# KING DELIVERS HIS SPEECH FROM THRONE

## BANKS NOW READY TO LEND PROVINCE WHERE FORMERLY THEY REFUSED

### Labor Does Not Approve Government's Plan With Reference Unemployment

LONDON, Nov. 23.—The new British Parliament will be asked to continue and extend the ameliorative policies prepared by the Lloyd George ministry as regards trade and employment and also to guarantee the loan for the restoration of Austria said King George V. in the speech from the throne officially opening the session today. While the address was very brief it touched on some of the most vital subjects of the day aside from the reference made to the necessity for the passing of an Irish bill in conformity with the Anglo-Irish treaty which will be one of the first duties of the parliament.

### HARRY CAMERON DIED YESTERDAY

Well and Favorably Known Old Timer Passed Away at Family Home

The death occurred yesterday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock of one of Prince Rupert's best and favorably known pioneers when Harry Cameron passed away at his family home, 320, English Avenue, East. Mr. Cameron was 55 years of age and was born in Brighton, England. He came to Prince Rupert in 1908 and had been for several years in the employ of Albert & McCaffery. Death was due to apoplexy following an illness of two months.

Funeral arrangements are in the hands of Hayner Bros., undertakers and interment will take place at 2:30 on Sunday afternoon in Fairview Cemetery. The body is remaining at the home until Saturday when it will be removed to the chapel.

The late Mr. Cameron is survived by a widow, who was called from England a month ago where she had been present at the death of her mother; two daughters, Miss Marjorie Cameron, who was in England with her mother, and Mrs. A. O. Franks; and three sons, Fred Cameron, in the employ of P. Burns & Co., Percy Cameron, of the Pacific Carriage and Frank Cameron of P. Burns & Co.

Deceased was an honorary member of the Loyal Order of the Moose.

### BARROW ON ORIENTALS

Minister of Agriculture Spoke in Legislature Yesterday on Slean Resolution

VICTORIA, Nov. 23.—Hon. E. D. Barrow, minister of agriculture, continued the debate on the Oriental question in the legislature yesterday. He said that two years ago Orientals owned or leased 10,500,000 acres of land and by increasing their holdings were driving out the white people. He urged the passing of the Ian McKenzie resolution calling for independence of provincial action on the matter.

### HABEAS CORPUS WRIT REFUSED TO CHILDERS

DUBLIN, Nov. 23.—A writ of habeas corpus was refused E. J. Childers, lieutenant of Eamon de Valera, by the master of rolls today.

### BIG FIRE LOSS AT SYDNEY, C.B.

Three Buildings Valued at \$500,000 Are Destroyed in Howling Blizzard

### CITY CUT OFF BY RECORD HEAVY STORM

HALIFAX, Nov. 23.—A fire broke out in the business section of Sydney, the Cape Breton steel town, during a howling blizzard destroyed three valuable buildings worth \$500,000 but there were no casualties.

### DAN CAMPBELL GETS SIX MONTHS IN JAIL BUT APPEAL ENTERED

Dan Campbell was found guilty of selling whiskey this morning by Magistrate McClymont and was sentenced to six months in Okalla Prison. He was later released on bail of \$2,000, notice of appeal having been given by his counsel, M. Gonzales. The costs were set at \$75.00 by the court.

The trial took place in the early part of the week and the Magistrate announced that he would give his decision this morning. There is also a charge of selling beer against Campbell and this will probably be heard this afternoon.

Hinging on the case is the charge against Peter Black for selling whiskey through his servant Dan Campbell. This will be heard in the near future, T. B. Hooper, crown prosecutor stated.

### FORMER MANAGER OF BRITANNIA STORES IS UNDER ARREST

Tom Miller Suspected of Systematic Robbery Extending Over Several Years

VANCOUVER, Nov. 23.—Suspected of systematic robbery of the stores of the Britannia Mining & Smelting Co. at Britannia Beach extending, it is believed, over several years, Tom Miller, former manager of the Britannia stores, has been arrested at Mojave in the California desert where it is stated he has been managing a store.

### GARLAND AND COLOMBE RETURN TO RUPERT

Men Sent to Okalla for Selling Liquor Out Pending Appeal

Len Garland and Ernest Colombe, sentenced to six months in Okalla Prison on charges of selling whiskey, came back to the city on Wednesday on the steamship Prince George from the south. The men are out on \$2,000 bail sent from their friends here in order to have them present at the appeal proceedings launched by the counsel, L. W. Patmore.

### COMMISSION ON FISH REPORTS

Use of Gas Boats Recommended in District No. 2 and Reduction License Fees

### ELIMINATION SEINES

Life Saving Patrols, Extermination of Dogfish and Close Season Clams

Permission to use motorboats in District No. 2 for salmon fishing, revision of license fees, elimination of drag and purse seines, close season for halibut, the establishment of life saving patrols, extermination of dogfish and close season for clams are among the recommendations made to the government by the Duff Fisheries Commission which visited Prince Rupert last fall.

### BIG SCHEME IMMIGRATION

Imperial and Australia Governments to Co-operate in Settling 6,000 British People

SYDNEY, New South Wales, Nov. 23.—Parliament today confirmed an agreement between the Imperial Government and the governments of the Australian Commonwealth and New South Wales by which 6,000 British settlers will be placed on the land at a cost of \$6,000,000. Both Australian and the Imperial governments will bear one third of the cost each and the Imperial government will provide the \$6,000,000 in the first place. Premier Fuller describes the project as beginning the biggest immigration scheme ever undertaken.

VICTORIA, Nov. 23.—Walter Hagen, the British open champion, and Dave Black, of Vancouver, defeated Phil Taylor and Willie Black, of Victoria, four up and three in a 36-hole exhibition match.

### VANCOUVER WON FIRST HOCKEY

Game Last Night With Seattle Resulted in Score of 5 to 2

SEATTLE, Nov. 23.—The Seattle Metropolitan sustained their first defeat of the Pacific Coast Hockey Association schedule on the home ice last night when they lost to the Vancouver Millionaires who thereby won their first victory by a score of 5 to 2. Charlie Reid, the Vancouver goal tender who has been receiving blame for the three straight defeats of his team, exonerated himself and it was chiefly owing to his spectacular custody of the net that Seattle was beaten. Cook and Skinner scored two apiece and the whole visiting team put up great exhibition which was irresistible.

### MAN DIED AS WIFE GETS READY TO GO AND CALL DOCTOR

PEMBROKE, Nov. 23.—Aza Labine died suddenly at his home, but an inquest will be held to inquire into the cause of his death. Deceased was a carpenter, who worked around the wharf in the employ of the Pembroke Transportation Company. He returned to his home ill. His wife went to get ready to go for the doctor, but before she could leave the house her husband had died. Deceased was in his 58th year, and had lived all his life in Pembroke.

### DEMONSTRATION BY UNEMPLOYED

Passed Off in London Without Untoward Incident Although Bloodshed Threatened

LONDON, Nov. 23.—A demonstration of unemployed which threatened at one time to lead to bloodshed passed off yesterday without untoward incidents. The leaders interviewed the ministers of health and labor. The police had taken elaborate precautions against possible disorder.

### Oliver Replies to Criticism Levelled Against Budget by Bowser and Shows Leader up

VICTORIA, Nov. 23.—Yesterday afternoon in the legislature, Premier John Oliver replied with vigor to the criticisms of the budget made by Hon. W. J. Bowser, leader of the Opposition and others. He claimed that the criticisms lacked their usual vigor and showed the immense deficits of previous governments and their inability to borrow. Now credit and confidence in the province had been restored, he said, and it was borrowing at lower rates than other provinces. Banks had refused to lend to the Bowser government but now they were ready to lend any amount. They had never refused to lend to the present government.

### EXPLOSION KILLED 60

Mine Disaster Occurred Yesterday at Birmingham, Alabama

BIRMINGHAM, Alabama, Nov. 23.—Seventy miners were killed and sixty injured, some seriously, in a dust explosion in the Woodward Iron Company's mine here. Four hundred and eighty miners were trapped, 350 escaping through the mainway just before the gas rush reached the lower levels.

### ROBBERY IN POST OFFICE MOUNT OLIE

Burglars Took \$130 Cash, Cigarettes and Boots and Shoes

KAMLOOPS, Nov. 23.—Burglars blew the safe of the Mount Olie post office and store and took \$130 in cash besides 2000 cigarettes and some boots and shoes. The post-office is located in the store of the Mount Olie Farmers' Exchange Association which is managed by J. G. Hindmarsh. Mount Olie is 60 miles north of here on the Thompson River.

### MAKURA TIED UP ON ACCOUNT OF SEAMEN'S STRIKE IN AUSTRALIA

SYDNEY, New South Wales, Nov. 23.—The steamer Makura was unable to secure a crew and her departure for Vancouver has been indefinitely postponed. This is on account of the seamen's strike which is in progress.

#### Prince Rupert And Quebec Parallel Cases.

That the case of Prince Rupert in its argument for use as a trans-Pacific shipping port is somewhat paralleled in the case of Quebec is indicated in an editorial recently appearing in the Shipping and Exporting Register of Canada. Prince Rupert wants grain and other commodities shipped this way and Quebec wants to get trans-Atlantic business. Similar conditions seem to be hampering both ports. The editorial, which applies to Quebec, a Canadian National port like Prince Rupert, is as follows:

It seems that some method should be arrived at whereby the Canadian grain that is now being shipped via Buffalo could be shipped via the Canadian Government Railways. This question will probably be one that the new management of the Government lines will look into for it is certain that Canadian grain could be made a big source of revenue to the Government lines.

It seems most ridiculous that the Canadian Government Railways, for which the people of Canada are being burdened to death with taxation should be deprived of carrying Canadian grain and that the fully equipped port of Quebec, which is capable of handling large quantities of grain should be allowed to rot and suffer for business while the American ports prosper at our expense.

#### How Long Will The Huge Joke Continue?

The matter is a huge "joke." How many business men would allow their private interests to go to rack and ruin in this way? The entire trouble is that the railway rates are so fixed that the Government lines from the West to Quebec are unable to get this business. There is no question but the rates are favorable to the Canadian Pacific and the lines coming to Montreal.

We are not condemning the Canadian Pacific for the rates and they are saying nothing for the reason that they are full up with business and little they care what their poor competitor the Government Railway lines is suffering. Business is business and we are of the opinion that rather than let the equipment of the Government lines leading to Quebec rot, that the rates on this line should be made so low that the port of Quebec would be clogged with grain the year round.

The vast equipment of the Port of Quebec is lying idle. The people of all Canada have put their money into this port and its equipment. They have also put, and are putting, their good money into this railway line, yet we all stand idly by and see our western grain being shipped in United States vessels through United States ports and over United States railways while we go merrily on footing the deficits of our Merchant Marine and our Government Railways.

What a huge joke it all is and how long will it continue?

considered the matter and recommended for adoption that on the opening of the fishing season of 1924 in District No. 2 the use of motor boats be permitted.

The commission find that the number of white men and Indians holding licenses is not in any way commensurate with the number of Orientals, and as a consequence the commission recommends that there be a reduction on all licenses issued to fishermen other than white fishermen and Indians of 40 per cent in 1923, this to include all methods of fishing, and that licenses issued in District No. 2 to other than whites and Indians be attached to the canners' permits. Local residents and returned soldiers to be given preference in all districts.

#### License Fees

The commission are strongly of the opinion that the present system of exacting license fees is of such a character as to eliminate progressive citizens from engaging in the industry and also bears heavily upon an industry which is already taxed to the limit. The commission feels that a person should not be called upon to pay extravagant license fees without being assured of an adequate return, and to that end it unanimously and energetically

recommends the following:

- Abalone license ..... \$ 1.00
- Crab license ..... 1.00
- Herring or pilchard drag-seine license ..... 5.00
- Herring or pilchard purse-seine license ..... 5.00
- Salmon drift or gill-net license ..... 1.00
- Salmon drag-seine license ..... 20.00
- Salmon purse-seine license ..... 20.00
- Salmon trap-net license ..... 50.00
- Sturgeon gill-net or drift-net license ..... 1.00

Annual fee for salmon cannery license, we recommend shall be \$20 for said license and in addition 10 cents for each case of 48 1-pound cans, or the equivalent thereof, of sockeye salmon, and 5 cents for each case of any other species of salmon.

#### Drag and Purse Seines

Your committee submit and recommend for your approval that drag and purse-seines should not be permitted to be operated save where demonstrated to be the only practical effective and reasonably economic method of catching fish, and in cases where purse-seines and drag-seines are permitted, the boundary to be moved out to not less than 1/2 miles from the mouth of the creek or stream, or further if in the discretion of the Chief Inspector it is deemed advisable. The commission most strenuously urges and recommends that in cases where drag-seines or purse-seines are permitted, none other than white British subjects and Indians (natives) be employed. This recommendation to be most imperatively enforced.

Licenses for cod fishing for commercial purposes to be issued without fee.

#### Weekly Close Time

The commission recommends that the close season for salmon fishing be in all parts of British Columbia from 6 a.m. Saturday to 6 p.m. on the following Monday of each week, provided, however, that this shall not apply to salmon trolling as provided in subsection D of section 27 of the Regulations.

In this connection the commission feels that penalties as provided for in the laws at present extant are unduly oppressive and harsh in many instances, and they therefore recommend that the law be amended so as to make confiscation or forfeiture for a violation of the laws a permissive rather than an imperative act. The commission have found that there is a great deal of fishing done during the close season and in closed areas and also the use of more apparatus than that permitted by law, and we recommend that drastic action be taken to prevent such abuses of the law.

#### Herring Industry

Your commission, after investigation realized the possibilities for the development of the mild-cured herring industry, and would strongly recommend that the government encourage said industry by making experiments with steamers equipped as drifters, and make any other experiments which may be necessary.

We strongly recommend that a close season on halibut be enforced dating from about the 15th of November to the 15th of February in each year, and that experiments be made to ascertain the movements of said fish, the banks where said fish are to be found and as to the advisability of closing certain banks for certain periods.

#### Life-Saving Patrol

We recommend that in order to help fishermen in distress, that one or more boats be placed in readiness on the coast so that they may proceed to the assistance of fishermen in distress. The said boat or boats can also be used in studying the habits of all classes of fish and prospecting with regard to habits of said fish.

We strongly recommend that such a board be established and which shall consist of practical scientists who shall be located one on the Pacific and one on the Atlantic coast.

Your commission went into the hatchery matter very thoroughly and heard a great deal of evidence both from employees of the said hatcheries and men engaged in the fishing industry, both as fishermen and purchasers of fish, and we are of the opinion that most of the hatchery operations could be suspended except that two hatcheries be kept in operation to experiment with the low proposed system and that a certain amount of the moneys now spent in hatchery operations be used for the clearing of streams, obstructions in rivers

and improving the spawning grounds for natural propagation. We also recommend that the bottom of the river near Bellsigate Canyon be cleared of obstructions as the evidence goes to show that that work was not properly completed.

#### Extermination Dogfish

Your commission strongly recommends that every available means be used for the extermination of this pest, and with that end in view it submits that dog fish should be permitted to be taken with all sorts of contrivances without any restriction of any sort whatsoever. Further, the commission recommends that a bounty should be placed upon the catching of these dogfish and encouragement should be offered by way of financial or other assistance to those engaging in the extermination of this pest and the utilization of it at all possible of the same.

Your commission recommends that there be a close season on clams either for equating, the selling fresh or any other purpose, the said season to be fixed as to the time deemed best for the protection of said fisheries.

#### Naas River Salmon

Your commission had the benefit of a conference with C. E. Garfield, representing the Alaska Fisheries Commission re the Naas and Alaska salmon fisheries and as a result of said conference your commission recommends that steps be taken with a view to having this matter dealt with between the parties interested.

Basketball and How to Play It

By Observer

CONCLUSION

In the course of these articles I have naturally omitted many points which might well be discussed but space limitations must be considered. Most points which have not been mentioned are well-known to all basketballers and will be suggested to the reader as he considers the points discussed.

I shall therefore summarize very shortly the various formations which can be developed by a team which does its own coaching and training and which desires to increase its own as well as the spectators enjoyment of its play. In defense there is the one-guard back defense where there is one running and one stationary guard; there is

the two-man defense where each guard is responsible either for a certain section of the floor or a certain man; there is the three-man defense here the center falls back immediately upon loss of the ball to become the first line of defense. His duty is to make the opponents pass the ball as quickly and as often as possible to give the guards an opportunity to intercept.

There is the five-man defense which has been discussed and the four-man defense which can easily be adapted from it. The box formation has been explained and will be found worth much study and drill work.

In offense the greatest opportunity for the use of formations comes at the tip-off and four plays starting from this point have been suggested. Innumerable variations will suggest themselves at once to the reader if he will but sit down with paper and pencil and place his men in their various positions on the playing floor. There is another play, however, that should be mentioned here and that is the play from out of bounds.

When the play is out of bounds

the team in possession of the ball has a better chance for a set play than at any other time except in the tip-off formation. The pass can be made to any man in any direction. Out-of-bounds plays can not and should not be developed for every foot of the boundary line but such general divisions as the ends, under either basket, side lines center, and side lines ends, can be made. Only a few out-of-bounds plays should be mastered because too many will surely create confusion.

Every effort should be made to speed up action on an out-of-bounds play before a defense can be formed. The nearer the ball is to the opponent's goal the harder it will be to get it into play, but little or no opposition is offered if the play occurs under one's own basket.

A bounce or a pickup pass, which is made by throwing the ball to the floor under the opponent's guard, will have to be resorted to sometimes in starting the out-of-bounds play as the player taking the throw will often be very closely checked. Then too, the player throwing the ball may make a feint with a direct upward motion of the hands so as to raise the arms of his opponent. A low underhand pass to an incoming team-mate will then solve his problem.

In conclusion I would suggest that if training rules are honestly observed, that if practices are energetically and enthusiastically attended and drill work made the subject of serious concentrated effort, any team can improve its playing standard to almost any degree and in so doing afford to its members and to its followers greater pleasure and more hearty regard for the game.


