# Three Year Bonds Are Sold Out Today Soon After Being Offered

In Addition Dominion is Floating \$55,000,000 of Twenty-Year Securities at 93.46, Yielding Four and a Half Percent to Investors

MONTREAL, Oct. 31:—The Dominion of Canada short term loan of \$25,000,000 was snapped up today in little more than an hour after the books opened. The bonds are for three years and are priced at 99.20, yielding 4.28%. In addition Canada put on sale today \$55,000,000 of twentyyear bonds at 93.46 returning 4½%.


