CONFERENCE PRACTICALLY AT STANDSTILL TALE OF HARDSHIP TOLD IN SEATTLE BY CREW OF SCHOONER WASHINGTON

Turks are Given Until Today to Decide About Near East Proposition

LAUSANNE, Dec. 20.—Turkish fears of attacks on Constantinople by sea and air have brought the Near East conference practically to a standstill.

The British and French have decided to give the Turks until today to accept or reject the Allied plan and are trying on the side to convince the Turks and Russians that freedom of the straits will not menace the Turkish national existence.

The French are preparing to leave for home on Thursday and the Russians will likely go too.

QUEBEC MADE FOUR MILLION FROM LIQUOR

Annual Report of Commission
Was Tabled in Eastern Legislature Last Night

QUEBEC, Dec. 20.—The annual report of the Quebec liquor commission for the fiscal year ended April 30, 1922, was tabled in the legislature last night. It shows that the year's sales totalled \$15,212,801 and the net revenue was \$1,000,971.

ESTIMATE OF CROP IN 1922

Will Exceed 1921 But Will Not
Be as High as Year Before
That

OTTAWA, Dec. 20.—A preliminary estimate of the value of this year's field crops in all Canada places the total at \$984,139,500 as against \$954,863,670 in 1921 and \$1,455,244,050 in 1920.

WILLIAM PINNELL WAS PIONEER N. VANCOUVER

Deceased Second Steward of
Steamer Prince George, Was
49 Years of Age

Further details of the death of William I. Pinnell, for eight years second steward of the Prince George, were furnished by the officers on the boat on arrival here today. Deceased was 49 years of age and was a native of Bristol, England. He was one of the pioneers of the North Shore in Vancouver where he conducted a dairy produce business.

He is survived by his widow and a brother. Flowers were sent to the funeral by the captain and officers, the engineers, stewards' department, pursers' department, dock and office staff in Vancouver and the Tyee Lodge of Prince Rupert.

DEATH OF OLDEST MAN IN CANADA REPORTED

William Kennedy, of Helden,
Near Edmonton, Was 125
Years of Age

EDMONTON, Dec. 20.—The death of William Kennedy, of Helden, at the ripe old age of 125 years, has been reported to Donald Mackie, registrar of vital statistics as having occurred November 30.

Kennedy's age at death is correct, not only was he the oldest inhabitant of Canada but he must have come to Canada when he was over 100 years old, since it is stated that he came here twenty years ago.

Kennedy always insisted upon his age being given as stated and the person who reported his death has documentary evidence that Kennedy was baptized by the Rev. John Richardson, parish priest of Enniskillen, Ireland, September 25, 1802, at which time his age was given as five years.

PRINCE GEORGE IN

Vessel Will Sail for Vancouver
With Holiday Passengers
Tomorrow Evening

The G.T.P. steamer Prince George, Captain Morehouse, arrived at noon today from the south with a small passenger list and 125 tons of freight. When the ship sails at 10 p.m. Thursday night she will take a passenger list of 90 people to the south for the Christmas holidays, this being the last boat of this line to reach the south in time for Christmas.

Just as the boat docked the drill whistles sounded and the spectators on the dock had an excellent opportunity of seeing how fast the boats could be swung from the davits in case of emergency. The officers report continued cold weather in the south with snow.

OTTAWA, Dec. 20.—Tom Moore, president of the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress and director of the Canadian National Railways who recently returned from Europe, had an odd experience in Belfast which city he visited in the course of his trip. He and his son Lewis, who accompanied him, were looking into a store window when they suddenly got the command: "Hands up," and two wicked looking revolvers in the hands of two policemen were thrust under their noses. Hands went up promptly and both father and son were searched for hidden arms. None were found so they were allowed to proceed. Later in the same day, Mr. Moore was stopped, entering the post office to send a telegram, and was searched and had to produce his papers.

RESIGNS HIS MEMBERSHIP

Brig. Gen. Odium Quits People's
Prohibition Party as Protest
Against Rev. A. E. Cooke's
Statements

VANCOUVER, Dec. 20.—As a protest against what he considers untruthful statements against British Columbia made by Rev. A. E. Cooke, chairman of the People's Prohibition party of B.C., in the course of his recent lecture tour in Eastern Canada, Brigadier General Victor W. Odium, yesterday resigned from membership in that organization.

Fishermen Made 56 Mile Passage by Dory in Icy Waters of North After Being Marooned Many Days

SEATTLE, Dec. 20.—Tales of hardships following the wreck of the halibut schooner Washington in Yakutat Bay, Alaska, are brought here by Erling Olsen and Olof Larsen, who with five other members of the boat's crew, were marooned for 22 days following the wreck. After having had good fishing, five storms were encountered and finally the Washington foundered on the rocks after a hole had been punched in her side. The crew took to the dories and fought their way to shore from the derelict. After reaching the beach, they made a hut and finally launched a dory in which three of the party reached Icy Bay 56 miles away. No other humans lived within forty miles.

MORE POWER AT ANYOX SMELTER

Granby Co. Has Let Contract for
Work Which Will Cost \$200,000,
Mr. Munro Announces

H. S. Munro, general manager of the Granby Consolidated Mining, Smelting & Power Co., who went south last week, announces that contracts have been signed for the installation of a 5,000 horsepower addition to the existing hydro-electric facilities at Anyox. The new addition will cost about \$200,000 and will be ready for service about next July. Mr. Munro also states that the new dam will be finished about mid-summer next year, work having now been temporarily shut down on account of weather conditions.

XMAS LIQUOR WAS SEIZED

Barge Containing \$500,000 Worth
Taken at New York—Smugglers are Legion

NEW YORK, Dec. 20.—An ocean going barge, loaded with 4,000 cases of holiday whiskey valued at \$500,000, was seized by a sub-chaser while waiting for a chance to smuggle its cargo into the three-mile limit near here. The biggest flotilla of liquor smugglers ever seen is reported off the New York shores. Excise officers are keeping up unusual vigilance.

Three Cornered Contest
For Mayoralty Unnecessary.

A three-cornered fight in the Prince Rupert mayoralty election would be of little benefit or satisfaction to anyone. Generally, in three cornered contests—and also where there are more than three candidates—the majority of the public is not satisfied. That is, of course, if one of the candidates is not elected with more votes than the others combined. Such being the case it would seem a better plan to sink differences before nomination day and get in behind one of two candidates. It would be just as well to do that before the election as to be forced to do it afterwards.

The indications at present are that personalities may come into the contest. Such certainly will be the case if too many candidates are entered. When there are four or five candidates in an election contest, the general principles of some of them are usually so nearly similar that they could readily stand combination. Personal stubbornness is not desirable and will usually be shown up in the end. What is really wanted is common-sense principles with as much co-operation and team work as possible. Good legislation in the realm of civic affairs, as well as any other field, is more apt to be produced by a common desire toward the general welfare of the community rather than through personal endeavour, no matter how honest the latter may seem on the face.

Mayoralty Is Not
The Only Sphere.

There is room and plenty of it for good material in civic politics without concentrating on the chief magistrate's chair. Only one man can be elected and the others will be out of the game altogether. It would seem to better purpose if some of the candidates whose objective is the mayoralty would content themselves with running for the council and perhaps the school board or police commission as well. In these capacities as much work for the city can be done as in the mayor's office, for, after all, a mayor has little power except of a summary nature, and that is usually subject to the ratification of the council. When it comes down to the final point, an alderman has almost as much say in city affairs as has the mayor and an alderman who also sits on the school board or police commission has just as much. There is a certain amount of honor and prestige about being mayor and there is a little more pay for a great deal more work. That is about all there is to it. While a mayor is necessary under the law and there must be an executive head to all businesses, there seems, after all, to be no very great benefit personally or to the community as a whole by any particular person occupying that position.

Peace Seems At
Hand In Ireland.

Now that the last of the British military forces have been withdrawn from Southern Ireland it will be interesting to follow events there and ascertain if their will be any improvement in the matter of law and order under self-government which is now fully in effect. Certain dispatches last week indicated that the Republicans were tending towards a conciliatory attitude. If that is the case and the followers of De Valera can be ultimately reconciled, there would seem to be no reason why an era of peace should not be coming in Ireland. It is apparent that the past few days have been quieter in Ireland. While it is not to be expected that peace will come at once, suddenly and completely, there is basis for the hope expressed by many that a cessation of the internal strife is at last in sight. The Republicans are perhaps beginning to realize that their cause is a hopeless one and that they might as well adjust themselves to the new order of things and settle down under the most liberal autonomy possible as long as Ireland remains a part of the Empire. If De Valera has not already surrendered he soon will have to and he might as well do it peacefully.

United States Puts
Problem To Nations.

That the European nations will have to come to some basis of settlement of their reparations difficulties before any financial assistance for Germany will be forthcoming from the United States seems apparent from the announcement made yesterday by the J. P. Morgan Co., the leading of the United States financial concerns. The attitude taken by the United States firm does not necessarily mean that it is unwilling to give assistance to Germany but rather that some plan will have to be worked out for accepting such assistance before it will be given. After all, that is a very logical stand, for if United States did advance a large sum of money to Germany, there would have to be some definite understanding as to how it would be disposed of. There will doubtless be a great call for it from many creditors and an unsatisfactory distribution of payments would be little better than no payments at all. The next step will be for Britain, France and Germany to reach a basis of reparations payments. This may be done in Europe or it may be done at another conference at Washington, the calling of which by President Harding was suggested in last week's dispatches.

Versatile Program is Presented
by Pupils of Public Schools in
Fine Annual Christmas Concert

The pupils of the Prince Rupert Public Schools put on the first recital of their annual Christmas concert in the auditorium of the Booth Memorial School last night and they did themselves as well as their instructors much credit indeed. The entertainment, which lasts well over two hours, is most enjoyable and novel and provides something in the way of entertainment that the citizens of Prince Rupert can ill afford to miss. The spacious assembly hall of the school was filled to overflowing last night and there was not one of all those present who was not most surprised and pleased at the talent and elocution, music and dancing displayed. The work of the teachers in the preparation of the affair must have been long and painstaking but their efforts will have a great deal of recompense in the favorable impression created upon the minds of the audiences. The concert will be repeated tonight and, in view of the favor it found last night, the place will undoubtedly be packed again.

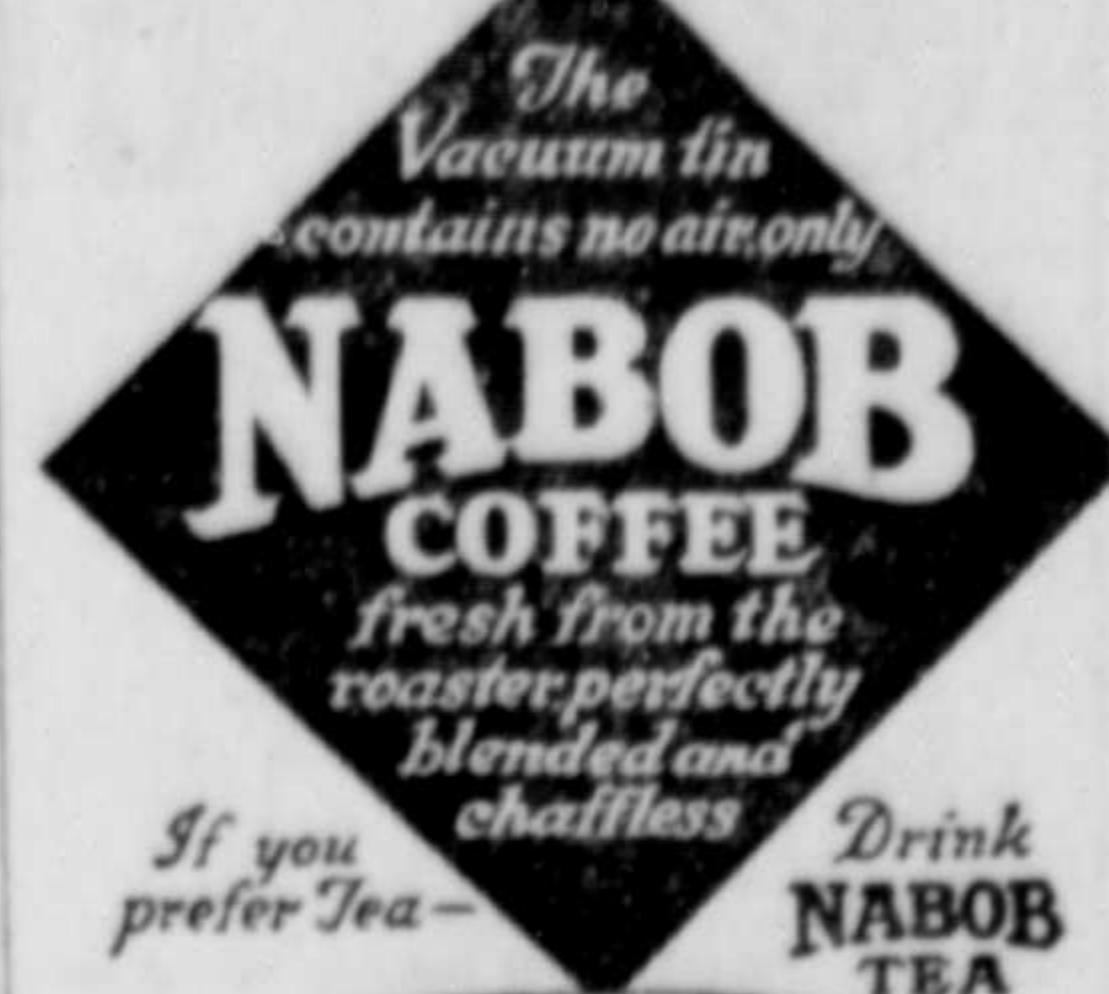

BRIG-GENERAL OPENS
RESTAURANT IN LONDON

LONDON, Dec. 28.—(Canadian Press).—Behind a desk during business hours by an unpretentious but spotlessly clean restaurant in Marlborough Court, Carnaby Street, London, stands the proprietor, no less a personage than Brig-General W. B. Buller, D.S.O., one of the heroes of the Great War. The restaurant was recently opened by the General. It is appropriately named "The Venture," and so far is not known whether it may prove a profitable one or not. It's proprietor, however, seems to have faith in it, and this is a big part of the battle.

When the war began, Brig-General Buller was a retired officer, farming in British Columbia. He left everything in Canada and went to France, where he had a brigade in the 24th Division. He was wounded in the knee, and, in fact, only recently returned to his under medical treatment.

"My property, which deteriorated during the war, is over in Canada waiting to be sold," General Buller told an interviewer recently. "I can't think of my knee, and like tens of thousands of others, I feel around to look for a means of livelihood. My wife is assisted by Mrs. Waller, the wife of a Colonel, my chief is an ex-soldier and, perhaps, my circumstances have impressed us with the need of a place where people of refinement may obtain lunch, tea and supper, served on fine china to their home life, at reasonable prices."

Simple decorated, "The Venture," with tables covered with snowy white tablecloths, with serviettes, serves a well cooked and substantial lunch for one, children and six pence. The General is not too dignified to go out and obtain for a customer a bottle of Cognac, if asked.
