Severe Storm Swept City Last Night HALIBUT CATCH SO FAR THIS SEASON IS WELL UP TO AVERAGE

Sixty Mile Southeaster Caused Some Damage; Loss is not Very Heavy

Plate Glass Windows and Sidewalks Suffer Down Town--Residences Also Shaken Some

Considerable damage has been done locally as the result of the sixty mile an hour south-east gale which struck the city at an early hour this morning. A velocity of 70 miles an hour in the gusts was blowing. Telephone and light communications suffered somewhat and the light and phones in several localities were temporarily interfered with. The Daily News office was tied up for about half an hour.

The wind blew with such force that at times the air was filled with shingles from roofs, pieces of loose boards and other missiles making it unsafe for pedestrians on the street.

The old tree east of Fulton Street, between Fourth and Fifth Avenues, which has stood as a landmark on the top of the hill, was swept down to the sidewalk and early this morning lay a tangled mass. Fortunately no one was passing at the time or serious consequences might have resulted.

The rotary wheel at the head of the sidewalk to the railway depot was blown from its moorings.

A number of houses throughout the city have suffered damage to roofs and windows, a great deal of the damage having occurred on Fourth Avenue W. where the full velocity of the wind was felt. The aerial pole of Jack Barnsley's wireless outfit was snapped off about half way up.

The telephone wires on Ninth Avenue W. became seriously entangled by the wind and took the linemen some time to unravel.

Plate Glass Windows
Plate glass windows came in for their share of the damage, and the windows at McMeekin's, Central Hotel, Mrs. Frizzell's, the Jap Mission on Sixth Avenue, and the Dominion Government telephone office were blown in.

The waterfront did not fare so badly and no damage is reported to boats. One of the lumber piles at the E. H. Shoreley lumber wharf was blown into the bay.

Both telegraph lines went down close to the city, the trouble on the government service being between here and Port Edward.

At the dry dock about ten feet was blown off one of the old sheds which was used by the Prince Rupert Dry Dock and Engineering Co. and Wallace's in the course of ship construction. The damage was of little consequence, the particular building, a furnace shed, now being the property of the receivers.

Sidewalks Suffer
Eighteen yards of sidewalk on Third Avenue, and sixteen feet of sidewalk on Second Avenue was torn up by the wind and turned over on to the street.

The windows in the Catholic School, corner of Fifth Avenue and Fulton Street suffered severely and as a consequence the children were unable to attend school this morning.

The delivery car of the La Casse Bakery was turned over on its side outside the store.

An anxious time was spent by members of the Prince Rupert Yacht Club last night who had small crafts moored at the boat house. Several owners of boats kept a dog watch all night. A gas boat belonging to F. Chandler broke from its moorings and was blown across the bay.

When engaged against the latter the new machine, it is claimed, will be able to dart down, discharge its torpedoes at the enemy vessel and climb out of range of anti-aircraft guns in no time. Its ability to climb rapidly will enable it to destroy quickly any Zeppelin that it sights. It is credited with a speed of three miles a minute.

Great secrecy is being observed about another machine, a four-seater known as the "Hisson," which it is also predicted will do wonders. It has been specially designed for landing on and taking off from the deck of a battleship or aircraft carrier.

OPPOSITION TO STEEL SMELTER

Project for Establishment Near Vancouver Opposed Says Sun

Opposition to the establishment of the proposed steel smelter for Western Canada at or near Vancouver is said to be coming from large United States and Eastern Canadian steel interests says a London cable to the Vancouver Sun. Pressure is being brought to bear upon the Dominion government, it is stated, to prevent it from sharing with the Imperial government and the British Columbia government in guaranteeing the debentures of Coast Range Steel, Limited.

Following an interview with Hon. W. S. Fielding in London recently, Henry Landahl, moving spirit behind the scheme to place a steel industry in Western Canada, stated that the Canadian finance minister's attitude had not been wholly satisfactory.

Mr. Landahl expressed the fear that powerful steel interests in Eastern Canada and the United States have looked with little favor on developments promising a steel industry in the West, which would be in a position to compete in the growing Far East market, and are doing their utmost to discourage continuance of the plan.

While the Imperial government, Mr. Landahl states, has confirmed in writing its statement that it would hold £800,000 for the undertaking, it is conditional upon the support of the Dominion government.

Alternative Plan
Mr. Landahl is shaping alternative plans and it is possible that he will ask the British government, which has also agreed to subscribe guarantees equivalent to £800,000, to condition its guarantee not only upon the Dominion government and the Imperial Trade Facilities Committee guaranteeing the other two-thirds of the capital required but to add the clause "or Coast Range Steel, Limited, supply the other two-thirds of the capital required."

H.M.S. CAPETOWN ARRIVES VICTORIA

VICTORIA, Nov. 3.—H. M. S. Capetown, of the Northern Atlantic and West Indies Squadron, is in port today from Monterey, California. The vessel will remain for a short time on the coast.

The Capetown is the first battle cruiser to visit Victoria since the Raleigh was here last year. The lower deck ratings of the ship are to be entertained by the ex-service organizations of the city and the Navy League, plans having been under way for some time.

FISH ARRIVALS

Storm Holds Arrivals up Considerably—Only One Boat In

Only one boat marketed fish this morning at the Fish Exchange. The arrival was the M. J. Christopher with 12,000 pounds of halibut which was sold to the Royal Fish Company at 11.00 and 7.50.

The storm which raged early this morning has prevented boats from coming in but, with the abatement of the wind, it is anticipated a heavier catch will be marketed tomorrow.

TWO MILLION DOLLARS FISH

Catch so Far This Year Totals 21,085,850 Pounds—900 Carloads

About 900 carloads or, to be exact, 21,085,850 pounds of halibut has passed through the port of Prince Rupert from the fishing schooners for shipment to the world's markets so far this year. To place the value of the commodity at an average of 10c, a low figure, the total valuation would be over \$2,000,000.

Last year's total halibut catch through Prince Rupert was 21,750,000 pounds. Providing November and December are but average months in quantity of fish landed last year's total should be easily exceeded though, perhaps, not by a very large margin.

THIS BOAT WAS WELL SUPPLIED

In Appealing for Return Confiscated Liquor, Captain Says 24 Cases Was Ship's Stores

VANCOUVER, Nov. 3.—An appeal was made before Mr. Justice D. A. Macdonald yesterday against the decision of an Alhambra magistrate confiscating 24 cases of whiskey and a gallon of rum found aboard a 35-foot gas boat belonging to J. H. Peterson. The defence was that the liquor was a part of the ship's stores and a private allowance for Capt. Peterson and his crew of two during a fishing trip to the West Coast Banks. The judge ordered a cancellation of the \$75 fine imposed because the penalty for the carrying of liquor was confiscation and not a fine. The judge, however, could not see his way clear to ordering a return of the liquor.

SCHOONER ORIENT IS IN DRY DOCK

The Seattle halibut schooner Orient, Capt. F. H. Rudd, while en route to the Westward fishing grounds developed crankshaft trouble and put into port yesterday afternoon. The craft is now at the dry dock to undergo an overhaul of the crankshaft bearings. It is expected that the work will be completed and the vessel will leave for the fishing grounds in a few days' time.

DAWSON COMING HOME FROM OTTAWA SOON

F. G. Dawson, member of the Canadian National Railway board, is expected to leave Ottawa on Saturday en route home. He will probably arrive in the city towards the latter part of next week.

FREEMAN SENT UP FOR TRIAL

Committed by Magistrate McClymont on Charge of Obstructing Customs Officer

Capt. Hoopes K. Freeman, master of the launch Narbethong, who held up the business of the local customs office on Tuesday morning when he took up his post in the Hallway of the Dominion Building armed with a short carbine, was committed for trial by Magistrate McClymont this morning on the charge of obstructing William John Nelson, customs officer, in the pursuit of his duties. The plea of the accused that the charge should be dismissed because there was no evidence to prove more than the shadow of a threat was not entertained. Evidence was given by W. J. Nelson and John Wynn, customs officers, and Chief Vickers and Constable D. S. Cameron.

The first witness called was W. J. Nelson, customs officer, who said that on the morning of October 31 last, upon going upstairs to the Customs House, situated in the Post Office building, he was stopped by accused who had a rifle. Prisoner had told him to stop or he would shoot. This happened at 9 o'clock in the morning.

John Wynn, customs officer, in giving evidence, said that on the morning in question he arrived at the Customs House before anyone was there. Shortly afterwards accused arrived with a rifle. He asked when the Customs office opened and witness told him at nine o'clock. Accused said that it would not open that morning and threatened witness with the gun.

Constable's Evidence
Constable Cameron said that he was present when accused was brought out of the Post Office building about 1:20 p.m. on Tuesday when Ben Self was carrying the rifle. Witness stated that the rifle was ungalvanized and that no shells were found on the person of the prisoner. Previously the constable had endeavored to persuade Capt. Freeman to come down, but prisoner told him he wanted a square deal and would not come down until he had been promised an investigation into his trouble.

Police Chief Vickers in giving evidence said that the gun was handed over to him at the police station by Constable Cameron on Tuesday last. Upon prisoner being given over to him he was searched but no shells were found.

Wanted Dismissal

Magistrate McClymont read the evidence to Capt. Freeman and asked him if he had anything to say warning him that anything he said would be taken down and used in evidence against him. Prisoner asked that the charge be dismissed because there was no evidence to prove more than the shadow of a threat. Freeman was then committed for trial to the higher court.

OBSERVER LEAVES

After Undergoing Brief Overhaul in Local Shipyard

The C. G. M. M. freighter Canadian Observer, Capt. Cooper, which arrived in port on Tuesday morning and went on to the dry dock, left port at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon after completing cleaning, painting and a minor overhaul.

WHISKEY CASE IS PROCEEDING

Charge Against Ernest Colombe Being Dealt With in Police Court Today

Ernest Colombe, charged with selling intoxicating liquor, to wit, Scotch whisky, entered a plea of not guilty when the case commenced before Magistrate McClymont this morning in the city police court. Evidence for the prosecution was taken before the noon adjournment and the case is proceeding again this afternoon with the evidence of the defence being recorded. Milton Gonzales, of William & Gonzales, has the case for the defence, while City Solicitor T. B. Hooper is prosecuting.

The first witness called was Provincial constable W. T. Harrison, of Vancouver, who identified the accused. In the course of his evidence he said that on Thursday, Oct. 12, in company with Constable Dixon, he entered the premises of the Commercial Hotel about 5:30 p.m. Upon entering they saw accused sitting at the fire. They walked straight down the passage turned to the right and through a spare room into another room. The accused then brought out two small fluted whiskey glasses and a bottle labelled Millburn's Scotch Whisky.

Paid One Dollar
Witness saw a bottle of Johnny Dewar whisky in the cupboard and asked for it. Accused brought out the bottle marked Dewar and handed a glass to Dixon. Witness picked up a glass into which he poured some of the contents of the bottle and upon drinking it found it to be intoxicating liquor, to wit Scotch whisky. After drinking, accused was paid \$1, took the glasses and rinsed them in cold water. Witness then brought the next drink and picked up the glasses off bureau paying accused from which he did not receive any change. They then left the premises.

On October 26, witness, in company with Police Sergeant McGlinchy, returned to the Commercial Hotel with a search warrant. They saw the accused and read the search warrant over to him. He took them up to his room, No. 4, and there they found three bottles of Long John Scotch whisky and five bottles of Henry Simpson.

The bottles taken were identified in court by witness.

MEXICO WANTS TO GO TO CONFERENCE

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 3.—Participation of Mexico in the Pan-American Congress in Santiago Chile, next March which is still in doubt, has given rise to much editorial comment here, the consensus of opinion being that if Mexico is not invited to the conference she will lend herself readily to a Pan-American league of nations as recently suggested by President Bruin, of Uruguay.

There is in the editorials an undercurrent of pique and hurt pride, however, that Mexican participation is even in question. El Universal recently stated that "if Mexico is not present at Santiago, the Congress will not have full significance and will serve to create a feud between Spanish-America and Washington." The newspaper says it believes the Latin countries will eventually demand that Mexico be admitted as an equal.

LONG SENTENCE FOR KIDNAPPING

Thirty Five to Forty Years Imposed on Man Who Carried Off Young Girl

MUSKEGON, Mich., Nov. 3.—Raymond Wilson, who pleaded guilty to a charge of kidnaping eleven year-old Rosalie Shanty when she was coming from church on Sunday, has been sentenced from thirty-five to forty years imprisonment. Wilson carried the girl off in an automobile and she was away from home for three days. She is suffering from shock and may die. The girl is a famous swimmer of the locality.

VICTORIA TO HAVE REFERENDUM HALF HOLIDAY QUESTION

VICTORIA, Nov. 3.—The city council has pledged itself to submit a referendum to the voters at the civic election in December on the half holiday question. There is a controversy in the city over which day should be the weekly half holiday. Managers and owners of stores favor the mid-week day which is now in force, while clerks and employees favor Saturday. The latter have submitted a widely signed petition to the council and plan to augment it with so many names that a referendum to the people will be forced.

LITTLE DAUGHTER ATTORNEY GENERAL BREAKS HER ARM

Little Miss Marguerite Manson, six and a half year old daughter of Attorney General and Mrs. A. M. Manson, met with a severe accident last Saturday at Victoria when she fell from a tree and broke her arm as well as sustaining other less important injuries. The Liberal party was in caucus when Mr. Manson was notified by phone. The caucus adjourned when he departed for home and did not resume until late this week.

Question of Alsace-Lorraine's Status.

The status of Alsace-Lorraine, the butt for many years of German and French border differences, will be discussed at an international conference to be held there this fall. Autonomy and neutrality for the little country is the moving spirit behind preparations which are being made for the conference. It is expected that a number of delegates will come from America, especially Alsations living there. Friends of the movement are to be invited also from Switzerland, England, Denmark, Italy, Sweden, Norway, Holland, Spain, and other countries.

At a recent meeting in Kolmar of persons interested in the project, it was unanimously decided that the proposition for autonomy and neutrality should be placed before the League of Nations. The consensus was, however, that support should first be assured in such lands as the United States and England, and in countries which were neutral during the World War.

Speakers at the assembly, particularly those coming from agricultural districts, voiced opposition to the French administration. They cautioned at the same time against "sighing for the Prussian spiked helmet."

Political Conditions in Great Britain

Political conditions in Great Britain will bear comparison to almost anything that denotes disorder, from a scrambled egg to a strike riot. The collapse of the coalition released the elements of which it was composed. But the Unionist "split," and the Liberals stayed split. There are thus two so-called Unionist parties in the field, two so-called Liberal parties, and the Labor party; with a possibility that the late premier may be able to hold the "dissident" members of the two former together and reduce the total to a quartette. In the readjustment a good many well known figures are finding themselves in strange company. Perhaps the most notable instance is that of Mr. McKenna, former Chancellor of the Exchequer under Mr. Asquith, who is supporting the Bonar Law Government. For the time, too, some prominent men seem to have got lost in the shuffle. Mr. Chamberlain and Mr. Balfour have not been heard from since the crash, and Mr. Winston Churchill is for the moment out of public life because of ill-health. The voters are under fire of political argument from all sides, some of it evidently manufactured in Moscow. The Labor party has issued a manifesto pledging itself to tax the rich unmercifully and spend the money in delusion that that would help the poor. Mr. Asquith's following have issued a manifesto the chief purpose of which seems to be to assure the public that they are not socialists, though the contents are of a kind to make one wonder where the line of distinction runs. Mr. Lloyd George says he and his associates will support any government that stands for "peace, economy and progress"—patterned after their own ideas of course. The new premier proclaims the ground-work of his program to be a desire to restore public confidence, indulge in fewer stunts in the field of international politics, encourage industry, and help the revival of trade. Edmonton Bulletin.

G. S. Malloch, of the Dominion geological survey, has just finished a survey of the Ground Hog coal fields. He says that the field is not as large as at first anticipated but it has many seams containing large quantities of coal.

Capt. Alexander and Capt. Hawthorne, owners of the famous Engineer mine, at Atlin, went south on the Princess Sophia which passed through this port yesterday afternoon. They had samples with them of gold ore from the property, the value of which is said to run as high as \$100,000 per ton.

Joe Belway and Alex. McLaren arrived from Kitsumka on today's train. They recently made a rich strike of ore in the Kalum district.

NEEDLE SWALLOWED BY WOMAN REMOVED FROM HER DAUGHTER

STOCKTON, Cal., Nov. 3.—Three years ago Mrs. Frank J. Schwing, then Miss Ethel Frinck, swallowed a needle two inches long. Two months later she was married. Charlotte, her 22-months-old babe, began to cry recently and continued apparently without cause. Mrs. Schwing investigated the girl's repeated rubbing of a spot on her left shoulder and felt a foreign body under the skin. She found the needle. The head of the needle had disappeared. The blunt end of the needle finally protruded and the mother withdrew it. Neighbors were present when she withdrew the needle. Mother and daughter had never suffered pain from the needle until the girl felt it in her shoulder.

The fire brigade answered a call early this morning to the house of Alderman Geo. Kerr on Borden Street. Upon arrival a slight chimney fire was found to be in progress. It was easily overcome with a hand extinguisher.

TELLS ABOUT LOCAL FACTORY

George Bushby Addresses Rotary Club on Work at Tuck's Inlet

"When I came to Prince Rupert and took charge of the reduction plant at Tuck's Inlet I found the buyers did not want Prince Rupert product at any price. They could not rely on it. Now, after a season's work and the marketing of first class goods, people order by wire without question as to quality." That was the important statement made by George Bushby in an address to the Rotary Club yesterday.

Mr. Bushby said he had learned a good deal since he came here last spring. In reading up on the reduction and fish rendering business, he found that it was an ancient industry. The Chinese had engaged in it for many centuries. The Malays had been doing the same and using the product for fertilizer and food. In Britain fish had been used for fertilizer but the oil soured the land. Then the oil was taken from it and the fertilizer used.

Feed for Cattle

It was only of recent years that Germany conceived the idea of feeding swine and cattle with the nitrogenous proteins taken from fish. It was found that this had great food value and could be fed to poultry or cattle up to from seven to ten per cent without flavoring the meat or eggs. The protein from fish is more valuable than that from vegetable matter. Fish meal is now classified as a commodity for transportation.

Mr. Bushby compared the fish meal with meat scraps and showed that only in one or two cases was a meat scrap of higher nutritive value than fish meal. It was made from fresh fish and was not decomposed.

The oils manufactured here contained very little acid. They were used for tanning, for the manufacture of linoleum and synthetic rubber and some of it for paints. Hitherto they had shipped most of the product to the United States but now they had discovered a Canadian market which people had been buying from the people to whom the local market had been selling.

Telling of the process of manufacture, Mr. Bushby explained that the scrap fish was first cooked in huge cookers for three and a half hours. The oil was allowed exude, then it was put through hydraulic presses and the oil taken out. Then the oil was broken up and the glue and other by-products were taken out. The oil was shipped away on the car barge to the railway and thence to the market.

No Odor Left

The meal was dried in a steam drier leaving only from five to six per cent of moisture. This prevented decomposition. There was no odor left.

Mr. Bushby said they were trying to live up to the Rotarian standard and latterly had received nothing but congratulations on the quality of their product.

They were now asking the Government for a bounty to the fishermen on dog fish in order that they might be able to secure

HABITS OF GULLS ON ISLAND WATERS TO BE STUDIED

Scientist to Study Seagulls on Inland Waters

BURLINGTON, Vt., Nov. 3.—The migratory habits of sea gulls which year after year have made the Four Brothers Islands, in Lake Champlain, their breeding place, will be studied by a party of scientists who plan to visit the islands next summer. Professor Harry F. Perkins, of the University of Vermont, probably will head the investigators.

Full and authentic information concerning the habits of the birds is lacking and, in an effort to clear up some disputed points, the scientists propose to attach small bands to the legs of the young birds to serve as identification marks during the migrating season. The task will not be accomplished without difficulty, as the old gulls are known to resent strongly any interference with their offspring, and the investigators look forward to receiving some severe buffeting from the outraged parents.

The plan is in line with the aims of the National Bird Banding Association, whose members make a record of every bird banded, and send a copy for file to the headquarters of the association at Washington. Whenever a bird with a band upon its leg is captured by a member of the association, headquarters will be notified, and in this manner information relative to the movements of birds is obtained.

AMERICAN MUSICIANS INVADING ENGLAND

British Bandmen Object to Being Replaced by Players From States

LONDON, Nov. 1.—A number of saxophone players came to England from America. Presumably to be students, they very soon began work in English orchestras. The incident brought to a head the resentment of British musicians against the employment of Americans while native players are out of occupation. The Musicians' Union has decided that the only effective way to deal with the matter is to approach individual employers of American musicians. A beginning will probably soon be made with a prominent West End hotel which employs two bands composed of Americans, some of whom it is alleged have only been employed after British musicians had been dismissed for them. It was suggested that a trade dispute shall be declared against this hotel, and that the support of ex-Service men shall be invited. In cases where British ex-Service men are affected, the British Legion has already promised its active assistance.

CHANGING SEXES SCIENTISTS CLAIM

LONDON, Nov. 3.—The day should come, according to eminent British zoologists, when science will be able to determine and to control the power of growth. The interest taken in this subject was shown by the numerous audience which attended a lecture on interauxiliary before the British Association by Dr. F. A. E. Chew.

Dr. Chew is the scientist who last year reported the result of some remarkable experiments during which he changed hens into crowing cockerels. The continuation of these experiments, he said, had resulted in the complete reversal of the sex of hens and cockerels. But his lecture this year dealt chiefly with goats.

A case was known to him, he said, of a goat which had won prizes when an immature female and which came later to assume male characteristics and in behaviour was a male.

"I believe," he said, that an animal possessing the functions of the female can undergo such a complete transformation as to function as a male.

WIDOW LOSES CASE AT PRIVY COUNCIL

Compensation Act Covered All Cases Happening Within Province of B.C.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—(Canadian Press).—The appeal in the case of Walpole against the Canadian Northern railways was dismissed by the judicial committee of the privy council. The appeal was from a judgment of the Saskatchewan court of appeal, which affirmed a decision of Justice Bigelow.

FIFTH NORWAY'S PEOPLE BOOTLEGGERS

Great Competition in Illicit Business—Prices and Percentages

CHRISTIANA, Nov. 3.—Illicit liquor in Norway has become such a profitable trade that it is estimated twenty per cent of the population is active engaged in rum smuggling. Excitement and adventure induced appeal to many people, and as means small factor causing them to enter the business.

The competition in the trade is so great that ninety per cent alcohol from Germany is bought at thirty cents a quart on the boats and sold for two dollars. The water portion of this stuff is weak and contains a large percentage of weak alcohol and other poisonous ingredients.

These ashore this liquor finds ready market at many times its value, and it is sold under the eyes of the government in all the cities and towns of the straited districts.

The press of Norway agrees that the situation is little short of a public scandal, but it is unable to offer any suggestions to how the revenue department should cope with the law violators.

Meanwhile the government is losing millions of crowns, as the liquor brings no revenue into the state treasury.

VICTORIA CLAIMS MAIL DELAY FROM NORTHERN POINTS

VICTORIA, Nov. 3.—A delegation from the Chamber of Commerce recently waited on Post Office Inspector J. B. Corley and urged the need of greater consideration by Vancouver post office workers for mails from northern points to be transhipped to Victoria.

It was stated that undue delays occurring in transshipment of mail was greatly handicapping Victoria merchants in their conduct of speedy business with northern points.

Mr. Corley pointed out that if the complaints were due to post office delays there would be a prompt remedy, but he feared the origin to be due to late arrival of steamers from the north, which would cut into the time allowed for sorting letters from the smaller centres as to make it impossible to avoid delay. He promised every effort would be made to remedy matters.

The case of J. B. Robertson, charged with selling whiskey, will be heard in the city police court tomorrow morning before Magistrate McClymont.

SERVE CIGARETTES AT DRESS PARADES IN LONDON STORES

LONDON, Nov. 1.—Wonderful tea parties have been in progress at the big stores, where autumn dress parades have been held. At the more ambitious a half was called midway in the parade, and an army of parlor-maids and porters appeared with little fold-up tables, opened them out, spread them with snowy damask in the twinkling of an eye, and placed a little pot of tea, thin sandwiches, bread and butter and little cakes in front of each visitor.

Other firms send round mere cups of tea on trays followed by an army of elderly waiters with plates of cakes; while others again, more slipshod, planted two tiny cakes on the saucer of each cup and dared their clients to ask for more.

Where parades were held at the more exclusive private firms cigarettes were handed around after tea, which had the result of making women sit on to finish their smoke and see the second part of the show instead of bolting, as some of them did immediately after tea at less hospitable places.

MYSTERIOUS STUDENT OXFORD UNIVERSITY

LONDON, Nov. 3.—M. Venizelos, former Greek Premier, who is now very much in the public eye and is something of a mystery to the British public, has an equally mysterious young secretary, a tall, dark youth named Andrea Constantino Michelopoulos.

He was an undergraduate at Oriel College, Oxford, until a few months ago, always immaculate, well dressed and a brilliant scholar. His studies, however, did not prevent his participation in politics, and he frequently obtained permission to spend a night away from college ostensibly on domestic affairs. It has since transpired, however, that such trips included flying to Paris by aeroplane and returning the following day.

Michelopoulos left Oxford a few weeks before the Tino coup, but arrived in Greece only in time to escape on board Venizelos' private yacht. Before coming to Oxford he had been Civil Governor of Lemnos, Prefect of Eastern Macedonia, and had served in the Greek Army.

AIR PRESSURE AND LEVELS OF LAKE

CHICAGO, Nov. 3.—How to regulate the level of the Great Lakes and why the level of Lake Michigan varies at different points at the same time, is the subject of a report made public by John F. Hayford, dean of the engineering school of Northwestern University. Experiments over a period of eleven years formed the basis of the report. Dean Hayford and his colleagues concluded that when the barometric pressure of two points varies, the lake level will vary inversely as the barometric pressure.

Dean Hayford advocates the regulation of lake levels by the construction of movable dams in the St. Lawrence river near Lake Ontario and in the Niagara River opposite Buffalo, N.Y.

ARTIFICIAL EYELASHES ADORN PARISIAN WOMEN

PARIS, Nov. 3.—A superb set of silky eyelashes, secure for all time and impervious to loss through laughter or tears, may be had in Paris for a price, or rather two prices, the cost in francs charged for the operation and the pain which this same operation entails.

There are Parisian women who gladly pay both. The lashes are sewn into the edges of the lids by a deft surgeon, and take root there after about twenty days. Seen close at hand, they show no scar or rim around the lid to betray the surgeon's touches.

CONGRESS BUSINESS ON NOVEMBER 20

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3. — (By Canadian Press)—President Harding's purpose now is to call Congress back to Washington, November 20. This is the information which has been given members of Congress who have recently conferred with him. It has not been announced officially and there is as yet no certainty when official announcement will be made. Also, it is true that a number of leaders are still trying to induce the President not to call the extra session.

Ship subsidy will likely be before the House as soon as the extra session meets. The Senate will consider it in the regular short session which opens in December.

While the House takes up subsidy, the Senate will consider the anti-lynching bill demanded by colored republican voters. A number of other important measures will be pressed for passage this winter, including a general overhauling of the existing law relating to railroad labor and the railroad labor board. The Harding administration wants to avoid an extra session next spring but the program of proposed legislation of the first order is so long that it is by no means sure it can be avoided.
