Britain Cuts Down Her Expense Bill

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS SPEND LESS ON ARMY AND NAVY

Cutting Down Expenses Government in Great Britain Reductions Recommended

LONDON, Feb. 11.—Reduction in the personnel and estimates for the maintenance of the army and navy and air force in Britain is recommended in a report of the committee on national economy headed by Sir Eric Geddes. This is the committee which was asked to show parliament and the people how £100,000,000 could be clipped from the national expenses.

While the committee has not been wholly successful, it has been able to suggest how there might be reductions in the expenses of the nation amounting to £75,000,000 spread over the various departments of the administration.

Taxes are high in Britain and the drop in prices is making the people restless under the burden. There is a general demand for economy of expenditures but this economy is tending to accentuate the bad times. Men dismissed from the public service join the army of unemployed and reduced salaries means less money to spend. Every economy tends to decrease the amount of money spent.

CONSERVATIVES ORGANIZING IN GREAT BRITAIN

LONDON, Feb. 11.—The Unionist members of parliament who signed the pledge to stand as independent Conservatives and not as supporters of the coalition government in the event of an early election are organizing a group and discussing the future policy. The group numbers about fifty.

The action of the Conservative coalitionists followed the election of Lloyd George as president of the Liberals at a convention of Liberals held here. While the coalition government is still carrying on and will continue to do so for a short time, there may be a break any day and both sides are preparing for the next big political fight, which may come this year or possibly may be delayed until next.

IRISH REPORTS CONFICTING

Correspondent of London Times
at Dublin Says Kidnapping
Is Deplored.

LONDON, Feb. 11.—Conflicting reports are coming out of Ireland concerning the attitude of the southern provisional government toward the recent kidnapping of prominent Ulstermen. "The whole machinery of the provisional government is being employed to secure the release of the men," according to the correspondent of the Times at Dublin, who says the raids are deplored by every member of that government.

Against this is a report from another source, ostensibly friendly to the provisional government, implying the belief that the Collins administration had forehand knowledge of the raids and could immediately secure the release of the prisoners by giving a direct order.

PROFESSIONALISM IS RIFE IN FAR EAST IN AMATEUR SPORTS

HALIFAX, Feb. 11.—Two hundred amateur athletes in the Maritime Provinces, most of them in Nova Scotia, have to face charges of professionalism which are accompanied by sworn affidavits, President Covey states.

RAILWAY IS CLEAR AGAIN

Slide at Kwinitsa Opened at Mid-night Last Night—Engine Off Track Made Further Delay.

The snow slide on the Canadian National Railway at Kwinitsa was cleared out last night at 12 o'clock and the trains are all moving again. No. 3 westbound, due here on Thursday evening, is expected in between 3 and 3:30 this afternoon and No. 4, which was held up at the scene of the slide for two days, is again proceeding eastward. The train which was to have gone east this morning is posted to pull out at 9 o'clock tomorrow morning.

The clearing of the snowslide at Kwinitsa did not end the troubles of the railway, for the engine of the snowplow from Pacific went off the track between Salvus and Kwinitsa and occasioned an additional twelve hours blocking of the line. Following the righting of this the trains were enabled to move.

The fifty men from the city relief work and the equipment which was sent out to clear the Kwinitsa trouble returned here early this morning. Superintendent N. B. Walton, District Engineer Featherstonehaugh, Superintendent J. P. Kirkpatrick of Smithers and Roadmaster R. A. Harlowe were all at the scene of the tie-up and superintended operations. There was no damage to equipment and no one was hurt as a result of the blockade.

RAILWAY STRIKE AT CORK IMPROVED

Lorry of Rifles Seized and Taken
From Police in Neighborhood.

CORK, Feb. 11.—A lorry load of police travelling from Macroom to Brandon was this morning held up by armed men. The attackers captured the car with rifles and equipment. There were no casualties.

The situation arising from the seizure of railway stations yesterday by railway strikers is considered less acute today. No attempts were made to interfere with the rolling stock or get up steam in the idle locomotives.

RELEASE PRISONERS HELD IN ENGLAND

LONDON, Feb. 11.—The colonial office announced today that pursuant to the authority granted by the British cabinet steps are being taken to release prisoners taken into custody for offences committed in Ireland from Irish political motives prior to the Irish truce.

KOOTENAY ELECTION

Writ to Be Issued Today and by
Election Late in March.

OTTAWA, Feb. 11.—The writ for the by-election in East Kootenay will probably be issued today. The date of the by-election was decided yesterday but withheld pending the approval of the Governor-general, who is out of town.

The date will probably be toward the end of the second or third week in March.

NEW YORK, Feb. 11.—Benny Leonard retained the lightweight championship last night when he received the judge's decision after a fifteen round go with Rocky Kansas.

SEND DELEGATES TO ECONOMIC CONFERENCE

LONDON, Feb. 11.—In the House of Commons yesterday Lloyd George announced that South Africa and Australia were among the dominions which so far had accepted invitations to send representatives to the Genoa economic conference which meets in March.

CORKLE BOXES JOHN MORGAN

Six-round Go at Anyox Results
in a Draw—It Was a
Real Fight.

ANYOX, Feb. 11.—Anyox sports were treated to a feast of boxing on Friday night under the auspices of the Community League in Recreation Hall, with Floy Hatt as chairman. The main bout was between G. N. Corkle of Anyox mine, formerly of Prince Rupert, and John Morgan of Ladysmith. It was a real fight from the first sound of the gong in each round. The men mixed well and there were few clinches. The breaks were clean.

Corkle missed heavy rights to the jaw, landing body blows. Morgan led the left well, playing the jaw in each round.

The match was a humdinger, ending in a draw. At the close of the six rounds each of the boxers was as fresh as at the beginning. Ed Wall was referee.

SPRING ASSIZES IN PRINCE RUPERT MAY 5

VICTORIA, Feb. 11.—The dates of the spring assizes were announced yesterday. Court will sit in Prince Rupert April 27 for the trial of both civil and criminal cases and at Prince George on May 5.

COMOX LOGGING CO. MACHINE SHOPS BURN

VICTORIA, Feb. 11.—The machine shops of the Comox Logging Co. near Courtenay were almost wholly destroyed by fire. The shops were equipped with machinery valued at \$50,000.

SENATE BEGINS CONSIDERATION OF PACIFIC TREATY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—Consideration of the four-power treaty was begun today by the Senate committee on foreign relations. The countries involved are Britain, United States, France and Japan and the treaty is designed to replace the Anglo-Japanese pact.

LONG CHASE HAS ENDING

After Ten Thousand Mile Pursuit
Mounted Policeman Locates
Fugitive in Mexico.

PRINCE RUPERT BELIEVED
REFERRED TO IN MISTAKE

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 11.—Sergeant M. M. Stephens of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police arrived here yesterday with Chow Chimooske, who was taken in custody at Mexico City after a chase lasting five and one-half months and covering 10,000 miles. Chimooske is charged with a double murder at Prince Rupert, B. C. He was taken north today by another Canadian officer.

The chase for the fugitive led across Canada, through the Atlantic Coast states from Maine to Florida, and thence from New Orleans to Mexico. The old adage that the Royal Canadian Mounted Police always get their man appears to have been borne out in this case.

The above case seems more or less of a mystery to all the police here, Royal Canadian, provincial and city. None of them know of a crime as described having been committed here, nor do they know of Chow Chimooske. The Mounted Police have no record of the officer, Sergeant M. M. Stephens, nor have they a record of the crime. It is thought by Inspector Acland that Prince Albert may be the place referred to and that it was mistaken in the despatch for Prince Rupert.

CATTLE BREEDER IS SENT TO THE SENATE

OTTAWA, Feb. 11.—Arthur G. Hardy, the noted cattle breeder of Ontario, has been appointed to the vacant seat in the senate. He is the son of a late Premier of Ontario.

SEATTLE WINS HOCKEY MATCH

Team Is Now League Leader
After Beating Victoria Two
to Nothing.

VICTORIA, Feb. 11.—Seattle hockey team pulled itself back in the leadership of the Pacific Hockey League last night by beating the Victoria Aristocrats two to nothing.

The games this year are the most closely contested the league has seen since its inception. No team holds the leadership for any length of time. Victoria seems to be missing the aid of Moose Johnson, who recently left the game.

HELD ON SERIOUS CHARGE



George L. ("Tex") Rickard, international fight promoter, has been arrested in connection with charges made by the Children's Society of New York that he attacked a 15-year-old girl, and impaired the morals of another four years younger. He has been released on bail for a hearing.

The bout went ten rounds.

FOOD FOR RUSSIA BURNED WHEN VESSEL DESTROYED AT SEA

CHRISTIANIA, Feb. 11.—The British steamer Lowlands, bound for Murmansk with a cargo of food for starving Russians, was burned at sea. The crew escaped.

BONOMI IS STILL PREMIER OF ITALY

ROME, Feb. 11.—King Victor has not accepted the resignation of Premier Bonomi, which was presented on February 2. The Bonomi ministry is expected to be in its place next Thursday when parliament opens.

ALASKA HALIBUT FISHERMEN FAVOR A CLOSED SEASON

Owners of eighteen fishing vessels, at a meeting held at Juneau, declared unanimously for a closed season for halibut from November 1 to February 4 each year, covering the spawning period of the fish. A telegram to this effect was sent to Delegate Dan Sutherland and the Seattle Fishing Vessels' Association. It will also be sent to secretaries of the Fishermen's Union in Alaska.

The Seattle organization desired fishing to cease until March 15, but those present claimed that spawning season is now over and they decided to continue fishing.

FREE STATE IS TAKING STEPS TO KEEP PEACE

LONDON, Feb. 11.—The provisional Irish government has cancelled the amnesty for all men of the naval, police or military services who commit acts of hostility towards any Irish people. A despatch from Belfast says there is no change in the Irish situation. No more word has been received of the kidnapped Ulstermen who were released and both sides are waiting watchfully.

YUKON IS IN GRIP OF COLD

Thermometer Registers 62 Below Zero—Blizzard in Newfoundland Blocks Traffic.

RUPERT COLDEST YET.

ST. JOHN, Nfld., Feb. 10.—Newfoundland is again besieged by snow and ice. A blizzard swept over the country last night and yesterday and blocked all traffic everywhere.

DAWSON, Feb. 11.—The Yukon territory is in the grip of the ice king. After an unusually mild winter there has been a sudden drop in temperature the thermometer registering as low as 62 degrees below zero.

Coldest Yet Here. The lowest temperature reading of the winter was registered this morning at 7 o'clock at the local Dominion Government Meteorological Bureau when the instrument dropped to 9 degrees above zero.

Turn Attention
to North Ireland.

With what looks like a settlement of the differences in South Ireland it seems as if the storm centre was shifting to the north. The difference is now largely one of the boundary line between the two sections of the country. There are a large number of Sinn Feiners in the north who would like to join the south but they do not wish to change their place of residence. They continue to make things hot for the north in the hope that the territory in which they live will be transferred to the Irish Free State.

Matter of Freedom
Chiefly Sentiment.

The matter of freedom is chiefly one of sentiment. People in the north are free to go about their own business just as they are in the south. They have their own parliament and executive council, make their own laws and enforce them. There is nobody oppressing them. The government is one that was agreed upon and accepted with alacrity by the people. There are, however, in that part of the country intense religious differences, and these differences seem to keep alive a spirit of hatred. The differences are really very slight, but the people do not feel that way. The differences appear large and slight happenings there have great significance. Every man has a chip on his shoulder and is daring the other to knock it off.

In spite of the little troubles of which we hear and shall hear in the future, it seems scarcely likely that the Irish question will again loom large.

Quiet Time Here
Makes People Uneasy.

Business is quiet here, and this is making people uneasy. It must be expected that it will be quiet for some weeks yet. It can hardly be otherwise. We all feared a quiet time, but it is not so quiet as it might have been. Prince Rupert has not suffered much and it will take only a small impetus to set us going again.

Within a few weeks there should be word of some developments in this north country. Stewart is busier this winter than she has been for many a previous winter and travel in that direction will commence soon. Everything points to the beginning of a revival soon. There is absolutely no need to be anything but optimistic.

Why Pessimistic
About the Women?

Says the Winnipeg Free Press: Papers, preachers, professors and others are full of pessimism about the young lady of today. They say she smokes, she paints her face, she dances to jazz music, she stays out late nights, she cusses (mildly), she doesn't mind her mother, she calls her father "Old Bean," she's flip and she's frivolous, and goodness knows what isn't wrong with her. Truly it is a cheery enough picture of the freedom and the gaiety of life today but—what of the future? Ah, there's the rub? What kind of mothers are those girls going to make; what about the future of the race? That's the question that is leading to the worry.

Frankly speaking, we don't know what of the future. It may turn out to be all the pessimists are saying, and worse, which would be a bad thing for the race. TRUTH AND HONOR.

Editor Daily News:

I beg to take exception to your inference that would belittle your efforts to prevent the ruining of young people. If you will read my letter of yesterday again you will find that I do not object to scandal, which ruins reputations.

In your editorial of today you take the proper stand regarding the publishing of charges against officials. There has been too much of this thing of "bearing false witness." The most sacred thing we have next to our liberty—is truth and honor. I do not want to see our young people lose their love of liberty or truth, which are of more importance to me than all the dope peddlers.

In fact my contention is that the restrictions placed on the sale of "dope" only make it more desirable in the eyes of foolish people. If our young people are brought up to a high regard for truth and honor they do not need these restrictions, and when they do, an asylum is the proper place for them. The best governed country is the least governed. Lord's Day Act.

Now a few words in regard to the law itself. The principle of the act is the assurance of a right rather than the repression of a liberty. Every man has the right to shoot, fish, swim, picnic and do anything else he likes on Sunday, and there is nothing in the act interfering with his liberty in this respect. OTHER SIDE
SUNDAY LAW

Rev. Dr. Grant Writes in Defense of Dr. Hueistis and Sabbath Observance.

The following letter has been received from Rev. Dr. Grant: Editor Daily News:

Referring to your editorial yesterday, in which you commended the police commission for filing Dr. Hueistis' letter, will you bear with me while I give a few reasons why I think that action was wrong, and why I disagree with you.

Dr. Hueistis is the secretary of the Lord's Day Alliance of Canada, an organization that is represented in nearly every town between Halifax and Prince Rupert. This organization is the father of the Lord's Day Act and had it made law by the Dominion Parliament. In its efforts in this direction, the Alliance was backed by the Moral and Social Reform Council of Canada, and it in its turn is representative of every church in the Dominion, as well as the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada.

You can see therefore that the act has wide backing, that it is a Dominion law, and every citizen of the Dominion has an interest in seeing that it is effectively administered in every part of our land. I do not therefore think it can be reasonably charged that Dr. Hueistis was going beyond his right in courageously asking that the law be administered in this city. I agree with you that we are a law abiding people, and especially that the Lord's Day Act is fairly well administered, and I believe that Dr. Hueistis would say the same, but in one respect we do show some laxity in allowing some places of business to keep open on Sunday.

When he was here last year Dr. Hueistis interviewed the tobacconists of the city about closing. His report to me was that every man would welcome the enforcing of the law against commercializing the Sunday. They intimated they were forced to keep open because their competitors did. He then saw the mayor and asked if nothing could be done. The mayor promised to look into the question when he had dealt with other matters he had in view. Since then Dr. Hueistis had been written to by a citizen of this city informing him that the Lord's Day Act was not being enforced. He wrote to the mayor courageously asking him to implement his promise. This letter, which has a background of his former interview, and the request of a citizen, was submitted to the police commission and filed.

I hardly think, Mr. Editor, that you can agree that a letter with all this background was dealt with reasonably when merely ordered to be filed. Let us look for a moment at the class of men who are openly violating the act in the city. Outside of the tobacconists they are largely Orientals and others of non-British birth. They are not to be blamed for I expect they had no training as we have had in respecting the British Sunday. Do you think, Mr. Editor, we are paving the way for respect for British law, when we allow them openly to break this one, Lord's Day Act.

Now a few words in regard to the law itself. The principle of the act is the assurance of a right rather than the repression of a liberty. Every man has the right to shoot, fish, swim, picnic and do anything else he likes on Sunday, and there is nothing in the act interfering with his liberty in this respect. BRINGING UP FATHER



Firmer Basis for Future Is Resolved Upon Annual Meeting of Canadian Club

Resolve that the future activities of the organization shall be characterized with even more energy and co-operation than in the past was the keynote of feeling and discussion at the annual meeting of the Canadian Club, which was held last night in the Court House. A creditable record of past work was reviewed in reports of officers and several suggestions for the future, some of which were adopted, were advanced. Generally, a firmer basis of future endeavor, especially from a financial standpoint, was set out. Election of officers was the principal item of business at the

meeting. Judge Young presided and J. H. McMullin acted as secretary.

There were present besides: Ald. Theo. Collart; L. W. Patmore, D. G. Stewart, W. S. Fisher, Joe Greer, Rev. Canon G. A. Rix, Col. S. P. McDermid, J. F. Maguire, O. H. Nelson, H. F. McLeod and Ald. John Dybhn.

L. W. Patmore was elected president in succession to Judge Young who firmly declined to again accept the office which he held for ten of the eleven years' history of the club in the city. Regret was generally expressed that the judge saw fit to take such action and tribute was paid to the manner in which he had guided the activities of the club during his long period of office. In order that his services and dignity might not be lost, the office of honorary president was established, on suggestion of Canon Rix, and the judge was unanimously chosen to occupy that post of honor.

New Officers.

Honorary President, Judge F. McB. Young.

President, L. W. Patmore.

First vice president, Canon G. A. Rix.

Second vice president, D. G. Stewart.

Secretary-treasurer, Walter Gale.

Executive committee, J. H. McMullin, W. S. Fisher, O. H. Nelson, H. F. Pullen and G. A. McNicholl.

Judge Young, in announcing his retirement from the office of president, stated that he had had the honor of being president for all the period of the club's history since its establishment in 1911 with the exception of one year when Bishop Du Vernet had been president. He had felt it a great honor.

Rotation of Officers.

"But I do not think it is in the best interests of the club," went on Judge Young, "that one man should continue in the office for any length of time. In the past, however, no one has seemed willing to take on the office. Such a practice as I have suggested should be followed, I think, and should be operated from now on. There should be a new list of office bearers this year and it should rotate in future. It would create a greater interest in the club and would make for rivalry between the officers of the various years."

"Before retiring I would like to say a few words on the idea of the Canadian Club, what it is and what its functions are. It was originally created to encourage the spirit of patriotism and to keep the members in touch with the world affairs, to think imperial and to get away from provincialism.

Two Functions.

"The club functions in two ways—first, in conjunction with the Association of Canadian Clubs and, secondly, in giving luncheons where outstanding men, national or international, may be entertained and heard. As far as the first function is

concerned, there has never been a request made of the Prince Rupert Club by the association that has not been acted upon. A resolution was sent to us for support asking that all Hearst publications be excluded from Canada. We passed a resolution joining in the request. We were asked to endorse the League of Nations and we did so. There has only been one meeting in recent years of the Association of Canadian Clubs and that one was at Ottawa. It was impossible for a delegate to be sent on account of the expense, but we wired to Col. Peck, who was in the capital on government business, to represent us and he did so.

"Secondly, it is required that our speakers be outstanding men with a message. I have steadfastly refused to allow others than such to address the club. As we look back over the list we can find none to be ashamed of.

There was never one of the speakers who did not leave us a message valuable in inspiration and information.

No Opportunities Missed.

"Here in Prince Rupert we have labored under difficulties. We are isolated and there are only three trains and two fast passenger boats a week. That has been a great handicap and has meant that in order to speak here a man must spend a week of his time. The result is that the most of the speakers we have had here have had some other mission outside of merely addressing the Canadian Club. Some prominent men we have missed because we never knew of their coming and going. However, we have never missed an opportunity. We had a standing offer with clubs at Vancouver, Winnipeg and other cities to send their speakers on here

and also offered to take speakers in charge as our guests between here and Vancouver. Only one man, the Chinese Consul General, took advantage of this offer.

Our community service is of an educational nature and the only means we have of carrying it out is through the medium of these addresses. We sent offers to Hon. N. W. Rowell, Lord Jellicoe, Lord Atholstone, Hon. C. C. Ballantyne and Sir Phillip Gibbs and many others to speak here but none of them could come. The incoming officers will be faced with the same difficulty although there may possibly be a slight improvement."

Financial Matters.

The judge then went on to deal with financial matters of the club stating that there was a small deficit and the lunches should pay for themselves. The idea in the past had been to keep the price down and the result had been that there had always been splendid attendance with never a failure.

The reason that the finances had gone slightly behind was because membership dues had not been collected for the past two years or so. The committee and the secretary had not assisted in the work and he did not think that he was to be expected to go out with a subscription book to collect the fees. The club should be organized now so that it could attend the lunches who had not paid fees and were not duly qualified members. All should pay their membership dues and then there would be a fund to draw on for expenditures such as car hire, telegrams and other extraordinary expenditures. The luncheons would take care of themselves.

Vote of Appreciation.

Canon Rix, in proposing a vote of appreciation to Judge Young, stated that His Honor had constantly taken an interest in the affairs of the club when the rest of the committee had been dilatory. He had done more than ever should have been expected of him. Why did he even have to sell tickets? He (Canon Rix) would have the club go on record as appreciating the consistent and intelligent work which had been carried on under Judge Young.

L. W. Patmore, seconding the motion, said that Judge Young had nothing to hide himself about as far as the record of the club was concerned. If there was any blame to be placed it was the committee that should receive it. The members had not taken the proper interest and had left it all to the judge who was only too willing. Any criticism against him was neither right nor fair. He had carried out admirably all the legitimate functions of the club and all criticism should be leveled at the committee, which had failed significantly in its duty.

The vote of thanks was passed with enthusiasm.

Membership Fees.

The matter of membership fees was taken up and it was decided to charge \$1 per year. The question of making the luncheons exclusive to members was discussed but it was decided to leave it in abeyance until more members had been obtained.

Judge Young, W. S. Fisher, J. F. Maguire and O. H. Nelson were of the opinion that the luncheons should be limited to members while President-elect Patmore and Canon Rix throughout the time was inopportune to restrict them in that manner.

The financial report, as submitted, showed a balance in the bank of \$25.99 with outstanding accounts for \$37.36 making a deficit of \$11.37. The outstanding accounts are for advertising. Returns for the luncheons showed a profit of \$6.65 from the Taft luncheon, \$25.05 from Prebendary Gough and \$12.65 from Col. Forster.


