Strike Seems Likely on the Railways

PLENTY OF ACTIVITY IN IRELAND IN STRIFE BETWEEN PARTIES

Negotiations with Railway Employees Broken off: Men Ask for Conciliation Board

MONTREAL, July 15.—The Railway Association representing the companies of Canada has broken off negotiations which have been in progress for some time with Union officials regarding a decrease in wages of the maintenance of way men.

OTTAWA, July 15.—Shop mechanics and maintenance of way employees of all the chief railways of the Dominion are involved in the application for boards of reconciliation which have been made to the minister of labor by the unions of the employees concerned.

RAILWAYS WILL USE NON-UNION LABOR IN SHOPS

Efforts to Settle Strike Have Failed so This Course May Be Taken.

CHICAGO, July 15.—Virtually abandoning hope of an early settlement of the strike following the failure of last night's conference, railroad executives today are prepared to make a determined effort to re-open the shops with non-union employees, according to an official of the United States Railway Labor Board.

GEORGE SCOTT IS APPOINTED FOREMAN

School Board in Special Session Today on Booth School Repairs.

At a special meeting of the school board this morning, George Scott, was appointed working foreman on the Booth Memorial school repairs and was given instructions to commence the erection of the necessary scaffolding at once. This appointment is subject to the approval of Architect Jeffers when he arrives. Mr. Jeffers is expected to return to the city on July 23.

CROPS GENERALLY GOOD THIS YEAR

Bank of Montreal Summary Is Very Optimistic.

The bank of Montreal summary of the crop conditions throughout the Dominion is optimistic except for British Columbia. It says: "Rains have been of material benefit in the Prairie Provinces and on the whole the crops are in a favorable condition. All the crops in Ontario are unusually promising. Hay is all cut and is practically assured in Quebec and Maritime Provinces. Cereals and fruit in good condition. In British Columbia most crops are suffering from drought."

GERMANY PAYS REPARATIONS

Depositing 32,000,000 Gold Marks in Belgian and British Banks

PARIS, July 15.—Germany's July payment of reparations amounting to thirty-two million gold marks was to be deposited today in British and Belgian banks. Germany has asked for time but the Allies stood by their demand for immediate payment so the money is being put up.

GRANBY HAS SOLD SHARES TO COVER NEW EXPENDITURES

VANCOUVER, July 15.—A report from Boston states that the Granby Consolidated Mining, Smelting and Power Company has completed its immediate financing program through the sale of two blocks of treasury stock, which has increased the amount outstanding to approximately 190,000 shares. The company recently offered for subscription to stockholders at \$25 a share a block of 30,000 shares. About 70 per cent was subscribed. Funds required to liquidate the British Columbia retroactive taxes for 1917 and 1918 were obtained through the sale of some 9000 additional shares of treasury stock, netting the company \$30 a share. The property has got its production back to normal capacity, with the output from its four-furnace smelter running at the rate of 30,000,000 pounds of copper per annum. Cost of production continues to show a steady reduction.

MAKING RACE FOR VALUABLE FURS IN INTERIOR OF B.C.

PRINCE GEORGE, July 15.—The Larsen monoplane will fly into the Hazelton country with the idea of making her first expedition into a remote section of the Omineca country to buy a collection of fur valued at about \$25,000. This fur is held by a trapping and trading party that has been expecting the monoplane to come in and buy the catch. The transportation of the fur to "the outside" was a problem that the trappers would rather dispense with if they could "sell it by air." The delay has given other traders a chance, however, and a race is now on to get to the fur catch before the machine.

George J. Young, editor of the Pacific Mining News of San Francisco and Western editor of the Engineering and Mining Journal-Press of New York is here today on his way to Stewart and Anyox. He proposes to go as far as Juneau and then return to Vancouver and Victoria and later to visit Trail. He is getting information for his journals at first hand.

SHOT DURING AFFRAY STRIKERS AND GUARDS

MUSKOGEE, July 15.—A man was shot and dangerously wounded in an affray between railroad strikers and guards near Tulsa yesterday.

APPEALING FOR LIVING WAGES

President Mosher of Railway Brotherhood Urges Economy Without Wage Reduction.

OTTAWA, July 15.—A. R. Mosher, president of the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees, has issued a manifesto to the public asking consideration of the men's position in view of the proposed wage cut which he said cannot possibly improve business conditions and must militate against public prosperity.

Mr. Mosher says that a committee of the brotherhood is mapping out plans to prevent an "attempt to make sweatshops of the railways and place the workers on starvation wages."

The president insists that economies can be effected which will place the railways on a self paying basis without placing the hardships on the low paid railway workers. He suggests that injury to the railwaymen will be injury to the public.

SIX CANDIDATES FOR FAIR CONTEST

Col. Piggott, of Pay Department, Was Walking Along Street in Uniform.

CAIRO, July 15.—Col. Piggott, of the pay department of the British army, was shot, it is believed, fatally while walking along the street in uniform. The assassin escaped.

MARRIAGES ANNULLED RELIGIOUS GROUNDS BY QUEBEC JUSTICE

MONTREAL, July 15.—The question of the validity of the marriage of a Catholic performed by a Protestant minister was revived yesterday when Mr. Justice Coderre annulled two marriages because the officiating clergyman was a Protestant.

MUST PAY UP POKER DEBTS

So Says Judge Ruggles in Ocean Falls Case Tried at Vancouver

VANCOUVER, July 15.—Judge Ruggles decided, according to a judgment given yesterday, that poker is a game of skill and ordered C. S. Morris to pay a promissory note for \$260 given to Jack Mayville after a poker game at Ocean Falls a year ago.

Morris had refused to pay the note, claiming that poker is a game of chance and the debt was not legal.

Judge Cayle recently gave a similar ruling on a case arising out of the same poker game when Morris sued another player for \$100 lost to him. Morris got his \$100.

BOYS ELECTROCUTED WHILE SWIMMING; FARMER ARRESTED

SIMCOE, Ont., July 15.—Two small boys were electrocuted by a live wire in a pond while swimming yesterday. The wire was used for electric lighting last winter when the pond was used for a rink. The farmer owning the pond has been arrested for criminal negligence.

DISCUSS UNEMPLOYMENT OTTAWA IN SEPTEMBER

VICTORIA, July 15.—Premier Oliver has been notified that arrangements have been made for the conference between the province and federal government on unemployment to open on September 5 in Ottawa.

Irish Civil War Shows Little Abatement: at Cork Banks are Seized

DUBLIN, July 15.—Gun fire lasting 90 minutes at Mount Joy is reported to have come from inside the prison. It is rumored that the irregulars at Cork have seized the banks and all the money amounting to millions of dollars.

Five irregulars were killed and Colonel Mulvey, brother of the minister of defense, was wounded in a fight which lasted for an hour for the possession of the mansion called Clappard House, used as headquarters of the irregulars and which fell into the hands of the Nationalists forces.

Sean McEnroe, Republican member of the Dail, has been made prisoner.

Capt. T. Duane of Hwinesford County council was shot dead in Killmagh and his brother, an officer in the free state army, was wounded. De Valera is said to be taking command of the irregular troops in the southern area where Collins is now commander in chief of the Free State forces.

The irregulars at Cork seized the collector of customs and forced him to sign a check for \$50,000. Sharp fighting is going on in Sligo, which was captured by irregulars Thursday and recaptured by Free Staters Friday. The irregulars are said to have driven the Free Staters out of Ballyshannon.

SHOT AT CHIEF POLICE PARIS

Anarchist Thought He Was Firing at French President—Was Mobbed.

PARIS, July 15.—Three shots were fired at Prefect of Police Naudin yesterday by Gustave Bouvet, an anarchist, in the belief that it was President Millerand at whom he was firing. None of the shots took effect. Bouvet was arrested after being badly beaten by the crowds.

TOWN CAPTURED BY NATIONALISTS

Four Hours of Fighting Preceded Taking of Callooney—70 Prisoners.

DUBLIN, July 15.—After four hours of fighting the national army troops today captured the town of Callooney, six miles south of Sligo, taking 70 prisoners and a large quantity of arms and ammunition and bombs.

MAJOR BLAKE GETS AS FAR AS BAGDAD

Famous Aviator Is Now on an Aviation Trip Round the World.

BAGDAD, July 15.—Major Blake, the famous British aviator, arrived here from Hiba in Palestine yesterday, completing one more section of his long flight around the world.

FALLS TO DEATH OUT OF WINDOW

Tragic Death of Lady Clerk in Auditor General's Department at Ottawa.

OTTAWA, July 15.—Seized with a fainting spell, Miss Marion Fraser, aged 45, a clerk in the auditor general's department, fell to her death through an open seventh-floor window.

MINER WAS KILLED

WHITTSVILLE, Va., July 15.—A miner was killed and ten were injured when the mine train was wrecked here.

Fred Penn, manager of the Belmont-Surf Inlet mines, Mrs. Penn and family were passengers coming north on the Prince Rupert to Swanson Bay this trip. They are returning to Surf Inlet from a holiday trip in the south.

Conference On
Tariff Measure.

The United States new tariff bill will be among the measures to be discussed at the joint sessions of the Senate and House of Representatives. At that time the halibut duty will be considered as well as the attempt to compel the marketing of American fish at American ports.

There is strong opposition to the measure on the part of the fishermen, and the Seattle boat owners are also very much opposed to it. The outcome of the conference will be watched with great interest.

Management Changes
On The Railway.

It has been announced that there will be changes of management of the Canadian National Railways. The matter was mentioned in a despatch received here a few days ago and it was then said it would be discussed and finally settled in about two weeks time after the return of Premier Mackenzie King.

Naturally the personnel of the railway management means a great deal to Prince Rupert, and for that reason we shall look for the announcement with much interest. It is to be hoped that whoever is at the head of affairs, it will be someone who is in sympathy with the aims and aspirations of the port of Prince Rupert, and with the carrying out of the original Laurier policy with a view to making the railroad pay.

Senate Opposed To
Routing Through States.

In the year 1921 no less than 99,000,000 bushels of wheat was routed from Fort William to Buffalo through United States territory. This is detrimental to Canadian interests and the Canadian Senate Committee appointed to inquire into it has recommended to the Government that efforts be made to have the grain routed through Canada and shipped from Canadian ports. Part of the scheme includes the erection of terminal elevators on the Pacific coast.

There are three matters to consider in connection with the shipping of grain. The first is to have suitable elevators and terminals, the second arranging for reasonable freight rates, and the third seeing that arrangements are made with marine insurance companies for suitable insurance rates commensurate with the risk.

For the port of Prince Rupert we need the elevator and the insurance adjustment. There will also be the matter of rate adjustment. Just why there should be a cheaper domestic rate than export rate is hard to conceive. It would have been expected that export should be encouraged and that through Canadian ports. Possibly, however, the fear of a rate war with United States ports held the Railway Board back in regard to this matter.

The plan as it would seem to us would be for the Canadian National Railways to give a through rate to the point of destination on their railways and boats. It would obviate any difficulty and would develop Canadian railways, the Canadian merchant marine and give employment to Canadian people.

Demand Increasing
In The Orient.

The demand for grain in the Orient is steadily increasing and the returns show that half the wheat shipped through Vancouver last year went to the Orient. To cope with that increase the American merchant marine and the Japanese fleets are being increased. As much of the grain is grown in Canada, there is no good reason why it should not be carried on Canadian roads and shipped from Canadian ports as long as this can be done as cheaply as from American and not at the expense of the Canadian farmer.

In the Letter Box

FEELS SLIGHTED.

Editor Daily News:—
We are honored at present in Northern B. C. by a visit from two members of the Workmen's Compensation Board and a few of their official staff. They are to be in the district five days. Five days in five years is not a very big proportion of their time—just a trifle more than a quarter of one per cent. Probably that is the estimate of the relative importance of our district. The time the boat is tied up at the wharf determines Prince Rupert's allotment of this five days.

I have received considerable criticism because the Trades and Labor Council had not arranged a public meeting to discuss the administration of the Workmen's Compensation Act. The answer is we had no official knowledge of their coming. Personally, however, I happened to meet the boat on Wednesday and I did ask and made every effort I could to induce the Board members to hold a public meeting but they absolutely refused. Yet in spite of this refusal the Board Chairman addressed the members of a local Secret Society on the "Workings of the W. C. Act." I submit that if the party is here on a holiday each member of it has a perfect right to elect whom he shall or shall not address. If however, they are here on Board business then the working men of this community undoubtedly have the first claim on their time and should have been given a meeting in preference to any society.

No Appeal.

We are told that the Act is functioning efficiently. If it is, a public meeting would present a splendid opportunity of silencing those of us who think the Act itself is not free from defects and that it is badly administered. Although civilization for centuries fought against the assumed "Divine right of Kings" it has been granted to this Board so they naturally have come to resent criticism and claim as one of their greatest virtues the fact that their word is FINAL and against it there is no appeal. Yet even if dumb animals have societies working for them that grant an appeal against the action of a cruel or unjust owner or master.

We are told that lawyers have no standing before this unerring tribunal. Yet a local man injured—probably for life—makes a personal application to the Board for compensation and is absolutely refused, but a short note from a well known law firm brings a substantial W. C. B. check for an answer.

Two Standards.

We are told the Act is administered without fear or favor but reports of the Board indicate that the compensation fund which is provided entirely by the

employers is distributed according to one standard and the hospital and medical fund, furnished largely by the men, according to another much more generous standard.

Five years ago we were told that this Act was to rescue us from the technicalities of law. It has not only failed to do so but has placed us where we have to fight that of medicine also. If this Act gives all we were promised five years ago surely the Board members should stay here another day and advise us where and how we are to live in this Province so as to receive all the promised blessings.

Waterfront Whiffs

Doings of the Mosquito Fleet Which Is the Chief Source of Prince Rupert's Prosperity

All has been well along the waterfront this week and good snappy business is the order of the day according to the Admiral of the Fleet. While the amount of fish landed has dropped slightly in comparison with last week, the drop is nothing to be alarmed about and as a recompense the price has advanced somewhat. Consequently everybody is happy, and the Cow Bay floats have the appearance of a tenement on rent day—no one at home.

The total of fish during the week has been 357,750 pounds, and 14 carloads have been shipped to eastern points. The highest price during the week was 11.1c and 5c and the lowest 10.1c and 4c.

There has been practically no salmon at all sold at the local fish exchange owing to the fact that this fish is finding its way entirely to the canneries. From reports to hand the sockeye are running well in the Skeena now and trollers are averaging between 50 and 100 to a boat and the Naas is still going well.

Hon. W. H. Sutherland, minister of public works, is the hero of the hour along the waterfront. Only last Saturday afternoon the minister promised that a fresh water main would be installed immediately, but, as no particular emphasis was laid on the word immediately, it was mostly understood that it would in all probability be a few weeks at least before the work was commenced.

However the doctor is evidently very keen on his interpretation of the word immediately for yesterday the C. P. R. steamer Princess Alice discharged a brand new water main which will be placed in position by the provincial engineers "toot sweet" and the engineers can get some hustle on too when occasion demands. This prompt action by the minister is much appreciated in local nautical circles. The absence of easily obtained fresh water has been a sore point with the water dwellers around Cow Bay for some considerable time. However, all's well that ends well, and the fresh water troubles of the crews will soon be a thing of the past.

A heated discussion took place in the Admiralty offices during the week regarding the question of the words "rudder" and "helm." One official stated that while a rudder was a helm a helm wasn't a rudder, and the argument waxed long and hot. To elucidate the argument the following explanation is given. "Helm" refers to the steering of a boat, to the rudder and its connecting mechanism. All boats, except those propelled by paddles or oars, must have rudders of some description. "Motor Boat" says: "The rudder is usually a flat wooden plank or metal plate of considerable area hinged beneath the stern and capable of being swung from side to side by means of a tiller and suitable tackles leading to a steering wheel. The meaning of the term helm should not be confused, as it sometimes is, as having the same meaning as the rudder or the steering wheel for such is not the case. It is true that the helm bears a certain definite relation to steering and to the position of the rudder but, on the other hand, the steering of the helm and the steering wheel is not fixed or definite. The word helm probably has been handed down to us from the old sailing days when ships were steered by the tiller and before the introduction of the steering wheel as we know it today."

The launch Nancy, Mrs. T. C. Duncan acting as sailing master made a successful trip with a party of guests to Metlakatla and return on Wednesday afternoon.

Captain Geo. Place, of the troling boat First Place, returned from a successful salmon troling trip on Monday. About 800 pounds of prize salmon were caught. Now Cap has an inborn dislike for hot weather, and hearing that in Prince Rupert the mercury was climbing to giddy heights he decided to make

the hike to the Queen Charlotte Islands and sell his catch there. This he did with the result that he got five cents per pound less than he would have done on the local market. However, the Prince Rupert fish buyers will have to go some if they want to grab off any of Cap's champion salmon, as the next load he catches he may decide to sell in Japan or Siberia.

The tugboat Starston, Capt. Harry Watson has been fully employed during the week towing in rock from Smith Island for the city streets.

The gas boat K-44, recently sold by tender by the Dominion government, was purchased by Messrs. Steel & Murray, who are overhauling her in Cow Bay.

The perfect peace of the Cow Bay water rats was rudely disturbed in the early hours of a certain morning this week, the noise at once conveying to the alert brains of the secret service that a secret mission was on foot. The idea is, when going out on a secret mission, to make all the noise possible with the hope that the fleet officials will think you are just returning. Upon investigation it was found that the good ship Monty was being prepared for a voyage and the smoke bombs on deck were shooting out volumes of camouflage. The bulky form of her skipper was plainly seen in the pilot house. Unfortunately he was not wearing rubber heels on his voice or his destination might still be unknown.

The Wigwam, Captain Claude Ketchum, returned on Monday from Pierce Island with two scow loads of gravel for the top dressing of the city streets.

Cap Eric Rosang, Rosang I, returned from the Hippo/salmon troling grounds early in the week, after engaging for some time in the salmon troling stunts. Cap is to devote his attention in future to the halibut fishing and it is understood he is going to set up some new records for catches.

Flossie Flirt is kicking up her heels in Winnipeg according to the latest reports over the Admiral's private wire. Flossie thinks the Peggers are a bunch of hustlers. Upon getting out of the station she noticed several people on the rush and thinking they were going to a fire or a murder she made after them. After walking a few miles she asked a policeman if there was anything unusual on to which he replied that the only unusual thing he knew about was her presence in Winnipeg, which was not at all nice. Our Cow Bay heroine was very disappointed to find that the ice carnival was over having forgotten that in the east the sun gets warm sometimes. It was Flossie's intention to put up as a queen of the carnival. The Admiral has received a present from flossie in the form of a clay pipe with hand painted forget-me-nots on the bowl, which he is scared to smoke in case it should kill the flowers. It appears that Flossie has been offered a position as stenographer to an organ grinder but she has turned the offer down as the organ is all out of tune. The financial end of the oil venture is still the paramount question, and tenders are being called from the various eastern banks to take care of her \$3.50, the bank offering the best interest receiving the amount. Flossie is staying at a house situated on the street car line, and says the front door is so close to the street that in coming out one morning the street car ran over her toe but her big shoes saved her foot.

The Silver Spray, Capt. Billy Thane, arrived in port from Dundas Island on Thursday with a good sized cargo of salmon. Bill will return on a salmon

The halibut boat Lillian M had her rudder and shoe renewed at Cow Bay, the work being completed on Wednesday. She has since cleared for the halibut banks.

Albert & McCaffery are contemplating building a lumber shed on their wharf for the protection of the lumber piles from the elements. The demonstrations are not yet decided upon.

The power boat P. R. T. Capt. Ketchum, proceeded up the Skeena river yesterday to pick up fish waste from the canneries for the Marine Products company at Tucks Inlet.

A. O. Franks, the well known logging contractor, is proceeding to Surf Inlet early in the coming week in connection with logging operations for the Morgan Logging Company.

The logging boat Baluart, which has been engaged in logging operations at the head of Wark Channel arrived in port during the week for repairs.

During the week the tugboat Wigwam towed in a boom of logs to the Georgetown mill consisting of some 300,000 feet.

Captain John Iverson and his merry men, who ply their deep sea fishing in the Pair of Jacks have been having a little better luck lately according to the latest reports. Cap made port this week with 25,000 pounds of the classed halibut ever beheld on the spotless plank of the fish dock. The main point is that Cap can smell a dollar quite a few miles away and struck the market when the price was good with the consequence that everybody aboard is wearing a smile that won't come off for a few days yet.

The new Massett Island Missionary boat the Western Hope, which is being built at the well known yards of the N. M. McLean company, is nearing completion, and Mac expects the entire work will be completed next Wednesday when the Rev. J. Gillett will take her out on her trial trip. The boat measures 30 feet long x 10 feet 6 inch beam and is fitted out in the most up-to-date manner. The 24 h.p. Vivian engine is already installed and runs like a clock. The Western Hope will be piloted by Rev. Gillett. Mrs. Gillett and baby accompanying him on his travels. The points covered by this missionary boat will include Massett Inlet, Naden Harbor, Langara Island, Watun River, Naden River, Port Clements, Buckley Bay and remote logging and mining camps. Upon completion this will be one of the finest floating homes ever built in this port.

The James Garruthers, Capt. Parsons, arrived in port on Thursday with 65,000 pounds of prize takers, which were sold to the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. From reports to and Cap seems well satisfied with the trip and while in good humor he is to be approached to give a rendering of "The Grizzly Bear" if a special building for the occasion can be erected in time. If this request is complied with it is probable that "Keyhole" Hanna will officiate as the bear to give local color to the song.

Some fine specimens of minerals have been received by a local waterfront celebrity from the Greenville Channel district. The quartz carries gold, silver, copper and nickel, and samples have been sent east for assaying purposes. If the assay proves the samples to be of commercial value it is quite likely that local capital will be forthcoming for development work.

Captain Frenchy, of The Snipe, has just completed working out quite a novel invention. His engine, which gave him some considerable trouble, has greatly improved on its diet of Mother Siegel's syrup and hits on the one cylinder in perfect rhythm. Cap has worked out a scheme whereby the engine is converted into a gramophone and it is said that his record giving the Anvil Chorus is one of the wonders of the age, the clanking of the machinery giving great assistance to the orchestra making the record.

Sport Chat

The fifty-ninth annual meeting of the National Rifle Association opened at Bisley Camp on Monday and continues for two weeks or until Saturday July 22, when the final stage of the King's Prize is shot off, the victor crowned, the Grande Aggregate decided and the prizes distributed.

The program for this year's meeting at Bisley shows a determined effort to attract more competition, particularly from those of the younger generation.

The prize lists for the meeting generally have been lengthened and equalized and entrance fees in many instances have been reduced. The principal events are more evenly distributed throughout the program than has been the case heretofore. The total prizes for the meeting amount to over £7,000, of which the King's with its £100 prizes accounts for £1,170.

The rifles and sights being used this year in Service Rifle ("S. R.") competitions are the same as those permitted last year, but in future the long rifle (Lee-Enfield and Lee-Enfield) will not be allowed. There are no alterations in the conditions under which the King's Prize is being conducted, but in some of the other competitions the number of rounds at each range has been reduced and a sighting shot allowed. In International Service Rifle team matches all teams must fire with the same pattern of rifle.

Target shooting in England came into prominence with the formation of the Volunteer Force in 1859 and received a great impetus through the inauguration of the "National Rifle Association" in 1869, and the promotion of rifle shooting throughout Great Britain opened a new and important era in the history and development of the rifle. The first meeting of the N.R.A. was held at Wimbledon in 1869, when Queen Victoria, shooting from the 400 yard mark, fired the first shot, scoring a bull's-eye. It is thus that the Queen's Prize or King's Prize, as it is now known, had its beginning and this prize is the highest distinction to which a rifle shot can attain. The competition is one of three stages, and is open to only past or present members of His Majesty's Forces. The first and second stages eliminate all but the best 100 competitors. The N.R.A. bronze medal is awarded highest scorer in the first stage, the N.R.A. silver medal to the highest scorer of the three hundred who compete in the second stage, while the King's Prize of £250 and the N.R.A. Gold Medal and Gold Badge go to the winner of the third stage. Seventy-one shots in all are fired by competitors who go through all these stages. Distances range from 200 yards in the first stage, to 900 and 1000 yards in the final stage.

The chief event of the opening day was the first stage of the Queen Mary's Prize, a squad competition open only to past and present members of His Majesty's forces. Unlike the King's Prize, conditions of this competition are designed to conform as nearly as possible to actual war conditions. Monday's first stage consists of ten shots at 200 yards, snapshooting at disappearing targets, which reappear at irregular intervals spread over a total period of ten minutes. This is followed by five rapid fire shots at 300 yards total time being allowed is 25 seconds. The next stage is the "fire with movement." This consists of ten shots, ranging down from 500 to 100 yards, the men advancing and firing 170 shots at each hundred yard range at disappearing target. The position at the 500 and 400 yards mark will be prone at the 300 and 200 yards, kneeling at the 100 yards, standing. The final stage, on Tuesday, is the "deliberate" and consists of five shots at the 600 yard mark. In connection with the Queen Mary Prize is decided the winner of the Canada challenge Shield. This shield, purchased in 1913 out of a sum of money provided by the Dominion of Canada is awarded to the team of five making the highest aggregate in the Queen Mary competition.

Kalapore Cup, whose full title is the Rajah of Kalapore's Imperial Challenge Cup, open to teams of eight from the Mother Country, the several Dominions, India and the Channel Islands. This consists of ten shots at 300, 500 and 600 yards range, service rifles only and is shot off on Tuesday, July 18. The MacKinnon Cup, for teams of twelve is also of much interest to Canadians, and teams from Canada have met with considerable success in these competitions, having won one or the other on no less than twelve occasions, and in 1909 carried off both these events.

The first stage of the King's Prize is decided on Wednesday, July 19, the second stage on Friday, 21st, and the final stage on Saturday, 22nd. This has been won by Canadian marksmen on four occasions, 1891, 1895, 1911 and 1913. Major Crowe, of Guelph, Ontario, won the silver medal for the highest score at the second stage last year, with the final stage being won by Sgt. J. Cunningham, with a total of 226 for the second and third stages. Sergeant T. Angear of Calgary, Alta., was third with 222.
