Citizens Show Confidence In Mayor IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENTS ARE MADE BY HON. T. D. PATTULLO

Immigration, Industries and P.G.E. Railway Discussed by Minister Before Rotary Club

"It is understood that the British Government will at the next session of Parliament establish an organization somewhat similar to the British Columbia Land Settlement Board to work out the problems of emigration from this country, and the establishment of this board will work out to the benefit of British Columbians," said Hon. T. D. Pattullo in an address to the Rotary Club yesterday. "The general principles of an emigration scheme was worked out by the British Premier in conference with other premiers of the countries of the Empire, about the time I was in Great Britain with a view to the details being worked out by the different governments concerned."

DECIDE ON RAIL STRIKE IN IRELAND

Because Managers Refuse to Discuss Revision of Wages and Conditions.

DUBLIN, Jan. 13.—A general strike of all Irish railways is set for Saturday midnight owing to the refusal of the railway managers to discuss with the men regarding the threatened revision in wages and working conditions.

PRINCE GEORGE ELECTS MAYOR

Turnover in Civic Situation at Interior Centre—Johnson Is Mayor.

PRINCE GEORGE, Jan. 13.—J. H. Johnson, a prominent hotel man and president of the Board of Trade, proprietor of the Alexandra and Prince George hotels here, was elected mayor yesterday by a majority of 41 over George Abbott, chief locomotive engineer of the C. N. R. mountain division.

The aldermen re-elected are M. G. McKay and A. M. Patterson.

The new aldermen are Dr. R. W. Alward, Fred D. Taylor, Fred Buntin and J. K. McLean.

Police Commissioner—Edward Opie.

School Trustees—Alex B. Moffatt and W. J. Pittman.

Alex Moffatt headed the poll with a clear majority of 67. He is a native son of old Cariboo. Mr. Pittman is the proprietor of the music store here and was formerly in business in Prince Rupert.

The election marks a new era in municipal politics. It is a complete turnover.

OBSERVER HAS GONE ASHORE

VICTORIA, Jan. 13.—The Canadian Government Merchant Marine steamer Canadian Observer is ashore on the mud flats in Discovery Passage. This point is in the inside passage. The vessel is not in danger.

Vessel Floated.

VICTORIA, Jan. 13.—The Canadian Observer was floated on the high tide undamaged. She proceeded to her bunkers.

PUBLICITY FOR TREATY

Britain Pledged Aid France in Case of Unprovoked Aggression.

PARIS, Jan. 13.—The text of the proposed Anglo-French treaty brought by former Premier Briand from Cannes was made public today. It provides that Britain shall come immediately to the aid of France in case of direct and unprovoked aggression against French territory by Germany.

MORE VICTORY FOR TREATY

Shown in Election Sinn Fein Committee—Prisoners Being Released.

DUBLIN, Jan. 13.—The election of the standing committee of the Sinn Fein organization has resulted in a victory for President Arthur Griffith and his party as well as further endorsement for the Anglo-Irish peace treaty. Of the fifteen members elected to the committee only three opposed the ratification of the agreement.

Release Prisoners.

Forty-three political prisoners were released from Irish prisons yesterday and 370 are slated for release today. Five hundred and fifty police auxiliaries and daddies will be evacuated from Dublin today marking the relinquishing of police control. The evacuation of the army will commence in a few days.

MEIGHEN IS NOMINATED

Will Be Opposed in Grenville Riding, Ontario, by A. K. Patterson, Progressive.

PRESCOTT, Ont., Jan. 13.—Ron Arthur Meighen, ex-premier of Canada, who was defeated at Portage la Prairie in the recent election by Harry Leader, the Progressive, has been nominated for Grenville riding in this province. He will be opposed by A. K. Patterson, Progressive. There is no Liberal nominee.

RIOT AT MADRAS PRINCE THERE

Armored Cars Used in Quelling the Disturbance During His Visit.

MADRAS, Jan. 13.—The arrival of the Prince of Wales was accompanied with rather serious rioting, resulting in several casualties. Rioting became so intense that the police with armored cars interfered.

CONTINUE WARSHIPS

English Councils Say That This Should Be Done to Mitigate Unemployment.

LONDON, Jan. 13.—At a conference of the mayors of Northern English towns yesterday, it was decided to urge the British government to proceed with the building of battleships in order to mitigate unemployment which was brought about by the suspension of warship orders. It was declared that United States and Japan were continuing to build ships and that Britain should do the same.

TISDALL LEADING

Vancouver Using P. R. System Delayed in Getting Election Returns.

VANCOUVER, Jan. 13.—The count of votes in the civic election is still proceeding, there being much intricacy and delay under the proportional representation plan.

C. E. Tisdall is now leading, Ald. J. J. McRae is second, ex-Mayor L. D. Taylor third, T. H. Kirk fourth and Leon Lotzgar is bringing up the rear.

The result may not be known until late today.

Rochester is Elected For a Second Term as Prince Rupert's Mayor

The civic electors in no uncertain voice expressed their satisfaction with the administration of city affairs during the past year and their confidence in the same administration for the coming year when they retained Mayor Harry B. Rochester to office with the handsome majority of 202 over Lieutenant-Colonel S. P. McMordie, D.S.O., in yesterday's municipal election. Although it was apparent through the campaign that Mayor Rochester was the favorite, not even his most enthusiastic supporters expected that such a splendid majority would be rolled up in his favor. It was the biggest surprise of the whole election.

All five members of last year's council who sought re-election were returned for another term, Ald. G. G. Perry heading the poll. The new members of the aldermanic board chosen were Roderick A. McLeod, Theophile Collart and W. H. Montgomery, the two former making splendid runs and being elected in third and fourth places.

In the contest for the police commissionership, E. B. Shockley was elected by a good majority and polled more votes than the two other candidates, George M. Sutherland and George Leek combined.

The \$15,000 incinerator by-law was passed by a vote of 489 to 137, the necessary two-thirds vote easily obtained for it.

Winners Congratulated.

The whole election was a quiet affair, but nevertheless there was a good vote recorded. 849 persons registering their preferences in the mayoralty contest. Soon after the polls closed at 7 o'clock the votes for mayor had been counted. Both Mayor Rochester and Col. McMordie were present and when the result was known, the latter congratulated the mayor and wished him a successful year.

The counting of aldermanic, police commission and by-law then proceeded and it was about 9:30 when all counting was finished.

RECOUNT IS GRANTED BY JUDGE YOUNG

Proceedings Started by Colonel Peck Will Commence on Monday or Tuesday.

A recount of votes in the recent federal election for Skeena constituency was granted by Judge Young this morning to W. E. Fisher of Fisher & Ongton, who appeared on behalf of Col. G. W. Peck, V.C., the defeated candidate.

The recount will commence either on Monday or Tuesday, but the judge has not yet determined whether it will take the form of a general recount or not. W. E. Fisher will act as Col. Peck's agent in the course of the proceedings, which should not take more than a couple of days.

POINCARE TO BE PREMIER

Former President of France May Succeed Briand.

PARIS, Jan. 13.—Former President Poincare has been asked to form a new cabinet and has tentatively agreed, pending a conference with his colleagues. Mr. Briand telephoned Lloyd George, regretting his inability to continue conversations at Cannes and expressing a hope that his successor would take up the conferences immediately.

Causes Regret.

PARIS, Jan. 13.—Premier Briand's resignation seems to have caused regret among the general public and in many political circles.

PRISONERS WELCOMED

Demonstrations in Dublin and Other Parts of the Country.

DUBLIN, Jan. 13.—Materialization of the amnesty for political prisoners in Ireland elicited more outward enthusiasm here than any other development of the peace activities. It is remarked in passing that the choice of the phrase "act of oblivion" rather than "act of clemency" in the announcement of the amnesty recognized as a happy diplomatic stroke. Dublin's citizens indulged in lively demonstrations last night, the crowds outside Mountjoy prison welcoming each successive batch of liberated prisoners. Similar scenes were enacted in other parts of the country.

New Council Have Important Work.

The ratepayers of the city have endorsed the policy of Mayor Rochester in no uncertain voice and have elected a good council. There is no reason why effective work should not be accomplished. There is much work to be done. Not only are we expecting a revival of interest here in railway and other matters, which will bring prominent people here and will make it desirable also for us to send delegations east to confer on development matters, but we shall have to do things ourselves.

If the city is to get a new lease of life, it will be necessary to keep pace in the matter of improvements, and yet there will be the necessity of keeping within our income. Mayor Rochester has had some experience along these lines already, and on account of that experience will be able to deal with the budget intelligently. This is the time when expenditures for the city are arranged. The annual budget is made up early in the year in order that the tax rate may be struck, and it is time to think about what shall be omitted therefrom.

Farmers' Support for Liberals Real.

There seemed some doubt in many minds as to whether the Liberals would get the real support of the Farmers in the Dominion Parliament. Apparently they have been promised it, according to the statement made by their leader, T. A. Crerar. With that big vote behind them, the Liberals will be very strong, but depending on that big vote they will to some extent lose their independence and the legislation they introduce is likely to be strongly influenced by the farmer vote of the west. It will have to be. Happily the Liberal and Farmer ideals are practically the same and there is no reason in the world why they should not work well together as long as petty jealousies do not creep in. Unfortunately legislators have those human traits which sometimes causes them to consider other things than policies and other things than the public welfare. The announcement of Mr. Crerar is reassuring, however, and tends to make for stability of government.

Settle Country With White People.

The interview given by J. F. Hanna following a visit to Japan, in which he urges the settlement of British Columbia with a white population, is very interesting and timely. Mr. Hanna spent several months in Japan and he saw a good many things. He studied conditions and as a result of his observations he urges settlement of the province by Europeans. While Mr. Hanna has nothing but admiration for the sturdy Japanese, he is opposed to the attempt to mingle the races, a system which has not worked to the advantage of either.

Mr. Hanna is quite in line with popular opinion today. It is realized everywhere that white immigration to this country is desirable and anything the government may do to bring it about will be greatly appreciated. Possibly there will be co-operation between the Ottawa and Victoria governments working with the British Government to settle up Western Canada with selected immigrants who will help change the natural potential wealth of the country into real wealth.

Premier Briand Has Resigned.

It is too early yet to comment on the resignation of Premier Briand. It is sometimes difficult for us to understand the Latin temperament, but we are becoming better acquainted. Possibly it will take years to understand it. For centuries we fought the French. Now we are endeavoring to live peacefully beside them and endeavoring to co-operate. Allowances must be made for the French viewpoint on the relations with Germany because of the fact that France was invaded whereas Britain and Canada were immune.

Captain and Mrs. Roberson, who are to leave the city before long, were the first couple to be married in Prince Rupert. They were married by Bishop Du Vernet in St. Andrew's Church on June 4, 1908. The account of the wedding published at that time follows:

The first marriage ceremony performed in Prince Rupert took place in St. Andrew's Church on Monday afternoon, when Captain Harold Langhorne Roberson, formerly of Bayford, England, and Miss Marian Lingen Burton of Shrewsbury, England, were married by Bishop Du Vernet. H. G. Munro was best man and Misses Pillisbury and Betty Barrow made very pretty bridesmaids. Miss Burton, who arrived from England ten days ago, was given away by A. R. Barrow. The bridal party and invited guests were entertained by Mr. and Mrs. Barrow at their houseboat, to which they were conveyed in launches gaily decorated with flags and bunting. After the wedding breakfast, Captain and Mrs. Roberson left for a honeymoon cruise around the islands in the launch Constance, of which Captain Roberson is skipper."

ANNIE BESANT
ON ATROCITIES

Opposes Gandhi's Plan for Settlement with Moplahs of Malabar.

Mrs. Besant has made a crushing reply to an "appeal" issued by Mr. Gandhi to Moderates as well as non-cooperators to "compel the Government to suspend hostilities in Malabar and issue a promise of freedom for the Moplahs." The Moplahs, upon their undertaking to surrender and to permit non-co-operators to enter Malabar to persuade Moplahs to surrender," says the London Times.

While admitting that the terrible conversions "are terrible," Mr. Gandhi says that the Moplah bravery must command admiration; that the Moplahs are fighting for what they consider is religion, and in a manner which they consider is religious; and that Indian opinion must not "permit the extermination of such brave people."

The answer of Mrs. Besant is the more effective since she has been visiting the disturbed districts. She says that Moderate cannot respond to Mr. Gandhi's appeal since their sympathies are not with "the murderers, the oysters, the ravishers, who have put into practice the teachings of paralyzing the Government of the non-cooperators." Men who consider it "religious" to murder, rape, loot, to kill women and little children, cutting down whole families, have to be put under restraint in any civilized society. She says the misery she has witnessed is beyond description.

Girl Wives.

"Girl wives, pretty and sweet, with eyes half-blind with weeping, distraught with terror; women who have seen their husbands hacked to pieces before their eyes, in the way Moplahs consider as religious; old women tottering whose faces become writhen with anguish and who cry at a gentle touch and a kind look, waking out of a stupor of misery only to weep; men who have lost all, hopeless, crushed, desperate. I have walked among thousands of them in refugee camps..."

"Eyes full of appeal, of agonized despair, of hopeless entreaty, of helpless anguish, thousands of them—camp after camp. 'Shameful inhumanity' indeed, wrought by the Moplahs, and these are the victims, saved from extermination by British and Indian swords. For, be it remembered, the Moplahs began the whole horrible business; the Government intervened to save their victims, and these thousands have been saved. Mr. Gandhi would have 'hostilities suspended'—so that the Moplahs may sweep down on the refugee camps, and finish their work."



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


own department a million dollars a year had been added by reason of better organization. The liquor revenue, estimated at two and a half millions, had helped out but he did not like this method of raising revenue.

No Need to Worry.

The interest and other expenditures on the P.G.E. cost three and a half million dollars a year and the interest and sinking fund on the other bonded indebtedness of the province was also a large item. In spite of this debt there was nothing to worry about. He had noticed recently that the debt of the city of Seattle was as large as that of the Province of British Columbia. They had to guard against taxation becoming too high, however. It must not become higher than the neighboring provinces or states.

Mr. Pattullo said of what had been done in the irrigation belt where a million and a half dollars had been loaned to settlers for conservation of water supply and already of the first payment due on December 1 last, amounting to \$120,000, no less than \$118,000 had been promptly repaid by the borrowers.

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Mr. Pattullo said that the government had expected to lose money on land settlement. The condition following the war had been abnormal and prices were at the peak. The money he considered had been well spent and tangible results would follow and now were in evidence.

There was a large expenditure of mothers' pensions and the money for this had to be raised from taxation but no one regretted that. No public man would dare to advocate the revocation of the enactment.

Importance of Timber.

Mr. Pattullo then told of his trip to the Old Country to try to stimulate immigration and to look up markets for the sale of timber. Timber was an important industry. Ranking in value to the province in 1920 the natural industries were as follows:

Timber 8,920,000,000

Agriculture 64,000,000

Mining 42,000,000

Fisheries 14,000,000

From these figures it would be seen how important was the timber industry. A good deal of business had already been

done before the war.

SUPERB PHOTOPLAY WESTHOLME TONIGHT

Cecil DeMille's Luxurious Play "The Affairs of Anatol."

Subtitles of epigrammatic brilliance are taken for granted in a Cecil B. DeMille production following the high mark set by the subtitles in "Why Change Your Wife?" "Something to Think About" and "Forbidden Fruit." However, "The Affairs of Anatol," the latest production of the famous producer, which will be the feature at the Westholme Theatre tonight, is said to excel all previous efforts in this respect.

Jeannie Macpherson, author of the story, is responsible for these subtitles and to her goes the credit for their scintillating phraseology, thought and wit.

"The Affairs of Anatol" is a searching analysis of the matrimonial and divorce problem handled with the mastery which is Cecil B. DeMille's chief distinction. He has developed a powerful story that deals in real truths, it is said, and to this he has added a sympathetic comedy note that serves to relieve the serious vein of the story without in any way detracting from the power or vividness of the central theme. Wallace Reid and Gloria Swanson head an all-star cast in this picture.

If he wishes to become a first-class performer the young footballer who decides that his true position on the field is in the half-back line must be possessed of a real love of the game, says Andy Ducat, the famous International player. Half-backs are the hardest worked members of an eleven, although usually their efforts are not fully appreciated by spectators. The "class" half-back is quiet and unobtrusive in his methods. Although he may be on the run throughout the whole game, he gives greater service to his side if he develops the subtle art of anticipation than he does if he is obliged to indulge in those spectacular tackles, runs, and clearances that fall to the lot of the player who does not possess the extra touch of football foresight that half-marks the outstanding player.

The best half-backs may not attract as much attention as comparatively moderate players, for the onlooker may see nothing remarkable in a half-back intercepting a pass and then sending the ball on to one of his own side, whereas the half-back who fails to reach the leather and then succeeds in retrieving it from an opponent who is well away, seems to have done much more that is deserving of praise.

Half-backs must be ready to start their own forwards off by means of judicious passes to players who are unmarked, and must then follow up the vanguard in readiness to return the ball should one of the opposing team break away.
