OREGON SEAPORT LAID IN RUINS BY FIRE

MURDER AND REPRISALS FOLLOW CLOSE ON EACH OTHER SOUTH IRELAND

Fifteen Million Dollar Blaze Devastates Sixteen Blocks in Business District of Astoria

ASTORIA, Oregon, Dec. 8.—The business district of Astoria was laid in ruins by a fire which broke out shortly after 2 o'clock this morning and, despite the efforts of the fire department and reinforcements from Portland, the flames swept fifteen blocks causing loss which is estimated early at between \$10,000,000 and \$15,000,000.

So far it is known that one life was lost as a result of the fire, Norris Staples, president of the Astoria Bank, having dropped dead.

By nine o'clock, the fire had swept the entire district between Astor Street and the river front, south to Exchange Street and north and south between Eighth and Sixteenth Streets. Between Eleventh and Twelfth Streets it penetrated as far as Franklin Street.

The fire got out of control because the flames took hold underneath of buildings and burned through the piling on which the city is built. The streets collapsed with the burning of the piling.

All the docks were saved. It is expected that the fire will burn itself out at the east end of the city as only a few buildings remain in its path.

The port of Astoria is one of the most important seaports on the Pacific Coast of the United States. It is located at the mouth of the Columbia River, nearly 100 miles from Portland, and is the entrepot of the great volume of shipping that passes into the river. It is also a fishing and lumbering port of importance. It is an old city and was established over 100 years ago as a fur trading post, receiving its name from the famous Astor family. Its population is given as 15,000.

ELECTIONS IN NEW ZEALAND

Government, 39 Seats; Liberals, 19; and Labor, 17.

WELLINGTON, N.Z., Dec. 8.—The latest returns from the New Zealand elections show that the government has thirty-five seats, the Liberals have nineteen and Labor, seventeen. There may be changes when the late returns are received as the voting is very close. So far the government have won two seats and lost seven. Labor has won some seats while the Liberals lost five and won four. The Labor gains are principally due to splits in the voting in certain towns. Returns from the licensing referendum so far show a majority against prohibition.

PROHIBITION TURNED DOWN BY NEW ZEALAND

South Sea Dominion Gave a Big Vote Against it in Plebiscite

LONDON, Dec. 8.—New Zealand gave a big vote against Prohibition in the plebiscite taken concurrently with the general elections in Australia, says a despatch to the Daily Express.

EIGHT HOUR DAY BILL IS BEATEN

VICTORIA, Dec. 8.—The eight hour day bill, introduced by Major Richard Burde, member for Albert, was rejected by the legislature last night by a vote of 22 to 18. Party lines were abandoned in the vote. Labor members and some Liberals supported the measure. H. F. Kergin, member for Altn and H. G. Perry, Prince George, voted for the bill and Hon. A. M. Manson and Hon. T. D. Pattullo, against.

The discussion occupied nearly all the afternoon.

PRACTITIONER SAYS CHIROPRACTIC GOOD

Dr. Mercer Gave Evidence Before Committee Yesterday—Good Results Obtained

VICTORIA, Dec. 8.—Dr. Mercer, chiropractor, in giving evidence before the chiropractic committee yesterday, declared he had treated 3000 patients in Victoria with good results. He said the theory was genuine and has been proved scientifically as well as by results.

SEAMEN'S STRIKE WILL BE DISASTER

Australian Dockers' Union Urges That Strikers Give up and Return to Work

SYDNEY, Australia, Dec. 8.—The Dockers' Union is urging striking seamen not to continue the strike which has tied up shipping at this port for several weeks. The Union says that a continuation of the strike will prove disastrous.

PREMIER MUSSOLINI OF ITALY COMING TO LONDON PARLEY

LONDON, Dec. 8.—Premier Mussolini of Italy has accepted an invitation to come to London and attend a conference of premiers at the week-end. The meeting will be preliminary to the Brussels conference on reparations. Mussolini started from Rome yesterday.

Premier Mussolini dined with Lord Curzon at Lansdowne yesterday. He said that Italy would back the Allies in their Turkish policy. He hoped a settlement would be reached for, otherwise, there would be war.

TWO DEPUTIES ARE ATTACKED

Sean Hales is Killed and Patrick O'Malley, of South Irish Parliament, Wounded

DUBLIN, Dec. 8.—President Cosgrove announced to Parliament yesterday afternoon that Deputy Sean Hales had been shot and killed and Deputy Patrick O'Malley, who is also deputy speaker, had been wounded while they were on their way to a session of parliament. They were on a jaunting car proceeding along the quays when they were attacked by men carrying revolvers.

FOUR CHILDREN ARE BURNED TO DEATH

CHICAGO, Dec. 8.—Four children named Budak were burned to death and their father and mother and two other children were injured when fire destroyed the Budak home.

Reprisal Quickly Follows on Shooting of Irish Deputies Four Executions this Morning

DUBLIN, Dec. 8.—Rory O'Connor and Liam Mellowes, together with Joseph McKelvey and Richard Barrett, Irish rebels, were executed in Mount Joy prison this morning, it was officially announced today. The official army report states that the four men were executed as a reprisal for the assassination of Sean Hales, the deputy shot yesterday, and as a solemn warning to those associated with them in the "conspiracy of assassination against representatives of the Irish people."

O'Connor and Mellowes were leaders of a band of Irish insurgents that held the Four Courts building in Dublin in the stand against the Free State last June. They were tried by the military court martial during the night and found guilty, then sentenced to death.

The executions caused a great sensation.

O'Connor who was an engineer by profession held an appointment in Western Canada until the outbreak of war when he went back to Ireland.

WILL FIGHT TILL DEATH

Irish Republicans Describe Healy as Enemy of Nation

LONDON, Dec. 8.—The Irish Republicans, says a despatch to the Evening Standard from Dublin, have issued a manifesto describing Timothy Healy, the governor-general of the Irish Free State, as a lifelong enemy of the nation. The manifesto adds, "The fight will go on as long as there is a man in Ireland. It is a war to the death."

INDIAN CHIEF ON WAY TO ENGLAND TO SEE THE KING

PORTLAND, Maine, Dec. 8.—Chief White Elk, head of the British Columbia Indian tribes, has arrived here enroute for England where he will lay Indian grievances before the King.

POWERFUL BOMB WAS THROWN AT MILITARY CAR CORK THURSDAY

CORK, Dec. 8.—A powerful bomb was thrown at a military car yesterday afternoon. It did not reach the mark but exploded nearby wounding two men and two women. The thrower of the bomb escaped.

Legislature Approves Liquor Importation Resolution With Vote of Thirty to Fourteen

VICTORIA, Dec. 8.—After a final debate in the legislature yesterday afternoon, Attorney General Manson's motion, asking the Dominion government to give the provincial government the sole right of importing liquor, was carried by a vote of 39 to 14. All the Independent and Labor members voted with the government.

Canon Hinchcliffe, member for Victoria, said he had changed his mind since Hon. J. W. deB. Farris' speech and would vote against the motion. He was apposed to the provision in form. The cleric member complimented the Attorney General on his efforts to enforce the Moderation Act to the best of his ability but feared that conditions were too strong for him.

David Whiteside, member for New Westminster, intimated that he did not think any form of government control would ultimately succeed. All were in earnest in giving the Moderation Act a fair trial but it was his conviction that the people would come to their senses and not allow a thing which had cursed the world since the days of Noah. He regretted reliance being placed on liquor profits by the exchequer. The curse was honey-sounding provincial insinuations every day. Perhaps, this state of affairs would soon be overthrown. He lauded the Attorney General for his sincere efforts towards enforcing the Moderation Act but feared that he might succumb to opposition from an uncontrollable traffic. The alternatives to the Moderation Act were bone dry Prohibition or open bars.

HARTLEY BAY COUPLE WERE MARRIED TODAY

Miss Edith Clifton Becomes Bride of Walter M. Bates, Rev. G. G. Macker Officiating

Walter M. Bates and Miss Edith Clifton, of Hartley Bay, were united in marriage at the Methodist Church at 1 o'clock this afternoon by Rev. G. G. Macker. The witnesses were L. P. Buxton and Mrs. L. Douglas.

The bridal party reached the city yesterday and will spend a week here before returning to Hartley Bay.

NEW TRIAL FOR HINDU CONVICT

Two Women Tell of Seeing Man Dragging Boy's Body But He Was Not Terlochin Singh

VANCOUVER, Dec. 8.—On the evidence of two women who claim they saw a Hindu dragging what is believed to have been the body of 14-year old Hukma Singh on the day the boy was murdered, application has been made for a new trial for Terlochin Singh recently convicted of murder on circumstantial evidence. The two women, who were too frightened at the time to report their encounter with the mysterious Hindu, insist that Terlochin Singh is not the man they saw with the boy's body.

SUGGESTION IS MADE BY TURKS

Have Counter Proposal Concerning Control of Dardanelles

LAUSANNE, Dec. 8.—The Turks today presented to the Near East conference a counter suggestion concerning the control of the Dardanelles and the Bosphorus. The Turks ask, first, a guarantee against surprise attacks from land and sea and, second, a limitation of the naval forces bound for the Black Sea. The third intendment upon the maintenance of warships in the Black Sea is the liberty of passage for merchantmen in time of peace or war.

Attorney General Manson closed the debate with a fine effort urging all to throw aside party inclinations in voting. He was not surprised at Mr. Bowser's position. He would rather grovel in the mire than rise to clean things in the province. There would always be crime and wrong-doing as long as there was liquor but it was their duty to restrict the harm as much as possible. The only reason that the resolution was opposed at all was because it had emanated from the government side of the House.

PRESSING FOR IRON RESEARCH

Minister of Mines Asks Legislature to Ratify Agreement and Advance \$50,000

VICTORIA, Dec. 8.—Hon. William Sloan, minister of mines, is asking the legislature for \$50,000 with which to examine iron properties in the province under agreement with the Dominion government. Dr. Young has already spent four months examining properties and will continue in the spring, Mr. Sloan said. The minister pointed to what had been done in the maritime provinces and asked the House to ratify the agreement with the Dominion and give the government the right to enter on properties and develop them, charging the work against the property without the permission of the owner.

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Both Houses in Ulster Decline Acceptance of Irish Free State Bill

BELFAST, Dec. 8.—Both houses of the Ulster parliament have adopted an address to the King contracting out of the Irish Free State as permitted under the Anglo-Irish treaty just adopted by the British House of Commons, House of Lords, and signed by the King. They decline to take part in the commission which is to define the boundaries between the North and the South.

Premier Sir James Craig, of Ulster, has gone to London with the address which formally registers Ulster's protest against the establishment of the Free State.

LUMBER SHIP AT BLAINE HAD FIRE

Willie Higgins Threatened With Destruction—One Sailor Injured

BELLINGHAM, Dec. 8.—Fire which broke out yesterday morning threatened to destroy the steamship Willie Higgins loading lumber at Blaine. It is reported that an explosion occurred in the hold of the ship and one sailor was injured.

Japanese Present Their Case.

A case for the Japanese, no doubt inspired by the present movement against Oriental immigration, is presented in a booklet entitled "Facts About Japanese in Canada and Other Miscellaneous Information," which has been published by Tamekichi Ohta, Consul General for Japan, Ottawa. The booklet contains a great deal of information, compiled from a Japanese standpoint. It tells the number of Japanese in Canada classified by age and provinces, the number of Japanese naturalized in Canada, the number of Japanese in Canada in comparison with Canadian population, the average possessed in Canada by Japanese, the numbers of Japanese arriving in Canada and those returning, excerpts of House of Commons debates on Oriental matters, summaries of trade between Canada and Japan since 1910, number of Japanese enlisted in Canadian Expeditionary Forces, amount subscribed by Japanese to the Victory Loan, excerpts from House of Commons debates regarding illicit drug traffic in Canada, employment of Japanese in B.C. fish canneries, rights enjoyed by Canadians in Japan, the civil code of Japan, foreign land ownership and leasing in Japan, Japanese law concerning nationality and treaties between Great Britain and Canada and Japan.

British Columbia Is Most Affected.

The number of Japanese in Canada, including those naturalized and those born in Canada, is given as 17,691, 11,853 males and 5,838 females. Of this number, a total of 16,867 are located in British Columbia. Another table shows that the proportion of Japanese in British Columbia to white population is 420 to 10,000. The proportion of Japanese in Canada to white population is 24 to 10,000, while other provinces are given the following figures: Alberta, 1 to 10,000; Saskatchewan, 3 to 10,000; Manitoba and Yukon, 2 to 10,000; Ontario, Quebec and New Brunswick, 0.4 to 10,000.

Figures such as these show, without any further explanation, why anti-Oriental measures are being launched in the British Columbia legislature and why it is British Columbia members of parliament, regardless of party, who are the first movers towards laws eliminating Oriental immigration. British Columbia is the province that is most affected by Oriental penetration, Chinese as well as Japanese, and the East, not having actual illustration of the situation, is slow to accept its seriousness and fall in line with the British Columbia members and government in their efforts for action.

Fighting For Canada, Fighting For Japan.

The Consul General's publication says that 197 Japanese enlisted in the Canadian Expeditionary Forces, 131 of them being wounded in action and 54 killed. It also sets forth that the Japanese of Vancouver subscribed \$235,400 to the Victory Loan.

If this is to be made an argument in favor of the Japanese as Canadian citizens, it might just as well be offset.

In the first place, the Japanese were at war with Germany just as well as Canada and, that being the case, there was no particular show of allegiance to Great Britain by enlisting in the Canadian army. They were fighting for Japan just as much as they were for Canada.

The same may be said of their subscriptions to the Victory Loan. Victory Bonds were a good investment and buying them meant little more than changing currency from one species of collateral to another. Victory Bonds were always safe and easily negotiable and they paid a little more interest than ordinary bank deposits.

Real Objection From Economic Standpoint.

Capital is also made by the Japanese of the pleas made this year by certain cannery interests that, for economic reasons, the employment of Japanese in the British Columbia fisheries is essential. In this very economic reason lies one of the principal objections against Oriental penetration. It is known that the Japanese or the Chinese will work for smaller pay than the white men. Thus they oust the white man out of employment in the competitive industrial world and the whites suffer while the Orientals thrive. Against immigration, the impossibility of assimilation is often pointed out but, when it comes down to the fine point, there has been little attempt at assimilation and there likely never will be. There would be more danger in attempting assimilation than there is in the possibility of it.

The real objection to the Oriental is his damaging effect on the white in the economic world. Secondly, his desirability as an associate and neighbor of the white men is questioned. The question of assimilation does not constitute much danger as long as it is not attempted. The one great reason for the movement against the Oriental is the danger from an economic standpoint. If allowed to come in increasing numbers, there is the danger that the Orientals might gain control of the industries and, as a result, the country itself.

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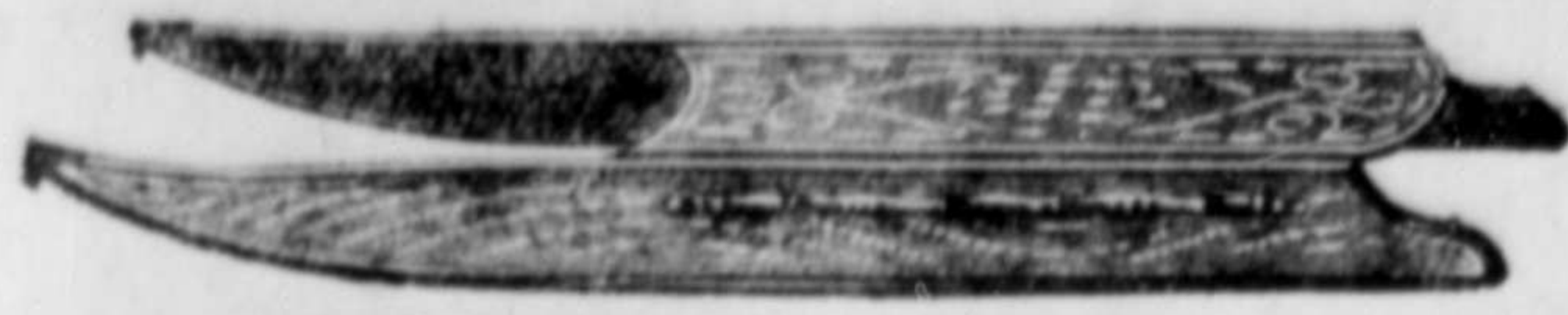

PERFORM OPERATIONS INSIDE GLASS WALL

Paris Surgeon Adopts New Plan For Demonstrating to Clinical Students

PARIS, Nov. 27.—By a new idea in operating rooms just perfected by Dr. Victor Pauchet, no longer will operations be conducted in a stifling atmosphere while a score of clinical students crowd around the table listening to the explanation of the best surgeons.

Dr. Pauchet has decided henceforth to separate himself from all students by a glass partition covering the entire operating space. The observers will be permitted merely to look down through the glass from elevated rows of benches. Opera glasses will be placed at their disposal for following delicate incisions while a small wireless telephone connected with an amplifier behind the observers will be used in describing the various stages of the operation.

By the use of a constant antiseptic spray before and during the operation Dr. Pauchet believes a greater degree of surgical success will be possible, as it is quite conceivable that under the old system dangerous bacteria frequently were exhaled into wounds by the unintentionally careless watcher.

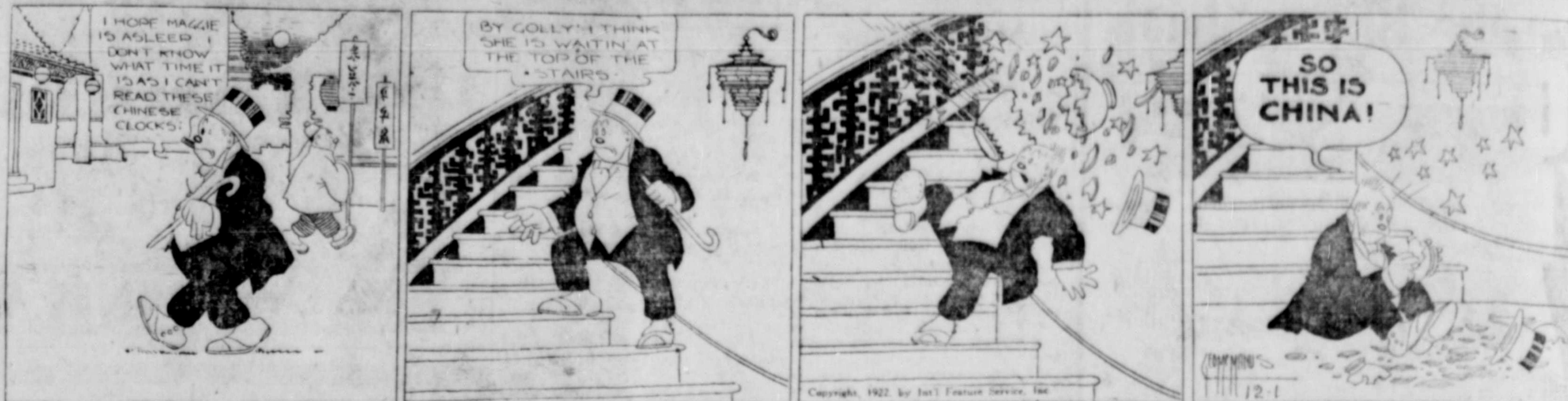

NO MORE BOUNTIES ON PREDACIOUS BIRDS

Cougar, Wolves and Coyotes Only Animals Still Under the Ban

VICTORIA, Dec. 7.—While discussing the estimates in the Legislature last week, B. H. Pooley, member for Esquimalt, asked some questions in regard to the bounties on predacious animals and birds.

M. B. Jackson, member for the Islands, who is chairman of the Game Board, said it was proposed to take off all the bounties during the coming year except those on timber wolves, cougar and coyote. While the crow was a pest it was suggested that if a bounty was at any future time offered for destruction of those birds, it should be done by the department of agriculture. From the point of view of the Game Board the crow did little injury.

Mr. Pooley said he thought the big horned owl the most destructive bird there was. The bird had no friends in the country. He suggested the board make an exception in the case of this bird. While there were not usually many horned owls in the southern part of the province they were numerous in the north, where there were rabbits. In seasons when rabbits were scarce the owls followed the ducks south and then preyed on the pheasants and other game birds.

Bald Headed Eagle H. E. Kerwin suggested it would be wise to keep the bounty on the bald eagle. These birds carried off young mountain sheep and owls and lived largely on grouse and rabbits. It would be good to follow up the bounty on these birds.

Kenneth Duncan said he had never known the eagle do harm. The chicken hawk was more destructive than the owl.

Mr. Jackson said there was a misunderstanding in regard to members of the hawk family. There were only two varieties that were pests, the Cooper hawk and the sharpshin.

Mr. Pooley suggested that the great horned owl did practically all the damage for the owl fam-

CONVICTION OF YOUNG QUASHED

Taxi Driver, Charged With Opium in Possession, Cleared by Judge Young

Judge Young yesterday afternoon quashed Magistrate McClymont's conviction of Oscar Young charged with having opium in his possession and the fine of \$200. In delivering his judgment, His Honor stated that there was no evidence that accused knew the contents of the package found in the bottom of his car. The facts of the case, he said, were consistent with his innocence as well as consistent with his guilt.

"There are good and bad taxi drivers and if we hold them responsible for every package left in their cars the quicker they get out of business the better. I am not free from doubt that all things might have happened without his knowledge considering the reputation of his passengers. Clara Martin smoked opium while Lim Chew peddled it. Young's good reputation and the manner in which he gave his evidence are in his favor. The conviction is quashed," Judge Young concluded.

The accused was put on the stand in the afternoon by his counsel, M. Gonzales. He told a straightforward story of how he had taken Clara Martin along with a passenger to the Central Hotel and of how the woman asked him to pick up Lim Chew. The rest of the evidence was similar to that given in the police court.

Constable McDonald and Sergeant McGlinchy gave the evidence for the crown. At the conclusion of the case Judge Young said about them: "Both constables are to be highly commended for their evidence and work. I am satisfied the interests of justice have been very well served in this case."

PRINCE OF WALES IS MADE MASTER WARDEN OF BRITISH MASONS

Elaborate Setting to Recent Proceedings in Albert Hall, London

LONDON, Dec. 8.—By Canadian Press.—In a setting of great splendor and in the midst of what is believed to have been the largest Masonic assembly ever gathered under one roof, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales was recently invested in Albert Hall here, as Senior Grand Warden of the United Grand Lodge of England. Nine thousand Freemasons, drawn from all parts of the English jurisdiction embracing lodges all over the world, as well as of representative deputations from the sister Grand Lodges of England and Scotland and some of the Dominions beyond the seas, were present at the investiture. Over 13,000 applicants for tickets of admission had to be disappointed, and more than 1,000 of those favored had to stand throughout the ceremony, which was conducted by the Duke of Connaught as Grand Master.

There was a stately procession of High Officers, whose approach was heralded by a silvery fanfare of trumpets from unseen musicians of the Grenadier Guards' Band, followed by a distant roll of drums. The High Officers escorted the Deputy Grand Master Right Hon. Sir Thomas Halsey towards the Great Throne. It was a scene of splendor. Purple and gold predominated on the dais and in the front belt of seats in the arena. Behind was a further belt in which crimson was the prevailing tone, and in the vast background were the pale blue and white regalia of the rank and file of the Masonic craft.

Greeting the Duke
 When the Grand Lodge had been opened the trumpets sounded again, and a second procession was formed, this time conducting the Grand Master, Sir Lord Amphibill, pro-Grand Master and Viscount Birkenhead, Junior Grand Warden, to the dais. The Duke of Connaught was greeted with cheer after cheer.

While the enthusiasm was at its height a slim young man in morning dress, with a simple blue collar of the Masonic order, slipped unobtrusively in, and sat in the front row of the body of the hall—the Prince of Wales, looking unusually grave, but in no wise nervous. He was accompanied by the Duke of York. After reading a message sent to the King expressing the assembly's loyal devotion to the Throne, and his Majesty's acknowledgement of "another proof of the close association between Freemasonry and my House," the Grand Master began the investiture of the Prince. The Duke recalled that this was the second time in the course of about fifty years that the heir to the Throne had taken upon himself high office in the Grand Lodge of England. The Grand Master placed around the Prince's neck a collar of royal blue with an edging of gold—the badge of his office as Senior Grand Warden.

The Prince's Reply
 There was tremendous cheering, and then followed the Prince's reply, which was a brief expression of his gratitude for the honor conferred upon him and for the warm welcome he had received. When the new Senior Grand Warden was conducted to his appointed place the assembly sprang to its feet and cheered and cheered again. This was followed by the unveiling, by Lord Amphibill, of a portrait of the Grand Master, painted by Sir Arthur Cope.
 The Prince of Wales entered the Masonic order through the Household Brigade Lodge, No. 2611, which he joined in May, 1919. He was then an officer in the Brigade of Guards. Shortly afterwards his brother the Duke of York also became a Mason, he was then initiated in the Navy Lodge, No. 2612. Both brothers became in turn Warden and Master of their respective mother lodges.

Zeal for Masonry
 The investiture of the Prince of Wales as Senior Grand Warden was the first occasion on which an heir-apparent accepted a position in the Grand Lodge other than that of Grand Master. The Prince, in being a keen Mason, is following the example of his grandfather Edward VII, who, during his Masonic reign

of a quarter of a century showed great zeal for the craft. The first Prince of Wales to become a member of the Masonic Order was the eldest son of George II, who was a "Master Mason and Master of a Lodge," according to the records. That Prince's grandson, known as George IV, was for many years Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of England, as was also his great-grand-grandson, Edward VII.
