Stork's Lead Considerably Increased ENGLAND AND FRANCE SUFFERING FROM INFLUENZA EPIDEMIC

All Telegraph Creek Ballots Thrown Out; With 20 Polls To Be Examined: Stork Lead is 50

The most important development in the recount of the Skeena constituency federal election vote since yesterday afternoon was the throwing out this morning of all the 20 Telegraph Creek ballots because they were typewritten and not printed in compliance with the rulings of the Dominion Elections Act. The result was that Fred Stork gained 16 votes, and his majority, with 20 small polls still to be examined, stands at 50. It is expected that the recount will be concluded early this afternoon.

These Telegraph Creek ballots had been sent by the returning officer. Yesterday afternoon and this morning the recount proceedings continued and there were several minor changes made which did not have a very great effect on the general standing of the candidates.

ANALYSIS OF RECENT VOTE

Conservatives Got 54,000 and
Liberals 50,000 in British
Columbia.

VICTORIA, Jan. 18.—Approximately 154,000 electors of British Columbia voted at the last federal election. The Conservatives got 54,000, or 35.1 per cent. of the vote cast and 53.9 per cent. of the representation in the House of Commons. The Liberals secured 50,000, or 32.5 per cent. of the vote cast and 30.7 per cent. of the representation. Labor, Socialist and independent candidates received 41.3 per cent. of the vote cast and did not elect a candidate.

The total poll of the Conservatives was 54,000; Liberals, 50,000; Progressives, 12,000; Labor, 7,000; Socialists, 10,000, and independent, 875.

LIBERAL EXECUTIVE MEETING SOME TIME AFTER CONFERENCE

VICTORIA, Jan. 18.—Members of the executive of the B. C. Liberal Association will not meet in Victoria next Monday when the Liberal members of the Legislature gather for the caucus conference, according to Premier Oliver today. The executive meeting will be held in the near future.

MONSTER BANQUET OF CANADIAN CLUB

Sir George Perley Guest of Honor in London Yesterday.

LONDON, Jan. 18.—The Duke and Duchess of Devonshire presided at a monster banquet of the Canadian Club of London to Sir George Perley, the retiring High Commissioner, who is returning to Canada.

EARTHQUAKE SHOCKS

Vibrations in Los Angeles Cause
Breaking of Glass Last Night.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 18.—Slight earthquake shocks which are reported from several southern California points late last night caused the breaking of window panes in the residential districts near the coast, cracking the plaster in the ceilings and rattling the dishes on the shelves.

POLICE BARRACKS WERE RAIDED IN IRELAND IN NIGHT

BELFAST, Jan. 18.—The police barracks at Charlestown, County Mayo, were raided last night by fifty armed men, who escaped with a considerable quantity of arms and ammunition. One sergeant was wounded during the raid.

MACKENZIE KING TO BE OPPOSED

To Be Straight Fight Between
Liberal and Conservative
in North York.

NEW MARKET, Ont., Jan. 18.—J. A. M. Armstrong, former Conservative member for North York, who was defeated by Mackenzie King at the general election, will oppose the re-election of the Premier at the by-election, apparently hoping the 3000 votes cast for the Farmer candidate at the last election will go to offset King's majority of a thousand odd. No Farmer candidate will be in the field this time.

DEATH WAS ACCIDENTAL

Coroner's Jury This Morning Investigated Burning to Death of Omar Soubriere.

The coroner's jury investigating the death of Omar Soubriere on Sunday morning last this morning brought in a verdict to the effect that deceased had met with his death accidentally through a fire which destroyed the shack in which he was sleeping. The inquest was held in the police court before Coroner J. H. McMullin and the jury were J. W. Potter (foreman), D. G. Stuart, J. Buckley, J. Barnsley, B. J. Bacon and H. Phillipott. The proceedings took up the most of the morning and the verdict was reached shortly after 12 o'clock. Instructions have been received by the city police to have the remains, which are in the hands of the B. C. Undertakers, shipped to Ottawa for interment.

Saw Blaze.

There were several witnesses heard at the inquest, the first of whom was Tom Watts, watchman on the Canadian Fish and Gold Storage Co.'s trawler, George E. Foster. He had been the first one to detect the blaze at 6:30 on Sunday morning. He rushed to the shack, which was about 400 feet distant, and attempted to get inside, fearing that it was occupied. This he was unable to do although he could see, after the smoke cleared, the form of a man. After the fire was out he saw the form of the man lying on the bed in a natural position. He had seen Soubriere alive last at 10 o'clock that evening at Orme's corner. He was a heavy cigarette smoker but he could not say he had been drunk that evening.

Fire Chief Dan McDonald told of the call to the fire. After the blaze had been put out he and Watts had gone into the shack and found the charred remains of the man lying on the bed. He called for the police and the undertaker who later removed the remains. He would judge that the fire had originated around the bed near the man's head and not from the stove. The shack was lit by a kerosene lamp, he understood. Sergeant Bailey told of a hole that had been burned right through the floor near where the man had been found lying. There was no fire of any extent on the floor between this hole and the stove. The deceased had apparently made no attempt to escape for he was lying on the bed quite straight and natural. There had been no evidence of a quarrel although everything was, of course, burned up.

Smoked in Bed.

E. Briand, partner of the deceased, told of having been in the shack for a few minutes about midnight. There was nobody there but a woman, Mrs. Pillage, the deceased and himself. There were three or four bottles of beer and each had drunk one. There was no whiskey in sight although Soubriere appeared to be a little drunk. When he left Mrs. Pillage was

LARGE CROWD DISPERSED

New Method of Civil Disobedience Adopted in Bengal, India.

CALCUTTA, Jan. 18.—A new method of civil disobedience adopted by a native in the Provincial Congress of Bengal resulted in the arrest today of more than four score persons by the police. The method adopted was the summoning of a public meeting in the prohibited area, thus drawing out a large crowd, which was addressed by members of volunteers. The police dispersed the crowd, arresting eighty-four persons.

EARLY MORNING FIRE IN CAFE

Travellers Cafe Gutted and
Westenhaver Block Had Close
Call—Damage About \$2500.

The Travellers Cafe was gutted and the Westenhaver Block at the corner of Second Avenue and Sixth Street had a close call from being destroyed in an early morning fire today. Fortunately, the blaze was discovered in time and was quickly extinguished after the fire department had been called. The total damage to property was about \$2500 which is covered by insurance. There was quite a blaze and the flames leaped up to the windows of the second floor in which the occupants of the rooms were sleeping. Had the fire not been checked in time there would have been greater damage and possibly loss of life.

The alarm was rung in from the poolroom in the building at 5:15 o'clock and the fire department was quickly on the scene doing effective work. It is understood that the blaze originated from the kitchen range, the Chinese cook having left a fire on when he went out at 2:30 in the morning. There were six cats in the restaurant, three of which were rescued, the others being burned.

PAYMENT MADE BY GERMANY

Hands Over Thirty-one Million
Gold Marks in Accordance
With Decision at Cannes.

PARIS, Jan. 18.—Germany made her first payment today of 31,000,000 gold marks in accordance with the decision of the reparations commission at Cannes, providing for such payment every ten days pending a decision on the whole reparations issue.

Influenza Epidemic Is Sweeping England and France: Is not Virulent

LONDON, Jan. 18.—The outbreak of influenza is still widespread and submarine crews are unable to put to sea with the Atlantic fleet on its annual cruise because of the ravages among them. At present the weather is cold and it is thought it will cause an abatement of the disease. Twenty-five deaths in Birmingham took place during the week, while for the month Middlesbrough reports 139 deaths from the malady.

PARIS, Jan. 18.—Influenza is rapidly becoming epidemic and throughout the provinces health officials admit the disease is spreading, but declare the present epidemic is of no importance compared with the one that swept the country three years ago, when hundreds of persons died every day in Paris.

NOMINATIONS ARE TOMORROW

Only Two Elections in Sight—
Mackenzie King and Graham
to Be Opposed.

OTTAWA, Jan. 18.—With contests certain in two federal ridings, the by-elections for the return of the ministers to be held on February 2, with nominations tomorrow, have taken on renewed interest. The announcement that Armstrong of North York, the defeated Conservative, would oppose Premier King came as a surprise and probably means that the Premier will leave tonight for Newmarket to address a nomination meeting.

Hon. George P. Graham appears to be the only other minister to be opposed. The Progressives of South Essex have decided to contest the election against the minister.

REFUGEES SENT TO ISLAND OF CYPRUS

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 18.—Fifteen thousand Greek and Armenian refugees are being sent from this city to the island of Cyprus in ships provided by the Greek government. Twenty thousand other refugees are awaiting transportation but the French authorities are persuading Christians not to go, as they have secured formal guarantees that the Turks will respect their lives and property.

LOYD GEORGE WORKS ON HIS BIRTHDAY AT A POLITICAL PROBLEM

LONDON, Jan. 18.—Lloyd George celebrated his 59th birthday yesterday. Many congratulations were received from every part of the world. He spent the day preparing an announcement for a Coalition Liberal conference.

SOVIET LEADER TO ATTEND CONFERENCE

MOSCOW, Jan. 18.—Either Premier Lenin or Foreign Minister Tchitcherin will head the Russian Soviet delegation to Genoa economic conference, it is officially announced.

FISHERIES CONFERENCE

Gathering at Alberni Is Attempt
of White Fishermen and Indians
to Co-operate.

VICTORIA, Jan. 18.—A. W. Neill, M. P. for Comox-Alberni, has called a conference of all fishing interests on the west coast of Vancouver Island to consider a program to settle their grievances regarding fishing and marketing conditions.

The fishermen of Barclay Sound recently banded themselves into a joint stock company for better marketing. It is the first attempt here for white and Indian fishermen to work together.

SKATER DROWNS BURNABY LAKE

W. P. Phillips, Aged 19, Victim of
Breaking Ice Near City of
Vancouver.

NEW WESTMINSTER, Jan. 18.—W. P. Phillips, aged 19, was drowned at Burnaby Lake yesterday. He broke through the ice while skating, and while he held on to the crumbling edge for 20 minutes, was unable to get out. He then sank unconscious and was drowned. A companion named Skinner also fell, but managed to hold on for 30 minutes, when he was rescued.

ENVER PASHA GIVEN UP TO NATIONALISTS

LONDON, Jan. 18.—Enver Pasha, former Turkish minister of war, who fled from Turkey shortly after the close of the war, was captured in the Caucasus and has been handed over to the Turkish Nationalist government at Angora.

NORWEGIAN BANK SUSPENDS PAYMENTS

LONDON, Jan. 18.—The Torvested and Skaarens saving bank at Haugesund, Norway, one of the largest institutions of the kind in that country, has suspended payments.

PARLIAMENT MEETS FEBRUARY SEVENTH

LONDON, Jan. 18.—The re-opening of the British Parliament set for January 31, has been postponed until February 7, it was announced today.

Privacy Always
Casts Suspicion.

The Daily News regrets that it is unable to give readers a first hand report of the election recount which is being held in camera here. There has been a good deal of discussion there over the legality and illegality of certain ballot papers and on methods of conducting elections which would have proved a useful guide to returning officers and deputies in the future could it have been reported. However, the law makes no provision for the press to be represented and the court, contrary to the usual custom, did not allow reporters to be there.

There are two parties particularly interested in the result of the election. Provision is made for one of these to be present, but not for the other. One party is the candidates and the other party is the people who voted for them. While the candidates have a personal interest, the vitally interested parties are the sovereign people who do the choosing and whose representatives they are. The people are not represented at the recount and there may be collusion on the part of the candidates to elect one of them without the consent of the people who did the voting, yet the public be none the wiser. A grave suspicion hangs over any private gathering which deals with public affairs. The election is the business of each voter just as much as it is the business of Fred Stork or Colonel Peck, yet while the candidates and their agents are allowed to be present, the press, which represents the people, is excluded.

There is a possibility that the account of the proceedings given by the newspapers is a garbled one and incorrect. There is a possibility that shady transactions have been going on behind those closed doors. The law seems to assume that the candidates are the chief interested parties to the election. That is the old idea of politics. The new idea is that the people should be jealous of their representative and should be kept informed of everything that has to do with his possible election or defeat. The press was allowed to be present at the first count, but at the second, when principles and methods of great value to the electors were discussed, they were excluded. The people are the losers thereby.

Rise of Labor
as World Power.

The despatches of late have been giving more prominence than ever before to the sayings and doings of labor leaders and to the general labor movement. Judging from the present outlook it would seem as if the next contest in Great Britain will be between the Lloyd George party and the labor groups. While labor may not win, the contest will serve to solidify the groups and unify their efforts in readiness for future efforts. It seems very desirable that before a party is elected to power it should be given a term in opposition to prove whether it is able to move as a unit. Should labor prove to be well represented in the next British Parliament it would be the official opposition and would learn a great deal more about government than it possibly can as a free lance group without any responsibility. There is a measure of responsibility for those in opposition, just as for those who control Parliament. Labor as an opposition group with hope of some day becoming the controlling factor in the country can formulate a reasonable policy which would be likely to be adopted by all those who labor, not only by a few fanatics. The extremists are always necessary to prepare the way for future advances, but the extremists can not carry a majority of the people. The people as a whole are moderate in their views and will not follow a demagogue very far.

MINIATURE SUBMARINE
OF SMALL CAPACITYUsed in Europe for Recovering
Treasure From the Sea.

ROME, Jan. 18.—A miniature submarine having a capacity of about one cubic yard and operated by one man has been invented by an engineer of Trieste to recover treasure from ships lost at sea and now lying in ocean depths. The little craft was devised by Francesco Kalin. It has an electric motor, a pump for expelling water and a device for changing

the air within the submarine which will allow her to remain submerged for two hours.

Two reflectors of 3000 candle-power enable the worker to see clearly about him while immersed.

The little submarine is attached by an electric cable to a ship on the surface which can, if necessary, raise the undersea boat. The latter, however, rises to the surface without assistance.

It is claimed that the little craft can descend to greater depths than have yet been attained by submarines. The boat was recently tested by several naval experts.

NEW WHARF AT
ALICE ARM IS
NOW FINISHEDIt and Provincial Government
Road, Both of Which Now
Provided, Fill Long Felt
Need.

ALICE ARM, Jan. 18.—The long awaited Dominion Government wharf at Alice Arm is now a reality. The finishing touches were put on it by Contractor W. T. Muse, of Prince Rupert, on Saturday and it is ready for traffic. With this wharf and the provincial government road connecting it with the town completed, the people now have egress from and ingress to the outside world without having to depend on private wharves or roads.

The new government wharf is located about 600 feet north of the Dolly Varden Railway wharf and is at the end of the government road, a distance of 4000 feet, or a little less than a mile from town.

The wharf contractor started work in October but the nature of the work, both surface and submarine excavating being necessary, made for delay. The excavation under water was especially slow and prolonged owing to the steep shelving nature of the shore line rock. The downward and outward dip of the strata necessitated extra drilling for footings some of them being drilled and shot four times. The services of a diver were required during the entire course of this work.

Heavily Braced.

The wharf is constructed of creosoted piling and is heavily braced, all the braces having been treated. All piers are anchored in concrete forms except the three outer ones which are held in place by sacked cement placed around the footings of the piles. The heavy bracing consists of four 8 by 12 and two 6 by 10 diagonal braces, each alternate bent having an additional 6 by 10 brace. The wharf is further anchored to the shore with six 1-inch galvanized steel cables extending from the front of the wharf and secured to eye bolts fastened in the rock. The dimensions of the wharf are 50 by 100 feet.

The superstructure consists of a warehouse 24 by 50 feet extending back eight feet into the roadway. For unloading purposes a 2-ton hand derrick has been installed.

COMMUNISTS HAVE
DIFFICULT TIME
IN JUGO-SLAVIADeath Penalty Faces Offenders
Against State in That
Country.

BELGRADE, Jan. 18.—Communism seems to have been suppressed in this country. The vigorous action of the government, which recently passed a law imposing the death penalty upon enemies of public security and offenders against the state has struck terror into the hearts of radicals and revolutionaries.

The jails of the country are choked with persons accused of Bolshevik or Communist activity, and others who are not in prison are declared to be either thoroughly cowed or to have fled from the country. Those persons implicated in the murder last July of M. Draskovitch, the minister of the interior, and in the attempt to assassinate Jugo-Slavia's young king, Alexander, will be brought to trial in January. Among them

are a number of Communist deputies in parliament.

Jugo-Slavia's statesmen assert that the entire Communist party, once of formidable and menacing proportions, have been suppressed as a result of fearless action by the government and that many of its members have been exiled or imprisoned.

The parliamentary privileges of Communist members of the National Assembly, numbering nearly 60, have been cancelled and since August none of them have participated in the proceedings. Communist newspapers and propaganda organizations throughout the country have been suppressed and their principals placed in custody or under surveillance. Communism first gained a foothold in Jugo-Slavia in 1919.

TWO ALICE ARM MEN
IN ANYOX HOSPITALJack Murdock Suffering From
Broken Leg and John Strom-
beck, Fractured Thigh.

ALICE ARM, Jan. 18.—Jack Murdock had the misfortune to break his leg last Thursday morning while on shift at the Esperanza Mine. The accident occurred as he was drifting in the tunnel, a mass of rock sliding down and pinning him to the wall. He was brought down by dog team to town and taken to the Anyox Hospital.

John Strombeck, the well known prospector, is also in the Anyox Hospital as the result of an accident last Sunday on the ice when he was playing in a scrub game of hockey and fell, fracturing his hip. He was taken to Anyox by special launch on Sunday evening.

RESOLUTIONS OF FARMERS

Fees of Medical Men Under Fire at Calgary Convention.

CALGARY, Jan. 18.—(By Canadian Press).—More than 200 resolutions have been submitted for consideration of the United Farmers' convention, which opened here yesterday and continues until Friday. They cover a great variety of subjects, including economic, political, legal and educational.

The subject of co-operative marketing of the products of the farm will occupy an important place in the deliberations of the delegates. Resolutions have been submitted calling for the creation of a co-operative wheat pool, while others ask the re-establishment of the Canadian Wheat Board. Other resolutions urge the provincial government to pass legislation favorable to the development of co-operation in the selling of various commodities, while one resolution asks the U. F. A. Central-Office to organize a central selling system in connection with co-operative dairy enterprises. The establishment of Dominion government owned packing houses is urged in a resolution from the Stettler local.

Amend B. N. A.

Among resolutions dealing with political questions is one from Custer Local demanding that the British North America Act shall be so amended as to provide for the abolition of the senate. The same local proposes that the B. N. A. Act should be amended to provide that the position of governor-general shall not be an appointive office.

A considerable number of resolutions deal with the necessity for railway extensions in various districts, while education also receives much attention. The Stettler District Association has submitted resolutions recommending important changes in the curriculum of the grade and high schools, while a number of resolutions on the same subject have been received from the Bow River U. F. A. Constituency Association.

Resolutions have been submitted by a number of locals demanding the recall of Rice Sheppard, who ran in opposition to the U. F. A. candidate in Strathcona in the recent federal election.

The provincial government is urged to introduce legislation to provide that a member of the legislature selected to a position in the cabinet shall not be required to return to his constituency for re-election.

Doctor's Fees.

It is proposed in a resolution from Mount Vernon local that a minimum doctor's fee of \$20 shall be fixed in respect to all maternity cases and that a maximum shall be agreed upon. In a resolution submitted by this local the fees charged by the Calgary Medical Association are quoted as \$35 plus mileage, and the Edmonton Association \$25 plus mileage. Various other changes in legislation affecting the medical profession are requested. Riverton asks that all medical charges shall be regulated by the government. A local of the United Farm Women of Alberta asks that the medical charge in maternity cases be fixed at \$15.

Compulsory medical treatment of defective school children is demanded by Fairacres local, U. F. W. A.

Lake Thelma local urges the establishment of a "democratically owned and controlled credit system," while many resolutions deal with the subjects of banking and credit.

H. F. Wearmouth is on a trip to Alice Arm and Anyox in connection with his duties as agent of the Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment Board.

Editor Daily News:—A recent issue of the News contained a report of the meeting of the Prince Rupert Board of Trade at which it was proposed to send a delegation to Ottawa to press forward the requirements of the western portion of Central, B. C.

The construction of branch lines, as feeders for the C.N.R. were proposed to the Copper River, Francois Lake, Stuart Lake and to the Groundhog coal area, but so far as I have learned, no branch was advocated for your nearest valley, the Kitsumgallum.

The Kitsumgallum Valley, stretching northward from Terrace to the Naas offers an easy grade and is probably the best route for a railroad to the Northern Interior.

The valley lands are fertile and not subject to summer frosts. Anthracite coal outcroppings indicate an extensive coal area. Mineral prospects yield free gold and native silver while the most desirable of fluids, petroleum, percolates through in sufficient quantities to justify the opinion that it will shortly add its wealth to that of the district.

Is there a valley in Central B. C. offering more potential wealth or a better place to commence a branch line to tap the almost unknown resources of Northern B. C.?

QUEEN'S DOLLS TOY COLLECTION

Exhibit in London Attracts Much Attention at Museum.

LONDON, Jan. 18.—(By Canadian Press).—Queen Victoria's dolls, collected by her when a girl and not so very long before she was called to rule over Britain form an interesting part of the exhibition of royal toys in London Museum. The dolls are small, with plain faces, painted exactly alike, and made of wood. Distinction is given to them by their dresses, varied according to the character represented—court ladies, opera singers, dancers, and historical personages. There are about 100 dolls in Queen Victoria's collection, and half of them were dressed by the Queen herself when she was Princess Victoria. The others were the work of her governess.

The young Princess Victoria was devoted to dolls, and derived great pleasure from playing with them. Her painstaking industry, as well as good taste, may be seen in the delicate needle-work of the costumes. The materials are comparatively simple and inexpensive, but she evidently made the most of them by minute decoration and finish. A noticeable feature of the Victoria dolls is the number of lady dolls carrying babies. One stately lady, in an elaborate court dress of white satin has in her arms two infants like twins.

Queen Mary's Collection.

Queen Mary's dolls' house is another feature of the loan exhibition of Royal toys at the Museum. It was a present from her mother, the Duchess of Teck. The miniature furniture and fittings—gifts or purchases made in the course of several years—were personally arranged by her Majesty when she was a girl. The house is between three and four feet high, and about three feet in width. The front opens like two doors on hinges, disclosing the interior of the ground floor and two upper floors. On one side of the hall is the kitchen, and on the other is the dining room. Upstairs are the drawing room and the music room, and on the top floor bedroom and nursery.

Each room in Queen Mary's doll's house is provided with its appropriate furniture—tables, chairs, cabinets, pictures of the tiniest and daintiest kind. On the centre table in the drawing room are diminutive copies of the Bible and the History of England. The little kitchen has a range, cooking utensils, and a dresser with breakfast and dinner ware. In the nursery are miniature toys.

Boys' Horses.

As the favorite plaything of little girls has always been the doll, so for boys who know they are boys the oldest and most popular toy would seem to be the wooden horse. A toy which King George V. played with, just added to the exhibits at the Museum—has the horse for its central and most imposing feature. It is a striking model of a Royal coach. The coachman in Royal livery is seated on a hamper of scarlet and gold, and there are two grooms

JAZZ TENDENCY IS CONDEMNED

Preacher Assails Giddy Gad of Womanhood in Address at Ottawa.

OTTAWA, Jan. 18.—Lashing the present system of society and civilization—a civilization which he described as being "unrestrained in pursuit of a multiplicity of wants"—Rev. Paul Rader, in vivid and scorching language assailed the jazz tendencies of the age at a largely attended meeting last evening in Erskine Presbyterian church.

The pastor of Moody Church, Chicago, and who is one of the speakers at the convention of the Christian and Missionary Alliance, now being held in Erskine church, certainly did not mince his words in his denunciation of smart, up-to-date sin. He commenced his address by taking his audience in a travelogue around the world. In his references to Palestine, he predicted that it again would witness "the closing up of this old civilization."

Continuing he gave a series of word pictures, describing the scenic beauty of the world in various countries.

"It is a beautiful world," said Rev. Mr. Rader, "but barren with rapine and unemployment and Bolshevism and wars and horrors that will not heal." He declared that there was something fundamentally wrong, and "that the steady wonderful thing that was expected to bless the world after the war had not come." Then the speaker launched into a spirited attack on modern evils. "The very vitality of law and government," of love and marriage are being undermined and called into question," asserted the speaker. He heaped castigation upon the modern vogue of jazz and excitement and sensational motion pictures. "All kinds of excitement are being fed into a child's life until it is made to flutter like a scared bird. Can you build steadily on such a diet?" he asked. He characterized modern fashions and modern tendencies as indecent, frivolous and lewd.

More Pep.
In his travels about the world he said he had seen women of other lands exposing themselves to nurse their young, but such exposure he asserted was modest in comparison with the exposure of fashion in so-called civilized lands. "This bunch over here expose themselves for an immodest purpose—to attract attention to their forms," he declared in his scorn for what he termed "the giddy gad of womanhood and the children of jazz." These things he considered "were shaking the foundations of society," and even the churches, he asserted, "were pulling in worldliness in order to attract and instill more pep."

PLAN TO MAKE NEW YORK THE LARGEST CITY IN THE WORLD

NEW YORK, Jan. 18.—The ancient discussion over the rivalry in growth between New York and London has been revived by the plan of the Port of New York Authority to solve the freight problem of the port. It would increase the metropolitan area from 375 to 1463 square miles, with a population of 7,971,019 compared with 5,620,048 for the five city boroughs given in last year's federal census.

London's metropolitan district showed 7,253,623 persons in 1919.

Chairman Outerbridge stated in his report that no other port in the world has ever presented problems of such magnitude and perplexity.

"The shore lines of the port of New York," he said, "are not less than 800 miles. That means that merely to coast along these shores in a 10-knot vessel for ten hours of daylight each day would take eight days or the average time of a fast passenger steamer across the Atlantic."

FARMER LEADER ON CONDITIONS

H. W. Wood Sees World in Terrible Plight and Urges Economy and Efficiency.

CALGARY, Alta., Jan. 18.—(By Canadian Press).—Addressing the annual convention of the United Farmers of Alberta here yesterday, H. W. Wood, president of the organization, spoke in part as follows:

"We have moved forward another year since our last convention. Perhaps never before has a year been so filled with the accumulated results of past actions and past wrong doing. 'As ye sow, so shall ye reap.' Humanity has long been sowing the seeds of strife and discord in all the fertile ground of civilization. In all social affairs, especially commercial activities, class has been striving against class, nation against nation, each recklessly and shamelessly striving to serve self without regard for the interest of others. It was inevitable that this mad strife should sooner or later burst in the greater and more diabolical madness of military conflict. Since the cessation of that wild ogreism the harvest of confusion has been slowly but inevitably ripening.

Millions in a world of plenty are starving, dying. Other millions are on the verge of starvation. Other and still greater millions are facing a future of grave, if not desperate uncertainty, and a great cloud of fear hangs over them.

Financial Ruin.

Nations have been sucked into the maelstrom of financial ruin. Other nations are immediately facing the same doom. Still others, of which Canada is one, are tottering under a load of indebtedness which will take the intelligent and united action of all citizens to meet and avoid financial disaster.

The internal financial equilibrium has been so broken up that the masses of the people are not only unable to bear the heavy burden of taxation, but many of them are below the line of actual comforts. The primary producers' end of the balance is so low that it rests as dead weight on the cost of production, while finished products are so high they are out of reach of many consumers. Reason would lead us to believe that such grave conditions would have a sobering effect on all men, especially those occupying responsible positions, and cause them to deal in the most serious manner with all social problems and to regard as sacred their obligation to advise and guide the people in the light of truth, appealing to their noblest sentiments of manhood and

UNITED FARM WOMEN ORGANIZATION GROWS

CALGARY, Jan. 18.—(Canadian Press).—Membership in the United Farm Women of Alberta at the close of 1921 totalled 4930 as compared with 3926 a year earlier, according to the report of the secretary submitted today to the annual convention here. In addition more than 3000 women are associated with the movement through the medium of United Farmers of Alberta locals. The report outlined the year's work, mentioning in particular measures which have been carried out for the relief of suffering in certain sections of the province which had met with repeated crop failures.

A report was presented also for the junior section of the U. F. A., which had now 115 locals with an aggregate membership of approximately 1200. "We feel," said the report, "that we have not only justified our existence, but we have helped to create added interest, new contentment and higher impulses in many communities where eager boys and girls are aspiring towards 'good' citizenship and 'better' seniorship."
