PREMIER BONAR LAW IS BUSY ON CABINET

BRITISH POLITICAL SITUATION STILL HOLDS CENTRE OF STAGE IN BRITAIN

Remarkable Ovation Given Llyod George this Afternoon at Guild Hall Luncheon to Prince of Wales

LONDON, Oct. 20.—Lloyd George received one of the most remarkable ovations ever witnessed in the Guildhall this afternoon when he arose to propose the health of the Prince of Wales, who was the guest of the corporation of the city at a luncheon.

For several minutes it was impossible for the premier to proceed and he was visibly affected.

In the early part of the speech Lloyd George was nervous, an unusual condition for him, but he soon regained mastery of himself. In his remarks he avoided any reference to the political situation.

CHINESE ARE ON STRIKE YET

Will Not Send Children to Separate Schools in Victoria

VICTORIA, Oct. 20.—The Chinese of this city are still maintaining a boycott against the separate schools opened by the school board for Chinese pupils. The board's ultimatum expires today and, if the pupils are not back, the schools will be closed. The students on the enrollment list will be declared to be habitual truants and will be barred from entering any Victoria school this term.

A Chinese school in Chinatown may be opened where only Chinese is spoken and it will be conducted in Chinese style. Several Chinese teachers have volunteered for the work without pay. This is the first expression of the threatened policy of Chinese non-co-operation.

LOCAL WOMAN WAS KILLED

Mrs. Helen Longpres Met Death in Auto Accident at Calgary

Word was received in the city today of the death of Mrs. Helen Longpres, formerly of this city, who was killed in an automobile accident in Calgary. No particulars were received, the telegram to the local police from the funeral directors merely requesting that Mrs. Longpres' father, Fanny McKay, be located for instructions.

The late Mrs. Longpres had lived in Prince Rupert for some ten or twelve years, her residence recently having been on Fraser Street and at the Commercial Hotel. She was about 30 years of age. She left the city about six months ago for Prince George, later going to Alberta.

JURY DISAGREED IN CHINESE MURDER CASE

NANAIMO, Oct. 20.—Wong, O. Sang, accused of the murder of Lin Sang at Cumberland last November, may be released on bail after a year in jail. His third trial concluded yesterday with another disagreement of the jury.

DIED AT DAWSON

DAWSON, Oct. 20.—During the last two days two pioneers died in their sleep here. They were D. E. Clindinnin and Oscar Gustavson.

Bonar Law will not Form Cabinet Until Chosen Leader Conservative Party by Caucus, He Tells King

LONDON, Oct. 20.—Right Hon. Andrew Bonar Law, who was yesterday offered the position of Prime Minister, told King George that he could not begin the task of forming a new cabinet until the Unionist caucus had elected him leader of the party. This it is understood may be done next week.

Mr. Bonar Law's ministry will be brief, it is understood, because his health is not good enough for the arduous duties.

All parties in this country announce readiness for an immediate general election if it should be called.

Meantime Lloyd George holds the premier's office and is carrying on the business of the country until his successor is ready to take the position.

CANADA WILL TAKE PART IN EXHIBITION OF BRITISH EMPIRE

OTTAWA, Oct. 20.—Right Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King informed all the provincial premiers that Canada will officially participate in the British Empire exhibition in England and asks to what extent the provinces will participate in the expense which may be considerable.

FRANCE STILL SORE OPPOSE LONDON FOR NEAR EAST CONFERENCE

PARIS, Oct. 20.—France refused to approve London as the meeting place of the near east conference, the date for which has been set tentatively for November 13. The event will take place at Lausanne.

DEVELOPMENT Q.C. ISLANDS

Fred Stork Very Optimistic Over Future and Says Are Coming Into Own

The mill at Massett Inlet will be operating in a big way within sixty days, according to Fred Stork, M.P., who returned yesterday on the launch Epauline from visiting Buckley Bay, Massett and Port Clements. Mr. Stork looks to big results from this industry which, along with others, will bring the islands into prominence in the near future.

In view of the activity that is developing at the Queen Charlottes and the value of these activities to Prince Rupert, Mr. Stork suggests that that Prince Rupert Board of Trade might well organize an excursion to tour the islands next year. The islands are wonderfully rich and they are tributary to this port. The timber wealth is commanding attention on the outside and the demand for spruce for box purposes for which it is well adapted, is likely to lead to a great deal of development. It is Mr. Stork's opinion that the islands are about to come into their own.

Mr. Stork looked into the matter of providing navigation aids for the vessels which will visit Buckley Bay and also discussed other public works with the residents.

TOTAL WHALE CATCH WAS 187 FOR SEASON

VICTORIA, Oct. 20.—The total catch of whales made by the Consolidated Whaling Company this year was 187. The season was a short one only lasting four months. During that time 94 mammals were taken at Naden Harbor and 93 at Kyuquot station on the west coast of Vancouver Island.

SHOOTING CASE ASSIZE COURT

Evidence of Captain and Mate Given Against Prisoner McEachern

In the assize court this morning, before Mr. Justice Murphy, the petit jury was selected and members sworn in to try the case of Rex vs. McEachern, in which a true bill was returned by the Grand Jury yesterday. McEachern is charged with shooting at Mate Matthews of the whaler "White" at Massett on August 24.

Geo. Smith was chosen as foreman, the other jurymen being: T. A. Roy, James Sheddin, W. J. Scherck, Alex. Strachan, N. C. Robinson, W. E. Willisroft, Howard Steen, S. A. Bird, W. G. Oakley, R. A. Sims, and J. A. Edwards.

A. Domaghy, Terrace, appeared for the crown and Milton Gonzales, of Williams & Gonzales, for the defence.

The first witness called was Captain Anderson, who was skipper of the White at the time the shooting took place. Capt. Anderson said that McEachern had been aboard the whaler White since last May. The whaler White was owned by the Consolidated Whaling Company of Victoria, B.C.

In the early morning of Aug. 24, between 8 and 9 o'clock, the accused had spoken to him on the question of pay. This happened while the boat was in Naden Harbor. McEachern said that the men on the other whalers were getting more money than the men on the White. Capt. Anderson told him that he did not think so, but the accused still insisted that they were paid more.

Went to Massett

From Naden Harbor the White went to Massett when all the men aboard went ashore. The boat was in Massett for three hours.

On the way back to the boat Capt. Anderson had seen prisoner just below the store about 200 feet from the wharf. Accused and another man were strolling around together. The captain then got all his men aboard and pulled out from the wharf. Captain Anderson took the wheel, while J. R. Matthews, the mate, was on deck some where but did not know just where.

McEachern came up on the bridge from the wharf and started to argue about the pay on the different whalers. He claimed that the whalers at Kyuquot were getting better pay than the whalers at Naden Harbor. Mr. Anderson said he did not think they were and that he did not know anything about it. Accused told him he did know and called him a liar. Captain Anderson then put the prisoner off the bridge, pushing him through the door, and he went down the steps with his face toward the bridge.

After accused had gone on to the deck J. R. Matthews, the mate, came on to the bridge and talked with Mr. Anderson. Mr. Matthews went to look over the bridge railing and the skipper heard a shot, and saw the mate fall.

Jumped Overboard

Captain Anderson then left the wheel and looked over the bridge when he saw accused standing forward with a rifle in his hands. Mr. Anderson then rushed on to the deck to get the gun from McEachern. The

SMUTS IS FIRM AGAINST RIFLE

Will Not Tolerate Rule of Gun in South Africa He Says

LONDON, Oct. 20.—(Canadian Press cable)—The case of the miner, Stassen, who has been convicted of killing two natives during the recent rand revolt, and was executed, despite frenzied labor appeals and a personal request from General Hertzog, the Nationalist leader, to Premier Smuts, for a reprieve for the condemned man, was referred to by Premier Smuts in a speech at Springfontein.

The premier said that the judges at the trial had arrived at the conclusion that the death sentence was the only one possible in Stassen's case, and there was no doubt in the minds of himself and his colleagues and the governor-general that the sentence must be carried out.

It was a bitter thing, Premier Smuts said, to condemn a man to death, but, if he had not advised the governor-general as he did in the case of Stassen, he would not have been worthy of his position as head of the government. He deprecated, as the greatest danger to the country, the tendency in South Africa to refer disputes to the arbitration of the rifle.

No Extremists

The premier declared, so long as he was in power, he would not tolerate the rule of the rifle. He would not permit extremists to rule the country. England, he said, had become great because she insisted upon the maintenance of law and order and respect for authority.

Referring to world conditions Premier Smuts said South Africa, in spite of all her difficulties was ten times better off than other countries. Looking around, it seemed to him the old world had reached its zenith and a decline would follow.

BELFAST, Oct. 20.—The capture by Free State forces operating in North Galway of Commandant General T. Maguire, member of the Dail Eireann and one hundred men under him is announced.

BRITISH AND AMERICAN MARINES LANDED TODAY AT VLADIVOSTOK PORT

VLADIVOSTOK, Oct. 20.—British and American marines landed at this port today to guard the consulates of the two nations.

PASSENGER STEAMER AT ST. JOHN UPSET

ST. JOHN, N.B., Oct. 20.—The passenger steamer Dream upset and sank in St. John River this morning. Two women passengers are reported to have been drowned.

ANOTHER TRAIN WRECKED

DECATUR, Ill., Oct. 20.—Engineer Charles Schumage was buried under burning wreckage of a passenger locomotive in a train wreck which also fatally injured the baggage man. Six others were injured.

Premier Bonar Law is Busy on New Cabinet May Have Difficulties

LONDON, Oct. 20.—Right Hon. Andrew Bonar Law appeared to be making rapid progress today in forming a cabinet to replace the fallen coalition government but he cannot officially announce the formation of his ministry until he is elected head of the Conservative party to succeed Austen Chamberlain. It is generally conceded this will be simply a question of formality.

The new premier was busy seeking out eligibles at an early hour today. He is showing the utmost energy but doubt is expressed if he will be strong enough to stand the long hard strain of office.

It is believed in Conservative circles that Bonar Law's cabinet will be completed before the end of next week. This prediction, however, ignores dark hints from some coalition sources of difficulties Bonar Law may perhaps encounter.

Prominence is given here to a story that Lloyd George proposes to form a centre party with Austen Chamberlain and other leading coalition unionists, it being insinuated that this connotes an important opposition to the regular Conservatives. There are also hints at the possibility of the retiring prime minister taking a course which will compel an immediate election. Much depends upon the forthcoming speech at Leeds. If this is a challenge to the Conservative party in their new independence and an attempt is made to sow dissension in that party dissolution would probably follow.

RICH MINE AT SMITHERS

J. F. Duthie Says Depth Has to be Proved by Diamond Drill

J. F. Duthie, the Seattle shipbuilder and owner of the Mamie and other mining claims at Hudson Bay Mountain, Smithers, stated yesterday at the Rotary Club luncheon that they had taken out five tons of ore from the mine near Smithers that had assayed over \$1800 to the ton and he had one hundred tons more that went \$200 to the ton. The only question that was yet to be solved in connection with the mine was its depth and he was about to put on a diamond drill to prove it. There was a wonderful mineralized area at the Hudson Bay Mountain and if this venture was a success it would mean a great deal to the town of Smithers and also to Prince Rupert.

Mr. Duthie said he was now fighting for proper freight rates. He was spending a lot of money at the mine and hoped to get co-operation.

HEAVY FINES BY COURT AT JUNEAU

JUNEAU, Oct. 20.—Three sentences were imposed by Judge T. M. Reed in the U.S. District Court on persons convicted since the beginning of the present term, two for violations of the prohibition laws and the third for simple larceny. John Wagner was sentenced to 60 days confinement in the local Federal jail and to a fine of \$500; Ed. Lamb five months in jail and a fine of \$500; David Peratovich to serve 60 days in the local Federal jail, the latter being the simple larceny case.

Judge Reed also specified that in case the fines in the Lamb and Wagner sentences were not paid, they should be served out in jail, the additional confinement, however, not to exceed 250 days.

Case is Dismissed

On the motion of J. H. Cobb, counsel for the plaintiff, the case of Salina McGree vs. Ole Orson was dismissed by Judge Reed, the dismissal being without prejudice. Orson was represented by H. L. Faulkner and H. B. Le Fevre. The suit was for the recovery of \$1,000 claimed by the plaintiff and involved in local real estate transactions some years ago.

MAKE BARGAIN IN AUSTRALIA

Minister of Trade and Commerce Outlines His Plan For Reciprocal Business

VANCOUVER, Oct. 20.—J. A. Robb, minister of trade and commerce, told the local board of trade yesterday he hoped to conclude in Australia a trade bargain which will mean more purchases in Canada. He reminded his hearers that the agreement must be reciprocal and they could not expect Australia to buy everything in Canada and sell nothing in return. He mentioned wool which the new Australian tariff makes more easily purchasable direct from Australia and said he hoped to secure to Canada some of the lumber and canned fish purchases which Australia was now making from the United States.

MOUNTIES MAY GET LAND PRIVILEGES SAME AS SOLDIERS

MONTREAL, Oct. 20.—M. J. Crehan of Vancouver was re-elected president of the army and navy veterans of Canada. At the annual meeting here a resolution was adopted favoring mounted policemen being given scrip or land privileges the same as soldiers.

VANCOUVER BEATEN IN BASEBALL GAME

VANCOUVER, Oct. 20.—The all-star baseball team from the major leagues en route to the Orient defeated the local team here yesterday prior to sailing. The score was 16 to 3.

Have You Registered For Civic Campaign?

Today is the day to register so that you may be entitled to vote at the civic elections this winter. Anyone not the registered owner of property must go to the City Hall and register or he or she will not be allowed to vote at the civic election. Anyone not registered before the end of the month is off the list until next year.

Most people put off the matter of registration. They think there is plenty of time and then they wake up on November 1st, after duly celebrating Hallow E'en to find that there is a real civic campaign under way and they are without the right to vote.

In spite of all the efforts of the committees and individuals there are always a lot of people who do not take the trouble to register. There are also a lot of people who find that they would like to have the right but it is denied them. Your vote may be the one that will bring good government to the city so do not neglect the opportunity today.

British Changes Take Place Rapidly.

When Lloyd George was defeated there was no delay in giving up office. He did not hang around for a week before handing in his resignation to the King. Almost the moment he heard that the Conservatives had decided against him and even before calling Parliament and laying his position before them, something he would have been quite justified in doing, he went to the King, told him he no longer possessed the confidence of Parliament and that he wished to resign. The King promptly accepted the resignation and just as promptly called upon another man to take his place. That is representative constitutional government as carried out at headquarters in connection with the mother of parliaments.

New Premier Is Said To Be Popular.

Premier Bonar Law is said to be popular. He is a Canadian by birth, a bluenose, but for twenty years he has been interested in British politics and has had a powerful influence there, especially previous to and during the war. When he resigned the leadership of the House of Commons under the Lloyd George regime, it was thought he had retired permanently from public life and some of his former political enemies began to deliver the funeral oration, but he is back to prove that he is just as good a man as they said he was.

There is a curious situation developing in Britain today. On the election that is to take place in the near future will depend to a great extent what the future of the country will be. Many think labor will come into power, but judging at a distance and from a quite ex parte point of view, we should prophesy that Bonar Law will win the forthcoming election. The only thing that can beat him would be a union of Labor and Liberal forces under Lloyd George and there seems no likelihood that such a union will take place, especially after all the bitter things Labor leaders have said about the former premier.

New Company To Use Dog Fish.

Another company is being organized to utilize dog fish in addition to the one at Tucks Inlet. The latest is to operate at Skidegate Inlet if it gets going. A Victoria lawyer and an expert manufacturer have the company in hand and it is quite possible more will be heard of it soon. If the company locates at Skidegate Inlet, this will be an additional industry to the many likely to be established on Queen Charlotte Islands in the near future.

EXPECTS BIG FISH CATCHES

Many Vessels Have Gone North
And Should Come in With
Halibut

BUSINESS DISCUSSED

James Lee Gives Interesting Talk
on Industry and Its Problems

That the present autumn deliveries of fish are likely to be large and that the catching of halibut in the autumn is a menace to the future of the halibut industry were the chief points made by James Lee in an address before the Rotary Club at its luncheon yesterday.

Mr. Lee said that he was brought up in a small fishing town of about ten thousand inhabitants on the shore of the North Sea and that his father was a fish curer. There were eighty or ninety fish curing establishments in the town. One of the first jobs was as an accountant in a steam trawling establishment. Later he went with a Scotch cure concern there and at other centres.

It was in 1911 that Mr. Lee first came to Canada landing in Vancouver where he first went into a lumber yard and later spent two years in the fish business on Queen Charlotte Islands. He came here and worked with McRae Brothers and for the past seven years had been manager of the Atlin Fisheries at this port.

Least Developed

The fish business, Mr. Lee said, was the oldest and until recently the least developed industry in the world. Prehistoric man had fished before he had tilled the soil. The industry was eradicated in the North Sea, which was particularly suited to propagation of fish being shallow with an average depth of 60 fathoms. The Dogger Banks averaged about eight fathoms. The bottom was affected by the waves and the sunlight was able to penetrate the shallow waters. This helped to produce the food on which the fish feed.

Another advantage the North Sea has is that there are 160,000,000 people living around it and these are all fish eating people.

Producing Area

Mr. Lee went on to say that ten million square miles of the water surface of the earth was a fish producing area. It was known as the continental shelf. Fish lived to eat and be eaten. There were no deaths from old age. The halibut banks on this coast extended from Oregon to far Alaska, a distance altogether of about 2,000 miles. The 100 fathom mark was the limit on the outside of the area which was long and narrow. It was about the same as the fishing area of the North Sea. The southern banks had been fished out and at the spawning season, which was from now to the end of the year, the halibut were found in large quantities on the northern banks. Last year they were brought here in large quantities and this year more vessels than ever were going north for the fish. With this big fleet operating he looked for a big catch.

All fishermen were agreed that it was almost a crime to catch the fish during the spawning season. The question was being taken up by the Fisheries Association and by the Fisheries Commission and it was expected a close season would be arranged. The fish were very poor when spawning. On one shipment he had sent to New York the shrinkage had been as much as 20 pounds to the box.

The halibut was twelve years old before it began to breed so propagation was slow. The fishing power was increasing and unless protective steps were taken a rapid decline in the halibut on the banks would be bound to follow. The fisheries had suffered from being a sideline instead of being administered by a separate government department. They hoped to have a minister in charge before long.

F. L. Buckley, manager of the Massett Timber Co., who has been over to the Queen Charlotte Islands, making arrangements for the opening of the lumber mill at that point, returned on the launch Epauline yesterday morning and left on the Prince George for Vancouver last night.

At the termination of the card playing delightful refreshments were served after which dancing was enjoyed to the strains of Arthur's orchestra until the early hours.

LABOR COMMITTEE MET LAST NIGHT

The organization committee of the labor movement met last night in the Exchange block.

It was decided to subdivide the city into eight districts in which a house to house canvas will be made by the different members of the committee for the purpose of seeing that all eligible residents are on the civic voters' list.

A public meeting will be held next Thursday evening in the Carpenter's Hall when short speeches will be made by some of the prominent workers in the labor movement on certain phases of civic politics as was outlined in the editorial of the Daily News of yesterday's date.

Steps are being taken to enlist the sympathy and support of other labor organizations that are not affiliated with either of the central labor bodies.

ALASKA JUNEAU IS GOOD PRODUCING MINE

JUNEAU, Oct. 20.—If the present rate of production is maintained through the remainder of this year, the Alaska Juneau will mine this year approximately 2,260,000 tons of ore, surpassing the best year's production ever experienced by the Gastineau Company, according to P. R. Bradley, General Manager of the company. The Alaska Juneau produced in September an average of 7,450 tons daily and a total for the month of 224,000 tons and the present rate of production is slightly in excess of that, said Mr. Bradley.

MISSION WORK OF METHODISTS

Figures Received on Wire Yesterday Were Misleading, Mr. Hacker says.

In connection with a telegraphic despatch which came yesterday, and which seemed misleading, Rev. G. G. Hacker stated this morning that the general conference of the Methodist Church four years ago set out to raise and spend eight millions in five years. Four years had elapsed and six millions of this had been raised.

Of the amount, 65 per cent is expended in Canada or home missions and the other 35 per cent on Foreign missions but orientals in Canada came under the foreign mission classification so that really more than 65 per cent was spent in Canada. The \$810,000 mentioned in the despatch was the amount spent in B.C. this year. Victoria and Vancouver churches were almost self supporting.

In connection with home missions the closest co-operation with other churches is maintained. In Saskatchewan only three missionary churches are continued where either Presbyterian or Congregationalists are located. In New Ontario 81 ministers were released to prevent overlapping and sent to other places.

In Yorkton Mr. Hecker said a home for high school boys and girls living away from home was established and he thought a similar home here would be useful.

European foreigners attending the Southern Alberta College were 100 per cent in their attendance and three won scholarships while three others won silver medals.

DUTCH CLOCK

Odd Time Piece Sent Here from Vancouver to be Repaired

A seventeenth century clock, which is of Dutch origin, the maker of which cannot be traced is a very interesting relic in the hands of Geo. Gibb, the local jeweller.

The clock originally came from Holland and was in the possession of E. Edwards, Lloyd's agent, in Vancouver, who sent the clock to Mr. Gibb in the hope that it could be put in working order, no jeweller in Vancouver caring to tackle it. This has been accomplished and the clock is now in perfect working order again.

The works are entirely made of brass while the face is made of iron on which is painted a Dutch fishing scene, and is decorated with lead facings.

This is a remarkable relic and, as far as is known, is the only clock of this period on the continent. The clock is on view in Mr. Gibb's store on Third Ave. who will be pleased to show it to anyone interested.

DEVELOPMENT OF SOCIETY

Rev. Dr. Grant Gives Interesting Address to Rotary Club

Discussing the growth of society, Rev. H. R. Grant, D.D., yesterday traced the various stages of development through the ages of man up to the present time. He told of the four periods that of the time when man hunted for a living, the age of flocks and herds, agriculture, and the age of commerce and industry.

During the hunting period man was in his most primitive form. He was then more individualistic than today. He was the hunter and his wife and family depended upon him as well as the older people. Trade and barter then commenced, for the clever hunter exchanged the produce of the chase for such other things as he needed. There was also a division of labor for while he hunted, the woman dressed the skins and cooked the food. The development was gradual until flocks and herds were kept and life became more stable. This stability was increased as agriculture was developed and trade and commerce developed. There was also a greater division of labor.

Professional Class

The professional class was recognized early in the race in the medicine man. Laws were evolved and courts grew up for the settlement of disputes.

Later representative government developed and the industrial period began. With the passing from the dark ages, there was a great revival of trade, commerce, literature, and discovery and this was followed by inventions, and the inventions led to the development of large industries and the captains of industry. The fine feeling existing between employer and employee was lost owing to the large number of employees and the fact that they saw little of each other.

Now there were two lines along which we were moving. There was the tendency of capitalism to get all it could and there was the desire for co-operation and betterment of the employees and service to the public. Capital, labor and public were all interested.

Machine Too Big

The question which now arises was whether the immense industrial machine was too complex. Was man big enough to run the machine? Is the machine going to break down in the hands of those who have built it? Every man must respect the right of others and serve the interest of all.

prisoner, on seeing Mr. Anderson, dropped the gun on the deck and jumped overboard. A boat was lowered and the captain and another man named Birch went out and picked McEachern up. Upon getting him back to the deck, Captain Anderson tied prisoner's hands behind him and left him in charge of the chief engineer. The skipper then headed for Massett again and turned the accused over to the provincial police.

Cross Examination

On being cross examined by Milton Gonzales for the defence, Captain Anderson said that but for this particular instance he had never had any trouble with prisoner and had always found him all right. Comparing him with other men he had always found him to be a very good man who had always fulfilled his duties. Prisoner had spoken to him sometime ago on the question of wages but had never given him any trouble on the matter. He had never seen him drinking or drunk.

Mr. Gonzales: "What condition was the accused in when he came back to the boat on the day in question?"

Capt. Anderson: "He had been drinking."

Mr. Gonzales: "Have you any reason to think he would have shot at you if he had been sober?"

Capt. Anderson: "No."

Mr. Gonzales: "You are satisfied that the shot was intended for you and not for Matthews?"

Capt. Anderson: "I do not know as to that."

Mr. Justice Murphy: "Did this man impress you as being drunk when he came to talk to you on the bridge?"

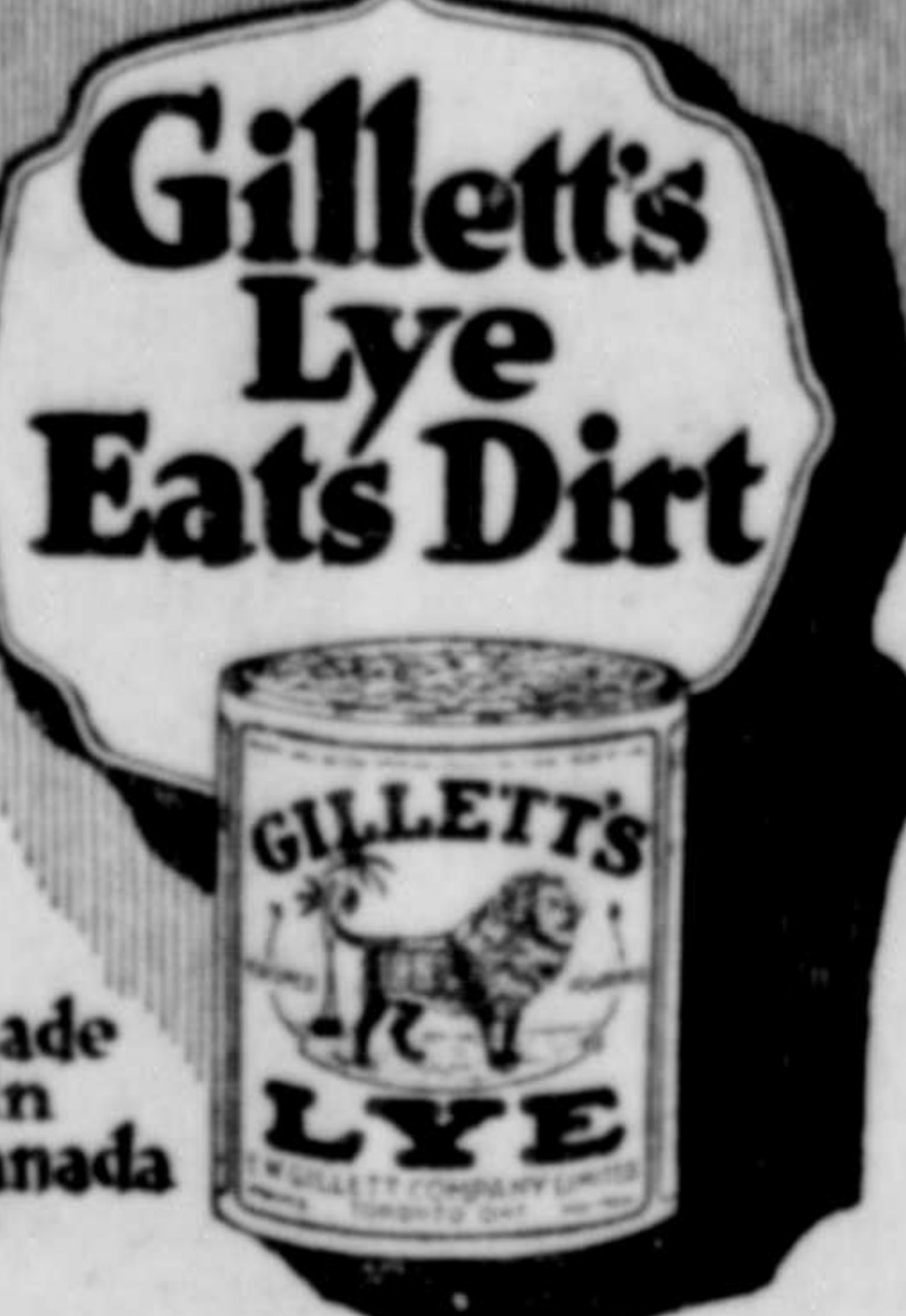

swear to the rifle on exhibit as the particular rifle used by prisoner. The rifle had been picked up off the deck by a man named Peterson.

Matthew's Evidence

J. R. Matthews, mate of the whaler White, was the next witness called. In giving his evidence he said that when the boat pulled out he was on the aft deck pulling in the stern lines. After the boat got under way he heard loud talking on the bridge.

On the way to the bridge he saw prisoner about twenty yards distant coming from the bridge with his back towards him, and McEachern did not see him at all.

On reaching the bridge Mr. Matthews had talked with the captain for a few minutes when he went to the front of the bridge and looked over towards the forward deck. He saw prisoner pointing a rifle at him and heard him say "I'll get you now you old ———". The rifle was let off and the bullet struck him in the head. Mr. Matthews exhibited a furrow across his head which clearly showed the track of the bullet.

The bullet glanced and struck the smokestack. He was blinded with blood from the wound, and was forced to go to his cabin being in bed for three days.

Previous to this occurrence Mr. Matthews had always got along very well with prisoner, who often brought him coffee to the bridge during his turn at the wheel.

Asked whether he considered prisoner was drunk or sober at the time of the occurrence, Mr. Matthews said he did not know but accused had not appeared drunk when he came from the bridge.

The case is proceeding this afternoon.
