwellings. Recently there has been quite an influx of prospectors and the town is consequently taking on an animated appearance. A very optimistic tone prevails throughout the north and a good and prosperous future in the mineral output is predicted.

Boyd Young Identifies Flewin as One of Men Who Assaulted Him on Night of September 11

R. Boyd Young, chief witness in the case against Clarence Flewin and Raymond Kevis, charged with attempted murder at Port Simpson on the night of September 11 last, at the opening of the preliminary hearing this morning before Magistrate McMullen, positively identified Flewin as one of the two men who struck him and said that Kevis was the same build as the other man who hit him.

L. W. Patmore, for the defence, cross-examined Mr. Young very closely on the identification. The witness stated, in reply to a question from T. B. Hooper for the crown as to how many times and when did he recognize Flewin that night, that it was three times. First when he wheeled around after the first two blows had been struck when he could see him distinctly against the skyline after he had wrenched his hand off his shoulder only two feet away; secondly when he tried to make for his store when a voice said, "close in" which he recognized as coming from Flewin; and, thirdly, when the witness was lying in the ditch and he was bending over him trying to club him. This time he saw him haven't seen him," replied the witness.

Young's Story
In telling his story, Mr. Young said that he had received a phone call about ten o'clock on the night in question asking him to come up to the Girls' Home for a send-off to Mrs. Raley who was going away on the boat. Britain Suspends Operation of Washington Disarmament Treaty in Regard to Scrapping Ships

LONDON, Nov. 29.—Great Britain will scrap no more warships under the Washington Disarmament Treaty until other nations have taken action and scrapped their quota according to assurance given to a questioner in the House of Commons today by Eyres Monsell, financial secretary to the Admiralty. Asked why the terms of the treaty were not to be carried out, Commander Monsell replied that the Washington Treaty had been ratified by United States, Japan and Great Britain, but not yet by France or Italy. Eight British capital ships had been already rendered useless for war purposes and had been sold and removed to ship breaking firms for breaking up, seven more had been rendered incapable of risk in war service and two more would be dealt with similarly by the end of next month. So far as was known United States and Japan had not disposed of any ships at all except, possibly, obsolete ships that would have been disposed of in the ordinary course, anyway.

Ambassador Withdraws From Greece; Britain Breaks off Relations

ATHENS, Nov. 29.—British Ambassador Lindley notified the Greek government that diplomatic relations with Great Britain had been broken off and left Athens last night. A British financial adviser remains.

The Greek government has issued a statement seeking to justify the execution of former Premier Gournaris and several other former ministers on the grounds that they brought King Constantine back in order to bolster up the Royalist regime under which they flourished and permitted Greece to blunder into chaos without warning the country.

Still another Greek cabinet has been sworn in under Col. Gonalos. It has issued a statement that its policy will be one of general rehabilitation for Greece.

LONDON, Nov. 29.—A despatch from Athens says that F. O. Lindley, British minister to Greece, has left for Lausanne to confer with Lord Curzon, the British foreign secretary.

FIGHTING AGAINST INSURANCE LICENSE

VICTORIA, Nov. 29.—A fight is being put up in the legislature against the licensing of insurance agents but objection is made on the grounds that it will cause the formation of another close corporation such as doctors and lawyers.

LLOYD GEORGE AND RE-UNION

Ex-Premier Suggests Early Meeting to Form Basis of Reconciliation

LONDON, Nov. 29.—Ex-Premier Lloyd George, in writing to political friends, suggests a meeting of the two branches of the British Liberals to discuss a basis for the proposed re-union. Mr. Lloyd George says he will in no wise oppose a re-union.

CONACHER DECLINES BIGGEST OFFER EVER MADE HOCKEY PLAYER

TORONTO, Nov. 29.—Lionel Conacher, amateur hockey star of the Auralee team and also a famous Rugby player, has been offered \$5,000 a year to join the Toronto St. Patricks, world professional champions. He refuses steadily to leave the amateur ranks, however. This is said to be the highest price ever offered a hockey player.

MORE LIQUOR CASES

Olive Solem of Seal Cove Circle was arraigned in court this morning before Magistrate McMullen on a charge of selling whiskey. Mrs. Lillian Ponzo was also brought up on a charge of allowing whiskey to be sold on her premises. L. W. Patmore appeared for them and T. B. Hooper for the crown. In view of other trials now on, the cases were adjourned till December 4, and bail was set at \$2,000 each. Constables McDonald, Dixon and Logan made the arrest yesterday.

TELLS OF FINE OIL IN ARCTIC

Alexander Malcolm Smith, Explorer, Indicates Possibility of Shipping from Point Barrow.

SEATTLE, Nov. 29.—Alexander Malcolm Smith, the Canadian explorer who has returned from the Arctic, says that a great lake of oil, better than in the California fields, lies between the Mackenzie River basin and Siberia. It could be shipped from Point Barrow to Japan twenty-five cents a barrel cheaper than the American oil, he declares. The only drawback is the short Arctic season.

ST. PATS WIN OVER ESKIMOS

World's Champions are Victors in First Game of Tour by 2 to 1

WINNIPEG, Nov. 29.—The Toronto St. Patricks, world hockey champions, defeated the Edmonton Eskimos by 2 goals to 1 in the first game of their exhibition tour. The St. Pats will play their first game on the Pacific coast with Victoria on Friday and will go to Seattle and Vancouver for exhibition games next week.

HENCHMAN OF DE VALERA ARRESTED

Pulling Chestnuts For United States.

Although United States may not be officially represented in the councils of the Near East conference at Lausanne, her influence is being felt. This was indicated early this week in the official statement issued by Lord Curzon, the British foreign minister, that England and United States were agreed on the "open door" policy for Turkey.

United States, with an expanding foreign commerce, is directly interested in such proceedings as these and it is only a pity that her statesmen have allowed their fear of becoming embroiled in European differences to overcome their sight of the necessity of taking part at Lausanne. It is to be hoped that the Republic does not continue the policy of letting Britain and other Allied nations "pull her chestnuts out of the fire."

Right Sort Of Enemies Blessing To Newspaper.

Fear of making an enemy robs the editorial columns of many newspapers of strength and influence. Many an editor does not dare to express his opinion on local subjects which are always closest to the hearts and interests of his readers so he generalizes in a perfectly harmless manner.

The right sort of enemies are a blessing to a newspaper. Any organ or person that has a strong personality and firm convictions is going to have opponents but it will have more friends and followers than a spineless thing that apparently has no character or opinion.

Editorials on home subjects have a pulling power. Muck-raking editorials are not the only kind that can be written.

The power of a newspaper is best known to its enemies, but it is seldom realized by its friends.—City Editor and Reporter.

British and Americans In Canadian Mining.

The Stewart story which recently appeared in "The Mining World and Engineering Record," of London, and which is reprinted elsewhere in these columns, is an interesting article replete with facts and figures regarding the development of mines in the Stewart district especially the Premier and the B.C. Silver. The article was the most prominent in the issue of the journal in which it appeared and that goes to show the attention that is being paid from far afield to the great mining district contiguous to Prince Rupert.

In telling the history of the now famous mine the English journal expresses regret that the Premier Mine "Eldorado" should have passed for all time from British to American control. At the same time it recommends the British Columbia mining field to British investors. The outcome of developments on the B.C. Silver, it predicts, may mark a British success.

The spirit of the article is splendid and it should appeal to Canadians who would indeed welcome more British participation in the development of Canada's natural resources.

In the past, American investors have been much more active in Canadian mining than have been the British with the result that most of the potential producers of mineral wealth are controlled by American interests. Especially in the mining field have British capitalists and interests been slow in establishing themselves. They have been leath to take a chance and have been over-cautious speculators. Such a criticism can hardly be made of the Americans. At the same time the Americans have always shown their ability of taking care of themselves.

There are other reasons, too, why the Americans have beaten the British investors in the Canadian mining fields. For one thing, they are closer at hand, and, for another, they are more conversant with conditions and methods in Canada. They are better able to meet the Canadian on his own ground than are the British.

A little more advertising of Canada in Great Britain and a little more co-operation of a personal nature, never forgetting the necessity for honest dealing, would do much to stimulate British interest and encourage British capital to the mining fields as well as to other points of prospective development in the Dominion.

STEWART MINES ARE DESCRIBED

Enlightening Article Appears in
London Mining and Engineering Journal

AMERICAN SUCCESS

British Capital Advised to Watch
Out That Plums Are Not Lost

A comprehensive article, entitled "Mining Developments in British Columbia," which deals almost exclusively with the Stewart district and especially with the wonderful record of the Premier Mine, appears in "The Mining World and Engineering Record," a London publication which has just come to hand. A history of the Premier mine and an account of its status of today—"the show mine of the district, if not of the world," as the article describes it—is given. Various other properties of the district and interesting information pertaining to them are given. A feature of the article is a set of splendid illustrations accompanying it. These include winter scenes showing the hauling of high grade ore by sleigh from the Premier mine and tractors en route from Premier to Hyder. There is also a picture of the B.C. Silver camp adjoining the Premier and a panorama of Portland Canal showing Hyder and Stewart taken from a great elevation on a mountain to the northeast. One of the most interesting of the pictures shows the party of cabinet ministers and others which visited Stewart last summer. The group, which is dressed in workaday bush clothes and stands in front of a trusty Ford car, includes Hon. A. M. Manson, attorney general; Hon. Dr. W. H. Sutherland, minister of public works; Mrs. Glynn Ward, journalist; Hon. F. C. Wade, K.C., agent general at London, and Col. Davies, director of Land Settlement. The latter picture was taken in Central British Columbia in the course of the tour of the district by the party.

The article is as follows:
The important mining developments which have taken place in the Portland Canal division and other portions of British Columbia continue to claim the interest of the mining community.

Premier Mine

Strictly speaking, the Premier mine was first located in 1907 by two prospectors who have since passed away but it was only in 1910 that work was commenced on one of three veins discovered. The property was then under the control of O. B. Bush, of Vancouver, who incorporated a company known as the Salmon and Bear River Mining Co.

After the formation of the Salmon and Bear Co. a boom followed and a large amount of stock was sold. Public enthusiasm, however, soon died down but not before New York interests appeared on the scene, headed by Mr. Aldridge and Dr. Thompson, who were represented on the spot by Messrs. Plate & Cronin. This group bonded the property for \$150,000 and spent \$70,000 but, after working the property for two years during which many experts visited the district, operations were closed down.

Found Real Richness

It was in July 1917 that R. K. Neill, of Spokane, bonded the Premier for \$100,000. He employed Pat Daly as foreman of a crew of workers. Mr. Neill, however, was not content with the opinion of others but at once examined the outcroppings, took samples, examined the previous work done, made a general survey and came to the conclusion that former owners had completely missed the richest point of development. His theory proved to be absolutely correct as, after only two feet of excavations in No. 1 tunnel had been made, he discovered the true vein which was really paralleling the previous tunnel.

As a result of Mr. Neill's work 1,000,000 tons of ore were developed, containing gold and silver worth \$30 a ton or a total of \$30,000,000. It should be mentioned that Mr. Neill was associated with Messrs. Wood, Wilson and A. B. Trites.

Big Missouri

The last named has recently had another success at the Big Missouri mine farther north. High grade ore has been struck and it is understood that a pro-

posal is on foot to extend the road from the Premier to the Big Missouri property.

Ultimately, these gentlemen were successful in getting the famous New York house of Guggenheim Bros. to become associated in developing the Premier Gold Mining Co.'s property and the management was then placed in the hands of the American Smelting Co. Thus what at first might have been a British success was for all time turned into an American Eldorado.

Transport then began to play an important part and steps were immediately taken to build a road from the dock near Stewart to the mine at a cost of \$51,000. Many difficulties were encountered even after the road was built for in winter the snow is sometimes 20 feet deep.

Under Guggenheims

By means of the money provided by the Guggenheims, development operations rapidly advanced. In July 1921 a 100-ton mill commenced crushing, concentrating and cyaniding plants were also provided.

Bigger plans, however, were on foot and an aerial transport cable was constructed by the Riblet Tramway Co. of Spokane. This commenced working toward the end of 1921. Now in daily use, the tramway conveys the ore from the mine to Hyder. It is the longest aerial cableway in the world, covering a distance of 11½ miles. There are 120 buckets of 800 pound capacity and in less than two hours a bucket is conveyed over the 11½ miles. During the first six months of 1922 the company has shipped more than 10,000 tons over this aerial tramway. Previously the company was using 40 to 60 horses and two 5-ton caterpillar tractors.

The Premier Gold Mining Co. has a capital of \$5,000,000, and its dividend record is probably unique in mining history. The first distribution of \$100,000 was made in November, 1921; this was followed by \$500,000 in March, \$750,000 in July, and there was paid on September 20 last another distribution of \$750,000, making \$2,400,000 in less than 12 months. Nor is this all, as the ore actually sold has been paid for as development proceeded, no working capital being required. This policy might be followed more extensively by British engineers, thus avoiding the creation of huge capitals upon which the poor shareholder receives meagre, or more probably no dividends at all.

Ministers Pay Visit

So important have been the developments in this far-Western portion of British Columbia that the Government, with great foresight, despatched some of the more important members of the cabinet, together with the Agent-General on this side, to visit this vast territory from which so much mineral wealth is being obtained.

Fish Creek, under the control of the American Mining & Milling Co., and 1½ miles from the Premier, is opening up well. The mine will shortly be shipping high-grade ore to Tacoma smelter. This property is situated on the Alaskan side of the international border. The ore is being sent down to Hyder awaiting shipment.

B.C. Silver Mines

Dealing finally with B.C. Silver Mines, over which the Selkirk Gold Mining & Finance Co. holds a controlling interest, this concern has a very good chance of becoming one of the few real British successes in British Columbia provided the board and shareholders in London hold fast.

TO MAKE IT HARD TO GET MARRIED

Welfare Speaker Says Poor Will Always Be Present Under Existing Conditions

WINNIPEG, Nov. 29.—"I want to make it hard to get married. We always shall have the poor with us so long as it is easy to get married—so long as people can go into the great adventure of life as they would go into a picture show," declared G. B. Clark, secretary of the Social Welfare Commission, in an address to the Winnipeg Ministerial Association. The likelihood of a request being made soon for legislation aimed at preventing too early and unprepared marriages was foreshadowed by Mr. Clark. He stated 50 per cent. of the girls who came within the scope of the welfare commission were married between the ages of 18 and 20 and the next group between the ages of 20 and 25.

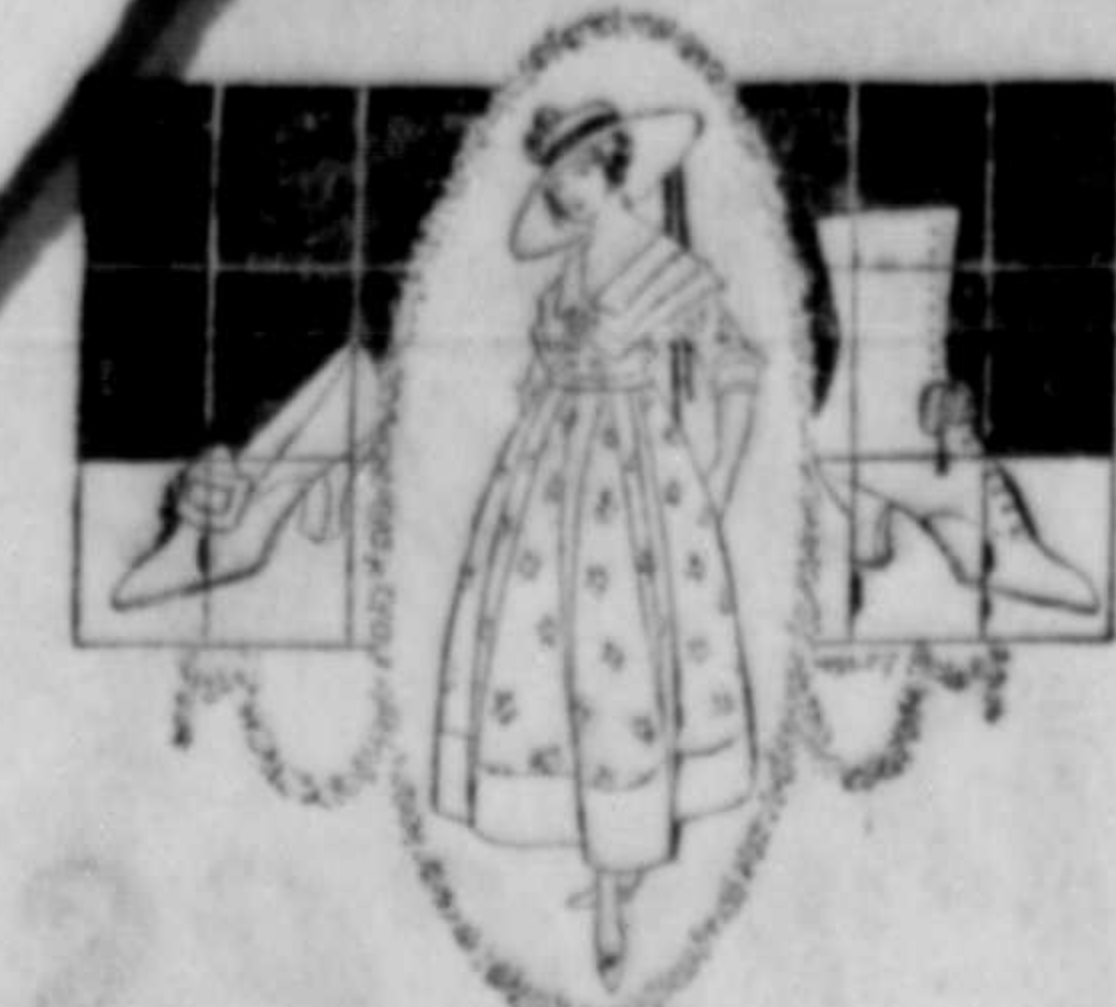

Prince Rupert Board of Trade Makes Reply to Editorial on Dry Dock in Vancouver Paper

The Prince Rupert Board of Trade has prepared and sent to the Vancouver World a reply to the editorial, advocating the removal of the local dry dock to Vancouver, which appeared in that paper last week. The Board has asked that its reply be published in order to clear up the misstatements that were made in the editorial.

The reply is as follows:

"There appeared in your edition of November 18 an editorial headed, 'Vancouver, Victoria and Prince Rupert,' dealing principally with drydocking facilities existing or under construction at these three ports.

"All right minded Prince Rupert citizens, and we have our share of such, admire and take pride as citizens of the province in the great and busy city of Vancouver. We realize the need of the port of Vancouver for drydocking facilities and sympathize with your efforts to obtain same.

The editorial mentioned, however, contains so many glaring mis-statements with regard to the Prince Rupert ship repair plant that this Board feels bound to take up the matter, trusting your paper will give our letter as much prominence as was given the original article.

Usefulness of Dock

The Prince Rupert plant was built by the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company and was completed in 1916. By reason of its location, five hundred miles north of the nearest point at which ships can be docked and repaired, and on account of the large amount of coastwise traffic between southern ports, Prince Rupert and Alaska, the yard at Prince Rupert constitutes a very valuable asset to shipping interests on the coast. Since the plant was built in 1916, it has handled a very considerable amount of work and a great deal of use has been made of the floating drydock.

In referring to the fifteen ships plying out of Vancouver to Australia and the Orient, you state or infer that since the beginning of the year these vessels have had to take the trip from Vancouver to Prince Rupert to be docked and painted, thus taking a week to do what could be done in twenty-four hours. As a matter of fact only two of these vessels have come to Prince Rupert and these have been on the run from Japan to British Columbia. For such vessels, it is very convenient to call at Prince Rupert, eastbound for drydocking. In fact, the best authorities state that it is more economical in point of mileage on these trips to send the ships to Prince Rupert for docking than it is to send them to Esquimalt. We

have it on the best authority that only vessels on this run are to be drydocked for painting at Prince Rupert and that those ships coming from Australia, or through the Canal, will go to Esquimalt as heretofore.

Far From Facts

Since this is so, it is apparent that many of the remarks in your editorial are far from actual facts and your criticism of policies is without any justification whatsoever. Surely the Canadian National Railways is pursuing the proper policy in handling vessels which it operates in a repair yard which it also operates when this can be conveniently done. If this course were not followed, then the taxpayers of the country would indeed be justified in voicing a protest.

Ships have not been sent north from Vancouver to Prince Rupert in a single instance, nor is it contemplated that this shall be done as far as we know. It would seem that this information could easily have been obtained by your paper, had you so desired, and we cannot understand why yours or any other Vancouver newspaper should take so much pains to create an impression which could only be expected to work an injury to the Port of Prince Rupert.

Room for Both

There is surely room for two sea ports on the mainland of British Columbia. The development of Prince Rupert can only work advantageously to the city of Vancouver. This has been the case in the past, for it is probably true that more than 90 per cent of the materials used in the building of our city were purchased in Vancouver.

Many thousands of trips are made each year by steamers along the route which you have described as being hazardous. If the risk to vessels on this run is as great as you apparently believe, then surely Prince Rupert, located half way between Vancouver and Skagway, is the logical point for a first class ship repair plant.

APPEAL IS DISMISSED

Fine of \$1,000 Upon P. R. Mercantile by Magistrate McClymont is Sustained

The appeal of the Prince Rupert Mercantile Co. Ltd. against the conviction made by Magistrate McClymont in the city police court which resulted in their being fined \$1,000 for illegally selling beer was dismissed by Judge Young in the county court yesterday afternoon, the decision of the lower court being thus sustained. The hearing started at 2:30 and, with the giving of evidence and argument of counsel, continued all afternoon. Milton Gonzales, of Williams & Gonzales, appeared for the appellant company and T. B. Hooper for the crown.

Mayor H. B. Rochester was the first witness called for the crown. He stated that about 6:30 p.m. on the evening in question he was in his room at the Prince Rupert Hotel getting ready for dinner when he heard an auto truck coming into the lane. Looking out he saw that it belonged to Wakefield's Cartage Co. with Wakefield driving. The auto was backed in between the St. James Hotel and the Alaska Rooms. The driver got out and, under the pretense of letting down the tail board, scanned the windows in the hotel to see if anybody was looking. Apparently being satisfied, he proceeded to unload two barrels of beer which he rolled into the lean-to at the side of the St. James Hotel. He then drove away hurriedly.

Mayor Enters Hotel

His Worship continued by stating that he was considerably annoyed by such work going on on Sunday so he phoned the police station and Sergeant McGlinchy answered. The two entered the St. James Hotel and asked for the proprietor who answered from the lean-to. He was questioned about a shipment of beer being just delivered but at first denied it, stating that it came on Saturday and then changed his date to Friday. Witness said the proprietor's name was George James. Later he admitted the delivery of the two barrels a few minutes previous and said Joseph Sigmund had delivered them but when confronted by the mayor confessed that Wakefield had brought them. On being requested to identify the two barrels produced as exhibits the mayor showed where he had put crosses on them. The barrels were stamped with the address of the Prince Rupert Mercantile Co. agents for the Vancouver Breweries at Prince Rupert.

Sergeant McGlinchy

Sergeant McGlinchy, on taking the stand, corroborated the mayor's evidence. James, he said, had told him that he had ordered a barrel and a half of beer from the vendor on Friday but it had not been delivered. He had phoned Sigmund of the Mercantile Co. with the result that the two barrels were delivered on Sunday. He stated that Sigmund had said he would make good for the extra half barrel with the government vendor the next day.

Mayor Rochester was recalled by Mr. Hooper and asked if he had seen any other deliveries to the St. James Hotel. The witness then stated that on the Friday previous he had seen Sigmund drive up in the evening and deliver two trays of pint bottles of beer and one barrel.

The crown then called Wm. J. Wakefield who told of being asked by Sigmund on the Sunday to deliver two barrels for him. These he got at the Mercantile warehouse and was paid \$1.50 for delivering them.

Herman Capstick

This evidence concluded the crown's case and Herman Capstick, manager of the Prince Rupert Mercantile Co. took the stand. At some length he told of the company giving up the export business and of how Sigmund, vice-president and a director of the company holding one share like the other members, had been greatly incensed and had taken over that part of the business himself. He stated that Sigmund, who acted as delivery man for the firm, had been given orders to deliver beer only on the request of the government liquor vendor. A book with the entry of deliveries together with requisitions from the vendor for August 18th and 21st were produced as exhibits in court.

The last witness for the defence was Joseph Sigmund.

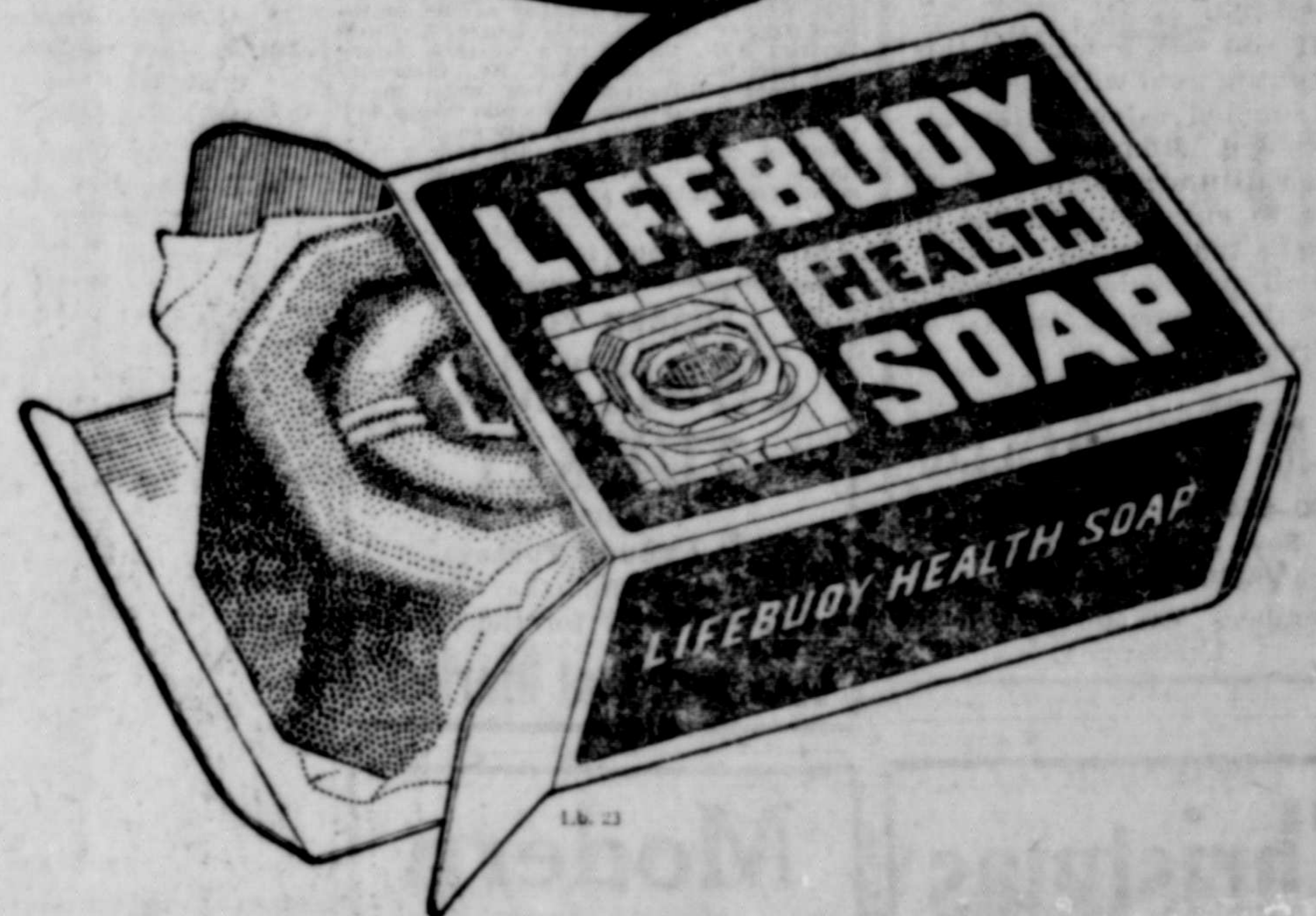

This first 232 feet accomplished was very difficult owing to the nature of country being much broken by boulders, but from now onwards operations should be more rapid. The object of driving the tunnel is to strike the Premier lode, which has already been located in the property further on—the Bush. It is expected to cut the lode at about 800 feet, and assuming that it will be possible to drive 200 feet a month very important news should be received before Christmas.

Mr. Banks has been able to secure an option on the Cascade Falls No. 5, a property contiguous to the original discovery, and upon which developments may be expected later.

Recommendations B.C.

It can be seen from the foregoing that attention is being focused upon this important territory, and we can only conclude by expressing the hope that British mining engineers may be able to obtain more of the plums which so far seem to be going almost entirely to shrewd and business-like Americans who are not afraid of risking capital to exploit this vast treasure house of wealth.

We would commend British Columbia to the attention of the great mining houses of the city of London. Some of these have already sent experts, but through lack of courage enterprise, or faith in the reports received, they have allowed properties to be pigeon-holed, and then later they are surprised to learn that Americans have visited the spot, promptly acquired options, and are at the present time opening up these same promising properties. That this kind of proceeding may cease must be the earnest desire of every patriotic Briton.
