Secretary of State Indicates United States Intention with Regard to Reparations Dispute

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Dec. 30.—Charles E. Hughes, secretary of state for the United States, in an address to the Historical Association here, said that a commission of financial experts from the Allied countries, appointed by the governments with no political connections to investigate Germany's ability to pay reparations, would do more towards settling the reparations question than a general commission of inquiry. Mr. Hughes indicated that the United States favored the scheme and would send a representative to such a commission if the Allied premiers failed to reach an agreement next week. Mr. Hughes declared that he was emphatically against forcible means of collecting from Germany. Such could only produce disaster, he asserted.

HONOR LIST IS HELD UP

Committee Appointed to Investigate Fitness of Candidates for New Year Honors

LONDON, Dec. 30.—Following the finding of the commission on titles, the government promptly decided to appoint a committee of the Privy Council to investigate the fitness of candidates for honors. The New Year honor list will be held up until the committee endorses it.

The commission's report says that abuses in regard to honors have existed but it does not suggest any drastic changes from the present system of awarding titles. The report also admits that no doubt there have been an increasing number of "bought" titles who would offer titles for money.

PLANNING FOR ARMENIAN HOME

United States Delegation Submitted Scheme at Lusanne Conference Today

LAUSANNE, Dec. 30.—Plans for an Armenian national home, financed with a possible \$20,000,000 appropriation from the United States congress or by a popular loan in America in addition to funds from other countries, were presented to the Near East conference today by the American delegation.

EAST IN GRIP OF BAD STORM

Trains Are Delayed and Business Suspended Causing Great Hardship

MONTGOMERY, Dec. 30.—The worst storm since 1906 is sweeping New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island and into New England. Trains are delayed and business is suspended, causing great hardships. The snow is nine-inch deep in some districts and the winds at some times reaches a velocity of seventy miles an hour.

EXHIBITION BOARD FINISHES BUSINESS

Jack Venables Will Not Be Fair Manager for 1923, He States

The exhibition board met last night and completed all business for the year. All accounts were passed for payment and everything is now ready for the annual meeting on January 19. It was decided to start the membership drive at 2 p.m. Tuesday, January 8 and continue it until the annual meeting. The same committees will be in charge as were appointed some time ago. Jack Venables, manager of the exhibition association, stated this morning that he would not apply for the managership of the association next year at the annual meeting. He is contemplating a trip south shortly after the annual meeting and will most likely go to San Francisco.

ENGLAND WINS FIGHT AGAINST HOUSE FLIES

Reduction From Myriads to Comparatively Few Is Accomplished Through Sanitation and Health Propaganda

LONDON, Dec. 30.—The reduction of the number of house flies from myriads to a comparatively few has been accomplished in England through sanitation and health propaganda, according to a statement by Dr. E. H. Hafford Ross, medical assessor at the Ministry of Pensions. Dr. Ross toured the British Isles last summer, and in those places where previously there had been thousands of flies, they were conspicuous by their absence, he declares. Some out of the way villages and farm houses still sheltered the grubs and insects, but these locations were not numerous. There has been a very great decrease in the figures on infant mortality, as compared to 1914, and the improvement is credited by Dr. Ross to the relative absence of flies.

Halibut Harvest This Year Just About Hit Record Made in 1921

The catch of halibut in 1922 ran very close to that of 1921, according to figures secured this morning at the water front on the total catch. This year the catch, including today's sale of 60,000 pounds, amounted to 25,500,950 pounds while last year the figure was 25,600,040 pounds.

The highest price of the year was reached early this month when 20 cents a pound was paid for first-class fish and 11 cents for second grade. The lowest prices of the year were 7 cents for firsts and 4 cents for seconds.

The Seattle was the only boat selling halibut this morning and the last this year. She had 60,000 pounds which was disposed of at the Fish Exchange for 16.6c and 8c to the Altn Fisheries.

TURK REINFORCEMENTS IN MOSUL DISTRICT

ATHENS, Dec. 30.—The Turks are sending reinforcements in the direction of the rich Mosul oil district, the ownership of which is in dispute at the Lausanne conference, according to advices to the Central News. A division of 6,000 Turks, it is stated, has already left for Mosul.

MARINE DISASTERS ON ATLANTIC COAST

Schooner With Four Men Lost and Freighter With Thirty is Given Up
NEWPORT NEWS, Dec. 30.—The schooner Mairie Peabody has been lost in Chesapeake Bay and her crew of four men have been drowned.
The freighter Heinrich Kayser with a crew of thirty, reported in distress twenty-three days ago, has also been given up for lost.

GAYA, British India, Dec. 30.—The All Indian Nationalist congress has rejected the proposal to boycott British goods.

Taylor Company Fails to Redeem Dolly Varden Mine and Property Now Lapses to George Wingfield

VANCOUVER, Dec. 30.—The Dolly Varden mines at Alice Arm are to be taken over by George Wingfield, the Reno banker, following the non-payment of \$200,866 by the Taylor Engineering Co. Ltd. and co-defendants on Thursday. This was the last day named by the Supreme Court for the redeeming of the property. Mr. Wingfield advanced \$182,322 in 1921 to the Taylor Co. on security of their holdings at Alice Arm.

It has not been definitely announced yet what Mr. Wingfield intends to do with the Dolly Varden property now that he has come into final possession of it.

There are two courses open to him. The first is to operate the mine and railway and get his money out that way or sell the mine and equipment for what it may bring. The property includes modern mining machinery at the mine, a short tram line and bunkers at the rail head, an eighteen-mile railway line and bunkers at the beach.

Those interested in the Kit-Fault River mining district are anxious that the railway will be reopened for it taps the valley and other properties are practically dependent upon it. The mine and railway last operated in 1920 and mining in the district has been impeded for two seasons on account of its inactivity. It is the general opinion of mining men that further properties besides the Dolly Varden must be put into shipping shape before the operation of the railway may be made a paying venture. The railway was completed in 1920 and was used for a time that year in transporting the high grade Dolly Varden ore to the water at Alice Arm. The road cost about \$1,000,000 to build and, together with the mine, became the property of the Taylor Co. in 1920 following the failure of the Dolly Varden Mining Co., of Chicago to meet its payments for construction.

COMES OVER TO LIBERALS

Another Progressive Will Join Government Ranks At Ottawa

OTTAWA, Dec. 30.—Completing one year of office yesterday without any cabinet changes, the Mackenzie King administration has received word that another Progressive will join the Liberal ranks when Parliament opens towards the end of January. This will be J. Binette, M.P. for Prescott, Ont., who will bring the government majority over all parties to two not counting the Speaker.

PANCHO VILLA WON OVER TERRY MARTIN

Flyweight Champion Went Out of His Class and Scored Sensational Victory at New York
NEW YORK, Dec. 30.—Pancho Villa, the flyweight champion, went out of his class and last night defeated Terry Martin in a sensational fifteen-round bout.

SIX DOLLAR A YEAR MAN IS INDICTED

Benedict Crowell, Former Assistant Secretary of War, Charged With Conspiracy

WASHINGTON, Dec. 30.—Benedict Crowell, assistant secretary of war in the Wilson administration and a six dollars a year man associated with the council of national defence, was indicted here today by a special grand jury investigating war frauds. Crowell is charged with conspiracy to defraud the government in the construction of war time army camps and cantonments.

BRITISH SCHEME ON REPARATIONS

Bonar Law Will Take Complete Plan to Next Week's Conference in Paris

LONDON, Dec. 30.—A complete plan upon which the British cabinet passed judgment yesterday in the hope of obtaining the agreement of the French for a final settlement of reparations difficulties will be taken to the Conference of Ambassadors in Paris next Tuesday by Premier Bonar Law.

OBLIGATION REDUCED

British Desire is that France Give German a Fair Trial

It is believed that the plan sets down the total obligation of the Germans at approximately one-third of that decided by the Versailles treaty. The British desire the French to give Germany a fair trial under the new scheme which, if not productive of the desired results, would be supplemented by the French schemes involving coercive methods.

REDUCTION IN JAP LICENSES

Though Duff Report Cannot be Acted Upon Immediately, There Will be 552 Less Next Season

OTTAWA, Dec. 30.—The interim report of the Duff commission, which investigated the fisheries of British Columbia last year, recommending a forty percent reduction in the number of Japanese fishing licenses on the Pacific coast will not be acted upon so far as the 1923 season is concerned. The main report cannot be dealt with until parliament opens. Departmental reductions, however, in Japanese licenses, will total 552 this year. The department points out that licenses are not issued to Japanese unless they are British citizens.

HAD ARM CUT OFF IN ORDER TO LOSE BRIGHT TATOO MARK

NEW YORK, Dec. 30.—By Canadian Press.—Because he was tired of a brightly tattooed figure on his right arm James J. Scallion of Shenandoah, Pa., placed his arm on the Pennsylvania Railroad track in Newark, Scallion told detectives at the City Hospital where he now lies recovering from the result of his act. A trainman drilling freight cars found Scallion beside the track with his right arm severed at the elbow. He confessed that the figure of an undraped woman tattooed in bright colors on his arm had grown monotonous to him and he deliberately placed his arm upon the track.

What New Year Means To Us.

It is customary at New Year's time for people to look back and view in retrospect the events and achievements of the Old Year and, with the guidance of past experience, to resolve on making the New Year a better one in every respect. Hopeful determination is the keynote of the constructive New Year spirit. Without it there is no prospect of betterment. It is vain indeed to make resolutions if there is neither the hope or determination of carrying them out. Success is the objective, and hope and determination are the means of reaching it. Our accomplishments will never be any greater than our resolutions. Therefore it behooves all to make their resolutions as lofty as possible and pursue their accomplishment with steady and unswerving course.

It is said that resolutions are made to be broken. No statement was ever further removed from the truth than this. Else why make resolutions? A broken resolution means disappointment in ones power of accomplishment and disappointments are weakening. Only the staunchest of spirits can suffer disappointment and rise again with the same high purpose. To many people a broken resolution is no better—perhaps worse—than no resolution at all. There may be exceptions to this rule but we are all human and subject to the weaknesses and shortcomings of mankind. Therefore our New Year resolutions, and our expectations, too, should be as high as possible but not too high for our accomplishment.

Past Year Has Seen Steady Business.

The success of a community is generally measured in its business and the prosperity of its citizens. Therefore, in turning over the old page for the new, a survey of the things of the past and the prospects of the future, is timely.

Prince Rupert people have had much to be thankful for in the year 1922 and they have much to look forward to in 1923. It is true that there has been no spectacular or even marked advancement in the growth of the city or the number of people in it. Yet there has been steady business, unmarked by any sudden or periodical inflations. There has been general prosperity in which all have participated more or less. Business men were, perhaps, disappointed with the failure of any great splash of holiday trade but, when they come down to inspect their affairs of the past year, they find that there has been steady good business and the aggregate of business, in most of cases, represents a distinct improvement over the year previous.

General Improvement, At Least, May Be Expected.

There is nothing but general improvement to look forward to in the New Year. The year 1923 may even see a spectacular advance in the history of Prince Rupert. We may not predict it but we sincerely hope for it and there is good basis for the hope.

We have looked for port developments such as a grain elevator, coal bunkers, lumber assembly wharf and other facilities—things that would establish the port as a distributing centre in the world's commerce. In fact, Prince Rupert's hope is built up on these things. They will come. Nobody doubts that. When they will come is the question. There is reason to believe we will have them soon—perhaps even in the year 1923. It is up to the community to resolve to get these things and to bend every effort towards obtaining them. This should be made the community New Year resolution and it is one that, far from being impossible, is within the bounds of almost immediate accomplishment. Then Prince Rupert would be made.

In the meantime, business is good and business is steady. The year 1922 has not been a bad year and the year 1923 should not be worse.

The Daily News endorses the resolution that it suggests to the public at large and in doing so voices the wish that the year 1923 will bring to the people who are its readers and advertisers and the means of its entire existence, development and prosperity for Prince Rupert and Northern British Columbia.

XMAS CONCERT AT ESSINGTON

Splendid Program Presented by Pupils of Native School

PORT ESSINGTON, Dec. 30.—The annual Christmas concert given by the native children of both day and Sunday schools, was held in the Methodist church at Port Essington on the evening of Dec. 27th. Rev. W. F. Rushbrook occupying the chair. A large audience of natives, whites and Japanese listened with much pleasure to a splendid program of drills, songs, motion songs and recitations.

A special feature of the program was the singing of two Christmas anthems by the choir entitled "The Heavens are Telling," and "Glorious." Job Nelson being organist and Arthur Stewart leader. These pieces were rendered with remarkable ability by a choir of twenty voices and were greatly enjoyed by the audience. This choir is just newly organized. The Christmas tree was most beautifully decorated, and when Santa Claus arrived with his pack to distribute the gifts, he was greeted with warm applause. There were gifts and bags of candy given to about forty children.

At the last Christmas concert a fund was started to purchase a gasoline lighting system for the church. Since then, these lights have been purchased and installed by the natives and at the entertainment this year the great improvement was much in evidence.

During the intermission, Rev. W. H. Pierce spoke for a few minutes on "Progress" and compared the church today to what it was about forty years ago.

RETURNED SOLDIERS' INSURANCE EXPIRY DATE

An amendment to the Returned Soldiers' Insurance Act provides that insurance may not be granted on the lives of returned soldiers with or without dependents, in a serious condition of health from causes other than war service, or those without dependents, even when impairment is due to service. The amendment, however, contains the following proviso:

"Provided that applicants with or without present and potential dependents who are so seriously ill that they have no expectancy of life, and who have dependents who are entitled to become beneficiaries under the contract as provided under the Act, shall be insurable under the Returned Soldiers' Insurance Act, up to, and inclusive of 1st JANUARY, 1923."

Insurance may be granted in all cases where the impairment is due to service and the returned soldier has dependents.

Application may be made at any local office of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, or by mail to Soldiers' Insurance Division, 14th Building, Ottawa.

Applications not affected by the above will be accepted until September 1st, 1923.

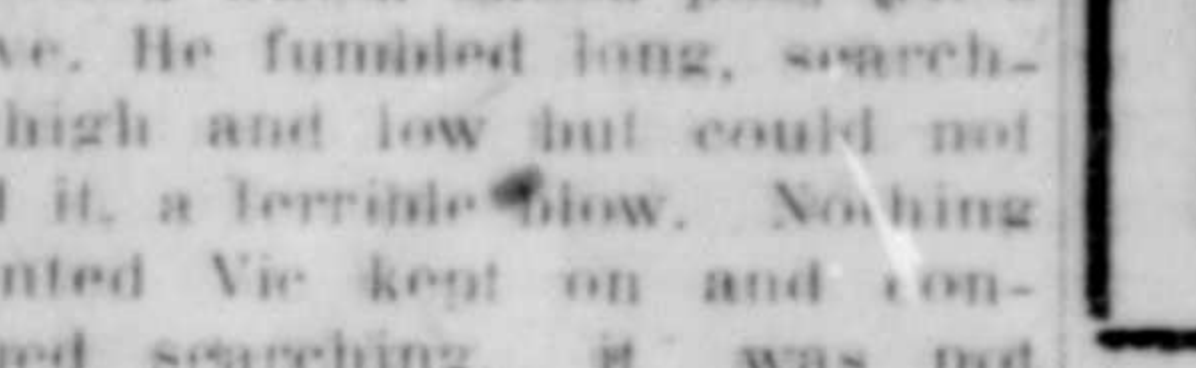

WAR VETERANS MAKE BIG FIND

Nova Scotia Association Finds \$10,000 Worth of Oil Paintings in Old Residence it Bought

OTTAWA, Dec. 30, (Canadian Press)—One of the most remarkable occurrences in the history of the association is recorded in a letter to G.W.V.A. Dominion headquarters from the branch at Bear River, N.S.

After purchasing an old residence with a view to turning it into a club house, several large oil paintings, reputed to have been done by a famous English artist, were discovered buried under an accumulation of wall paper. The paintings have been viewed by two American experts, who have placed a value upon them of at least \$10,000.

The circumstances leading to the find are somewhat interesting. Bear River branch of the G.W.V.A. is one of the oldest in the province of Nova Scotia. It has some 70 members. About eighteen months ago, after having raised funds by means of entertainments, etc., the house in which the painting were subsequently found, was purchased by the club. The citizens of the town and district did not think kindly of the idea, declaring that the veterans were taking on too great a proposition. The accidental discovery of the paintings followed, and steps were at once taken to have them fully exposed. They were then thoroughly cleaned and retouched by one of the members.

The paintings were quite ancient and show scenes of Halifax and Halifax harbor in the early days. They are stated to have been done by a famous English artist who visited in Halifax for a considerable period and went to Bear River on fishing trips. A number of offers have already been received from the United States by the Bear River branch for the paintings, but the veterans have thus far withheld the sale, hoping that the pictures may be retained in Canada.
