EDITORIAL

BOOSTS VANCOUVER.

A. E. Warren, general manager of the Canadian National Railways, was here a few days ago and while here refused to say anything encouraging as to business prospects of this port. In private conversation with some local people he is reported to have spoken disparagingly of the port and the north country.

Mr. Warren then proceeded to Vancouver and, as reported in an interview in the Province, told the people he saw no reason why they should not become the clearing port of all the grain of Alberta. He is spending a week in Vancouver where his business lies. He is apparently not interested in Prince Rupert or the north.

Perhaps Mr. Warren does not read the signs of the time. This is the day of the north and the Canadian National must rise to the occasion and do its part, if not under the management of Mr. Warren, then under some other management.

The following is from Mr. Warren's interview:

With adequate facilities for handling the grain and tonnage for transporting it to the world's markets, Mr. A. E. Warren, general manager of the Canadian National Railways, sees no reason why this city should not become the natural clearing port for all the grain of Alberta.

The general manager arrived on Saturday and will spend the week here getting in touch with local conditions as they affect the C. N. R. On Wednesday he will meet the harbor board, and throughout the week will consult with department heads of the railway who are stationed here.

Mr. Warren would make no predictions about the grain movement through Vancouver other than to say that with tonnage to be had he could see no reason why it should not greatly increase and become a permanent factor in the activities of the day.

"As far as the Canadian National is concerned," he said, "we welcome it, and the more the merrier."

The appropriation budget for the C. N. R. has been forwarded to the executive and the Vancouver items should be announced within a few days. Just how far they would affect the British Columbia division Mr. Warren was not prepared to state, but the fact that he will spend the entire week here is significant.

Mr. Warren is further reported to have said:

It was reported at the Canadian National Railways office this morning that there are between 1350 and 1450 cars of grain now en route to Vancouver. These have been shipped from as far east as the Alberta-Saskatchewan boundary line. West of Edmonton there are 914 cars of grain en route to the city. They are being brought here as fast as accommodation is secured for the grain at the government elevator. If accommodation offered the railway company claims that it could deliver one hundred cars per day.

GOOD ROADS CONFERENCE.

VICTORIA, Jan. 19.—The date for the Good Roads conference has been fixed to take place from June 13 to 17 at Victoria.

Granby Mining Company Plans Building of New Storage Dam To Increase the Anyox Power

FRED STORK IS ELECTED BY 55 MAJORITY

Recount Gives Liberal Candidate
Seventeen More Votes Than
First Tally.

The election which concluded before Judge Young in the County Court yesterday resulted in Fred Stork being declared elected by a clear majority of 55. Most of these votes were the result of the throwing out of the ballots at Telegraph Creek where Colonel P. had a majority of 16. The ballots had been sent forward before nomination day, that being the only way in which the returning officer could get them into the district on time. The ballots were sent in blank and the names of the candidates were telegraphed to the returning officer and typed in by him, but the designation of each was wrong. Stork was described as a merchant instead of hardwareman and Col. Peck as broker instead of gentleman with the list of military decorations.

Prince Rupert gave Stork an advantage of 6, Houston 3, Telkwa 2. At Houston three votes were taken after the polls closed and these were placed in a separate envelope and counted, but the judge threw them out. They were all Peck votes. Individual votes at various places mostly rejected ballots which were allowed by the judge put Stork forward fifteen more, making a total of 55 at the close of the count in place of the 38 lead with which the count was started. Fred Stork was therefore formally declared elected.

UNEMPLOYED IN CITY OF DUBLIN

DUBLIN, Jan. 19.—The new provisional government of Ireland already has a difficult problem with which to deal. Unemployment in that country is rife and the authorities must find temporary work.

Yesterday a group of unemployed occupied the hall and rotunda of Dublin Hospital and refused to leave until the city provided other accommodation.

MILITARY IS NOW LEAVING

Process of Evacuation of Ireland
Well Under Way—All Will Be
Gone Saturday.

DUBLIN, Jan. 19.—In the process of the evacuation of the British military forces from Ireland, three battalions will leave Northwall tonight for England. Of 1500 police auxiliaries, 800 have already left and the others will depart tonight. The final contingent is expected to leave on Saturday.

OPPOSITION FORMED FOR LEGISLATURE IN INDIA, MEMBERS JOIN

LONDON, Jan. 19.—The formation of a democratic party to conduct an opposition in the Indian legislature has reached a definite stage according to a Reuter's Delhi, India, correspondent. Fifty members out of a total of 140 have joined the party, the chief aim of which is to secure a status of self-governing Dominion for India.

BUSY CHRISTMAS FOR LIQUOR DISPENSARIES

Many Doctors Lost Licenses as
Result of Prohibition Law.

TORONTO, Jan. 19.—A noteworthy feature of the total liquor orders of the Ontario Government dispensaries last month was that they numbered 26,542 for the five days before Christmas and only 9925 for the five days following Christmas.

Doctors' prescriptions covered by far the greater proportion of the totals. There were 335 suspensions of doctors, but 25 of the suspensions were revoked.

IRISH GOVERNMENT FLOATS FIRST LOAN

Bank of Ireland Grants Credit
of Million Pounds Sterling.

DUBLIN, Jan. 19.—The Bank of Ireland has granted a credit of one million pounds sterling for the assistance of the Irish provisional government.

SKATING RECORD FOR THIS COUNTRY

Won at St. John by Charles Jew-
traw of New York.

ST. JOHN, N.B., Jan. 19.—The Canadian skating record was broken when Charles Jewtraw of New York won the Canadian championship for 220 yards in 19 1/2 seconds.

SAN FRANCISCO IS HAVING VERY COLD WEATHER JUST NOW

Sawdust Put on Decks of Ferry
Boats to Prevent Passen-
gers Slipping.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 19.—Ice formed today on the decks of ferry boats in San Francisco Bay and sawdust had to be sprinkled on them. This is the first time in years that this has had to be done according to the crews of the boats.

Copper Output.

Mr. Munro, speaking of general conditions, said that business was quiet and there was no particular optimism as far as copper was concerned. The industry is still running along steadily at Anyox where 930 men are employed and the output remains the same as before, namely 2,500,000 lbs. monthly. The price of copper is now 13 3/4¢ and when it reaches 14¢ there will be a general increase of wages averaging 60¢ a day according to the agreement which is now in effect at Anyox and which expires on April 1. Whether or not copper will reach 14¢ before that agreement expires Mr. Munro declined to venture an opinion.

Questioned as to a report which recently appeared in the southern press saying that the Granby Company was to build a smelter at Stewart, Mr. Munro said there was absolutely nothing to it. He denied the report and said that the company had no such intention. The Granby Company, however, would probably smelt quite a little Stewart ore this season.

Christmas at Denver.

Mr. Munro was accompanied north by Mrs. Munro and their two daughters who accompanied him East. He visited among other places Denver, Nevada and San Francisco, having spent Christmas at the home of Mrs. Munro's people in Denver. They were gone about six weeks. Mr. Munro stated that it was his intention to remain in Anyox several weeks this trip and he would possibly be out about the middle of February.

POPE BENEDICT IS ILL WITH BRONCHITIS

ROME, Jan. 19.—Pope Benedict is seriously ill with bronchitis. His Holiness is over 70 years of age and is not generally in robust health.

No Opposition Dr. King or James Murdock: Election For Return of Premier

CRANBROOK, Jan. 19.—R. E. Beattie, member of Parliament-elect for East Kootenay, has tendered his resignation to the Liberal executive and it has been accepted. The Liberals will soon hold a nominating convention, when the nomination will be offered to Hon. Dr. King, minister of public works in the Oliver cabinet, who is slated for the portfolio of public works at Ottawa. It is understood at a recent meeting of the Conservative executive that it was decided not to oppose Dr. King in the event of his nomination in the constituency.

BIG HAUL OF LIQUOR MADE

In New York as Result of Police
to Enforce Liquor Prosecu-
tions.

NEW YORK, Jan. 19.—Confiscated property representing a good sized fortune in value resulted from the police efforts to enforce prosecutions in New York from April 4, 1921, to the end of the year. Deputy Police Commissioner Teach reported today that in that period 162 arrests of law violators and 98 confiscations of liquor had been made. The latter included 596 bottles, 4497 barrels, 2161 cases, 910 jugs, 1114 cans and 815 other containers of various kinds and capacities.

GAUTHIER DEAD.

OTTAWA, Jan. 19.—Archbishop Gauthier of the Roman Catholic Metropolitan Province of Ottawa is dead, aged 78.

POINCARÉ ANNOUNCES HIS POLICY

Insist on Respect for Treaties of
Peace and no Debate on
Them.

PARIS, Jan. 19.—France's new ministry made its bow to the country with the reassembling of Parliament today. Respect for treaties that fixed the peace terms and insistence that the conditions of the Cannes protocol be accepted or rejected by delegates prior to any discussion so that none of the stipulations of the treaties can be debated, are two important declarations of the new premier.

BOWSER READY RESIGN LEADER

If Chosen Premier Will Not Com-
bine Position with Another
Portfolio.

VICTORIA, Jan. 19.—Gus Lyons, was elected president of the Victoria Conservative Association here last night.

In addressing the gathering, W. J. Bowser, leader of the party told the gathering that if the Conservative party assumed power after the next election and he was called upon to form a ministry, he would not combine the premiership with any other portfolio.

Mr. Bowser further said that if the Conservative convention decided against his continuing as leader he was willing to resign.

FEARS LOWER FRUIT DUTIES

President of Fruit Growers Con-
vention Says Change Means
Disaster.

VICTORIA, Jan. 19.—Delivering an address here at the opening today of the 32nd annual convention of the B. C. Fruit-growers, C. E. Barnes, president, said one of the most important questions to arise was the probability of early legislation on revising the customs tariff. "Whatever individual views may be held on the general principle of protection, we cannot escape from the fact that any legislation in the direction of lower duties is full of possibilities of inconceivable disaster to the fruit industry."

At the close of the discussion the association passed a resolution demanding the retention of the present protective tariff on fruit importations in order to prevent dumping.

ENGAGEMENT OF DUKE OF YORK TO BE MADE KNOWN AT WEDDING

TORONTO, Jan. 19.—A Mail and Empire despatch from London says that at the wedding of Princess Mary and Viscount Lascelles on February 28 the announcement will be made of the Duke of York's engagement to Lady Mary Ashley, daughter of Lord Shaftesbury. Lady Mary is 20 years of age and is a great favorite of Queen Mary's.

Confirmation of Stork Election.

The confirmation of the election of Fred Stork as the result of a recount by Judge Young proved satisfactory to most of the people of Prince Rupert. Even those who supported Colonel Peck at the recent election are generally agreed that after the way in which the Dominion elections have gone it is better that there should be a straight liberal representing us at Ottawa. The Colonel made a good fight and lost. Mr. Stork is now our accredited representative and will go to Ottawa with the people of the city unitedly behind him in his endeavor to make this a great port. The Board of Trade has already shown that politics are now a thing of the past, and it would be a wise thing for all of us to do the same.

Some day there will be another election contest and then we shall judge Mr. Stork on his merits and record. In the meantime if we unite to give him wholehearted support we shall be forwarding the interests of the district.

Small Places Have Libraries.

Many comparatively small communities have public libraries, but Prince Rupert remains without one. A report just received from the town of Duncan, not half the size of this place, tells of the annual meeting of the Cowichan Library Association held there. It goes on to say that during the year 200 volumes were added to the library, which now numbers 1700 volumes. Books were added by the holding of a "book tea" and books were purchased from the Times Book Club, from a private library and some direct from the publishers. The books are all catalogued and there is a card system to keep track of the distribution. This being a voluntary organization, fees are charged, and it was shown that during the year 97 had paid the full fee and 17 had paid for half the term. The circulation is on the increase, and while fiction predominated very largely in the borrowings there was a good percentage of other books taken out. The total cost of conducting this library was not large, but even there the people are not satisfied and they want to improve the library and put in a trained librarian to have charge. The scope of the institution is to be extended by making an endeavor to unite with adjoining municipalities for library purposes.

Practically all small American towns have public libraries, but Prince Rupert has the unique distinction of being the largest city without a library in Western Canada and probably in western North America.

New Dominion Has Its Troubles.

Scarcely is the ink dry with which the treaty with Ireland was signed when the new Dominion has to get down from the patriotic struggle to the commonplace work of dealing with the unemployed situation. It is in the capital of that country that the first demonstration took place. Doubtless Arthur Griffith, the provisional president, will be able to deal with this and other problems, and in doing so he will get the sympathy and aid of the rest of the Empire. Ireland is one of the members of the group of free states of the British Empire, and as such we can sympathize with her political and industrial problems.

Anyox Progress Vital to North.

It is only when any large camp or industry closes that we in Prince Rupert realize what it means to have it working. While we always feel that we do not get our share of business from Anyox, owing to circumstances over which we have no control, yet if the Granby mine and smelter were closed we should feel it very acutely. The spending of well over a quarter of a million dollars on a dam at the smelter town, much of it on wages, will employ a great many men and will tend to make the north busy. There will be shipment of materials north and men from Anyox will be bound to come here a good deal. Everything which makes for the prosperity of the north makes for the improvement of business in Prince Rupert.

Ten Years Ago in Prince Rupert

January 19, 1912.

B. Brynildsen, the pioneer merchant of Bella Coola, is visiting the city to see if closer trade relations may not be established between this port and the fertile valley to the south.

There was a fire this morning at Foley, Welch & Stewart's wharf warehouse caused by the upsetting of an oil stove. The fire department turned out with dispatch and soon put the blaze out. There was a good deal of excitement.

DIGBY ISLAND HAS GOOD REVENUE FROM WIRELESS BUSINESS

The statement of revenue from Dominion government radiotelegraph service in Canada for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1921, shows that the revenue from Digby Island wireless station is the fourth largest in the entire list of Dominion government stations.

The figures of some of the leading stations are as follows: Harrington Passage (near Halifax) \$13,328.12; Point Grey 11,100.43; Alert Bay 9,230.72; Digby Island 8,665.88; Triangle Island 7,887.62; Gonzales Hill 6,306.92; Estevan Point 3,850.66; Magdalen Islands 2,953.35; Dead Tree Point 2,324.78.

The large proportionate revenue of the stations at Alert Bay and Triangle Island, the latter of which has now been replaced by Bull Harbor, is accounted for by the large number of messages from ships and big centres which pass through them as outposts of communication. Messages from ships at sea and Swanson Bay go through Triangle (now Bull Harbor) and Ocean Falls business passes through Alert Bay.

SWANSON BAY SHIPPING PULP

The shingle, lumber and pulp mill of the Whalen Pulp and Paper Co. at Swanson Bay is again running full blast and two shifts are working daily. The plant is said to be turning out a better grade of pulp than ever. F. C. Bennett is manager in charge of operations and J. Hennessey is the mill superintendent. Last week the Princess Eola called at Swanson Bay and took out 600 tons of pulp which will be transferred to a Canadian Robert Dollar boat at Vancouver and taken to New York via the Panama Canal.

FIRST STAGE DRIVER.

SEATTLE, Jan. 19.—Ezekiel McCausland, Pioneer Indian fighter and driver of the first stage between Olympia and Portland is dead here aged 86 years.

OCEAN FALLS MANAGER GETS A PROMOTION

Goes to Vancouver as Manager for Coast Succeeding Martin.

L. S. Burden, until recently resident manager of the Pacific Mills at Ocean Falls has been promoted to the office of manager for the coast at Vancouver, in succession to A. R. Martin who goes to San Francisco to a more important post on the board of directors. Mr. Burden returned to Ocean Falls from Vancouver on the Prince Rupert on Tuesday and in about a fortnight's time will be moving to Vancouver with his family to take up his new duties. Mr. Mulkey, who has been accountant at Ocean Falls, will succeed Mr. Burden as resident manager.

Mr. Burden has been at Ocean Falls for six years ever since the plant was first started and his departure will be generally regretted. Mr. Martin was formerly at Ocean Falls as well and was resident manager before Mr. Burden.

TELLS ABOUT STEWART MINES

George A. Fraser, Druggist, Gave Interview in Victoria Recently.

That the district around Stewart, B. C., will develop into the richest mining section on the continent eventually was the opinion expressed by Mr. G. A. Fraser at his home, 1045 Fort Street, when interviewed by The Colonist at Victoria. Mr. Fraser has recently returned from Stewart, where he has spent two years, and says that Victoria looks good after his sojourn in the north.

Referring to the mining outlook at Stewart, Mr. Fraser said that great developments are expected in the district during this year. Last summer there were large numbers of eastern engineers there looking into the prospects for the various companies which have claims and properties in the district.

The biggest undertaking is the famous Premier mine, which, besides a tremendous quantity of gold, has shipped over one billion ounces of silver during the year. This mine promises, Mr. Fraser thinks, to become the richest mine in the country, some of the ore taken out of it being almost pure metal. At present there are about four hundred men working on this property.

Big Tramway Built.

The aerial tramway of the Premier mine has been completed and will shortly be in operation, Mr. Fraser says. This tramway is eleven and one-half miles long and contained forty-six miles of cable on which there are 125 buckets with a capacity of seven cubic feet each, and the travelling speed is six miles an hour.

There are some other very rich copper properties in the Stewart district, Mr. Fraser says, and when copper goes up another two cents these properties will boom. The B. C. Verde property on the Portland Canal is one of them, and the William George property on the Bear Creek is another. The latter is an exceptionally promising property and its output will be large.

Price of Silver.

Speaking of the price of metals mined in the district Mr. Fraser said that silver is now at sixty-five cents an ounce and that it will go up to seventy cents before very long. Copper is at present around fourteen and a half cents, and another cent or two will put a bright complexion on the mining industry in the district around Stewart.

It is expected that the Granby Consolidated Company will erect a smelter at Stewart before very long, Mr. Fraser says, and when this is undertaken that town will leave its present size far behind and become one of the best mining camps in the whole of the American continent.

Silverado Developments.

Developments are progressing on the Silverado property on the Lower Bear River, where a tramway is in course of construction and will soon be completed. At present there are

HALIBUT CATCHES CONTINUE LIGHT

Expected Run of Herring Will
Soon Be on—Has Started
off Alaska.

Halibut arrivals continue to be light and it is likely that the month of January will show a small total of fish landed at this port. This, of course, is the quiet time of the year for the fishing business. Yesterday the Confidence arrived with 1000 pounds of halibut, which was shipped to Seattle. The Albafross is in today with 42,000 pounds.

It is expected that the herring fishing will commence in a short time but so far no Canadian boats have arrived with catches although some have been out prospecting. There has been a little landed at Alaskan ports and a small quantity of it has reached here.

PEERAGE LIST IN BRITAIN IS GROWING

Present Government Has Broken
All Records in Giving Aristocratic Titles.

LONDON, Jan. 19.—All records in creating peerages have been broken by the present government according to the new issue of Dehrett's standard work concerning the British aristocracy. In the six years now expiring 94 peers, 235 baronets and 2016 knights have been created.

PROVINCIAL COURT OF REVISION TODAY

Hearings in Prince Rupert Today
—Tomorrow Session to Be
Held in Stewart.

The Court of Revision on land assessment by the provincial government for Skeena district is proceeding today in the provincial assessor's office before John Dybbahu, judge of the court. Tonight the court will go to Stewart where a session is to be held tomorrow.

THREE DIVORCES FOR ONE PERSON IN SOVIET RUSSIA

RIGA, Latvia, Jan. 18.—Three divorces to any one person are considered the limit in Soviet Russia, according to Parley Christensen, of Chicago, candidate for president of the United States on the Farmer-Labor party ticket in 1920, who recently spent a month in Moscow. Mr. Christensen visited several Bolshevik courts.

"It is fairly easy to get a divorce in Soviet Russia," according to Mr. Christensen when in Riga, "but I understand the limit is three for each person. If a man or woman has appeared in the divorce courts more than three times, he or she has a very difficult time."

"I visited one divorce hearing. It was extremely simple. The pair was separated in half an hour. On arrival in the court room, the man and woman were separately questioned by the judge. He then got them together and tried to persuade them that their quarrel could be patched up and they might live together. They couldn't see it that way, so the judge took them into another room to sign papers dissolving their marriage."

Mr. Christensen also visited a number of "People's courts," corresponding to police courts in America, where persons are tried for minor offenses. Most of the judges, he said, were dressed in rough clothes, including brown flannel shirts.

"In general," said Mr. Christensen, "I was amazed at the fairness of these courts."
