Terrible Fire English Lumber Yards

ITALIAN DELEGATES WASHINGTON FAVOR CONTROL SUBMARINES

Italy Will Second Root Undersea Craft Motion If France Also Agrees

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—Italy has decided to second the Eilhu Root resolution prohibiting attacks by submarines on merchant ships providing France does the same. This announcement is said in Italian circles to be authoritative.

Italy has not been in the limelight as an active participant in the submarine debate, and it is with a good deal of satisfaction that British and American delegates see that she is favorable to control of undersea craft.

PRINCE STILL WELL RECEIVED

Enthusiasm of Natives at Rangoon, Burma, Exceeded All Expectations.

LONDON, Jan. 5.—The Prince of Wales met with a reception characterized with frantic enthusiasm on his arrival in Rangoon. The natives cheered in thousands and upset all expectations in regard to their conduct. The gentility of the Prince and his ability to carry out strenuous games in the intense heat apparently impresses the Burmese people enormously.

A despatch to the Times says that a policeman's strike is planned for Madras on the arrival of the Prince.

RANGOON, Jan. 5.—The Prince of Wales left here for Mandalay and Upper Burma. He was given a great send-off.

FIRE ON BOARD ATLANTIC BOAT

Dutch Freighter Sommeisoyk Sent Out Calls for Aid—Everything All Right Now.

QUEENSTOWN, Jan. 5.—A wireless despatch received here last night reported a fire aboard the Dutch freighter Sommeisoyk. During the day the blaze caused the ship to send out calls for aid. It is now reported that the fire has been extinguished and the vessel is proceeding to Rotterdam.

DARCY HADFIELD IS NEW SCULLING CHAMP

Defeated R. Arnst in New Zealand by Six Lengths Thus Gaining Title.

LONDON, Jan. 5.—Darcy Hadfield won the world's sculling championship from R. Arnst on the Wangamui River in New Zealand by defeating the former champion by six lengths.

TONNAGE OF MOVING SHIPS IS INCREASED

Report Issued From Ottawa Exclusive of Coastwise Traffic But Inclusive of Inland.

OTTAWA, Jan. 5.—Exclusive of ships engaged in coastwise trade but inclusive of those in inland waters, the total tonnage of vessels entering and leaving Canadian waters during the fiscal year ending March 1921 was 54,648,630 tons as against 49,493,534 for the year previous.

ROTARY CLUB LUNCH TODAY

J. F. Maguire Was Guest—General Matters Discussed.

The weekly luncheon of the Rotary Club was held in the St. Regis Cafe today, a good gathering of members being present. The program did not contain any special items, the main discussion concerning internal club matters.

J. F. Maguire was the guest of the day and, on the invitation of the president, E. F. Doby, addressed the club. His remarks were of a general nature and in the course of them he said: "On the invitation of Dr. Grant I came here this afternoon for the purpose, as I thought, solely of stimulating, both material and intellectual things. I had not the faintest idea that I would be honored by being asked to say even a few words, and you will understand that I am utterly unprepared to do justice to the occasion."

"Personally I am sorry that I have not been here before, but I am very glad that I am here now, and I would consider it a splendid advantage and enjoyment to have a similar experience on a future occasion. I have followed the doings of the Rotary Clubs in various cities for a good many years, but merely as an outside spectator, and have never had the privilege of looking on in the inside work unit today, and therefore the experience I have gained here today has certainly whetted my appetite. I consider the Rotary Club a first class organization and its object of bringing together a number of men who are competitors and friends for six days in the week in which they work, is a most essential thing. There is an old saying that 'distance lends enchantment' but I often think the most interesting experience possible in life is to be brought face to face with someone whom you have known at a distance and whom you have a dislike for. Often on close acquaintance one finds that he is a very desirable chap after all and has a lot of good characteristics."

"We come together with a flow of reason as well as soup and we learn to sympathize with one another better. As Mr. Wakefield has suggested, even an experienced speaker likes to have a little notice before being called upon to stand up before an assembly. Mr. President and gentlemen, I thank you for admitting me to your midst and for the honor conferred upon me by allowing me to say even a few words."

BANK PRESIDENT IS SHOT AND KILLED

Bandits Rob His Party of Company Payroll, \$12,000.

CHICAGO, Jan. 5.—John Sofel, president of the Maywood State Bank, was shot and killed and a police officer and bank messenger were wounded when five bandits robbed them of \$12,000, the pay roll for the Maywood plant, American Can Company.

MAN WITHOUT A COUNTRY



Sir Edgar Speyer, multimillionaire investor, who completed the work of the late Carnegies by forming a gigantic trust of tubes, bus lines and tramways in London, may be another man without a country. His naturalization papers have been cancelled by the British Government on grounds that he unlawfully communicated with the enemy during the war. Statements that Sir Edgar was born in Germany have been denied by his counsellor, who says that he was born in America of American parents. According to Chief Naturalization Officer Sturges of New York, he will have to take out naturalization papers if he intends to become an American citizen. As it is now, it looks as though Sir Edgar is another man without a country.

NEWSPAPERMAN IN DUBLIN KIDNAPPED

DUBLIN, Jan. 5.—A. B. Day, correspondent for the London Times, was kidnapped last night by three armed men while with a party of other newspapermen in a grocery store. No explanation is forthcoming as to why the seizure was made. Word received from Cork this morning said that he would be released later in the day.

CONTROLLER WOUNDED

CAIRO, Jan. 5.—Badrline Bey, controller in the Egyptian government crimes department, has been seriously wounded by a revolver shot fired by a youth who escaped.

TURK LEADER RAISING RED ARMY



Enver Pasha, the young Turkish chief who is reported to be active in conducting Bolshevistic agitation in the Caucasus for the purpose of marching into Anatolia, overthrowing the Nationalists' Government and proclaiming a Soviet dictatorship.

PETITE BLONDE AGED 23 MAYOR OF CITY

FAIRPORT, Ohio, Jan. 5.—Dr. Amy Kankonen, recently elected mayor of Fairport, Ohio, on a dry ticket and pledged to squash bootlegging, is perhaps the youngest as well as the first woman mayor in the United States. She has received letters of congratulation from many leading women, including Mrs. Harding. Dr. Kankonen, a petite blonde of 23, was the youngest woman to be graduated from the women's Medical College of Pennsylvania, Philadelphia, during the war she was a member of the Army Volunteer Medical Corps.

DAIL EIREANN

Adjournment Made to Allow For Study of Valera's Proposals.

DUBLIN, Jan. 5.—The Dail Eireann met this morning and immediately adjourned until this afternoon to give members the opportunity of discussing the situation created by the presentation of De Valera's alternative proposals.

NO STRIKE VANCOUVER

By Vote 514 to 503 Car Men Decide Against Reduction in Wages.

VANCOUVER, Jan. 5.—There will be no strike of the street railwaymen of Vancouver, Victoria and New Westminster because of the reduction of wages, effective January 1, of approximately ten percent. The men voted last night 514 against the strike and 503 in favor of it despite the recommendation of the executive that a strike be declared. The officials of the Street Railwaymen's Union will now sign up with the B. C. Electric Co.

An agitation is being started for a reduction of the street car fares in this city.

M'COIG TO SENATE; MURDOCK GETS SEAT

Minister of Labor Will Run in By-election Kent County, Ontario.

OTTAWA, Jan. 5.—It is understood that A. B. McCoig, member-elect for Kent, will be appointed to the Senate on Thursday. Writs will be immediately issued for a by-election and Hon. James Murdock, the new minister of labor, will contest the seat in the Liberal interests.

Appointment Made.

OTTAWA, Jan. 5.—(Later) Official announcement is made of the appointment of A. B. McCoig, member-elect for Kent, to the Senate. The vacancy was created by the death recently of Hon. T. W. Crothers.

The appointment paves the way for the new minister of labor, Hon. James Murdock, to obtain an Ontario seat. Writs for the by-election will be issued shortly.

Severe Weather In Old Country Accompanied by Wind and Snow; Five Million Fire At Hartlepool

LONDON, Jan. 5.—Severe weather is being experienced throughout the United Kingdom. Heavy storms are sweeping over the English Channel and there are severe gales on the Yorkshire coast. Heavy snows are reported in the highlands and in the eastern counties the railways are blocked by snow.

In addition to the storms that are distressing the country, influenza is disturbingly prevalent at present.

Destructive Fire.

WEST HARTLEPOOL, England, Jan. 5.—Scores of houses were laid waste today, two thousand people were rendered homeless, and more than five million dollars worth of damage was done by a fire in the timber yards here. Fanned by a gale, the fire spread throughout the night, and by this afternoon covered approximately eighty acres.

TORONTO MAN CHARGED THEFT

Donald Mossack, Politician, Lawyer, Preacher and Broker, Fails Appear in Court.

TORONTO, Jan. 5.—A bench warrant has been issued for the arrest of Donald G. Mossack, well known here as minister, lawyer, real estate agent and politician. In a trial which has extended over several months he was charged with the theft of \$5000 from John Hunter. Yesterday he failed to put in an appearance at the court's order.

MAN BURNED TO DEATH AND THREE BADLY INJURED

Fire Destroyed Home of J. H. Matthews at Cedar Rapids, Iowa.

CEDAR RAPIDS, Iowa, Jan. 5.—One man was killed and three others were badly burned in a fire which last night destroyed the home of J. H. Matthews here.

VANCOUVER ADVISED.

VANCOUVER, Jan. 5.—Advice has reached here that the Prince Rupert Dry Dock has been awarded the contract for the construction of a steel hull ferry to operate on Francois Lake. It will be a twin screw gasoline boat.

WENT ASHORE IN BLIZZARD

Schooner Alexandria Piles Up Near Ganso After Becoming Unmanageable.

GANSO, Nova Scotia, Jan. 5.—Stripped of her sails, covered with ice and unmanageable, the schooner Alexandria, bound from Antigonish to Gloucester, Massachusetts, with a cargo of fish, was driven ashore on the rocks at Black Point, 20 miles from here, in a heavy blizzard. The crew of five men were rescued.

TIMBER SEED TO ENGLAND

Douglas Fir, Sitka Spruce and Pine to be Propagated in Old Country.

NEW WESTMINSTER, Jan. 5.—Fifteen hundred pounds of Douglas fir seed and a similar amount of Sitka spruce and pine seed is to be shipped to England to be used in connection with a reforestation scheme in the Old Country. It will be sent from the provincial government's seed extraction plant here.

GREEK DESTROYER BLOWS UP, MANY KILLED AND HURT

ATHENS, Jan. 5.—The torpedo boat destroyer, Leon, was wrecked by an explosion aboard. Many were killed and injured. The vessel was moored at Piraeus.

Fifty Killed.

ATHENS, Jan. 5.—Fifty bodies have been recovered from the Greek torpedo destroyer Leon, which was wrecked in the Piraeus harbor as the result of the explosion of a torpedo. The explosion damaged nearly warships and caused houses ashore to collapse, killing a number of inhabitants.

CENSUS RETURNS NOT QUITE READY YET

OTTAWA, Jan. 5.—The census figures are now almost complete, with the exception of a few points in British Columbia and Saskatchewan. It is not expected, however, that they will be made public until the new minister of trade and commerce in the Mackenzie King cabinet takes hold of the department.

**Municipal Government
 And Its Powers.**

At this time, with a municipal election approaching, a few remarks dealing with the duties and powers of various city executives and administrative bodies might be in order. Municipal governments in many respects resemble the larger provincial or federal legislatures. Their scope, of course, is not so extensive. They have to deal merely with affairs which concern the cities alone. They have no power to legislate outside of the city limits or legislate on matters that affect relations with other municipalities. As the provincial government deals with internal matters of the province and the federal government deals with matters affecting the Dominion, so does the city government deal with matters concerning the city.

**Mayor a Guide
 And Not Dictator.**

The office of mayor of a city corresponds largely to the office of prime minister of a province or the Dominion insofar as his relations to the other executives of the city are concerned. His appointment differs, however, from the appointment of a premier, for he is chosen by direct vote of the people while the premier is chosen by the representative of the crown through the recommendation of the party which he represents. As a premier fails in government of the country if his legislature fails to support his policies, so does the mayor fail in city government if his council fails to support him. In the case of the premier it is necessary for him to go back to the people if he meets with a crisis, but a mayor in similar difficulty may carry on until the end of his term, though his control would be practically impotent. The actions and the work of a mayor thus depend largely upon the feeling and attitude of his council. Therefore, it is rather vain for a mayoral candidate to make far-reaching promises of what he will do if he is elected, and for the same reason it is rather vain for a mayor's record to be condemned. A mayor's power does not allow him to carry out legislative policies without the consent of his council, and his power is largely restricted. He acts as a guide to a council and not as a dictator. If the council fails to carry out his policies then it is responsible for the results.

**City Council, School
 Board and Police Commission.**

The city council corresponds to the legislative assembly. It is the only body in the city that has the power of making laws. Temporary rulings can be made by the mayor or other officials or groups of officials, but these all have to be ratified by the council to be of any effect. Weekly meetings of the council are arranged so that this function may be carried out. The police commission and the school board only have the power of supervising the conduct of the departments coming under their jurisdiction. Neither have the power to make laws, although this is not always remembered by the public at large. The business of the school board is dependent on the rules set out by the Council of Public Instruction where matters of educative policy are concerned. Where matters of expenditure are concerned the city council or the ratepayers have the final say. Similarly the police commission's work is under the supervision of the provincial attorney-general's department and its actions are confined to supervision of conduct and administration of affairs affecting the law and order of the city. If it desires to inaugurate laws all it can do is to recommend the proposed reforms to the city council or the provincial government. If they are considered to be in the best interests of better government they may be passed. If not, no action is taken on the suggestions.

**NEW WHITE STAR
 LINER MAJESTIC HAS
 MUCH EQUIPMENT**

LONDON, Jan. 5.—The new White Star liner Majestic, 46,000 tons, the largest steamer in the world, now being built in England, will carry record quantities of articles of everyday use on board. She will have 45,000 pieces of plate, and her articles of cutlery will number 14,000. Her crystal and glassware, with 16,500 glasses and tumblers, will come to 27,000 pieces, and the number of cups, saucers, plates, dishes, and other china and earthenware utensils will amount to 80,000. Of linen she will carry 178,000 pieces, including 13,000 pillow slips and a like number of sheets, 45,000 serviettes and 75,000 towels. The Majestic is expected to enter the White Star line's Southampton-Cherbourg New York service in the early spring, in which she will join the Royal Mail steamship Olympic, 46,439 tons, and the Royal Mail steamer Homeric, 35,000 tons.

Prince Rupert is in a good state of health at present, with a birth rate of 19.2 per thousand and a death rate of only 4.8 per thousand. There were eight births last month and two deaths, one of which was due to accident. This was the report to the Medical Health Officer at council last night.

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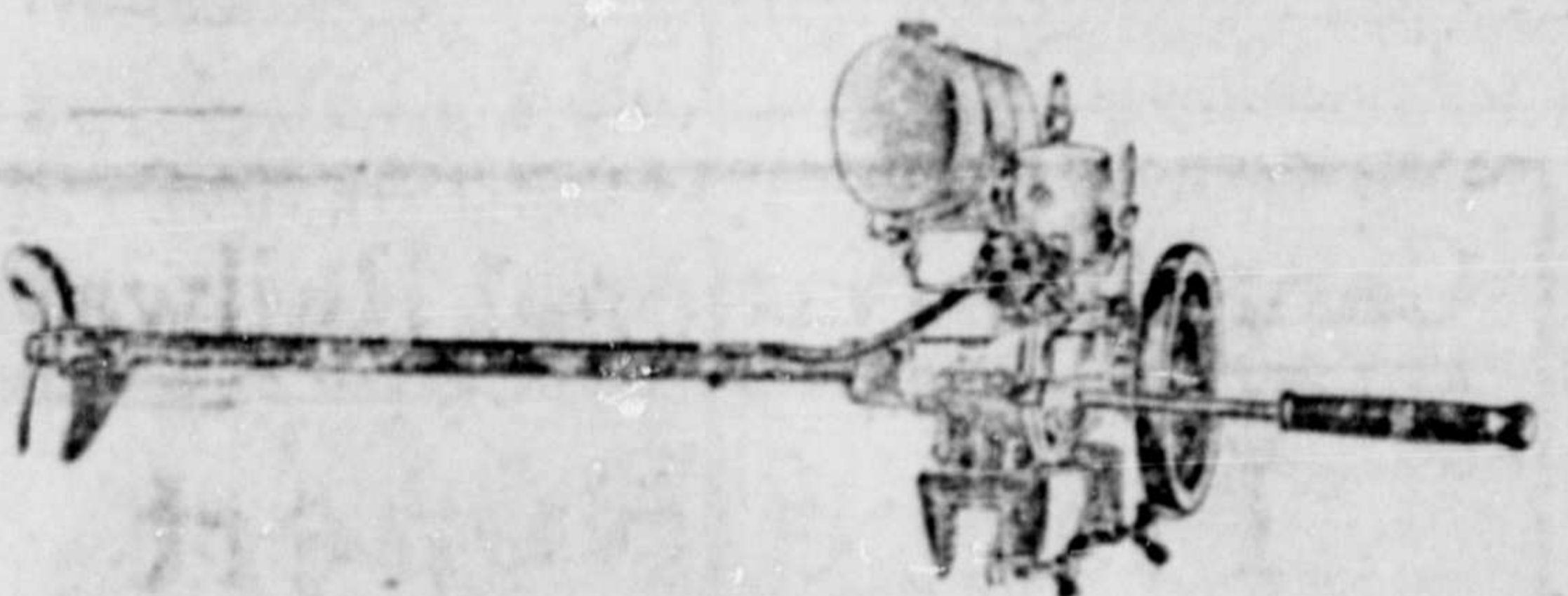

LAUNCH WARSHIP TO BE SCRAPPED

TOKIO, Jan. 5.—The dreadnaught Tosa was launched recently at the Mitsubishi shipyards at Nagasaki. Like her sister ship, the Kaga, launched a month ago, the Tosa is slated to be scrapped under the naval limitation plan agreed to at the Washington conference. The Tosa's launching is the last in Japan prior to the naval holiday. The Tosa and Kaga were estimated to cost upwards of 73,000,000 yen each to complete. In their present state they represent approximately one-third of that sum. Each is 700 feet long, has normal displacement of 30,000 tons and was to be equipped with special anti-torpedo protection and armed with a main battery of 16-inch guns.

TROUBLE AHEAD FOR SCHOONER LADY MINE

Customs Prepare to Penalize Vessel to Extent of \$60,000 Unless Loss of Cargo Explained.

VANCOUVER, Jan. 5.—Liable for customs duties in excess of \$60,000 if her master cannot prove conclusively that the loss of her cargo was an act of God, the auxiliary schooner Lady Mine, which cleared from here for Ensenada, Mexico, on December 10 with a cargo of whisky, will in all probability be the subject of an enquiry when she reaches Vancouver after effecting repairs.

The Lady Mine, dismasted and with her holds filled with water, put into San Francisco a few days ago, and her master reported the loss of his cargo through jettisoning and the high seas which broke over the schooner on her way down the coast.

Scotch and Bourbon.

The 1250 odd cases of Scotch and Bourbon with which the boat was loaded when she left Vancouver was from bonded warehouses here, and customs regulations call for a bond or undertaking from her owners to the effect that the bonded goods will be landed in the port for which she cleared. The bond is for double the amount of duty which would ordinarily be collected if the goods were for Canadian consumption, and in the present case amounts to about \$40 per case.

According to customs officials amount will be between \$60,000 and \$80,000 if the boat can not prove that the cargo was lost by action of the elements, or if there is any doubt as to the manner in which she is said to have lost it.

No Hear, No See, No Speak.

The customs brokers attending to the affairs of the Lady Mine on her last trip were the firm of Vidal & Co. of this city, but enquiry at their offices elicited the fact that it was impossible for the brokers to give out any information regarding the matter or as to the shippers of the liquor in question. Customs officials are watching the case closely, and it is on the findings of the San Francisco authorities that their decision will be taken.

The Lady Mine has already had an adventurous career. For some time engaged in sealing, whaling and trading in the Behring Sea, and making some trips to Japan, she came into the possession of her present owners after Captain Smith, at present watchman on the Empress of Russia, had found

ALL BRITISH COLUMBIA CANNERIES TO RUN

Canvass of Provincial Ganning Industries Indicates Busy Season for Plants During 1922.

Stocks have been cleaned out in the market, and when the French buyers come in February it is expected there will not be a can of salmon left in the provincial warehouses it is stated.

It is reported by the same authority that replacement values on the new pack are down nearly one hundred per cent, owing, it is said, to the fact that tin plate is now coming from the United Kingdom plants at about half what it cost last year from Pittsburg. This is one of the directions in which the British are competing successfully with America for the trade of British Columbia. In addition to this labor has been reduced materially and freights to the east more favorable to moving cargoes.

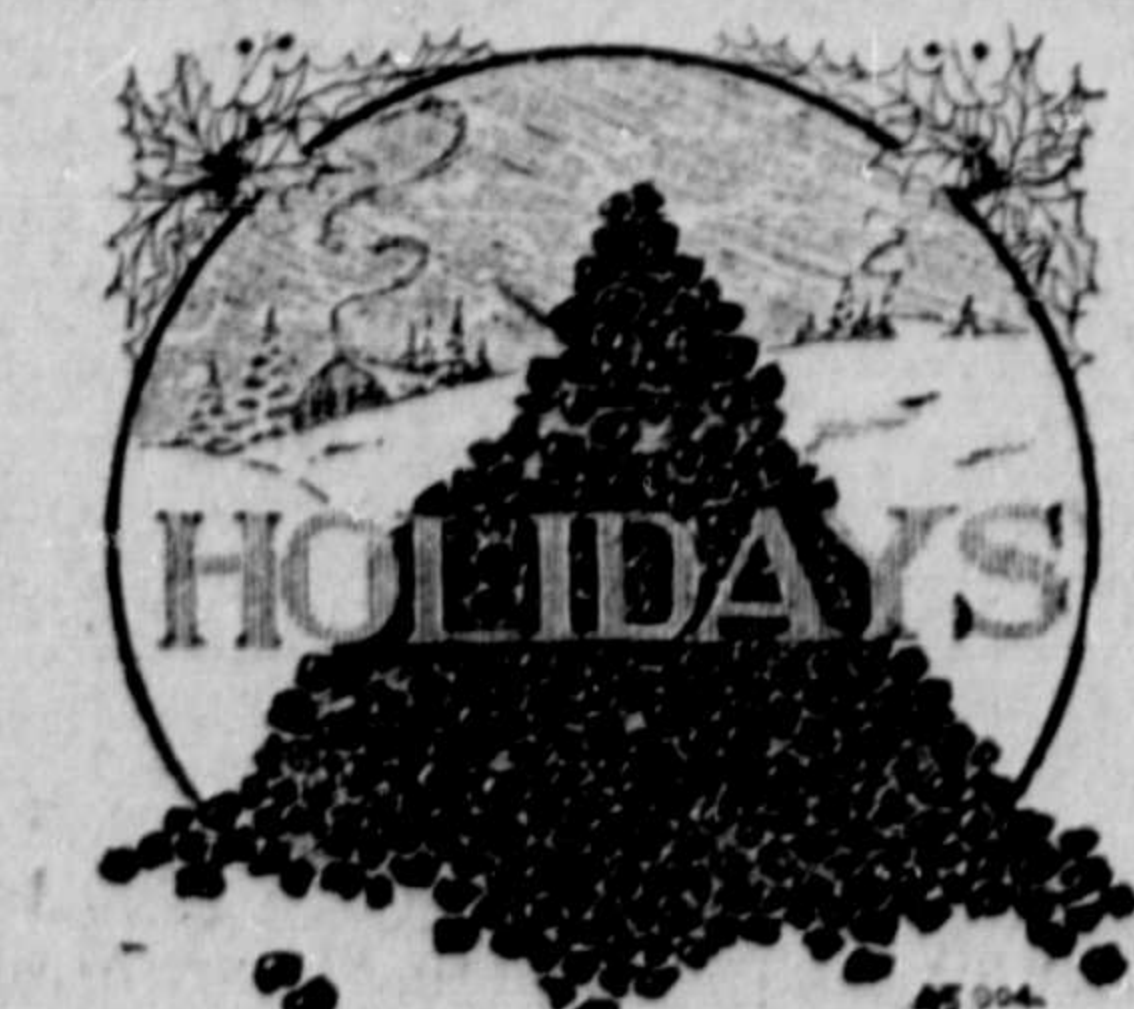

SEGREGATION IN FRENCH TRAINS

Compartment for Smokers, Babies, Women — Separation Politicians Suggested.

PARIS, Jan. 3.—The French have already carried to a considerable length the segregation of railway travellers according to natural or acquired characteristics. In addition to the British schemes of partition in favor of smokers and women, there are special arrangements for railway staff, sportsmen with dogs, and members of parliament. Now a bill has been tabled by a deputy which aims at securing special accommodation for women with babies under two years of age. The main object seems to be to safeguard the baby from the oppressive companionship of the adult, but it is at least likely that the benefit to temper will be reciprocal.

There is really no end to the possibilities before an enterprising and imaginative railway company that makes "Every man in his humor" the motto of its service. The first step is to provide refuge for the silent and to safeguard the lover of books from the menace of a third-rate talker. Many would regard the "Non-Talker" as the happiest abode for a long journey, though the schedule of penalties for breach of the peace and the best means of inducing them would no doubt raise difficulties and even litigation. The problem of those whose choice is for conversation raises further possibilities of classification. Political parties might, in the interests of harmonious travelling, elect to keep themselves to themselves.

Fortunately there is not, like the inhabitants of the Southern United States, a racial problem to complicate matters, but as they keep black from white in the matter of compartments it might assist the amenities of the railroad if "reds" and "whites" of the more aggressive type had their appropriate debating chambers ready labelled. That travellers with severe colds and the fore-running signs of influenza hot upon them should share a common exile is perhaps too ambitious a scheme even for the precise particularism of French travel.

There is only one person who has everything to lose by the universal adoption of all these fine shades of distinction. That is the man who makes it a point of punctual honor never to be early but always to mount the train as it leaves. With no time to look before he leaps he might find himself in some very hot corners.
