# UNITED STATES MAY GO WET

## ROOSEVELT WILLING TO TALK WAR DEBTS WITH HOOVER

### Responsibility Rests With Those in Office, President-Elect Says

New York Governor Qualifies His Acceptance of Invitation to Go to Washington to Confer on Matter of British and French Notes

ALBANY, N.Y., Nov. 15.—Franklin D. Roosevelt, Governor of New York and President-Elect of the United States, today informed President Herbert Hoover of his willingness to confer with the chief executive in Washington on the question of war debts. Mr. Roosevelt added, however, that "the immediate question raised by the British, French and other debt notes creates a responsibility which rests upon those now vested with executive legislative authority."

### FOUR DIE IN SOUTH

Chapter of Violent Deaths Recorded Over Week-End at or Near Vancouver

VANCOUVER, Nov. 15.—Four fatalities were reported in British Columbia over the week-end. Alfred H. Wyborn, aged 19, Vancouver, was drowned in Seymour Bay, Bowen Island, when a boat in which he was fishing capsized. His companion, Alex Sinclair, was rescued.

Alex Fraser, aged 60, Canadian National section man, was drowned when a boat capsized in the Fraser River at Yale. Fraser had stood up in the boat to relieve a cramp in his leg. His wife and son, Alex Jr., escaped.

Ronald Money, aged 9, was killed in Victoria when he was run down by an automobile.

George H. McKee died as a result of injuries suffered when his car was in collision with another on the outskirts of New Westminster. His wife and young son are in hospital suffering from lacerations.

### FACTS ARE APPROVED

House of Lords Gives Stamp of Approval to Agreements Reached at Ottawa

LONDON, Nov. 15.—Third reading was given in the House of Lords this afternoon to the government's bill implementing agreements of the Imperial economic conference at Ottawa. There was no discussion.

### SUCCEEDED IN EXAMS

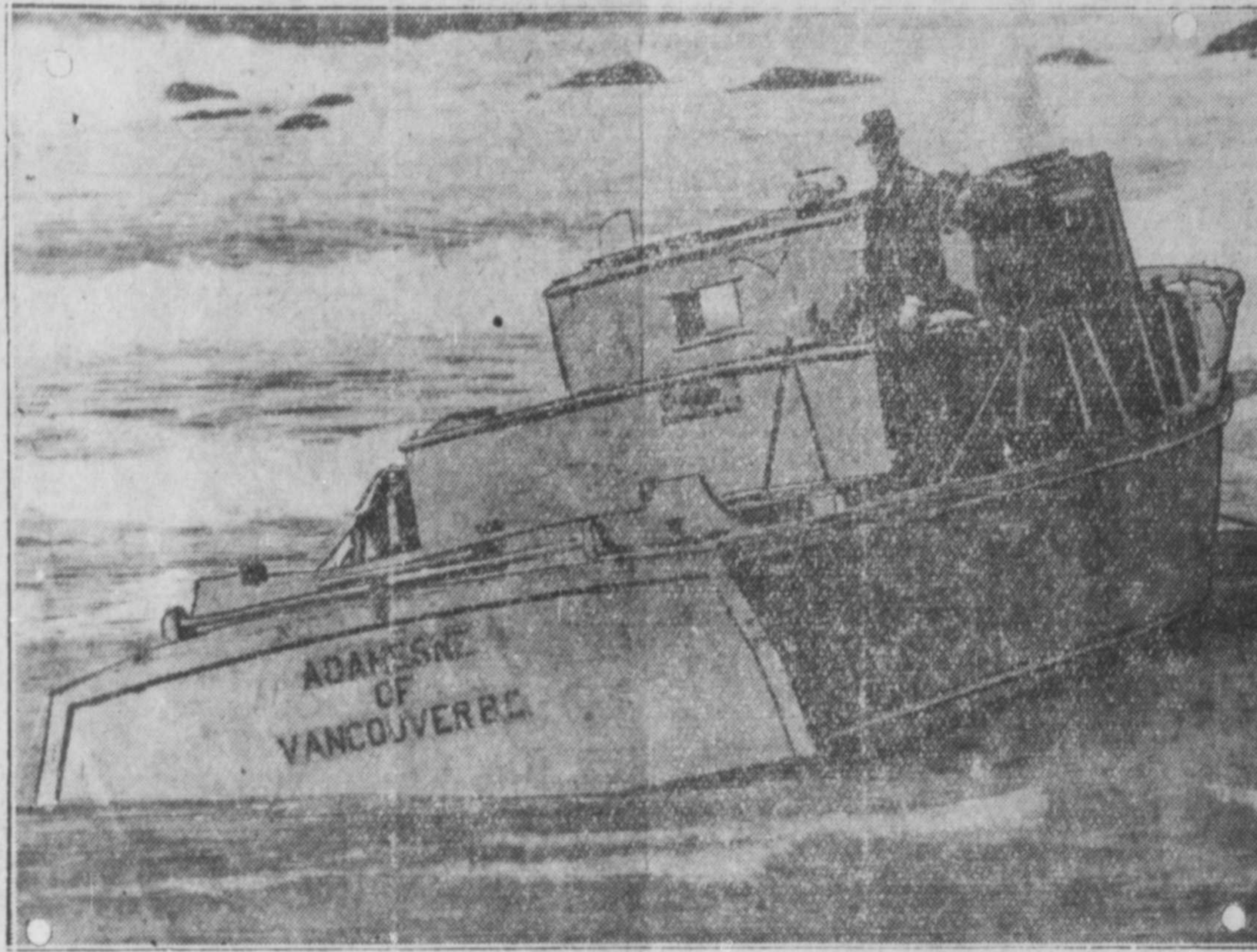
Stanley Dalby, Charles Stuart and Alan Hale Qualify as Junior Clerks

### NOVELIST IS DEAD

W. Levington Comfort, Well Known Story Writer, Passes Away in Los Angeles

Will Levington Comfort, noted American novelist, who visited Prince Rupert a couple of years ago in the course of a tour of the north died a few days ago in Los Angeles.

Born at Kalamazoo, Mich., January 17, 1878, the late Mr. Comfort was educated at the grammar and high schools in Detroit. During the Spanish-American War in 1898 he served in the United States Cavalry. The next year he went to the Philippine Islands and China as war correspondent for the Detroit Journal Newspaper Syndicate. He was in Russia and Japan in 1904 during the Russo-Japanese War for the Pittsburgh Dispatch Newspaper Syndicate.

Returning from the Orient, Mr. Comfort turned actively to the writing of novels. Some of his better known books were "Routledge Rides Alone," "Fate Knocks at the Door," "Down Among Men," "Midstream," "Red Fleeced," "Lot and Company," "Child and Country," "The Hive" and "The Shielding Wing." He also wrote many short stories for leading magazines.

Mr. Comfort, who made his home in Venice, Cal., is survived by a widow who, before her marriage to him in 1900, was Mrs. Adith Duffie-Mulholland of Detroit.

### SECRETARY TO RESIGN

Ray Lyman Wilbur Will Be First of Hoover Administration to Quit

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 15.—Following the defeat of the Hoover administration in the election last week, it is reported here that Secretary of the Interior Ray Lyman Wilbur will be the first member of the government to submit his resignation. It is said that Mr. Wilbur is anxious to resume the presidency of Leland-Stanford University.

Mr. Wilbur is due back in Washington tomorrow from a trip to California.

### BEER BILL COMING UP

Modification of Volstead Act Will Be Brought Before Short Session in United States

### Wets Ascendant

But May Not Have Two-Thirds Majority Necessary—Unemployment Insurance Too

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 15.—Representative McDuffy of Alabama, prominent Democrat and outstanding candidate for the Speakership in succession to Vice-President-elect John Nance Garner, is expected to bring forth a resolution at the forthcoming short session of Congress in December calling for modification of the Volstead Act to permit the sale of beer and light wines.

In spite of the fact that, as a result of the election last week, 259 seats are held by avowed wets as against 78 by dries while 60 Senate seats are in the hands of wets as compared with 25 for dries, prohibition supporters still maintain that the country will not go wet and point to the fact that a two-thirds vote is necessary in both House and Senate in order to repeal the Eighteenth Amendment. This would mean that 290 members of the House would have to vote wet and 64 members of the Senate.

The anti-prohibition feeling as expressed in the election is, however, obvious. Eleven states approved of anti-prohibition measures while nine states voted to repeal the dry laws. If beer legislation is not actually enacted at the short session, there will at least be some sort of vote on the question.

At the short session, Robert F. Wagner, re-elected Democratic senator for New York last week with a majority of over a million votes, being the largest majority received by any congressional candidate in the contest, is expected to again press for the passage of unemployment insurance legislation. This was a plank on the basis of which Wagner received the support of labor in the election.

Latest returns on the election showed 310 Democrats elected to the House of Representatives with 120 Republicans and five Farmer-Laborites from Minnesota.

### Mrs. Roosevelt Is Interviewed

Wife of President-Elect Hopes Her Husband Will Be Able to Accomplish Things For People

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—Giving an interview to newspaperwomen here, the radiantly happy Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, wife of the President-Elect of the United States, expressed the hope that her husband would be able to accomplish "those things that the people are hoping and praying for."

### Aviatrix Is In Reno to Obtain Third Divorce

RENO, Nev., Nov. 15.—Ruth Elder, noted American aviatrix, appeared in court here yesterday seeking a divorce from her husband, Walter Camp. She charges Camp with cruelty. She has been married twice before.

### STILL FOR COALITION

Premier Tolmie Reiterates Former Plan Regarding Dissolution of Legislature

VICTORIA, Nov. 15.—Premier S. F. Tolmie, in an address before Ward Four Saanich Conservatives last night, reaffirmed his desire to bring about a union government and reiterated his intention of reorganizing the cabinet after the next session of the Legislature before going to the country with the best selection of men possible regardless of their political creeds, the leadership remaining open until after the election.

### TO REMAIN IN ARREST

Appeal of Samuel Insull to Courts of Greece Has Failed

ATHENS, Greece, Nov. 15.—Samuel Insull, a tired old man, stood in the Greek court of appeal and was told that he would have to remain under arrest of Greek authorities pending extradition proceedings to the United States following his indictment at Chicago on charges of embezzlement and conspiracy.

Insull's arrest followed the coming into effect last week of the extradition treaty between Greece and United States which the local courts have ruled is retroactive. Insull has been here for several weeks a fugitive from justice.

### RETURNS TO WASHINGTON

President Hoover Leaves Palo Alto Home—Congratulates His Successor

PALO ALTO, California, Nov. 15.—President Herbert Hoover rested for a few days at his home here following the arduous election campaign before leaving at the weekend for Washington where he will resume his duties of state on Wednesday. Mr. Hoover will continue as president until March 4 when Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt, his Democratic successor, will be inaugurated. Meantime, President Hoover will get his affairs in readiness to turn over to the new chief executive who it is expected will be invited to Washington between now and inauguration for discussions with the retiring president.

Surrounded by his wife and immediate relatives here, President Hoover heard the returns which spelt his political downfall. Despite the news of reverse after reverse coming in, Mr. Hoover remained in good spirits. The President definitely conceded his defeat when he dispatched a telegram to President-Elect Franklin Roosevelt at the Biltmore Hotel in New York which read as follows:

"I hasten to congratulate you on the opportunity that has come to you to serve your country. I wish for you a most successful administration and I dedicate myself to every possible and helpful effort."

### KILLED IN COLLIERY

Twenty-Four Miners Lose Lives When Lancashire Pit is Wrecked

WIGAN, Lancashire, Nov. 15.—Twenty-four miners were killed and many were injured in an explosion which wrecked the pit of the Edge Green Colliery at Ashton in Wakefield on Saturday. There were 104 men working in the mine when the blast came.

### NUDISTS TO BE OUSTED

California Authorities Considering Action Against Society of Sun Worshipers Cult

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Nov. 15.—State authorities are considering taking action against a cult of nudists known as the Society of Sun Worshipers which has established a colony in San Luis Obispo county. The basis of action, however, is not the scanty clothing of members of the cult, but rather that they are believed to have entered this country illegally.

The colony was at first located near Carmel but later moved to San Luis Obispo county when the Carmelites did not give them a very hearty welcome.

### Wheat Crop For 1932 Over Four Hundred Million

OTTAWA, Nov. 15.—The 1932 wheat crop for Canada is placed at 431,200,000 bushels in an official estimate of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics.

### ONE HUNDRED ARE DEAD IN JAPANESE TYPHOON

TOKYO, Nov. 15.—More than one hundred persons are reported dead or missing today in the wake of a 12-hour typhoon that scourged land and sea in the Tokyo district with torrential rains and a 100-mile gale.

### AMY JOHNSON MAKING PROGRESS ON FLIGHT

ORAN, Algeria, Nov. 15.—Amy Johnson, British aviatrix, arriving here last evening from Lympne, Eng., left again at 11:30 last night for Niamey, French West Africa, about 1800 miles across the Sahara Desert, continuing her flight to Cape-town with a view to establishing a new speed record.

### ADVANCES FOR POOL

Canadian Government Helped Co-operative in Hedging Operations

OTTAWA, Nov. 15.—The federal government made guarantees to the banks to permit the Canadian Co-operative Wheat Pools to continue hedging operations, Premier R. B. Bennett stated in the House of Commons yesterday.

If hedging had been discontinued, the Canadian crop could not have been marketed, Premier Bennett said.

### PASSES IN REVELSTOKE

John Boyd, 91, Was Engineer of First C. P. R. Locomotive Into Winnipeg

REVELSTOKE, Nov. 15.—John Boyd, aged 91, engineer of the locomotive Countess of Dufferin, which pulled the first Canadian Pacific Railway passenger train into Winnipeg in 1882, died here yesterday. He had been a resident of Revelstoke for forty years.

### Making Another Effort to Locate Napoleon Labelle

To make another attempt to find trace of Napoleon Labelle, aged pensioner of Georgetown, who has been missing for some time, Staff Sergeant Alex McNeill, provincial police, and three officers left yesterday on the police boat P. M. L. 8 for Georgetown. The disappearance of Labelle still remains a profound mystery, no trace whatever having yet been found of his fate or whereabouts.

WAR DEBT SPARRING

Now that the U. S. elections are over it is possible to discuss the war debts without fear of some American politician raising a hulabaloo over it. For a year or two the U. S. executives will be in a position to discuss any subject in a sane manner.

As a starter the British government has asked for a renewal of the moratorium on war debt interest and a revision of the whole war debt situation. Other countries doubtless will have their say and it is confidently expected that a new arrangement will be made which will materially reduce the burden at present imposed on the nations of Europe.

LEADER TO SPEAK

Tonight T. D. Pattullo, leader of those who are opposed to the Tolmie administration, will address his constituents. He will have a great deal to say because a great many things have happened since he last spoke at a public meeting in Prince Rupert. Since that time there has been an abortive move on the part of his opponents to oust him from the leadership. Doubtless he will tell about how it happened and what has been the outcome. Following that move there was a big gathering of Liberals at Vancouver and Mr. Pattullo was acclaimed as the leader of a united party. It is probable something will be said about this event. It is possible that Mr. Pattullo may give some inside information in regard to the political plotting that has been going on during the past few months and state why it failed. At any rate there will be a great many people at the meeting anxious to hear at first hand about the conduct of affairs at Victoria.

The Letter Box

CHIPPING IN AS USUAL

A whole lot of people are already discussing a debate between Ald. Casey and George Murray on the subject of adoption of silver as the medium of exchange with a view of facilitating a business recovery.

I well remember reasons advanced by Ald. Casey last March when he introduced the subject before the city council some of which were cheapening of money and enhancing of currency. These two reasons, if brought into reality as factors in the financial structure of the country, would produce a condition usually termed "inflation of currency."

It may be well to observe in connection with the above that, ever since the beginning of this "temporary business dislocation," there was and still is a strenuous struggle raging between two sections of the capitalist class over the control of the economic life of nations. The industrialists demand a moderate and controlled inflation while the financiers, such as insurance companies and bankers who have investments in the farm mortgages, demand deflation.

However, my contribution to the solution of this problem, viewing it from what I think is the rational standpoint for supporters of the capitalist economic regime to take, is that the Dominion Government should issue a Reconstruction Loan guaranteeing, instead of interest, a complete satisfaction of one's patriotic aspirations (give until it hurts!) and amounting to the total sum raised for the conduct of the last war.

This loan would be distributed among needy people in the following pro rata manner: All the unemployed would receive 75% of the total, those who have worked but earned less than \$500 per year 15% and those who have earned less than a thousand the remaining 10%.

One can easily visualize what a tremendous era of capitalist prosperity would be inaugurated by distribution of these reconstruction dividends. What a good time will we have. The boys would go down town with pockets full of money and spend it in the most patriotic fashion while patronizing home industry right at the home market. Merchants would get their stores quickly emptied. Wholesalers would send numerous orders for more and better goods to the manufacturers. Factories would be running again and provide employment for about 60% of the workless workers, leaving the remaining 40% as chronic unemployed due to the technological progress and our generous bankers would get rewarded by bigger and better interest.

Well, Mr. Editor, I hope some bright mind will send this letter to the Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett and that it will engage his most serious consideration.

CHICKEN SHORTCAKE

2 cups pastry flour (or 1 1/4 cups of bread flour)  
3 teaspoons Magic Baking Powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
4 tablespoons shortening  
1 egg 1/2 cup water

Sift dry ingredients; add shortening and mix in thoroughly with a steel fork; add beaten egg and sufficient water to make soft dough. Roll or pat out with hands on floured board. Cut out with large floured biscuit cutter, or half fill greased muffin rings which have been placed on greased baking pan. Bake in hot oven at 475° F. about 12 minutes. Split and butter while hot, and fill with hot creamed chicken. Makes 6 shortcakes.
