## Conservatives Victorious in Elections WOULD CO-OPERATE WITH DOMINION IN PROVING B. C. IRON

### Bonar Law's Party Has Ample Majority to Control British Commons; Returns Incomplete

LONDON, Nov. 16.— Election returns from throughout Great Britain at 4:30 this afternoon show that the Conservatives have more than the 308 necessary to obtain a majority in the new House of Commons. With only 75 divisions yet to report, the standings of the various parties are as follows:

- Conservatives, 319 members.
- Asquith Liberals, 55.
- Labor Party, 120.
- National Liberals, 38.
- Other Parties, 13.

Arthur Henderson, the Labor leader, was defeated by the Conservatives in Widnes division, Lancashire.

Six divisions in Glasgow showed a sensational turnover from Conservative to Labor.

Premier Bonar Law was elected in Glasgow central division with a majority of 2500.

Hon. H. H. Asquith was re-elected in Paisley with a majority of 3,000.

#### Women Fare Badly

Women candidates appear to have fared badly, but two are reported to be elected. They are Lady Astor for Sutton division, Plymouth, and Mrs. Wintour, who was re-elected for southern division, Lincolnshire.

J. R. Clynes, the Labor leader, was re-elected in Manchester by a large majority.

Hon. Austen Chamberlain was re-elected at West Birmingham. Ramsay MacDonald, Labor candidate, won the Welsh seat at Aberavon from the Liberals.

Sir Arthur Griffith-Boscawen, Premier Bonar Law's minister of health, was defeated.

A tremendous vote was polled throughout the country and there was great excitement.

### GOVERNMENT SUSTAINED

Hinchcliffe Motion Censuring Mothers' Pension Board Defeated by 30 to 13 Division

VICTORIA, Nov. 16.— Following a forceful speech by Mrs. Ralph Smith in which she scored Canon Hinchcliffe and defended the Patriotic Fund, the government was again sustained in the legislature yesterday by a vote of 30 to 13, all the Independents voting against Canon Hinchcliffe and Hon. W. J. Bowser's motion of censure on the Mothers' Pension Board for its action in making war widows come under the Patriotic Fund.

Canon Hinchcliffe made his second long speech in support of the motion and most of the press representatives left the gallery.

Mrs. Smith followed Canon Hinchcliffe. She said that there might be reason for criticism but there was no reason to refuse investigations as the Conservatives were doing. The Federal government had been responsible for Canada going to war so it should pay. Women should not feel under any obligation in taking money from the Patriotic Fund. It was right that the men who made money out of the war should pay. Looking at Canon Hinchcliffe, Mrs. Smith said that any man who made charges and then refused to investigate was not doing his duty.

### JAIL FLOOR WAS FLOODED BY RAIN

Constables and Prisoners Called Out to Check Course of Incoming Water

That the rain cares nothing for law or prisons was shown last night at the police station when about seven o'clock the floor very closely resembled a swimming pool and Chief Vickers called the prisoners out to help bail the water with tin cans and all other receptacles handy. The whole trouble arose when a stream of rain water coming down off the cliff on the south side of the city hall refused to keep its course and a turbulent body of water surged under the door. Constable Cameron went out to change its course but did not succeed before an inch of water covered the floor.

### AUSTRIAN RAILWAY FARES GO UP AGAIN

Are Now 24 Times Higher Than in August of This Year

VIENNA, Nov. 16.— Railway rates in Austria were raised 300 per cent early this month, making them now 24 times what they were on August 1, 1922. Even with this heavy increase, it is estimated that the deficit still will be about 1,500,000 crowns a day.

The passenger deficit is said to be due largely to the enormous amount of free transportation, or so-called cost price fares enjoyed by government servants. During the summer it was estimated that at least half the travel was of this class. So far the government has taken no steps toward abolishing the evil.

### LUMBER COMING HERE FOR EASTERN MARKET

Big Bay Mill Shipping Four Carloads to Ontario and Manitoba—Coming Tomorrow

The tug McCulloch, Capt. H. Clifton, leaves tomorrow morning for the Big Bay mill at Georgetown, to bring a scowload of lumber to this port for transshipment East. The scow will contain one carload for Toronto, one for Winnipeg, one for Oshawa and one for West Toronto.

### ALASKA CONGRESSMAN INTERESTED IN FISH BUSINESS THIS PORT

### USE OF PRIVATE MONEY RECALLS HISTORY OF 1780

LONDON, Nov. 16.—The action of the German government in allowing certain firms to print their own money in small denominations, recalls a somewhat similar state of affairs in the early years of George III. In these days the amount of copper coin in circulation was totally inadequate, and tradesmen all over the country issued tokens of their own which attained almost equal standing with the legal coinage. One manufacturer in Birmingham issued over nine million pennies and 3½ million half-pennies in the course of a few years, and the amount of "tokens" in circulation in 1780 outnumbered the genuine coinage.

### KLONDYKE GOLD RUSH MAY SOON HAVE RIVAL

Rich Strikes in Newfoundland Reported and Prospectors From Far Afield Join in Stampede

SYDNEY, N.S., Nov. 9.— That Newfoundland next spring will see a big rush that will rival the famous Klondyke stampede of '98, is the opinion expressed by W. T. O. Hall, a prospector, who has just come from the north, after staking extensive claims at Stag Bay, where rich strikes have been reported. During the last three weeks, news of the strike has created a gold fever in Newfoundland, and more than 700 claims may be filed at St. Johns. The claims are large, comprising 320 acres each. Prospectors from as far distant as Alaska and South Africa are planning to join the rush.

### ENGLAND AND FRANCE AGREE

Are in Full Accord in Regard to Turkish Situation

PARIS, Nov. 16.—Britain and France are now in complete agreement on the fundamental conditions of a Turkish peace, it was stated following a conversation between Premier Poincaré and the British Ambassador Hardinge.

The French premier accepted the British point of view. The action will remove all danger of a Franco-British split in the Near East negotiations.

### CITIZENS' CLUB CASE BEING HEARD TODAY

Crown Witnesses Subjected to Stiff Cross-Examination Again by Defence Counsel

The case against the Citizens Club Ltd., charged with selling beer through its servant, G. Ciccone, is being heard in the police court before Magistrate McClymont today. The only witnesses heard this morning were Constables Dixon and Harrison, of the provincial force.

Chief Vickers swore to the conviction of Ciccone and his 850 fine, on information laid on October 26. After Constable Dixon had given his evidence L. W. Patmore, for the defence, subjected him to a lengthy examination on the amount of money he and the other constable received to get convictions.

Dixon stated that he was paid \$150 salary in advance and \$300 extra when he needed it. Inspector Miller of the Liquor Board had given him the money to enforce the Liquor Act, witness stated in reply to a question.

At some length Mr. Patmore asked him about his instructions from Inspector Miller in regard to getting information and much about the way the money was spent but the witness gave only general information. The counsel for the defence asked the witness what the exact words of the inspector regarding the convictions had been whereat the witness replied that he could not remember.

"You have a pretty good memory," remarked Mr. Patmore.

"Yes, I have when it is necessary," replied Dixon.

"You mean convenient," replied the counsel.

He then asked the witness if Inspector Miller had discussed with them ways and means of getting evidence but received a reply in the negative.

Constable Harrison gave similar evidence.

### Sloan Introduces Bill Providing for Further Investigation Steel Possibilities in this Province

VICTORIA, Nov. 16.—A bill introduced by Hon. William Sloan, minister of mines, providing for the co-operation of the Dominion government in proving iron ore properties with a view to the establishment of a steel works in the province, was given its first reading in the legislature yesterday afternoon. The motion would give the province the right to enter on any property and develop it making the work done the first charge against the property. An appropriation of \$50,000 would be allowed for the work.

Hon. W. J. Bowser, leader of the opposition, asked for correspondence bearing on the establishment of an iron and steel industry, and scored the government for its alleged inactivity.

Mr. Sloan said that if the steel works were established it would have to be a commercial proposition and not speculative. Negotiations were already under way with various firms but none had reached an advanced stage.

### PROSECUTION OF HUNTERS WHO DO NOT LOOK FIRST

Cowichan Game Association Presses For Legislation Against Careless Hunters

VICTORIA, Nov. 16.—A strong appeal that the government institute legislation providing for criminal prosecution of senseless hunters who shoot without seeing what they are shooting at causing injury or death to many hunters engaged in seeking game was made by the Cowichan Game Association at the session of the Game Conservation Board here, M. B. Jackson, chairman of the board, said that the seriousness of the question was duly recognized but the matter should be referred to the Minister of Justice at Ottawa for amendment of the criminal code as it was a criminal matter.

J. P. Babcock assistant game commissioner, proposed the establishment of a game preserve 75 miles by 30 in the pocket north of Spectacle Lake, Quesne, Lake and Bowron River where all wild life would be immune from destruction and where naturalists could study in the greatest preserve in the world.

### MANY KILLED SINCE REIGN OF TERROR IN BARCELONA STARTED

MADRID, Nov. 15.—Since the reign of terror began in Barcelona, in 1918, figures just published show there have been 255 killed and 753 wounded in Barcelona alone, in addition to which the disorders in Madrid, Valencia, Seville, Bilbao, and Saragossa have resulted in the death of 424 and the wounding of 420.

Barcelona has had eleven civil governors since 1918, one of whom, Maestre, was killed by the Unionists. None of the perpetrators of the attacks upon the employers or unionists has been convicted, those suspects arrested always being freed either by the investigating magistrate or jury.

### BIG GALE ON WATERFRONT

Halibut Schooner Carolen Lost Her Rudder Coming to Port

The halibut schooner Carolen, of Sitka, Capt. A. J. Anderson, arrived in port this morning after having struck a heavy storm in the northern waters. At the height of the gale her rudder was carried away which necessitated improvising a jury rudder to enable her to navigate at all.

Several of the skippers arriving in port this morning report having encountered particularly heavy weather on the last trip several boats having had their ventilators stripped off as a result of the fierce wind.

### RUSSIAN-SWEDISH BUSINESS BETTER

STOCKHOLM, Nov. 16.— A new Russian effort to establish closer financial and commercial relations with Sweden is seen in the arrival in Stockholm of Aaron Scheinman, head of the Russian State bank.

Mr. Scheinman has declared that the bank which he heads may place its foreign assets and clearing funds in Swedish banks, providing a safe-guarding agreement can be arranged between the two countries. He has come here, he says, to enlarge the financial co-operation between Russia and Sweden. He considers Sweden one of the safest countries owing to its independent position and its well-ordered conditions.

The Russian State Bank, declares Mr. Scheinman, has acquired 36,000,000 gold rubles through its foreign exchange operations; and the end of the present year will add 50,000,000 to the total figure. The main purpose of the bank is to finance state industrial enterprises.

### STEAMSHIP MAN TO FORM NEW CABINET

Wilhelm Cuneo Accepts Task of Re-organizing German Ministry

**Who Would Be A Legislator?**  
 Who would be a legislator? It is a thankless job and one not in the least to be envied. Unless he is a man who likes to spend hours listening to speeches about nothing in particular and other hours listening to representations from constituencies and lobbyists and trying to keep his own head and strengthen his thinking and grasp the new subjects as they come before him, he is not fitted to be a legislator. Some legislators never bother about anything. They are thick skinned and thick headed and nothing penetrates. There are others, however, who are really able men and who try to do the work conscientiously and to serve the province faithfully. To such the work means something. They are the men who fret under the waste of time by the incompetent and the constant efforts to play the political game just to get ahead of the opposing side.

**Play To Galleries For Election Effect.**  
 Taken as a general rule it may be said that oppositions are trying to show up their opponents in such a way that they will appear to disadvantage when they go to the country. They seldom try to convert the supporters of the Government, but instead they say and do things which they think will look well for them in the newspapers and bad for their opponents. They are all the time playing to the press gallery and to the people beyond the readers of the newspapers.

And oppositions are not much more guilty in this respect than Governments and their supporters. Each has an eye to the people. That is well, for under the democratic system, the people are eventually the ones who decide. The difficulty is that politicians often adopt unfair tactics in order to try to show up their opponents to the people and if these tactics are not played up by the press, the people are sometimes led astray.

**Newspapers Keep Politicians Straight.**  
 Newspapers have a deterring effect on politicians. They also have a constructive and educative work to do. No matter what good work a legislature is doing, unless the newspapers tell about it, the work will be of little effect. Members would often take a certain line of action were it not that the newspapers would publish the fact and then there would be trouble at home. More depends upon the newspapers than is generally supposed. The newspapers can make or break a politician, sometimes.

Newspapermen were the first to detect shams, to note causes and effects in political life and they sit behind the scenes cursed and praised alternately, yet caring little as long as they do the work allotted them and serve their particular newspapers faithfully.

There is not much that is attractive about the newspaper work in Victoria. There is one fairly large room set apart for the use of the reporters but beyond that there are few privileges except that they have access to most of the meetings, if they wish to attend, and there is a special gallery set apart for their use in the legislative chamber. The amount of work the men are supposed to do is appalling, but they manage to do it, largely by combining forces and doing team work.

**Looked Upon As Necessarily Evil.**  
 The average newspaperman seems to be looked upon as a necessary evil. He is something no public man can ignore, yet something of which he is not proud and is sometimes ashamed. Each man sees his own little affairs bigger than anything else in the world and he cannot understand how it is the newspapers do not so view them. When a member makes a speech in the House, he expects a good report and sometimes he gets it. Sometimes, however, he says nothing which would be of interest to the readers of the paper and in that case he is left out or cut down so small that he is mortally offended and swears vengeance on the newspaper and reporter.

On the whole there is plenty of interest in the newspaper game, either in connection with parliamentary work or elsewhere. Given a fairly thick skin and a sense of humor, especially the latter, the life is an enjoyable one.

**PARENT-TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION FOR TERRACE PLANNED**

Organization Meeting Will be Held Next Monday Night at Strawberry Centre.

TERRACE, Nov. 16.—A Parent-Teachers' Association is to be formed in Terrace and a meeting has been called for next Monday night for the purpose of organization. The proposal of establishing such an association was introduced at a meeting of the Terrace Welfare League on Tuesday night when Mr. Fogster and Mr. Fraser, school inspector, spoke on the subject. Mr. Forster explained very clearly the aims and work of Parent-Teachers' Associations and suggested that immediate steps be taken if one were to be organized here. Three important functions looked after by such an organization would be the establishment of a school library, music in the schools and beautifying of the grounds.

Mr. Fraser made a short speech later on the subject pointing out the necessity of a definite objective to work for and a wise selection of officers. He also pointed out that trouble might arise if matters not directly affecting the Association were allowed to come up.

**EDUCATION DISCUSSED BY SMITHER'S LEAGUE**

Retention of Married Female Teachers Suggested—Return of Examination Papers

SMITHERS, Nov. 16.—The weekly meeting of the Social Activity League was held on Monday evening last, the subject of discussion being "Education."

This was dealt with by L. Warner from the standpoint of the school trustees, while Mr. Burt represented the teaching profession and Rev. M. W. Lees the general public. A plea that more consideration be paid to the retention of married female teachers was advanced by one of the speakers on the ground that they were more experienced and better equipped to handle young children than teachers just out of the Normal School.

Another interesting point made was that after the annual examinations were over, and results announced, the education department should return all examination papers to the schools in order that teachers, children and parents might see the cause of failures and profit thereby. This suggestion was very heartily endorsed. An animated and interesting discussion followed the addresses.

**FIGURES REGARDING POLYTECHNIC SCHOOL**

The latest report on the operation of the Northern Polytechnic Institute in Prince Rupert and Anxox for the month of October gives the number of classes in Prince Rupert as 21 and Anxox 8. Twenty seven different subjects are being taught in Prince Rupert and ten in Anxox. Seventeen instructors are engaged in Prince Rupert and eight are engaged in Anxox.

Pupils enrolled in Prince Rupert up to and including the first week of the month 117, and in Anxox for the same period, 50. Forty-six pupils were enrolled in Prince Rupert during the remainder of the month and fifteen were enrolled in Anxox. Two

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pupils were struck off during the month in Prince Rupert while in Anxox none were struck off. Pupils enrolled at the end of the month of October in Prince Rupert were 161 and in Anxox 65. The total attendance, in actual hours spent by the students in their respective classes, was: Prince Rupert 4,314 hours and Anxox 296 hours.

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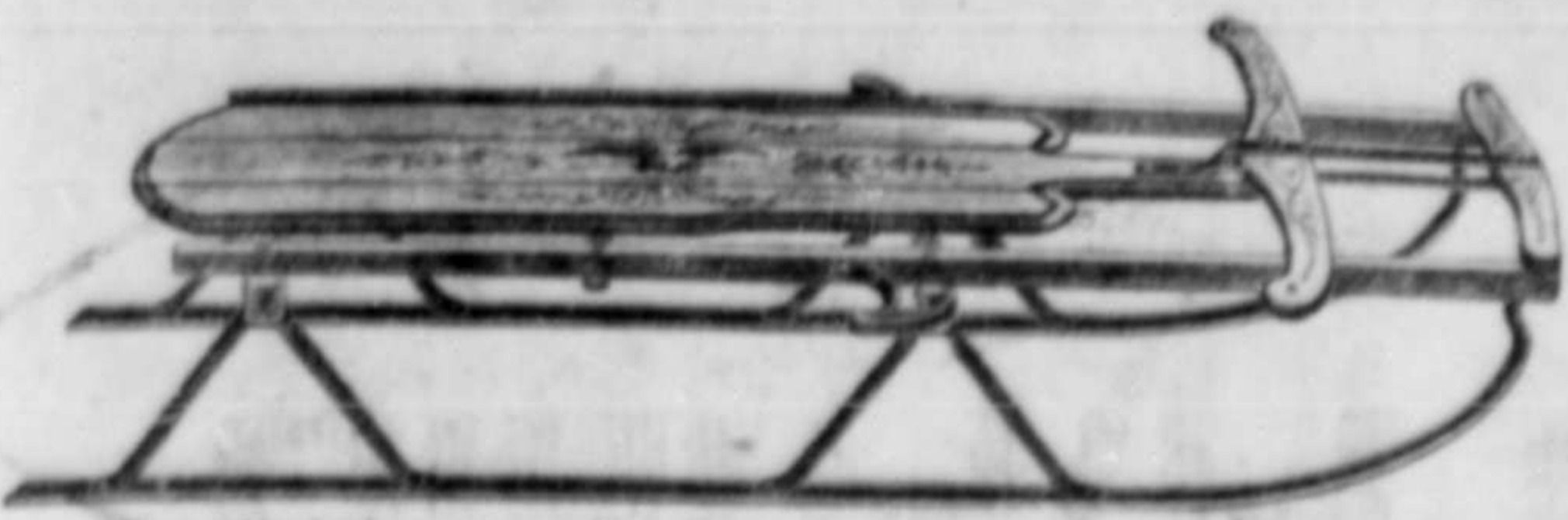

## CANARIES TO SING LIKE NIGHTINGALES

Bremen Bird Fancier Produces New Species After Ten Years' Experiments

BREMEN, Nov. 15.—After ten years of experiments, a Bremen bird fancier has succeeded in producing canaries with a nightingale warble. The cross-breed was obtained by using nightingales as "singing masters" for young canaries, and rearing the latter entirely removed from the sound of any other bird note except the warbling of their "instructors."

The breeder's chief difficulty was at first found in the fact that normally nightingales sing only during two months of the year, and his purposes required a longer uninterrupted period of instruction for the canaries. He was finally successful in changing the moult, or non-singing period of certain nightingales so that some sang from May to July, others from June to August, and still others from August to October.

Using these birds he kept newly-hatched canaries continually within hearing of their warbling. Several generations of breeding showed that birds reared from the original students instinctively possessed the nightingale warble, and that "instructors" could be dispensed with for the offspring except for "polishing off" their singing.

## BUDDHISM SPREADING IN CHINA RAPIDLY

OXFORD, Eng., Nov. 16.—"Buddhism is the probable rival of Christianity in the Far East," said Professor Sutherland, who at one time occupied the chair of Chinese at Oxford University, in an address before the Conference of Modern Churchmen. His remark has created something of a sensation in church circles.

"Buddhism," the professor stated, "can adopt and adapt to will. It has recently adopted Christian methods wholesale. Its ideas are at work in the West, even in our churches. Buddhism calls for sympathetic study, and the day may come when the best men in Buddhism and Christianity will meet together to discuss the possibility of working together for the salvation of the world."

"Buddhism, originally, little more than psychology and ethics, is today a religion and the only probable world rival to the two other propagandist religions, Christianity and Islam. Islam has a closed creed. Christianity is willing in its own hands but will burst them. Buddhism has none. Buddhism is spreading in China."

## HARRY KILLAS

### CASE CLOSED

Magistrate McClymont Will Give His Decision Monday Morning

Decision in the case of Harry Killas, charged with selling whiskey, will be given on Monday morning, Magistrate McClymont announced at the conclusion of the argument in the case yesterday afternoon in the police court.

Evidence for both sides was given in the morning and immediately after luncheon the magistrate with the two counsel, L. W. Patmore and T. B. Hooper, Dr. J. P. Cade and a police officer went to the Fishermen's Rest where they took the evidence of Fred W. Anderson for the defence. The witness is very ill and the doctor's orders were that the counsel should be very careful in cross-examining him.

Immediately on returning L. W. Patmore, for the defence, recalled Constable Harrison on the question of what money he and Constable Dixon had spent in the clubs to get evidence. On being asked how much each paid to Killas in the Travellers' Club witness replied \$1.70 and added that he had orders to do so.

"Do I understand you to say that the government told you to spend this money," questioned Mr. Patmore.

"Object to this," declared Mr. Hooper.

"Don't shout," replied the defence.

"Do you object to shouting? You have done enough here," came the reply.

Mr. Patmore—"This is just another instance of how my friend cannot appreciate his position as crown prosecutor."

"I refuse to argue with you and I'll give way to you as always," followed Mr. Hooper.

Then to the witness again—"Does the government pay you to spend money in these places?"

"Yes."

**Detectives Salary**  
 Mr. Hooper interjected to ask the witness his salary which he said was \$150 and expenses.

"Then it is not crown money you are spending?" asked the crown. Mr. Patmore stating that he objected to the crown's line of cross-examination.

In his argument, the defence counsel drew the court's attention to the fact that the crown was not bound by any statute unless expressly mentioned. He therefore contended that the crown had a right to purchase liquor and that, in this case, the crown had purchased liquor through its agents, the police and added that the crown could argue "till he was black in the face" to the contrary.

Just at this point Mr. Patmore appealed to the court to have Mr. Hooper stopped from interrupting him in his address. Mr. Hooper jumped to his feet and levelled his finger at the Magistrate. "Now you listen to me. This is the first time that you have asked either counsel to have order. You never came to my assistance before when I wanted it. When I ask for assistance I want it," he exclaimed.

**Must Be Order**

Magistrate McClymont replied that there must be order in the court. Continuing Mr. Patmore declared that there was a preponderant weight of evidence in favor of the accused and that there was not one little of evidence that liquor had been found on the premises in a search.

He also enlarged on the evidence of the defence witnesses that the proprietors of the club had not allowed liquor to be kept or consumed on the premises.

## WORKINGS OF SECRET SERVICE DURING WAR

Described By British Criminologist Who is on Tour of United States and Canada

NEW YORK, Nov. 16.—(By Canadian Press)—Some interesting sidelights on the work of the British secret service during the war were told to the members of New York Canadian Club yesterday by Sir Basil Thomson, the famous British criminologist, at a special luncheon given in his honor in the club rooms.

Sir Basil was at the head of the secret service during the war. Previously he was for twelve years commissioner of the Metropolitan police force at Scotland Yard. He described the methods of the secret service in dealing with German spies. The entire espionage organization of Germany and its methods of operation were known previous to the outbreak of the war, but in order to secure further information as to its ramifications the German agents were allowed to remain at large under surveillance after war actually broke out.

"It didn't make any difference," Sir Basil remarked, "because the only reports which went to Germany were the ones that happened to be rather inaccurate."

Sir Basil told many amusing anecdotes of the days of the "spy mania" in London and the various rumors that the police had to contend with.

Expressing his pleasure at being among Canadians, Sir Basil in concluding his speech declared that in 1914 the British government was in a quandary because of a shortage of rifles to furnish reinforcements for the "first hundred thousand." Then Canada poured her men over to fill the gap," he said, "It was something that never will be forgotten."

Sir Basil plans to visit a number of Canadian cities before returning to London.
