## FRENCH CABINET STANDS BEHIND PREMIER

### HOPES OF BEER BY GLASS ADVOCATES DASHED TO GROUND BY LEGISLATURE

#### Poincaré's Attitude at London on Reparations Question is Endorsed

PARIS, Dec. 13.—The French cabinet this morning approved the attitude taken by Premier Poincaré on the reparations question at the recent conference of premiers in London. It also expressed agreement with him regarding the declarations to be made in the chamber of deputies on Friday when it is expected the government will be called upon to reply to an interpellation. Premier Poincaré, it is foreseen, will ask the Chamber for a free hand in reparation negotiations with the Allies.

#### ROAD VOTES ARE REDUCED

Nearly All Constituencies Get Smaller Appropriations From Province

VICTORIA, Dec. 13.—There is a general reduction in the road vote passed by the legislature this session covering practically every constituency in the province.

There was a long discussion yesterday on the matter, a number of members claiming that they should get better treatment. No revisions were made, however.

H. G. Peery, member for Fort George, congratulated the government on its policy of opening up new districts for settlers and spending money there.

#### UNITED STATES HAS COLD WAVE

Extends to Southern Portions of Both Atlantic and Pacific Seaboards

CHICAGO, Dec. 13.—The winter's first cold wave that has given the northwest region below zero temperatures for several days, has extended to the Atlantic Coast and to the southern portion of the Pacific Coast as well as extend southern Florida. The spell continued today with but slight relief in some sections.

#### FRENCH BIRTH RATE DOWN WHILE DEATH RATE GOES HIGHER

PARIS, Dec. 13.—Vital statistics for the first six months of 1922 show a decrease of 25,000 births and an increase of 39,000 deaths over a corresponding period in 1921. The increase of births over deaths last year was 73,000. This year it is only 9,000.

#### NO NEW YEAR HONORS COMING IN JANUARY

LONDON, Dec. 13.—It is understood that there will be no New Year honors issued on January 1. Premier Bonar Law is awaiting the report of the royal commission which is now sitting on the matter of honors.

#### CAMBRIDGE DEFEATS OXFORD AT SOCCER

LONDON, Dec. 13.—Cambridge defeated Oxford by 2 to 0 in the annual soccer football game today.

#### C. R. STEWART PASSED TODAY

Pioneer of the City Died at Hospital Following a Long Illness

One of the best known of Prince Rupert's pioneers passed away in the person of Charles R. Stewart who died this afternoon at 2 o'clock at the General Hospital. Mr. Stewart had been in failing health for several months following a paralytic stroke and his death was not unexpected. Many friends, however, will learn with deep regret of his demise.

The late Mr. Stewart was about 60 years of age and was a native of Goderich, Ontario. He spent several years in Manitoba before coming to British Columbia. Thirteen years ago he came to this city and was at first employed in the Christian-sen-Brandt realty company. He was also engaged on railway construction and spent one summer with a survey party at Alice Arm. Later he had been connected with the customs department here. He was unmarried and is survived by five sisters, one residing in Emerson, and others at Man, Tvan, Sask, Spokane, Wash., Idaho and a fifth in another part of the States.

The late Mr. Stewart was a prominent member of the local Knights of Pythias Lodge and the funeral will be held under the auspices of that organization. He also belonged to the St. Andrew's Society. The remains are in the hands of the B.C. Undertakers.

#### OVER THOUSAND MEN EMPLOYED AT ANYOX

ANYOX, Dec. 13.—On November 30, there were 1030 men working for the Granby Company in Anyox. The figures were made up by the various departments as follows: Hidden Creek mine, 305 smelter, 254; mechanical, 144; housing and community facilities, 112; transportation, yards and docks, 64; coke plant, 61; power, 10; office and accounting, 22; general stores, 23; smelter stores, 12.

#### THIRTEEN INCHES OF SNOW IN VANCOUVER

Officers on the Prince George arriving here today reported that it was very cold in Vancouver when they left on Monday night. There was thirteen inches of snow on the streets.

#### UNUSUAL COLD FELT IN ITALY

Several Cases of Death by Freezing—Wolves Are Driven to Gates of Rome

ROME, Dec. 13.—Italy is suffering from an exceptional cold wave. Five persons have been frozen to death in Rome and several similar cases are reported from other cities. The Apennine Mountains are completely covered with snow. Wolves driven to desperation by the lack of food have descended to the plains and almost to the gates of the capital.

#### FISHERMAN DEAD IN HIS GASBOAT

Vancouver Provincial Police go to Howe Sound to Secure Body of J. Booth

VANCOUVER, Dec. 13.—Provincial police officers have gone to Cowan's Point, Howe Sound, to secure the body of J. Booth, a fisherman of this city. The remains are lying in the cockpit of a gasoline launch which is pounding on the rocks. It is believed that Booth was struck on the head by the flywheel and thrown across the engine.

#### UNMASKED BANDITS STOLE \$90,000 IN ST. LOUIS EXCHANGE

KANSAS CITY, Missouri, Dec. 13.—Three unmasked bandits held up five special messengers and secured \$90,000 and escaped in a stolen automobile from the lobby of the Live-stock Exchange here. One messenger who resisted was shot and slightly wounded.

#### TOKYO STUDENTS DECLARE STRIKE

Want Extension of Courses and More Financial Assistance From Government

TOKYO, Dec. 13.—Four hundred students at the Tokyo Foreign Language School have declared a strike, refusing to attend classes until the government extends the school course from three to five years and increases the appropriations for that institution by over \$50,000. The government has suggested a four-year course as a compromise.

#### FREE STATERS SWEEP FERMOY AREA TAKING REPUBLICAN CAPTIVES

DUBLIN, Dec. 13.—Making a clean sweep of the entire Fermoyn area, Free State troops have taken possession and captured a number of Republican prisoners, an official statement says.

#### TWELVE YEAR OLD BOY SUICIDED AT CARDSTON, ALTA.

CARDSTON, Alta., Dec. 13.—George Thompson, aged 11, shot and killed himself. The motive is not known.

#### WILL EMPLOY FIVE HUNDRED MEN AT FISH CREEK MINE

SEATTLE, Dec. 13.—Grant Mahood, president of the American Mining & Milling Co., Ltd. announces that machinery will be installed and 500 men employed at the Fish Creek mines near Hyder which his company has purchased for about \$500,000.

#### IMMIGRATION IS DISCUSSED

Vote of \$50,000 is Made for Purpose at Victoria—Pattullo and Oliver Speak

VICTORIA, Dec. 13.—Replying to a question regarding the vote of \$50,000 for immigration, Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, said in the legislature that it could not be exactly stated how this money would be spent for plans were not yet far enough advanced. Personally, he did not believe in spending money on transportation for settlers when the cost of roads, schools and hospitals had to be looked after.

Premier Oliver said there were hundreds of thousands of acres of land and if people who were here could not occupy them he did not see why others should be debarred from coming. All the government was asked to do was to take care of these people on arrival and place them on the land. Some money would be required in doing this, if the House decided that it did not want people to come that would end it.

#### FISH ARRIVALS

Ten Boats Sold 174,000 Pounds Here Today—Valorous Arrives Safely

Six schooners marketed 174,000 pounds of halibut at the Fish Exchange this morning, the prices paid averaging a little over the 10c mark. The arrivals included the Valorous which was reported as missing last week.

Azores, 6,000 pounds, at 10c and 7c, and Reveille, 15,000 pounds, at 10c and 8c, to the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co.

The Albatross was in with 65,000 pounds but cleared for Seattle to market the catch there.

#### WOMAN DETECTIVES FOR TOKYO POLICE

TOKYO, Dec. 13.—Tokyo will have a number of women detectives added to its police force. Police officials here say there is a great need for women on the force to watch the movements of women associated with secret societies and dangerous thought movements.

#### Resolution Put Forward by Clearihue That Referendum on Beer Inopportune Passed

VICTORIA, Dec. 13.—The hopes of the beer by glass advocates were dashed yesterday afternoon when a resolution put forward by J. B. Clearihue, member for Victoria, declaring the time inopportune for a referendum on the sale of beer by the glass in establishments approved under government control, was passed in committee of the whole. The house divided—seventeen voting for beer and twenty-five against. Those voting for beer by opposing the motion were R. H. #### OBSTRUCTION BY LABOR MEMBERS

Will Not Allow Business to Proceed Because Unemployment Not Dealt With

LONDON, Dec. 13.—Labor members of parliament are obstructing the business of the House in protest against the government's plan to prorogue on Friday without having taken definite steps on the unemployment question. Voting of supply is behind schedule because Labor members in relays have prevented adjournment of the House night and day.

#### Gain Their Point

LONDON, Dec. 13.—A supplementary estimate of £1,000,000 for the relief of unemployment was agreed to by the House of Commons early today, towards the end of a fifteen hour session prolonged by the tactics of the Labor Party.

#### PROGRESS ON SLOAN BILL

Measure Providing For Iron And Steel Investigation Passes Second Reading

VICTORIA, Dec. 13.—Hon. William Sloan's bill providing for a survey of the iron ore properties of the province and setting aside the sum of \$50,000 for developing them also giving the government the right to enter on the properties and charge the work against the owners passed its second reading in the legislature this morning by a vote of 28 to 10.

Hon. W. J. Bowser criticized the bill caustically and suggested that it was all being done for friends of the Liberal government and the Coast Range Steel Co.

Hon. T. D. Pattullo said that prospectors favored the bill. The only ones opposed to it were the rich holders of properties who were asking big prices. This legislation was similar in principle to that dealing with agricultural areas which had been a great success.

G. H. Banes, member for North Vancouver, thought the big corporations should pay their share. It was time the government took powers like this which was a step in the right direction.

Independent and Labor members voted with the government.

#### RUSSIAN REFUGEES MUST SHOW STATUS IN ENTERING KOREA

TOKYO, Dec. 13.—The Japanese foreign office has instructed the Korean government-general to refuse to allow Russian refugees to land in that territory unless convinced of their status.

Should Take Care Of Colds.

Local physicians state that a mild form of influenza has been prevalent in the city for the past few weeks and it is really that malady which is affecting many people who have been suffering from what they presumed to be severe colds.

Prevention Of Fire Is The Thing.

At this time of the year when big fires are kept on in furnaces and stoves of buildings and homes, there is always a greater danger of fire breaking out. A little precaution in regard to dangers, which occupants of buildings and houses know of more than any one else, may save a great deal of damage being done.

Prince Rupert And Provincial Roads.

Last week the provincial public works department asked the city of Prince Rupert to assume the maintenance of the only bit of usable road that the government owns in or about the city of Prince Rupert.

The provincial government takes a good deal out of Prince Rupert in the way of automobile licenses and, so far, has not acceded to the request of the city that some sharing up of these traffic levies be made.

As long as the public works department does no more for Prince Rupert in the matter of roads than it has done and the provincial treasury continues as it does to collect so much money which is generally assumed to be for road purposes, it does not seem reasonable that the city should be called upon to maintain the only bit of road in Prince Rupert that belongs to the government.

When Prince Rupert gets better treatment in the matter of roads it will feel more sympathetic towards sharing in their maintenance if it is its place to do so at all.

Get Daylight Saving Properly Before Voters.

A plebiscite on the daylight saving question is to be taken at the next civic election, it is announced. The wording of the plebiscite has been left over until next week on account of the question arising as to the specification of the months to be put on the ballot papers.

Those opposed to daylight saving have no representations to make on the question. They will simply vote against it altogether and that will be all there is to it.

On the other hand, supporters of daylight saving should be interested in the wording of the ballot. It was suggested on Monday night that the voters be given the choice of the months of July and August. The month it is really needed is September when the days begin to draw in.

SOVIET RUSSIA IS AFTER DIPLOMATIC RECOGNITION CHINA

PEKIN, Dec. 13. — The Soviet government is making a strenuous effort to obtain diplomatic recognition from the Pekin administration, but so far without prospect of success.

Russia was the first European country to receive the ambassadors of China. That was in 1731. Recognition was withdrawn on September 23, 1920, and all Russian privileges in China were simultaneously withdrawn.

# WOMAN KILLED BY CIGARETTES

LONDON, Dec. 13.—It is a great pity that the fair sex do not take to smoking pipes," said Dr. Greenwood, giving evidence at an inquest held at Marylebone on a single woman of sixty who was addicted to cigarette smoking.

The woman, Miss Eleanor Catherine Mealy, kept an apartment house at St. John's Wood and lodgers stated that when indoors she was seldom seen without a cigarette in her mouth. She did not care for expensive brands and always smoked one of the cheapest varieties made.

Miss Mealy was found lying fully clothed lying on the bed in her room. She was dead and a half smoked cigarette was at her side.

Dr. Greenwood, who made a postmortem examination, said that Miss Mealy seemed to have eaten a heavy meal shortly before her death and her heart, weakened by nicotine, was not equal to the strain imposed upon it.

"Cheap cigarettes," added the doctor, "are particularly harmful on account of the very large amount of paper used in their manufacture."

**FAMOUS DOG MASCOT OF TENDER ESTEVAN DEAD IN VICTORIA**  
 Rastus, Great Dane, Official War Veteran, Never Missed Sailing on Lighthouse Ship  
 VICTORIA, B.C., Dec. 13.—Rastus, huge black dog of the Great Dane species, official mascot of the tender Estevan, is dead and many friends mourn his passing.  
 He died at sea on the tender Estevan, on which he never missed a sailing during his lifetime. A soldiers'-friend he was and it was the funeral of a comrade he was given. Full naval honors marked his consignment to the deep.  
 A remarkable character was Rastus, returned men declare. Handsome in appearance, probably the biggest dog on the coast, he made friends on all sides.  
 Rastus' original owner was the late Paddy Hinson, who fought with the 67th Western Sea. After the war the two were inseparable, and spent much time round the club rooms of the Veterans of France. Rastus was officially made a member, and the only way to ruffle his temper was to attempt to tamper with the veterans' badge on his collar.  
 During the war Rastus had found a home on the Estevan. While the ship was in port he lived on the fat of the land, but sailing day found him on the dock. **TRAINED FIGHTERS IN EUROPE TODAY**  
 Russia Has a Standing Army of 1,600,000 and France Close to Million

ROME, Dec. 13.—The armies of the vanquished in the world war have been reduced to 100,000 men for Germany, and 30,000 each for Austria-Hungary and Bulgaria, according to the newspaper which has collected statistics on the military strength of various countries in Europe from official sources.  
 The paper calls attention to the immense number of soldiers who are being trained to arms in southern and eastern Europe. In the Balkans, where the spark that brought about the conflagration was ignited, the record is particularly high, it declares. Greece, with a population of 6,500,000 has an army of 300,000 men. Yugoslavia, bellicose by nature and tradition and surrounded by neighbors who do not love her, has an army of 80,000 men, a heavy burden on her scanty finances. Rumania and Czechoslovakia, hunted by the fear of bolshevism and surrounded by enemies and uncertain friends. Keep up each an army of 200,000 men; while Poland, new to liberty and independence and hating bitterly her former masters, Germany, Russia and Austria, paperizes hers—If to keep on a war footing 300,000 soldiers.

**Face the Menace**  
 These nations have to face the menace of bolshevist Russia, with her 1,600,000 German trained fighters. France comes next to Russia with an army of almost 900,000 men, while England and Italy, whose home populations are about equal in numbers, have respectively armies of 340,000 and 220,000 men. These large bodies of soldiers, withdrawn from the industrial life of their countries, are a constant danger to the peace of Europe, and an almost intolerable burden for the impoverished nations that have to support them.
