### DAMAGE ON HALLOWE'EN

Pranks at High School to Be Investigated By Police

The board of school trustees, at its meeting last night, decided to From Vancouverrequest the city police to make an investigation into considerable damage which was done at the premises of King Edward High School on Hallowe'en night with a view to ascertaining who were the culprits. Should it be found that the damage was done by school pupils, they will be brought before the board for reprimand. On the other hand, if it is is found that adults were involved. they will be brought into police; court before the magistrate.

The matter was brought before the board in the report of the acting principal of the High School, Miss E. E. Lucas, and was referred to later in the meeting by Chairman W. J. Greer who informed the board that doors had been taken off their hinges, the school entered, plugs pulled in electric light switches, the contents of the the principal's desk dumped and other damage done or attempted. Either big boys or men had been responsible for what had been done and the chairman believed they had gone just a little too far.

Trustee Brooksbank agreed that the culprits had gone a little too far and moved that the police be asked to investigate and ascertain who had been responsible. Trustee Schubert seconded the motion on the understanding that, should it! be found school pupils were responsible, they would be dealt with hy the board rather than in police! court. Trustee Gillis was not in favor of too drastic punishment and thought a warning would suffice. After all, it had been merely a Hallowe'en prank.






