ERSKINE CHILDERS WAS EXECUTED TODAY

NEWBOLD, LADY ASTOR AND VARIOUS LEADERS HEARD IN REPLY TO SPEECH

Communist Member Made A Sensation With Speech British House Commons

LONDON, Nov. 24.—Newbold, the Communist member of the new government, created a sensation in the House of Commons by warning the government members that shortly they would have to work at useful work. He described the formalities of opening parliament as a "tomfool show" and expressed his regrets that the King's Speech only referred to unemployment without suggesting a remedy. He said that soviet Russia was carrying on in spite of everything that the British had done to it and while he (Newbold) was the first Communist member to reach the foot of the throne he would not be the last.

CLOSE SEASON FRASER RIVER NOT ENFORCED

Vancouver Advised to This Effect From Ottawa—Strong Objections Made

VANCOUVER, Nov. 24.—Word received here today from Ottawa indicates that the Federal government will not enforce the recommendation of the Duff Fisher Commission for a close season in the Fraser River sockeye fishing season for five years. Strong objections to the commission's recommendation have been voiced by business and other interests.

FIRST VICTORY OF GOVERNMENT

Bonar Law Administration Wins by Vote of 238 to 135

LONDON, Nov. 24.—The first division in the new House of Commons took place this afternoon and was easily by a government majority of 103 votes against the Laborite opposition when Premier Bonar Law moved that the government be empowered to take all the time of the House for government business during the session. The Laborites opposed it. The motion carried by 238 to 135.

PRINCE JOHN GETS PLENTY OF WEATHER

Was Forced to Anchor Under Tow Hill all Night on Account of Terrible Southeast

If Capt. Harry Nodden and his crew were susceptible to that malady known as mel-de-mer it is hard to say where the good ship Prince John would be today. However, they don't get sea sick so everybody's happy, although the officers say that every time the staunch G.T.P. coaster sticks her nose out she runs into a duster—at least that has been the experience from the past month.

The John arrived in port this morning about 11 o'clock from Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands with a good-sized passenger list and some freight cargo. She was due last night but yesterday afternoon she ran into a terrific southeast gale out of Massett Inlet and was forced to anchor under Tow Hill until early this morning when the blow abated somewhat. She returns tomorrow evening to Vancouver and the Queen Charlottes.

TWO NANAIMO MEN KILLED

Alfred Odgers and Gilbert Mc-Broom Lost Lives in Explosion

NANAIMO, Nov. 24.—Alfred Odgers, fireboss, and Gilbert Mc-Broom, fireman, employees of the Western Fuel Company, were killed today by an explosion of coal dust in the Wakesiah Mine. Both men were married with families.

POPE ORDERS FATHER TO BECOME CARDINAL

ROME, Nov. 24.—After Father Erbe, former librarian of the Vatican, had refused the Red Hat, the Pope has ordered him summarily to take the cardinalship as a duty.

COMMUNITY CHEST SO FAR FAILURE

Victoria Committee After Two Week's Work is Still Far Short of Objective

VICTORIA, Nov. 24.—The community chest scheme here has been a failure so far. In two weeks only \$13,000 out of the proposed \$86,000 has been collected by the committee. Another committee is to take up the scheme and try again.

The idea of the community chest is to administer the finances of local charities in one fund eliminating overlapping and enabling people to give to charity since a year and know that the money is well spent. Various charitable organizations of the city have adopted the scheme and are making concerted efforts on its behalf.

ANTI-ALCOHOLISM CONVENTION OPENS AT TORONTO TODAY

TORONTO, Nov. 24.—Officially welcomed by Dominion, provincial and civic dignitaries, the international convention under the auspices of the World League against alcoholism opened here this morning to the accompaniment of enthusiastic and confident demonstrations from the delegates representing many nations. Prohibition delegates from six continents were heard from.

BUDGET DEBATE IS STILL PROGRESSING

VICTORIA, Nov. 24.—Premier Oliver will move in the legislature today that, whereas the member for Rossland has made an allegation that the Northern Construction Co. had been allowed to sub-let construction on the Pacific Great Eastern Railway and pocket the difference between the price paid the contractors and the unit price, the allegation be referred to the public accounts committee with instructions that it immediately inquire into its truth or otherwise and report to the House.

CARLTON CAFE CASE IN PROGRESS TODAY

Mrs. Rose E. Smeeton and W. H. Smeeton vs. Eliza F. Martin

The case of Rose E. Smeeton and W. H. Smeeton against Eliza F. Martin, of Victoria, for an injunction restraining the owners of the building in which the Carlton Cafe is situated on Third Avenue from seizing the contents, is being heard before Judge Young today. W. E. Fisher is appearing for the plaintiff and Stanley Taylor for the defendant.

Mrs. Smeeton was put on the stand this morning by her counsel. At some length she told of the damage sustained to her property by water coming through the skylight in the rainy season and far when the weather was hot. She stated that she had complained to H. B. Mortimer representing the owner on several occasions and when repairs were made, the leak was worse than ever. The tenants had refused to pay their rent of \$460 a month for the past three months till proper repairs were made.

Witness stated that on November 1 the sheriff had served her with distress papers and on the seventh goods in the store were appraised. The store was then locked up.

The case is proceeding. J. B. Lambert, Dominion government public works engineer, returned today on the Prince John from Queen Charlotte City. He has been making departmental inspection of wharves on the Islands.

Free State Authorities Carry Out Death Sentence of Second in Command of Republican Army

DUBLIN, Nov. 24.—Erskine Childers was executed at 7 o'clock this morning for having an automatic pistol in his possession, an official bulletin of the National Army announces. Childers was lieutenant commander in the Irish Republican army and was right hand man to Eamonn de Valera, leader of the Republicans. He was arrested at Wicklow on November 10 and tried by a martial tribunal here. He appealed for a writ of habeas corpus through counsel, this being denied yesterday by the Master of Rolls and also by the Court of Appeals for Southern Ireland.

JULES EGGERT PASSED AWAY

Dr. C. A. Eggert, of This City, Receives News of Father's Death at Atlin

Jules Eggert, of Atlin, one of the oldest timers and best known figures of Northern British Columbia, died yesterday afternoon at Atlin, word to this effect having been received from the north by Dr. C. A. Eggert, of this city, his son, last evening.

The late Mr. Eggert was 67 years of age and was a native of Switzerland. He went into Atlin in 1897 at the time of the gold rush and has resided there ever since, following his business as a jeweler. News of his death comes as a shock to his many friends not only in the north but all along the coast.

The funeral will take place in Atlin where his wife, who predeceased him a couple of years ago, is buried. Besides Dr. Eggert, of this city, two other sons will mourn his loss, Paul Eggert, of Vancouver, and Henry Eggert, who is in Africa.

Dr. Eggert, on receipt of advice of his father's demise, had intended going in to Atlin to attend the funeral but found that it would be practically impossible to do so on account of the ordinary transportation routes being now closed for the winter. It was only last February that the late Mr. Eggert visited in Prince Rupert and Vancouver with his sons.

Baron Sonnino, Silent Statesman of Italy and Twice Premier, Died at Rome After Long Useful Career

ROME, Nov. 24.—Baron Sonnino, twice Premier of Italy, and foreign minister during the Great War, died today.

Baron Sidney Sonnino, "the silent statesman of Italy," disliked to talk but could be fluent in five languages. He was Prime Minister of Italy in 1906 and again in 1910. From 1914 to 1919, he was Minister of Foreign Affairs. He also served as Minister of Finance, as Minister of the Interior, and as a member of Parliament. He brought to the Paris peace conference the reputation of "the first financier of Europe, the man who had probed the economic life of the world to the core."

"I do not shine, I do not glitter," he said on one occasion in the Chamber of Deputies. "I leave that sort of thing to my political opponents. I am satisfied if I can reveal an occasional gleam of common sense." At another time, addressing his indifferent colleagues, he said: "I propose to put a little knowledge of the state of the nation's revenue into your heads, whether you feel interested or not."

Financial Ability While Minister of Finance he was credited with having laid the foundation for his country's stability from the revenue standpoint and for his establishment of budget surpluses.

Baron Sonnino was one of the most abstemious of men in spite of his wealth. Even before the war, he practiced the most rugged economies. Italy could not borrow favorably in the London market by reason of her enormous public debt. Sonnino lowered it by vigorous taxation, by reducing public salaries and expenditures and dismissing needless employees. The politicians, therefore, hated him.

"I would not think of having a fire in my bedroom," he protested to the deputies on one occasion. "Our Italian winters are too beautiful to be spoiled in that fashion." When a Sicilian deputy complained of the food supply in a crisis of the war, Sonnino grimly responded: "I have tasted no meat for a week."

Scotch Mother A Jew by race, a Protestant by faith and a native of Egypt, the man who was one day destined to handle the Italian ship of state, was born of an Italian Jewish father and a Scotch mother on March 11, 1817, on the banks of the Nile. He was educated partly in England and at the University of Pisa.

Sonnino's grandfather migrated from the ghetto of Leghorn, Italy, to Egypt, where he built up an enormous fortune as a banker, a fortune which the future Premier of Italy enjoyed.

Before entering politics he was editor of the magazine "Rassegna" which he founded and in which for years he aired his political and economic views. He also wrote and lectured on Dante and Petrarch of whose works he was a close student. Later he became one of the proprietors of the Giornale d'Italia. Baron Sonnino was always interested in the welfare of the Italian farmers. His book, "The Peasants in Sicily," was a notable contribution to public knowledge of agrarian conditions in that country. One of his aims, he said, was to revive southern Italy economically and morally. He also built local railways, put isolated regions in touch with great markets, strengthened the farm banks and assisted villages and towns in fighting illiteracy. He possessed a wonderful library. The Baron never married.

WHITE GIRLS AND CHINESE

Attorney General Tells Legislature That Law Not Being Enforced in Prince Rupert

VICTORIA, Nov. 24.—Hon. A. M. Manson, attorney general, said in the legislature yesterday afternoon that the law against the employment of white girls by Chinese was not being enforced. In Prince Rupert nothing was done, he declared. The attention of the attorney general had been drawn to the condition in a note. He said that the police were supposed to enforce the law especially in relation to restaurants.

CHIROPRACTIC IS DISCUSSED

Legislature Sends Bill to Committee—Speaker Calls for Order

VICTORIA, Nov. 24.—Speakers in the legislature yesterday cheered two or three times in the course of the discussion on the appointment of a committee to consider the Chiropractic Bill. Speaker F. A. Pauline announced to the people in the galleries that they must not show assent or dissent. The resolution was opposed by Attorney General Manson and others and was supported by several other speakers. It was finally amended by Premier Oliver and carried. It is hardly likely that it will pass this session and the probability is that it will never get back from the committee.

"Vancouver And Prince Rupert."

The Vancouver World in an editorial headed, "Vancouver, Victoria and Prince Rupert" again brings up the subject of towing the Prince Rupert dry dock to Vancouver. The editorial also condemns the building of a dry dock at Victoria which it describes as "a political dry dock." It states that the Prince Rupert and Victoria dry docks are unnecessary at the present time and that "Vancouver's growing commerce is being held back for lack of adequate facilities," giving "an illustration of how this unsatisfactory and unfair condition works out to the handicap of steamship lines, to the detriment of the port and the actual loss of money to the people of all Canada."

Twenty Years Ahead of Time.

"At Prince Rupert is a large floating dry dock owned by the Dominion Government which has done little else but float since it was built," says the editorial. "Prince Rupert has also a large ocean dock and a large repair plant. Undoubtedly Prince Rupert as an outlet for the northern interior, a port connected with the National Railway System, and possessing a short route to the Orient, is justified in expecting a great commercial future. The time will come when she will need her 20,000-ton dry dock, her ocean dock and her repair plant. But she has been equipped with these twenty years ahead of her time."

"If the Canadian Government ships and the Canadian Government dry dock at Prince Rupert were owned by Capt. Robert Dollar or any other capable shipowner, what would he do? Would he continue every time to send his ship on a week's unnecessary cruise through hazardous waters, paying unnecessary piloting and insurance fees? Not for one moment. He would send a couple of powerful tugs and tow that dry dock down to Vancouver."

"The bestowal of patronage by one government and the other on Victoria and Prince Rupert is one thing; the wilful retarding of the immense growing trade of Vancouver is another. It is not a local matter, for the prosperity of the whole Dominion is based on the development of our foreign trade. Governments both at Victoria and Ottawa, will be well advised to take the fullest steps to see that Vancouver in its competition with Seattle for the commercial carrying trade to the Orient is no longer to remain under these serious and removable handicaps."

Vancouver's Need The First Consideration?

Moving the Prince Rupert dry dock to Vancouver is an old bogey but little heed may be paid to it. The Vancouver World may say that it is 25 years ahead of its time here but Vancouver has a great habit of seeing Prince Rupert in that light. Vancouver believes that the Canadian National Railway is a superfluity and that there should be no such place at Prince Rupert, Northern B.C., in Vancouver's opinion, should have no transportation service other than coasting steamers from Vancouver in order to bring all its tremendous wealth tributary to Vancouver with no danger of competition. However Vancouver may feel, Prince Rupert is here and Prince Rupert is going to be the centre of Northern B.C., no matter how covetous our southern sister may be. Prince Rupert is indeed justified in expecting a great commercial future but it will likely be enjoying that future sooner than "twenty-five years from now." In the meantime, Prince Rupert will keep her dry dock and it will not be moved to Vancouver or anywhere else. Vancouver needs a dry dock. That may be apparent but Prince Rupert and Northern B.C. needs one too, so Vancouver had better look elsewhere.

AVIATOR PREST COMING AGAIN

Undaunted by Loss of Two Planes
in North Flyer Will Try For
Siberia Next Year

Among recent visitors to Seattle was C. O. Prest, aviator, who had the misfortune to lose his plane when almost within sight of his goal, says the Alaska Dispatch. Mr. Prest expects to build another plane during the coming winter and will make another flight next year, with Siberia as the objective point.

Although quite a young man, Mr. Prest has had twelve years flying experience. He had intended making a flight from New York to some point on the Siberian coast, and back.

The flight was commenced in bad weather and Mr. Prest says that during his long journey he did not have a single day of anything like fair weather, rain alternating with snow daily until he was forced to land near Eagle, where his plane became a total wreck.

Left Eagle

On Sunday, July 16, he hopped off from Eagle, headed for Fairbanks in the early morning. It was raining at the time but not very heavily. When he had flown about half an hour spark plug trouble developed, one cylinder went out entirely and another was missing badly. His altitude at this time was about 3,500 feet and, although he could have held his altitude with six cylinders, he could not climb and as he knew there were some mountains ahead of him, coupled with the fact that the plane could not long stand the vibration resulting from partial use of the engine, he made preparations to land, intending to resume the flight after he had put the engine in order. He picked out a sloping plain at the top of a hill in the neighborhood of the Seventymile river. He knew it was a niggerhead swamp but it was the best he could find, and he made the landing safely, coming down among scattered bands of caribou not in the least disturbed by his sudden appearance. In a very short time he had corrected the engine trouble and then spent a couple of hours clearing a runway through the swamp by tearing out the niggerheads with his hands. When his work was completed he climbed in and taxied for the take-off. The plane was gathering speed and almost ready to leave the ground when a soft spot was encountered. The wheels buried themselves in this, bringing the plane sharply on its nose and breaking the propeller. Luckily for Prest he was strapped in his seat and escaped being hurled from the machine.

Forced to Leave Machine

It was impossible for him to right the machine alone, so he gathered up more important instruments and started in search of a trail. The weight of his pack being too much for him it was cached about three miles from the scene of the wreck and the aviator returned to the machine, intending to take shelter under its tail from the rain. Before leaving the plane a second time, he set up his moving picture camera, hoping to film the caribou among which he had landed. But they were too far away. Leaving the machine in position, he climbed a nearby hill to see if he could locate a trail and, upon looking back, he saw his plane and camera surrounded by a band of 700 or more caribou. He shot one of the animals and lived on juicy steaks until discovered by a searching party on the following Wednesday. In the meantime, the plane had been completely wrecked by a gale of wind.

A Lot of Fun

After having killed the caribou, Prest took a quantity of the meat and made another start to find the trail. The meat was cooked in primitive manner, over a camp fire, and eaten without salt or other food. He left the plane on Monday and on Wednesday morning he found the trail and shortly afterward met the searching party headed by Deputy Marshal Durney. "I had a lot of fun," was the way the aviator put it.

Prest flew from Los Angeles to Prince Rupert last year, his plane being wrecked at the latter place after he had made a round trip flight to Ketchikan.

HOSPITAL INSURANCE WILL BE EQUALIZED

Board Decides to Place \$10,000
More on Building and Equip-
ment, Making Total of
\$40,000

Insurance on the hospital was given discussion at last night's meeting of the board and it was decided to raise the insurance on the building from the present \$30,000 to \$40,000. Of the \$10,000 additional insurance being taken out \$7,000 will be on the building and \$3,000 on furniture and equipment. The \$30,000 now held is divided into \$23,000 on the building, \$6,000 on furniture and equipment and \$1,000 on stock. The additional \$10,000 will be divided as equitably as possible among the various insurance firms in the city, the details being left in the hands of the finance committee.

A committee comprising M. J. McNeill and Co., S. P. McMorris reported a valuation of \$40,000 on the building exclusive of furniture.

The finance committee reported the renewing already of expired policies for \$1,000 and \$5,000 respectively with J. Lorne MacLaren and D. McD. Hunter.

The board decided to have a complete revision of the hospital insurance in order to divide it up equally with the various agents in the city.

The matter of insuring the new ambulance was left in the hands of the finance committee with instructions to see that it is placed at the same time as the insurance on the building. George Leek presented a tender for the insurance of the ambulance.

Ald. R. A. McLeod suggested at last night's hospital board meeting that a handyman be employed at the hospital to eliminate heavy expenditures for repair work and odd jobs. The matter was left over until next meeting, the secretary being instructed to report in the meantime.

T. H. JOHNSON TELLS OF TRIP

Gave Rotarians an Interesting Address at Luncheon Yesterday

President T. H. Johnson, of the Rotary Club, gave the members at the luncheon on Thursday an account of his visit to various Rotary Clubs in the East. At the outset he stated that he had found general opinion to be that the future was brighter for business. Buyers were only buying what they needed and asking a profit on their goods without speculating. Business in his opinion had been delayed about three weeks in the East due to the very warm weather but the change had made the merchants more optimistic.

At the Winnipeg Club Mr. Johnson listened to an address by Jack Miner, the celebrated naturalist and evangelist, who told of taming wild geese and then etching text from the Bible to them, releasing them with the hope that the message might fall some place where it would be needed.

Heard Fordney

In Chicago he attended a luncheon of the Illinois Manufacturers' Association and listened to an address by Mr. Fordney of the tariff bill fame. He considered that the author of the bill did not have an overabundance of public opinion on his side at the meeting and later election reports bore this out.

Mr. Johnson also attended a Rotary luncheon on the twenty-eighth floor of the Sherman Hotel. He visited the headquarters where he saw a chart with the name of the Prince Rupert club on but the pin denoting the club was placed midway between the Queen Charlotte Islands and China. "Nevertheless, they know Prince Rupert is on the map," Mr. Johnson added.

In Toronto and New York, the local president was hospitably received and listened to a number of excellent addresses. In the majority of the clubs he found the members busily engaged in boys work and at Montreal they were backing a drive for \$10,000 for the Boy Scout movement.

Joke on Balfour

One joke Mr. Johnson told the members was well worth repeating. Earl Balfour, head of the British mission at the Disarmament conference at Washington, went into a cafe one day where negro waiters were the only help. He was presented with a large menu card but not wishing to go all through it, called the waiter and asked him to select a dinner for him. This was done and Earl Balfour found it very enjoyable. He continued this practice for the rest of his stay and when he was leaving went over to thank the waiter.

164 Students at Prince Rupert Branch of Northern Polytechnic Being Instructed in 27 Courses

Since the inception of the Northern Polytechnic Institute, which commenced on October 2 under the direction of J. Pinder-Moss, the work of the various classes has progressed very satisfactorily. A total of 164 students are receiving instruction at night school, the classes embodying twenty-seven subjects. The subjects, which are being taught include drawing and art, gas engineering, machine shop practice, shorthand and typewriting, business English and arithmetic, book-keeping, electricity, boat designing and mechanical drawing, plain sewing, dressmaking, millinery, English for foreigners, geometry for sheet metal workers, steam engineering, public speaking, French, chemistry and Junior High School and matriculation subjects.

Machine Shop

Thirteen students are at present studying motor construction and machine shop practice, including lathe work, under the direction of A. Akerberg and H. D. Robinson, at the Akerberg-Thomson Machine Shops and King Edward High school. The class, which is a very enthusiastic one, is now engaged on the construction of a 12 h.p. three cylinder gas engine. This engine is being entirely built by the students from the bed up and has now reached the stage of assembly. The pistons are now being worked upon and two of the three cylinders are ready for fitting.

The remainder of the class is busy making machine tools which will be used in operating the lathes and other machinery.

Mechanical Drawing

The mechanical drawing class under the direction of Glen McMillan, at the Booth school, is at present studying the elementary principles of screw threads, bolts, nuts and riveted joints. The boat designing section of the class is confining its studies mainly to the laying out of small coastwise boats, fishing boats and pleasure craft. The students are showing a keen interest in their work. The class at present comprises 14 students.

French Class

The elementary and advanced French class, under the tutelage of A. Auger, consists of ten students and is located at the King Edward school. The class is studying under the Berlitz system and no English is allowed to be spoken during the class session. All explanations and corrections are given and received in French. This class is showing a ninety per cent attendance which speaks for the keenness of the students.

Commercial Class

The commercial class, embodying typewriting, shorthand and spelling, under the direction of Miss E. M. Earl, at the King Edward school, is making rapid strides.

The students are already able to take slow dictation in shorthand which is rapidly and accurately transcribed. They have already completed three budgets in type writing which is particularly accurate and neat. This class has ten students already enrolled with a ninety per cent attendance.

Drawing and Art

The drawing and art class including freehand drawing, black and white, pastels, and oil color work under the supervision of Mrs. Edith Goodrick, at the King Edward school, has already executed some extremely creditable work. This class also includes the students taking the high school course and special students who are studying art alone.

Chemistry

The Chemistry class, under the direction of E. A. Mann, at the King Edward school, is composed of eight nurses from the General hospital who are studying practical chemistry as affecting their special calling and includes chemistry of the body. The nurses are taking a very keen interest in the subject and the fact that the class has a hundred per cent attendance speaks for the enthusiasm of the students.

Book-keeping, etc.

The book-keeping, business English and arithmetic class, under H. White, at the King Edward school, is at present studying cash accounts and the cash book. In letter writing the construction of exposition paragraphs is being carried on. The arithmetic is being adapted to the special needs of the students.

Electricity

The class in elementary electricity and magnetism, under the direction of John J. Little, at the King Edward school, has an enrollment of ten students who are making excellent progress.

The class has reached the study of magnetism and magnetic fields, the construction of a magnet, etc. The students are now reaching the point where the study is of particular interest to the practical man.

Public Speaking

The class of public speaking under the instruction of Rev. Dr. H. R. Grant, at the King Edward school, shows an attendance of ninety per cent with an enrollment of ten students. The class has completed the elementary work including breathing, pronunciation, emphasis, the placing of the voice and breathing exercises, and is now preparing short addresses and memory work.

Dressmaking

A comprehensive program is being covered by the dressmaking class which is under Mrs. Eda Hudson at the Booth school. The articles of wearing apparel completed include a cotton house dress, short waist in flannel material, and one in silk. The class is now busy on the making of a skirt in serge or woollen material. Following these articles the class will make a party dress in silk, a one-piece jumper dress in serge, and a Tuxedo coat to match, a summer dress in gingham, a visiting gown and an evening dress will complete the course. This is the largest class of the Polytechnic and has 26 students.

Millinery

The millinery class has 11 students enrolled under the supervision of Miss P. E. Smith at the King Edward school. This class has completed lessons in bandeaux, linings, milliner's folds, cord covering and drafting of patterns, and is now in the midst of constructing its first model hat stretching materials on forms and the fitting of the crown. The completion of six hats will be undertaken during the course.

English for Foreigners

The English for foreigners class is under the tutelage of A. J. Lancaster with six students, who are studying writing, spelling, reading and pronunciation of the English language.

Steam Engineering

The steam engineering class under E. N. Valentine at the King Edward school has an enrollment of eight students. The class is studying steam engineering as required for the boiler inspector's examinations for the province of B.C. Visits have been paid by the students to the city power plant and the Dry Dock, and prospective visits are contemplated to the Gold Storage and Shewan's plants.

High School Class

The class in high school preparation and matriculation is being conducted by E. A. Donohoe, L.L.B., A. Auger, B.A., R. A. Fisher, B.S.A. and Mrs. Goodrick. This class is making excellent progress with an enrollment of 8 students. The students are preparing for the University matriculation examinations.

The geometry class under Norman C. Robinson, and the geology class under J. Mitchell, with a total enrollment of 12 students, are making rapid headway. An excellent collection of mineral samples has been lent to the N.P.I. by M. M. Stephens for the use of the geology class.

RED LIGHTS TO REDUCE POLICE

Suggestion by Mayor Made to Police Commission—Estimates Called

NEW ALARM SYSTEM FOR PATROL OFFICERS

At the suggestion of Mayor Rochester, the police commission at its meeting last night passed a resolution giving the mayor power to secure full information regarding the cost of installing a system of red lights at the top of light poles around the centre of the town in order to notify policemen on beat when they are needed at the station. By this method the commission hopes to cut down the staff by two men and also to eliminate having a constable on duty at the station all night to receive calls or complaints. Another feature of the new system will be that the provincial police will be asked to take charge of prisoners as the commission deem it very unwise and inhuman to allow them to be in the station in their cells all night alone in case of accident.

Mayor Rochester, in reporting on the system, stated that he had been informed by the superintendent of utilities that the cost would be in the vicinity of \$500 to \$600. This sum would be made up in a short time by the cutting down of the force.

Working of System

The working of the system, briefly is this. Lights will be placed on poles in a loop around the city. Whenever a phone call is sent into the station it will go through the telephone exchange first. The operator on duty will request the party to hold the line or get the message. Then she will turn on a switch which will light all these lights and the policeman patrolling the streets will phone in to the operator as soon as he sees the lights go on and receive the message. Any person wishing to make a complaint to the police at night will simply call 40 and the operator in turn will inform the policeman by turning on the lights. It was suggested that all parties having complaints should phone in if possible or call at the operator's office.

The system is very much like the American District Telegraph and the only expense will be putting the lights on the poles. The topographical layout of the city is such that these lights could easily be discerned from any point. Immediately the constable phones in, the lights will go off.

The commissioners considered the suggestion a very good one and the only one by which the force of the police department could be reduced.

The suggestion was made by the mayor following the receipt of a letter from L. Potterton, formerly on the force in England, asking for a place on the local force. In view of the mayor's suggestion the letter was filed.
