# TRADE TREATY HAS BEEN RATIFIED

## PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT TO ASSIST CITIES WITH RELIEF

### Anglo-Canadian Pact Is Approved by Both London and Ottawa

Division in Canadian Parliament Last Night Was 128 to 80—Old Country Legislators Vote 416 to 68 in Favor of Agreement

OTTAWA, Nov. 4.—A few hours after the British Parliament had voted its final approval, the Canadian House of Commons last night ratified the Anglo-Canadian trade treaty, negotiated at the recent Imperial economic conference in Ottawa, by a vote of 128 to 80. Conservative members voted en bloc in favor of ratification and were joined by one Liberal, J. L. Hsley, Hants-Kings, Nova Scotia and six Progressives. The remainder of the Liberal, Progressive, United Farmer, Independent and Labor members voted against the treaty.

### FIVE-DAY WEEK NOW

Paramount Studios Adopt Plan in Order to Increase Number in Employment

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 4.—A five-day working week, which is expected to increase the number in employment by 21%, went into effect at the Paramount Pictures Corporation studios yesterday. All employees on an hourly basis are affected.

### Golden Gate Span Contracts Are Let

Three Million Dollars Advanced to Start Construction of Bridge at San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 4.—Three million dollars of the \$6,000,000 which will be required to build the projected bridge across the Golden Gate having been advanced by the banks. Preliminary contracts in connection with the great span were let yesterday.

### NEVADA BANKS STILL CLOSED

United States Treasury Department Taking Steps Towards Their Reorganization

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 4.—The Treasury Department intimated yesterday that steps were being taken with a view to early reorganization of banks in the state of Nevada which have been closed for three days owing to financial difficulties. George Wingfield, Reno capitalist, is the principal figure in the situation.

### PRINCESS HELENE GIVEN PARTIAL CUSTODY OF SON

BUCHAREST, Roumania, Nov. 4.—After having reached an agreement with King Carol whereby she obtains custody of her son, Crown Prince Michael, for six months of each year with the right to keep the boy during that time either in Roumania or abroad, Princess Helene left Bucharest yesterday for Italy. Princess Helene denied suggestions that a reconciliation between herself and King Carol might be impending.

### Britain Also Approves

LONDON, Nov. 4.—The British House of Commons last night approved the Anglo-Canadian trade treaty by a division of 416 to 68. All Nationalist government supporters voted in favor of the agreement, Free Trade Liberals and Laborites voting against.

### Many Convicts Are Paroled in South

Only Two of Six Hundred Released Men Are Rearrested During Month

BATON ROUGE, La., Nov. 4.—Owing to overcrowding of penal institutions in the state, the Governor of Louisiana during the past month has released six hundred convicts. So far, only two of the paroled men have been rearrested.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 4.—James Hall, screen actor, was on his way back yesterday to New Haven, Connecticut, where he will answer charges of non-support laid by his wife, Irene Hall.

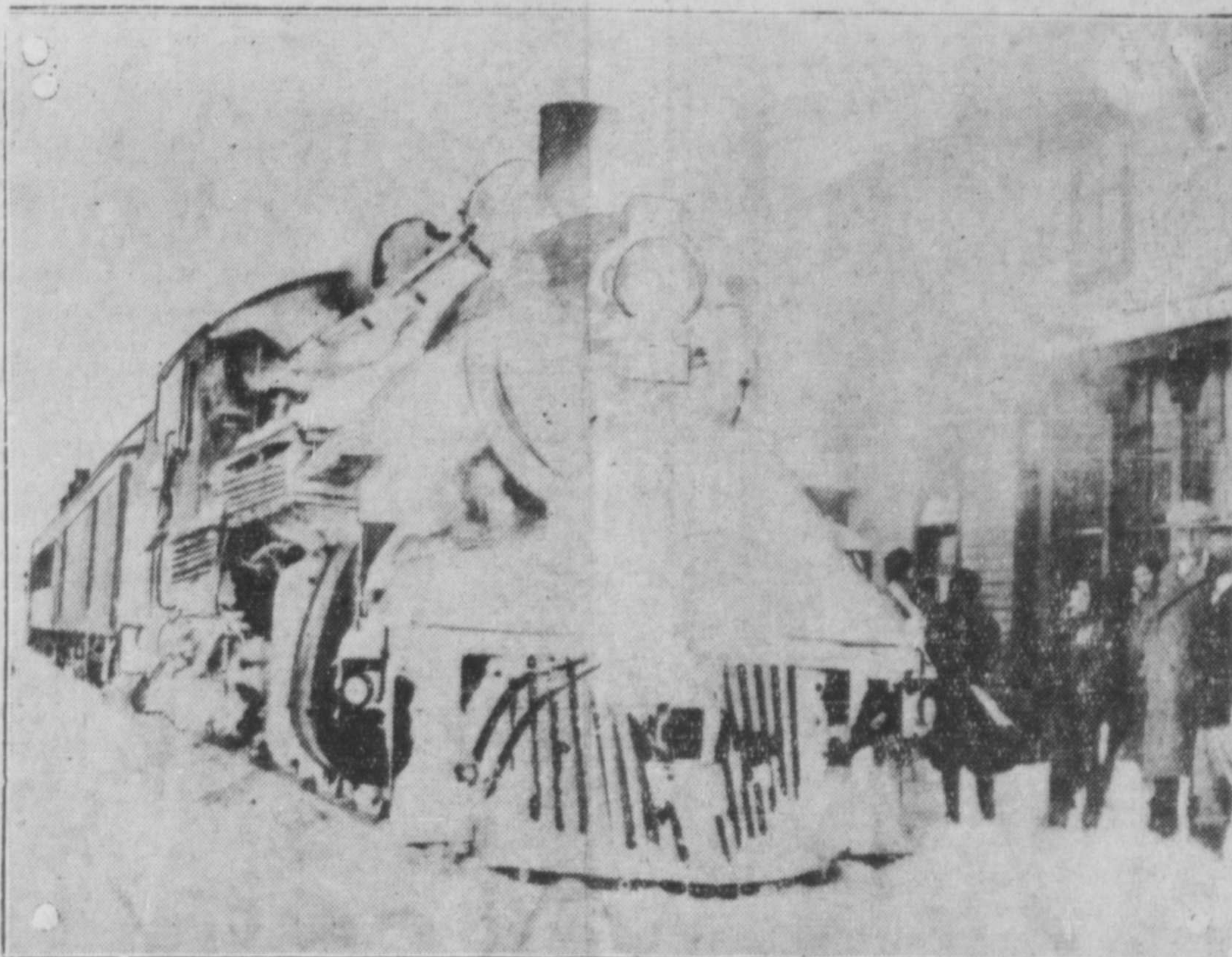
### Vancouver Pays \$1400 Per Month In Medical Fees

## Prince Rupert is Listed Among Municipalities Which Will Get Advances During Coming Winter

Money Will be Loaned But Cash Will Not be Handled Locally—New Scale For Relief of Married Men and Families Under Consideration

VICTORIA, Nov. 4.—British Columbia municipalities to be aided by payment of their relief bills in the next two months by the provincial government will pay 5.5% on these loans and will not handle the cash. Instead, cities will be paid by the province from funds it has borrowed from the Dominion government at interest.

Approximately twenty-five municipalities may have to be helped during November and December. Ten which have already been assured of such aid include Burnaby, Fernie, Prince Rupert, North Vancouver City, North Vancouver District, Port Moody, Prince George, Trail, Port Coquitlam and Port Alberni.

The government is getting ready to suggest a new scale for relief of married men and families in urban centres. A maximum aid of \$35 a month per family is being mentioned unofficially. Municipalities are also to be budgeted in respect to their total relief costs in the next few months.

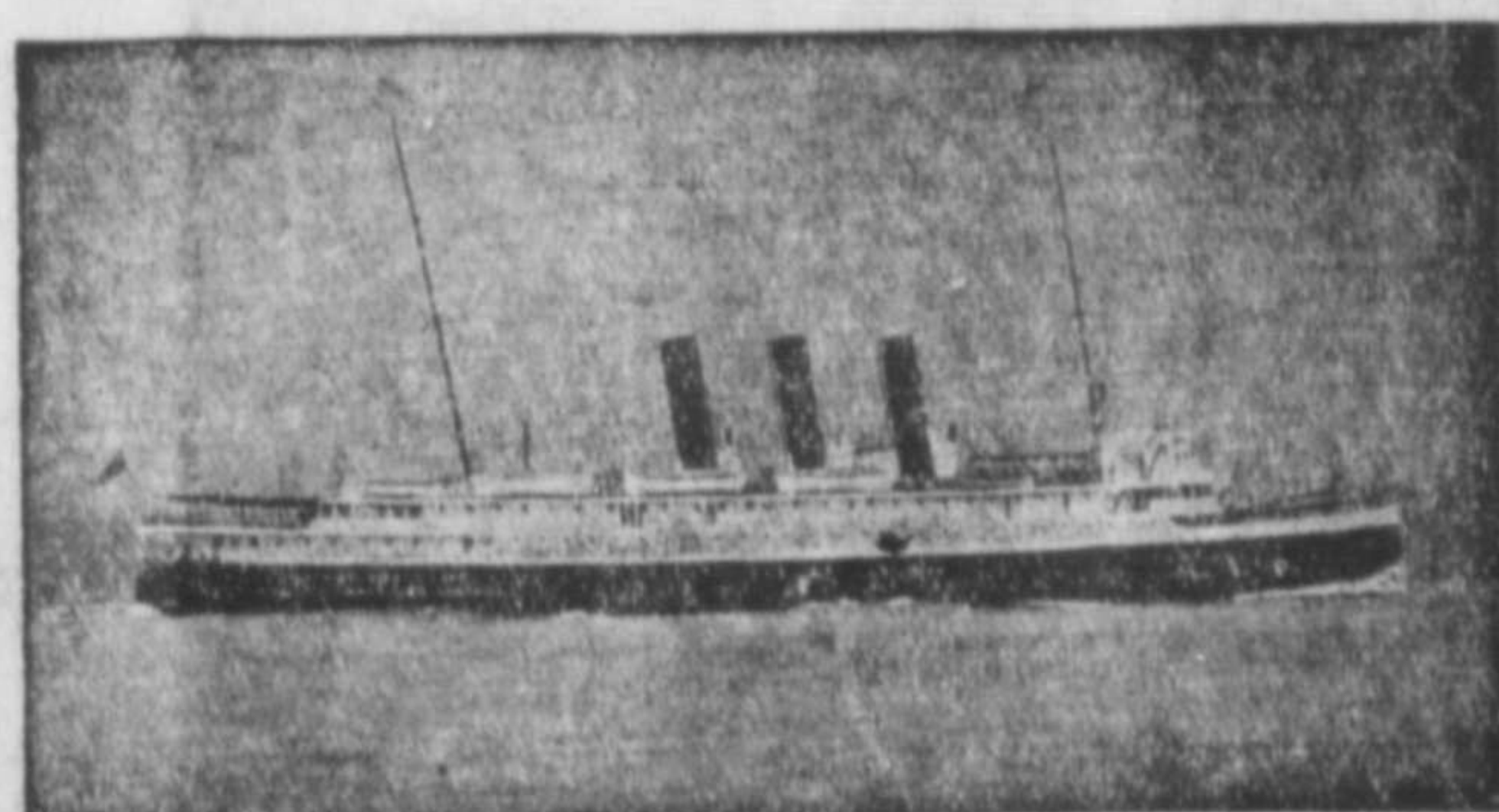

### EMBARGO AGAINST JAP GOODS IS ORDERED BY GOVERNMENT OF U. S.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 4.—A virtual embargo on canned tuna and salmon and electric light globes from Japan is ordered in instructions issued to collectors of customs at all ports in the United States. Unprecedented dumping of these commodities of late is given as the cause for the action of the government.

### POLICE HEAD HAS RETIRED

Deputy Commissioner T. S. Belcher of Royal Canadian Mounted Police Superannuated

OTTAWA, Nov. 4.—Retirement on pension of Deputy Commissioner T. S. Belcher of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police was announced yesterday. His successor has not yet been appointed but Assistant Commissioner J. W. Spalding of Regina will assume the duties of Acting Deputy Commissioner.

### PROBE IS STILL ON

North Carolina Authorities Not Yet Satisfied as to Nature of Reynolds' Death

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C., Nov. 4.—Carl L. Higgins, state prosecutor, announced yesterday that the death of Smith Reynolds, young tobacco magnate, last July was still under investigation, the authorities being not satisfied yet as to the circumstances under which the millionaire youth came to his end after a drinking party in his home. Libby Holman Reynolds, his wife and former Broadway "torch singer," and Ab Walker, Reynolds' secretary, are still under indictment on charges of murder in connection with Reynolds' death.

### Deputy Minister Of Defence Named

Col. L. R. LaFleche of Ottawa Appointed Successor to George J. Desbarats, Retired

OTTAWA, Nov. 4.—Col. L. R. LaFleche of Ottawa has been appointed deputy minister of national defence succeeding George J. Desbarats who retired on November 1.

### CHINAMAN MURDERED

Wong Bat, Wealthy Merchant of Kelowna, Came to His Death By Blow on Head

KELOWNA, Nov. 4.—An autopsy has revealed that Wong Bat, also known as Wong Sam, who was at first believed to have died from natural causes, was, instead, killed by a blow on the back of the head with a blunt instrument. The investigation is proceeding. Wong Bat was a wealthy local Chinese merchant and is known to have been in the habit of carrying considerable money about with him. He was found dead in his garden.

### EXCISE TO BE REDUCED

Impost on Cigarettes and Tobacco to Be Cut Under Bill Introduced in Commons

OTTAWA, Nov. 4.—Hon. E. B. Ryckman, minister of national revenue, introduced a bill in the House of Commons yesterday to reduce the excise tax on cigarettes and tobacco. This would bring the excise tax into line with tariff changes in the Anglo-Canadian trade treaty.

MONTREAL, Nov. 4.—From first reports, it would appear that ten cigarettes for ten cents and twenty for twenty cents would be the popular selling packings, an official of the Macdonald Tobacco Co. said in announcing today that the reduction in excise tax, which is to be made by the federal government, will be passed on to the consumer immediately.

### REUNION AT PALO ALTO

Brother and Sister as Well as Other Relatives of President Will Be There on Election Day

PALO ALTO, Cal., Nov. 4.—A reunion of the Hoover family will take place here on election day next Tuesday. The president will be met by his brother, Theodore Hoover, head of the engineering faculty of Stanford University, and his sister, Mrs. Lodge. Other relatives of the president will also be here. President and Mrs. Hoover will cast their own votes at Stanford University.

### CAMPAIGN STRENUOUS

President Hoover to Make Thirty Speeches Today and Saturday On His Way West

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 4.—President Herbert Hoover, who left here for the west by special train at 4:10 yesterday afternoon, expected to make at least thirty speeches today and Saturday in Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, Nebraska, Minnesota and other mid-west states. On the way to Palo Alto, Cal., the president's home, where he will be on election day, the presidential train will probably make many brief stops so that assembled crowds may hear the chief executive.

Right Rev. Bishop E. M. Buno, O. M. I. wrote from Paris on October 20 that he was leaving there for Canada October 29. It is expected that he will soon be back in Prince Rupert. He has been in Rome after attending the recent Eucharistic Congress in Dublin.

**MOOSE WOMEN HAVE BANQUET**

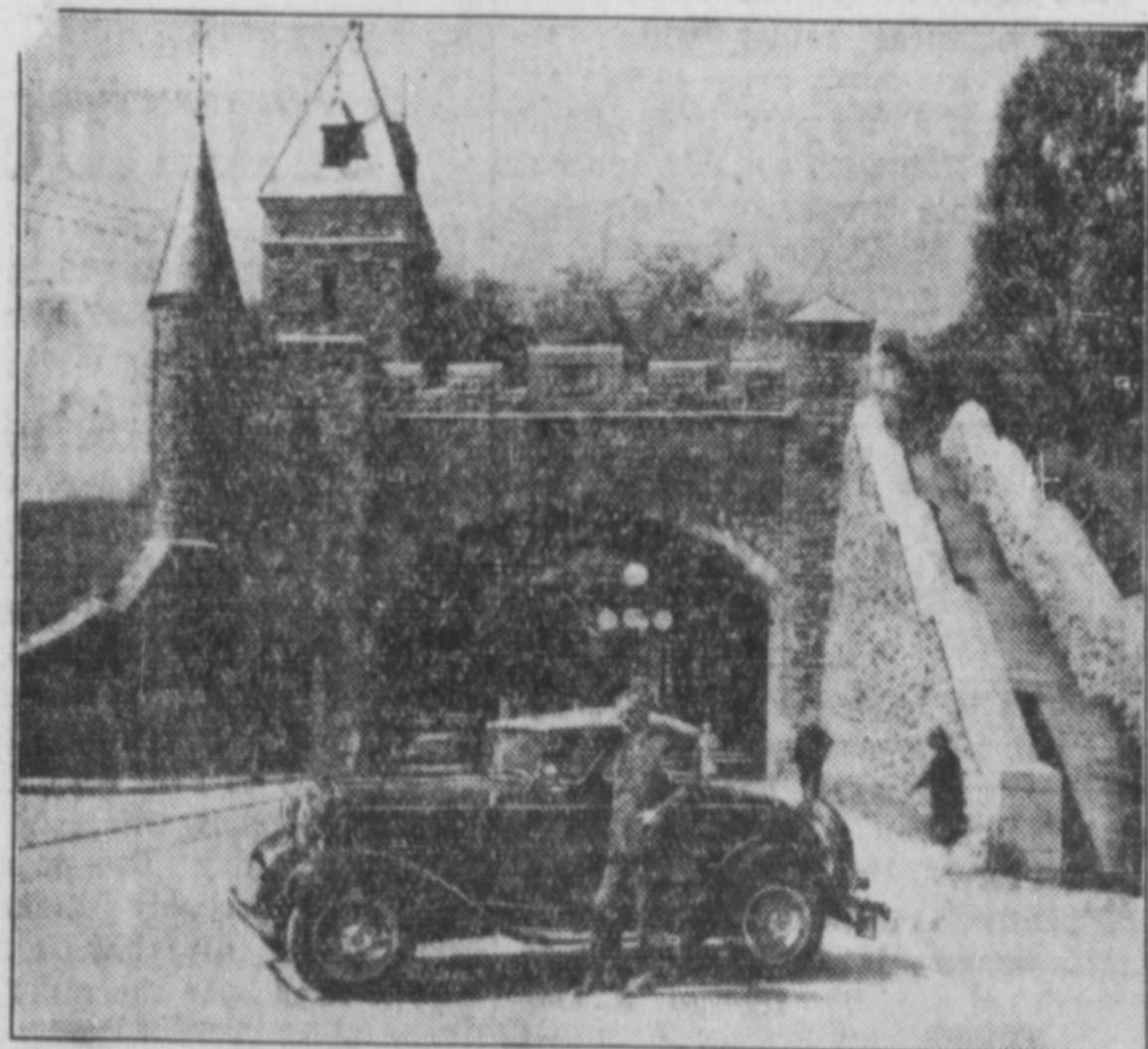
Jolly Affair Held Last Night With Good Crowd in Attendance

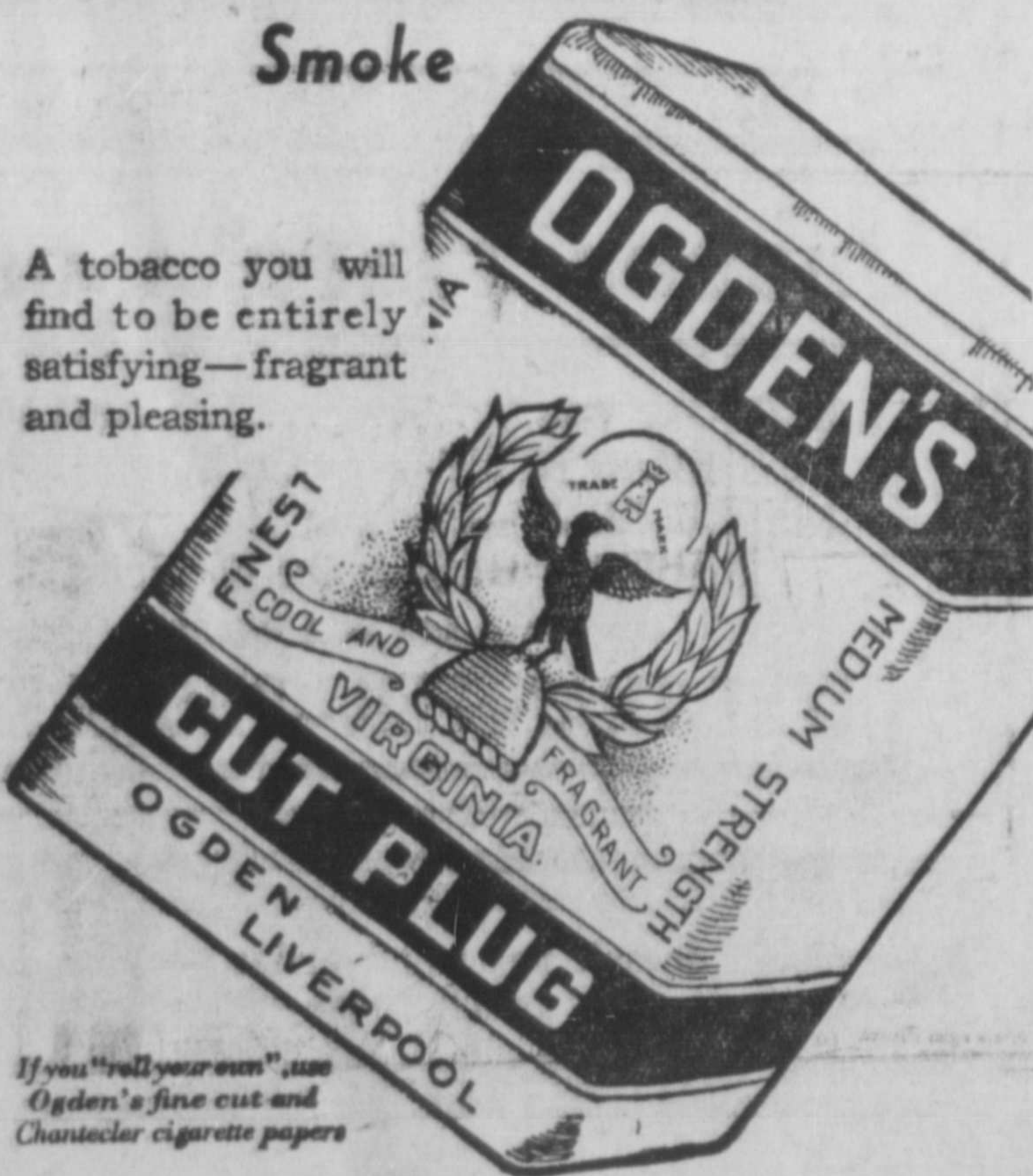
