**Is Pleased**

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 14.—The British and French governments have requested an extension of the Hoover moratorium on intergovernmental debts pending a re-examination of the subject. The British note said: "Hopes which were early raised by the president's initiative, unfortunately, have not been realized and economic troubles which the moratorium was designed to alleviate have not come to an end."

#### Parliament to Rise Soon For 2-Month Recess

OTTAWA, Nov. 14.—Premier R. B. Bennett announces that Parliament will reassemble on January 30 following adjournment ten days hence.

GENEVA, Switzerland, Nov. 14.—Eleven men were killed and seventy persons injured in rioting which followed a Socialist demonstration in this "City of Peace."

President Herbert Hoover, enroute here from his home at Palo Alto, has invited President-Elect Franklin D. Roosevelt to confer with him in Washington late in the week on the international debt question.

#### SCALING IS DOWN

Sawlog Production For This Year Is Behind Last by Five Million Board Feet.

Log scaling in Prince Rupert forestry district for the month of October this year totalled 12,052,925 board feet as compared with 13,365,035 board feet in the same month last year. Scaling for this year to date has reached a total of 78,775,737 board feet as against 83,038,623 board feet in the first ten months of 1931.

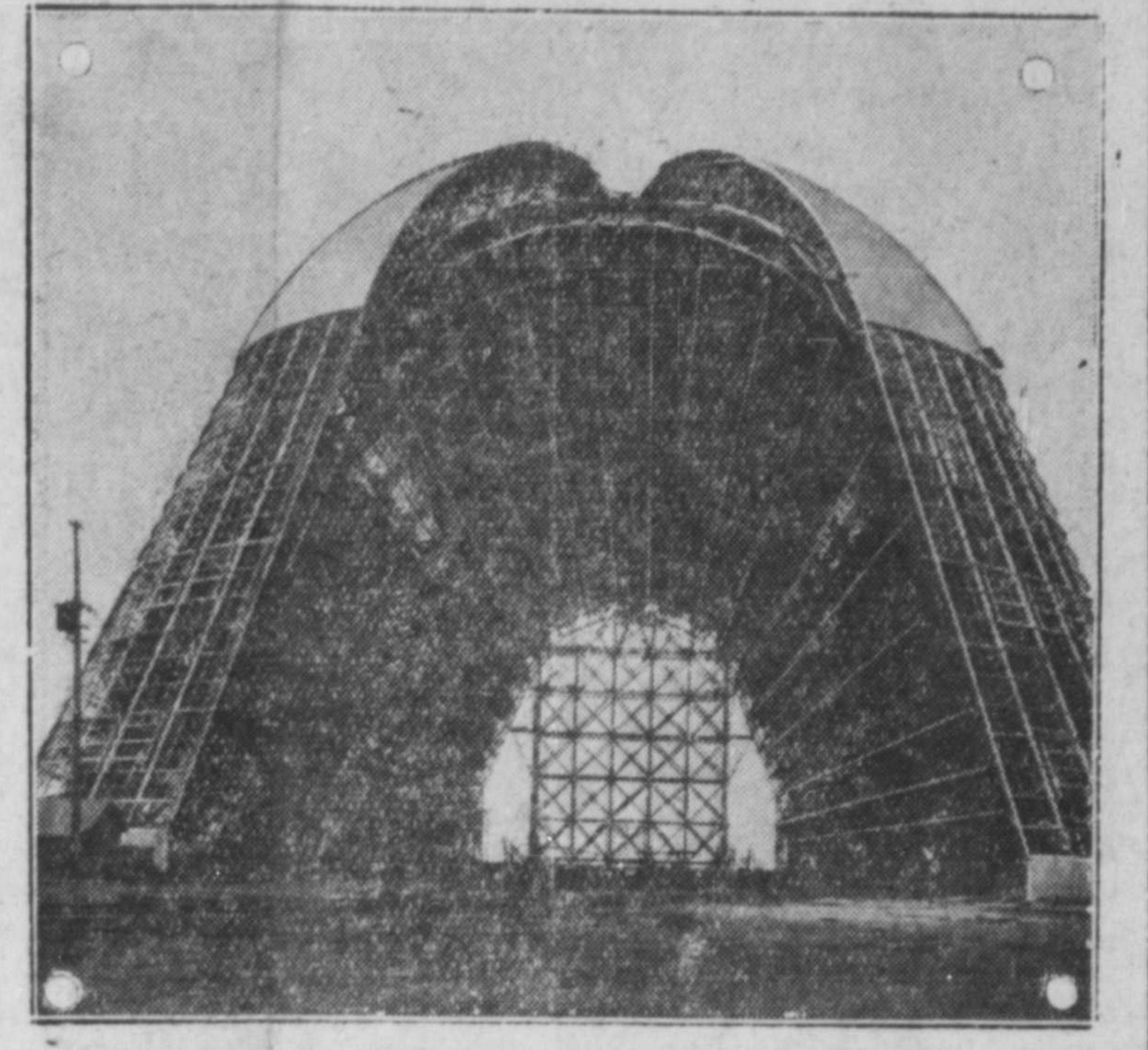
**Forest Products**

Reports were current this morning that Ald. J. H. Pillsbury, at present chairman of the board of works, might be a candidate for the 1933 mayoralty.

#### ARMISTICE OBSERVED

All Canada Paid Tribute to Glorious Dead of Great War on Friday

OTTAWA, Nov. 14.—Canadians from coast to coast and from the International Boundary Line to the isolated Arctic outposts paid tribute on Friday to the Glorious Dead of the Great War. Armistice Day throughout the Dominion saw a renewal of tribute to those who died in the conflict. In the largest cities and the tiniest hamlets solemn observance of the day set aside to honor the memory of the fallen was a feature of the national holiday.

CALGARY, Nov. 14.—The Alberta Appellate Court on Saturday dismissed the appeal of Spooner Oil Limited against a ruling of the Supreme Court of Alberta that the Turner Valley Gas Conservation Act is intra vires and within the powers of the provincial legislature.

#### Premier British Woman Flier Is Out to Break Husband's Record

Famous Aviatrix Leaves Lypne in Attempt to Reach South Africa in Less Than Four Days, Seventeen Hours, Nineteen Minutes

LYMPNE, Eng., Nov. 14.—Amy Johnson, Great Britain's premier woman flyer, took off today for South Africa in an attempt to beat the record of her husband, Capt. J. A. Mollison, which is four days, seventeen hours, nineteen minutes. Her new Puss Moth plane, named "Desert Cloud" and equipped with special fuel tanks, is expected to have a flying range of two thousand miles.

**GUARDING AGAINST PRISON DISORDERS**  
WINNIPEG, Nov. 14.—Troops have been sent from here to Prince Albert Penitentiary and Stony Mountain Prison in Manitoba as a precautionary measure in the fear that outbreaks similar to those in eastern penitentiaries may be attempted.

#### HERE WITH HIS PLANE

Pilot William S. Grey of New York Is Taking Damaged Ship to Alaska

Pilot William S. Grey of Glen Curtis Airport, North Beach, New York, arrived in the city on Saturday evening's train from the interior, bringing with him a Fairchild six-passenger cabin plane which is being shipped to Alaska after having been damaged in a crash near Telkwa a few days ago while flying north. The plane was one of a flotilla of three which set out from Maryland, where they were built, for Fairbanks where they will be operated in commercial service by the Pan American Airways. The other two planes are now in Alaska, having hopped last Monday from Hazelton to Whitehorse enroute north.

Pilot Grey and his plane will leave here for the north on the Princess Norah on Wednesday. The plane will be reassembled and repaired after arrival in Alaska. Pilot Grey is an experienced American aviator and has done a good deal of flying in Central and South America.

**STORM HITS JAMAICA AND CUBA, MANY DIE AND DAMAGE IS GREAT**  
HAVANA, CUBA, Nov. 12.—Fully fifty percent of the banana plantations of the island of Jamaica were wiped out by a terrific storm in the western section last week. The damage is estimated at \$3,000,000. Three hundred persons were reported killed at Camaguay City, according to a dispatch from Jatinbonica to the newspaper Information of Havana. It was believed today that probably two thousand in all had been killed on the north coast and the central portion of the island of Cuba. The town of Santa Cruz del Sur, with a population of three thousand persons, was wiped out by a tidal wave and will probably not be rebuilt. Buildings were razed and boats sunk at many points.
