DEMOCRATS MAKE BIG GAINS IN ELECTIONS

ALLIES ORDER THAT MUDANIA ARMISTICE CONVENTION MUST BE OBSERVED

Republicans May Lose Big Lead in Congress; Will at Least be Reduced to Very Slender Margin

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—At noon, Eastern time, today twenty-five states had completed their congressional returns in the national elections but neither Republicans or Democrats had progressed much further toward control of the House of Representatives. The vote at noon stood: Republicans, 185; Democrats, 187; Socialist, 1. The majority necessary to control is 218. Iowa was the only state to elect a solid Republican delegation.

Democrat gains in the elections continued to pile steadily as belated returns came in this morning from all parts of the country. Democratic gains in the House of Representatives accumulated without counter-gains by the Republicans in a single congressional district. The great majority rolled up for the Republicans in the Harding landslide two years ago has been cut into by the Democrats in debatable districts and states until there seems a chance that it may be wiped out entirely or at least reduced to a slender working force for the administration.

MILITARY HAVE BEEN ATTACKED

By Irish Republicans in Dublin—Casualties Not Yet Counted

DUBLIN, Nov. 8.—An attack with machine guns and rifles from nearby house tops was made by the Irish Republican forces against the Wellington military barracks this afternoon. Three National army soldiers were killed and twenty others were wounded. The fighting lasted for two hours. The number of casualties suffered by the Republicans has not yet been learned.

VICTORIA ASKS PRIVATE BILL

J. B. Clearihue, Member for That City, Gave Forecast Legislation Yesterday

VICTORIA, Nov. 8.—Victoria city will ask the legislature for the right of giving delinquent taxpayers fifteen years to pay up and the adoption of the installment plan in paying also for the privilege of levying retail tax on business houses and graduated licenses for stores. Forecast of the introduction of a private bill to this effect was given by Joseph B. Clearihue, member for Victoria, in the legislature yesterday.

CITY TO REPURCHASE ITS SCHOOL BONDS

It was decided at the city council last night to re-purchase the \$8,000 debentures held by the Royal Finance Corporation, Vancouver, on the Borden St. school, which had been offered to the city on a 7 per cent basis. The re-purchase will be made on December 1 to save the interest which will have accumulated between that time and May next the original time for expiration.

PARLIAMENT OPENS ON NOVEMBER 23

LONDON, Nov. 8.—The opening of the British Parliament has been postponed by the King from November 20 to November 23 on account of the fact that the date of general election so closely preceded the date first set for the opening.

Andrew Soderburg died last night in the General Hospital after a prolonged illness. He had been an inmate of the institution since January last. WOMAN FACING LIQUOR CHARGE

Case Against June Alexander, Charged With Selling Whiskey, Being Heard Today

The case against June Alexander charged with selling Scotch whiskey commenced in the police court before Magistrate McClymont this morning and is being continued this afternoon. Evidence was given for the prosecution by Provincial Constables Harrison and Dixon and defence witnesses are now being examined. L. W. Patmore appears for the defence and T. B. Hooper for the crown.

Provincial Constable Harrison in giving evidence, said that on Monday, October 9, in company with Provincial Constable Dixon, he went to the premises of the accused, situated in the rear of the old George Street house, in the 700 block on Fraser Street. The premises were on the second floor. As they were going upstairs Dixon looked at his watch and the time was about 11.40 a.m. Upon knocking on the door accused invited them in and they went into the dining room. Accused then asked them what they wanted and they both said Scotch. She left the room and went into the kitchen returning with two small plain whiskey glasses on a tray. Both constables took the whiskey. Constable Harrison, upon drinking his, found it to be intoxicating liquor. Accused was dressed in a dressing gown with nothing on her feet. Dixon paid a dollar bill and a fifty cent piece.

Witness then asked for the next drink which was served in the same manner—two whiskeys and one beer—brought from the kitchen on a tray. He paid two quarters and two 50 cent pieces. The accused then brought a third drink, two whiskeys and one beer from the kitchen for which they did not pay. Both constables left the premises about 11.55 a.m.

Andrew Ushers

Cross examined by Solicitor Hooper witness said that he asked what whisky it was and then the accused brought out a bottle labelled Andrew Ushers.

Mr. Patmore—"Why have you got everything down so pat and then do not remember to tell us what whisky it was until suggested by counsel?"

Witness—"I had not finished my story."

Mr. Patmore—"You referred to your notes before you came into court?"

Witness—"Yes."

Mr. Patmore—"You put your notes in your pocket before you came in just now?"

Witness—"Yes."

Mr. Patmore—"It assisted your memory."

Witness—"Not much."

Mr. Patmore—"I suppose you will admit in this case as you did in former cases that you are in the habit of deceiving people?"

Witness—"No, not necessarily. There was no deception in that case at all."

Defence Witness

Jack Taylor was called for the defence. In giving evidence he said he knew accused and also knew Clarence King.

Stork and Neill are Eulogized by Major Burde of Alberni who Also Appreciates Alex Manson

VICTORIA, Nov. 8.—Major Richard Burde, Independent member for Alberni, paid compliments in the Legislature yesterday to Fred Stork, M.P. for Prince Rupert, and A. W. Neill, member for Alberni, for the manner in which they had tackled fisheries questions of the province especially in connection with the recent investigations of the Duff commission.

Major Burde also spoke appreciatively of Hon. A. M. Manson, attorney general, whom he characterized as "The Young Man from the North."

The Alberni member said that the Conservatives had neglected the fisheries of the west coast of Vancouver Island but no sooner was the Liberal government elected than they listened to the advice of Mr. Neill and Mr. Stork. The commission had acted promptly and like intelligent men. Their report had shown that the Oriental must be eliminated.

Better Close Canneries

"That picturesque man, Hon. H. H. Stevens, and his bedfellow, H. S. Clements, have referred to me and my friends as Reds, Socialists and Bolsheviks, but I feel sure the present government will carry through the fisheries proposals to a finish," declared Major Burde. "It would be better to close the canneries than allow Orientals to keep on working in them."

Major Burde asked the government to support his efforts for eight-hour day legislation which he said was demanded by 18,000 people in the lumber industry. He also urged the attorney general to bring down a bill allowing lighter drinks in smaller quantities. He defended the manner in which the attorney general had granted liquor stores but said that the present moderation law was harmful to the country.

ALL ACCOUNTED IN REILLY MINE

Casualty List in Disaster Consists of 80 Killed and 32 Injured

SPANGLER, Ill.—The recovery of five more bodies brings the total of deaths in the Reilly mine explosion to eighty and accounts for all the 112 men who were trapped in the mine. The 32 others who were recovered were all uninjured.

RAILWAY HAD BIG DEFICIT

Showing for August 1922 Was Not as Good as Same Month Last Year

OTTAWA, Nov. 8.—The net operating deficit on the Canadian National Railways in August was \$829,847, a marked increase over August 1921. To earn a dollar this August the company spent \$1.08. Operating expenses were about the same as last year but there was a decrease in total revenues of some \$800,000.

MINERAL CLAIM SALE YESTERDAY

Forty-two mineral claims were offered at the mineral claim tax sale held yesterday by the provincial assessor. Out of this number seven claims were sold. Six claims in the Cassiar district were purchased by John Mellor of Stewart at the upset price.

Exchange Rate And Trade.

Yesterday's press dispatches stated that Canadian exports to
the United States had increased by four million dollars and im-
ports to Canada from across the border had decreased one mil-
lion dollars between September this year and the same month
in 1921. In the same twelve-month a heavy exchange rate ad-
verse to Canada has practically disappeared. These two condi-
tions have a great deal to do with each other. If Canada's busi-
ness with the United States continues in the same healthy direc-
tion Canadian money, instead of being at par in the United
States, may soon be actually at a premium.

Canadian Money Looked At Askance.

On account of Canadian funds having been at a discount
in the United States for such a long time, the people over there
still look askance at our money in spite of the fact that they can
get dollar for dollar for it at their own banks. Travellers re-
turning from the States will tell of American citizens—ticket
agents, hotel clerks, merchants, etc.—still refusing to accept
Canadian currency at its face value. Such a condition will pos-
sibly continue for a short time until the American realize that
Canadian money is now worth as much as if not more than their
own. One person who returned recently from a trip to the north-
western states tells of having had Canadian money discounted at
a Portland hotel and American money discounted in a Van-
couver clothing store. No doubt the Canadians will realize the
return of their money to par more quickly than the Americans
will realize the same fact.

Turks Do Not Seem Trustworthy.

Early dispatches from the Near East telling of the renewal
of hostile activities towards the Allies by the Turkish Nationalists
would indicate that the Kemalists had been preparing for a coup
under the protection of the Mudania armistice convention. It is
not likely that the Allies will be caught thereby, however, for
past experiences must have taught them not to give the Turk too
much leeway even at his word. Such an occurrence as this last
one will make peace an even more difficult matter of execution
in the Near East. If the Turk Nationalists cannot be trusted un-
der a temporary arrangement it is easily apparent that they could
not be left with a permanent agreement if they had the power to
break it. It would seem at this distance that it is going to be a
difficult proceeding to deal satisfactorily with the Turk without
using force instead of moral suasion.

Ten Years Ago In Prince Rupert

It is expected that it will be
toward the end of the month
before the big 2,000 pound bell
will be finally installed in its
place in the tower above the
city hall. Several of the attach-
ments are still to be received,
they having left Boston the mid-
dle of last month. It will be
quite a feat to raise the bell into
place, the work of which is go-
ing to be undertaken by the staff
of the electric light department
as soon as they can spare the

time from the vast amount of
work at present on their hands.

the earliest to migrate to Stewart
at the time of the mining excite-
ment, returned to the city yes-
terday from a visit to the lower
coast cities and will proceed to-
night to Granby Bay where he
expects to locate.

INCINERATOR AT NELSON

Recommended by Mayor Rochester
—Expense Account Passed

A report from Mayor Roches-
ter on the question of an incinerator
being installed in the city
was read at the council meeting
last night. The mayor stated he
had inspected the incinerator in
use in Nelson which was similar
in population to Prince Rupert,
and he had found that it worked
admirably. The plant was located
in the heart of the city and was
giving every satisfaction. A sim-
ilar incinerator could be built
here for \$11,000 or \$14,000. The
matter was laid on the table un-
til the return of Mayor Rochester.
At the same time the mayor's ex-
pense account, which amounted to
\$75.80, in connection with his re-
cent trip to Kamloops to the con-
vention of United Municipalities
of B.C. was accepted. Acting
Mayor Dybhuven remarked upon
the economy the mayor had dis-
played in his account.

MUSKEG SEDIMENT IN LOCAL MILK

A letter from the Minister of
Agriculture on the question of
dairy cows and the milk supply in
Prince Rupert was read at the
council meeting last night. The
letter stated that the conditions
under which dairy cattle were by
no means as sanitary as they might
be. In driving the cows through
the muskeg it coated on their legs
and udders and there was, as a
consequence, a sediment in the
milk. The letter was referred to
the Health Committee for their
report.

BUILD RAILWAY NORTH STEWART

Charles F. Caldwell Makes An-
nouncement at Ketchikan
Following Visit to
Mining Camp

KETCHIKAN, Nov. 8.—Charles
F. Caldwell, president of the New
Alaska Mining Co., and the Port-
land Canal Railway and Terminal
Co., arrived from Hyder on Sat-
urday morning and left the same
evening by the steamer Spokane
for the south.

Mr. Caldwell, who is preparing
to commence the construction of
a railroad from Hyder, on the
Salmon River Valley under the
charter held by his company,
stated that he had concluded ar-
rangement with C. A. Carlson, of
the Siemsen-Carlson Construction
Co., of Spokane, for the com-
mencing of the construction of
the railroad as soon as possible.

Mr. Caldwell is also president
of the New Alaska Mining Com-
pany, with its headquarters in
Spokane, and bonded the 11-mile
group of claims in the Eleven
Mile camp three years ago. He
has succeeded in making the last
payment of \$37,000 due on Oct. 1,
and payment was made on Sep-
tember 30. The owners have re-
banded the claims to Pat Daly and
it leaves a contest of ownership
to be decided by the courts unless
an adjustment can be arranged
outside, probably by arbitration.

Most Important Mine

The rich and large showing un-
covered by recent developments
makes it the most important on
the Alaska side of Salmon river.
The railroad is being built to open
up what is now believed to be
the greatest mining camp the
world has ever seen. The Pre-
mier, that is developed by three
tunnels, has, roughly speaking,
between eight and ten million
tons of ore in sight on two claims.

This mine is now producing
over five hundred thousand tons
a month with three hundred
miners at work, yielding about
\$500 per diem to the man.
Developments in the New Alas-
ka and Big Missouri, which is as
large and rich a mine as the
Premier and the recent strike of
12 feet of ore in the Indian group,
four feet of which is steel galena,
amounting about 400 ounces to the
ton, is a guarantee that the rail-
road will have a paying business
from the time it is ready to carry
freight and passengers.

some important mining deals in
Spokane, will go east to New
York on matters connected with
the Alaska project.

MRS. ROBERSON ASKS QUESTIONS REGARDING CITY DUMP AND SCHOOL

A letter was read from Mrs.
Marion Roberson, late of Prince
Rupert and now residing in Vic-
toria, at the council meeting last
night, regarding the unsanitary
condition of the road leading to
the Fairview cemetery and the
Booth School question. To a
previous letter City Engineer
Whittaker had replied that the
pile had been burned over and
that it would be burned over and
covered with disinfectant periodi-
cally.

Mrs. Roberson, in her letter
read last night, stated in part
that she had heard in September
that the city had sanctioned the
throwing of rubbish there. No
burning in that bog could dis-
pose of the offensive matter and
even "wealthy Rupert" could not
afford one quarter the disinfec-
tant and germ destroying fluids
required to destroy all that are
congregated there.

In reading of the Booth School
tragedy a few of Mr. Cox's re-
marks had come to her mind. Mrs.
Roberson enquired if it was right
that for supporting the floors hori-
zontal beams had been placed
from wall to wall. Did not Mr.
Cox say that the walls were al-
ready so weak that they had to be

LIBRARY TO OPEN MONDAY

New Institution Will Commence Functioning Temporarily in Red Cross Headquarters

The Prince Rupert Public Library will be opened to the public on Monday next at 1 p.m. The library is situated for the present in temporary quarters in the Red Cross but on Third Avenue, but will be moved early in the New Year to the permanent quarters in the Public Works department building next door.

Library hours will be from 1 to 6 p.m. daily, and every Monday, Wednesday and Saturday evening from 7 to 9 p.m.

Any resident who is a tax payer or licence holder in the City of Prince Rupert is entitled to become a member of the library. A member must give one reference and his address. Those who intend to become residents must have their card signed by the person giving the reference. Visitors to the city and temporary residents may borrow books by depositing two dollars which amount will be refunded to them on their departure. Non-residents may borrow books by paying a subscription fee of two dollars a year, together with postage, if such is necessary.

Circulation Rules
All books, except those marked reference, may be borrowed by any member for a period of two weeks and on return may be renewed once for a similar period if not in special demand. A fine of 2c a day will be charged for each book kept overtime. All fines must be promptly settled and no other book will be issued until such claims are fully adjusted. Each member is entitled to the use of one library card only and on it may borrow two books at a time—one fiction and one non-fiction. Members must always present their cards when borrowing or returning a book. If this should be lost a new one may be obtained at the end of one week or on the payment of 25c.

Sport Chat

The timely spell of mild and sunshiny weather on Thanksgiving Day was appreciated by all lovers of the outdoors in the city. There was a football game at the Aeropolis Hill Grounds, all so tennis games and many hunting and picnicking parties were out. It is a favored climate that is blessed with such balmy weather as prevails here when the sun shines in November.

At a meeting of the Stewart Athletic Association, held on Friday night last, it was decided to construct a skating rink in Stewart for use during the coming season. After some little discussion it was determined to try and procure for the purpose two lots from the government. It was suggested that the rink measure 40 x 120. The following compose the Finance Committee: Harry Smith, Jack Grey, E. Armstrong, W. R. Tooth.

Amateur boxing and wrestling matches in Regina will in future be controlled by a commission of five members. The city council recently adopted a bylaw creating such a commission, but appointments have not yet been announced. The commission will have complete control of all bouts and is given power to stop bouts which it may consider are not to be properly and openly contested and to order restitution of all admissions; to collect a percentage of the receipts to meet operating expenses of the commission and to pass on the application of contestants. All contestants must be examined by a physician 24-hours before the bout. Six ounce gloves are required for all boxing bouts in which the contestants weigh under 148 pounds, over that weight eight ounce mitts are required. No bout can be longer than 15 three-minute rounds.

"The operation of the course has completely killed the notion many of us had that golf is a rich man's game," declared A. W. Puttee, vice-chairman of the Winnipeg public works board, in stating that the municipal golf course was entitled to rank among the most successful and prosperous of Winnipeg's municipal enterprises. Mr. Puttee believes that a second public course will have to be provided in the near future. "Another 18-hole course would be desirable," he states, "but if that is beyond the financial capacity of the city at present, at least a 9-hole course should be provided next season. The records of the public links show that nearly 50,000 games have been played this season. This means that from early spring until late fall, with the exception of hours of darkness and rain, there has been a continuous stream of golfers tramping over the course, and even rain has not kept some of the hardy ones away."

WATER FOREMAN GIVEN NOTICE

Action of City Engineer in Inter-
est of Economy Sustained by
Council

The matter of the discharging
of R. E. Walker, water works
foreman, by the city engineer,
came in for much discussion at
the council meeting last night, a
number of interested spectators
being present to hear the outcome
of Alderman McLeod's question
on the matter. The question was
"Was it economy to discharge
Foreman Walker and at the same
time have a man ready to take
over the position?" City Engi-
neer Whittaker in his written re-
ply stated that Mr. Walker had
been given notice owing to a cur-
tailment of departmental expen-
ses and that his duties would
cease on and after November 15.

The idea was to abolish the
duties of walking foreman and
substitute a working foreman as
well as to otherwise curtailing
operating expenses in that de-
partment. The water works de-
partment had for years shown a
large deficit according to the
statement of the auditor. For the
year 1921, according to a tabula-
tion made of 27 cities in the pro-
vince, the deficit in Prince Rupert
was the second highest, being
\$22,828.33. The department had
for the past two years been car-
rying a walking foreman, one pipe
fitter, a patrolman and three la-
borers at an expenditure annually
of \$11,000. Realizing these facts
and considering that the council
placed the whole of these public
works absolutely in his hands
and considering the continuous
cry of the council for economy,
the engineer felt it his duty to re-
organise and curtail expenses
wherever possible and this could
only be done efficiently by merg-
ing the lesser, or the water
works department into the great-
er, public works department, ad-
ding to or subtracting labor from
the former when and where re-
quired. There was no idea of
creating again such a position
and therefore no man was ready
to take over the position.

Action and Injustice

Alderman McLeod, after hear-
ing the reply, said that it was not
satisfactory and claimed the ac-
tion was an injustice. He said
that Mr. Walker had worked for
the city for eleven years and in
that time there had not been a
blemish on him as a citizen or a
workman. He had always done
his work faithfully and well. Ald-
McLeod claimed there was a man
ready to take over his position.
He did not agree with a state of
affairs which permitted of the
throwing over of old and faithful
employees without offering them
a job at a lesser wage. He want-
ed fair play for all employees of
the city, and considered that Mr.
Walker had been discriminated
against.

Ald. Collart asked the city en-
gineer if he had another man to
take the job.

City Engineer Whittaker re-
plied that Ald. McLeod was wrong
in that assumption.

Ald. McLeod—"You told me
that you were going to put an-
other man in his place."

Mr. Whittaker—"I did not."

Ald. Kerr agreed with Mr.
Whittaker that Ald. McLeod was
wrong.

Valuable Official

Ald. Kelly questioned the econ-
omy policy of letting old em-
ployees out and considered that
a man like Walker who had been
on the job a long time was an
asset. No other man in the city,
he said, could tell where half the
water pipes were. He asked Mr.
Whittaker if he could show him
in his office a detailed map of all
the pipes in the city. Mr. Whit-
taker replied that the trouble had
been that he had not been able to
get sufficient information to
compile the map.

Ald. Montgomery considered
that any discussion of Mr. Walker
should not be made at that time.
He thought such a discussion was
ill timed.

Ald. Kerr said that the board of
works had been trying to curtail
expenses and that they had been
at the city engineer to cut down.
The water works department had
come up for consideration in this
connection. The running expenses
of the water department had
been away above the average. As
far as he understood from Mr.
Whittaker there was absolutely
nobody to take Mr. Walker's

place, and if he could be offered
the job of working foreman it was
agreeable to him.

Purely Economy

Ald. Montgomery said that when
it came down to a point that a
position was not warranted he
did not feel justified in keeping
that position on, and that it was
purely from an economical stand-
point that the present action had
been taken.

Ald. McLeod—"Any time that
any official or employee of the
city is discharged in the inter-
ests of economy I am with you
but if I see any official or em-
ployee of this city being dis-
charged as a result of ill feeling
I am against it."

Ald. Silversides said that he did
not know very much about the
Walker question but he had been
approached on the outside on the
subject and had made it his busi-
ness to find out a little about the
case. As far as he could find out
Mr. Walker had been dismissed
purely as a matter of cutting
down expenses and he understood
that he (Mr. Walker) had not
been turned out absolutely and
that he could get another job with
the city if he wished to.

Ald. McLeod then moved that
Mr. Walker be reinstated as a
working foreman, but the motion
was not seconded. Ald. Collart
made an amendment that the ac-
tion of the city engineer be sus-
tained the job of working fore-
man to be offered to Mr. Walker
if considered necessary, this be-
ing seconded by Ald. Montgomery.

On being put to the vote the
amendment was voted for by all
except Alderman McLeod and Ald.
Kelly.

The Board of Trade is taking up the matter of the manner in which the contracts have been let this winter with the Canadian National Railways.

During the past week Miss Rickards has been too ill to attend school and Mrs. Bowman is taking charge of her pupils in the meantime.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class and second-class land, \$2.50 an acre. Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only. Records will be granted covering any land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land. Particulars of pre-emption abolished but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emption. Records will be granted on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 10 acres before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation of less than 5 years, and has made no improvements, he may, by reason of ill-health, or other cause, be granted a certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$250 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or to record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, provided statutory improvements, made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads. Title to be obtained after fulfilling residence and improvement conditions. For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased, conditions include improvement of land.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible to existing roads may be purchased on condition of improvement of a road to them. Release of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is also made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The new provisions apply to the death of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under the Act is extended from one year after the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the great war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emption are due or payable by pre-emptors on pre-emption recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys advanced due to pre-emptors on account of payments, fees or taxes on pre-emption.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or descendants acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enrollment to March 31, 1929.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS
Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1929.

GRAZING
Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on number ranged, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

"Now perhaps you will think it was the act of an over-fond father, but when Gloria was six months old Signor Caruso took her up in his arms and, carrying her close to a light, examined her open mouth.

"Look, read, he exclaimed in delight. 'The formation at the back of the mouth here is like that of my own dear arch! And look here—and here!' And so he went on, excitedly declaring that different parts of the child's throat were moulded after the various features that went to produce his own wonderful voice.

"Gloria has inherited the love of music. She will be given every opportunity to develop her abilities."
