BRITISH UNIONISTS ENDORSE BONAR LAW OPPOSITION TO SOVIET LEADERSHIP IS FINALLY WIPED OUT IN SIBERIA

Andrew Bonar Law Officially Enters Political Fight When Elected Leader of Unionists

LONDON, Oct. 23.—Andrew Bonar Law, who was recently called upon by the King to form a Government and who delayed taking action because he was not the accredited leader of the Conservative party in Britain, was unanimously elected leader of the Unionists at a meeting today.

This action of the Unionist party is in line with constitutional usage which requires that the premier shall be the accredited leader of the predominant party in the House of Commons.

Bonar Law, on leaving the Unionist meeting, told the newspapermen he would accept the task of forming a ministry. The meeting was attended by 439 members of the party including 152 peers.

Law was proposed for leadership by Earl Curzon, minister for foreign affairs in the Lloyd George cabinet. The nomination was seconded by Stanley Baldwin, president of the board of trade. His election enables Law to accept the task of forming a cabinet, thereby giving Britain her first Conservative prime minister since 1905. It is understood that the new cabinet is virtually complete.

Will Define Policy

The premier designate did not define his policy before the meeting, according to reports obtained from the gathering, but intimated that he would do so in a speech at Glasgow next Saturday.

Mr. Law expressed the hope that the coalition unionists, who had voted against the resolution passed at the Carlton Club last week for a return of the party to independence, would join their unionist brothers and go to the country as a united party. Law arranged for an audience with the King at 5:30 this afternoon.

In an address Law declared this was not the time for introducing large schemes which might be beneficial to the empire, however dear such might be to his heart. He added he should rather hope for a period of quietness than one of fierce controversy. His reference is supposed to have been to tariff reform.

Mr. Law declared the Irish constitution must be carried out.

Referring to Lloyd George, Bonar Law said he was sure they would have a "pretty tussle" but he hoped they still would be friends afterwards.

KITSUMKALUM LAKE YOUTH MEETS DEATH

Remains of Robert Smith Found
in Water With Head Half
Blown Off

Robert Smith, aged 17, was accidentally shot and killed at Kitsumkalum Lake near Terrace according to advice which was received today by the local provincial police office from Constable Mancor of Terrace. Smith's remains were found at the lake with the head blown off and the body partly in the water.

Later investigation by Constable Mancor established the fact that death had been entirely accidental, the youth's parents being satisfied to this effect. The remains are being brought to Terrace and the tragedy is being fully investigated.

TRUE BILL AGAINST SECTION FOREMAN

Constantine Duralis Was Indicted
by Grand Jury at Supreme
Court Assizes This
Morning

A true bill was brought in by the Grand Jury at the Supreme Court Assizes this morning against Constantine Duralis who is charged with attempted rape and indecent assault against Mrs. Alexina Boudais at Doughty Station on September 22 last. Assizes are a railway section foreman. L. S. McGill of Smithers, is counsel for the defence. The hearing is proceeding this afternoon.

SUNDAY CONCERT PROVES SUCCESSFUL

Count Scheda Party Given Good
Reception at Westholme
Theatre

In spite of the unusually inclement weather which prevailed last night the special musical concert in the Westholme theatre given by Count Scheda and artists was a pronounced success, a large and appreciative audience being present. The artists were very indulgent and gave many encores with apparent delight.

The concert opened with pianoforte solos by Danielo Popovich, whose execution of the difficult masters brought forth rounds of applause. His selections included Sonata, B flat minor, by Chopin; In a three Horse Sleigh by Tchaikovsky; as an encore Mr. Popovich gave "Turkey in the Straw." Country Gardens by Grainger, and the Prelude, C sharp minor by Rachmaninoff concluded his excellent turn.

Andre Jovovich, the eminent Serbian baritone, gave a splendid selection of vocal numbers including Le Cor Fleigier; Toreador Song from "Carmen"; and the Blind Ploughman by Clarke. As encores he sang Solo Mio; My Cousin Carus and a Serbian March. The applause of the audience proved that Mr. Jovovich's performance was highly appreciated.

Count Scheda, was perhaps the favorite of the evening with his violin. He played Nel Carpio non Misento by Paganini; Scottish Caprice by Carl Guhr, and the Polish Dance by Wieniawski. As encores he played Cavatina by Rimowski, Home Sweet Home and Ave Marie. The execution of his popular program stamps the Count as a star in the firmament of the world's violinists.

The Count Scheda Concert party will leave for Anyox on Wednesday night.

LADY DECAPITATED CAUGHT UNDER CAR

SASKATOON, Oct. 23.—Miss Helen Bird, aged 21, of Saskatoon, was decapitated when an auto overturned and the running board descended across her neck. Her mother, who was also in the car, was seriously injured.

CANADIAN NATIONAL DIRECTORS GO EAST AS FAR AS QUEBEC

The board of directors of the Canadian National Railways who were touring the west came only as far as Jasper when they returned east without entering British Columbia. They are going direct through to Quebec. Word has been received here to that effect.

While there is no information to hand it is understood that the action of the directors has been influenced largely by a desire to meet the new president on his arrival in Canada and to bring him with them when they make the inspection in British Columbia.

DEMAND FOR MEN CENTRAL CANADA

WINNIPEG, Oct. 23.—Work for 3,000 men in the lumber camps is available at the present time, while more will be needed directly winter sets in, declared officials of the Employment Service of Canada. The demand for agricultural workers for post-harvest work remains unchanged, but the call for men in the building and construction group is quieter, painters and builders' laborers being the only class of laborers required at the present time, it is said. More than 500 men were transferred outside the province by the local bureau during the week, practically all being sent to the bush; about 60 construction workers were sent to work at Keewatin and Kenora.

LYMAN ABBOTT DIED SUNDAY

Famous Editor and Preacher
Passes Away After Active
Life

NEW YORK, Oct. 23.—The famous editor and preacher, Dr. Lyman Abbott, passed away here yesterday, aged 87 years.

Dr. Abbott was one of the most famous editors and religious writers of his day. He was the successor of the late Henry Ward Beecher as pastor of Plymouth Church, Brooklyn, and was an exponent of Liberal religious thought. As editor of the Outlook he is perhaps best known to people on this continent. His series of articles some years ago on "The Theology of an Evolutionist" caused a great stir in religious circles when the evolutionary concept was not as popular as it is today. He is the author of many books and up to quite recently contributed articles to the Outlook.

RUSSIAN CRUISER LOST IN BALTIC SEA

RIGA, Oct. 23.—The Russian armoured cruiser Rossya and Grombo and several other vessels was lost in a storm which swept the Baltic Sea.

BUCHAREST, Oct. 23.—Thirty people were killed and 85 injured in a train collision near here.

FOUND GUILTY LESSER COUNT

Jury Finds McEachern Guilty of
Unlawfully Wounding Mate
Matthews of Whaler

A verdict of guilty of unlawfully wounding with a recommendation for leniency was returned by the jury in the Rex vs. McEachern case at the Supreme Court Assizes before Mr. Justice Murphy this afternoon and adjournment was made until the end of the session when sentence will be pronounced. The taking of evidence and argument of counsel was heard this morning and the judge's charge was made just at the noon hour. The jury returned with its verdict shortly after 2 o'clock this afternoon. Archie Donaghy conducted the case for the crown and Milton Gonzales, of William & Gonzales, appeared for the defence.

Robert Watts Cameron, jeweler, gave evidence as to the rifle that was produced in court and with which the shooting was alleged to have been done. It was a short Lee-Enfield as was used in service in the recent war.

Evidence of Accused
McEachern, the accused, gave evidence on his own behalf. Previous to enlisting in 1915 he had been a tailor. He had followed that calling on his return from overseas until last spring when there had been domestic troubles and he had gone to Victoria to find work that would take him away from "civilization." He had obtained a job on a whaling boat and had got along well with the captain, officers and crew. There had never been trouble or ill feeling. On August 24, the date when the shooting took place, he and other members of the crew had gone ashore at Massett to get tobacco and clothing. At the store Raybone had noticed some lemon extract and they had purchased a bottle. This they consumed and went for more, considerable of which was drunk.

Accused said he did not remember sparring with Raybone on the wharf nor had he remembered anything about the shooting. The first thing he remembered was waking up in a strange house in Massett, that of Constable Singer. He had asked Mr. Singer how he got there and he was told he had shot the mate of the boat and jumped overboard. That was the first he knew of the shooting.

Regarding the increase in wages, he had spoken to the captain about it but there was no ill feeling. He had no reason or motive for wanting to shoot the captain or the mate. He had got along well with both.

Addresses Jury
In addressing the jury, Milton Gonzales, counsel for the defence, dealt with the clean record of the accused before the war, during service and since. Accused had not been sober that was evident. It could not be believed that accused had shot with intent.

A. Donaghy, counsel for the crown, suggested that accused had not been drunk enough not to know what he was doing.

Mr. Justice Murphy explained the counts to the jury. The charges of attempted murder and attempt to commit grievous bodily harm required proof of intent. If there was a doubt of the intent, it would be the jury's duty to find the accused guilty of wounding, about which there had been little controversy.

Soviet Wins Out in Eastern Siberia and People There are Awaiting Their New Rulers

VLADIVOSTOK, Oct. 23.—The curtain has been rung down on the final scene in the Russian revolution. Those who defended this port, the last outpost of opposition to Soviet rule are departing. In the final struggle a few hundred persons were killed and the people are sitting back waiting for their new rulers, the soviet leaders of the Far Eastern Republic, better known as the Chita Government, to arrive.

The soviet progress was held back for a long time by the presence of the Japanese but they were recently withdrawn and the soldiers of the old regime were powerless to meet the advancing foe.

By many the change is welcomed as promising to settle the troubles in Eastern Siberia and making it possible for the country to settle down to a period of quiet in which trade and commerce may be restored.

AMERICANS WON RACE

Schooner Henry Ford Two
Minutes Ahead of Blue-
nose at Finish

GLOUCESTER, Oct. 23.—Schooner Henry Ford won the schooner race today by about two minutes.

Schooner Henry Ford, the challenger, and the Canadian fishing boat Bluenose, the international fishing schooner champion, got away this morning in a good breeze in the first official race for the trophy.

Prior to the start the skipper and crew of the Henry Ford declared they would not start because Saturday's race was not recognized by the committee, but they were prevailed upon to start after the committee had ordered them to do so.

At the first mark the Henry Ford was 45 seconds ahead of the Bluenose.

Crew Annry
Only part of the regular racing crew of the Henry Ford, which won the Fishermen's boat race to day was aboard the winning vessel. The whole crew was angry at the ruling made after Saturday's race, which deprived them of victory, when the race was classed as unofficial because both boats ignored the committee's postponement signals.

Captain Morrissey, of the Henry Ford says Captain Walters of the Canadian boat told him today that he would be willing to consider the Cup won by America if the Henry Ford won again today.

Appeals made by Secretary of the Navy Denby induced some of the crew to go aboard with Captain Morrissey, while others were recruited from the wharves. The committee had announced that if the Henry Ford did not appear at the starting post, the Bluenose would go on without her.

NEW YORK, Oct. 23.—Federal Judge Learned Hand today dismissed a motion for a permanent injunction brought by Foreign and American steamship companies restraining federal prohibition agents from putting into effect the bone dry ruling of Attorney-General Daugherty. He extended the stay temporarily, however, providing the steamship companies file an immediate appeal to the United States supreme court.

25 FOOT TIDE ON SATURDAY AFTERNOON

No Damage is Reported Along the
Waterfront Either From This
or The Storm

The usual monthly high tide and a southwest wind tended to make the water of the harbor unusually high on Saturday afternoon when the variation between low and high water was 25 feet. This was not as high as on September 22, however, when the variation was 26 feet. No damage is reported along the waterfront either from high tide or the storm of the week-end.

STRANDED ON MUD NEAR METLAKATLA

Three Local Sportsmen Have to
Slay Out Late in Inclement
Weather

There were at least three people who did not enjoy the driving rain last evening. The three were Charles Starr, William Nelson and S. K. Campbell. They went to the Salt lagoon yesterday in search of ducks and anchored outside on the flats this side of Metlakatla. The tide was a very low one and as it went out it left the boat stranded on the mud and there it remained until much later than the hunters intended. They arrived home this morning before daylight.

International
Yacht Races.

The international yacht races for fishing boats on the Atlantic have been attracting attention all over the continent. Here people have been inquiring for news for many days. It is looked upon as an important event in sporting circles.

The suggestion has been made that a contest might be arranged for fishing boats plying out of Prince Rupert. A purse might be made up to present a substantial prize to the halibut boat making the quickest run to the banks and getting its catch back to port. All those taking part would have to leave the same day at the same time. They could go anywhere they wished but it would be obligatory to bring back a certain amount of fish, based on the classification of the boat. Each boat taking part would have to carry an official who would see that everything was done fairly. Such a race would attract attention all over the world and if prizes of say \$2,000 and \$1,000 were given they would be worth competing for. From a sporting point of view and also from a fishing point of view nothing would advertise the city as well and the cost would not be large. It might be run in connection with the fall fair next year. It would be the most pretentious and spectacular event of the year and would be talked of all over the world. Pictures of the boats would get into the London and New York newspapers and illustrated journals and magazine articles would be written about it. It might be worth considering.

Need Of Elevator
At This Port.

Vancouver newspapers have been campaigning with a view to securing more grain elevator accommodation at that port. In that they are quite justified. It has been shown that grain may be shipped from this coast successfully and that the Orient is gradually demanding Canadian wheat. This all being true, Prince Rupert has a right to a grain elevator just as much as Vancouver. We are not suggesting we should get it instead of them. All we are asking is that we shall get our share and that the new railway board will give attention to the situation in which we are placed. We are quite aware that we have a good advocate on the railway board, but we are not quite satisfied that we should leave everything to him. The persistent agitation of Vancouver may possibly make itself felt in political circles so that we may not get just that amount of consideration from the railway which is our due. Money for improvements by the railway has to be voted by the government and it is to them as well as to the railway directors that we must look.

Empire Exhibition
Worthy Of Support.

Canada will undoubtedly take part in the Empire Exhibition and it is to be hoped it will be on such a scale as is consistent with the importance of the country. While there should be no lavish display or attempt to spend Canadian money extravagantly, there can be a good exhibit staged without any outrageous cost. We cannot afford to pass up the advertising effect of such an exhibition as that is bound to be.

Many Canadians will visit England during the exhibition and they would be ashamed to find their country occupying anything but an important place at this big event.

All the other parts of the Empire are to be well represented and the Canadian Government will be well advised to see that this part of the Empire has its share of publicity.

Civic Expenditures
Are Being Discussed.

From one end of Canada to the other, civic expenditures are under fire. Prince Rupert's case is not an isolated one although it must be admitted it seems to be an aggravated one. There is a general campaign against luxurious expenditures. People who are criticizing are of the opinion that no expenditure should be made unless it can be shown that dividends will accrue.

So far as we have been able to discover there is no town in Canada of the population of Prince Rupert where the expenditures are anything like as high as they are here. This has no reference to the city utilities, the accounts for which to a large extent are kept separate. The general expenditures of the city here are about double the expenditures on other cities or towns or municipalities. This is not owing to the physical conditions but owing to extravagant methods and tastes.

FISH DAY ON
ALL HALLOWS

October 31 is Set Apart as National Day to Feature Industry

The idea of a national Fish Day should appeal to Prince Rupert people and doubtless the Fisheries Association here will celebrate the occasion fittingly. On that day special attention will be called to the value of fish as a diet and so far as we are concerned to its commercial possibilities.

Authorities say fish should be used once a day, at least. Contrary to popular belief it has all the requisite food properties for people who follow hard manual or mental occupations. It has additional advantages, though, of being easily digested and being procured at low cost. Many persons engaged in sedentary occupations are big meat consumers and do not spare the time for the necessary physical exercise properly to digest the food. Fish solves the problem for this class of worker. Dietitians and medical experts the world over recommend fish for people with defective digestive organs and for people so stricken that they are incapable of the least physical exertion. It stands to reason if it is good in these instances it is good for all.

Plenty of Variety

There are other features also which make a fish diet advisable. There are hundreds of different kinds of edible fish and twenty or thirty of them may be obtained any day in the local fish stations. There is no such variety to choose from when one comes to the flesh of animals. Culinary experts declare furthermore, that fish is extremely susceptible to the gastronomic art. A single species, says one expert, may be used three times a day seven days a week and served in such a variety of ways as not to appear monotonous.

The government endorses National Fish Day because of its desire to develop the great national resource which the country inherits. One would deplore the waste involved in dumping hundreds of tons of good edible fish into a dump heap. Is it not equally wasteful to allow the same fish to stay unutilized in the seas?

Below Normal

Canadians have the raw material to attain pre-eminence as a fish-producing people. They can produce the fish, but the difficulty is to find a market for it. The domestic market offers the best field for development because at present fish consumption is away below normal. They eat on an average not more than twenty pounds a year, while England uses fifty-six, Germany forty-five, countries bordering on European fishing grounds, from thirty-five to fifty, while Japan consumes no less than 200 pounds each per year.

If fish is not being used regularly people would do well to incorporate it judiciously in their diet, serving themselves not only physically but economically.

MATERIAL FOR ROAD SURFACING FROM TAR SANDS INVESTIGATED

EDMONTON, Alta., Oct. 20.

The research department of the University of Alberta has made excellent progress in developing a good road surfacing material from natural tar sands from the Fort McMurray district. A process has been developed whereby the asphalt can be extracted from the sand. It is planned to carry investigations on during the winter, the university having secured twenty-two tons of the sands which will be reduced. With the four or five tons of asphalt obtained, stretches of rural roads will be surfaced. If this surfacing stands the test, it is expected the development of the deposits will assume large proportions.

Two tons of the sand have been brought to Edmonton by the Dominion Government and all those who desire an opportunity to experiment with them can obtain samples from the lands office here.

The McMurray field comprises 75 square miles of tar sand deposits ranging to 18 feet in depth along the Athabasca river and its tributaries, according to a government engineer who recently concluded a special investigation.

SAVINGS BANK IS SUCCESSFUL

Manitoba Province Gives Report of Provincial Institution for Two Years

WINNIPEG, Oct. 23.—The first annual report of a department of the provincial government to be drawn up this year is the report of the Provincial Savings office. It is shown the government bank, in the two years it has been in business, has accumulated deposits totalling \$4,334,013.7; has made profits sufficient to pay off the \$33,544 advanced by the government for initial organization and operating expenses and in addition now shows a net surplus of \$10,000. The bank is now making a monthly profit over all expenses of \$2,000.

This report, issued by E. A. Weir, chairman of the board of directors of the bank and manager, has been forwarded to Hon. F. M. Black, provincial treasurer.

Steady Progress Made.

The progress of the institution has been increasing steadily since its inception, the report shows, and the best month in the history of the organization was the closing month of the last fiscal year, August, when more than 700 new accounts were added to the books, meaning about 30 new depositors per business day. There are 12,000 depositors in the bank.

The increase in the deposits during the nine month period, starting December, 1921, is shown at \$1,126,950.93.

The deposits in the bank are in the main held and used by the provincial government. Of the grand total, \$3,200,000 is used by the provincial treasurer; \$874,980 is invested in Victory bonds—which it is shown are worth \$10,571.69 more now than was paid for them—and the remainder of the funds is held as cash in the various banks with which the organization has depositing arrangements.

Interest Received

The total interest received by the bank from its investments during the period covered by the report was \$161,991.23 and the interest paid to depositors was \$109,840.78, leaving a net revenue of \$52,150.45. The administration and operating expenses for the year were \$34,777.88, leaving a net profit of \$17,372.57.

The personnel of the board which controls the bank is: E. A. Weir, chairman and manager; J. R. Murray, assistant general manager of the United Grain Growers; R. S. Ward, who is also a member of the Workmen's Compensation board and who represents labor; and F. J. Collier, a successful farmer and stock breeder, who lives at Macauley, Manitoba.

Opened in 1920

The bank was started Aug. 18, 1920, and the provincial government, to defray initial expenses and the early operating costs, put up the sum of \$33,544. By the end of this sum had been paid back and the annual report just issued shows the balance to be set aside out of profits for payment.

The figures are taken from an audit of the bank's books by the Price Waterhouse accounting firm.

MODERN APPLIANCE STAMPING LETTERS

Machine Obviates Use of Stamps
Where Much Mailing Is
to be Done

OTTAWA, Oct. 23.—(Canadian Press)—In pursuance of the Postmaster General's policy to study modern appliances with a view to their adoption in connection with Post Office work, if deemed advisable, sanction was recently given for a demonstration before officers of the Meter department for a Postage Meter machine, and the question of approval of this particular style is now under consideration.

The machine which is driven by a small electric motor, prints an impression on each letter signifying that say 3c. postage has been paid, also showing the date and hour at which the letter was prepared for mailing. If desired, it also seals the letter in the one operation. Connected with the printing die is a small, ingeniously devised mechanism which records the number of letters stamped Postage Paid. This recording device is called the Postage Meter and is under the control of the Post Office. It is set to record the number of letters specified in a contract granted on payment of the amount of postage involved. When this total is reached the device locks automatically and will print no more impressions until re-set at the Post Office. The main portion of the machine may however, continue to be used for sealing envelopes if desired. The machine operates at a speed of approximately 250 pieces per minute and stamps letters of varying size and thickness.

The benefits to be derived from the use of such a machine by business concerns which send out a large letter mail or which use the mails to a considerable extent for advertising may briefly be summarized as follows:

1. Postage being paid in cash, there is no necessity to purchase large quantities of postage stamps.
2. No loss of postage through stamps falling off letters due to excessive moistening of stamps by office staff.
3. Time saved in closing letters.
4. More expeditious treatment at Post Office, as letters or circulars when so mailed are immediately ready for sorting and despatch.

INDUSTRIAL BANK IN RUSSIA IS FORMED

MOSCOW, Oct. 20.—Private interests in Russia has received further recognition by the Communists. The government has granted permission to private persons to participate, by their capital, in the organization of a Trade and Industrial Bank.

The institution which is now being organized and will begin its operations in November will be a private limited company. Fifty-one per cent of the shares are assigned to the founders, the Supreme Economic Council, while the remainder will be covered by public subscriptions by the trusts and syndicates, and private persons.

The new bank is going to finance industry and transport on a broad, commercial basis. Private capital is not only allowed to participate, but guarantee is given to place its representatives on the board of directors of the bank.

SPEED SYSTEM IN FOOTBALL

Difficult to Account For Large
Number of Accidents This
Year

LONDON, Oct. 23.—(Canadian Press)—Although only in its early stages, the football season has already levied a heavy toll, the list of injured players being unusually lengthy. The matches, with a very few exceptions, have been free from illegal plays, so that it is somewhat difficult to assign a cause for the many accidents. Foul tactics are no more prevalent than in former years, and so far as first-class games this season are concerned, football has never been cleaner.

Getting Faster
The desire for speed, and the accomplishment of this desire, is held in some quarters to be the main reason for the long trail of accidents this autumn. Football is very much faster than it used to be and consequently when two players come into contact while going at full speed there is more likelihood of injury, if only because of the greater momentum. Again, if a player running at top speed, in seeking to pass his opponent happens to lose his balance when tackled, he falls very heavily, and where a defender has locked a ball the attacking player frequently wrenches his ankle or knee, owing to the sudden jerk with which he is brought up. It is from the latter cause that a considerable number of injuries have been sustained.

Opponents of the "speed system" say that these accidents are unavoidable and must be expected so long as the present style of playing continues. They also charge that the value of speed or pace has been over-rated and that the time devoted to its development is not warranted by the results obtained, and they point to the result of the last two international matches with Scotland as justifying their criticisms.

Lacks Combination
In the last two internationals between England and Scotland, the English side was admittedly the faster, but was lacking in combination and the speed was soon reduced to helplessness by the determination and skilful anticipation of those whose business it was to keep the ball from entering the Scottish goal. At Birmingham last April the English forwards must have scored again and again if they had kept their heads when in the neighborhood of goal. They over-ran the ball, shot wildly or hesitated until they were robbed, or they failed completely to place in possession when tackled, or just before they were tackled, a colleague who was exceedingly well-placed to defeat the Scottish goal-keeper. There was pace in plenty in the English attack, but there was not enough skill.

If, in the future, more attention is not paid to football strategy and subtlety and less dependence placed on mere speed, there will be an immense improvement in first class football as a spectacle and a sensible reduction in the number of injuries to players, is the prediction of the "anti-speed" element.

TOMMY BURNS HAS NEW WHITE HOPE TRAINING ENGLAND

Former Local Resident Busy in
London Training Irish
Giant.

Tommy Burns, ex-heavyweight champion and formerly a resident of this city and now in London, England, claims to have found a new "white hope" in Robert Read, a gigantic Irish youth who lived in Scotland since he was 12 years old. Read is now 21. He is 6 feet 4-2 inches tall, weighs nearly 200 pounds, and has a reach of 81 1-2 inches, 7 1-2 inches more than Dempsey's.

In a photograph sent to the Daily Mail, the new man towers above him; Burns head reaches only to Read's shoulders. Read has a good appearance, an athletic build, and is gaining fight experience in the rough and tumble life of the English travelling boxing show, a familiar sight at any small town carnival or country fair.

Burns says that he has tried

Read out and that he is not disappointed in him. "Last year Read won the amateur western district championship in Scotland," said Burns. "He is a quiet, gentlemanly boy, and of course he needs a lot of experience. Only time can tell whether he will develop into a real champion. The experience with the travelling boxing show, which he joined after winning the amateur championship, certainly won't do him any harm."

Sport Chat

Samuel Reschieski, the nine-year-old Polish chess prodigy, lost his first game recently in the ninth American Chess Congress.

Playing in the fourth round against I. Bernstein, New York State champion, he was forced to resign after 41 moves. Bernstein launched an energetic attack, which carried him through to victory, when the boy wonder began with a faulty defence, after declining the queen's gambit.

The bout between Panchito Villa, United States flyweight champion, and Frankie Mason of Fort Wayne, scheduled for Oct. 30, has been ordered cancelled by the chairman of the State Athletic commission. The bout was ordered off on the ground that the former champion is thoroughly outclassed by Villa.

Laid up in New York for six weeks as the result of an operation, Gene Sarazen, America's greatest golfer, will lose \$3,000 in matches. Walter Hagen and other professionals will fill the dates Sarazen had to cancel.

Upon the advice of John McGraw, manager of the Giants, Arthur Nehf, Irish Meusel and George Kelly will decline the invitation to go to Japan with a specially picked team.

Jack Britton, welterweight champion of the world, will defend his title in a 15-round bout at Madison Square Garden, New York, on November 1, against Micky Walker, of Newark.

The United States commissioner of internal revenue announces that with 185,947 paid admissions to the World baseball series and receipts totalling \$605,475, the admission tax collected by the Federal government from the series was \$60,547.50.
