U. S. Senate Makes Treaty Possible G.T.P. EARNINGS IMPROVE RAPIDLY; RAILWAY ESTIMATES DOWN

Senate Ratifies Four Power Pacific Treaty with Britain France, Japan for 10 Years

WASHINGTON, March 25.—The four power treaty for the Pacific was ratified by the Senate yesterday, the vote being 67 to 27 or four more than the necessary two-thirds vote.

The four power treaty between Britain, the United States, France and Japan, was designed at the Washington Conference to supplant the Anglo-Japanese alliance and pave the way for the acceptance of the United States proposals for naval reduction.

The treaty is a ten-year agreement by which the four nations concerned bind themselves to respect their existing rights in

insular possessions and dominions in the Pacific and in case of dispute which can not be settled by diplomacy to agree to a joint conference among themselves.

Any one of the parties to the treaty may withdraw on giving the others three months' notice after the expiration of the specified ten-year period.

The treaty was to come into effect upon the ratification according to the constitutional methods of contracting parties. The only apparent obstacle was the United States Senate, the consent of which has now been obtained.

The signing of the treaty on the part of the United States, was subject to the making of a convention with Japan concerning the island of Yap and which are termed the mandated islands in the Pacific Ocean north of the equator, negotiations in regard to which have been concluded.

ASIA MINOR ARMISTICE

Turks Distrust Allied Proposals—Greeks Welcome It.

CONSTANTINOPLE, March 25.—The proposal for an armistice between the Greeks and the Turkish Nationalists in Asia Minor advanced by the allied foreign ministers has been received here with indifference and distrust by newspapers of all shades of opinion.

In Athens, the Greek press is taking kindly to the idea of the armistice as proposed by the powers and relief is expressed at the prospect of peace.

CALGARY, March 25.—The coal mines of Eastern British Columbia and Alberta will close on April 1 following a decision of the mine operators not to accede to the wage demands of the employees and ask for a board of arbitration.

Grand Trunk Pacific is Improving Financially is to be Shown by Returns

OTTAWA, March 25.—When the minister of railways brings down the railway budget in the House of Commons, the Grand Trunk Pacific will, it is expected, play a more optimistic role. Returns by the transportation branch of the bureau of statistics show that during the year ended December 31, the freight traffic on the G. T. P. provided the outstanding feature of operations.

The operating deficit on the G. T. P. last year was \$3,997,488 as against \$10,134,543 the year before. The reduction in operating loss on the Canadian Northern section will be shown to have been reduced from \$16,440,476 in 1920 to \$6,574,236 in 1921.

CRITICAL VOTE BRITISH HOUSE

Return of Lloyd George on Monday Means Vote Soon on Genoa Conference.

LONDON, March 25.—Parliamentarians and public are looking forward to the return of Premier Lloyd George on Monday from Criceith, Wales, where he has been enjoying a brief holiday.

His return to the House of Commons is expected to precipitate the promised vote of confidence in regard to the Genoa conference, which the Northcliffe Press has been belittling and asking to have called off.

TO DISCUSS MATTER U. S. REIMBURSEMENT

British and French Finance Ministers Are Confering in France on Subject.

PARIS, March 25.—Sir Robert Horne, British chancellor of the exchequer, has arrived here to confer with the French minister of finance regarding the American note concerning the reimbursement to United States of the costs of occupying Rhineland.

WITHDRAW TROOPS FROM SCUTARI

Allied Ambassadors Think All International Forces Should Be Withdrawn From There.

PARIS, March 25.—The Allied Council of Ambassadors today decided that all international troops occupying Scutari should be withdrawn. The forces there now are almost entirely Italian.

Estimates Tabled House of Commons

OTTAWA, March 25.—The estimates tabled here yesterday are very complete and comprehensive and cover an immense lot of detail. Outstanding, however, are the estimates for the railways and some other departments that were discussed at the last Dominion Election. Following are a few of the figures:

Grand Trunk Pacific, \$15,900,000.
Canadian National, \$42,800,000.
Grand Trunk Railway, \$75,750,000.
Canadian Naval Department, \$1,500,000.
Mounted Police cut to \$1,456,532.
Merchant Marine cut to \$4,360,520.

The expenditures on the Railways are exclusive of any payments for stock, shares, or maintenance.

On Monday in Parliament the House of Commons will pass an interim supply bill for one fourth of the total estimates which have been brought down. If there is time the estimates will be discussed or Government bills will receive attention. The Senate will not sit on Monday.

MAJOR BRITTON OF VICTORIA PASSES ON

Officer Commanding "A" Company at Work Point, Victim of Pneumonia

VICTORIA, March 25.—Major James Capell Britton, D.S.O., officer commanding "A" company Royal Canadian Machine Gun corps at Work Point barracks here, died yesterday from pneumonia, aged 38. He served with distinction in the great war, joining up at Saskatoon. A widow survives.

CONTROL OF DARDANELLES

League of Nations Asked to Take Charge Owing to Friction.

PARIS, March 25.—The League of Nations is daily being asked to take over control of the Dardanelles.

The rivalry between France and Great Britain in the near East and the constant friction which existed between them at Constantinople is pointed to in international political circles as showing the practical impossibility of applying schemes of internationalization to the straits which would suit all the allies.

WHOLE HOUSEHOLD BURNED TO DEATH IN FIRE NEAR PORTAGE

PORTAGE LA PRAIRIE, March 25.—Six persons were burned to death in a fire which destroyed a home at Amaranth, Manitoba, north of this city. The dead are Mr. and Mrs. Max Warhaft, their three children and maid. The property damage is set at \$30,000.

MEN ENTOMBED

TRINIDAD, March 25.—Eighteen men are entombed in a mine where an explosion occurred. Eight bodies have been recovered.

TRINIDAD, March 25. (later).—The total dead at the Sopris mine explosion numbers 1.

MORE JAPANESE DISTILLERS ARE TAKEN BY POLICE

Total Number Arrested in Skeena River Raids by R. N. W. P. is Now Eight—\$500 Bail Each.

Eight Skeena River Japs have been brought to the city by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police to answer charges of operating stills in contravention of the Inland Revenue Act.

The three who arrived in charge of Constable Martin on Thursday night were charged yesterday before Magistrate McMullin and remanded until Tuesday. They were released on \$500 bail each. These are T. Kuwahara, of Standard camp, S. Kobuke, Claxton, and T. Kogo, Kennedy camp.

Five more alleged offenders, T. Koseki, Y. Inouye, V. Inouye and T. Nakihiro, were brought to the city yesterday afternoon on the Pakenham by Inspector Aeland, Corporal Newham and Constables Thornthwaite and Davies. They were also charged today, remanded until the first of the week and released on \$500 bail each. W. J. Nelson, of the customs department, accompanied the mounted policemen who were making the arrests.

Constables Sainl, Martin and Gibson, of the Provincial police who discovered the stills in the course of a general police patrol of the river mouth, have returned to the city on the departmental launch Myfanwy.

IRISH MEETING TUESDAY NEXT

Sinn Feiners Will Go to London But no Word from Ulsterites

LONDON, March 25.—The Colonial office has been notified that Arthur Griffith, president of the Dail Eireann, and Eamonn J. Dugan, minister of home affairs, will arrive in London on Monday in compliance with the request of the British Government for a conference on the critical Irish situation. Should the Ulster Government accept the invitation to the conference it will meet here on Tuesday.

GUNMEN YET BUSY

BELFAST, March 25.—Gunmen are again busy today and as a result there have been several shootings but no fatalities.

CRAZED FROM EXPOSURE ON FLYING BOAT

Two Women Die and Two Other Passengers Jump Overboard in Ocean.

MIAMI, Fla., March 25.—Two women passengers on the flying boat "Miss Miami," which left here Wednesday for the Island of Bimini and which was forced down in the open sea through a broken propeller, died from exposure. Two other passengers, crazed by exposure, jumped overboard into the sea, according to a story told by Robert Moore, pilot of the craft, to members of the crew of a steamer William Green, which rescued him last night from the wrecked flying boat.

SEMI-FINALS AT FOOTBALL

English Championship to be Between Huddersfield and Preston North End.

GLASGOW, March 25.—The Glasgow Rangers defeated the Partick Thistles at Ibrox Park today by two goals to nothing in the semi-final game for the Scottish Association Football cup.

LONDON, March 25.—Huddersfield and Preston North End will meet in the final game for the Association Cup, emblematic of the soccer championship of England April 29. They enter the final game by virtue of their victories at Burnley from Notts. County, 3 to 1, and Preston beating Tottenham Hotspurs, the cup holders, at Sheffield, 2 to 1.

EDMONTON UTILITIES SHOWING NET PROFIT

For Months of January and February Sum of \$102,149 Goes to General Revenue.

EDMONTON, March 24.—The earnings of the city utilities during the months of January and February are considerably larger than for the same period last year. The net profits for all the utilities for these two months total \$102,149 which will be carried as taxes to the general revenue fund of the city. Last year for the same two months after deducting the losses of the street railway the net profits were \$58,476, which shows a substantial increase for this year.

The net profits for the first two months this year from the power plant and pumping station was \$26,272 in comparison to \$22,738 for the same time last year. The telephone department shows a profit of \$12,786 while the profits for these two months last year were only \$11,353. In the electric light department the profits were \$18,937 as compared to \$37,568 an increase of \$11,369 for these two months this year. The profits made by the water works department for these two months, \$6,811 as compared to \$3,920.

The best showing of any of utilities was undoubtedly made by the street railway. During the months of January and February of 1921 the street railway showed a deficit of \$17,123 but for the same two months this year show a net profit of \$7,343, an increase in earnings of \$24,466.

For the month of February alone this year the net earnings of all of the utilities was \$548,943 and for the same month last year was \$29,451.

Prince Rupert Is Heard in East.

There were not many members of Parliament took part in the debate on the address in reply to the speech from the throne but among them was the member for Skeena, Fred Stork, who sounded the praises of this north country. While we have only a short summary of his maiden speech in the House of Commons, we may be quite sure that he made the people down there realize that Prince Rupert was on the map and was a place to be reckoned with. In season and out of season it is sure that Fred Stork will speak up for his constituency.

Discarnate Personality.

Every person has his own point of view and the point of view vitally affects the conclusions at which he arrives. The following editorial from the Nelson News in regard to the Antigonish ghost is interesting:

"Dr. Prince has laid the Nova Scotia ghost. It isn't a ghost at all, but a 'discarnate personality' which instigated a girl in the now notorious farm to start fires, turn the cows loose, make mysterious noises and strike blows against the bodies of newspaper reporters and other seekers after truth.

"This 'discarnate personality' theory may explain a lot of things and contains possibilities beyond calculation. It might lead to a complete denial of personal responsibility. If one commits murder, not the murderer, but a 'discarnate personality' which instigated it, is the criminal.

"If one breaks a window in a fit of alcoholic exuberance, it is not the window breaker, nor even the government booze which is responsible, but a discarnate spirit. If one commits a good action it is creditable not to the person who commits it, but to the discarnate personality which is in control.

"Dr. Prince's report is bound to be the subject of warm controversy. Psychoanalysts, for example, will find the phenomena with which he deals explainable by their theories of the vagaries of the subconscious mind and will not admit spirit agency. The advocates of the spirit theory, probably almost as numerous, will consider Dr. Prince's conclusions merely further proof of established spiritual facts."

Four Power Pact Safely Passed

Although a great deal of fuss was made over the discussions of the Pacific Pact between United States, Japan, Great Britain and France it is now safely ratified by the United States Senate and will become an established treaty. It will replace the Anglo-Japanese treaty and thus get Britain out of the difficult position of seeming to be allied with Japan as against the United States. With each of these powers in the same pact there can be no irritation from this source.

With nations as with individuals, it is well to be careful not to hurt the feelings of those with whom we have to live. It is necessary sometimes to talk plainly but at the same time it is well to avoid unnecessary irritation. If war is to become a thing of the past nations must keep from any action that will tend to cause friction.

Delayed Prosecution of Bank Officers.

The delay in prosecuting Sir Montagu Allan and the manager of the Merchants' Bank for their share in the Merchants' bank scandal has caused a good deal of adverse criticism. It is pointed out by the man on the street that a less important person would have long ago been railroaded to jail for such an offence. If company presidents and managers are to be relieved of responsibility in connection with the work they are supposed to do, the public will lose all confidence in big corporations.

The commencement of proceedings in the police court looks like a howling to the popular demand. The odd thing is that the officials mentioned were not arrested instead of being reluctantly summoned to appear.

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

Waterfront Whiffs

Doings of the Mosquito Fleet Which is the Chief Source
of Prince Rupert's Prosperity

With better weather prevailing the Admiral of the Mosquito Fleet reports that all boats have hit for the "high spots" and the rendezvous of the "Hole" fleet is somewhat depleted of the deep sea monster chasers. While the weather last week had not been conducive to particularly remunerative fishing, in so far as only small catches were brought in, reports to hand from the deep sea fishing grounds state that the weather is improving and that fishing is good. It is anticipated that early in the coming week several large catches will be marketed. The prices prevailing during the week have been good and have reached as high as 17.7 cents, so that those crews of the Mosquito Fleet who were lucky at all were goldrained lucky.

The Fur commissioner of the Fleet reports that the severe weather experienced in the past week has had a detrimental effect upon the fur trappers in certain districts. Heavy falls of snow and continued frosts having buried the trap lines. Most of the trappers who went out a month ago, having encountered tough weather, have forsaken their trap lines and hit for home. However, on the outlying islands, where the snow fall has not been so heavy, trapping is still being continued.

It is reported that the Alaska herring fishing was very backward this season, and conditions in Alaska waters, as far as this industry is concerned, have been similar to those prevailing in the home waters. When the herring did swim to the surface they swam in tremendous shoals and consequently, though late, the Alaska herring have been taken in large quantities.

The success of the Library Bylaw has met with favorable comment along the waterfront, and already a number of the fishermen are making out a list of books they are anxious to obtain, the majority of which are books of a technical nature touching on machinery and other topics of interest in their business. Undoubtedly a number of arguments, which often arise aboard ship, will be settled by reference to books obtained from the library.

The launch Narbethong, Captain Freeman, having returned to port from a secret mission, is undergoing her annual machinery and hull repairs. The hull repairs, consisting of re-caulking and painting, have been completed and with the completion of the machinery overhaul the craft will be O.K. for further fields of conquest.

The White Lilly, Captain Hugh Gillies, left port on Thursday morning for the high spots.

The Dixie Rupert, Captain Newcombe, returned from Zandari Rapids on Tuesday, where he had been with a party of linemen engaged on wire repairs for the government telegraph department.

Captain Frank Lockwood of the Canadian President arrived in port on Tuesday evening with a fine catch of furs in the vicinity of Gardner Canal.

The following terms in common use on the windjammer will

doubtless be of interest to some motor boat owners. While the motor boat does not worry much about the wind, when the engine is hitting on all cylinders, there are occasions when the art of sailing is useful.

The sailboatman terms the side of his craft toward which the wind blows, the weather side. The other side is the leeward side. Off the wind, indicates that the vessel is sailing with the wind abaft the beam. Down the wind, means sailing with the wind over the taffrail. Into the wind's eye, into the wind, or heading to windward, all indicate that the boat is heading in the direction from which the wind comes. Running before it, running down the wind, all indicate a course directly away from the point from which the wind comes. A beam wind, is one which blows directly at the boat's side or at right angles with her keel.

Jack says the stunt worked alright but for the fact that the water splashed too much and put out the fire, besides coming underneath the cabin door and washing the wall paper off the floor. The Olympia, owned by H. Pattinson, broke her mooring at the floats at Cow Bay during the week and after drifting around for a while quietly sank. The submerged craft has been towed into the bone yard creek at Cow Bay, where it is expected repairs will be made.

The Lydia K. and the Napoleon Bruno arrived in port early in the week from Dundas Island with a number of Mink skins aboard. The trip had not been so successful as had been anticipated owing to the skipper becoming the victim of influenza, which put the lid on their activities.

The launch Rex made port on Monday with a cargo of 17 first class mink furs.

Captain Vic Marekland of Maunley Island arrived in port on Tuesday morning towing his new hull. The engine is to be transferred from the old boat to the new hull at Cow Bay, and it was with this object in view that Cap came across.

Several rowboats have been taken from this port to Wark Channel preparatory to the spring salmon trolling.

The Asolando, owned by J. C. Brady, has been put in dry dock at Cow Bay to undergo spring repairs.

The Beaver Cove, Captain Bud Corley, left port on Thursday morning for the high spots.

Unless you can wield a hammer and saw in good shape keep away from the N. M. McLean shipyards, as Mac is too busy to talk politics these days. The hull, which is being built at these yards for Captain Saunders, is practically completed and will be ready for the water in a few days. The Lear Bros. hull is doing fine, and this also will be in the water very soon. The dimensions are 15 ft. long by 11 ft. 8 inches beam, and a depth of 6 ft. 6 inches, with a carrying capacity of 25,000 pounds.

The tug McCullough left port at 7 a.m. on Thursday morning for Georgetown mills for a scow load of boxes for the local fish houses and also a scow load of lumber for the Big Bay Lumber Company yards for local consumption.

The Big Bay Lumber Company were successful in obtaining the contract for the lumber for the new \$3,500 Fortier house which is to be built on Eighth Avenue facing Fulton Street. The lumber arrived per scow on Thursday morning from the Georgetown mills.

A gang of workmen are busy around Cow Bay tearing down

the elevated roadway approach from Cow Bay to First Avenue to permit of the continuation of the new roadway.

The new warehouse for Albert & McCaffery, situated opposite their office building is nearing completion. When finished this will be used as a warehouse for double dressed lumber.

The schooner Atlantic, Captain Gjeide, arrived in port early Thursday morning from the high spots with 40,000 pounds of halibut aboard. This is the first big schooner to arrive in port this season. Captain Gjeide was formerly skipper of the Tom and L. one of the big American schooners out of Seattle, and has now purchased an interest in the Atlantic.

Billy Miller is in port from Porecher Island, and is busy packing out provisions for the ranchers in that district.

The Skeena River Snag Boat, Captain John Mulligan, has been in port from Digby Island for the past week undergoing repairs and general overhaul. Upon completion of this work the snag boat will proceed to Naas River for a month and will then return to the Skeena River for the balance of the season.

The Bill Shrubbsal smoked cod interests are doing a "smoky" business these days, and if one wants to see two real live optimists, just drop into the Shrubbsal smoke house on the government wharf and chat to the Shrubbsal Bros., but make it snappy. While it is reported the industry has been somewhat handicapped lately for the lack of fish, sufficient fish has been forthcoming to permit of all orders being readily filled. W. Shrubbsal, the managing director of the thriving concern, intimated that business was picking up well and that he looked forward to a marked invasion of eastern markets when the fish supply became assured.

The launch 23, Captain H. Gilbert, has just completed her annual overhaul and is now ready for the forthcoming season's business.

The following boats arrived in port early in the week with light catches, and after discharging cargoes hit for the high spots immediately. Reveille, Teddy J., Imperieuse, Pair of Jacks, Star, Bringgold and Wolverine.

QUEER CRAFT SEEN AT SEAL COVE IS LATEST INVENTION

Anyone who is interested in late model pleasure boats take a trip to Orwig Bay, Seal Cove, and witness the remodelling of a long narrow craft which resembles a speed boat in some ways. The owner intends to add a couple of new inventions which he claims are his own although some who have seen the craft are not inclined to give him all the credit for similar inventions were recently described in a written account in "Pacific Motor Boat."

One of the principal of these inventions is a trap door in the bottom of the ship with a window in it. Another is a new style motor which is suspended from the top of the cabin with ropes. The power is derived from the atmosphere.

The owner of the craft at Seal Cove has discovered new uses for these improvements to motor boats not to mention the unlimited supply of cheap fuel. The trap door in the bottom will provide a means of escape if the ship should turn turtle and under ordinary circumstances those riding in the boat can make faces at the fishes.

The suspended motor allows of direct passage to the cockpit when the motor is smoking badly thus reducing the liability to be gassed. It also gives the passengers something to hang on to in heavy weather.

The name of the ship is to be changed when alterations are completed, the old name at present being painted over with a thin coat of paint which only allows of "Flo" being seen. However, the sister ship's name is "Roland Neptune." The new name will be "Florence Neptune."

SPENT NOBEL PRIZE MONEY ON TAPESTRIES

Anatole France Put Part of Cash in Bonds—Other Winners.

STOCKHOLM, March 23.—Anatole France, the French author who won the \$10,000 Nobel Prize for literature last awarded, has just appeared the curiosity of the Swedish public by telling how he spent and invested the money. Most of it is already disposed of, he announced.

"The Nobel Prize awarded me," said M. France, "has given rise to much talk and stupidities. I have spent some of the money for some very beautiful Gobelin tapestries—exquisite, royal ones. The rest of the money I have invested in French national defense bonds. I consider that an excellent and most comfortable means of investment."

Knut Hamsun, the Norwegian novelist, whose "Growth of Soil" helped win for him the Nobel Prize for literature, showed that he was in earnest when he wrote the above-mentioned book. He invested most of the Nobel Prize in bloated stock and other improvements for his farm in Norway.

It will be recalled that Theodore Roosevelt who won the Nobel Peace Prize in 1906 for his efforts in bringing to an end the Russo-Japanese War gave his \$40,000 to the Foundation for Promoting Industrial Peace.

FINNAN HADDIE ARE DESCRIBED

Fisheries Department Article Tells of Habits, Use and Value of Haddock.

From various traditions we learn that the European fishermen were lured to the great fishing banks of the western Atlantic a century before Columbus discovered America, says a Dominion Fisheries article.

The predominating fishery of these early days was for cod, but it was not long before the haddock began to be caught in far greater numbers. Today thousands and thousands of people are engaged in catching this fish. It has grown so in favor with the public as a food that now it is one of the most important of deep-sea edibles.

Is a Quiet Fish.
The haddock is a quiet fish, with very little life in it when taken from the bottom. To catch haddock the fisherman employs a hand-line equipped with two or three hooks baited with herring, squid or capelin, or sometimes clams, &c., with a lead sinker to weight the line down. A fisherman is adept in operating these lines and may operate several at a time from his dory. Haddock when caught by this method is considered by many as superior even to the cod.

A long line, some 2000 feet in length, commonly called a trawl, is used by the deep sea fishermen with perhaps as many as 800 hooks. But in recent years steam trawlers have come into use on this side of the Atlantic and this has resulted in a tremendous increase in the take of haddock. The fishing apparatus of a steam trawler is a huge bag of heavy netting shaped like a cone. This bag is drawn slowly over the head of the sea and great quantities of bottom-dwelling fishes are trapped in it.

During the months of April, May, June and the last months of the year the haddock is very abundant off our Atlantic coast and it is then that the largest catches are made. The haddock is seldom seen at the surface, but is a bottom-feeder. Although a bottom-dweller, the eggs being lighter than the seawater rise to the surface and are scattered over a vast expanse of the sea during the spawning season which is from April to June on our coasts.

Swim in Large Schools.
Haddock swim from place to place in large dense schools. They usually weigh from four to five pounds each and are distinguished by lateral black lines on the body and a dark spot on either side just behind the gills. This peculiar spotting has led to the belief that was common in different countries that the haddock is the fish from whose

FULL TRAIN LOAD OF AUSTRALIAN ONIONS

Were Rushed Through to Eastern Points on a Special Train

As showing the varied character of import business when once a port gets busy is shown in an article published in the "Daily Produce News of Seattle" which is in part as follows:

"Many special trains loaded with raw silks have been shipped from Seattle to the Atlantic coast and trainloads of automobiles have made special trips to the Pacific coast but never before in the history of the country's vegetable industry has a special train of produce been shipped from the Pacific to the Atlantic coast."

This unusual trans-continental shipment consists of thirty-eight straight carloads of approximately 12,000 crates of imported Australian onions which arrived in Vancouver, B.C. last Sunday evening in the hold of the steamer Niagara. Quick work was performed in transferring the onions to the cars as the special train left over the Canadian Pacific for the east last night in charge of an inspector.

Sold in East

The onions were shipped by the Robertson & Morris Co., of Vancouver and have been sold to large jobbing houses in Toronto, Montreal and Halifax. Railroad officials are much interested in the special and will endeavor to make a record fast trip across the continent. All precautions have been taken against the possibility of a wreck as it was feared that not only the train crew, but the entire countryside would be gassed from the onion fumes in case of a collision, it was said.

SOUTHERN ALBERTA AND NEW OIL FIELD

Well at Kevin Over Border is Not a Gusher But Will Produce.

LETHBRIDGE, March 24.—

With the first barrage of rapid fire rumors of the Kevin, Montana oil strike cleared away and the truth made accessible, two facts stand out today as pretty clearly established. First, the discovery of oil in commercial quantities in the Gordon Campbell well is certain, and second, the well is not likely to be a gusher, as at first expected.

Tom Brown, Arthur Baalim and Hugh Crawford, Lethbridge oil men, after a thorough investigation of the proposition on the ground, give positive confirmation that a real discovery of exceptionally high-grade crude oil has been found, that it will be a pumping proposition rather than a flowing well of oil and that it is probable that it will be a 500 to 700 barrel well.

The men declare that the arch extends into Alberta and that rigs will doubtless soon get busy in this province.

Never Saw Finer.

Tom Brown, who is a veteran oil man said: "I never saw finer oil sands than the grade at Kevin. After being washed twelve times, the granules when placed on the tongue still tasted oily showing that they were saturated with the fluid. This is an acid test of oil sands. It is my firm opinion that the well indicates a big permanent productive field. It has been found that neither gas nor water is forcing up the oil, which removes the probability of a gusher. It looks like a real well, nevertheless, and oil men of long experience have learned that the gusher type is usually of short life."

Already there is strong talk here of a refinery should further wells be found. Lethbridge is about seventy miles from the Sweet Grass field, Lewiston, Montana, is sixty miles from the Cat Creek field. With excellent railway facilities and water and coal in abundance, the inducements offered by Lethbridge are considered very attractive.

Mr. Meighen promised that he would further the idea, and it is said he will introduce the matter during the session. The present agitation is for the appointment of "Judge" Emily Murphy of Edmonton.

Today, Miss Agnes McPhail, M. P., was interviewed in the expectation that she would be sympathetic, but she was far from it.

"As I do not believe in the senate as an institution," she said, "I could not consistently recommend the making of any further appointments to it."

STILL SEARCHING FOR AMBROSE SMALL

Renewed Interest in Two Year Old Mystery at Toronto.

TORONTO, March 25.—Interest has suddenly kindled in the two-year-old mystery surrounding the disappearance of the Toronto millionaire, Ambrose J. Small, and there is a demand in several quarters for a widening of the scope of the investigation rather than continuing it as a "one-man job." Detective Mitchell, who has been working on the case, having failed to solve the mystery, pressure is being brought to bear on the board of police commissioners to take action.

The Misses Small, sisters of the missing man, are carrying on an independent inquiry through their solicitor and other friends are equally active. The Toronto Telegram put new life into the investigation last night by publishing an affidavit signed by a barber named Weatherup, who claims he shaved Mr. Small on the day he disappeared and that he saw him consult his watch before leaving the shop and keys were found under his pillow at home on the morning following his disappearance, although the evidence up to the present has indicated he left his theatre for home on December 2, 1919, but never reached there.

The police department admitted last night that this affidavit was "news to them" and they were inclined to attach little importance to it.

BETRAYER OF EDITH CAVELL IS ON TRIAL

"The Perfect Traitor" is Being Brought to Justice: Evidence Against Him

PARIS, March 25.—The trial of Armand Jeannes, "The Perfect Traitor," who is chiefly instrumental in the betrayal of Nurse Edith Cavell to the Germans, has begun at Mons. All through the war, Jeannes worked for Germany and was responsible for the death of hundreds of Frenchmen and his own countrymen. He was a Belgian. As a reward for his work he was given a high position in the German spy system with authority over a big organization of German agents.

Just before the battle of Verdun, Jeannes furnished his superiors with the names of sixty-six French agents. Just before the attack was launched all of them were arrested, so that Marshal Petain had to defend Verdun without information as to the enemy's movements, other than the British could furnish him.

More than two hundred reports written by "The Perfect Traitor" were found by the Belgian authorities. They had been left behind by the Germans, and if sustained, any one is sufficient to convict him. No attorney would voluntarily defend Jeannes and the court was finally obliged to appoint counsel for him.
