TURK NATIONALISTS ON RAMPAGE AGAIN

MEMBERS HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES AND SENATORS ARE BEING ELECTED

Constantinople In Terror And Disorder; Allies Ordered Away But Refuse To Go; Pact Broken

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 7.—The Turk Nationalist government is in control of the city. Rafet Pasha is in charge and Hamid Bey, representative of the Angora government, has ordered Allied troops out of Constantinople. A council of Allied generals last night decided to refuse to leave. The Turks have torn up the Mudania armistice agreement and are marching into neutral areas at Chanak and other points occupied by the British. Student and other mobs have been parading the streets since Saturday and the Allied police have been compelled to fire several times killing persons in the mobs. Christians are in fear of massacre and the deposed Sultan is under guard in his palace also fearing assassination. The Allied council refused to acknowledge the Young Turks' right to forbid passage of ships through the Dardanelles without Turkish permit. The Sultan has not abdicated yet and apparently the Allies are guarding him. The French and British are in full accord in demanding the Turks to live up to the armistice pact. Three additional classes of Turk soldiers have been called to the colors according to Turk Nationalist headquarters. It is also reported there that the British forces are retiring from Mosul on the Tigris in northern Mesopotamia and that the Kemalists are entering the evacuated area. All Kemal Bey, editor of the Constantinople Anti-Nationalist newspaper Sabath, has been arrested and condemned to death by the Turkish authorities, the Allies have been informed. Late last night the Allied representatives gave Rafet Pasha, the new civil governor of the city, forty-eight hours in which to release the editor.

SITUATION REGARDED SERIOUSLY PARIS, Nov. 7.—The Allied high commissioners at Constantinople have asked their governments for authorization to take all necessary measures to maintain order in Constantinople. It was announced this afternoon that the commissioners will declare martial law if necessary. The French dreadnaught Jean Bart will leave Toulon today to join the Allied fleet at Constantinople. LONDON, Nov. 7.—The surprising demands which the Kemalists have made upon the Allies in Constantinople since they took over the civil government there on Saturday still cause a great deal of anxiety. In London the feeling of uneasiness has been intensified by the scarcity of news from Constantinople in the last thirty-six hours. All newspapers here treat the situation seriously.

CANADA TRADE IS IMPROVING

Exports to U. S. Increase While Imports from There Decrease WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—Imports from Canada to the United States increased in value \$4,000,000 and exports decreased \$1,000,000 in September this year as compared with September 1921. The total value of imports from Canada this year was \$28,000,000 as against \$24,000,000 last September and exports were \$55,000,000 as against \$56,000,000.

CABINET RESIGNS

LISBON, Nov. 7.—The Portuguese cabinet has resigned.

GASOLINE PRICE IS LOWER HERE

There have been several reductions in the price of gasoline during the past few weeks, the last having gone into effect on October 31, when a drop of 1c per gallon was made. Prices of common fuel commodities on the local retail market today are as follows: Premier gasoline, 34 1/2c. Distillate, 22c. Benzol, 27c.

MANY KILLED IN COAL MINE

Ninety to Ninety-five Trapped in Explosion at Spangler, Illinois SPANGLER, Ill., Nov. 7.—Ninety to ninety-five men were trapped when an explosion sent gas and dirt down into the Reilly mine here. Only 31 were rescued and the rest are, apparently, dead. Bodies Recovered SPANGLER, Ill., Nov. 7.—The bodies of fifty miners who lost their lives in the Reilly mine explosion here yesterday lie in a temporary morgue today. Thirteen more are in sight in the mine, rescuers say. Thirty-two are in hospital.

WHALEN MILL TO RE-OPEN

Immediate Resumption of Operations at Swanson Bay Plant VICTORIA, Nov. 7.—Preparations are being made to reopen the Whalen Pulp & Paper Co.'s pulp mill at Swanson Bay which has been closed down for several months. The company's operations up north are to resume at once and already a number of men have gone in there and the new manager is on the ground. It is expected the mill will be operated continuously from now on.

HANDLING BULKLEY VALLEY BEEF HERE

Harry Boynton Arrives From Yukon to Take Charge of Slaughtering The two carloads of Bulkley Valley beef which were brought to the city recently by the P. Burns Co. have been butchered locally and the beef is on the market today. All the local butchers are giving their ardent support to the project and have the beef on display in their windows. The cattle were slaughtered at the old Pacific Sea Products plant, near the Canadian Gold Storage plant, which has been temporarily transformed into a slaughter house for the killing of livestock brought in from the interior. Harry Boynton, who arrived last night on the Princess Mary from Mayo, will stay in town to do all the butchering of the Bulkley Valley cattle. The butchers in town are very desirous of pushing the sale of the Bulkley Valley beef and present indications are that there will be much assistance given to ranchers of the interior for the disposition of whatever beef is offered this fall. As soon as this shipment has been disposed of Mr. Boynton will take a trip into the valley for the purpose of securing another shipment.

RHODESIA DOES NOT WANT TO JOIN WITH UNION SOUTH AFRICA

General Election in Progress in United States; Observers Expect Little Change Coming

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—Early reports from various parts of the United States indicate the probability of a heavy vote in today's congressional elections. Political observers who have been following the campaign closely believe that there will be but little change in the political aspect of the House of Representatives or the Senate at Washington as a result of the contest. It is not probable, however, that the standing majority of the administration in the House may be diminished. Democratic leaders profess to having seen in the final week of the campaign a turning of public opinion in their direction. The electors are today selecting a new House of Representatives consisting of 437 members. Thirty-seven senators are being elected out of a senate membership of 96, there being five extra contests to fill vacancies caused by death or resignation.

She is out on \$200 bail. K. Aida, Japanese, and Len Chue, Chinaman, were both fined \$50, or thirty days, for being found in a bawdy house without a lawful excuse. These cases resulted from a raid made yesterday morning by City Police Constable Logan, in company with Constable Cameron on the house of Clara Clark, Comox Avenue.

PROSPECTS HERE BEST IN B.C.

TRADE TREATY WITH FRANCE

New Agreement Being Arranged by Hon. W. S. Fielding OTTAWA, November 7.—Negotiations are now under way between Hon. W. S. Fielding, Canadian Finance Minister and the French government for a new trade treaty between Canada and France. When such treaty has been concluded it is expected that the Hon. W. S. Fielding will take up the revision of Canada's present trade arrangements with Italy. Despatches state that Premier Mussolini of Italy has already given some consideration to the question.

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**University Students Big Campaign.**

The campaign which the students of the University of British Columbia have been carrying on to have their permanent buildings erected at the Point Grey site has been drawing a great deal of public attention, particularly in Vancouver and generally throughout the province. The students have the general support of Vancouver citizens and the press of that city has been giving great service. Vancouver has double reason for getting behind such a campaign for the erection of the buildings, which are to be located there, will mean much to the city from an architectural standpoint as well as making the Western institution much more attractive than it is under present conditions. From a provincial standpoint, the buildings are necessary to serve the better interests of education. That is why the movement is receiving general support throughout the province.

**Need Has Not Been Generally Realized.**

The campaign has brought to light the fact that a large number of B. C. people know little of the actual inadequacy of the present accommodation at the University. With a total registration of 1187 (the Arts registration being next to Toronto and second in Canada), certain professors are forced to give the same lecture three and four times because there is no room large enough to contain their whole class; a private house and two churches, including a basement, are being used as classrooms, while a chemistry course is even conducted in a tent. Every available bit of space is in use, and further expansion is quite out of the question. Something must be done at once, and the students in making known such deplorable conditions are asking the general public to extend its support and bring the pressure of its opinion to bear on the government. It is a very significant fact that Alberta with a smaller population than we have, has spent ten times as much on University buildings and equipment. By the Kiwanis plan of raising on the security of the Varsity grant of 3,000 acres of land at Point Grey, the University could be moved without placing any additional burden whatsoever on the taxpayer. Since the objection of increased taxation is thus removed, and since the University is being fatally cramped by its unremovable quarters, there should be no unnecessary delay in the construction of permanent buildings.

**What Visitors' Day Showed.**

So anxious were the undergraduates to make known their ever-crowded condition that they secured the consent of the President, L. S. Klinek, to have last Friday as visitors' day and they invited the public to inspect the premises and see the situation for themselves. A committee of students showed the visitors through the various buildings pointing out the handicap both to students and professors of the insufficient space and equipment. Many laboratory classes which met last Friday were visited and an opportunity given to see the collegians at work. The different activities and courses were explained and the congestion in every building was brought home to the visitors. An item of interest was the close proximity of the college buildings to the consumptive wards of the Vancouver General Hospital; the latter being not thirty yards from the buildings where the students spent the greater part of the day, separated only by a board fence. Equally commented on was the entire lack of campus or gymnasium and much surprise was expressed that U. B. C. athletes have become so prominent in sports, with absolutely no athletic facilities.

**Thousands Of Signatures Secured.**

On visiting the Students' Council offices the guests were given the latest figures on the number of signatures obtained up to date, for the petition to the government. During the summer undergraduates spread throughout the province were able to gather the names of 17,000 people who were favorable to the student campaign. Since then signed petitions have been pouring in by the thousand, so that the total has now reached 56,000 names. It is expected that this number will be augmented by another 10,000 at least, before the petition is presented to the government.

**THANKSGIVING BANQUET WAS FINE AFFAIR**

Great Success Attended Annual Dinner Given by Methodist Ladies' Aid

The commodious social hall of the Methodist Church was not large enough to seat all those who came for the annual thanksgiving dinner under the auspices of the Ladies' Aid last evening. Two sittings were necessary and a large number of the earlier arrivals had to give up their seats when they were through with the splendid dinner to those who came later. With turkey and chicken in abundance and all kinds of dainty and appetizing relishes and desserts, the meal itself was an achievement to the credit of the ladies. The program which was followed was a fine entertainment with vocal and instrumental numbers and several fine speeches in proposal and response to the toasts. Altogether the annual affair was a most successful and enjoyable one reflecting credit on all those concerned.

Miss E. M. Earle was toast mistress and she made an excellent one indeed, keeping the program going in a live manner throughout with her many apt remarks and observations. Grace was pronounced by Rev. G. G. Haeker. After the banquet table had been done full justice to, the toast to the King was duly observed by the singing of the National Anthem. Pryce's Orchestra rendered the opening musical selection, "Graduation March."

**Thanksgiving Day**  
 The first toast, "The Day," was proposed by P. Linzey and responded to by Rev. H. R. Grant. The former told something of the origin of the Thanksgiving Day celebration. It had been established some three hundred years ago by the Pilgrim Fathers and had since become a national occasion in the United States and Canada. The person who did not observe it was indeed of shrivelled spirit. Dr. Grant said that the observance of thanksgiving was peculiar to the North American countries. It was a day set apart by the governments of United States and Canada to offer up thanks to God for the blessings of the harvest. Agriculture was the basic industry of a country and in the success of its harvests might be measured up the prosperity of a nation. Canada in the past few years had been blessed. In a short time her harvests had so increased that now she was one of the most important grain exporting nations in the world having taken the place of Russia in importance. The people must not forget that the blessings which had prospered the land had come from God and some return was expected. To return these blessings with a true spirit of thanksgiving appreciation was the duty of the nation and its citizens.

**City of Prince Rupert.**  
 The toast, "The City in Which we Live," was proposed briefly by Ald. George W. Kerr in the absence of Mayor Rochester who, it was explained, had been suddenly called away from the city. "It will be unnecessary for me to speak on this subject," said Ald. Kerr, "but I will propose the toast and call upon your first mayor, Fred Stork, M.P., to respond."  
 Mr. Stork said that the gathering reminded him of those old thanksgiving festivals back in old Ontario some forty years ago. It was the first he had attended in B. C., but he hoped it would not be the last. Prince Rupert had much to be thankful for, Mr. Stork declared. In her short history she had already made much progress and she was off to a good start. The city had many necessary things, such as a dry dock, ocean dock and other facilities. All that was wanted to complete her equipment was a grain elevator, lumber assembly wharf and coal bunkers which he had no doubt would come in the not far distant future. Given these Prince Rupert would take her place as a port in the affairs of world commerce and trade. Prospects for the city were never brighter.

**Like Citizens, Like City**  
 "The future of the city will be largely as its citizens make it, however," reminded the speaker. "If we are pessimistic and discontented we will not make pro-

gress. It is up to us to be optimistic and to put out our best efforts into our city in building it up. We should speak well of it and try to improve it instead of acting in temporary manner and making our effort only to get enough money to get out of it. Some may feel discouraged on account of the number of people who have left but I feel that those who have left we will see back before so very long. It is up to all to assist in bringing about the destiny that is assured the city.

**Our Sister Churches**  
 was proposed by Dr. W. T. Kergin and responded to by Archdeacon G. A. Rix and Capt. Coleman. Each of the speakers referred to the amicable feelings that had always prevailed between the various churches of the city. There had never been any discord and each felt that the prosperity of one congregation meant the well being of the other. Archdeacon Rix emphasized the necessity for all citizens to assist spiritually and materially in church work. It was the one great force of uplift in the community and without the churches the city would be a sorry place indeed. There were churches in the city for all tastes and there was no excuse for any one. Capt. Coleman said that all should seek the Spirit of God. That found, all other good things would follow.

**Toast to Ladies**  
 The toast "to the Ladies" was proposed by A. W. Edge and responded to by Miss Haddock, each of whom made humorous speeches though tinged with a serious spirit. Each referred to the influence of the mother as being the one great guide in the weaving of the destinies of men and women for better things. 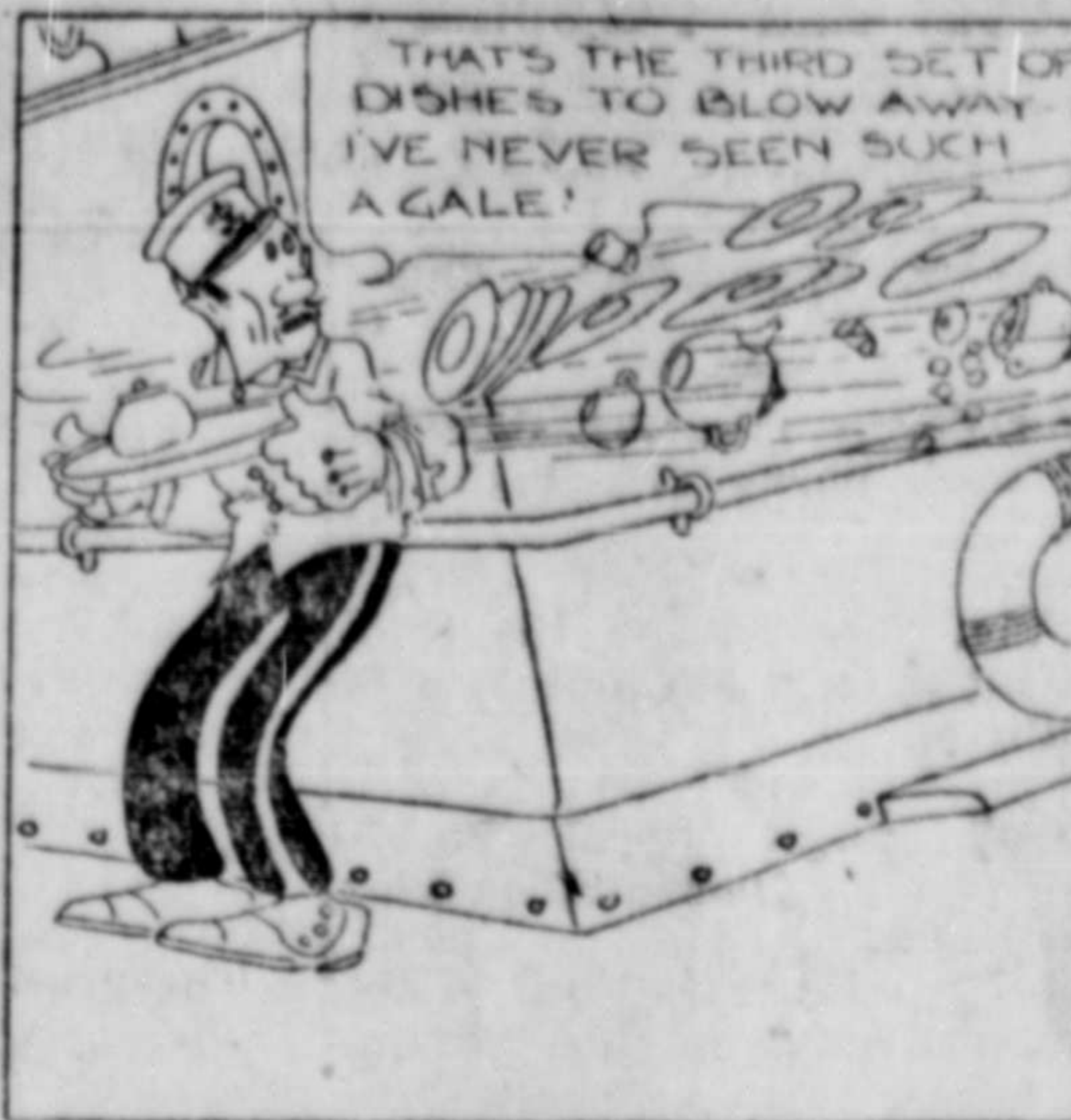

## ROBERTSON CASE CLOSED

### Evidence and Argument of Counsel—Accused is Acquitted

The case against J. B. Robertson, charged with selling intoxicating liquor, to wit Scotch whisky, on October 14 last, was continued in the city police court, before Magistrate McDymont, on Saturday afternoon and, after the hearing of evidence and argument of counsel was completed, accused was acquitted on a technicality, there being no such brand of whiskey as the detectives said was sold.

The first witness called for the defence was Duncan McMillan, a partner of accused. Upon going into the witness box Mr. Patmore requested him to draw a plan of the upstairs rooms situated over the Kaien Island Club premises on Second Avenue.

In giving his evidence witness said he remembered seeing Provincial Constable Dixon on the morning of October 14 in his bedroom, he having been brought in by the accused, Robertson said "Here is a friend of yours and he is sick this morning." Witness had never seen the man before and he was a complete stranger to him. A man, named Mercer, was in the room at the time washing. Both the constable and accused then went out of the room together.

Questioned by Mr. Patmore witness said that no one had come up the stairs after that as the door had been left open and he would have heard anyone coming up.

Mr. Patmore, "Dixon says that he got Scotch whisky out of a bottle marked D. Watson's Scotch whisky. What do you say about it?"

Witness, "I say that he is telling a lie."

Mr. Patmore—"Did you ever hear of such a whisky as D. Watson's?"

Witness—"No, sir."

Mr. Patmore—"Do you know whether the Liquor Board sell such a brand of whisky?"

Witness—"No, sir, I have never heard tell of it. I had one bottle of Watson's about three months ago."

Mr. Patmore—"How long were you upstairs after Dixon and Robertson went out?"

Witness—"Three quarters of an hour. I got up, dressed and shayed myself and during that time no one came upstairs."

**Hammering on Door**

Witness continuing said that the next morning he woke up upon hearing someone hammering at the door and shouting "Dunk." He got up and opened the door and saw three men standing outside, Harrison, Dixon and a little fellow, whom he did not know but thought he was a cook. Witness asked what they wanted and they said they wanted a "shot." He told them that he did not handle whiskey and "to get to Hell downstairs." The fat man started to shake a bit and said "Dune, I'm sick and need a shot." Witness told him to go and get his shot where he got sick, slammed the door and went back to bed.

Cross examined by Solicitor Hooper, witness said he was a partner with Robertson in the Kaien Island Cafe and also the club that was run behind.

Mr. Hooper—"In that club did they sell beer?"

Witness—"They served beer."

Mr. Hooper—"This beer that was served, who owned it?"

Witness—"Members of the club."

Witness continuing in reply to Mr. Hooper's questions said that he had served beer and that in a sense he knew that it was against the law. He had been in trouble before for being drunk.

Mr. Hooper—"When Dixon was up there that morning where did you have your bottle of Watson's?"

Witness—"On an open shelf."

Mr. Hooper—"A bottle of Watson's?"

Witness—"No sir, it was not a bottle of Watson's."

Mr. Hooper—"Is it true that Dixon got as far as the bedroom?"

Witness—"Yes."

Mr. Hooper—"Evidently Robertson thought he would get something or he would not have brought him in?"

Witness—"He changed his mind after he had asked me."

that his place of business was the Kaien Island Club premises on Second Avenue.

In reply to questions put by Mr. Patmore he said that he saw Dixon on the morning of October 14. He had just got in the building, somewhere around 10 a.m. when he was told that a man had come upstairs. He went to the foot of the stairs, and calling "Dune." Witness went upstairs and asked Dixon what he wanted Dune for. He said he could not drink any more beer as he was sick and wanted some whiskey. Thinking Dixon was a friend of Dune's witness opened the door and took him into the room.

Witness, Mercer was washing and Dune was in bed. Witness said "Dune here's a friend of yours and he's sick." Dune sat up and looked at him and said "He's no friend of mine and I've got nothing for him."

Witness then turned to Dixon and said, "That's all I can do for you."

Witness and Dixon then went downstairs through the restaurant. He then sat down at the lunch counter to have his breakfast.

until he had his sleep out. They had both been in this country a long time and he thought that probably Dixon was a friend of Dune's. Accused said he had never, to his knowledge, served anyone but members of the club with beer.

**Adverse to Methods**  
In closing the case for the defence Mr. Patmore said he was very adverse to the methods adopted by the Liquor Board in bringing the prosecutions. He said the present case was a pure betrayal of friendship. It reminded him of another individual who sat and supped with his friend and then betrayed him, his name was Judas Iscariot. He said that when the Liquor Board resorted to the present methods of getting evidence they were making the law a joke. They had no respect for the law themselves and then they asked the people to respect the law. "Eliminate the profit from the selling of liquor and you will put the bootlegger out of business," said Mr. Patmore.
