British Political Crisis Been Delayed CANADIAN GOVERNMENT WINS FIRST VICTORY IN PARLIAMENT

British Political Crisis Set for Monday Next when Lloyd George will Move Resolution

LONDON, March 29.—Lloyd George is back in London and is concerning himself primarily with the Irish situation. When the conference is concluded he will take up other pressing matters. Next Monday he will himself introduce the eagerly awaited resolution on the Genoa conference, on which the Government will ask for a vote of confidence.

The terms of the resolution will be: "Resolved that this House approve the resolutions passed by the Supreme Council at Cannes as the basis of the Genoa conference and will support His Majesty's Government in endeavoring to give effect to them." A wonderful speech in support of the resolution is anticipated.

Whether Sir George Younger and his Conservative following will make an endeavor to upset the Government and destroy the Genoa conference is a moot question. They are being urged forward by the Northcliffe Press, but on the other hand there are ameliorating influences at work that may whip the recalcitrants into line and secure a strong support for the Premier so that the British delegation to Genoa may have the preponderant influence at the big economic conference.

MURDER WAS ATTEMPTED OF P. MILUKOFF

Supporter Gave Life for Soviet
Representative Lecturing in
Berlin.

BERLIN, March 29.—An attempt made to assassinate Professor Paul Milukoff, representative of the Russian Soviet Government, while he was addressing a gathering of Russians in Berlin. One of the supporters of the speaker threw himself in front of Milukoff and received the bullet, as a result of which he instantly died. Several other shots were fired but Milukoff escaped.

LOCKOUT OF ENGINEERS

Notice Posted Announcing Take
Effect One Week From
Today.

LONDON, March 29.—The engineering employers' association today posted notices locking out members of the union.

The notice will affect 47 unions in addition to the Amalgamated engineers' union. It will take effect one week hence and will affect 600,000 additional men.

ANOTHER SKEENA RIVER JAPANESE IS FOUND GUILTY

T. Kakihara, of Balmoral, charged with having a still unlawfully in his possession, pleaded guilty before Magistrate Mc-Mullin this morning and was fined \$200 and costs.

Similar charges against Y. Inouye, Y. Inouye, K. Oseki and T. Toki are now being heard.

Court was in session on the cases all morning and is continuing this afternoon.

OPPOSE SETTLEMENT OF GRECO-TURKISH DISPUTE BY POWERS

LONDON, March 29.—Late news from Ankara indicates there is likely to be a strong majority against the acceptance of the allied proposals for a settlement of the near eastern question in which Turkey and Greece are primarily involved. This news comes from Constantinople to the Evening News.

ACTIVE WORK OF SETTLING CENTRAL B. C.

Land Settlement Board Be-
coming Active to Co-op-
erate with Puttallo.

VICTORIA, March 29.—Land Settlement Board announces that it is preparing to proceed with the active settlement of the lands of Central British Columbia. It is securing full information as to the possible markets in the Prince Rupert district and also in other directions and intends to make this a record year in regard to placing people on the land.

While the Land Settlement Board is operated under the Minister of Agriculture, that department is co-operating with the Minister of Lands in his plans for bringing in settlers from Great Britain and the United States. Every effort is to be made by the Provincial Government to get the right kind of people into the country. They must be men who will develop natural resources of the province.

COUNTER MOVE OF LIQUOR MEN

Government Control Asked by
Moderation Leagues of Man-
itoba and Ontario.

TORONTO, March 29.—As a counter offensive to the Dominion Alliance drive for national prohibition, the moderation leagues of Manitoba and Ontario have sent a memorial to Premier Mackenzie King demanding a move for national government control of the liquor business. Mr. King has promised every consideration.

BEER AND SPIRITS IN GREAT BRITAIN GREAT REDUCTION

LONDON, Mar. 29.—Rt. Hon. Sir Robert Horne, chancellor of the exchequer, stated in the House of Commons today that there was an immense decrease in the amount of beer and spirits sold in this country. The people now were drinking 1.9 gallons per head as against 2.64 in 1913. The amount of spirits consumed was now .07 gallons as against .39 in 1913.

MOUNT AETNA IN ERUPTION

Streams of Lava Flow From All
Sides of Crater and Earth-
quakes Occur.

VILLAGERS LEAVE.

LONDON, Mar. 29.—Mount Aetna is in violent eruption, says a despatch from Rome. Streams of lava are flowing from all sides of the crater and the inhabitants of the villages on the mountain side have fled from their homes. Several earthquakes occurred in Palermo and Messina provinces during the past few days.

FISHERMAN DIED AT SKEENA HOT SPRINGS

Isaac Maki Passed Away on Sun-
day Morning and Was Buried
Yesterday at Port Essington.

Isaac Maki, a well known Finnish fisherman, died suddenly last Sunday at the hot springs above Port Essington on the Skeena River.

Maki, who was about 35 years of age, had been complaining of not feeling well and left Essington on Wednesday for the springs. On Sunday morning he was found dead in bed by his partner. His body was brought to Port Essington and burial took place yesterday.

Maki had worked for some years in the Inverness and Sunnyside canneries and other plants in the Skeena slough.

ARCHDUKE IS PAUPER

Leopold of Austria Applies for
Aid; so Does His Divorced
Wife.

BASEL, Mar. 28.—The former Austrian Archduke Leopold, who broke with the house of Hapsburg ten years ago as a result of his marriage to an actress, has applied to the little town of Regensburg for aid from the paupers' fund. His wife, whom he has divorced, has also asked for aid.

Mr. and Mrs. James Hill, formerly of this city, are now in Manchester, England. Mr. Hill is in the United States consular service.

CANADIAN FINANCIER SERIOUSLY ILL.



Sir John Eaton, president and dominant personality of the great T. Eaton Company, Ltd., of Toronto and Winnipeg, the largest departmental institution of the Dominion of Canada, is seriously ill and not expected to recover. In official circles he is known as the foremost civilian in cooperation with the forces of the Government during the war period. Sir John was knighted in 1915 and was incidentally recipient in 1917 of the special decoration of the Navy League, this being an exceptional honor, but twenty-eight persons in the Empire in the last twenty years winning the decoration. During the war 2,532 voluntary recruits went from his establishments to the war—this splendid body representing 39.25 per cent. of the company's male employees. And while the men were fighting for flag and freedom Sir John provided liberally for their families at home, this wage roll of patriotism exceeding \$2,000,000 in the ultimate total.

Liberal and Progressives Vote Side by Side to Defeat Hostile Conservative Motion

OTTAWA, March 29.—The Conservative amendment to the Government motion in the House of Commons was defeated by a vote of 162 to 42. The amendment was technically a vote of no confidence, and the Government majority of 120 constitutes a decisive victory. It was a straight party vote.

The Progressives voted with the Government with the solitary exception of Miss Agnes McPhail, the woman member, who abstained. The vote came thirty minutes after the dinner hour and a number of members had gone home, not expecting a vote until the evening session.

OTTAWA, March 29.—A resolution amounting to a vote of non-confidence was moved in the House of Commons yesterday afternoon by Col. Arthur, seconded by H. H. Stevens, both Conservatives. The resolution was an amendment to one that the House go into committee of the whole to consider supply. It brought up again the question whether Liberals prior to the election promised cash bonuses to returned men.

The amendment referred further to the plank of the Liberal platform of 1919 in regard to cash grants and declared this policy had been continuously held by Liberals before the people of Canada. Failure on the part of Liberals to put this policy into effect constituted "a repudiation of solemn obligations and disregard of political honor."

J. H. Simmons, head of the Simmons Construction Co., of Winnipeg, which is now completing the contract for the building of the superstructure on the new ocean dock here, arrived in the city from the East by last night's train.

RUSSIAN SOVIET DELEGATES ON WAY TO GENOA

Reached Riga This Morning, Com-
pleting First Stages of
Their Journey.

LONDON, Mar. 29.—A telegraphic despatch received here from Riga says that the members of the Russian Soviet delegation to the Genoa conference arrived there today, completing the first stage of their journey to Italy.

Much of the opposition in this country to the conference is caused by reluctance of the conservative factions to agree to conferring with the Soviet representatives.

The Coastwise Shipping Company's barge Independent, which turned turtle two miles off Anyox when bringing 500 tons of Premier ore to the smelter last week, is in the local dry dock for repairs.

Toronto St. Patricks are Hockey Champions Winning World Series

TORONTO, March 29.—The St. Patricks of this city won the third and final victory in the Stanley Cup series, defeating the Vancouver Millionaires five goals to one and taking the world's professional hockey championship for 1922. There was an immense crowd present to watch the game and excitement ran high. The fact that Vancouver had already won two out of four previous games made the result uncertain.

The Toronto team started with a rush and Dye scored four goals for the home team within the first five minutes, which seemed to put the game on ice figuratively as well as literally. The fifth goal was scored by Denny, while Vancouver's lone goal was put through by Adams just before the final bell.

Having secured a good lead in the first period, Toronto went on the ice in the second determined to put a stubborn defence in order to maintain the position. They maintained a stone wall against the attacks of the west-coasters. When Vancouver massed before the Toronto goal in a desperate effort to break the deadlock, Toronto would send three-man rushes down to the neglected Vancouver goal and shoot.

Toronto's goalie, Roach, was struck by the puck in the first period which was delayed twenty minutes while the doctor attended to the injury. Roach then finished the game bandaged, but triumphant.

TOO MANY MEN LOOK FOR JOB

Fifty Employed on Railway to
Dam at Anyox—Many Idle
There.

ANYOX, March 29.—The work on the construction of the railway to the new dam is proceeding satisfactorily, there being some fifty men employed on the job.

As there are a number of men at present in town unemployed, a note of warning should be issued to those who contemplate seeking work at Anyox that there are no vacancies in any department of the Granby Company's business at the present time. Several men have visited Anyox recently on the off-chance of securing work and while the Granby Company is anxious to relieve the labor situation as far as it lies in their power, they feel that it is a hardship on would-be employees to have the expense of travelling and living in town with no prospect of work.

GLASGOW ELECTION RESULTS IN DEFEAT OF LABOR AND SOCIALISTS

LONDON, Mar. 29.—The election of the new board of education in the city of Glasgow resulted in a decisive defeat for the Labor and Socialist candidates. The Catholics also lost four seats.

TEX RICKARD FOUND NOT TO BE GUILTY SEDUCTION CHARGE

NEW YORK, March 29.—Tex Rickard has been found not guilty by the supreme court jury of the charge of seduction of girls who were minors.

PREMIER KING NOT FAVOR OF PROHIBITION

Says There is No Possibility of
Introduction of Measure This
Session.

OTTAWA, March 29.—"I am not in favor of prohibition in anything but I do favor temperance in everything," said Premier Mackenzie King to a large delegation of representatives of the Dominion Alliance of Canada, which met him and other members of the Government yesterday afternoon and asked that the Government enact a Dominion law prohibiting the manufacture, importation and inter-provincial transportation of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes at the present session. Premier King decisively assured the delegates that there was no possibility of the introduction of a measure of total prohibition at the present session of Parliament.

IRISH CONFER OVER CRISIS

Representatives of North and
South Meet with Lloyd George
in London.

LONDON, March 29.—The promised conference between representatives of northern and southern Ireland and the British Government began this morning for a discussion of the Irish crisis. The deliberations were carried on with much official secrecy.

The people of Britain are keenly interested in the outcome of the conference. The high feeling between north and south in Ireland has given rise to the expectation that civil war would result. The action of the Republican army in acting independently of the Irish Free State authorities has also caused alarm.

RAID MADE ON POLICE BARRACKS IN IRELAND

Fifteen Constables with Arms
and Ammunition Carried
Across Border.

BELFAST, March 29.—The police barracks at Belleau near Cavan on the border of Fermanagh was raided last night by armed men. Of the garrison of 21 Irish constabulary and specials only six escaped. The other fifteen with all their arms and ammunition were carried into Free State territory.

Immigration to Fill Vacant Lands.

Australia has been encouraging immigration and the result has been that thousands of British people have flocked to that country since the war, while Canada has secured very few. This has been noted by the Canadian statesmen and as a result efforts are to be made to get our share of the settlers. The lands here are vacant and there are people across the Pacific who are anxious to come. We must either let the people from the East into those lands or we must populate them elsewhere. We can not permanently carry on with a dog-in-the-manger policy. The Indians were dispossessed because they were not using the country. So we shall be dispossessed if we do not use it.

As a nation Canadians are not in favor of creating a standing army or spending large sums on a navy. As a matter of fact they are not a very military people. The Japanese are a military people and are very ambitious. If we are going to stand on the threshold of the country and keep people out we must be prepared to spend immense sums in providing an army and navy and coast defences. Eventually we shall have to defend our unoccupied country. If, however, the country is filled with white settlers there will be no cause for any country to look with envious eyes on it. This is not an imaginary case. It is simply an argument based on history.

Vision of Future Needed by Statesmen.

Vision for the future is needed by statesmen. We all look to the future, but we must learn to see things large. The member for this district has the vision in regard to immigration and it is to be hoped that he can impress the Ottawa people with his views and get them to co-operate in carrying out a vigorous policy. There are plenty of people anxious to come to this country, but in the past every obstacle has been put in their way. We want to make it easy to come here, easy to get land, easy to get started. At the same time we want the class of people who will make good.

New York Police Commission Ridiculous.

The New York police commission made itself ridiculous in attempting to legislate against women exercising the same rights as men. The United States is still a long way behind other countries in the matter of women's rights.

This is not an argument in favor of women smoking in public but it is in favor of women having the same rights as men. If men can walk around puffing a cigar there seems to be no reason why a woman, if she wishes, should not chew the end of a stogie and blow out occasional clouds of smoke as she chats with a friend on the street corner.

We are met with the argument that it does not seem right. That women are respected more if they avoid doing these things. Granted. It does not seem right, and women are more highly respected if they avoid conduct of that kind, but as long as we do that sort of thing and spit all over the sidewalk, we have no right to demand that women should not have the right. It is up to her. If women are to be prevented from smoking in public, the regulation should also apply to men. Either would be ridiculous. Excess of zeal in small matters and a lack of zeal in matters which really mean something leads many officials astray. There is a lack of proportion in the minds of many which leads them to see small things important and large things unimportant.

Curious Case of Rat Fish Wound.

The story recounted yesterday of how the fisherman who was seriously injured by a rat fish caused a great deal of comment and interest around town last evening. It reminds us how little those who are not fishermen know of the denizens of the deep, their habits and structure. It reminds us that the fishermen have a knowledge of nature of which most of us are very ignorant. Perhaps some day we shall have in Prince Rupert a museum where samples of these curious fish may be kept and where we may get some idea of what they are.

ALBERTA RAISE STANDARD OF HIGH SCHOOL

Province Follows Lead of British Columbia in Making Change.

EDMONTON, March 29.—Following the lead of British Columbia the school authorities here have decided to raise the standard of high school work. The following are the general principles affecting the change:

1—Greater flexibility of the course to meet varying needs of pupils under different conditions and to meet limitations of various school boards.

2—Reduction of a number of subjects to be taken concurrently.

3—Provincial examinations in all subjects. All applicants for these examinations must be admitted, whether qualifying on day or night schools, promotion being by subjects.

4—Minimum standard of efficiency to be further considered and probably raised to 50 per cent. The minimum is now 34 per cent.

5—Course for graduation from high school to be extended to four years, but provision to be made that requirements for normal entrance or junior matriculation can be completed in three years.

6—English and physical education obligatory for all four years. History for first two years.

7—Direct methods of teaching modern languages to be adopted.

8—Provision to be made for a general course to lead to a high school graduation diploma on the completion of 24 units of work.

EXAMINATION OF WALLS AT SCHOOL NOW IN PROGRESS

Following the heating out of the Booth Memorial School during the past ten days in an attempt to thoroughly dry out the walls, the city engineer is making an examination of the walls with a view to making a report to the city council and the school board on their condition. The board is taking time by the forelock and is making preparations to secure accommodation for the pupils of the school in case it is decided to close down the place until repairs are made. Eleven rooms will be needed if it is decided to take this course.

The board is having a special meeting this afternoon to appoint a successor to Miss G. Hall, resigned. Booth Memorial school matters may be also taken up at this meeting.

SENTENCED TO SIX MONTHS AT OKALLA

John Main Found Guilty of Breaking and Entering and Stealing from Mrs. Frizell's Store.

John Main, found guilty by Magistrate MacLennan of breaking and entering Mrs. Frizell's store and stealing goods as well as doing considerable damage, was sentenced to six months hard labor at Okalla Prison farm this morning. Accused said that on completion of his time, he would endeavor to make restitution of the damage he had done.

Ten Years Ago in Prince Rupert

William Manson, Conservative re-elected member of the legislature for Skeena at the election yesterday with a clear majority of 262 over the nearest candidate, A. M. Manson, Liberal. The vote was: William Manson, 723; A. M. Manson, 464; W. H. Montgomery, 244; Dr. W. B. Clayton, 81. The Conservatives made a clean sweep of the province.

J. C. Nethway, who recently visited here from the United States, was in the city looking over the local situation as a possible terminus of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railroad, it is understood.

Fred Storck, one of the best known printers of the city, passed away at the General Hospital yesterday after a brief illness.

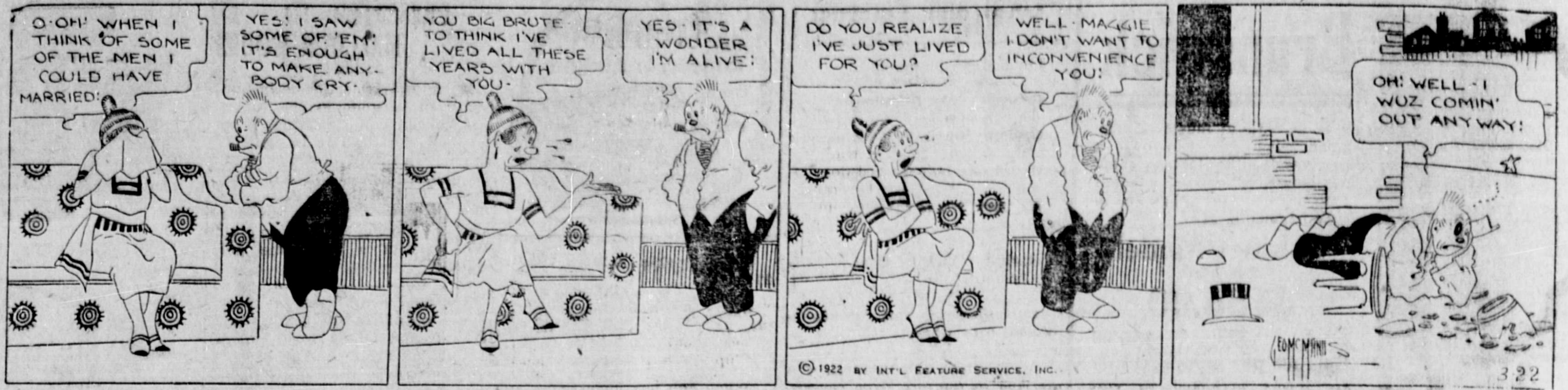

Chaplain Rev. Gibson took as his text: Proverbs, chap. 27, verses 17 and 19: "Iron sharpeneth iron; so a man sharpeneth the countenance of his friend." "As in water face answereth to face, so the heart of man to man."

Personal Influence.

We are bound together in numberless ways and it is out of this close relationship that influence comes. Our very existence exercises an influence far beyond our knowledge and beyond our calculations.

Influence is of two classes, direct and indirect, and in Proverbs 27, verses 17 and 19, both are illustrated. Direct influence is that which we deliberately put forth; indirect is that which radiates from us, whether we will it or not. In regard to direct influence, each one must choose his own line of action. There are, however, certain lines that may be dictated and which lie open to all:

(a) Keeping others in the right path.

(b) Bearing testimony against evil.

(c) Taking part in Christian and benevolent work.

Indirect is the invisible belt of magnetism which a man bears with him wherever he goes. It invests him, and others quickly detect its presence. Some of its simplest phases are the influence of a look, the influence of a smile, the influence of sympathy, the influence of example, the simple doing of what is right though we say nothing about it.

What We Learn.

The whole subject teaches us: (1) Our responsibility if we are ready to ask "Am I my brother's keeper?" the answer is, "You can not help being so." It is as easy to evade the law of gravitation as the law of responsibility. (2) The power all have to do good. (3) The secret of good influence is to be influenced by good ourselves. Our lamp must first be lit if it is to shine and we must ourselves be personally influenced by coming to the Great Source of spiritual power.

OBJECTS TO REGULATION.

Editor Daily News:

Referring to your editorial of yesterday and dispatch of T. D. Pattullo's re immigration, I beg to point out to you that the best immigration policy we could have would be to place restrictions on immigration, but advertise to the world that Canada was the land of liberty that our government was founded on the principle that every individual citizen was free to live his own life until he injured some one else, that there were no restrictions on commerce between our citizens, in fact that we gave free trade at home.

Too Much Government.

There is no doubt that we need settlers, but the immigrant leaves his home country with reluctance if he is a good citizen, and leaves because of too much government and too costly misgovernment, because too much of his labor is required to pay useless government officials.

He will not come here unless he can better himself. The assisted immigrant is the poorest of citizens for two generations. Those who come on their own, knowing they take destiny by the hand, that their individual efforts are the only means of prospering, make good citizens. Such citizens are not made by prohibitive laws nor will they come to a country where the performance of service is made a crime nor where religious intolerance exists. But they will herd in as fast as our country will absorb them if they know the country makes good on letting an honorable man sell service without having to pay for the privilege of doing so.

Honesty and Decency.

The best governed country is that which depends on the honesty and decency of its citizens to play fair. It is the most efficient, because a government official then can have some pride in his work. It is the least expensive, because there are less laws and law breakers, and less government officials. It is that government which prohibits only the individual who injures some one else.

There is no hope of getting good citizens to come here if we have so many law officers to enforce law that the burden of taxes is equal or nearly so to the countries these people are asked to leave. Nor is there any hope of getting good citizens to come if we start off by making beggars of them by pampering them on one hand and grafting off them on the other.

There is no man who is given authority over another to interfere with and regulate another man's private life or business, who can stay straight. The temptation to use his power for graft or revenge or friendship is too great.

The best governed country is the least governed.

LIQUOR EXPORT AND THE LAW

Association Decides to See Customs Regulations Not Evaded.

VANCOUVER, March 29.—The federal government through the port of Vancouver, is benefiting to the extent of twenty dollars a case, or about five million dollars yearly through the action of the newly-formed Licensed Export Association of Vancouver, according to an unnamed member of that association.

Consisting of about twenty licensed liquor dealers, and with a membership that takes in firms in Vancouver, Victoria, Grand Forks and Prince Rupert, the new organization, in addition to giving prices at which liquor will be sold to outside sources, also refuses to handle any liquor that does not pass through the customs, it is stated.

Scrutinize Shipments.

"All liquor handled by members of the association has been cleared from bond and duty to the extent of twenty dollars a case has been paid on it," said the member. "We are doing our bit to see that the government of Canada gets its dues and the members of the association feel that the customs officials should scrutinize shipments going out in bond more carefully. If shipments land in places where they come in competition with goods on which duty has been paid they have an advantage of \$20 a case, and they encourage attempts at trying to get whiskey away without clearing through the customs. This is one of the reasons for the formation of the association."

Price Raised.

Regarding stories from Seattle that the association raised the price of liquor on the Seattle bootleggers, he explained that it was true prices had been raised from about \$5 to \$8 a case on various brands. "It is a protective association," he said. "There was a great deal of price-cutting and a lot of attempting to get whiskey out without paying duty, and we formed this association to have laws and to sell at fair prices that will allow reasonable return on investment. The price-cutting got so bad that one firm, after putting auditors in, found it had been selling at a loss of 80 cents a case, so it was time that something was done in the matter."

HOWLING DOWN LABOR LEADER

Toronto Globe Criticizes Action of Reds in Not Hearing Tom Moore.

A week ago Tom Moore, trades unionist leader, was howled down at the Labor Temple at Toronto. Criticizing this action the Toronto Globe says:

"It is important that the trades unionists who constitute the backbone of organized labor in Canada, as well as employees of labor, should understand why Tom Moore, president of the Trade and Labor Congress, was howled down on Sunday by an audience of workers at the Labor Temple. Mr. Moore is opposed to communism. He does not believe that the condition of the wage-worker will be improved by destroying the present economic system and substituting for it a system under which the machinery of production will be operated entirely by the state, and private property will be abolished. He had the temerity to tell a group of 'Reds' that he, for one, would object to forcing a Soviet system upon the people of Canada.

Speaks for Labor.

"In making these statements Mr. Moore undoubtedly speaks, not for himself alone, but for the great body of the organized trades unionists of the Dominion. The Canadian workman, with few exceptions, is not a communist, and there is no possibility of lining him up with the European Reds who would fill the world with the horrors that have made Russia a tragic word. It is because Mr. Moore and those who follow him are not to be led away from the tried methods of trades union organization into the paths of revolutionary 'direct action' that they are denounced as 'class traitors' and held up to the contempt of their fellow-workmen as theorists who talked at Geneva about 'white lead' when they should have been talking about 'red lead,' the latter presumably the variety our would-be revolutionists hope to stain with the blood of those who fail to bow to the Marxian philosophy as expounded by Lenin and Trotsky.

War on Unions.

"The abuse to which Mr. Moore and other moderate leaders of organized labor are subjected by members of the extreme 'left' within the ranks of labor should not pass unnoticed by public men interested in the good government of Canada. Premier Taschereau of Quebec, who is said to have declared war on international trades unionism, and to desire that Canadian trades organizations shall take the place of the internationalists, has probably not made a sufficiently intimate study of labor organizations on this continent to know that international trades unionism is the strongest barrier that stands in the way of 'internationalism' of the Red variety. If the moderates in the labor movement are placed in a position where they must struggle against enemies within the ranks of labor and at the same time defend the very existence of trades union organization against the assaults of men holding high public office and wielding great political power, it is entirely possible that they will be crushed under the dual pressure and that the more dangerous elements in labor's ranks will gain control and endeavor to put their militant theories to the proof.

Capital and Labor.

"The relations of capital and organized trades unionism are not free from friction, and at times even bitterness, but neither employers nor employees, in the main, wish to turn aside into the 'red lead' road."

BASEBALL IN FRANCE IS FLOURISHING AND LEAGUE IS FORMED

PARIS, Mar. 29.—The French Baseball Federation, or "La Federation Francaise de Baseball," as the natives will know it, came into being this month in the club rooms of the American Legion in Paris, whose walls are covered with trophies of the great war in which Americans and French fought side by side.

There are already three all-French baseball teams in France, one in Paris, known as the Ranelagh Baseball Club; another at Roubaix and a third at Tourcoing. The Ranelagh team, who have been playing for three seasons, last year competed in a contest between the half-dozen clubs formed of Americans in Paris attached to the American banks here, the Graves Registration and other similar organizations. While the Frenchmen did not head the list at the end of the season, they were not the last on it, a noteworthy achievement when it is remembered that they played against experienced American players. This year, thanks to the Federation Francaise de Baseball which has just been founded, clubs will compete for the championship of a real French league, and the honor of being the first champions will be keenly fought for.

FRANCE IS WORRYING OVER DAYLIGHT SAVING

Cities Wish to Have It While Country Districts Oppose.

PARIS, March 29.—Town and country are waging battle in France, to determine whether daylight-saving time shall be used here next summer.

Summertime has proved so popular to the townsman that the decision of the members of the Senate to suppress it has raised a storm of protest, and every effort is being made to bring pressure to bear on the Chamber of Deputies to reverse the decision of the upper house.

Leading newspapers are taking part in the campaign for summertime. They contend that the great interest taken in athletic sports of all kinds during the last three years is due almost entirely to this measure, which enables the worker in the office or the factory to get exercise in the open air after his day's labor.

L'Auto, a daily newspaper devoted to athletics, is calling upon its readers to flood their representatives in parliament with petitions for the maintenance of summertime.

In the country, however, summertime seems to have proved distasteful, and farmers and land laborers are just as obstinate in their determination to suppress it. Representing a large part of the electorate, they also bring pressure to bear on their members of parliament. Each day argument grows hotter and hotter. Versailles Treaty, Washington, Genoa, reparations are often secondary to the great controversy, summertime or no summertime.

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"SKY PILOT" TONIGHT WESTHOLME THEATRE

Tremendous Thrill in Great Cattle Stampede—Local Man Was Original Hero.

What is the biggest thrill engendered by an action rush on the screen? Was it the surging herds of revolutionaries in "Passion," the rescue-race of native canoes in "The Idol Dancer," or the thunder-gallop of the supply train in vain attempt to save General Custer in "Bob Hampton of Placer"? Or is it the mad stampede of 1000 steers, charging headdown on a defenceless girl and a battling man in "The Sky Pilot"? Each has its own adherents, but there is one man at least who would welcome all the other thrills as something easy compared to the spinal shivers he experienced while facing that cattle stampede in Ralph Connor's famous story of the Canadian ranches, John Bowers, stands over the body of an injured little ranch girl and faces the onrush of terror-stricken cattle.

Pistols clinched, teeth gritted the Sky Pilot stood his ground in that eventful moment when a thousand head of cattle stampeded towards him. Four times his clothes were ripped by steer horns before he even paid heed to his bruises. The fifth instance took the matter out of his hands, however. A wild steer howled him over, with a resultant wound that required six stitches.

No Faking.

The scenes of the cattle stampede in "The Sky Pilot" are said to rival any "thrill scenes" ever shown on the screen. There was no faking, no doubling, no tricks. Bowers stood to his task until he was knocked to the ground; and the several hundred feet of this cattle stampede, practically all of which is close-up photography will make a striking impression when seen on the screen.

Additional interest is lent to this picture when it is remembered that it was a local man who was the original sky pilot and who inspired the story which Ralph Connor wrote.
