Confer Over Steel Works Proposal NOVA SCOTIA GOVERNMENT TAKES HAND IN THE COAL STRIKE

Conference To Discuss Steel Smelter Proposal Vancouver Island Site

VICTORIA, Aug. 19.—A conference will be held in London next month of representatives of the British Government, the British steel manufacturers, Hon. W. S. Fielding, federal minister of finance, and either Hon. William Sloan, minister of mines, or Hon. John Hart, provincial minister of finance, in connection with the proposal to establish a twelve million dollar steel plant on the British Columbia coast according to an announcement made by H. L. Landahl of Vancouver, who has been active in promoting the undertaking and who states that the three governments are backing the proposal.

Big efforts are being made to secure the construction of the proposed plant on Vancouver Island. Hon. William Sloan, minister of mines and member for Nanaimo, is bent on getting it for his own constituency while Rev. T. J. Menzies, member for Comox, would like to have it at Union Bay where the Comox coal would be used and where there are at present a number of coke ovens. It is said that some Vancouver Island site will be chosen.

In the south there are a number of iron deposits, particularly on Letada Island in the Gulf of Georgia and at the south end of Vancouver Island, near Port Renfrew. These are magnetic iron. There is limonite deposits in the interior at Whitewater and near at Copper River, off the Sema River.

It is pointed out here that the deposits are usually located in the neighborhood of the coal deposits as it is easier to transport ore than the coal.

JAMES AUSTIN IS ARRESTED

Found Beneath Hay in His Own Barn This Morning by Watchers

NEW WESTMINSTER, Aug. 19.—James Austin, the 65-year-old farmer who is being sought by the police in connection with the shooting to death of Henry Green a neighbor on Thursday, was taken into custody this morning, found hidden underneath the hay in his own barn.

Watchers on the premises early today heard a smothered cough and investigating located Austin, who surrendered without trouble. It is alleged there had been a long standing feud between Austin and his victim.

ELKS BOOSTING PRINCE RUPERT

Joe Brown Takes Fish to Winnipeg and Tells Newspapers of Place

Among the interesting arrivals in the city for the big Elk convention is Joe Brown, of Prince Rupert, says the Winnipeg Free Press of Monday. The Prince Rupert fish companies, the Board of Trade and merchants have donated 5,000 pounds of various kinds of fish, which will form the piece de resistance at a banquet at the Fort Garry hotel to be given by the Elks. Mr. Brown is enthusiastic about Prince Rupert and points with pride to its tremendous fish industry. The halibut catch last year, he says, was 25,000,000 pounds, the salmon pack 24,500,000, and the herring catch 8,500,000 pounds.

RECEPTION TO BARON BYNG

Governor General to Have Busy Three Hours at This Port Today.

The C. P. R. steamer Princess Alice, Capt. Ormiston, bearing Baron Byng, Governor General of Canada, Lady Byng and their suite is due in port at 4:30 this afternoon. The vessel will be here until 7 o'clock allowing the Governor General to pay his official visit to Prince Rupert.

The guard of honor of the North B. C. Regiment will be stationed at the gang plank. As Baron Byng descends from the vessel the guard will give the Royal Salute and the 102nd battalion band will play the National Anthem. The Governor will be met at the foot of the plank and greeted by Mayor Harry B. Rochester who will then introduce him to Major John McGregor, V.C., officer commanding the Guard of Honor, which will be inspected. Major McGregor will then turn the Governor over to W. E. Denning, in charge of the Great War Veterans' parade, and then in turn J. A. Tenz, in charge of the Boy Scouts, and C. V. Eviatt, the boys of the Naval Brigade. The guard of Honor will take up one rank, the Great War Veterans, three, with the Boy Scouts and Naval Cadets behind. While the inspection of these bodies is going on Lady Byng will inspect the Girl Guides.

Present Addresses.

When these ceremonies are completed, the vice-regal party will be taken to the platform while the band plays a patriotic selection. Here Mayor Rochester will present the scroll of welcome to Baron Byng who will reply. Mrs. S. P. McMordie, regent of the Municipal Chapter, Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire, will then present an address to Lady Byng and Miss Audrey Parkin, little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. T. Parkin, will present a bouquet. The Mayor will then present the members of the reception committee assembled on the platform to Baron and Lady Byng. On the platform as members of this committee will be, besides the mayor, Bishop E. M. Bunoz, O.M.I., Archbishop G. A. Rix, Rev. G. G. Hacker, Rev. Dr. H. R. Grant, Rev. W. H. Redman, Capt. Coleman, of the Salvation Army, W. E. Denning, president of the Great War Veterans' Association, S. D. Macdonald, president of the Trades and Labor Council, C. H. Orme, president of the Board of Trade, Mrs. S. P. McMordie, regent of the Municipal Chapter, Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire, Judge and Mrs. F. McB. Young, Fred Stork, M. P. and Mrs. Stork, Ald. John Dybbavn, Ald. Theo. Gollart, George Rorie, president of the Boy Scouts, and N. B. Walton, general superintendent of the Canadian National Railways.

When these introductions have been made, the Mayor will announce to the public that His Excellency is desirous of meeting as many of the citizens and returned men as possible and there will be a general reception which will last for about 30 minutes.

Following this, the party will be taken to the fish docks where they will witness the landing, preparing and packing of halibut for Eastern shipment. The Governor General has already expressed his interest in this

Nova Scotia Government Mans Pumps at Mines and Will Protect Property

HALIFAX, Aug. 19.—A provincial police force of 1,000 men will be organized to protect the pump men at the Nova Scotia mines in order to protect public property. A troop train from the East arrived yesterday. Strikers had threatened the station master with the third degree at Sydney unless he told them the time of the train's arrival. However, when the soldiers arrived there was no violence and after some blundering attempts to block their passage, the crowds allowed the soldiers to join those already on duty at the Sydney mines.

The Provincial Government has decided to man the pumps in the mines threatened with flooding, the men to work under protection.

SYDNEY QUIET SINCE ARRIVAL OF SOLDIERS

Longshoremen Refuse to Load Vessel With Cape Breton Coal

SYDNEY, Aug. 19.—Tranquility marked the early hours of the fifth day of the general strike in the Cape Breton coal fields, following the arrival of troops at New Aberdeen. The excitement which marked the situation on Friday afternoon died away and there were no developments of importance during the night.

Yesterday a train of coal shipped from Glace Bay was held up by strike pickets and turned back to the mines at North Sydney. Last night the longshoremen refused to work the bunker steamer Sable with coal shipped over the Canadian National Railways from Sydney.

At present they can get certain stations only by relaying.

Welcome To Baron Byng.

The Daily News joins with the rest of the community in extending a hearty welcome to Baron Byng. In the first place he is a splendid soldier and did good service in the war, especially as leader of the Canadians. For that he deserves our gratitude. It is, however, as the representative of the British Empire that we welcome him. He is the delegate sent here from the capital of our Empire to represent all the other independent nations of the Empire here and especially Great Britain and Ireland. He is the bond that unites us with the others.

Let Us Forget That Word "Loyalty."

Usually on such occasions as this there is a lot of talk about loyalty. When Lord Minto came to British Columbia as Governor, he urged the people to remain loyal to England. We have no intention of doing anything of the sort. We are just as loyal to Australia as we are to England, and the main thing is that we remain loyal to ourselves and that England remain loyal to us. Also we should ask the same of Ireland.

Statesmen today are careful to speak of the self-governing nations comprising the British Empire. Among these self-governing nations there will eventually be no greater and no less, except that one may be great in being able to serve the others. The greatness of service of nation to nation is going to be the test. Canada is one of this great group of nations and she looks to Britain, to Ireland, to Australia, to South Africa, to New Zealand to be loyal to her. That is the only kind of loyalty we recognize. Possibly we do not pay our share of the overhead in regard to the conduct of affairs in the Empire. The British taxpayer has to pay a great deal more than ourselves toward the defence and general development. The King, the emblem of central authority, lives in London and his expenses are paid by Britain. However, we pay the salary and expenses of our own governor who represents the King, so that in that respect we are about on an equality. Where we fall down is on the naval and military expenditures. Whether we should assume more is a matter on which all are not agreed. But whether we pay a larger proportion or not in future it is well for us to consider our position. We cannot expect perfect loyalty from the other parts of the Empire unless we are prepared to pay our way and carry our share of the overhead. At any rate we can forget the word "loyalty" as applied in the old time. We have a sentimental affection for the mother country and also it is to our advantage to remain a part of the British Empire. In union there is strength. We welcome Governor Byng today as the representative of the central authority and the representative of that British sentiment that has built up the Empire and has made it great. When he returns to England he will speak in the councils of the Empire as a Canadian and will demand there for us that loyalty which we extend to him and the people he represents here.

Great Need Of A Nurse's Home.

One of the most deserving proposals that has been made here in recent years is that to establish a nurse's home at the General Hospital. If the people of the city knew the conditions at the institution they would have seen to it that one was built long ago. Our information is that at present a small house adjoining the hospital is rented for the purpose, but that it is so small that only a few of the nurses are able to enjoy its privileges. The rest of the nurses, mostly those who are learning the profession, sleep three in a room right in the hospital within reach of the iodine smell and with all the associations of sickness around them. Only the fact that the girls are young and strong makes them able to stand it for any length of time.

It would be bad enough for a grocer to have to sleep in his shop within reach of the scent of the cheese and butter and other food articles but to be always within the depressing area of the sick wards and with the associations of sickness all around them is an experience that no girl should be asked to pass through. Only the strong are able to stand it.

When a girl is training to be a nurse she is expected to be on duty for long hours and if she should be needed for an extra shift or for a few hours of overtime she does it without extra pay. She is restricted in the hours she is allowed to be out and she is supposed to study as well as undertake the work of the sick-room. Then we ask her to share her room with two others and to have that room right in the hospital buildings with all its associations which the nurse knows so well but which she would rather forget.

Miss Randall has done the community a good service in drawing attention to the condition which exists here. If we know the people of Prince Rupert, they will not allow the condition to continue a day longer than is necessary. A new building where the nurses can live in comfort and each have a room of her own is the least that can be expected. There is no need of a palatial structure. The originators of the building scheme have done well to cut their requirements to the minimum. What is needed is a place that will be convenient and commodious such as is the ordinary citizen's home.

CAR SHOPS EDMUNTON HAVE BEEN COMMENCED

First Unit Laid Down Which May be Added to From Time to Time

EDMONTON, Aug. 18. — A. E. Warren of Winnipeg, general manager of the Canadian National Railways spent Wednesday in the city looking into the activities of the various departments of the railway here. He intends to return to Winnipeg from the coast by track motor in order to thoroughly inspect the line.

The first piles for the new car-shops in Edmonton were driven Tuesday and the first unit of what will eventually be a large enough plant to take care of the requirements for all of the Western lines is being built. Mr. Warren stated that at the present time only one unit is being built, but more units will be added from time to time as necessity demands.

Mr. Warren is fairly optimistic over the crop situation and says that present indications are that more grain will be hauled over the Canadian National lines in Western Canada than last year. In some places the crops are not quite up to standard, but taking the west as a whole there will be a fair average.

Speaking of the coal situation Mr. Warren stated that in Winnipeg Alberta coal is in good demand and there was a market for much more than is being shipped there at the present time.

PEOPLE LIVE LONGER THAN IN THE PAST

LONDON, Aug. 19.—People are living longer today than in the past, said Sir Kingley Wood, M.P., of the Health Ministry, at a recent meeting of the Faculty of Insurance at Leeds.

There are at the present time in England and Wales 600,000 persons over 70 years of age, and 60,000 persons over 85 years of age.

In 1920, 200,000 deaths occurred in the case of persons under the age of 45, or 44 per cent of the total number of deaths. The chief causes of the present high mortality rate are bronchitis, pneumonia, tuberculosis and diseases of the nervous system. Cancer also stands high in the list.

PROGRESS AT BUCKLEY BAY

Senator Stevens Says That Preparations for Re-opening of Mill Proceeding Steadily.

Ex-Senator G. A. Stevens, of Montana, who is interested with F. L. Buckley in the big timber project on Graham Island, is in the city on business and will return to Buckley Bay on the Prince John tonight. He will likely be in the district until the end of the year.

Senator Stevens reports that the work of overhauling the Massett Timber Co.'s mill, the installing of new equipment and the extension of the power facilities in preparation for the resumption of the mill's activities are proceeding steadily. It is the intention to start cutting next month.

Raise Own Stock.

Speaking of stock, in which he is particularly interested, Senator Stevens says that there are now 100 head of cattle on the property which he holds near Massett. It is the intention to increase the number when mill operations commence in order to meet all the meat requirements of the town and camps. The large tract of land which is owned by him is now being fenced and preparations are being made to grow feed. This land is located some 28 miles away from Buckley Bay. The stock they already have is located there and any extensions to the number will also be there. Nothing definite has yet been decided, Senator Stevens says, in regard to the big stock proposition which he has under consideration.

Machine Work.

In the course of a conversation with a News representative yesterday afternoon, Senator Stevens said that the Prince Rupert drydock was proving very useful already to the operations at Graham Island. Machinery which required work on a big lathe could be sent over on Thursday on the Prince John and returned on Sunday. It would take a fortnight to have the same work done at Vancouver.

Woven by Native Women.

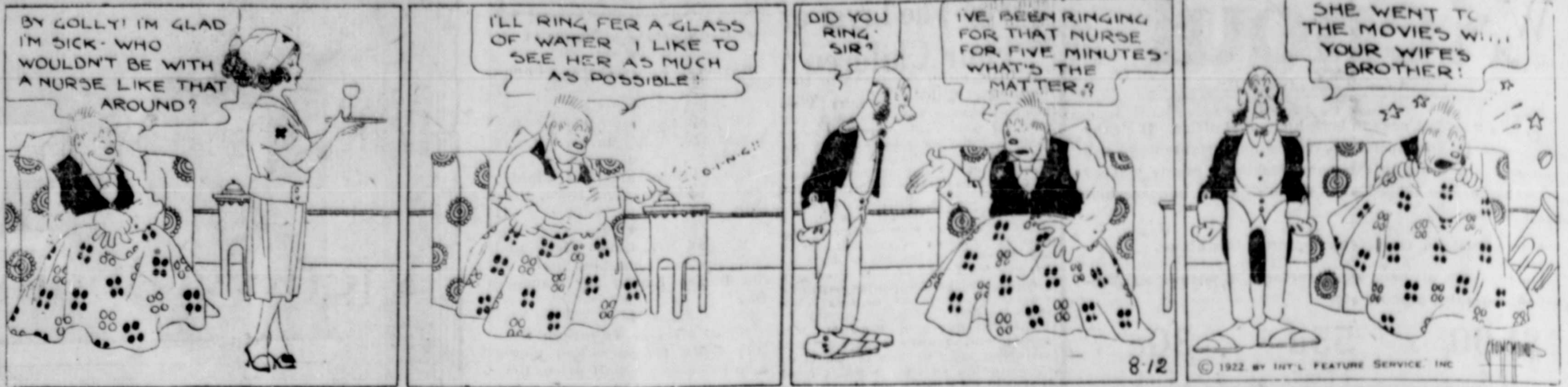

AIR RACE FOR CUP PRESENTED BY KING

Will Be Arranged For Early
Part of September and to
Occupy Two Days.

LONDON, Aug. 19.—There is to be a great air race for a cup presented by the King some time during the first fortnight in September.

The race will occupy two days, one for the outward half of the course, and one for the return. It will start and finish at Croyden and Glasgow will be its northernmost limit. Birmingham, Newcastle-on-Tyne, Manchester, and Bristol are among the cities that will be points on the route, and it is hoped that the civic authorities will do all that is possible to facilitate the arrangements for the race, which will be in the hands of the Royal Aero Club.

The plans for the race so far are not advanced but it is already settled that it shall be flown under a handicap, and that, in addition to the King's Cup, a trophy which many airmen have already declared it their ambition to win, there shall be certain subsidiary prizes. In the provision of these the promoters of the race have some expectation that the great industrial and commercial centres over which the racing aircraft will pass in the contest, will take some part. The need for the encouragement of aviation is acute, and the race will provide an opportunity for the public who are coming more and more to realize their dependence at a time of national emergency on their airmen, to express their appreciation of them.

It is intended that only British airmen and machines shall compete. Any type of aeroplane will be eligible.

Waterfront Whiffs

Doings of the Mosquito Fleet Which Is the Chief Source of Prince Rupert's Prosperity

Just like the weather the business along the waterfront has been good this week. No one has a kick coming, not even the fleet donkeys. The Admiral is in particularly fine fettle these days and has taken upon himself to start around the floats in the early morning with his official hat on. When you see the Admiral with his hat on one side you can bet your next week's washing that there is business afoot in sight, that is if it is cocked over the port eye. Should it be cocked hiding the starboard light then the old boy has usually wined well.

The Admiral's secretary reports that some 200,000 pounds of halibut has passed through the port this week, and in addition some 35,000 pounds of black cod, which has constituted four or five loads for eastern shippers. Prices have been very steady around the 10c mark for first class and 6c for second class fish, with a flourish towards the end. The highest price paid during the week was 11c and 8c and the lowest 9.1c and 6.5c, which is a fair average.

The Tuck's hold, owned by Capt. Bill Hegge and Paul M. Pederson, is one of the best equipped halibut boats on the coast. Her owners have recently installed a heavy oil engine which takes the place of the distillate burner. The new engine is giving entire satisfaction. The Tuck's has a length of 33 feet, a 10 ft beam, and a gross tonnage of 57. The new engine is a Fairbanks-Morse "C" 30" heavy oil engine of the semi-enclosed type, of 60 h.p. which gives her a speed of some 9.1 miles per hour. It is said that the 60 h.p. heavy oil engine gives her as much speed as the previous 80 h. p. engine did

when new. Captain Hegge, and his brothers, Martin and Nils, have been fishing on the northern coast for the past 20 years and are among the best known vessel owners in the district.

The Dominion fishery commission which sat here on Monday and Tuesday in the city council chamber is naturally the subject of much comment along the waterfront. It is the general opinion that the tone of the commission was very indulgent and the fishermen seem satisfied that the commission is doing its utmost to get to the bottom of various snags in the fishing game and to give everyone concerned a square deal. During a discussion aboard the flagship of the fleet it was the general consensus of opinion that the issue of one license per individual, at a reasonable sum, covering the fishing rights of the holder all over Canada, which would give the owner the right to fish in any waters and for any class of fish would be a good thing. Such a license to be issued to Canadian citizens only. Further that no more than one such license should be issued to any one corporation or individual. It was thought that in this way every Canadian citizen would be placed on an equal basis and that such measures would tend to prevent monopoly in the industry.
