OTTAWA, Nov. 10:-Taking the Premier at his word that his government stands or falls by the four trade treaties negotiated at the recent Imperial economic conference in Ottawa, Rt. Hon. William Lyon Mackenzie King threw out a direct challenge in the House of Commons for an election.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10:-In spite of the Democratic landslide in Tuesday's election, it appeared last night that the Republican party would still hold control of Senate during the forthcoming short term of two years.

The Senatorial issue was apparently settled in favor of the Republicans when late returns from New Jersey and Colorado showed the Republican candidates to be leading and, apparently, elected. The re-election of Senator Barber in New Jersey was conceded while Carl Skyler, Republican, was leading his Democratic opponent by a substantial margin in Colorado.



This provision was compulsory under the Insurance Act and meant that a reserve against policies must be maintained in the form of cash or high grade securities in sufficient sum to meet all death clams and maturities as they came due. The amount to be set, aside each year was determined by acturial science based on the average age limit of human life.

Earnings of Companies

The rate of interest assumed in calculating the policy liabilities was three percent, some using three and a half percent. In actual experience, however, the companies earned more than that.

The law of averages was applied long different lines by the insurance companies, Mr. Jabour explained.

Speaking of the investment of funds, Mr. Jabour pointed out that every dollar invested by an insurance company was invested according to government regulations. Life insurance funds were permitted to be invested in Dominion, provincial and municipal bonds, industrial bonds of certain companies, first mortgages up to a certain valuation of the property, policy loans and preferred stocks of companies which have paid dividends for seven years previous to the purchase. Protection of the policyholders' money is the watchword of a life insurance company's investment department.

Misconception as to the position of life insurance companies arose

from a lack of understanding of their functions and the nature of their obligations, continued the speaker. Solvency was not tested merely by setting declared liabili. ties against the liquidation value of assets. A life insurance company's obligations could not all fall due at one time. The obligations reached into the distant future and might fall due for payment five, ten or thirty years from now as policies matured and policyholders died. There was a fundamental difference between life insurance companies and banking institutions which must meet a large portion of their liabilities on demand and was the subject for an interesting were required, of necessity, to carry a large portion of their assets in
