Thanksgiving And Anxiety In Ireland CANDIDATES FOR MUNICIPAL ELECTION WERE NOMINATED TODAY

Urge Municipal Library For Prince Rupert with Expert Trained Librarian

"The only method I should recommend for the people of Prince Rupert in order to start a library would be to get up a petition to the city council asking them to place a bylaw before the people with a view to voting a certain sum annually toward the institution," said Miss Helen G. Stewart, president of the British Columbia Library Commission, in an interview with a Daily News representative at Victoria a few days ago.

In answer to a question Miss Stewart said the library would not cost much if the city would provide the building. An assistant librarian could be secured for about \$100 a month to begin with and then it would be necessary to have an investment in books all of which might be secured for about \$2,200 a year.

ONE CONTRACT IS STOPPED

Now Government Instructs Shipyard Delay Building Ice Breaker.

MONTREAL, Jan. 9.—The Canadian Vickers Company of Montreal have received instructions from Ottawa not to proceed with the construction of an ice breaker, for which the late Meighen government had let the contract in December last, entailing a cost of \$1,580,000.

OFFER TO KING IS CONFIRMED

average number of volumes in the library 10,285, the average circulation 30,670 a year, the average income \$3696, the average per capita tax 21c.

These figures give some idea of what the United States is doing in the matter of reading and they show how far behind that country is this province where a city such as Prince Rupert is unable to have a library owing to the carelessness of the people in not providing it.

Miss Stewart said the commission had had Prince Rupert in mind for some time and was looking for a favorable opportunity to suggest action with a view to starting a library. It was useless to do it, however, except under favorable conditions and with most of the people supporting the movement.

She urged that the correct thing was to get the city council to bring in a bylaw at a time when other bylaws were coming before the people so that additional expense should not be added from that source. It might be possible, she thought, to get a voluntary library, but this was not the best way. No matter what was done the one thing necessary above everything else was a trained librarian. Good results were never obtained without one.

Chehalis with a population of 4558 has 2954 regular borrowers of books from a library of 7,245 at a total expense of \$3,133 a year or 70c per head of population.

Blackfoot with population 4822 has 2186 regular borrowers from a library of 3062 costing \$2005 or 10c per head of population.

Lewiston with 6574 population has 11,216 books costing \$3,008 a year or 59c for every person annually.

La Grande with 6915 has 3215 regular borrowers from a library of 6088 books the total annual expenditure being \$1879 or 70c each person.

Miles City with 7437 people has 2216 borrowers from a library of 6957 books costing \$4,305 annually for upkeep or 54 cents a year for each person.

Hoquiam with population of 10,058 lends to 2783 regular borrowers from a library of 8860 books costing \$5,429 a year or 53c per head of population.

Raising the Money. To raise the sums necessary in the libraries mentioned, millage rates were levied of from one to two mills on the dollar of assessment. In New York state in cities of from five to twenty thousand population the average population is 9,395, the

Dramatic Scenes Followed Ratification of Treaty In Dail Eireann: Valera Done

DUBLIN, Jan. 9.—General thanksgiving filled the churches yesterday for the ratification of the Anglo-Irish peace treaty, but the situation in the Dail Eireann gives source to grave anxiety. The split was intensified by the vote and its closeness, the figures having been 64 to 57 in favor of creating the Free State of Ireland. The future seems obscure.

When the result of the vote was revealed, Eamonn de Valera, leader of the republicans and erstwhile president of the republic of South Ireland, broke down. While he declared that Ireland was a republic and would remain so, Michael Collins, the finance minister and leader of the section favorable to the acceptance of the treaty, called: "We still feel the warmest regard for President de Valera."

Mary McSwiney leaped to her feet and broke into a torrent of abuse against those who had sought to "destroy the Irish republic." She avowed her intention of fighting the supporters of the treaty to the last ditch.

When De Valera regained control of himself and was able to speak he again ignored Collins' expression of friendliness and merely asked that those who had opposed the treaty meet him on Sunday morning.

Collins, who was apparently deeply hurt, retorted that if the mere presence of himself and his colleagues was offensive to the president both sides could withdraw.

Making Preparations. Collins this morning met the Imperial authorities in Dublin and arrangements are already being made to transfer all authority to the provisional government which is presumed will be formed under the treaty. It is considered probable that Collins and Arthur Griffith, founder of the Sinn Fein and minister for foreign affairs, will be at the head of it, both having signed the treaty at London on December 6 and supported it during the debate in the Dail.

If nothing interferes the new

election as president was moved and, after discussion which lasted well into the afternoon, was defeated by 58 to 60. Several members were absent.

The situation remains critical and confused. There was much cheering and booing as the members left the chamber today at the noon adjournment.

STRABANE, Tyrone, Ireland, Jan. 9.—There were scenes of wild enthusiasm here when the news of the ratification of the peace treaty became known. The town was illuminated, bells rung and all the people joined in the celebration.

BELFAST, Jan. 9.—Cardinal Logue says that the ratification of the peace treaty was necessary and that all the people were for it.

Ulster Stands Out. LONDON, Jan. 9.—Ulster's determination not to enter the Irish Free State has been strengthened by the example of "Southern mentality and Southern methods," says the Belfast correspondent of the Daily Mail.

These methods were illustrated, he says, during the discussion in Dail Eireann of the peace treaty.

LONDON, Jan. 9.—The transfer of administrative powers to the Southern Ireland government under the treaty ratified on Saturday by Dail Eireann will be arranged immediately.

PIONEER DEAD. James Johnstone, of Nelson, Passed Away at Age of 59.

NELSON, Jan. 9.—James Johnstone, a pioneer fruit grower of the Kootenay district, died here today at the age of 59. The deceased had lived in Nelson for the past twenty-two years.

CAPTAIN BLACK IS HURT AGAIN

Yukon Member in Auto Accident—Cong'don Coming Out.

DAWSON, Jan. 9.—Captain George Black, member-elect for Yukon constituency in the House of Commons, sustained a cracked rib as the result of an automobile wreck between Keno Hill and Mayo City. He will be delayed several days before he will be fit to take the overland trip by dog team on his return to the coast.

F. T. Congdon, K.C., Liberal candidate, has left Dawson en route to Vancouver and Ottawa where he says he will urge upon the government the needs of the Yukon. James Anderson, the staker of Rico claim, the richest ore producer in Mayo, accompanied him.

GOOD PROGRESS ON OCEAN DOCK

Trusses Done by Tomorrow Night and All Should Be Closed in By End of Month.

Work on the superstructure of the new shipmen dock is progressing very satisfactorily. The trusses will be practically all erected by tomorrow night, and the roofing and placing of the windows in position will then be proceeded with. It is expected that the whole structure will be closed in by the end of the month if the weather does not interfere with the work. All necessary material is to hand including ventilators, windows, bolts, roofing materials, etc. Forty men are employed on the work.

STATION DONE BY MARCH 31

The foundation work at the new depot is finished, and the brickwork will be started immediately. All the necessary material is on the ground, and weather permitting, it is anticipated the entire job will be completed by the end of March. Some fifteen men are employed on the work.

Another Step In Irish Affairs.

The news that the Anglo-Irish peace treaty had been ratified by the Dail Eireann must have been gratifying to the most of British subjects all over the world, although it might not have been surprising. Indications of the past few weeks or so pointed to the final acceptance of the treaty. However, there was a hard fight for and against it in Dail Eireann, as was evidenced by the closeness of the vote. This acceptance marks the final step in the settlement of Irish affairs as far as the governments are concerned. The majority of elected representatives of the South Irish people have spoken in a favorable voice and it now remains to be seen if the people are to back them up with their conduct and actions. There may still be a reasonable doubt as to whether this treaty will immediately bring an era of peace in Ireland, for all know that both in Ulster and Southern Ireland there are many apparent irreconcilables and these are strongly organized in some cases. Whether they will keep their peace and abide by the decision of the majority of their representatives will be one of the factors in deciding whether the new treaty is successful or not. If peace is not entirely and permanently restored in the troubled isle the main purpose will not have been achieved.

Future Developments May Be Interesting.

The treaty epitomizes the most flexible and most independent status that can be given Ireland under British rule. As far as Southern Ireland is concerned, any objections against the treaty may be taken as open revolt against British rule, and if trouble still continues it will amount to the same as rebellion. In the treaty Ulster is given the option of withdrawing from the Free State within thirty days, and it is likely that this clause will be taken advantage of and that she will withdraw. However, as it is now Ulster and the rest of Ireland are under separate governments and the new treaty therefore should make little difference to her. What action De Valera and the other Sinn Fein irreconcilables will take now that the treaty is accepted will be watched with interest. The ratification of the treaty, in spite of the strenuous objection of the De Valera faction, shows that his power in Southern Ireland is not so strong as was generally believed and that he and his policies are not popular with the majority.

Housecleaning in Conservative Party.

Developments in the ranks of the Conservative party both as far as provincial and federal politics are concerned are being watched with interest. Indications are that there is to be a great housecleaning in that party in the near future, for the old leaders are becoming unpopular on account of their failure to keep the party in power. Housecleaning in the province has been a long time in coming, but the rank and file and the old line adherents are beginning to realize that it must be done before the party has a chance of rising from its present position. W. J. Bowser, the provincial leader, is an astute and clever politician, but he is too much of a dictator and he must be replaced by a more popular man. His deposition will likely take place in the near future, and it looks as if he will be replaced by somebody altogether new as far as the provincial field is concerned. In the formation of new political parties and the success of the Progressives in the recent federal election, the Conservatives see the handwriting on the wall and they are coming to the realization that there must be radical changes made very soon if the party is to retain its place in the government of the land. During the past few years it has been gradually falling to pieces and it is apparent now that great changes must be effected if it is to alter this course.

Valuable Work of Board of Trade.

The annual reports of the Prince Rupert Board of Trade prove that that organization has done a great work in the city and district during the past year. The value of the Board is clearly manifested and its influence has been shown to have been powerful. Although it is a non-legislative body, it is of great assistance in placing the needs of the city before the proper authorities and it is an organization to which the government and members look for advice when making legislation and passing money. The success of its efforts during the past year has been splendid and has eclipsed all other years, but the indications are that its work during the year 1922 will be even more important and more successful.

BULKLEY VALLEY GOES TO ALBERTA FOR HORSE SUPPLY

Alberta-raised colts are being sought by farmers and ranchers of the Bulkley Valley, one of the richest agricultural spots in British Columbia, and John McNeil, a resident of Telkwa, is at present in Alberta negotiating with Messrs. Layzell & Parr of Calgary for the shipping of several carloads, says the Edmonton Bulletin. Mr. McNeil thinks Alberta second only to the Bulkley Valley, of which place he gives a glowing account. Rich in gold, silver, copper, lead, copper and coal, and possessing abundant marketable timber and ideal mixed farming land, he names the valley as containing a more varied assortment of valuable natural products than any he knows. Besides the mining and farming, two pulp mills turn out an aggregate of half a million tons of paper a day, and the coastal fishing realizes as large an output as any other section of the Pacific Coast.

The valley was first prospected 17 years ago when the C. P. R. telegraph line was run from Ashcroft to Dawson.

OLIVER ENTHUSES OVER PEACE RIVER

Greater Population Some Day
Than That of Dominion
Now, He Says.

Between the frozen Rockies and the crowning Laurentians in Alberta nestles an empire as great in area as France, but with a population scarcely equal to that of Outremont.

The story of the fight to develop the little-known but wealthy Peace River country as related by the Hon. Frank Oliver, one time minister in the Laurier cabinet, western pioneer and newspaper man, to the Montreal Star recently is one that intrigues the imagination to conjure up visions of the vast undeveloped west which remains for man to conquer.

A population even greater than Canada's present figure will some day people this region, industry will thrive and agriculture will produce not only a sustenance for the region itself but will make a bid to compete with the products of the older portions of the Dominion as well as with those of other countries of the world.

Such, in brief, is the picture unfolded by Mr. Oliver as he enthused over the last West's future, in which he incidentally placed his home city of Edmonton as the metropolis.

Two Railways.

Already there are two railways feeding the region, but development has of necessity been slow, as a certain depression has visited the Northwest as well as other parts of the Dominion. Due, however, to the comparative insignificance of industrial development in the Northwest, where human energy has been turned principally to the cultivation of the soil, this depression has not been so great, consequently a more optimistic view as regards extension of individual operations is to be found there than in Eastern Canada.

NORTHERN NOTES

Two companies will begin drilling for oil in Alaska next season, says the weekly news letter issued by the Publicity Bureau of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce. The Alaska Pacific Development Company, it is stated, will start an oil rig in the Gold Bay field early in the season and the Alaska Anchorage Oil Syndicate, will also begin drilling on its 12,800 acres between Point Mackenzie and Knik.

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CAPTAIN BOYCE IS HEAD OF MERCHANT SERVICE GUILD

Skipper Well Known Here on C. P. R. Boats Heads Organization for Year.

Fashion experts are enthusiastic over the beauty of the models. The garments are to be of the finest Irish linen trimmed with exquisite Carrickmacross and Irish point stitch lace, and threaded with pale blue satin ribbon. Some of the lace has the shamrock pattern worked into it.

Donegal fisher girls are to make a number of white knitted frocks for the Princess's honeymoon abroad. Technically they are described as "of very fine wool, quite plain in the bodice, short sleeves, and with a deep flounce for the skirt showing raised knots."

Irish tweed is the material for the Princess's travelling dresses.

SILVER STANDARD MINE MAY REOPEN

In the hope that the silver market will shortly begin to pick up, W. G. Norrie Lowenthal, superintendent of the Silver Standard mine at New Hazelton, has gone north to do the year's assessment work, says the Vancouver Sun.

A small crew of men will be employed for a short time to keep the property going in order that real development may be undertaken when silver goes up.

The Silver Standard has the reputation of being a good mine and is expected to yield excellent returns when it is reopened for full operation.

PRINCESS LOUISE IS NEARLY READY

New Canadian Pacific Vessel Will Enter Alaska Service Very Soon.

Captain C. D. Neurotsos, marine superintendent of the Canadian Pacific Coast Steamship Service, announced recently in Victoria that the new steamer, Princess Louise, designed specially for the Alaska route, would be ready for service by the end of the month. After being tested on the Vancouver-Victoria run the steamer will be placed on the northern service. She will maintain the service until the summer schedule is put into effect on June 10. The Princess Alice will then operate in conjunction with the Prince Louise and the service to the north will be the best ever given amounting to practically a semi-weekly schedule.

PRINCE ALBERT STRUCK A ROCK

Was Little Damage, However, and Proceeded to Stewart Last Night.

While going into Lockport, Queen Charlotte Islands, on Thursday night, the Grand Trunk steamer Prince Albert scraped a rock, with the result that two or three plates were slightly sprung. No leakage, however, resulted. When the boat encountered the rock it merely gave a couple of leaps and the incident did not affect the speed or the navigation. The Albert left for Stewart last night, as usual, and may go on the dry dock on her return here.

FAMOUS LAKE LOUISE GRADUALLY FILLING

W. A. Johnston Tells Science Convention That Lake Will Eventually Disappear.

TORONTO, Jan. 9.—When the American Association for the Advancement of Science convened here recently numerous interesting and highly technical papers were read to various branches. According to W. A. Johnston of the Geological Survey, Ottawa, the famous Lake Louise, so well known to tourists of Western Canada, will eventually disappear. Deposits are gradually filling up the lake, but the process of deposition is so slow that it will take a thousand years or more to fill the lake basin.

RUSSIANS EATING DOGS, CATS AND RATS

Terrible Conditions in Soviet Country Described in Letter.

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"Here, in the small territory the Friends are responsible for, we have got to feed 650 people, or else decide what proportion of that number must die because we can not afford it. We are faced with enormous difficulties of rail transport here, and still greater distribution difficulties from this town, with no roads, one poor railway, nearly Arctic conditions, and practically no horses or camels unclean. The roads and transport conditions are so bad that we do not seem to be able to get into the villages even, but people come in, and one man lately told me that in his village of fifty families, ten adults die daily. They have eaten the cats and the dogs and the rats, and now that there are no more leaves to make bread they are simply dying."

FIND UNKNOWN LAKES IN JASPER PARK, ALTA.

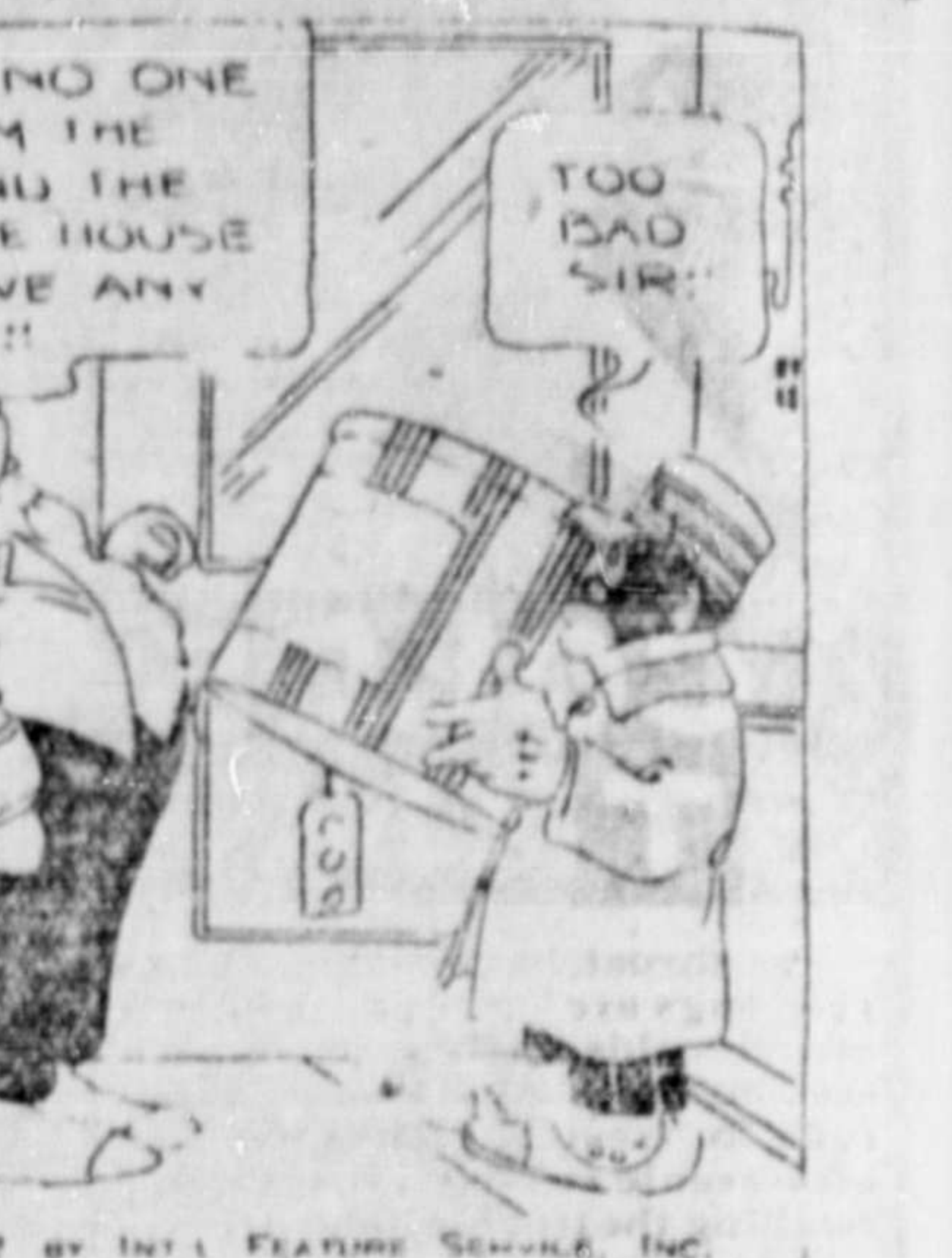
OTTAWA, Jan. 9.—Several hitherto unknown lakes and river valleys have been discovered in Jasper Park through the use of government airplanes. This work was undertaken by the High River, Alberta, air station, and three experimental flights were carried out over the region for the purpose of exploration and photographic reconnaissance. With the aid of the plane the unknown lakes and rivers were accurately located and valuable information was secured as to the possibility of breaking new trails through the district. Complete reconnaissances were made of mountain peaks, valleys and mountain passes. Information was also secured as to the extent of the timber in the park and communication was kept up with construction gangs working several days' foot journey from the nearest telephone.

PLASTIC SURGERY GIVES NEW FACES TO WAR MAIMED

Ten Thousand Disfigured Soldiers Said to Have Been Successfully Treated.

LONDON, Jan. 9.—What has become of the men who had terrible facial wounds in the war? The foreign visitor to Britain often asks this question and finds it hard to believe that great numbers of their men are not still dragging out hopeless and dreary existences in sad homes and hospitals. It is learned that of some 10,000 cases of this kind which passed through the main concentration hospital for facial injuries, the Queen's Hospital at Sidcup, only 10 or 15 men are regarded as incurably disfigured. The ministry of pensions is understood to be contemplating the purchase for these men of a country house as a home for them.

Plastic Surgery. This wonderful number of cures is due largely to the skill of Major H. D. Gillies, R.A.M.C., chief plastic surgeon at the Sidcup hospital. He has grown cheeks, mended and replaced shattered jaws, and even replaced faces that had been literally burned away by terrible explosions. In mending wrecked faces his principle is "bone for bone, cartilage for cartilage, and fat for fat." He has built jaws with bits of bone from the leg, cheeks with fatty tissue covered with strips of skin taken from the body, and noses with cartilage from the ribs.

Results Permanent. To a reporter Major Gillies paid a high tribute to the skill of his fellow plastic surgeons at Sidcup. "Their success in making good the wreckage of the war is practically complete," he said. "The maimed men are to be found sitting alongside you in omnibuses and trains, working in shop and office, on the land, or back in the navy and army again. You would not have an inkling of what happened to them."

"I can tell you of one case, a petty officer in the navy who had his face burned off at the battle of Jutland. He has had a new face built, is back in the navy, and recently passed his gunnery tests. There have been other cases as remarkable as these are back in civil life again."

"Are the results permanent?" Major Gillies was asked. "They are," he replied.

"One never hears a breath of scandal about her."

"Why? Hasn't she any friends?"—London Mail.

WHIST DRIVES AND THE LAW

Their Legality is Questioned by London Legal Circles—Result Recent Law.

LONDON, Jan. 9.—(By Canadian Press).—"Are whist drives illegal?" "What is unlawful gambling?" These questions are troubling the public just now in consequence of the recent decision of the House of Lords that in certain circumstances money paid by cheques in betting transactions could be recovered by the drawers of the cheques. A legal correspondent of the Times says, "There now seems to be some confusion among laymen about the law to whist drives. The question whether they were legal or not was raised recently in the Court of Criminal Appeal and was really left undecided, but remarks by the way of the Judges are of importance."

The Times correspondent explains that the appellant was convicted of using a hall for unlawful gaming within the meaning of a certain section of the Gaming House Act. That section that any person who owns or occupies "any house, room or place," and who "shall open, keep, or use the same for the purposes of unlawful gaming being carried on therein," may, on summary conviction before two Justices, be "adjudged to pay" a penalty not exceeding £500. The question has been raised what is "unlawful gaming?"

Chance and Skill. Mr. Justice Hawkins (afterward Lord Brampton) is quoted as having given a decision in a case as follows: "All games of chance and skill combined (which cannot be called games of mere skill) are unlawful games." If played in a house kept for playing them, it has been held, however, the Times' legal correspondent states, that an isolated occasion on which an unlawful game was played among friends at the house of one of them did not render the owner of the premises liable under the section.

In another case Mr. Justice Avory said that playing at games of cards for money was gaming which was not necessarily unlawful, but it became unlawful if the game was played in a common gaming house "as part of the business thereof." Whist in the opinion of the Courts, is a game of chance and skill combined, and the element of chance is made the greater in whist drives or progressive whist.

Common Gaming House. So far, the Courts have been lenient in the interpretation of the section of the gaming house act relating to whist. They have not insisted that the mere use of the premises for the playing of card games of chance and skill combined is sufficient to render the owner or occupier liable. They have taken the view that there must be evidence of the premises being "kept" for unlawful gaming. Thus, a man who hires a hall for a series of whist drives, charges for admission, and offers prizes, would come under the penalty imposed in the statute as a person who kept gaming house—namely, to use Mr. Justice Hawkins' definition, "a house in which a large number of persons are invited habitually to congregate for the purpose of gaming."

The "gaming" must be the taking part in a game which is not a game of mere skill says the Times legal correspondent. The predominance of skill over chance is not enough to take the game out of the category of games that are unlawful when played in "gaming house," as defined by the Courts.

CONSIDER CALLING OF BOOTLEGGER AS DESIRABLE VOCATION

ST. CATHARINES, Ont., June 9.—Is the business of a bootlegger a profession, a calling or just a mere job? In any event it is conceded by at least one high school pupil here to be a vocation. In answer to a question put to the boy pupils as to "what vocation" they desired to follow after leaving school, one boy exclaimed that of a bootlegger as his choice.

MIDDLESBOROUGH, Eng., Jan. 9.—The world's swimming record of 6 minutes 55.45 seconds for 500 meters held by Norman Ross, U.S.A., was lowered here recently by J. G. Hatfield, the holder of several British championships, who covered the distance in 6 minutes 51.25 seconds. Hatfield was timed by officials of the Amateur Swimming Association, and the effort was made in public.

TURTLE TRAVELS A MILE IN FOUR YEARS AND MAKES RECORD

TORONTO, Jan. 9.—What is believed to be a world's record for turtle speed has been achieved by turtles that Prof. A. S. Seeger, of the University of Wisconsin, tagged and let loose. Prof. Seeger stated at the recent convention of the American Association of the Advancement of Science that one turtle had traveled a little over a mile in three years, 11 months and 19 days. The average distance covered by 166 turtles in five months was 115 yards.

IMPORTANT FIGHT IN PARIS TONIGHT

Eugene Criqui and Charlie Ledoux Battle for European Bantamweight Championship.

PARIS, Jan. 9.—One of the most important ring battles staged here in a decade is set for tonight, when Eugene Criqui, the "Knock-out King," meets Charlie Ledoux in a 20-round encounter for the bantamweight championship of Europe, now held by Ledoux.

Should Charlie Ledoux be returned the winner he will journey to America, where he has signed up to meet Joe Lynch, Joe Burman, Pete Herman and Johnny Buff. If Criqui wins the fight, Ledoux plans to retire immediately. The purse is the largest ever offered for a pugilistic encounter in France, being 300,000 francs, which will be divided 70 per cent. to the winner, 30 to the loser. When Jack Johnson met Frank Moran here in 1914 the stakes amounted to 200,000 francs, which has not yet been paid owing to legal entanglements.

WORLD CHAMPION STRIKER, BEEN OUT THIRTY-FOUR YEARS

BURLINGTON, Iowa, Jan. 9.—A. M. Parmeter, 87 is the world's champion striker. He's been on strike 34 years! And he's drawn \$47,400 strike pay from the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers. His cheque for \$25 comes every month. Before 1912 he got \$50 a month. Parmeter walked out on the Burlington road with division 151, B. of L. E., in 1888. The strike was broken up and the other strikers returned to work. But Parmeter wasn't that way. He stuck out. He's still sticking.

Sport Chat

Without any delay the second round of the Trail Club shield billiard series will commence tonight when the Elks and Great War Veterans teams meet in the opener. The commencement of the second half sees the Trail with a long lead in the standing which it will be indeed difficult to overcome. In fact, it is generally conceded that this team has the shield pretty well clinched for this season. Fans can hardly understand how the Wanderers' man could have been beaten by such a score after having showed such great style all the season through up till this game. Waugh, of the Trail, McMillan, Elks, and Andrews, St. Andrew's, by recent defeats, have also lost their chances for a perfect record. The six men still unbeaten are: Pillsbury, Elks; and Blythe and Harbour, of the Trail, each with five wins; Shockley, Wanderers, four; Shakespeare, Trail three, and Howe, Wanderers, two.

"The thoroughbred racehorse," says Premier E. C. Drury, of Ontario, who put up a hard fight last year against betting on race horses, "is a type of beast which is about as useful as the game cock among fowls. The horse breeding of this country would be no worse off if the running horse were entirely eliminated. The most profitable horse to breed, from a general standpoint, is not the thoroughbred, the hunter, or even the army remount, but just the heavy draught type and, second, the roadster. Race track betting centres around the thoroughbred but this is not a utilitarian animal. The winning of a race should have its own reward in the increased value of the animal and betting should not be necessary to encourage better breeding."

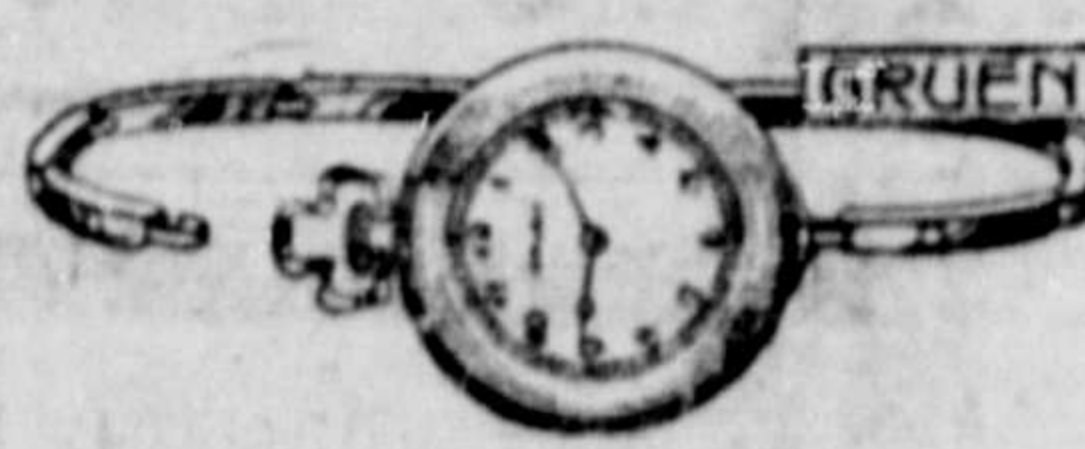
