News and Views on Municipal Election

NEW PREMIER AND CABINET OF DAIL EIREANN HAVE TAKEN HOLD

South Ireland Parliament Adjourns Until February 14; Amnesties Are Given

DUBLIN, Jan. 11.—Arthur Griffith, the new president of the Dail Eireann, and his cabinet assumed office yesterday. It is recognized that careful work will be necessary if pitfalls are to be avoided during the full month which must elapse before the final ratification of the treaty making Ireland a free state is possible. The new Dail leaders claim that they have assumed their tasks backed by the goodwill of the majority of Ireland's population.

The Dail has adjourned until February 14, when the treaty will be finally ratified. De Valera and his followers have pledged co-operation with the Griffith administration so long as Griffith remains president of the republic. It will oppose him as head of any other form of government.

Amnesty has been granted all political prisoners, including about forty who were sentenced to death. The other prisoners run into the hundreds.

RESIGNATION IS DISCUSSED

Provincial Cabinet Ministers Go
Into Situation With Hon.
J. H. King.

VICTORIA, Jan. 11.—At a meeting of provincial cabinet ministers held here yesterday the proposed resignation of Hon. Dr. J. H. King and his entry into federal politics as minister of public works was discussed.

At the conclusion of the meeting Premier Oliver said he had no statement to make.

Dr. King told his colleagues that he had been offered the portfolio of public works by Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, the new Canadian prime minister, and that there would be no difficulty in his finding a seat as R. E. Beattie, member-elect for Kootenay East, his own constituency, had offered to resign in his favor.

Dr. King has just returned from a trip to Kootenay East, where the subject has been discussed in different parts of the riding.

LIBERALS WILL INVESTIGATE THE TARIFF QUESTION

OTTAWA, Jan. 11.—It is generally conceded that the tariff revision is unlikely to come soon. The Liberal Government will investigate the whole question thoroughly before making any revision.

ALL DOMINIOMS TO BE INVITED TO CONFERENCE

CANNES, France, Jan. 11.—All the British Dominions, including the Irish Free State, will be invited to the international conference to be held shortly in Geneva.

RESIGNS POST

Hon. James Murdock Relinquishes Duties As Vice-President of Trainmen.

TORONTO, Jan. 11.—Hon. James Murdock, the new minister of Labor, has resigned as vice-president of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen. W. J. Babe succeeds him.

COLONEL PECK IS AIDE-DE-CAMP TO GOVERNOR-GENERAL

Also Receives Office of Full
Colonel—Col. Urquhart Succeeds
Command Sixteenth.

OTTAWA, Jan. 11.—Col. G. W. Peck, V.C., has been made an honorary aide-de-camp to Governor-General Lord Bessie, Lieut. Col. W. W. Foster, of Vancouver, has also received a similar appointment.

ENGLAND BACKS UP AGREEMENT

LONDON, Jan. 11.—The British cabinet, it is understood, has unanimously approved the proposed pact between England and France for the protection of the French frontier against German aggression.

CANNES, Jan. 11.—The British memorandum of the proposed Anglo-French pact declared that Britain makes the security of France a problem of her own, and that she will be ready to again throw in her forces, as in 1914, if France is attacked.

WARREN TOMORROW

The municipal election will be held from 9 o'clock tomorrow morning until 7 o'clock in the evening. E. A. Woods will be returning officer and Harry W. Birch will be poll clerk. The deputy returning officers, all returned men, will be E. Baker, J. Clapperton, L. S. Davies and R. Howe. Which Candidate Can Better Serve City in Taking Right Rank as Terminal Port

To the Voters of Prince Rupert:

He declared the future might be expected to show whether the movement was to organize farmers to go ahead to increase their usefulness or to wreck it on the rock of direct political action.

KING LEAVES DENVER.

DENVER, Jan. 11.—Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Premier of Canada, has left for Ottawa.

Candidates For Civic Election Tell Ideas In Brief Interviews

In view of the fact that the municipal election campaign this year has been of such a character that most of the candidates have either not cared to or have not had the opportunity to express themselves through the usual medium of public meetings, the Daily News has talked to each of them personally with the object of learning their general views and policies, and a short interview with each is now presented.

Each candidate for mayor and aldermen was asked, first, what, in his or her opinion, would be the biggest question or questions to be dealt with by the city council and, secondly, what, if anything, each had to say in regard to general policies.

The various opinions were taken verbatim and are given as follows:

MAYORAL CANDIDATES.

Mayor H. B. Rochester: "The biggest questions to my mind are the questions of electric power and permanent street improvements. Any improvements in future must be along permanent lines. If our city is to progress we must be in a position to furnish sufficient electric current, and this is especially important with regard to new dwellings."

BRIAND GOES BACK TO PARIS

Will Have It Out with Chamber of Deputies as to Criticism Offered.

CANNES, Jan. 11.—Premier Briand leaves for Paris this afternoon not only to inform the French consul as to the status of negotiations here but also, it is understood to meet and answer criticisms from certain groups of the opposition. He will ask the Chamber of Deputies either to support or reject him.

The principal differences between the Premier and the opposition, it is learned, are with regard to the new terms of payment of reparations by Germany. The terms have been adopted by committees of experts but have not yet been accepted by the full council of France. Under them France would receive less than under the previous arrangements although there would be a greater proportion in kind.

ALDERMANIC CANDIDATES.

John Dybhavn said: "I would say the most important matter will be the safeguarding of the city's financial standing with due regard to the most urgent need of improvements. I think this answer applies to both questions and I would think it would cover the matter of general policies for the forthcoming year. There are lots of matters of policies which will naturally arise in the course of the city's business during 1922 but I would not like to prophesy to any greater length."

Ald. Tom Silversides.

Ald. T. Silversides: "The question is just one of getting permanent improvements done as far as possible on an economic and progressive basis. The general policy as during the last year, is to do all work as far as possible in a permanent manner and thus put the city on a permanent footing."

Energy and Optimism Shown.

The Prince Rupert Board of Trade is taking a new lease of life and the opening of the year 1922 finds the organization full of energy and optimism. That is a happy combination and its application should bring immediate results. The idea of sending a strong delegation to Ottawa at this time is a splendid one. It should meet with favor there. It is to go with many requests, the most of which are well founded, and the putting into effect of which may be reasonably expected by Prince Rupert and Skeena district. In the main, they bear out what was originally planned for this port and the vicinity when the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway was built under the auspices of the Laurier Government some eleven or more years ago. Now that there is a restoration of the Laurier policies with several of the same statesmen on hand to execute them, it would seem that the optimism of the Board of Trade is well founded with a feeling of confidence as to the ultimate success of its efforts. All political factions seem to be joining in the energetic demand for an immediate start on the continuation of the old policies.

Are the Requests Fair Ones?

The question arises as to whether the requests that are to be made are too extensive and too far reaching. This should not be the question, however. It should really be, "Are the requests reasonable and fair ones which the people of Prince Rupert and Skeena should have any right to expect to be carried out?" If this question is put in place of the other, there should be no difficulty in answering it as it applies to the various questions on hand. We venture to state that most of the requests that are being made are fair ones and ones the execution of which might well be expected. The majority of the reforms, changes and concrete results which are asked for are either the avowed intentions of the Liberal party or are the natural consequences of a policy of fair treatment to this part of the country. Being such, it seems not too much to ask that they be carried out.

What the Big Task Really Is.

The difficulty, as was pointed out by Hon. A. M. Manson at the Board of Trade meeting on Monday night, is that the conservative and careful East will perhaps not see the point when extensive expenditures are asked for with a view to formulating a railway policy that will make the Canadian National Railway pay and at the same time bring to Prince Rupert its just due in the form of business and growth consequent upon the inauguration of such a development policy. It is easy for us here to see that dollars spent would mean dollars earned and eventually dollars made. Not so with the East. The people there do not understand our conditions and they do not realize the potential possibilities of Central British Columbia. The only thing they can think of is the outgo, for that is all most of them can see. They realize that the Canadian National Railways are not paying, and some of them think they will forever be a "white elephant." They must be shown that further development of the public facilities of this country is good business—business that eventually will save them money. When they realize that, the hardest part of the job will be done and Prince Rupert will soon come into its own. To bring this about a strong delegation may be of great assistance. It will back up our member and, at the same time, will be backed up by him. Therefore, send these men to Ottawa to tell Mr. King, Mr. Lapointe, Mr. Kennedy and other cabinet ministers, the members of both the government and the people of the entire East. In the selection of men to do such a task only the ablest and most informed and the most energetic should be sent.

District Will Doubtless Co-operate.

The Board of Trade is asking that the entire district get behind its efforts and back up its requests. All public organizations are to be asked for their support and, at the same time, they are to be given the opportunity of inserting their own requirements in the memorandum. There is no doubt but that this backing which is requested will be freely given, for all the people of Skeena district must realize that what means development for one part means benefit to the other. Their co-operation with the Board of Trade in the present big effort may well be expected, for the appeal is to be a powerful one and one that will bring this whole district in no mean manner before the attention of the powers that be at Ottawa.

Here's Where, and How—The following figures are amounts raised in excess of 1918 which the Council were forced to take care of:

The above clearly shows that the 1921 general administration was conducted for less money than it was in 1918, regardless of the fact that the value of the dollar was approximately 25% less. The increase in Fire, Health, and Public Works Departments were due principally to an increase of approximately 20% of the rate of pay, which was brought about by a sharp advance in the cost of living; and also to the natural increase in population, from 5000 in 1918 to 7500 in 1921. The Police administration was less in 1921 than it was in 1920. I did NOT have \$310,000.00 to spend, as misrepresented by Mr. Mordie, but simply the amount as stated above, namely \$270,122.82, of which amount \$86,071.27 was due to previous liabilities and causes, before I came into office, and over which the Council had no control.
