THOUSAND KILLED IN SATURDAY'S DISASTER

ITALIAN AND FRENCH GOVERNMENTS TAKE ACTIVE MEASURES AGAINST TURKS

Appalling Earthquake and Tidal Wave in Chili Leaves Death and Terrible Wreckage in Its Wake

SANTIAGO, Nov. 13.—The death list in an earthquake and tidal wave disaster which closely followed upon one another on Saturday in Chili will reach one thousand, it is now expected. Thousands were injured and thousands more are homeless and starving. Naval vessels have been pressed into relief service. Conditions are appalling and villages have been razed to the ground.

The effect of the tidal wave which followed the earthquake was felt along 1,200 miles of seacoast and was echoed in Honolulu where tidal conditions are phenomenal. In Chili the seabed itself was apparently disrupted and undermined. Vast quantities of water were sucked through the bottom causing unnatural recession of the waters. Then came a great tidal wave which swept up the water. The wave receded four times, flinging small vessels up high and dry, splintering wharves and buildings and destroying entire villages along the waterfront.

Relief forces to aid the thousands of homeless as a result of the disaster were mobilized today.

The properly lost will likely go into the millions on account of the several towns that were almost entirely wiped out.

RESOLUTION ON ORIENTALS

Debate on Question Will be Continued Today—Amendment May be Introduced

VICTORIA, Nov. 13.—The government members will not accept the amendment of the leader of the opposition to the anti-Oriental resolution moved by Hon. William Sloan but they may move an amendment themselves embodying some of Mr. Bowser's suggestions.

The chief object of the resolution is to keep the menace before the public and carry on a campaign of education which will eventually bring the East to see the danger.

Hon. A. M. Manson, attorney general, will speak on the resolution today.

ARE OPPOSING DOLE SYSTEM

Mayor Rochester and Executive of U. B. C. M. Met Government on Saturday

VICTORIA, Nov. 13.—Mayor Rochester of Prince Rupert, who met the government on Saturday with the executive of the Union of B. C. Municipalities, spoke against the dole system for the relief of unemployment. He also advocated a uniform system of accounting for the municipalities. Hon. A. M. Manson, attorney general, said the government would give any assistance possible to the scheme.

BOLSHEVIKI SEIZED ITALAN AND FRENCH STEAMERS AT BATUM

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 13.—The Russian bolsheviks at Batum have seized the Italian steamer Lloyd Triestino and the French steamer Piragies.

ALLAN IS ACQUITTED

MONTREAL, Nov. 13.—Sir Montagu Allan, president of the defunct Merchants' Bank, who was charged in the Court of Special Sessions with negligently signing a false statement in the return of the bank's condition to the treasury department October 1921, was this morning pronounced not guilty by Chief Justice DeCarie.

LIQUOR IN POSSESSION

Charge Against Nick Gurvich Being Heard in Police Court Today

The charge against Nick Gurvich of having unsealed liquor in his possession is being proceeded with in the police court today before Magistrate McClymont. Evidence was taken from crown and defence witnesses and adjournment was made so that the contents of a bottle in question may be examined by H. T. Cross, analyst.

According to evidence submitted by constables, a large quantity of Scotch whiskey, some beer and a bottle partly filled with rum was found in Gurvich's quarters at 622 Fraser Street on October 26. Through his counsel, L. W. Patmore, the accused produced papers showing that he had paid the government tax on the whiskey and beer but when the bottle of rum was produced without a seal, it became more difficult.

Gurvich told the court that he had found the rum too strong and had put it in another bottle with water to dilute it. The other bottle however, bore the label of a rum bottle and T. B. Hooper for the crown had the court adjourned in order that H. T. Cross might have a chance to analyze the spirit contents of the rum. The case will most likely be proceeded with this afternoon.

Beer Question May be Before Legislature This Week; What Will Happen Seems Uncertain

VICTORIA, Nov. 13.—The beer question may be before the legislature this week. Hon. A. M. Manson, attorney general, will move amendments of an unimportant nature to make the administration easier.

It is understood the government may consent to a private member bringing in a bill in regard to the selling of beer in order to test the feeling of the House.

A morning paper suggests that the Conservatives will oppose anything, so no one knows what will happen. In any case, the question is sure to be debated. Capt. Ian MacKenzie will likely father the beer amendment.

The bringing down of the budget is set for Wednesday.

ROCHESTER HAS NOT MADE UP HIS MIND

VICTORIA, Nov. 13.—Mayor H. B. Rochester, mayor of Prince Rupert, when questioned as to the possibility of his again being a candidate for the chief magistracy in his home town, said that he might run again but he was still undecided.

BUSINESS OF LIBERAL ADVANCEMENT CLUB AT LAST WEEK'S MEETING

Membership Committee Appointed—Ladies to be Invited—Slogan is Adopted

The Liberal Advancement Club, at its meeting last week, appointed a committee to interest prospective members, both men and women. In view of the ladies now having the franchise, it was considered that they should also take an active part and it was decided to invite them to attend. At the next meeting half of the membership committee will be appointed from among the ladies.

The club also passed a resolution in favor of the government helping the interior country in the matter of roads and facilities incidental to the life of that section. This resolution will be forwarded to the members of the legislature interested and also to the secretaries of Liberal Associations in the interior.

It was unanimously agreed that the following slogan be adopted and each member is to do all he can towards its fulfillment:

"Grain elevators and coal bunkers will solve the National Railway problem."

W. F. Roberge, secretary of the club, points to the proper name of the organization as being The Liberal Advancement Club and not the Young Liberal Association.

TWO MILLS UP LINE RE-OPEN

Cutting of Lumber Commences at Hanall and Usk For Eastern Shipment

The sawmill at Hanall, owned by Olof Hansen and R. E. Allen, resumed cutting operations last Wednesday under the personal supervision of Mr. Allen. It is expected the plant will continue active all winter, the lumber going principally to Eastern Canada. Between 15,000 and 20,000 feet is being cut daily and about 30 men are employed between logging and actual cutting.

The mill at Usk, owned by the Kleanza Co., started operations about two weeks ago. Last week five carloads of lumber were loaded for Eastern shipment. Operations will continue as long as market conditions continue favorable.

Russians and Turks of Old Regime Flee While Martial Law Declared

LONDON, Nov. 13.—Italian and French generals have been authorized by their governments to declare martial law in Constantinople, but it is now feared that this action is too late to prevent disorders.

Despatches say that eight leading opponents of the Kemal regime at Angora have been hanged.

The League of Nations has begun evacuation of 10,000 Russians from Constantinople following the Angora government's intimations that Russians were not popular there.

Several hundred Turkish personages of the old regime have embarked for Alexandria, accompanied to their vessels by British troops to prevent attempts by the Kemalists to detain them. The Kemalists withdrew in order to prevent a clash with the British.

IN MEMORY OF HONORED DEAD

Prince Rupert Paid Tribute to Brave Warriors at Memorial Service

Despite the inclemency of the weather some two hundred people attended the memorial services of the soldier dead at the Westholme Theatre on Sunday afternoon. The heavy wind and rain precluded the idea of holding the services at the cemetery as originally planned and the ladies of the Adair Garsc Chapter of the I. O. O. F. E. under Mrs. Youngman took charge.

The speakers included Mrs. Youngman, Dr. Grant, William Denning, president of the G. W. V. A., Fred Stork, M.P., and Rev. G. G. Haeker of the Methodist church. Tributes of a very high nature were paid to the soldiers who had paid the supreme sacrifice overseas for the principles of truth and freedom and also to those who were fortunate enough to come back to their homes after long service.

OSCAR II. AGROUND NEAR CHRISTIANIA

LONDON, Nov. 13.—The steamer Oscar II., which sailed from New York on November 2 for Christiania and Copenhagen, is aground near the entrance of Christiania harbor. Two steamers have gone to the assistance, the 95 passengers on the ship still being aboard today.

ONE-MAN CARS IN VANCOUVER COLLIDE AND SEVERAL HURT

VANCOUVER, Nov. 13.—Motor-man Craig, Mrs. Eliza Moneriff, Miss Moneriff, W. B. McGregor, and L. Amos were seriously injured last night when two one-man street cars met in a head-on collision on Almah Road.

THOUSAND DOLLAR FINE IS IMPOSED ON MARATHON CLUB

Magistrate McClymont found the Marathon Club Ltd. guilty of selling beer this morning and imposed the minimum fine of \$1,000 on that organization. M. Gonzalez appeared for the club.

SIX MONTHS FOR JUNE ALEXANDER

Crown Counsel Informs Magistrate He Has No Power to Suspend Sentence

June Alexander was found guilty of selling liquor this morning and was sentenced to serve six months in Okalla prison by Magistrate McClymont. W. L. Patmore, appearing for the defence, gave notice of an appeal.

Magistrate McClymont at first stated that he had found the woman guilty but would suspend sentence.

"Pardon me, Your Worship, but you have no power in this case for suspension," T. B. Hooper, crown counsel, exclaimed, rising to his feet.

"I would then ask Your Worship to reconsider your decision," said Mr. Patmore.

Mr. Hooper then informed the court that he had orders from the attorney general to oppose any suspended sentences in such cases, whereupon the magistrate announced the sentence as six months.

Some question arose as to the cost of the appeal which the defence counsel announced would result. The crown said \$50 was not enough and that \$100 was being charged in Vancouver. After some discussion a wire was sent to Vancouver regarding the matter.

BIG BLAZE ON NAPLES HARBOR

Ten Million Dollars Estimated Loss—Naval Vessels are Destroyed

LONDON, Nov. 13.—A fire which started when blazing naphtha spread over the harbor caused damage estimated at \$10,000,000 in Naples at the weekend. One Italian cruiser was destroyed and two lesser naval vessels were disabled.

Times Are Dull But Business Sound.

Things are dull, writes H. F. Pullen, editor of the Daily News, who is in Victoria. That is the usual opinion expressed everywhere. It means that there is no special improvement recently and that a good many people are living, as they always are, on expectations. This is true in Vancouver and Victoria and what is true there is true throughout the province, according to report.

While it is true that Victoria and Vancouver are not so busy as they might be, yet business there is on a pretty sound basis. In Victoria, which I have seen more than Vancouver, the stores are all occupied. Some small places which had been disused for years are now made over and the people using them seem to be doing some business.

Residences all seem to be occupied here and a number of new ones are going up. There are also a few business places being erected, all of which looks well. Coming in here as an outsider, I should say that the outlook was never so healthy here as it is today. Victoria is capitalizing her climate, which is the right thing for her to capitalize. She may or may not become an industrial centre, but she certainly will prosper on account of her climate, which is what many other places, including Los Angeles, is capitalizing.

What They Think Of Prince Rupert.

The notoriety given Prince Rupert by the leader of the opposition in the legislature and by H. H. Stevens in Vancouver has given the idea everywhere that Prince Rupert is a very wicked city. She is looked on somewhat as the Sodom and Gomorrah of British Columbia, judging from the remarks heard everywhere in regard to her. It is a passing cloud that will clear away before the rays of the sun but in the meantime it might be well for the Prince Rupert Board of Trade to take some action in regard to it and get the findings of the board published abroad, especially in Vancouver and Victoria. It is not always wise to sit down under an imputation of that kind. It is probable that Prince Rupert is not any more wicked than Vancouver or any other place. Life and property are just as safe there, and there is very little crime as has been shown by the police records for several years past.

This City To Be Reckoned With.

While Prince Rupert has an unsavory reputation as the result of political activities of those opposed to the ministers from the north and those jealous of the position of the northern port, there is also a feeling, which lies deeper than the other, that there is a great future in store for Prince Rupert and that she is a power to be reckoned with in the near future. While nobody has any very definite idea of how Rupert is to prosper and what will be responsible for the progress of the future, they all are looking to see things happen in the north. This attitude is reflected in an eagerness for information. It is shown in the prominence given Prince Rupert affairs by such newspapers as the Vancouver Province. There is none of that effort to belittle the city and the north generally which formerly was felt by those visiting the south.

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MR. PATTULLO IN LEGISLATURE

Many Important Subjects Dealt With in Speech by Local Member Last Week

Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands and member for Prince Rupert, made an exhaustive but comprehensive address on provincial questions before the legislature last week. In part it follows:

One of the biggest outstanding questions is the future of the P. & G. E. Of this future a very gloomy view has been taken by many people. During the past year the government caused a report to be made by three men well known in the railroad world. The report made by Mr. Sullivan particularly is of a discouraging character and would not appear to justify the optimism of the promoters and the administration which caused the undertaking. I am offering no defence of those responsible for the beginning of the undertaking, yet I very much incline to the opinion that Mr. Sullivan did not have sufficient time to make such personal examinations as were necessary to pass finality of judgment upon so large and important issue. I incline to think that a very considerable portion of his information was of a second-hand character and not so authoritative as it should be.

While I do not propose at this juncture to define any attitude in respect of the railway I would point out that there is upon the people of this province a responsibility to the people served by the P. G. E. and to those who relied upon its completion to Prince George.

University Question

Another question of very great importance and magnitude is that of the provincial university. I think that it will be generally admitted that the establishment of a university in B.C. was premature. Our population is not sufficiently large to provide all the requisite facilities by way of buildings and upkeep and the number of faculties which once a university is started seem essential to the fulfilment of its highest purposes. There is no doubt that the public wants no further taxation and without passing finality of opinion I should say that the most careful investigation should be made to see how far the lands in Point Grey especially set aside for university purposes can be utilized to finance the undertaking.

Forest Protection

I come now to discuss the question of forest protection from the ravages of fire. The past year has brought it home to everyone in the province as they never realized before the terrible havoc that can be wrought by the devastation of forest fires.

It has probably been the worst in the history of the province yet it may well be that it will serve a useful purpose in bringing to the attention of the people of the province the importance of vigilance by the people themselves and unwavering support to the work of the department in coping with the common enemy, fire. As legislation will be introduced at this session dealing with this question I need not upon this occasion go into the detail that I otherwise would. Public opinion will, I believe, support drastic legislation. There exists in the minds of a number of people a belief that some fires have been of incendiary origin.

I am glad to say to the House that considering world conditions and general business conditions, the timber industry outlook is very hopeful. It will be recalled that one of the difficulties in this province has been the spasmodic and fitful periods of prosperity enjoyed by the timber industry. For many years past there would be a short period of fair business followed by a longer period of depression.

Organisation Necessary

When I first assumed charge of the Department of Lands under which is the Forest Branch I came to the conclusion that lack of organization in the industry and consequent lack of pushing effort was considerably responsible for the decreasing business of the industry, especially in our off-shore trade and upon several occasions, in addressing public bodies, I expressed the opinion that the industry would never be stabilized until we could be rea-

sonably sure each year of a continued and continuous business through the medium of an export trade. The opportunity came to render signal service when through governmental effort an order for some 70 million feet was obtained from Great Britain. Upon that occasion the timber men were called together and an organization was created which has done as much export business as was formerly done by the whole province and was the beginning of a general co-operation in the industry which has resulted in getting the benefit of the strength of unity and placing the industry in a position to cope with the many external problems to be met in the conduct of an off-shore trade.

Immigration

I come now to a problem upon which there has existed and still exists a very wide divergence of opinion, namely that of immigration. Less than two years ago it was difficult to talk immigration upon any basis without running counter to a well defined public opinion. Today there is still a very strong opinion against any form of immigration except that of agriculturalists.

Last year and again this year I visited Great Britain in connection with this and other matters and I may tell my friend the member for Esquimalt that the Burlington Arcade has sadly retrograded since the time when he first frequented it and is comparatively respectable.

I believe that there is in this country a well defined feeling that in any immigration policy there should be as large a proportion as possible of immigrants of Anglo-Saxon origin. I believe that there exists a general feeling that if we are to maintain in their integrity what are called British traditions it is desirable that a proportion of our population shall be of British extraction. In this expression of desire to maintain our British traditions there is contained not the slightest reflection upon any other nationality. These other nations cherish their own traditions. Doubtless they think them superior to British traditions. It is not impossible that they may be, nevertheless it is natural that we shall pressure our own institutions. I do not think it possible however to obtain in one year from Britain even under a generous policy the number of settlers which in my judgment at all events, Canada can readily absorb annually, and therefore it will be necessary for us to go to other countries.

More Aggressive Policy

The government of this province has not sought to encourage other than agricultural immigration except such as might be incidental to the encouragement of the establishment of industries but I am referring to direct effort. My personal opinion however, is that Canada should pursue a much more aggressive policy than has been for some time. I recently made the statement that I felt sure Canada could readily absorb 300,000 immigrants a year and that I believed every mentally and physically healthy immigrant of white nationality should be admitted. This statement has been interpreted by some to mean a hodge-podge of entirely unregulated immigration. There are always those who are looking for the very worst construction which they can put both upon language and action and who attribute to others a lack of common sense which as applied to themselves they would indignantly resent. The statement I made still stands in a reasonable interpretation. For instance, I would not think it well to admit three hundred thousand all of one nationality unfamiliar with our institutions.

The Minister of the Interior who is in immediate charge for the Dominion was not in Ottawa when I came through, but when discussing with him the matter in the spring he informed me that he intended to call a conference of the provinces and the Dominion in order to arrive at a line of common action. Until therefore we know just what the Dominion proposes to do, I do not think it would be well for us to close any special or general undertaking with the British authorities.

Industrial Development

During the time that I was in England I also took up a number of matters looking to industrial development in the province and at the present time there are several concerns that are looking into the possibilities of investing in enterprise here. Yet while this

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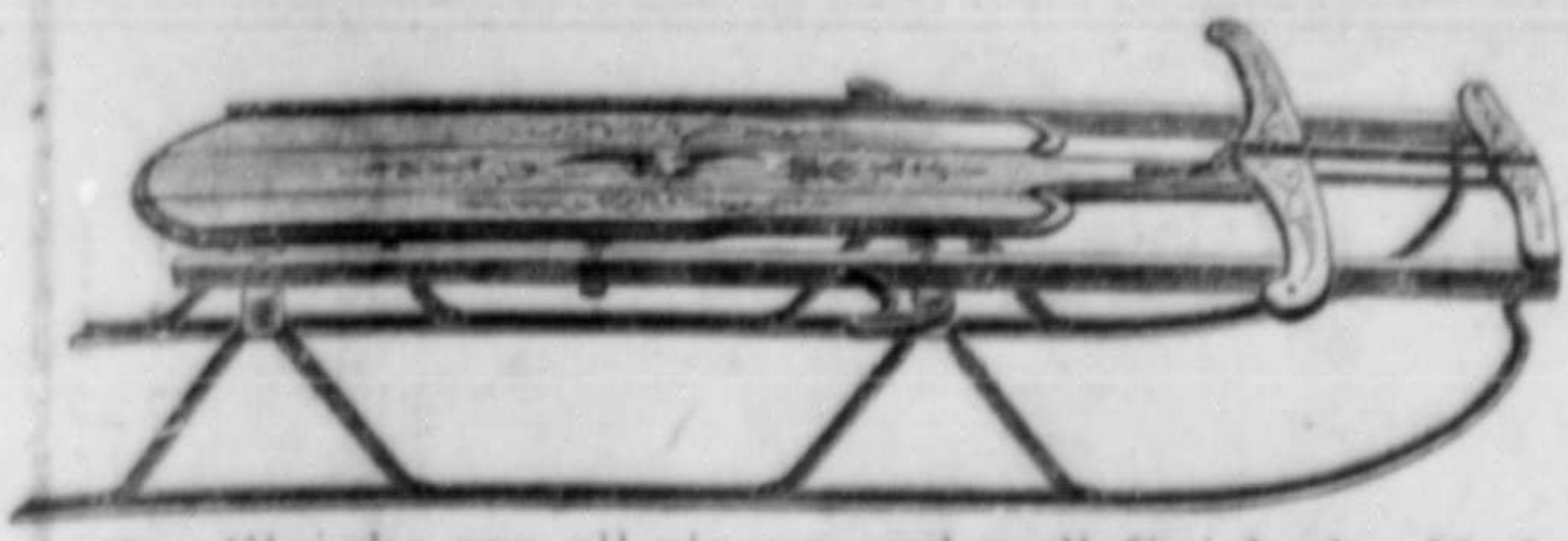

VICTORIA TAX NINE PER CENT

Other Means Than Land to be Found to Raise Money Needed in Cities.

VICTORIA, Nov. 13.—Some interesting statements were made in the Legislature by J. B. Clearihue, member for Victoria, city in a speech on the address.

Speaking of the increasing cost of city government and of education in particular, Mr. Clearihue said the Victoria tax rate was 33 mills and the city assessments were three times actual value so that based on actual land values the tax rate was about nine per cent. This was much too high and it should be distributed over other revenue sources. Today Victoria held about five and a half million dollars worth of reverted land, all of which was withheld from paying taxes and the result was that the burden fell on the rest of the land. That was why they were suggesting the taxation of rentals and an increase in the business licenses on a graduated scale. He also favored raising money for municipalities from income tax, but this he suggested should apply to all municipalities and not only to Victoria. Tax payers were too few and the basis of taxation should be changed so as not to bear too heavily on the few. Every year the number of those paying civic taxes was decreasing and the burden was becoming heavier. Everything possible should be done to encourage people to pay their taxes. The admission of the instalment system by which the payments could be spread over ten months would be a step in the right direction.

Mr. Clearihue quoted Edmonton, Calgary and other cities as places where other than land taxes were raised.

President Denning
President Denning, in an excellent speech touched upon the fact of Armistice Day being a red letter day in the life of veterans of the Great War. Many advantages had been gained by returned soldiers through the work of the Great War Veterans' Association. The Association, he said, stood fundamentally and always for the betterment of the returned man. The lapse of a few years brought forgetfulness and to enable them to stick together to fight for their rights, as they had fought in Flanders, as a common unit that the G.W.V.A. was formed. He was not an advocate of any political clique or creed but it was up to the returned men themselves to hold and fight together and thus make sure that whatever party was in office gave the returned man that which was his just due. As an association they would not maintain their influence unless they were backed up and got the entire support and sympathy of every returned man in the district. This applied to all districts throughout Canada. If it had not been for the untiring efforts of a few members of the G.W.V.A. in the city many returned men would have had a hard row to hoe.

President Denning also touched upon the duty the Association had to perform to the comrades who were taken by death and said that if they had done nothing else but prevent the departed
